Dr. W. P. Few addressed the Conference on the question, "Can We Do It?"

FOURTH DAY

Saturday, December 14, 1918.

The Conference convened at 9:30 a.m., Bishop Darlington in the chair. Prayer service had been conducted by Dr. A. D. Betts, President of Paine College.

Minutes

The minutes of the last session were read, and, after being corrected, were approved.

Directors Summer School

N. H. D. Wilson, representing the joint committee of the Board of Education and the Board of Missions, nominated the following as directors of the Summer School of Theology: H. M. North and W. W. Peele, for the term of one year; for the term of two years, M. T. Plyler, and J. C. Wooten; for a term of three years, J. M. Ormond, and W. A. Stanbury. The nominations were confirmed.

Name Referred

On motion of J. B. Hurley, the name of M. H. Tuttle was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations, for the supernumerary relation.

Name Referred

On motion of E. M. Snipes, the name of A. P. Tyer was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the superannuate relation.

Question 12

Question 12 was called, viz.: "What local preachers are elected deacons?" J. M. Poole, from the Rockingham District, and E. T. Ipock, from the Washington District, having been recommended by their respective district conferences, were, upon motion of the Conference in each case, elected to deacon's orders.

Question 16

Question 16 was called, viz.: "What local preachers are elected elders?" Answer: No one.

Question 18

Question 18 was called, viz.: "Who are located this year?" Answer: No one.

Question 22

Question 22 was called, and the preachers in the New Bern District whose names had not been called, passed the examination of character.

Constitutional Question

Bishop Darlington submitted to the Conference the following constitutional question handed down by the General Conference: "Shall the Apostles' Creed be so changed as to substitute for 'Holy Catholic Church' the words 'Christ's Holy Church'?" The number of members of the Conference voting was 159. Of this number 100 voted for, and 59 against, the proposed change.

Constitutional Question

Bishop Darlington submitted to the Conference the following constitutional question, handed down by the General Conference: "Shall lay members be eligible to all board and office without regard to sex?" The number of members of the Conference voting was 173. Of this number 160 voted for and 13 against the proposed change in the constitution.

Statistical Secretary

Communication

A communication from Bishop Candler, Chancellor of Emory University, was read by the Secretary, and referred to the Board of Education.

Question 22

Visitor Introduced

Rev. Peter McIntyre, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, was introduced to the Conference.

Question 5

President Wilson Endorsed

J. G. Brown presented and read a set of resolutions expressing appreciation of the manner in which President Wilson has directed the affairs of our country through the great war, and the resolutions were adopted. (Document 8 in Appendix.)

Centenary Publications

Mr. H. E. Dewey spoke to the Conference with regard to the Missionary Centenary publications, and took subscriptions for the same.

Time Extended

On motion of R. B. John, the time for adjourning was extended until the class for admission into full connection had been received.

Centenary Committee

The report of the Conference Centenary Commission was read by C. J. Harrell, and it was adopted. (Document 9 in Appendix.)

Cablegram Received

A cablegram from Chaplain Daniel Lane, now in France, bringing greetings from the Christian soldiers on the victorious battle-field, was read by the Bishop.

Question 4

Question 4 was called, viz.: "Who are received into full connection?" The following, having passed the Examining Committee, and the Committee on Admissions, were examined by Bishop Darlington in open Conference, and were, upon vote of the Conference, received into full connection: D. E. Earnhardt, B. F. Boone, W. L. Loy, Guy Hamilton, and W. B. Humble.

Memorial Service

On motion of R. H. Willis, it was ordered that when we adjourn we do so to meet Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock for the memorial session.

The Bishop requested J. E. Underwood to preside at the memorial session.

The Conference adjourned. Benediction by Dr. J. T. Gibbs.

FIFTH DAY—MEMORIAL SESSION

Sunday, December 15, 1918.

The Conference convened at 3 p. m., Rev. J. E. Underwood, by appointment of Bishop Darlington, presiding.

Question 21

After devotional exercises, conducted by Brother Underwood, Question 21 was called, viz.: "What preachers have died during the year?" WILLIAM H. KIRTON

William H. Kirton, for four years a Confederate soldier and for more than fifty years a Methodist preacher, has fallen on sleep. By far the greater part of his long service in the ministry was spent in South Carolina, but for some years before his death he was a member of the North Carolina Conference.

Brother Kirton was a man of original thought and mental as well as moral courage. His own logic, rather than the instructions of others, was the source of his convictions. He studied the deepest problems of human character and destiny until he was able to say, "I believe." Such a man will not always preach pleasing sermons or meet with ready acquiescence in all his views, but Brother Kirton was accustomed to devote the best thought of a more than average mind to his subject before he spoke.

Not seeking an easy path through life, giving his unswerving loyalty to the truth as he saw it. Brother Kirton was an unselfish friend and when he met antagonism he could still speak kindly of the exponent of opposing views.

Brother Kirton believed that he had a message to deliver for his King. He expounded the Scriptures forcibly, and sought to ground his hearers in their doctrines. He made little reference to current topics and little effort to please and entertain his congregations with the graces of rhetoric. He esteemed it his high duty to give them the results of his own personal study of God's Word vitalized by his own personal conviction of duty.

Brother Kirton was born in Horry County, South Carolina, November 3, 1843, and brought up under Methodist influence. He was converted and joined the Church when about twelve years old, entered the Confederate army as a volunteer August the 10th, 1861, and was taken prisoner March the 9th, 1865, being released in time to reach home on the fourth of the following July. During these years in the army he lost the consciousness of God's presence, but was again converted April the 12th, 1866. Soon afterward he felt divinely called to preach, and was licensed to preach in November, 1866. Except for two years during which he was unable to preach on account of throat trouble, he served faithfully in the regular ministry until his superannuation in 1908.

He filled the following appointments: Whiteville Circuit in the North Carolina Conference and Waccamaw Circuit in the South Carolina Conference he supplied in 1871 and 1873. In December, 1873, he was received on trial in the traveling connection by the South Carolina Conference and his appointments have been: Waccamaw Circuit, 1874-75; Pubu Circuit, 1876; Hanging Rock Circuit, 1877-78; Johnsonville Circuit, 1879; Summerton Circuit, 1880-81; Tumbling Shoals Circuit, 1882-83; Pickens Circuit, 1884-85; Providence Circuit, 1886-87-88; Blenheim Circuit, 1889; Bennettsville Circuit, 1890; Bishopville Sta

tion, 1891-92; Lunondale, 1893; Green Street, Columbia, 1894-95; Hartsville, 1896; Lomar, 1897; Lake City, 1898-99. Was on the superannuated list in 1900 and 1901 on account of throat failure. Loris Circuit, 1902; then transferred from the South Carolina Conference to the North Carolina Conference, and filled the following appointments: Pamlico Circuit, 1903; Bethel Circuit, 1904; Mount Tirza Circuit, 1905; Yanceyville Circuit, 1906; Nashville Circuit, 1907-08. Again he asked and obtained a superannuate relation, in which relation he continued and in feeble health until his death, May the 13th, 1918, in the home of his daughter, Mrs. D. J. Butler, Loris, S. C.

Brother Kirton, on September 29, 1865, was happily married to Orilla V. McQueen. To them were born seven children: Rev. Preston L., Charles Wesley, Isadora V., William Marvin, Mary Caroleen, John Powell, and Claudia. Three daughters survive: Mrs. D. J. Butler, Mrs. Russell, and Mrs. Claudia Hubbard. As a husband and father, Brother Kirton was affectionate and kind,

and his family indeed hold him in loving remembrance.

Brother Kirton was a man of strong personality and great faith in God. He has added his life work to the sum total of human achievement, and gone to his reward.

EDWARD EUGENE ROSE

Rev. Edward Eugene Rose was born in Warren County on March 5, 1866. He was born and reared in a Methodist home, where God was honored and served. His father was for many years an honored steward in old Zion Church on the Ridgeway Circuit. The impress of a Christian home was left on the boy. He was converted in early life and joined the church of his parents.

In his boyhood days he heard the voice of God calling him to the work of the ministry. About this time he was fortunate in having the late Rev. John N. Cole, of precious memory, as his pastor, who encouraged him in his efforts to prepare for the great work of the ministry and helped him in every way possible.

He was educated in the public schools of Warren County and in Trinity College. He spent about three years in college, leaving there before the completion of the regular course in order that he might respond to the call of his church to fill a place where his services were needed.

In the beginning of 1891 he accepted Person Circuit, serving it as a supply, and at the following Conference was admitted on trial into the traveling connection, and was returned to the same charge where the Lord put the seal of his approval on his work to a remarkable degree. He was instrumental in leading a number of souls to Christ. After leaving this, his first circuit, he served the following charges in the order named: Caldwell, Milton, Halifax, Battleboro and Whitakers, Northampton, Williamston and Hamilton, Haw River, Mount Olive and Faison, Carthage and Conway.

While on the Carthage Circuit his health failed and he was compelled to give up his work for a while, but after spending

some time in a hospital in Richmond, Va., he was seemingly restored to health, and finished his full term on the Carthage charge. At the following Conference he was assigned to the Conway Circuit, and was gladly received by this good people, many of whom had known and loved him when he was on the

Northampton Circuit in the same county.

His ministry in this, his last charge, was eminently successful. Large congregations waited on his ministry, and many were won to Christ. But the seeds of death were already sown in that body which had a few years before been so strong and vigorous, and he was compelled to give up his work and patiently to wait the coming of the end, which he knew could not long be delayed. Brother Rose was no ordinary man. As a preacher he was earnest, practical, and eminently scriptural. As was said of the Master, "The common people heard him gladly." He was one of the most faithful pastors I have known.

Brother Rose was ordained Deacon by Bishop Duncan, in Wilmington in 1893, and was ordained Elder by Bishop Wilson at

Elizabeth City in 1895.

On December 20, 1893, he was happily married to Miss Maggie Waller Umstead, daughter of John W. Umstead, Esq., of Flat River, N. C. To this union four children were born, all of whom are living and give promise of becoming strong and useful men. Brother Rose was peculiarly fortunate in his marriage. His wife was a strong Christian character. Her devotion to her husband, to her children, and to her church went to the point of absolute self-sacrifice.

Brother Rose has wrought well. He has finished his course, and his reward is glorious. We shall meet again, where sorrows never come, and suffering is forever unknown. Until then,

CHARLES EDWARD VALE

Rev. Charles Edward Vale, son of Robert Vale and Jane Bagley Vale, was born in Birmingham, England, May 21, 1876, and died suddenly in the home of Mr. Archie Thompson, Hallsboro, N. C., August 8, 1918, in his 43d year. He was recommended for license to preach by the Quarterly Conference of Grace Church, Wilmington, N. C., June 2, 1905, under the ministry of Dr. N. M. Watson, and his license was granted by the Wilmington District Conference, in Wallace, N. C., July 1, 1905, Dr. M. Bradshaw being the Presiding Elder. He was admitted on trial into the traveling connection in the North Carolina Conference in Centenary Church, New Bern, N. C., December 5, 1907, ordained Deacon by Bishop Collins Denny in Hay Street Church, Fayetteville, N. C., December 1, 1912, and Elder by Bishop John C. Kilgo in Fifth Avenue Church, Wilmington, N. C., December 5, 1915.

When Robert Vale and family immigrated to the United States, he settled in Providence. Rhode Island, where he went to work for the Gorham Silver Company. Here he reared a large family. Robert Vale was never a member of the church, but his wife was

a consistent member of the Pentecostal Church, a patient, godly woman. Charles was eight years old when he came to America. He received his education in the public schools of Providence. He had no opportunity to go to college, the financial condition of the family being such that Charles had to work to help support them. He early developed a love for books, and spent the nights and leisure hours in reading good literature. Among other things he purchased books on photography and made a special study of the subject. After reaching his 21st birthday, he spent some months in a studio as an assistant, later launching out in business for himself. His work was a success from the beginning; at one time he was official photographer for one of the South's greatest railway systems. It was while thus engaged he met the woman who afterwards became his wife.

Brother Vale was converted at a very early age in his life and connected himself with the Pentecostal Church with his mother. When 12 years old he realized that God had called him to preach the gospel. He was not encouraged in this impression and he soon gave it up; however the desire remained in his heart, but as the years went by he saw no opportunity to make the necessary preparation. He was fond of reading the biographies of great men, especially preachers and missionaries. If the opportunity had presented itself he no doubt would have entered the

ministry much earlier in life.

In Pinehurst, N. C., on June 2, 1900, he was happily married to Miss Hattie L. Lewis, the daughter of Thomas D. and Helen Bascome Lewis, of Orwell, Vermont, who from childhood had been a member of the Congregational Church. To this union there were born three children two of whom preceded their father to the kingdom above. For more than eighteen years Sister Vale walked by his side, sharing his successes and misfortunes, and proved herself a helpmeet indeed. Like her husband, she was an indefatigable worker, and contributed largely to his success. His desire to preach was confided to his wife who encouraged him by doing as much of his work in the studio as she could, that he might have time to study and make the best preparation possible. He used the time well, as was evidenced in his after life.

After severing his relation with the railroad, he located for a while in Rock Hill, S. C., later coming to Wilmington, N. C., where for some years he conducted what was probably the most up-to-date studio in the State. When he came to Wilmington both he and his wife connected themselves with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, joining Grace Church. In a short time both became prominent in church work. On June 1, 1905, Brother Vale was elected superintendent of the Sunday School and served till December 2, 1907, when he resigned to enter the itinerant He put his soul into his work with an untiring ministry. energy, and under his leadership the school ranked as the largest and best in the city. So much were his efforts appreciated that the members of the school presented him with a beautiful gold watch, nicely engraved, which, with pride, he carried as long as he lived.

In 1907 he served for a few months on Carver's Creek Circuit

as a supply, filling a place made vacant by the illness of the preacher in charge. His first appointment was Chadbourn Circuit, from 1907 to 1911, where he had five societies and one church building. During his stay there he built three or four new churches and a parsonage, and so enlarged the work that it was necessary to divide it. From 1911 to 1915 he served Jones Circuit, where he labored four years under great difficulties, and the Lord wonderfully blest his labors. While serving that charge his wife's health broke down, his only daughter was taken ill and died, and himself had to spend some time in a hospital. undergoing a serious surgical operation. His next and last charge was Jacksonville and Richlands, serving there during 1916, 1917, and until August, 1918, when his Master called him home. Here, as on the other charges, great success attended his ministry. His eleven years as an itinerant Methodist preacher was spent on three charges.

Brother Vale was a hard student, a strong preacher, and an efficient pastor. As an organizer and leader of men he had remarkable powers. Wherever he went Epworth Leagues sprang up and were maintained. His simple faith in Christ seemed to draw men from all walks of life into his Master's vineyard. He had a high sense of honor and hated a sham. As an instructor of penitent sinners at the altar, he had few equals, and was never happier than when he had helped some struggling soul to find his Lord.

Having been deprived of college training, and feeling his great need of it, he resolved to gain as far as possible what he had lost in earlier years. Under the guiding hand of some of the leaders of our church, he bought only the best books and set himself to master them, often burning the midnight oil, after a hard day's work. He seemed to forget that there was a limit to his strength. If there was a deed of mercy he could perform, or a service he could render his fellow-man or his country, he never said no.

The charges he served were all heavy, often preaching three times on Sunday, besides giving his presence to the Sunday School, and teaching a class when some teacher was absent. Being a true missionary, he sought out the waste places, organized classes, and built houses of worship, but never involving his congregation in a hopeless debt. The failure of his wife's health added greatly to his burdens, but with a tenderness born of love and with the light of heaven in his face, he carried his load and did his work without a murmur.

He was much interested in the outcome of the great European war. His patriotism knew no bounds. Being an Englishman by birth, and an American by adoption, he greatly desired to go to the front and have some part in winning the victory that meant freedom for all men, but was prevented from doing so on account of the condition of his wife's health and the care of his only child. He threw himself into the work here at home, and no man did more in helping the Liberty Loan, the Red Cross, the War Y. M. C. A., or the War Savings Stamp drive than he. He was made chairman of the War Savings Stamp Drive. For weeks he was delivering addresses day and night, meeting committees, directing the campaign in the field, and doing whatever

was necessary to make the drive a success, while at the same time he did not neglect his work as a pastor.

Some of his friends besought him to stop and rest, fearing that his overtaxed strength would result in a breakdown, but he would not agree to do it till the work in hand was brought to a successful close. His wife was in a hospital in Wilmington, N. C., and he went to visit her; while there he decided to take the advice of his friends and rest for a little while. After a short stay with his wife, he went to Hallsboro, N. C., to spend a few days in the home of his old friend, Mr. Archie Thompson. Thursday afternoon he spent the most of his time out in the grove; he loved nature, the birds were his friends, and their songs cheered him. It was his custom to often seek some solitary spot and spend some time in meditation and prayer. the sun was sinking in the West he was heard singing some of our great hymns, which were dear to his heart. The twilight hour of that evening was made sacred by the melody of the singer.

After spending the evening with the family, he retired as well as usual, but greatly fatigued. The crushing load he had carried too long had made its mark upon him. He did not rise the next morning as early as usual, and when his friend went to call him to breakfast he found him cold in death. He had died without a struggle. The physical machinery had been under too great a strain, and during the night it had broken beyond repair and his imprisoned soul had gone home. He died without hearing of the glorious victory of the Allied armies, but with the consciousness that he had not only done his bit but his best, both as a citizen and a preacher.

In the death of Charles E. Vale our Conference has lost its sweetest singer. He sang the gospel as often as he preached it, and just as effectively. Rag-time or light, trashy music had no charm for him, but he loved our great hymns, and sang them with pathos, and often with great spiritual power. For eleven years he was a member of the N. C. Conference «Quartet, an organization which sang for conferences and conventions on both sides of the continent. He is gone and there is no one to take his place. He was a delegate to the Eighth International Epworth League Convention, which met in Seattle, Washington, in July, 1909, and was an honor to his Conference in that great gathering.

In his death Brother Vale leaves a wife, who is a helpless invalid, and a son, Charles E. Vale, Jr., who at the present live in Richlands, N. C., two sisters and two brothers who live in Providence, Rhode Island, and one brother in New York City. He was buried in Trenton, N. C., Sunday morning, August 11, 1918, by the side of his daughter. The funeral was conducted by his Presiding Elder, Rev. J. H. Shore, of the Wilmington District, assisted by Revs. T. W. Lee and C. T. Rogers.

The writer of this paper has been intimately associated with Brother Vale for many years and knew him as possibly no one else did; was with him when he passed through some very trying experiences in his business career, at a time when a partner in business proved untrue and involved him heavily in debt, at

a time when heartless men tried to make him consent to things that his conscience condemned, but with the courage of a man of God he said no. I never saw him swerve an inch to save himself, or fail to measure up to his obligation like a Christian gentleman. His life was clean and his dealings honorable. always carried the sunshine and had a kind word for all with whom he came in contact, a man true to God, his home, and his country.

CLAYTON O. ARMSTRONG

Another one of our preachers has been called home; this time a man in the best of his years, and, so far as any one could see, with the promise of many useful years ahead. The last time the writer saw him, about three weeks before his death, he was in the most vigorous health, and in the highest spirits, planning for advances in his work, and looking forward to the approaching session of this Annual Conference. He had just come from a revival meeting at one of his churches, and was laying plans for a meeting at another. He was one of the last anybody would have thought of as being marked for so soon a departure.

Clayton Otis Armstrong was born December 1, 1882, at Columbia, in Tyrrell County, North Carolina, and was therefore nearing the end of his thirty-sixth year. He was the son of Leonard and Martha Alexander Armstrong, Christian parents, who sought tirelessly to bring to bear on the life of their son the truths of the Gospel. And the life of this boy, when he became a man, was

fine evidence that such training is not in vain.

Brother Armstrong had his education in the public schools, and then at Ayden Seminary, being a member of the Free Will Baptist Church. Having finished school at that institution, he taught for several years, spending some months each summer in evangelistic work in this and other States. In the fall of 1908 he entered the University of North Carolina, and was graduated with the class of 1912. As a student here, and as a man among the other men of the University, he stood among the first in character and certainty in morals and in sound judgment. was older than the average student, and thus was in a position to exercise a leadership that other and younger men found it difficult to wield. But it was not for this reason alone that he was one of those to whom his fellows looked for leading. was because of his superb manhood, his decision of mind and character, and his quite unbroken habit of being on the right side of any question. This, combined with his studious habits and with his evident constant knowledge of Christ, gave high promise for the future; a promise which was not unfulfilled.

On February 22, 1913, he was married to Miss Delia Rice, of Bayboro, North Carolina. She and their two little boys. C. O., Jr., and William Rice, survive him. She has been a true homemaker in the parsonage, a genuine sharer in all the joys and sorrows of a preacher's life, and to the last a strong comforter and companion to her husband. She resides now in Bayboro.

with her mother.

After finishing his education at the State University, he resumed his work as a teacher, again spending some time each year in evangelistic work, and always with success. Somehow he seemed to be able to put the Gospel message in such a way that it brought men to Christ. And in the fall of 1916, feeling that his service for the Master would be thus enlarged, and having had from the first a deep admiration for the doctrines and polity of Methodism and a hearty sympathy with them, he sought admission to our Church and Conference, and was received to be one of our number at the session in Durham two years ago. He was appointed to the Stantonsburg Circuit, which charge he served with great zeal and faithfulness to the time of his death.

He knew how to work his way into the hearts of the people, especially of those over whom he was pastor, and that not for his own sake, but for the sake of Jesus Christ. In many a home his voice has been lifted in prayer, and little children have heard him ask God's blessing upon them. Faithful in his ministry, sincere in his love for his people, thorough in his methods of work, tender in his dealings with those who erred, firm in his condemnation of wrong, afire with the zeal that yearns after men in the name of Christ, he spent his days in ways that won the respect of men and brought honor to the Gospel which he preached.

He was always sure of himself, not in any bigoted or opinionated manner, but with the certainty of one who knows his mind because he does his own thinking. And the supreme certainty of his life was the knowledge of Jesus Christ. He knew Him througout his ministry; and in the hours of pain in his last illness he was certain of Christ's companionship. He had fallen a victim of influenza, and from the first it was seen that he could not live. With utter disregard for his own comfort or safety, he had ministered to the other members of his family, without rest or respite, when he himself should have been nursed instead of nursing. And when finally driven to his bed, his strength was already consumed. Repeatedly he gave testimony of his Lord's presence, and spoke of his going away, making plans for his family, and assuring those who were about him that he already knew something of the sweetness and perfection of heaven.

On Monday morning, October 28, just as the sun was coming up, he slipped away and was gone. The next day the faithful and devoted people whom he had served for two years as pastor and preacher of the Gospel gathered about the parsonage door and wept while hymns were sung, and while the Scriptures were read which tell of the victory of the Son of God over death and of our immortal share in that triumph. At the hour of noon his body was put away in Maplewood Cemetery in Wilson, and the words, "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord," seemed to have a new wealth and beauty of meaning.

The Church of God has lost a faithful minister, who needed not to be ashamed; his family a true and godly husband and father; and his friends a high-souled and honorable man. But God is using him now, somewhere, for "His servants shall serve Him" there.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE METHODIST SUMMER SCHOOL AT TRINITY COLLEGE

We, the Board of Managers of the Methodist Summer School, an institution authorized at the last session of the Western North Carolina and the North Carolina Conference, would respectfully submit the following report:

Soon after Conference, December 18, 1917, the Board of Managers met at Durham, organized the School, and arranged for holding the first session at Trinity College, June 5-14, 1918.

The success of the first term is evidenced by the following facts:

Number taking and passing course of study in whole or in part, 34. Competent instructors gave courses in all undergraduate studies of the Conference course. To graduates Dr. F. N. Parker gave a course of nine lectures. A series of inspirational addresses were given by Drs. Worth M. Tippey, of New York; E. C. Caldwell, of Richmond; George R. Stuart, of Birmingham; and E. B. Chappell, of Nashville.

The report of the Treasurer, which is submitted herewith, indicates the use made of the money appropriated by the Conference for the benefit of the school:

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

We, your retiring Sunday School Board, beg leave to submit the following report:

We note with pleasure that the work of the Sunday School during the last quadrennium has made tremendous progress. No other line of church activity has made such notable headway. We rejoice in the service that it has been enabled to render the Church, preparing her people for a larger truth, training her young people in the work of the kingdom, converting thousands from sin unto righteousness. We heartily appreciate the assistance rendered by our ministers and laymen and bespeak for the incoming board a continuance of your assistance and good will.

While the work done during the past four years has been remarkable, both as to quantity and quality, yet we feel that we have but touched the surface of the real work that needs to be done. The situation is far from satisfactory. We are not reaching nearly so many people as we should. We have not yet arranged for the proper instruction and training of the pupils that we have enrolled. We are not properly equipped. Far too few of our people are really interested in this work. We do not wish to discount any other branch of church work, and yet it must be very apparent that this is really the most effective channel of service for which the church provides, and we wish to insist upon the hearty coöperation of all friends of the Church.

We wish to emphasize the need of renewed activities just at this time. We have just emerged victorious from the most terrific conflict that the world has ever witnessed. The greatest moral issues of history have been fought out and right has triumphed. It is all-important that we should conserve the effects of this victory. It will be worse than useless for us to win this war if we are to lose the moral battle which must now be fought. A physical victory will be of little value if we do not better our spiritual situation. We wish to warn against losing sight of our home base in our great drive for the evangelization of the world. We must bestir ourselves to see that childhood is conserved and properly trained, that youth is developed in morals and religion, and that our adults are trained in the service of the King. The call is great and unmistakable. We dare not fail to respond.

For the promotion of our work in the future we have these suggestions to make:

- 1. That we work on in our patient way and perhaps gradually arouse the public to the needs of the school and its vast possibilities, and thus by agitation and education bring about improvement.
- 2. That our pastors assist us as much as possible by studying the methods recommended by the Sunday School authorities and by implanting the ideas gained by this study in the minds of the people.
- 3. That we set about to train our young people in our schools and colleges in order that they may learn the things that pertain to the kingdom of God. These will catch the new vision and they will spread the new knowledge in every village and country-side until we shall bring about a transformation.

We have the following recommendations to make:

- 1. That we heartily endorse the Centenary Movement and pledge ourselves to assist in carrying out the plans outlined by the General Board.
- 2. That our schools and colleges be urged to incorporate the regular teacher-training course as a part of their curriculum wherever practicable
- 3. That we show our appreciation of the kindness of Trinity College in putting on an extension course in teacher-training by urging our people to take advantage of this opportunity to take this work.
- 4. That the regular plans of the Sunday School Board as to their field work be continued.
- 5. That our people be urged to attend the Junaluska Training School whenever it is possible for them to do so.
- 6. That we urge the departmentalization of our schools as far as practicable.
- 7. That a course for pastors and superintendents be arranged at the Trinity College Summer School for preachers, and that our laymen as well as pastors be urged to take this course if possible.
- 8. That we lay great stress on housing the Sunday School, and that we urge the remodeling of old churches as well as the proper arrangement of the new with a view to making proper provision for the school.

Your Board further instructed its Secretary to record a protest against the advertising of what might be considered questionable articles in our Sunday School literature.

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EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD

Your Epworth League Board is glad to report a substantial progress in the work of the young people of our Conference. The Annual Conference held at Louisburg College last July was well attended by representatives of Leagues throughout the Conference. Its chief characteristic was the intense spirituality manifested throughout the session. We commend the work of this annual conference of our young people to the brethren, and advise that we earnestly encourage them in their good work.

The Secretary of the Epworth League Conference in her annual report to this Board shows that during the year twenty-four Leagues have been organized. However, a survey of our Conference reveals that the young people are by no means fully organized. Many of our charges have no Leagues at all, and a multitude of congregations are

without any organization in the Church designed especially for the exercise and cultivation of the spiritual life of our young people and their training in work of the Church. Neglect here is nothing short of fatal. We must conserve our young life for Christ. We therefore urge that all our preachers faithfully promote the organization of their young people in Junior and Senior Leagues, and give to such organizations constant support and encouragement.

The report of our General Secretary, Dr. F. S. Parker, reveals conclusively that the Epworth League is the recruiting station from which come most of our missionaries, preachers, deaconesses, and active laymen. Liberal contributions to missions and other benevolent causes also come from this source. The Leagues of this Conference contributed \$1,200 to missions last year. They have pledged themselves to give \$3,500 this year.

We call to your attention that by General Conference action the League is now upon a new financial plan by which the old method of support by the contributions of the individual chapters has been displaced by a participation in the assessment for connectional causes. This measure holds enormous promise for the future development of the Epworth League. The Centenary will be prominent in the League. This organization has undertaken as a special to raise \$380,000 for the advance work in Africa, and for the building program at Paine College. Of that sum the Leaguers of the North Carolina Conference will give \$3,800 a year for five years.

With the beginning of the great Centenary program of the Church we deem it highly important that we bring our young people's work into line with the general work of the Church. We pledge the faithful coöperation of the Conference Epworth League Board with the Conference Epworth League, and also with the General Secretary and General Epworth League Board.

We all love the Bible cause, yet we fail to prove our love for it in hours of opportunity. This is one of those hours. The American Bible Society in the progress of the war, to supply copies of God's Word, imperatively needed, has trusted to our help and met these needs. Debt has been incurred. Seventy-five thousand dollars of that debt is still unpaid. This results from the work of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Testament League, which has been of the greatest value in the distribution of God's Word.

We recommend that one-half of the amount contributed by us to the Society be applied to this feature of the work.

We request, also, that all the money for this cause be sent to Rev. M. B. Porter, Richmond, Va.

We urge that each pastor, as early in the year as possible, present this cause to all his congregations, as the Discipline directs.

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CHURCH EXTENSION REPORT

The Board of Church Extension makes the following report:

Durham and Fayetteville Districts paid in full. The others were not far behind. Two hundred and three dollars more raised this year than last. We again report, and thank Mr. B. N. Duke for his gift of \$7.500 to aid rural work. But owing to the restrictions he places on his gift we were able to recommend for this fund only two churches, \$300, and two parsonages, \$750, total of \$1,050, leaving in hands of General Board unappropriated \$6,450.

We feel that our greatest need is an adequate Loan Fund, and our main effort still will be to secure this. Our present Loan Fund is This has been secured by setting aside each year a small amount for this purpose.

The Washington City church matter was referred to us, but we didn't feel at liberty to apply the funds raised for weak, struggling churches to a large city church, however worthy. Our Conference pledged \$5,000 to this work several years ago, but to date has paid only \$1.515.14, leaving a balance now due of \$3,484.86.

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REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. WAR WORK COMMISSION

The Executive Committee of the War Work Commission of the North Carolina Conference, begs to make the following report:

The War Work was represented by members of the committee at nearly all of the District Conferences, and the pastors were urged to collect the amount apportioned to the several charges and forward the same to John Victor, Treasurer of the War Work Fund, Lynchburg, Va.

The total amount asked for from the North Carolina Conference is \$10,583.00. Of this amount \$5,295.46 has been received by the Treasurer. This is, as you will readily see, just about 50 per cent of the amount asked for. Your committee urges that the remainder of this amount be collected and sent to the Treasurer by January 1, 1919. Your committee will endeavor to acquaint itself with any war work that should be done within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference, and make such recommendation as it shall deem wise to Dr. E. O. Watson, Secretary. The committee has undertaken to secure the names and rank of all the sons of ministers of the North Carolina Conference who are in the military service of the United States Government, and also the number of stars in our service flags.

The tabulated results up to date show that 32 sons of preachers of the North Carolina Conference are in the military service of the Government, and that there are 1.717 stars in our service flags, of which 32 are gold stars.

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BOOKS AND PERIODICALS

Your Committee on Books and Periodicals submits the following report:

Raleigh Christian Advocate. We are glad to note that our Conference organ has had a successful year, and that in spite of increased cost of publication it is able to report no financial losses. On the contrary, it has been able to declare a dividend of more than five hundred dollars, or an equivalent of 6 per cent dividend on the original capital stock. Attention is called, however, to the fact that the recent action of the Postoffice Department, ordering a discontinuance of all subscriptions that are in arrears, will necessitate a further trimming of the subscription list. In order to meet this emergency we recommend that the pastors and Presiding Elders be requested to secure at least 2,000 new subscribers this year with the following apportionment by districts:

We recommend that the Presiding Elders, together with the District Stewards, make the apportionment to the pastoral charges.

In accordance with your action of one year ago, the stock of the Raleigh *Christian Advocate* was taken over by the Conference. About \$5,000 of the amount necessary to purchase the outstanding stock has been raised, leaving a balance of nearly \$2,000 yet to be raised.

The committee recommends that the term of office for which the editor shall be elected shall be fixed at four years.

We commend the editor for his faithful service and assure him of the hearty coöperation of the members of this Conference.

Your action of last year so arranged the Board of Publication that the term of one member shall expire with each session of the Annual Conference, but did not define as to who should have the power of nominating his successor. We recommend that the Board be empowered to nominate his successor, and in the interim of the Conference to fill any other vacancy that might occur. We nominate for the ensuing term Mr. Joseph G. Brown, to succeed himself.

We recommend that the Board of Publication be authorized to negotiate with the Board of Publication of the Western North Caro-

lina Conference concerning the matter of consolidating the two Conference organs, and that they be empowered to effect such consolidation if suitable arrangements can be made.

OTHER PUBLICATIONS

We wish to express our appreciation to the editor of the *Christian Advocate* for the splendid work which he is doing, and to assure him of our heartiest sympathy in his great enterprise. We wish, especially, to emphasize the fact that the general organ is supplementary to our Conference organ and that no pastor or layman can be thoroughly informed without it. We believe that a systematic campaign for new subscriptions ought to be made for the *Christian Advocate* as well as for the Conference organ.

We wish to commend the splendid Sunday School and missionary literature published by our Church. We call special attention to the *Methodist Review* and the *Epworth Era*. These publications are all splendidly edited and deserve our hearty support.

We are glad to note that in spite of distractions of war the Publishing House makes a very creditable report.

We request Bishop Darlington to appoint T. N. Ivey, Editor of the *Christian Advocate*, and L. S. Massey, Editor of the Conference Organ.

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REPORT OF ORPHANAGE COMMITTEE

Your committee notes with pleasure the unmistakable evidences of God's goodness toward our beloved Methodist Orphanage. In the midst of the great world war, and when our people have been called upon to respond to so many worthy causes, its ever-increasing needs have been supplied, and the number of supporters multiplied. From the Superintendent we learn that forty-seven big-hearted friends throughout the Conference have assumed the support of an orphan at \$120 per year. Quite a large number of Sunday Schools are giving monthly offerings for current expenses. There has been a marked increase in the number of organized classes that are giving from five to ten dollars each month for the maintenance fund. Woman's Missionary Societies of the Conference are doing splendid work in helping to clothe the 235 children. This year witnessed a marked increase in the number who gave to the Orphanage their income from a day's work. During the past Conference year more than \$33,000 was added to our Permanent Endowment Fund. Educational Loan Fund was increased \$10,000 the past year. By the generous spirit which our Methodist people have displayed our Methodist Orphanage has been able to go forward and accomplish its high mission of service to the orphan children of the Conference.

We further note that there have been many improvements in our buildings and campus. During the year more than \$10,000 have been spent for this purpose.

The Orphanage school has been strengthened by the addition of another grade, so that it prepares its pupils to enter our best colleges.

Your committee wishes to heartily endorse the earnest and prayerful efforts that are being put forth to make our Orphanage a real Christian home for the fatherless who are so fortunate as to find a shelter there in the days of their helplessness. From the report of our Superintendent we are told of a real revival which visited the home this year, and so graciously blessed the entire life of the institution. We are further informed that there will be an effort made each year to lead all the children to the Saviour, and to develop them in Christian service.

With revival fires burning brightly upon the altars of our Orphanage, and our children growing up in the pure atmosphere of Christian faith and experience, we confidently believe that the life of our great State and Church will be invigorated and enriched by their godly and consecrated lives.

Your committee believes most emphatically that the hour has struck for a campaign in the interest of our Endowment Fund. In this time of unprecedented prosperity, and when big things are being projected, we believe that we ought to set for our goal not less than \$100,000, to be raised within the next three years. Since we secured one-third that much during the year that is now closing, we believe most sincerely that we can do as well each year for the next three. This can be successfully done by securing War Savings Stamps, Liberty Bonds, and legacies. With this definite purpose and worthy object in view, we would most cordially ask our leaders to lay the cause of the orphan children of our great Church upon the hearts of our Methodist folks, believing that such an undertaking will encourage and stimulate more generous giving to every other worthy cause for which appeals may be made.

Your committee further wishes the Conference to express its sincere gratitude to all who contributed toward the securing of more than \$33,000 for our Orphanage Endowment Fund during the past year. We cannot refrain from expressing our great joy over the \$5,000 given us by Mr. L. J. Baker, of Palmyra, and the \$25,000 given us by our noble benefactor, the late E. B. Borden, of Goldsboro. We also feel that it is fitting that we express our gratitude to Mr. S. C. Vann, of Franklinton, for his generous gift of \$10,000 for the Bettie Henley Vann Educational Loan Fund.

Your committee would ask the confirmation of the reëlection of the following trustees for the term expiring January 21, 1924: Hon. W. R. Allen, Hon. J. C. Biggs, R. R. Covington, General J. S. Carr, Rev. L. S. Massey, Hon. R. N. Page, Hon. J. B. Leigh, W. E. Springer, and Graham Woodard.

The Board of Trustees having reëlected A. S. Barnes Superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage, we would request the Bishop to reappoint him for the ensuing year. We wish to heartily commend him for the faithful and efficient service which he has rendered our Orphanage during the past four years of his administration, and we would urge all of our pastors and leaders to coöperate with him in all plans looking toward the upbuilding and strengthening of our beloved Methodist Orphanage.

It is sufficient to say that the members of your Board share with the whole Conference in accepting the call of the Church in this matter as the voice of God, and stand ready, both as individuals and as a Board, to do all necessary and possible to achieve its success. To this end the Board requests the Bishop to appoint Rev. A. D. Wilcox, Conference Missionary Secretary, and has made provision for his salary in cooperation with the Commission and for all needed expenses. latter subject only to the advice and consent of a committee consisting of the president and secretary of the Board and of Mr. J. C. Braswell. Brother Wilcox is without question preëminently fitted for this task, deserves, and your Board believes will receive, the hearty coöperation of every member of this Conference.

We recommend for reëlection as a Conference Committee on Evangelism for the new quadrennium, Revs. D. H. Tuttle, H. M. North, J. G. Johnson, E. H. Davis, and J. A. Dailey.

With great gratitude for the interest and liberality of the giver, we are glad to be able to announce that Mr. J. B. Duke has again sent his check for \$5,000 to be used in our rural and factory work. We recommend for this the following: E. Burlington, \$200; Pearl and Eno, \$200; Rougemont, \$200; S. The location of churches and parsonages should be given much careful consideration. Failure at this point has often caused much inconvenience and considerable financial losses.

TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

Your Board of Temperance and Social Service begs leave to report as follows:

LYNCHING

We deplore the fact that there is still extant throughout our land a spirit of lawlessness that manifests itself in the lynching of a fellow-citizen. Life should never be taken except by order of the courts, and it behooves Christian citizens everywhere to uphold the authority and frown down the practice of mob law.

THE CIGARETTE

The war has taught us many good lessons, and in many respects our country will be benefited by the war, but we deplore the fact that under the sanction of Government our soldier boys have been supplied with cigarettes. Not only has medical science taught us that the use of the cigarette is injurious, but many States have passed laws either prohibiting or restricting the sale of the same. The law obtaining in this State that cigarettes shall not be sold to boys under sixteen years of age is not enforced. We desire to go on record as favoring the enforcement of this law, and we urge our officers, who are charged with this enforcement, to see that the law is carried out.

TEMPERANCE

The Board desires to call attention to the law obtaining in our State requiring that scientific temperance instructions be given in all of our schools, and we call upon our efficient Superintendent of Public Instruction, Dr. J. Y. Joyner, and his splendid corps of teachers throughout the State, to see that this requirement is fully carried out. We also urge our pastors to acquaint themselves with this law and find out if the teachers, in the bounds of their work, are giving due consideration to this requirement.

PROHIBITION

Prohibition has made rapid strides throughout the nation in the past twelve months. Thirty-two States now prohibit the manufacture and sale of liquor within their borders and Congress has passed a law for war-time prohibition, which prohibits the manufacture of all intoxicating liquors after May, 1919, and the sale of all intoxicating liquors after July 1, 1919, and until the army is demobilized. Congress has also submitted to the States the Prohibition Amendment to the Federal Constitution, and this amendment has been ratified by fifteen States. The legislatures of thirty-six States must ratify before the law becomes effective, and it is expected that the other twenty-one States will ratify in January.

The enforcement of law is as necessary as the enactment. To give prohibition a fair trial, the law must be rigidly enforced. We urge our pastors to keep this matter before their people, and we urge our people to support, at the ballot boxes, officers who will stand for the enforcement of the law.

ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE AND OTHER TEMPERANCE ORGANIZATIONS

Your Board endorses the work of the North Carolina Anti-Saloon League, the Anti-Saloon League of America, the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and other like organizations.

We believe that the Anti-Saloon League has been the leading organization in bringing about the present status of prohibition throughout the nation, and we are glad to know that the pulpits of our Conference are open to its speakers, and that our people are giving to it loyal and adequate support.

We desire to give endorsement to the legislative program unanimously agreed upon by the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Anti-Saloon League, which is:

"First. That the Prohibition Amendment to the Federal Constitution be ratified. "Second. That the State office of Prohibition Commissioner be established. This officer and his deputies will have authority anywhere in the State to issue and serve warrants against any one who violates the prohibition laws. This law is needed to stop the blockaders.

"Third. That an 'Ouster Law' be enacted so that we can rid ourselves of those officers whose duty it is to execute the law and who do not. This law provides that any reputable citizen may report an officer to the court for not enforcing the law, and if the jury find the officer guilty the judge must oust him from office. The authority for providing such an officer in case of death or resignation would name his successor.

"Fourth. That the manufacture and sale of wine and cider as beverages be prohibited.

"Fifth. That our shipment laws be made bone-dry, so as to harmonize with the National anti-shipping laws.

"Sixth. That the sale as a beverage of bitters, extracts, Jamaica ginger, and other proprietary medicines, commonly used instead of liquor, be prohibited."

We urge our people to acquaint themselves with this legislative program and help in every possible way to get the laws enacted.

The Board desires to call attention to the Biennial Convention of the North Carolina Anti-Saloon League, which will be held in Raleigh, N. C., January 16th and 17th, 1919. We urge our churches, Sunday Schools, Epworth Leagues, and Bible classes to elect and send delegates to this convention, and thus help to ratify National Constitutional Prohibition.

The Board recommends that the Bishop appoint Rev. R. L. Davis, the Superintendent of the North Carolina Anti-Saloon League, as he has been elected to that position by the Board of Trustees of the Anti-Saloon League.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LAY ACTIVITIES

To the Bishop and Members of the Eighty-Second Annual Session of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

We, the members of the Board of Lay Activities, beg leave to submit the following report:

We are grateful to Almighty God for his wonderful love which has been manifested in his abundant mercies and manifold blessings which have come to us during the past year. But in an especial manner would we express to Him our gratitude for the happy termination of the world-war which has so long monopolized the attention and efforts of the civilized world, and which has cost so much in blood and treasure. To Him would we ascribe praise, glory, and honor for the victory of righteousness over unrighteousness, and for the preservation of our Christian institutions and civilization.

We contemplate with great pride and gratification the patriotic and unselfish service which our people have rendered our country in the hour of her crisis, and the self-denial and sacrifices which they have so willingly practiced at the call of the country that they might contribute something to the winning of the war. Now that the war is over, and peace has again come to the world, may we not hope that this spirit of patriotism and sacrifice will be transmuted into service to the Church of Jesus Christ? Surely we can give no greater expression of our gratitude to God who has led our armies to so great a victory, and has so wonderfully blessed our nation, than by entering the door of opportunity which He has, at this time, or ened for world-wide evangelism. We rejoice that, to that end, He is moving in our Church, through the Centenary Movement, to the accomplishment of His purposes. We believe He is in this movement, and is challenging us to a mighty task. Shall we not accept it? It would be disloyal not to do so. Shall we be less loyal to God than we have been to our country?

Believing that through the Centenary of Methodist missions God is calling us to larger things in world-wide evangelism, and is opening up larger and broader fields of opportunity for service in His kingdom, we gladly give to the movement our most earnest support, and deem it a great privilege to coöperate with those who are in charge of the plans of the movement in bringing to it the greatest measure of success. And we appeal to all of our people to gird themselves for the tremendous task which faces the Church of God at this time, which will demand at our hand a large measure of personal sacrifice and earnest intercessory prayer.

The committee recommends that Y. T. Ormond be elected Conference Lay Leader.

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REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

We believe profoundly in the moral and spiritual functions of education, and we desire to record our firm conviction that, both as regards the present crisis which has come with the ending of the war, and more especially as regards the reconstructing of civilization and the salvation of the future, the spirit and character of our American educational institutions are of supreme importance. It has been the colleges and schools of the country that have furnished the leadership without which the war could not have been won; and it will be the schools and colleges of the country which will deter-

mine, by reason of the men and women who go out of them, the quality and the fate of tomorrow's civilization. Therefore there can be no question to which this is secondary. And we declare once more our belief in an education whose first aim is the right kind of character, and whose heart is the truth manifested in Jesus Christ.

We put ourselves on record as urging more generous and substantial support of all our colleges and schools, insisting that the Church school has an essential and indispensable part in our society. We hold it to be a matter both of patriotism and of religion to see to it that from the homes of our Methodist people should go in loyal file the young men and women who hold the future in their hands.

We are deeply interested in Emory University, and in all other institutions of our Church. We call upon our people to give them a large place in their hearts. But the first place among us is bound to be given to the enterprises of our own Conference. We bear them in our prayers, and are ready to make such sacrifices for them as may be demanded. We look forward with joy to the beginning of the third year of this quadrennium, when the Church-wide popular campaign for education is to begin.

TRINITY COLLEGE

Like the other men's colleges in this country, Trinity has this year been used by the War Department for the training of young men for the army. We rejoice to know that both the administration of the college and the student-body have shown the utmost loyalty and devotion to the causes which have called us in this war. Both in the Students' Army Training Corps and in the forces in the field and on the water, in which more than eleven hundred Trinity men have been enrolled, these men have proved themselves worthy of the fine traditions of the college; and they have added immortal glory to the name of the college and to the name of education. We give thanks for this great college, and look with confidence to the future, because we believe that wherever men have to strive and do the hard part of those who are devoted to great things, Trinity men will not be found wanting.

GREENSBORO COLLEGE FOR WOMEN

This institution reports a prosperous year, with an increased enrollment and a widening of its circle of substantial friends. The Department of Religious Education is progressing steadily, the enrollment increasing with the growth of the student-body. The alumnæ have completed the raising of ten thousand dollars for the Chair of English, and they have inaugurated another campaign for a Library Fund. The new dormitory, erected last year, has been named The Hudson Hall, in memory of Mrs. Mary G. Hudson, who made the

largest contribution ever made by a woman to Greensboro College for Women. We note with profound sorrow the tragic death of Mr. J. B. Blades, Chairman of the Board of Trustees.

LOUISBURG COLLEGE

This Junior College has had a prosperous year; but, owing to the illness of President Love and a large number of the faculty and students with influenza, the college had to be closed for the Christmas holidays some two weeks earlier than usual. We record our firm belief in the place of the Junior College in our educational economy, believing that it fills a place that nothing else can take, because it furnishes an opportunity to many girls and young women to obtain an education who would otherwise be denied. Further, we believe that this particular college, as well as others like it in our Church, deserves the whole-hearted support of our people, both in a material and in a moral way.

CAROLINA COLLEGE

Carolina College has slightly fewer students than a year ago, but they are an exceptionally fine body of young women, and the faculty is unusually strong. Fortunately this institution has thus far been spared a visitation of influenza, and the health of the students has been of the best. We commend with all our hearts this excellent institution to our people.

LITTLETON COLLEGE

There have been considerable improvements in material equipment of the college property the past year. The work of the students and teachers is being well done; and we deem worthy of especial commendation the work done to assist young women of small means.

SUMMER SCHOOL

We are glad to say that the Summer School held last year at Trinity College for the young ministers of this and the Western North Carolina Conference was in every way a success. We heartily commend this to them and to all our preachers and laymen the coming summer.

Your Board has adopted a resolution accepting membership in the Methodist Educational Association, and has directed the Treasurer to forward to W. E. Hogan, Treasurer, the requisite membership fee of \$6 for two years.

We call attention of the undergraduates to the new regulation requiring that they take their Conference courses of study with the Correspondence School.

We nominate C. J. Harrell and W. A. Stanbury to serve for four years as members of a commission to provide for religious education for Methodist students in schools maintained by the State of North Carolina.

The appropriation to Trinity Park School is to be applied to the payment of tuition for ministers' sons and those preparing for the ministry, and the remainder, if any, is to be used at the discretion of the faculty for loans to worthy students, or for running expenses, or both.

Estimates of apportionments, under the amount allotted to education for causes within our Conference and for Trinity College and for Greensboro College for Women for the ensuing year are as follows:

The apportionment for Trinity Park School is to be used as follows:

- 1. The sons of ministers and those preparing for the ministry are to be given tuition free, each receiving a tuition scholarship of \$40 annually.
- 2. At the discretion of the faculty, scholarships may be granted to other worthy students.
- 3. In the judgment of the faculty, loans may be made to deserving students, provided that not more than \$100 may be loaned to any one student in any scholastic year, and, further provided, that such loans shall be made on properly secured notes. Interest at the rate of 6 per cent is to be paid annually.
- 4. The demands of section 1 having been met, and the conditional demands of 2 and 3 having been met in such manner as the faculty may determine, the remainder, if any, may be applied on running expenses for the school.
