JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY.

The North Carolina Annual Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, met in its seventy-sixth annual session in Hay Street Methodist Church, Fayetteville, N. C., on Wednesday morning, November 27, 1912, Bishop Collins Denny in the chair.

The Conference was opened with the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, conducted by Bishop Denny.

On motion R. H. Willis was elected Secretary.

On nomination of R. H. Willis, J. L. Cuninggim was elected Assistant Secretary; G. T. Simmons, Recording Secretary, and W. W. Peele, Statistical Secretary.

On motion of R. B. John the hours for the sessions of the Conference were fixed as follows: Meet at 9:30 a. m. and adjourn at 1:00 p. m.

Rev. W. F. McMurray, D.D., Secretary of the Board of Church Extension, and Rev. James Cannon, D.D., of the Virginia Conference, Superintendent of the Southern Methodist Assembly, were introduced to the Conference.

On motion it was ordered that the Presiding Elders nominate committees.

A. McCullen, for the Presiding Elders, nominated the usual committees for this session of the Conference and they were elected. (See Committees in Appendix.)

Communications were received from the Board of Education, Board of Church Extension, Board of Missions, Board of Trustees, Department of Ministerial Supply and Training, Publishing Agents and Sunday School Department of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and were

referred respectively to the Board of Education, Board of Church Extension, Board of Missions, Joint Board of Finance, Board of Education, Committee on Books and Periodicals, and the Sunday School Board.

J. D. Bundy introduced a resolution fixing the time when reports calling for increased assessments may be considered and it was adopted. (Resolution No. 1 in Appendix.)

On motion of M. C. Thomas it was ordered that Committees on Sabbath Observance and Temperance be elected.

A. McCullen, for the Presiding Elders, nominated these committees, and they were elected. (See Committees in Appendix.)

L. S. Massey submitted the report of the Trustees of Louisburg Female College, and it was referred to the Board of Education.

L. S. Massey submitted and read his report as Editor and Business Manager of the *Raleigh Christian Advocate*, and it was referred to the Committee on Books and Periodicals.

Rev. W. F. McMurray, D.D., addressed the Conference in the interest of Church Extension.

Rev. J. S. Hunter, of the Virginia Conference, was introduced and represented the Richmond branch of the Publishing House.

Rev. James Cannon, D.D., spoke in behalf of the Southern Methodist Assembly.

The report of the Board of Trustees of Trinity College was presented and referred to the Board of Education.

On motion of R. C. Beaman the following were elected a Committee on Public Worship: R. B. John, L. E. Thompson, and J. H. Judd.

On motion of R. H. Willis the following were nominated Assistant Statistical Secretaries, and they were elected: L. D. Hayman, T. M. Grant, E. B. Craven, F. S. Love, C. J.

Harrell, J. W. Bradley, Rufus Bradley, J. W. Autry, T. G. Vickers.

On motion of R. B. John it was ordered that Thanksgiving service be held tomorrow at 11:30 o'clock, and that Bishop Denny be requested to preach the sermon.

Question 6 was called, "Who are received by transfer from other Conferences?" The Bishop announced the transfer of E. C. Glenn from the Western North Carolina Conference, and Marvin W. Hester from the Central Texas Conference.

Question 22 was called, viz: "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?"

R. C. Beaman, M. T. Plyler, R. B. John, J. E. Underwood, J. H. Hall, A. McCullen, R. F. Bumpas, J. T. Gibbs, and N. H. D. Wilson, Presiding Elders, reported the year's work on their respective Districts, and their characters were passed.

R. W. Townsend, W. H. Townsend, and J. O. Guthrie passed the examination of character, and their names were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the supernumerary relation.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction by Rev. M. C. Thomas.

SECOND DAY.

The Conference opened at 9:30 a. m., Bishop Denny in the chair.

The devotional services were conducted by Rev. A. P. Tyer.

The minutes of the former session were read and, after correction, approved.

H. A. Page, alternate from the Rockingham District, was substituted for L. R. Hamer.

Communications from the Epworth League Board of the

Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Biblical Department of Vanderbilt University were received and referred respectively to the Epworth League Board and the Board of Education.

Question 22 was called, viz: "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?"

M. C. Thomas, J. E. Thompson, A. D. Betts, T. J. Browning, G. D. Langston, T. P. Bonner, W. A. Forbes, and W. H. Kirton passed the examination of character and were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the superannuate relation.

W. H. Puckett and F. A. Bishop, having died during the year, their names were referred to the Committee on Memoirs.

T. J. Dailey, J. Y. Old, and D. C. Geddie passed the examination of character.

In answer to Question 2, viz: "Who remain on trial?" Robert Grandison Lee Edwards, Robert Elijah Pittman, Nathan Bradley Strickland, James Allen Morris, and Charles Edward Vale passed the examination of character, and, having been approved by the Examining Committee, were advanced to the class of the second year.

Roger Hunter Hasty, William V. McRae, and John W. Frank passed the examination of character and were continued in the class of the first year.

Shockley J. Kilpatrick was discontinued at his own request.

Communications from Carolina College, Greensboro Female College, and Littleton Female College were received and referred to the Board of Education.

In answer to Question 14, "What traveling preachers are elected elders?" Hicks Edward Lance, Walter Adair Stanbury, William Joseph Watson, Junius Arthur Martin, Marvin Young Self, and Franklin Swindell Love, passed the examination of character, and, having been approved by the Examining Committee, were elected to elders' orders.

Thurman Gomez Vickers, James Joshua Boone, Neil M. McDonald, and Robert D. Daniel passed the examination of character and were continued in the class of the fourth year.

In answer to Question 9, viz: "Who are the deacons of one year?" Frank Culbreth, George H. Biggs, Robert L. Carraway, Thomas M. Grant, and Cornelius B. Cullbreth passed the examination of character, and having been approved by the Examining Committee, were advanced to the class of the fourth year.

Marcus W. Dargan and Clarence R. Canipe passed the examination of character, and were continued in the class of the third year.

Walter Patten, George S. Bearden, and George Milton Daniel passed the examination of character, and, having been approved by the Examining Committees for the second and third years, were advanced to the class of the fourth year.

Jesse Marvin Ormond, Lewis D. Hayman, John E. Blacklock, Costen J. Harrell, Kirby F. Duval, and Bernard T. Hurley passed the examination of character and were reported as having been approved by the Examining Committee and the Committee on Admissions.

Thomas C. Ellers and Eugene E. Barnette passed the examination of character and were continued in the class of the second year.

George Milton Daniel was elected to deacon's orders.

Doctrine H. Read was discontinued at his own request.

Elijah L. Stack passed the examination of character, and having been approved by the Examining Committee was advanced to the class of the third year.

Bishop Denny announced that tomorrow morning at 10:30 o'clock the class would be received into full connection.

On motion of R. B. John is was ordered that immediately following the reception of the class into full connec-

tion tomorrow morning, memorial services be made the order of the day.

J. N. Cole presented and read the report from the Methodist Orphanage and it was referred to the Orphanage Committee.

Question 1 was called, viz.: "Who are admitted on trial?"

Thomas William Lee, Julian Lewark Midgette and James Herbert Miller from the Elizabeth City District; Baxter Boone Slaughter, and Harry Cleveland Smith from the Durham District; Nathan Martin Wright and George Washington Perry from the Fayetteville District; Eff David Dodd, Frank Treat Fulcher, and William Bynum Humble from the New Bern District; Edwin Lee Jones from the Charlotte District, Western North Carolina Annual Conference, and Robert Nicholson Fitts from the Warrenton District, having been recommended by their respective District Conferences, and having been approved by the Examining Committee and the Committee on Admissions, were admitted on trial.

The Conference adjourned with the Thanksgiving service conducted by Bishop Denny.

THIRD DAY.

The Conference met at 9:30 a. m., Bishop Denny in the chair.

The opening devotional services were conducted by Rev. W. B. North.

The minutes of the last session were read and approved.

Telegrams conveying Christian greetings were received from the South Carolina Annual Conference now in session and from Bishop John C. Kilgo. On motion the secretary was instructed to make suitable response by telegram to each of these messages.

A communication from the Sunday League of America was received and was referred to the Committee on Sabbath Observance.

J. J. Porter having died during the year, his name was referred to the Committee on Memoirs.

On motion the names of M. A. Smith, J. Y. Old, W. H. Moore and J. D. Pegram were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the superannuate relation.

On motion of A. P. Tyler the selection of the place for holding the next session of the Conference was made the order of the day tomorrow at 10:30 a. m.

Question 12 was called, viz.: "What local preachers are elected deacons?"

Frank Treat Fulcher, Charles Edward Vale, and Eff David Dodd from the New Bern District and Samuel James McConnell from the Rockingham District having been recommended by their respective District Conferences, were elected to deacons' orders.

Question 16 was called, viz.: "What local preachers are elected elders?"

William Bynum Humble having been recommended by the New Bern District Conference, was elected to elder's orders.

Question 5 was called, viz.: "Who are readmitted?"

Answer: No one.

Question 7 was called, viz.: "Who are received from other churches as local preachers?"

Thomas Mossette Lee having been recommended by the Wilmington District Conference and having sent up a certified subscription to our doctrines and discipline, and to our ordination vows, was received as a local elder from the Pentecostal Holiness Church.

Question 8 was called, viz.: "Who are received from other churches as traveling preachers?"

William Hoops Smith, an elder in the Disciple Church, having been approved by the Committee on Admissions, his

orders were recognized, and he was received into full connection, coming before the Conference and taking upon him our ordination vows.

W. B. Cooper presented and read the report of the Sunday School Board, which was adopted. (Report No. 1 in Appendix.)

On motion of J. T. Gibbs, Bishop Denny was authorized to draw on the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of the Conference for \$586.03 in favor of the Joint Board of Finance.

In answer to Question 4, viz.: "Who are admitted into full connection?" Jesse Marvin Ormond, Lewis D. Hayman, Costen J. Harrell, Kirby F. Duval, Bernard T. Hurley, Walter Patten and George Milton Daniel having been approved by the Examining Committee and the Committee on Admissions, were examined by Bishop Denny in open Conference, and were, upon the vote of the Conference in each case, received into full connection. John E. Blalock had been approved by the committees, but was not present to be received into full connection.

N. H. D. Wilson made an appeal in behalf of T. H. Bain, who has served many years as a supply in the Conference, and a collection was taken for his benefit.

Rev. Lester Smith, Rev. K. A. McCloud and Rev. W. M. Fairley, all of the Presbyterian Church; Rev. J. D. Hammond, D.D., president of Paine College; Rev. W. B. Bates, of the Virginia Conference, representing the American Bible Society, and Dr. H. M. Hamill, Superintendent of Training Work in the Sunday School Department, were introduced to the Conference.

The hour having arrived for the order of the day, Question 21 was called, viz.: "What preachers have died during the past year?"

F. A. Bishop, W. H. Puckett, J. J. Porter and W. A. Jenkins having died during the year, their memoirs were read respectively by R. B. John, A. L. Ormond, N. H. D.

Wilson, and D. H. Tuttle, and they were adopted. (Memoirs Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4 in Appendix.)

Dr. H. M. Hamill spoke to the Conference in the interest of our Sunday school work.

A. J. Parker presented and read the report of the Epworth League Board, which was adopted. (Report No. 2 in Appendix.)

On motion of J. T. Gibbs, R. D. Daniel was located at his own request.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction by Rev. J. D. Hammond, D.D.

FOURTH DAY.

The Conference met at 9:30 a. m., Bishop Denny in the chair.

The opening devotional services were conducted by Rev. J. N. Cole.

The minutes of the last session were read and approved.

N. H. D. Wilson introduced a resolution relating to increase of assessments.

While this resolution was being discussed the hour for the special order arrived, and Question 48 was called, viz.: "Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?"

A. P. Tyer presented an invitation from Oxford Church; J. C. Wooten presented an invitation from Grace Church, Wilmington; E. M. Hoyle presented an invitation from Jarvis Memorial Church, Greenville. Oxford received a majority of the votes cast and was chosen as the place for the next session of the Conference. On motion the vote was made unanimous.

Thurman Gomez Vickers, having been approved by the Examining Committee, was elected to elder's orders.

Dr. J. D. Hammond addressed the Conference in the interest of Paine College. Bishop Denny spoke upon our

duty to the negro and a collection was taken for Paine College, amounting to \$1,395.21 in cash and subscriptions.

Walter F. Pierce, manager of the Richmond branch of the Publishing House, was introduced.

Rev. W. G. Bates addressed the Conference in the interest of the American Bible Society.

J. A. Hornaday presented and read the report of the Joint Board of Finance and it was adopted. (Report No. 3 in Appendix.)

On motion the time for adjournment was extended twenty minutes.

Question 8 was called, viz.: "Who are received from other churches as traveling preachers?"

R. L. Andrews, an elder in the Wesleyan Methodist Church, having been approved by the Committee on Admissions and having subscribed to our doctrines and discipline and to our ordination vows, was received into full connection.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Denny.

FIFTH DAY.

The Conference assembled at 9:00 a. m., Bishop Denny in the chair.

The opening devotional services were conducted by Rev. T. A. Sykes.

The minutes of the last session were read and approved.

N. H. D. Wilson in the name of the signers withdrew the paper offered by him at the last session.

Questions 11, 13, 15 and 17 were called and the following was given in answer:

I Collins Denny, one of the Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, certify that on Sunday morning, the first day of December, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and twelve, in Hay Street Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in the city of Fayetteville, State of

North Carolina, after preaching a sermon based on the seventh verse of the sixth chapter of the Epistle to the Galatians, A. P. Tyer, an Elder, reading the Epistle, I ordained George Milton Daniel, a traveling preacher, to the office of Deacon in the Church of God, and the following local preachers to the same office: Frank Treat Fulcher, Charles Edward Vale, Samuel James McConnell, and Eff David Dodd.

At the same time and place, J. T. Gibbs, an Elder, reading the Gospel, and assisted by the two Elders named, and also by A. D. Betts and Jesse L. Cuninggim, Elders, all four of whom joined in the laying on of hands, I ordained the following traveling preachers to the office of Elder in the Church of God: Hicks Edward Lance, Walter Adair Stanbury, William Joseph Watson, Junius Arthur Martin, Marvin Young Self, Franklin Swindell Love, and Thurman Gomez Vickers; and William Bynum Humble a local preacher.

Given under my hand at Fayetteville, in the State of North Carolina, the first day of December, in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and twelve.

Y. T. Ormond introduced a resolution relative to anniversary of laymen's movement, which was adopted. (Resolution No. 2 in Appendix.)

The Secretary read the report of C. E. Weatherby, Conference Leader, which was adopted. (Report No. 4 in Appendix.)

The report of the Board of Church Extension was presented and read by J. E. Holden and it was adopted. (Report No. 5 in Appendix.)

The report of the Committee on Conference Relations was presented and read by E. E. Rose and it was adopted. (Report No. 6 in Appendix.)

Questions 23-45 were called and answered. (See General Minutes.)

Question 47 was called, viz.: "Who is elected Conference Leader?"

Y. T. Ormond nominated C. E. Weatherby and he was elected.

L. E. Sawyer presented, and the Secretary read, the report of the Orphanage Committee, which was adopted. (Report No. 7 in Appendix.)

J. C. Wooten presented and read the report of the Board of Education which, after being amended, was adopted. (Report No. 8 in Appendix.)

On motion of N. H. D. Wilson it was ordered that we go into the election of editor of the *Raleigh Christian Advocate*. H. M. North and J. E. Holden were appointed tellers and the ballot was taken. L. S. Massey received a majority of the votes cast, and was declared elected.

R. L. Davis presented and read the report of the Committee on Temperance, which after being amended was adopted. (Report No. 9 in Appendix.)

J. D. Bundy presented and read the report of the Board of Missions, which was adopted. (Report No. 10 in Appendix.)

M. T. Plyler introduced a resolution calling for larger voluntary service, which was adopted. (Resolution No. 3 in Appendix.)

Rufus Bradley presented and read the report of the Committee on Church Property, which was adopted. (Report No. 11 in Appendix.)

L. T. Singleton presented and read the report of the Committee on Sabbath Observance, which was adopted. (Report No. 12 in Appendix.)

C. W. Robinson presented a resolution of thanks, which was adopted. (Resolution No. 4 in Appendix.)

The Secretary read the report of the Committee on District Conference Records, which was adopted. (Report No. 13 in Appendix.)

Question 46 was called and answered. (See General Minutes.)

E. H. McWhorter presented and read the report of the Committee on Books and Periodicals, which was adopted. (Report No. 14 in Appendix.)

L. E. Thompson, for the Committee on Public Worship, announced that Rev. J. D. Bundy had been chosen to preach the opening sermon at the next session of the Conference and Rev. H. M. North alternate.

Question 22 was called, viz.: "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and administration?"

REV. FRANKLIN A. BISHOP.

Franklin A. Bishop, son of Grear and Eliza Garrason Bishop, was born in Wilmington, North Carolina, August 26, 1848, and died January 6, 1912. He was converted when a young man and joined old Front Street Church. Consciousness of the love of God brought him great joy and he became at once zealous for his Lord, and sought to show others the way of salvation. Before joining Conference he spent three years at Trinity College in Randolph County. On the 26th of November, 1871, he was married to Rachel Alexander of New Hanover County. The flowers had bloomed and the birds had sung but one short summer over his resting place before a new-made grave received the mortal remains of her with whom he had journeyed for forty years.

Brother Bishop joined the North Carolina Conference at Greensboro in 1876 and served in succession the following charges, viz.: Coharie Mission, Cumberland Circuit, Cokesbury Circuit, Bladen Circuit, Lincolnton Circuit, Plymouth, Fairfield, Greenville, Beaufort, Henderson, Main Street (Durham), Hertford, and New Bern Stations: the Fayetteville and Washington Districts as Presiding Elder; then Central Church (Raleigh), Selma, Louisburg and Dunn. One year ago, on account of his hopelessly impaired health, he, with deep regret, asked to be superannuated. For the last four years he had attempted the work of the pastorate in great weakness and with the unafraid consciousness that on any day the silver cord might be loosed. Five weeks from the time he laid down his armor he passed to the triumphant ranks and was buried in lovely Oakwood Cemetery in the city of his birth.

The places and dates set forth mark the movements and bring before us the fields of labor of dear Frank Bishop, whose commanding figure, cordial greeting and warm clasp of the hand made him a conspicuous figure at our annual gatherings.

As a preacher Brother Bishop was always strong. His sermons were chiefly exegetical and textual. He had the power of unfolding the meaning of Scriptures so that others wondered why they had not seen it that way before. His English was excellent. Thought fitted into thought and his well rounded periods and resonant voice always compelled the attention of his audience. He grasped strongly the fundamental doctrines of Methodism and contended for them in no uncertain way. He was a militant preacher. I have thought the civil and political conditions of his section during the formative period of his life helped to develop this trait of his character. He was in his seventeenth year when Appomattox became historic, and for six months he belonged to the Home Guard of the Confederacy. He was within hearing distance of every gun fired in the terrific bombardment of Fort Fisher, a few miles below Wilmington, and felt the distress of the fall of his native city. From then on to his maturity were years of uncer-

tainty and tumult and passion, times when the powers of aggression and resistance were called into full play. Brother Bishop as preacher and as a man was always brave. He had well defined convictions, and where he stood on any vital question was always known. He dealt in no sophistries and knew no evasions of responsibility. Everywhere his stay and pastorate among a people left a clearer atmosphere and sturdier manliness. These are values that cannot be tabulated. He won the confidence of men and held it. From Coharie mission to his last charge are to be found today those whose friendship for him never changed, and as we meet them here and there they almost uniformly, and often with emotion, say, "Brother Bishop was a good man."

His power to give and win friendship was invaluable in his pastoral work. Ever ready to strike error with the hammer of the Word, he was no less ready to go with healing sympathy to sorrowing and burdened hearts. His feelings were quickly aroused for every kind of distress, and he went with willing steps to where comfort was needed; and when human sympathy was inadequate his fervent prayers helped many a weary soul into spiritual kingdoms.

For eight years previous to his death Brother Bishop was a Trustee of Trinity College, and to this institution he gave his ardent support.

Brother Bishop's life completed two pleasing circles. He was sent to Coharie mission before the days of railroads and towns in that section, and he preached in schoolhouses round about where is now the town of Dunn. At one of these he organized a church known as Black's Chapel. This church is now a part of the Dunn charge, and thus he ended his ministry where he began, and preached to the church whose foundations he had laid. He was born and was reared in Wilmington, and from that city went to the one not made with hands.

Two days before his death it was my privilege to visit Brother Bishop. He knew he was nearing the river's brink, and he wished me to say to the Conference that his skies were clear, and sad, as I was taking my leave, "Give my love to all the brethren."

REV. WILLIAM H. PUCKETT.

When our friends are called of God to pass through the doorway of death to enter into that blissful experience of immortality, their memories are embalmed in our hearts and their virtues inspire us to higher aspirations and nobler achievements.

While the world is on the rush in business, fulfilling duty and following pleasure, it is eminently fitting that love and friendship and memory should cause us to pause and commemorate the virtues of our translated brother.

The man called of God to be a messenger to dying men and minister to the needy is no ordinary man. He is a shepherd to

feed the flock, to nurture the lambs, to lead them out into pastures green, to stand upon the walls a faithful watchman to warn the people, to cry aloud preparing the way of the Lord. Such was the mission of our brother deceased.

William H. Puckett, to whose memory we pay loving tribute today, was born in Tyrrell County, North Carolina, March 17, 1856, and died in Smithfield, N. C., June 1, 1912. He was the son of W. C. Puckett and Hester A. Spruill, his wife. He was reared in a Christian home, was converted and joined the Methodist Church at old Scuppernon Church on Columbia Circuit, under the ministry of the sainted W. H. Clegg, when 13 years of age, and remained in this connection until God called him to join the Church triumphant.

Both of his parents were Methodists and were members of the church he joined. His grandfather, Thomas C. Puckett, was a local Methodist preacher and came from Virginia to North Carolina. His mother was the daughter of James A. Spruill, a Methodist class leader.

He was elected superintendent of the Sunday school at his home church when seventeen years of age, was licensed to exhort when eighteen, and licensed to preach at the age of twenty.

His opportunities for an education were not so good as many, but he made the best of what he had. He attended the district school in his neighborhood between the laying-by of the crop, and the gathering of the same, for several years during his boyhood days. Later he attended a private school at Sunnyside, in Washington County, N. C., for two terms, and went to high school at Fairfield, in Hyde County, N. C., for one year.

While attending the last named school Dr. William Closs had him put on the Jones Circuit as a supply, which charge he served three years—1879, 1880 and 1881.

When the Conference met at Winston in 1880 he was received on trial into the Conference. In 1882 he was sent to Carteret Circuit, and at the end of the year, his health failed. He being discontinued, went back to the local ranks, in which connection he remained four years—1883, 1884, 1885 and 1886.

During the year 1886 he was again employed as a supply and sent to Carteret Circuit, and at the close of the year was readmitted on trial into the Conference at Reidsville, N. C., and sent back to Carteret Circuit.

His appointments after 1886 were as follows: Hillsboro Circuit, 1887, 1888, 1889; Smithfield Circuit, 1890, 1891, 1892; Fremont Circuit, 1893, 1894; Haw River Circuit, 1895, 1896, 1897, 1898; Granville Circuit, 1899, 1900, 1901, 1902; Oxford Circuit, 1903, 1904, 1905, 1906; Selma, 1907; Selma and Princeton, 1908; Sanford Station, 1909.

On March 24, 1881, he was married to his first wife, Miss Mariot H. Burnett of Morehead City, N. C., who died at Trenton, N. C., Sept. 20, 1885. His second marriage took place November 22, 1883, to Miss Alice Pell at Mebane, N. C., who with three children—Virginia, Sadie and William—survive him.

To his former union two children were born, both of whom

died in infancy. To the latter union six children were born, three of whom are dead.

The above is a brief record of one of the purest spirits God ever touched, but reveals little of the real man and his consecrated effort to extend God's cause.

With complete submission he was glad to have a place in God's Kingdom to work. He always went where he was sent, without a murmur. After reaching there, under God's direction, he brought things to pass.

He was always delicate, but he knew how to lean on God with childlike simplicity, and this constant touch with Christ sent him out to preach the pure gospel message to dying men.

As a preacher, he was well prepared when he entered the pulpit—self-poised, graceful and instructive—always hiding himself and magnifying a living Christ to lost men and women, and hundreds of souls were brought to Christ through his faithful ministry.

As a pastor, he was sympathetic and practical, was much among his people, and was a veritable ray of sunshine. He was thoroughly consecrated to his work and gave it his undivided attention. Wherever he served he still lives in the hearts of those left behind.

As a friend, his friendship was as pure as the morning dew and sparkled with the love of the Sun of Righteousness. He was ever ready to serve, to sacrifice, and love after the fashion of the Son of God who came that we might be made like unto Himself.

As a husband, none held dearer the relations of husband and wife than he, affectionate and faithful in all things pertaining to home purity.

As a father, his love for his children was seen in his devotion to them. He was tender in his dealings, giving them careful instructions, joining with them in their innocent pleasures, doing all in his power to make home a delightful place.

As a citizen, his patriotism cannot be questioned. Love for his State and Nation burned brightly upon the altar of his heart, and he not only felt it a privilege but a duty to do all in his power to better the conditions of civic righteousness.

In the death of William H. Puckett, the North Carolina Conference has lost a faithful member: one who loved his brethren and Conference with a deep and abiding love.

It can truthfully be said that he has gone up out of great tribulations and has learned that

"'Tis glorious to suffer,
'Tis majesty to wait,"

and that

"No life
Can be pure in its purpose and strong in the strife,
And all life not be purer and stronger thereby.
The spirit of just men made perfect on high,
The army of martyrs who stand by the throne

REV. JESSE JUDSON PORTER.

Jesse Judson Porter, son of Eli and Rhoda Caroline Porter, was born in Onslow County, North Carolina, June 14, 1860. Before he was two years old his father fell in the defense of the State. The bereaved young mother took her four little ones and returned to the home of her father in Duplin County. Here young "Jud" grew to manhood under the beneficent influence of a loving Christian mother. She lived to see him a valiant and successful soldier of the Cross. Brother Porter delighted to attribute to her much that was good in him, speaking often most tenderly of her as the last days slipped away. Under her influence he joined the Baptist church as a lad. When and why he became a Methodist, I do not know.

As his early educational advantages were most meager, his call to preach was a call to get ready to preach. Telling his brother with whom he was working as assistant section master, that ten dollars a day could not keep him longer from trying to obey what he thought to be the call of God to preach, he addressed himself to the seemingly almost hopeless task of preparation. At this time his uncle, Dr. Porter, of Pender County, was the friend in need who is a friend indeed. For him and "Aunt Lina" he preserved until the end a most affectionate love. Undismayed, he entered the class with small children, though he was at this time a grown man. He seemed sadly out of place. But one who was in the school with him says that there was something about the young man which made all the children love him.

There was considerable doubt in the quarterly Conference about his preparation for the work, but his piety and determination conquered. Again when in 1891 at Greenville, among one of the ablest and best equipped classes which has ever applied to our Conference, he made application to be admitted on trial, there was grave doubt whether he would be able to overcome his educational handicap, but his purity, his piety and his determination won his admission. Of that class one of the brightest intellectually soon fell by the wayside: one located; one, the sainted McCall, walked with God and was not for God took him: and eight of us today bear the heat and burden of life's midday of labor and strife in the North Carolina Conference. Some have filled larger place and had more of life's honor than Brother Porter, but no one has filled or could have filled the places assigned more faithfully than has our departed brother.

The course of study was necessarily exceedingly hard to him, but he attacked it with an ardent determination to do his best, and year by year we saw the growth of his mind's power. He was assigned to "hard" charges, where the work was hard and the pay small but the opportunity great. He and his noble wife went where they were sent, lived on what they got, counted the opportunity to serve great honor, and with unceasing labor of love sought to win souls for Christ. It has been my privilege lately to be associated with many who have been from time to time under Brother Porter's pastorate, and I have heard again and again, "He was the best man I ever saw." "He did more good than any man we ever had here," and similar tributes. He was courageous, conscientious, industrious, prayerful and faithful, and his work abides and will abide. Faith is better and Heaven is richer because of the labors of this man of God.

He served charges as follows: Dare Circuit, 1892, 1893; Kennekeet, 1893, 1894, 1895; Vanceboro, 1896; Columbus, 1897; Brunswick, 1898, 1899; Bladen Street Church, Wilmington, 1900, 1901; Carver's Creek, 1902, 1903, 1904, and 1905; Hobgood, 1906; North and South Henderson, 1907, 1908, and Newton Grove, 1909.

His frame, always frail, could not stand the strain his conscientious concentration of duty put on it. Despite the pleas of friends and the pangs of pain, he pressed on till he could go no further. At the conference of 1908 he was seriously ill when the appointments were read and he was assigned to the Newton Grove Circuit. He did not recover sufficiently to make the effort to go to his appointment until in April, and only a trial forced him to surrender the work. That he might have the skilled attention of the learned doctor, the preachers' friend, Dr. D. W. Bulluck, he removed with his family to Wilmington, where he spent the three years of his hardest service. "They also serve who only stand and wait!" He made his room a sanctuary, his bed a pulpit and his very sufferings an occasion to preach Christ.

During the last year and a quarter I was often with him. He knew his condition and at times spoke of the end as near. But at other times he was buoyed up with hope. But always he said, even in the delirium of the end it was his refrain, "I had rather be in God's hands than in my own," "I would not take myself out of God's hands if I knew I would die tonight." "I know God will do what is right, but, oh, if it was just his sweet will how gladly would I get well so that I could work. I would gladly go anywhere." Over and over he would say: "If this poor, weak sinner is by the amazing grace of God saved at last, and if God will in His great power help me to save just one soul, I will count my life a great success." I do not know how often he repeated a sentence of which this is the substance. Those two things he craved, to be saved and to be the instrument of saving some other. And thou art safe, dear brother, and not one but many stars bedeck thy diadem; for thou art one of those who shall shine forever and forever.

January 21, 1891, he married Miss Maria E. Bell of Jacksonville, N. C. She, with two daughters and two sons, survive him.

He could not have found a more worthy, more faithful, or more helpful companion. A woman of marked ability, serene piety and great industry, through the years of his arduous labors, she bore her share with faithfulness and success, and in those years of suffering she was ever near, his guardian angel.

On Sunday, January 10, 1912, ere the day dawned, he slipped away. We gladly laid the poor pain-racked body to its rest, knowing that the redeemed soul had rest and reward. The funeral was from Bladen Street Church, of which at one time he was the beloved pastor. Its officials chiefly constituted the pallbearers. The pastor, Rev. W. I. Rexford, the faithful friend who had stood by him until the last, was in charge; but each of the pastors and the writer took part. We bore him forth as a victor, his warfare over, to lie in state until his Master's voice shall bid the sleeping body rise. If we wept, it was not for him but for the bereaved loved ones. But even they are richer than before; rich with the legacy of his life and rich with the beekoning hope of a heavenly reunion.

Jesse Judson Porter had his limitations. All men have. But his were those over which he had no control. Industrious to a fault, faithful to every calling, with a faith that did not shrink when pressed by every foe, with a definite personal experience, a consciousness of God, a grateful love for Christ, a dependence on the Holy Spirit, an ardent affection for the Church and a hunger for souls, humble and teachable, yet with flintlike firmness to principle, his pre-eminent marks, faithfulness to duty and confidence in prayer, our brother lived and died a true follower of his Master. He suffered with Him here, and we believe he reigns with Him above. And the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be when the light affliction which is but for a moment shall work out for him the far more, exceeding, and eternal weight of glory.

REV. WILLIAM A. JENKINS.

William A. Jenkins was born in Onslow County, North Carolina, July 30, 1858, and was the son of Edward and Elizabeth Jenkins. While yet a boy his parents moved to Wilmington, N. C., where he grew to manhood. His parents were Baptists, and in that faith he grew up and was preparing to preach when in the providence of God he was brought into a series of revival meetings, conducted by this writer in the Fifth Street Church, Wilmington. He became greatly interested in our doctrines, especially those on universal redemption, Christian perfection, and infant baptism. He asked for and was provided with our doctrinal standards, which he read with increasing interest and thoroughness. He came to the emphatic decision that these were the doctrines that not only met the demands of his own heart and life, but were also that embodiment of the great redemptive scheme that he as a gospel herald desired to proclaim to all the families of earth. He re-

solved at once to connect himself with our Church. In my journal for the year 1887 I find this entry on January 16: "Five accessions today on profession of faith—one a Baptist minister, Rev. J. W. Gurganous, another young man, W. A. Jenkins, who has been preparing for the Baptist ministry. Both of these desire to enter the ministry of our church." Brother Jenkins was admitted on trial at the session of our Conference held in Goldsboro in 1892, and at the same session was ordained deacon by Bishop Duncan. He was ordained elder by Bishop Wilson, at the session of our Conference held in Kinston, in 1896. He served the Church of his choice and heart's supremest love in the following fields: Wacamaw Mission, Newton Grove, Bladen, Pamlico, Onslow, Pekin, East Robeson, and at the last session of our Conference was appointed to Mt. Pleasant Circuit. He had entered upon the new year with characteristic zeal, and in the midst of the first round of appointments was called from the field of labor to the reward of the faithful servant. This was as he desired, for he had often said to his devoted wife that he "wanted to die in the active service."

As a preacher Brother Jenkins was strong in the fundamental doctrines of Salvation. His strength as a preacher was from three sources: First, being a completely consecrated man, he was filled with the Holy Spirit and preached in the demonstration of the spirit and power of the same.

Second. He preached out of the fervency of a rich personal experience, having sought out and wrought out his own salvation in the same doctrines he was preaching to others.

Third. He was a most diligent and thorough Bible searcher; his mind was literally filled with the word of God—the sword of the spirit. At any moment his memory was ready to furnish his tongue with a clear proof text for any experimental or doctrinal position that he had taken. This last named source of ministerial strength made him a holy terror to teachers of false doctrines or shallow religious experience. Wherever he preached sinners were clearly converted and believers securely built up in the most holy faith. Brother Jenkins' home life was tender and beautiful in its devotion. His exemplary Christian home was created by his happy marriage on February 2, 1887, to Miss Blanche Evans, of Town Creek, Brunswick County, N. C. She proved a true companion and divinely suited helpmeet in his life work, and in the end will share largely in the rewards of his ministry. Sister Jenkins now lives with her five sons at Trinity College, Durham, N. C. The sons are aged respectively as follows: Sanford, 21; Carlisle, 19; Roy, 15; Theodore, 8, and Wilbert, 5.

Brother Jenkins had been in declining health for three years, but could not be persuaded to cease or rest from his loved employ—he coveted death on the firing line, and with the whole armor on. God granted his request. On his last Sunday he was sick in bed, but got up, dressed and rode twelve miles and preached twice. Monday forenoon he felt better, but in the afternoon remarked to

his wife that his time was short, but that it was all well with him. On Tuesday morning, December 19, 1911, while sitting up and reading, he was seized with heart failure and died in a few minutes. His last words were that his sufferings were over, with a request to his devoted wife not to grieve over his going. His body was laid to rest beside old Zion Church, Town Creek, N. C., from whence he will arise to greet us on the glorious resurrection morn.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

The Conference year just closed has been marked by special activity on the part of your Board looking to the general upbuilding of our Sunday School interests.

Efforts have been made to reach our workers in cities, towns and the country by means of Sunday School institutes. This work has not been confined to any one section of our Conference but has extended from Troy and Hamlet on the west to Straits and Roanoke Island on the east, and from Warrenton and Rich Square on the north to Marietta and Shallotte on the south. Most of the efforts have been made in country churches or in towns easy of access. The meetings have been arranged for our field worker for the most part by our Presiding Elders, and these officials were present in many of the meetings, lend their assistance to the work. We wish to thank them and also our pastors and superintendents for using the means we placed at their disposal for the interests of Sunday School work.

We urge the adoption of the Standard of Excellence as set forth by our General Sunday School Board, in our schools, wherever practicable.

We especially urge that emphasis be placed on Teacher Training work. We are glad to note that Dr. Chappell, our Sunday School editor, reports much progress in this department. Dr. H. M. Hamill, our Superintendent of Teacher Training Work, is with us, and we wish to express our appreciation of his presence. We look for much good to result from his visit to us.

We would also direct the attention of our Conference to the Wesley Adult Bible Class Department and urge with all possible emphasis that our schools provide themselves with literature bearing on this great form of organization for our classes. We ask that our pastors endeavor to have all organized classes within their charges enroll with the Wesley Adult Bible Class Department.

Our General Board has recently provided a form of organization for our intermediates and seniors into what shall be known as Wesley Intermediate and Wesley Senior classes. Literature bearing on any of these classes be obtained from our publishers or from our Field Secretary.

Dr. Chappell announces that the Board is preparing an alternative series of lessons bearing on our church laws and usages, and we believe that this is a step in the right direction. It will tend to develop church loyalty through the increased intelligence which is bound to follow such a course of lessons.

It is the purpose of your Board to continue for another year the field work of the Board in charge of the present Field Secretary. To do this, and to make our regular work move forward, by providing our schools with Children's Day programs, by aiding needy Sunday Schools, and by contributing to the work of the General Board, it will require more money than we now have in the treasury. For the information of all concerned we include in this report a statement showing our financial condition:

thus leaving a balance on hand of \$1,360.14 and from this amount must be deducted the pro rata share of the General Board in the Children's Day fund of 1912, thus leaving us with not even this much.

To meet the demands of the Board's work for the ensuing year we will not have sufficient funds and we therefore ask the following:

That the Conference request every Sunday School, by the adoption of this report, to give the regular collection taken in the Sunday Schools on the fourth Sunday in January to the Sunday School Board for maintaining its work, and that this amount be sent in to the Treasurer of the Sunday School Board as soon after that time as possible.

This is not intended to interfere with the splendid efforts which our pastors have made and are making in the interest of an increased Children's Day fund, but simply to aid the board to carry on the plans for the enlargement of the Sunday School interests. We would also ask that our pastors during the coming year endeavor to have Children's Day observed in every school in their charges.

We ask that our Presiding Elders, Pastors and Superintendents make

use of our Field Secretary and coöperate during this year in the same happy manner as in the year just closed.

THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

We, your Epworth League Board, have pleasure in submitting a report of Epworth League achievement for the year just closing.

The latest examination of the records of the Central Office at Nashville shows an increase of 443 in the number of chapters organized and a gain in membership of over 7,000.

The receipts of the Central Office for 1912 have been in excess of the amounts received in the corresponding months of last year, and, what is even more significant a larger number of chapters than ever before have paid the Ten Cent assessment.

One office Secretary, skilled in stenography and typewriting, has been employed for full time.

A finely equipped woman has been elected to the position of Junior League Secretary, to give her attention exclusively to the organization and promotion of Junior Leagues.

More than a hundred great Epworth League Conferences have been held during the year. In attendance and personnel, these gatherings outranked any of like character that have heretofore been conducted.

Incomplete returns from the field in our own Conference indicate that about 50 new chapters have been organized, representing a gain in membership of more than 2,000.

At our last Conference at Kinston in June of this year, \$500.00 was pledged for the Cuba Special, and an amount sufficient to support Mr. Hinohara in Japan was guaranteed.

Now, we your Board, feel that the League Institutes held in connection with the Sunday School Institutes throughout our Conference the past year have in many instances proved of great worth to the cause, we, therefore, ask:

1st. That there be held in each presiding elder's district an Epworth League Institute, at such time and place as shall be agreed upon by the Presiding Elder and the District League Secretary.

2d. That both Senior and Junior Leagues be entitled to one representative for every fifteen members of the local chapters, the junior superintendent and the presidents of Senior Leagues being members by virtue of their office.

3d. That in those charges where no League now exists, the Presiding Elder, on nomination of the preacher in charge, have three young people elected by the Quarterly Conference to represent that charge at the institute.

4th. That the Presiding elder coöperate with the League Secretary in arranging programs and securing suitable speakers for these institutes.

Your Board has appointed a committee to confer with the League Cabinet looking toward the securing of a district organizer in each district for the purpose of prosecuting an increase campaign in April and May of 1913.

We recommend that the Conference concur in the action of the General Board in asking the Leagues to celebrate on the first Sunday in May, or as near thereto as possible, what is known as May Day, and that at this celebration a collection be taken, half of said collection to go to the General Board and half to the Conference League Treasury, and wherever this collection is taken that League taking same will not have to pay the Ten Cent Assessment. But the League that does not take this collection is to pay the assessment as heretofore.

CONFERENCE LEADER.

To the North Carolina Conference:

The Conference of 1908 and 1909 elected Dr. D. B. Zollicoffer as their Lay Leader. While in an indirect way the laymen in some of the churches performed work in the Master's vineyard, Dr. Zollicoffer went through the Conference endeavoring to organize the church into a working order. In 1910 Mr. Zeb. V. Judd was elected Lay Leader, but without his consent. He afterwards found it impossible to serve, so that year found us without a leader.

At the Conference of 1911, I was elected to fill the position. If any one thought the fires started by Dr. Zollicoffer had been extinguished, they were mistaken. As the result of his administration I found in many places the good work was still going on. My aim has been to help the churches spiritually by having the stewards especially to take an interest in the prayer meeting and other services: it has also been my idea to help the small churches in their financial work, especially those depending on the Board of Missions for help. In a few churches I found that they did not want to be helped, that is if they thought that it would take away the support given by the Board of Missions. Your leader visited seven district conferences, and has called on a number of stewards individually, and a few church bodies. He had the pleasure of securing the services of Dr. C. F. Reid, of the Laymen's Movement, and with him visited a number of churches in the Conference. I felt that there should be a Sunday set apart especially for consecration of our members and prayer for our church. Consulting with the Presiding Elders, the fifth Sunday in September was the day set for those special services. I wrote to every pastor and enclosed a return stamped addressed envelope, and out of the 190 preachers I received replies from 132. One hundred and thirty of this number were in favor of the services, two were not, showing that about sixty did not answer. The result of those meetings of the church body I can not tell, but that is with my Lord. I do know that in some instances good was accomplished.

Your leader hopes that a Sabbath day will be set aside by the North Carolina Conference, to be known as a day of consecration and prayer for our church. The laymen have been at work conducting prayer meetings, revival services, etc., and helping their pastors. One grand piece of work has been put under way by the Laymen's Missionary Movement,

where the beauty of earth and sky mingle, namely, the Chautauqua : Waynesville.

Brethren, I have sent out a quantity of literature, and my expense has been about \$85.00 which was for stamps, express, printing, etc., and which I gladly give to my Lord's cause throughout the North Carolina Conference. You have had a poor leader this year, but one who was willing to give his time and what talent he did have to the cause. I trust that good has been accomplished and do know that through the influence of the laymen's organization the past few years, pastors' salaries have been increased, and amounts raised for missions are largely in excess of former years. Literature being distributed has given light to the congregations, letting them know what is being done with the money. More churches than formerly are using the envelopes. Your leader, brethren, urges upon the churches to adopt the envelope system, believing it to be the best means of getting in the funds regularly for the support of the ministry.

I believe that the duty of the pastor is to preach and visit the members of his congregation and to leave all finances to his stewards.

We have a small nucleus and have decided to set apart some of the regular collection each year for this purpose. And we recommend that our brethren apply for loans instead of donations as far as possible.

We call attention also to the very interesting literature on the subject, which may be had free by addressing Dr. W. F. McMurray, Louisville, Ky., or the Conference Secretary.

A Sunday School Loan Fund is also being raised by "Birthday Jars" in the Sunday Schools, which Dr. McMurray has already explained.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

We have received the report of the General Secretary of the Board of Education and find that our Board is working in harmony with the suggestions made therein.

At the suggestion of the present Board a special committee consisting of H. M. North, J. H. McCracken and J. C. Wooten was appointed to draft a constitution for the local Board and report at next Annual Conference for its adoption.

H. M. North was elected to represent this Board at Dallas, Texas, next April, at the Conference of Education.

CORRESPONDENCE SCHOOL AND DEPARTMENT OF MINISTERIAL SUPPLY AND TRAINING.

The Department of Ministerial Supply and Training is charged with the responsibility of developing a more efficient ministry for the Church, and none of our connectional enterprises is more important. We heartily endorse the work the department is doing, and pledge to it our active coöperation.

We emphasize the importance of Presiding Elders and pastors furnishing to the Department of Ministerial Supply and Training the names and addresses of young men who feel called to preach in order

that they may be stimulated and guided in their preparation for the itinerary.

We call special attention to the action of the General Conference authorizing pastors wherever practicable to take a special collection for ministerial education, and would recommend that any amount thus raised be forwarded directly to the Department of Ministerial Supply and Training to be used in helping worthy young men.

We rejoice in the continued prosperity of the correspondence work, as indicated by the enrollment during the past year of 1,034 students. We feel that the time has come when all the undergraduates of the Conference ought to be required to pursue their studies by correspondence, but we would also insist on their appearing before their respective examining committees for such examinations as the committee may see fit to give.

TRINITY COLLEGE.

We are grateful to be able to report that Trinity College has had another year of solid growth in the number of students, in material improvements, and in public esteem. Up to November 15th of the present year, there have been enrolled in all departments 747. Of these 449 are in College, 163 are in the Trinity Park School, and 135 are taking extension courses in the Department of Education.

In physical equipment the College is becoming better and better prepared to take care of the students that come here each year in larger numbers. A consistent and thorough-going effort is likewise being made to raise the educational efficiency of the College and so in larger proportions to train properly the minds and to nurture the characters of this growing student body. By the use of every means the College is earnestly endeavoring to make this each year a better place in which to breed men. And all this is becoming widely known throughout the Southern States with the result that students are annually resorting here in increasing numbers, and this puts upon the College the obligation constantly to enlarge its plant and add to its teaching force. And to meet these demands larger and larger resources become necessary as time goes on.

Reverend W. W. Peele is this season entering upon his second year as Headmaster of the Trinity Park School. He is proving himself to be the man for the place, and that institution is growing in efficiency in the estimation of the public educators of the State.

GREENSBORO FEMALE COLLEGE.

Your Board rejoices in the steady growth of Greensboro Female College in buildings, equipments and larger usefulness. The request made by Trustees, Alumnae and Faculty of the College for a change of name by dropping the word "Female," making the legal name Greensboro College for Women, was granted by the Board and we so recommend. We recommend the confirmation of J. A. Long as Trustee of the College.

LOUISBURG FEMALE COLLEGE.

The report of Louisburg Female College was gratifying because of the increase of numbers and equipment and specialized work being done. We recommend the confirmation of L. S. Massey, A. J. Parker and F. B. McKinne as Trustees. We recommend the appointment of the pastor at Louisburg as financial agent of the College.

LITTLETON COLLEGE.

We desire to express our appreciation of the great amount of good this College has done. The President has succeeded in building and equipping a splendid plant and securing a faithful faculty, who year after year have enriched the lives of many of our girls.

CAROLINA COLLEGE.

We commend the liberality of Maxton and the deep interest shown in building and establishing Carolina College. We endorse the work of President Mercer and most heartily thank him for his tireless energy and unflinching faith which enabled him to open the College September 25, 1912.

PAINE COLLEGE.

We have received a report from Paine College of Augusta, Ga. This is the institution of the Methodist Church South for the training of pastors, teachers and other leaders of the colored race. We consider this as one of the most important missionary enterprises of our Church, and one in which the whole Church is equally interested. The income of this institution is derived from the collection of the General Board of Education. And for this and other reasons we urge upon our preachers the importance of securing this collection in full. The Board would commend to the more careful consideration of the Ministers and Laymen of the Church this school with its earnest effort to supply better trained workers for the negro race.

A. P. Tyler, J. C. Wooten and H. M. North were appointed as committee to consider the advisability of establishing a Preachers' Institute for the Conference at Trinity College.

TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

The North Carolina Conference held in this town in nineteen hundred and one, on the invitation of the Baptist State Convention then in session at Winston, appointed a committee to confer with like committees from other churches to devise a method whereby the united Church could wage a battle against the liquor traffic. These committees met in joint session in Raleigh, January, 1902, and decided to organize the North Carolina Anti-Saloon League.

Since that day the progress in temperance reform has been great. The traffic has been outlawed. The liquor politician has been put out of business and the dram discouraged until the dram-drinker is ashamed of his habit. Public sentiment is strong against the crime of selling liquor and the courts are prosecuting such criminals and sending them to the roads. The Commissioner of Internal Revenue at Washington, Mr. Cabell, speaking to this point said recently, "North Carolina has made a stronger effort to enforce her prohibition laws than any other State having State-wide prohibition. From the standpoint of law observance, I can say that conditions in North Carolina are good."

For this success we rejoice, thank God and take courage.

After a study of the temperance situation in our State and nation, your committee believes that the legislature ought to enact a law giving authority to police officers to search places suspected of selling liquor and to seize such liquor when found; that the Congress of the United States ought to pass a law that will restore to each State the right to protect itself against liquor shipped from other States; and that we need a campaign for total abstinence. Therefore, we recommend:

(1) That this Conference memorialize the General Assembly that convenes in January, 1913, to enact a search and seizure law as a means to the enforcement of our prohibition law.

(2) That we memorialize the Congress of the United States to pass the Webb-Kenyon interstate liquor shipment bill now pending, which is fixed as the order of the day in the Senate for December 16, 1912.

And that we assure our Senators and Representatives of our hearty approval of their action in working for the passage of this measure.

(3) That our pastors and Sunday School Superintendents coöperate with the Anti-Saloon League in its efforts to get the children to sign the pledge to abstain from the use of intoxicating liquors.

(4) That we approve of the Conference of Temperance People called to meet at Washington, D. C., December 16 to 19th in the interest of legislation to stop the shipment of liquor to blind tigers in dry territory; and that Rev. J. E. Underwood, Mr. C. C. Covington, Rev. A. D. Wilcox and Mr. J. H. Bridgers be appointed delegates to this meeting (alternates if needed to be appointed by the Conference Secretary).

(5) That the Conference approves of the action of the Executive Committee of the Anti-Saloon League in calling a State Convention of the temperance forces to meet in Raleigh January 30, 1913, and it requests the churches to send delegates, elected by the Church Conference or appointed by the pastor, to this convention.

(6) That we endorse the work of the Anti-Saloon League and commend it to our people as worthy of their prayers and financial support. And that we commend the *American Issue* and other League literature as worthy of large circulation.

(7) That the Bishop be requested to appoint Rev. R. L. Davis, Superintendent of the North Carolina Anti-Saloon League.

BOARD OF MISSIONS.

Your Board of Missions has carefully considered every communication referred to it. The letter from the Secretaries of the parent Board of Missions reminds us that we have 258 missionaries on the foreign field, 69 picked and trained men and women in China, 43 in Korea, 27 in Japan, 51 in Brazil, 48 in Mexico and 20 in Cuba. While they are there doing God's work in saving souls, the provision of food, raiment and shelter for them is the God-imposed obligation upon us at home. From them comes the information of the demand upon them being beyond their strength and time. The cries for light and life which are coming to us from those anxious heathen hearts should suffice to warm the deadest heart into grateful responsiveness. This situation must be squarely and liberally met as a result of a wide-spread proclamation of the facts, and a more extensive education of our people to a knowledge of their duty. Your Board therefore suggests and urges more earnestly upon the pastors the adoption of the envelope system, the every member canvass, the use of missionary charts, the thorough organization of their charges, the more extensive circulation of our missionary litera-

ture and a house-to-house canvass for subscribers to the *Missionary Voice* which should be in every home.

Your Board also calls your attention to the growing demand for men and means on our home field, for the swarming of those of other lands to our shores is pressing upon us problems of increasing seriousness and reponsibility. In our own Conference we note the fact that some mission charges are lowering their salaries, while calling for larger appropriations. The Board therefore urges upon the Stewards of those charges the fact that those decreases unless well accounted for will tempt it to decrease, if not discontinue the appropriations. Instead of decreasing salaries there should be an unwavering purpose to increase the salaries that the Board may as quickly as possible be relieved of their care and be given more opportunity to open up new fields. The Board regrets exceedingly its inability to grant all requests for help and the necessity of cutting some to help any new applicants, because of the demand from every part of the Conference that there be no increase now.

Your Board recommends to the Presiding Elders their most hearty encouragement of a system of mutual helpfulness in holding missionary rallies, addressed by equipped and impressive speakers, in each charge of their districts.

Special attention is called to the General Missionary Conference to be held at the Southern Assembly Grounds, Waynesville, N. C., June 26-29, 1913, under the care and direction of Rev. Dr. C. F. Reid, Secretary of the Laymen's Missionary Movement. The Presiding Elders are requested to have each Quarterly Conference elect at least one delegate to this Conference that our Annual Conference may have a part in making it a great generator of increasing missionary zeal and enthusiasm throughout our entire church.

The report of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the North Carolina Conference gives us the following facts:

There are 1,980 members. They support 16 missionaries, 17 scholarships, 7 Bible Women, 1 Hospital, 1 school and one widows' home. The collections for this year are \$9,197.44. Including those of last year not yet reported to this Conference, they are \$24,271.88. Since its organization the Society has raised \$170,611.19, not including the pledge of 1912. The Bright Jewels of the Society have built and mostly equipped and supported the Mary Black Hospital in China. These facts are evidences of what the women of our Conference can and will do when given an opportunity. The Board therefore urges upon all our pastors the duty of helping these women by their genuine sympathy and hearty coöperation.

We are glad to have with us one of our efficient General Secretaries, Rev. Dr. E. H. Rawlings, whose addresses have been both interesting

and profitable to us. We believe he is sowing seed which will bring an abundant harvest in the increase of missionary activity.

The Missionary Secretary of the Conference is authorized by the Board to equip himself with the latest missionary charts and attend all the District Conferences he can and help in the dissemination of missionary knowledge among our people throughout the entire Conference.

The report of the Treasurer of the Board shows a surplus of \$2,531.69 over the assessment, \$16,500.00 on Foreign Missions and a deficit of \$353.30 on the assessment of \$19,700 for Conference and Home Missions raised this Conference year. The entire amount raised this year for both Foreign and Conference and Home Missions is \$38,358.39, or \$7,214.61 less than last year. These disappointing facts should move us to greater efforts during the ensuing year.

The Board recommends that H. M. North, D. H. Tuttle, J. A. Dailey, E. H. Davis and J. G. Johnson be appointed a Conference Committee on Evangelism.

For the ensuing year, the assessment for Conference and Home Missions is \$14,500. Added to this amount is an assessment of \$5,200 for Home Missions made by the General Board, making a total of \$19,700. The assessment for Foreign Missions is \$16,500. The apportionment to the districts is as follows: (See Table of Assessments.)

We deplore all Sabbath desecration, such as automobile sporting, freight and excursion trains and boats, buying and selling, especially as is carried on at many drug stores.

We commend the recent act of our National Government in restricting the delivery of Sunday mails.

We heartily endorse the great work of the Sunday League of America, and at its earnest request will ask the pastors of our Conference to remember the week after Easter as the time set apart to preach special sermons on Sabbath observance.

BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

Fathers and Brethren:—

The exhibit submitted by the agents of the publishing house for the fiscal year ending February, 1912, shows an increase of \$22,120.07 over the volume of business for the previous year. There is a corresponding net gain in profits of \$8,249.75; the assets are also substantially increased.

We believe that these sales could, and therefore should, be greatly enlarged by a more conscientious patronage, and that our people every-

where should be urged to purchase all their literature from our own house. If this were done there would not only be an individual saving to the Church, but the \$10,000 now appropriated from the profits of the house for our superannuates might be appreciably enlarged.

For the convenience of the Eastern Conferences, including our own, the branch house located in Richmond, Va., under the management of Mr. W. F. Pearce, has been recently established, giving promise of wide success. With this convenience so near our door, we may receive supplies on much shorter notice, and realize a considerable saving in cost of transportation. It is urged by the agents that all our business henceforth be sent to the Richmond house.

We believe that much of the genius of Methodism is in her connectionalism: that much of her progress and power is due to her peculiar organic life. To maintain her connectional spirit it is entirely essential that each individual acquire an intelligent knowledge of the whole Church. This can only be accomplished by the printing press. Our people must read our own literature; our church papers must have first place in the domestic circle. The exigencies of the work and the importance of the task to be done demand that every fireside be brightened with the glorious news of Zion. While the secular press flames with sensationalism and cheap magazines push their way unblushing to every newsstand, and the immoral, not to say indecent, rubbish of diseased and eccentric dreamers challenge the church on every hand, how important it becomes that we seek to preëempt the young mind with clean, wholesome and religious literature.

We call the especial attention of the Conference to that deadly form of heresy now finding its way into our homes through the secular press, a doctrine that strikes at the very foundation of our holy faith, viz., Russellism. We urge our pastors to faithfully warn our people against it and to exhort them to touch not and taste not and handle not this unclean thing.

Believing that the Pastor is not degrading his dignity nor belittling his sacred calling by acting as agent for our literature, but is rather becoming an effective instrument of the Church for the moral elevation and Christian instruction of our people, we urge that every member of this Conference this year magnify his office in this particular.

We desire to call the especial attention of the brethren to the following periodicals and papers:

The *Methodist Review* is equal to any periodical in America, and deserves our fullest united patronage.

The *Christian Advocate*, our general organ, is ably edited by our own Dr. Ivey. It ought to enjoy a larger circulation. It is not too much to expect that every member of this Conference, and every member of the official boards of North Carolina Methodism, read constantly this great paper.

The *Missionary Voice* is an absolute essential to an intelligent

knowledge of missionary conditions, and should be pressed into every home where possible.

The *Epworth Era* should be offered to our young people everywhere.

But especially at this time does it become important in the interests of our North Carolina Methodism that we bestir ourselves to increase the circulation of the *Raleigh Christian Advocate*.

Editor Massey reports a net increased circulation of 258 for the year and an increased income of \$631.35. Owing to the enforcement of the new postal regulations which are liable to be put in effect any day, many delinquent subscribers may be cut off. It is absolutely essential that every Pastor push the subscription list with all vigor before January 1, 1913.

We recommend:

1. That each Pastor furnish the office of the *Advocate* with a list of names and addresses of those in his charge, whom he can solicit for the *Advocate*, and that the office send sample copies to these addresses, with a letter of solicitation, to be followed closely by the Pastor in a personal solicitation.

2. That the Presiding Elders and Pastors bring the claims of the *Advocate* before the official boards of the various charges, and endeavor to secure a subscription from each member of the official board.

3. That the official board become active in this campaign, and that every home in the pastoral charge be solicited for subscription, and where actual pecuniary conditions preclude a voluntary subscription, that an effort be made to secure the same by the generosity of others more able.

4. We heartily commend Rev. L. S. Massey for his faithful and efficient management and editorship of the *Advocate*.

We recommend that R. B. John, M. T. Plyler, J. H. Hall, C. S. Wallace and B. B. Adams be appointed to elect an Editor in the Conference interim in case of a vacancy.

In view of the fact that Rev. W. L. Grissom died before the completion of the second volume of his most excellent history of North Carolina Methodism, we recommend that steps be taken by this Conference looking to the completion and the publication of this volume.

We recommend that a committee of three be appointed by the Conference, to co-operate with a like committee already appointed from the Western Conference, and that both of these committees act with the Trinity College Historical Society in the publication of this volume.

To serve on this committee we nominate M. T. Plyler, W. W. Rose and N. H. D. Wilson.

The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in February, 1837, and in 1850, and again in 1870, North Carolina territory in the South Carolina Conference was transferred to this Conference. In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference. So now the two Conferences embrace the whole of North Carolina.
