MEMOIRS

ALEXANDER DAVIS BETTS

BY J. T. GIBBS

"Uncle Betts," as he was affectionately known all over North Carolina, was an unusual man. He early placed his chief treasure where neither moth nor rust corrupt. He knew, with the absolute knowledge of an abiding faith, supported by intimate personal communion with God, Him in whom he had believed. As far as lieth in man, he was like his Maker, without variableness or any turning from the path of righteousness. Upon this foundation he built a life of great usefulness.

There was no self-seeking in Brother Betts. The hardest his Conference had was always good enough for him. Whatever the people paid was sufficient for his hire. Or, rather, he knew that his Master in the better land would count his pay in the souls that turned to God under the example of his consecrated life and the simple eloquence of the Gospel as it came from his earnest lips.

Nor was he in the least neglectful of his family; children grew to useful naturity in his home. With their father, they found plain living sufficient for their needs, and his example of high thinking was such as to draw them to a similar course of life. They attended leading colleges, with a knowledge that much depended upon their making the most of the opportunities offered. And when they received their diplomas they took from home lessons of more value than any imparted in the class-room. Brother Betts was to an unusual degree a successful father.

Such was the man whose passing leaves a gap in the religious life of a great State. He was an army chaplain in the early sixties and a pastor in civil life until advancing years forced him to lay down the active duties of his beloved office. He was known, loved, respected and admired throughtout the Old North State, too well known and too secure in the affections of thousands to need eulogy now. His monuments are the lives that are better because of his. We shall miss his saintly presence, his manly independence, the light of Heaven that shone from his face.

As we think of the loved ones whose tender care watched over his last days and picture their sad return from the place they laid him, our thoughts are drawn to Joseph's rock-hewn tomb. It was not in the nature of things that death could hold our Saviour. There was still work that love could do. And so it shall be with this His disciple.

The subject of this memoir was the son of William and Temperance Utley Betts, and was born in Cumberland (now Harnett) County, N. C., on August 25, 1832. His boyhood days were spent on a farm, and he loved to the end of his days the running brook, the wild flower and the singing bird. He was educated at Summersville Academy and the University of North Carolina, receiving from the university at different times the

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degrees of A. B., A. M. and D. D. He was converted at Chapel Hill, N. C., October 15, 1853, and was licensed to preach in 1855. He was admitted on trial into the North Carolina Conference in 1856 and served the following charges:

Sampson Circuit, 1857-58; Smithville Circuit, 1859; Elizabethtown Circuit, 1860; Smithville Circuit, 1861. On October 25, 1861, he was commissioned as a chaplain in the Confederate Army and served faithfully through the war.

General Lee spoke of him as "that model chaplain." He walked for hours at a time that some footsore, sick or wounded soldier might ride his horse. He visited and prayed with prisoners. To friend and foe alike he carried the message of To the end of his life he was thanked by people back God. home for his kindness to their men who were soldiers, and for letters he wrote, telling of them when sick or wounded or dead -and many of these men claimed him as their spiritual father. He was filled with the Spirit; for in those trying days he records the fact that he was in "perfect peace." He writes of seven days in the saddle from Chapel Hill to Richmond as the happiest days of his life until then. He says: "When I knelt at sunset in the woods and prayed for the chaplains, the soldiers, my country and my family, my soul was so happy." in peace, he knew Him in whom he had believed. In war, as He was a patriot as well as a Christian. When Lee surrendered he went to Johnston's army, and when Johnston surrendered he went, as ordered, to the Federal headquarters and was paroled near Chapel Hill, N. C.

Brother Betts, after the war, served the following charges: Topsail Circuit, 1866-69; Oxford Circuit, 1870-71; Rolesville Circuit, 1872-73; Ansonvlle Circuit, 1874-75; Mt. Pleasant Circuit, 1876-77; North Guilford Circuit, 1878-79; Duplin Circuit, 1880-82; Carteret Circuit, 1883; Jones' Circuit, 1884-86; Nashville Circuit, 1887-88; Swan Quarter Circuit, 1889; Wilson Circuit, 1890; Goldston Circuit, 1891; Maxton Circuit, 1892-93; Rockingham Circuit, 1894; New Bern, Hancock Street, 1895-96; Rocky Mount Circuit, 1897-98; Ayden Circuit, 1899-1900; Bethel and Jamesville Circuit, 1901; Cokesburg Circuit, 1902; Lillington Circuit, 1903-04; Spring Hope Circuit, 1905; Town Creek Circuit, 1906-07; Shallotte Circuit, 1908. At this Conference held by Bishop A. W. Wilson in Durham, N. C., December 9-14, Rev. A. D. Betts asked and obtained the superannuate relation, being then in his 77th year. But his work was not ended. From the day of his superannuation he regarded himself free to work in a larger parish. He never got in anyone's way, but he went into many charges, preached, visited the people; especially visited in schools and prisons-and everywhere Uncle Betts was regarded as a real benediction.

There were many testimonials of this man's embodiment of the Christian graces and of his great usefulness while he lived. At the University of North Carolina there has been through the years abundant testimony of the favorable impression he made there as a good student, a sincere man, and for undoubting faith in the God of the Bible. Of the great number of tributes from the pens of our preachers I quote only a few. Dr. Swindell wrote: "He is a man of the highest character, and has the full

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confidence of all the people." Rev. John N. Cole wrote: "He has lived to make the world brighter and purer and sweeter." And Dr. Ivey wrote: "No other man in North Carolina Methodism will leave to the generations a richer bequest than will be left by Dr. Betts."

Brother Betts was married May 12, 1855, to Miss Mary E. Davis. October 26, 1881, he was married the second time to Miss Priscilla M. Debnam, who survives him. Of his eleven children only six are living, namely, Rev. W. A. Betts. Olanta. S. C.; J. R. Betts, Macon, N. C.; Miss Sallie Betts, Louisburg, N. C.; Dr. J. S. Betts, Greensboro, N. C.; Mrs. L. P. Wilkins, Sanford, N. C., and Mrs. R. L. Davis, Raleigh, N. C. With his son, Dr. Betts, a Greensboro, Brother Betts and his wife, after his superannuation, lived.

Brother Betts always attended Conference, and enjoyed much these annual meetings with the brethren. He went to Goldsboro to attend our last Conference, but sustained injuries from a fall, answered by phone the Conference roll call, and was taken to his home in Greensboro. All that could be done was done for him, but feebleness of age and the injuries received terminated his life. The funeral services were conducted by Dr. E. L. Bain, pastor of West Market Street, and Rev. J. M. Rhodes. president of Littleton Female College, and the mortal remains of Alexander Davis Betts were interred in the cemetery at Greensboro.

This man, pre-eminently of single aim in life, and that the highest aim, has certainly added something to the sum total of human achievement. This man, who, take him all in all, was doubtless our man of greatest faith, shall surely have a part in the first resurction.

CLATOR WINN SMITH

Reverend Clator Winn Smith was born August 7, 1919, in Rutherford County, N. C., near the present town of Henrietta, and died in Whiteville, N. C., February 12, 1919. He was the fourth of seven children born to Jeremiah Webb Smith and Sarah Jane Smith. He was left fatherless at the age of five and motherless at the age of fourteen years.

Young Clator Smith grew up on the farm. With few advantages in the schools and subject to not a few hardships incident to the conditions of his early life, being left without the fostering care of father and mother, the lad of the hills knew not the privileges of many. He did not get a fair start in life. Still, after his conversion, the young man went to Boiling Springs Academy and to Rutherford College in preparation for his life's work.

The experience at Cedar Grove Church, Cherry Mountain Circuit, Saturday, August 6, 1873, marked an epoch in the life of the sixteen year old country boy. On Sunday following, August 7, he felt called to preach. To the mandates of this hour he devoted the rest of his life. His birth, August 7; his conversion, August 6; and his call to preach, August 7, were to

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him alike most definite events and made, for him, August a memorable month. All of Brother Smith's people were Baptists but his conversion at a Methodist camp meeting turned him to the Methodists. Reverend John W. Puett recommended Clator Smith for License to preach and Dr. H. A. Hudson was the Presiding Elder. These devout men must have left their impress on the young preacher.

At Raleigh, in 1882, with Bishop Keener, presiding, Clator Winn Smith was received on trial in the North Carolina Conference. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop Linus Parker at Wilmington, and Elder by Bishop J. C. Granberry at Reidsville in 1886. The start on an itinerant's rounds made at Raleigh by this Methodist preacher was a journey not notable for soft and easy places. A bare recital of his appointments makes a suggestive story for all who are acquainted with the times and are able in their imaginings to follow his goings.

Brother Smith served the following charges: Onslow Circuit, 1883-4; Whiteville, 1885; Enochville, 1886-7; Elizabethtown, 1888-9; Whiteville, 1890-1; Bladen Street, Wilmington, 1892. A Superannuate relation was granted Brother Smith for 1893, but in August of that year he was put in charge of Whiteville charge, which was given up by Rev. W. A. Forbes. Whiteville, 1894; Red Springs, 1895-6; Elizabethtown, 1897; Carver's Creek, 1898-0; Supernumerary, 1901-2-3-4; Columbus. 1905-6-7-8; Roberson, 1909-10-11; Raeford, 1912; Troy, 1913; Winfall, 1914-15.

This record of more than thirty years spent in weariness and sufferings, sometimes personal sufferings, and for many years the sufferings of an invalid wife, will never be fully known until the books are opened above. Always on circuits, some of which were big and undeveloped. Brother Smith knew well the trials of a Methodist preacher. Though afflicted in body and burdened with cares in his home he labored and suffered on.

Clator W. Smith was a man of strong convictions. He was a man genuine to the core and had a lasting contempt for the meanness of men. Sometimes the sharpness of his rebukes led men to misunderstand his motives and fail to appreciate his efforts to help. He preached the gospel of repentence and of salvation by Jesus Christ as the only hope of men. As he moved in the obscure ways among men, oftentimes in places where the light had gone out of life, they always knew that a man of prayer was among them pointing all to a Saviour and Guide. Perhaps, this man was most potential in life and most effective as a Methodist preacher because of his power in prayer. He was deemed a practical and earnest preacher who came with a message of intense conviction. Energetic in action, genuine in his religious experience, strong in stating his convictions, and devoted to his Lord, the life of Brother Smith counted where-Sinners were saved and the material interests ever he went. of the church built up. At Enochville, Whiteville, and Bladen Street he built parsonages.

On December 15, 1886, Clator Smith and May Mosby were married by Rev. Paul J. Carraway at Whiteville, N. C. To them were born Annie May, Fannie Slade. Sally J., Hellen, Cora Winn, and Clator Webb. All of these children remain to serve their generation and to bless the world; and the dear devoted wife.

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knowing only the invalid's chair, proves an inspiration to all by her hopefulness and good cheer. She proved a noble inspiration to her devoted husband through all the years of their pilgrimage. He found much comfort in his last days by the life and labors of his children, and the hopes he entertained for their future.

We first knew Brother Smith with real intimacy when in his home after he had made the long move across the conference to the Perquiman's Circuit. Though the invalid wife and mother had not walked a step for eight years, they gave themselves to the task and no man on the Elizabeth City district gave himself more entirely to his work than did this man of God that year. But before the next year had passed the final break came and it was plainly evident to his friends that his labors had ended. Broken though not in despair, he moved to his home in Whiteville. This was to end his itinerary. The pilgrimage was drawing to a close.

Whiteville had been somewhat a harbor of refuge to this man of God whenever the adverse winds had become too severe. Whenever afflictions in his family or in his own person compelled him to rest awhile, he would seek this haven of rest. Here the people knew him best and appreciated his life and labors. They believed in him and trusted him. At Sunday School in Whiteville on the Second Sunday in December, 1918, he attended his last public service fully conscious that the end was near though he remarked on his way home that day that he felt well enough to live six months yet. The next Sunday, he sat with the family at the table for the last time. From this time to the end on February 12, 1919, he suffered untold agonies, but he faced death unafraid.

To his Presiding Elder Rev. J. H. Shore, some weeks before his passing, Brother Smith spoke with calmness and much assurance of the end which he realized was near. Of special consolation to him in his last weeks of untold agony was the memory of the many friends who had helped him through the years. He was most appreciative of a kindness done him.

Rev. J. H. Frizzelle, preacher in charge at Whiteville, bears this beautiful testimony:

"As his pastor I found him as true as steel to the church and as clear as the sun in his Christian experience. A true friend to his pastor and more than willing to render any service he could, his influence here was of the finest type and still abides. His attitude on all moral questions was distinct and open. His energy was the most remarkable of any man that I have been thrown with. It was pitiful to see him struggling to get strong enough to attend conference; but it was not within his strength and had to be given up."

Near the noontide hour of a beautiful day, the ills that flesh is heir to and the hardships incident to an itinerant career came to an end. The body was laid away in the cemetery at Whiteville. The family and friends resumed the ordinary rounds of life but the influence for good of this our brother now lives

and moves above the commonplace. Since no good deed ever utterly perishes from the earth and the faithful are had in everlasting rememberance, this itinerant Methodist preacher did not spend his life in vain. Such, we are assured, shall shine as the stars forever and ever.

CHARLES O. DURANT

It was our pleasure to accompany Brother C. O. DuRant to the last session of our Conference. We travelled in an automobile and through the unrestrained intimacy of the trip the simple greatness of the man was always evident. He had just finished a ministry of four years on the Snow Hill Circuit and was going to conference to get another appointment. The unselfish way in which he had given himself to the work of the ministry, for thirty-six years, had made him a prematurely old man; yet he felt new strength in the anticipation of a new field in which to labor and was gladly awaiting the word that would send him. God, however, decreed that the work of Brother DuRant was needed in another world. Spanish Influenza seized him while at conference and from its effects he never recovered. In the early morning of March 13 this year when another day was kissing the earth with promise and suggestion, God kissed his soul and with the promise of eternal life and took Brother The body was laid to rest in Snow Hill DuRant unto Himself. near the scenes of his last ministry. Reverend W. A. Piland and Reverend J. L. Rumley together with the writer conducted the burial service.

We had the pleasure of knowing Brother DuRant only a few months, but those months were triumphant and glorious ones for him. He was travelling the last leagues of the journey; he moved in the power of a sublime, and the glory of a sacred There might have been a time when his joy was little, his iov. faith anaemic, and his praise feeble, but not when we knew him. He could see his way out the long gorge to the far light on the shining table lands where God Himself is moon and sun; radiant and compelling was his spirit in the conception of such. As we looked upon him in those victorious hours no boastful nor arrogant spirit was apparent; he was an earnest and humble spirit rejoicing to do the will of his Master. Doubtless God could have made a better man but doubtless God never did.

Charles O. DuRant was born in Brunswick County, North Carolina, September 6, 1858. His home was one that knew God and in the atmosphere of his Godly home he laid the foundation work of his useful ministry.

His school advantages were limited to years of preparation in the public schools of reconstruction days and a short time at old Trinity College. His days in school however did not measure the extent of his education. He was a good student and in the course of years gathered about him a well selected library which fed his mind and inspired his spirit. At the age of twenty-three he was licensed to preach. The following year,

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1882, at Raleigh, he was received on trial into the North Carolina Conference. For thirty-six years he preached with joy the message of redemption through the cross of Jesus Christ. During his thirty-six years of service he served the following charges: Point Caswell Mission, Randolph Circuit, Pekin Circuit, Youngsville Circuit, Raleigh-Brooklyn, Warren Circuit, Halifax, Currituck, South Creek, Craven, Hamlet, Richmond Circuit, Goldston, Elon, Newport, Goldsboro, Snow Hill.

In 1891 he was married to Miss Edgerton of Wayne County. This good woman entered the itinerancy without complaint and found joy therein. In his home, Brother DuRant found a ready place of rest and soul refreshment from the strain of his consuming ministry. Mrs. DuRant, together with three children Ethel, Winnie, and Fred. survive him.

We would not attempt to put this sacred man's character through any analytical examination but there were some of his virtues which added special charm and attractiveness to his character, that we wish to mention.

He believed that the minister was a pastor with the severe drive of his conscience ever urging him,—he never overlooked this truth. His flock was never forgotten. He carried the sick upon a bosom of prayer to the great Shepherd; with tenderness and firmness he sought the wandering sheep; in secret joy he led his flock into the fields of God's truth, where they might feed.

Together with the man's fervent care of his flock we would mention his purity of soul. During his ministry of thirty-six years there can not be found a single shadow of suspicion resting upon his record. He was an Israelite in whom there was no guile, catching in his soul the beauty of God and His Kingdom, and reflecting it to the world. Men were glad to be in his presence because they heard none of the distant sounds of hell, but heaven's notes rushed upon their ears through the symphony of his spirit.

Again we would mark that feature of his soul that made his work imperative and sent him to his task without an alternative, because he had a consciousness that God had sent him. No ordinary hindrance could keep him from meeting an appointment to preach the word. Driven by this consuming passion to do the will of the Master, he subjected his body to many hardships and he became weak and feeble before age had an opportunity to bring such results. He did not have strength to fight, when influenza attacked him. He had offered himself as a living sacrifice to the work of the Kingdom.

We thank God that He gave us such a man as Charles O. Du-Rant and may we never forget the life he lived among us.

DAVID BASCOMB PARKER

Two years ago David Bascomb Parker retired from active service in the Conference, and went to live in his little home near Hamlet. It was here that he died last April.

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Some of the most important events in his life are these. He was born at Roseboro, Sampson County, December 2, 1850, being the son of John and Jenetta Parker. On November 5, 1902 he was married to Miss Annie Saunders, who now lives in Hamlet with their two children, David Bascomb and James Saunders Parker. Besides these relatives there were also four brothers and eight sisters. Brother Parker was a school teacher before he entered the ministry. He joined the North Carolina Conference at Elizabeth City, and served continuously until his superannuation in 1917. His death occurred on April 17, 1919.

The following were the charges which he served, given in the order and time of his service: Campbelton, 1895-96; Sampson Circuit, 1897; Jacksonville and Richlands, 1898; Pantego Circuit, 1899-1900; Hobgood, 1901-05; Youngsville, 1906-10; Elizabethtown, 1911-13; Candor, 1914; Laurel Hill, 1915-17.

As to personal characteristics David Parker was rather modest and retiring in his demeanor. He did not take his congregations by storm when he came upon the scene. But before he had been long with them his people realized that he was firm and strong, and they were assured that a Christian gentlemand and minister of the Gospel of the Christ had come to be their pastor. It was not his lot to be a pulpit orator, to sway the multitudes; to walk in the limelight before applauding His type was that of the steady, faithful, diligent hearers. pastor who looks carefully after the details of his charge. One would have to go to his place of work to find him. He was rather scholarly in his methods of thought and in the manner of presenting the truth. He did not lift up his voice in clamor. and his cry was not heard in the streets. His was the meek and quiet spirit which, in the sight of God, is of great price.

After a man goes from us it is the custom to ask. "What was he worth?" and "How much did he leave?" From a physical standpoint this man left an unpainted cottage in the midst of a few acres of poor soil. But from a better viewpoint he left a good name, a clean character and a worthy record of service in the ranks of our ministry. His discharge was with honor. How much was he worth? We would have to ask what he had meant to the sick, and to his people who were passing through affliction, and to little children who had been shepherded by him, and to sinners brought to Christ by his ministry; and how much he was worth to those in his own home who knew him most intimately. His rating will not be found in Bradstreet's records, but rather in that which the angels keep in the Lamb's Book of Life.

In his mind there was no question as to our Gospel. He accepted it as the complete thing that it is, and preached it in its wholeness convincingly to his flock. This was but to make good in practice the vow he had taken upon entering the ministry.

When our friends come to the end of life in this world it is always of interest to hear what they have to say of the journey thus far and of the outlook. It was the writer's privilege to be at the bedside of this man of God shortly before his going, and to hear him testify that it was well with him. Of course, we

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knew it was well, still it was good to hear him say so. The ministry, the church, our common human life have all been made the richer because David Bascomb Parker came this way. Services to his memory were held in the Methodist Church at Hamlet, and his body was laid to rest in the cemetery there. The angels will know where to find his dust in the day when the Lord shall come to make all things new.

WILLIAM A. FORBES

Rev. William A. Forbes, the third child of Rev. John H. and Mrs. Mary Forbes, was born near Danville, Va., February 18, 1846, and died at his home, Buies Creek, N. C., on Tuesday evening, October 27, 1919.

Brother Forbes gave his heart to God in his ninth year, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in which his father was a beloved local preacher, at Rock Springs, near Danville, Va. He moved from this community, when about grown, and settled at Roxboro, N. C., where immediately he entered heartily into the life and work of the church; being soon elected Superintendent of the Sunday School and for a time Superintendent in general of the Sunday School of Person County. He, also, at this time, was a singing master, and taught a number of classes in singing and hymnology. While thus engaged as singer and Sunday school superintendent, he felt the call and was licensed to preach, the gifts for which he exercised as a local preacher for a number of years.

In his twenty-first year, he was married to Miss Virginia Powell, near Milton, N. C., May, 1866. To this union two children were born, one of whom died in infancy. The other is now Mrs. D. C. Bryant, living near Wallace, N. C.

His wife was truly a good woman—a helpmeet indeed,—For thirty-four years they labored together in the Lord, until at the time of Brother Forbes' pastorate at Dunn, she became greatly afflicted and after a long illness, died December 4, 1900, at the home of the daughter, and was buried near Wallace.

On June 2, 1902, he was married a second time, to Miss Lola B. Crowder of Buies Creek, N. C., who survives him. To them one child was born, but it died in infancy. However, they adopted a bright boy to whom they gave the name of Luther Davis Forbes, and he, also, survives. No man in old age and failing health ever had a more self-sacrificing and devoted companion than did Brother Forbes, as the wife of his last days. Her devotion was wonderful and their companionship was beautiful.

It was when about forty years of age, that he entered the itinerant ministry, joining the North Carolina Conference on trial at the session which convened at Charlotte 1885. But he had, certainly, a very remarkable and successful ministry, covering a period of nearly a quarter of a century, having served charges as follows: Magnolia, 1886-87; Kenansville,

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1888-9-90-91; Whiteville, 1892-93; Bethel, 1894-95; Mattamuskeet, 1896; Richlands and Jackson, 1897-98; Dunn Circuit, 1899-1900-01; Henderson, 1902.

In the fall of that year, his health failed him and he took the superannuate relation; but, regaining his health during the next year, he was placed again as an effective at the Conference of 1903; receiving further appointments as follows: Duke, 1904-05; Dover, 1906; Farmville, 1907-08-09; and Atlantic, 1906. In that year his health again failed him, and he asked again for the superannuate relation, which from that time on, he was obliged to retain, till his translation. During all these years, he has made his home at Buie's Creek, doing such work as he could for the church, as opportunity offered, and being always the truly helpful friend of the pastor, as well as the distinct leader of the religious community life.

Early in the year it became apparent that Brother Forbes could not long remain with us; but it was only five weeks before his death, that he had to take to his bed. Then he suffered no pain, just gradually weakened away till he fell on sleep to wake in the glory land, to which he looked forward, with an ever brightening hope. This hope he made clear to all the many who came to see him. He told his Presiding Elder to hear this message to his Comrades: "Tell the boys I will not answer the roll call at Conference, as I am going to answer the roll call in heaven." That roll call he answered with exceeding great joy.

The funeral service was conducted from the residence at Buie's Creek, N. C., on Tuesday afternoon, October 28th, by the writer assisted by Rev. J. M. Daniel. Beautiful tributes were paid to his life and character, by Brothers Miller and Egerton of the Baptist Church, and Brother Menius of the Presbyterian Church, and a multitude of neighbors—young and old—passed the casket in reverent review. Then on Wednesday morning his body was carried to Old Rock Fish Presbyterian Church, near Wallace, and laid beside that of his first wife, to await the resurrection. The burial service was conducted by Rev. M. D. Hix.

Sleep, beloved brother, and rest from thy labors, for "Precious in His sight is the death of His saints."

JAMES M. BENSON

James M. Benson was born in Hyde County, December 12, 1853, and died March 9, 1919. He was reared under religious influence and at about twenty-one years of age was converted under the ministry of the late Rev. J. D. Buie. From the time of his conversion he was active in every phase of church work. He served as steward, Sunday School Superintendent and leader in prayer-meetings.

Brother Benson was a man of culture and received splendid training in the schools. For a number of years he was one of

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the successful educators of the state. He was admitted into the Conference on trial in Raleigh in 1897 and served the following charges; with great fidelity: Jones Circuit, 1897-1900; Goldsboro Circuit, 1901; Nashville Circuit, 1902-04; Snow Hill Circuit, 1905-08; Roper Circuit, 1909-10; Kenly Circuit, 1911-14; Carthage Circuit, 1915; Troy and Biscoe, 1916; Vass Circuit, 1917-18.

In July, 1918, on account of declining health, he laid down his beloved work, hoping day after day that his health would at least allow him to complete the year. But his Lord willed otherwise.

Brother Benson was twice married; first to Miss Sarah Bonner of Hyde County. These two lives seemed perfectly blended; there was never a note of discord. She was the mother of his children, some of whom died in early childhood, and four survive. His second wife was Miss Annie Williams, of Hamilton, a woman of rare intellectual gifts, a deeply spiritual woman who proved herself a companion and diligent help-meet during his ministry.

No man in the Conference was more greatly beloved than Bro. Benson. Those who came in personal contact with him were impressed with his deep spiritual life. There was a magnetism about him that immediately drew men to him. Those to whom he ministered frequently said of him "Brother Benson is a man of such wisdom and large-heartedness that anyone in trouble may go to him and find comfort and strength.' His prayers for others were special pleas with God that never His home life was beautiful. There was failed of answer. never a murmur or complaint; if there was ever an occasion for reproof, it was so gentle one scarcely recognized it as such. but felt an impulse to refrain from anything that would wound His sons and daughters, though having reached maturity, him. always sought his fatherly counsel and advice, and never entered upon any business proposition without consulting him. His preaching was of a high order of mind and heart that lifted the hearer heavenward. He often presented the beauties of the Christian life. He dealt with sin in its every phase, but with a gentleness that stamped itself upon the conscience, and men were sometimes converted in the quiet of the regular morning or evening service.

From November until March, his frail body was so racked by disease and he was in such a weakened condition that he talked very little but frequently expressed himself as ready and waiting to see loved ones on the other side. The way was bright, made so by a faith that claimed every precious promise.

During the last four days of his illness, he suffered intensely but occasionally rallied. With his face radiant and shining he said when a hand was laid on his heart and he was asked if he were suffering pain—"Happy." After being unconscious two nights and a day, early Sunday morning every vestige of pain departed from his face, he heard the Master's call, opened his eyes, looked at the two who were standing by his bedside and smiled, again looked up and smiled, and then the gentle spirit of Brother Benson took its flight and returned to God who gave it. We shall see him again for we shall know where to find him.

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MRS. ANNIE PERSON FRIZELLE

Annie Person Frizelle, the wife of Rev. James H. Frizelle, of the N. C. Conference, was born near Carthage, N. C., October 25, 1863 and died in Whiteville, N. C., March 18, 1919 and was buried there. By the request of the family of the late Rev. C. W. Smith her last resting place is in their family plot. The funeral was conducted from the church by Rev. A. J. Parker, assisted by Rev. J. C. D. Stroud.

Sister Frizelle was the daughter of William and Margaret Person and a niece of Rev. S. D. Adams of sacred memory. Her father was a brave Confederate soldier and was mortally wounded in the Battle of Gettysburg and died while the army was retreating through Virginia and was buried in Winchester of that State. She had no chidren, but was a mother to her husbands little three year old sister Etta, whom she reared to womanhood with all the affection a real mother could lavish upon her own child and when she was equipt for life's duties saw her happily married to Mr. J. C. Williams, the merchant prince of Wilmington, N. C. Her mother and only brother Mr. W. B. Person died years ago. Only one sister remains, Mrs. W. K. Jackson of Carthage, N. C.

Sister Frizelle was married on June 5, 1884 to Mr. James H. Frizelle, who at the time was in business in her native town. When her husband informed her that he felt called to enter the ministry, she with joy threw herself into his plans and was a great factor in his preparations for this new field of labor. She went cheerfully to the little cottage parsonage on their first circuit. The furnishings were scant and worn but she never murmured, counting it a great joy to be permitted to have some part in her husband's success as a soul winner.

For nearly 27 years she was a helpmeet indeed undergoing the hardships, trials, and privations incident to the itinerant preacher's life and with never a word of complaint. No cloud was ever so dark, but that her faith saw "The silver lining," no disappointment however bitter, but some how she saw the Lord's hand in it all. While at Roanoke Rapids her health broke down, and during the remaining 20 years of her life she never saw a day when she was well. She bore her suffering patiently and died triumphantly.

She was converted early in life and joined the Methodist church. She grew up loving her church and was ever faithful to the vows she took at its altar. As a primary Sunday school teacher, and Superintendent of Junior Epworth League she had but few equals. She was active in the Woman's Missionary Society, but her greatest achievement was in leading young people to Christ. At the altar she seemed to know how to whisper the right word that showed the earnest seeker the way to victory. Many and beautiful have been the letters of sympathy received by the bereaved husband, saying among other things: "She led me to Christ." What a rich legacy to those left behind. Her copy of the Bible shows that it had been constantly in use, and is marked in a wonderful way. Many of

the great texts seems to have been choice food for her reflections. She was modest and retiring, strong in prayer and with a faith that never failed.

Her great ambition was to make an ideal home for her husband and well did she succeed. She loved books and read them to good purpose. For some time she knew her days were numbered, but she had no fear of death. During her last visit to my home the past summer, she came into my study and said: "I want a little talk with you, for this may be my last oppor-"I know my condition and I cannot live tunity," she said. many months at most and may be not many days. When I die I want you to conduct my funeral. I am ready to go when my Lord sends for me. I have three nephews in France who are fighting for their country, some how I want to live to see my boys get back home, but I fear I shall never see them again in I know Jim will be so lonely when I am gone, no the flesh. woman has ever had a better husband than I and it nearly breaks my heart to leave him, but I am ready to say "Lord, Thy will be done." She returned to Whiteville and I did not see her again till the day of her death. She left the boys in France a message and said: "They will know how auntie felt about them." I shall never forget the little talk in my study, while her husband was oiling his car preparatory to returning home. She did not seem to be facing death, but rather a journey to a delightful land. Hers was a brave and noble life. Her husband was called home from the session of the last conference in Goldsboro on account of a sudden attack; from then until the end came she suffered greatly, but with it all was patient and at times cheerful. Her only living sister, though feeble in health, was with her when the end came.

MRS. IVER ELLIS CADE

The ranks of North Carolina Womanhood were greatly weakened when Mrs. Iva Ellis Cade fell asleep in death last summer. The call came so suddenly that her best friends are scarcely able to realize that she is gone. The following will serve as a chronicle of the thirty years of her earthly life.

Iver Ellis was born in Durham, July 15, 1889. She attended the city schools, and in 1909 graduated with honors from Trinity College. For the next three years she taught in the public schools of Durham and Pender counties. On October 14, 1914, she was married to Rev. William A. Cade of the North Carolina Conference. In this new relation she went with her husband who was sent as Junior preacher to Centenary Church. New Bern. After this she served with him for two years at Riverside and Bridgeton; then two years at Edenton, and into the midst of this year at Rocky Mount. She died of tonsilitis on August 2, 1919, after an illness of only one week.

In early childhood she joined old Main Street Church, in Durham, and became one of its most devoted members. Especially she brought her consecrated intelligence to the work of

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the Sunday School and Epworth League. Later on in the larger circles of the North Carolina Conference she was a well known and trusted leader in the Epworth League, having been one of the officers ever since its organization in this conference.

In her home life she was finer still. There were two little children to call her mother. William Albert, Jr., who was born July 22, 1915, and Alma Louise, who came on October 24, 1916. She nurtured and trained these babies with a skill that is rarely found in these times. Their home was a little heaven upon earth. The blow has fallen very heavily upon her husband who is left with the load of the pastorate and the little ones on his hands. Her only sister, Mrs. Frank Green, of Durham, shares with him the unexpected sorrow. For the nearly five years of their married life Mrs. Cade regarded the pastorate as a joint ministry with her husband. He testifies that in all their experience of poverty and hard work she never uttered any save words of cheer and encouragement.

Hers was a most excellent Christian character. She had the sweet grace of her mother, who was herself the gentlest of good women, and who left us only a year before her daughter went. In Mrs. Cade were seen the finest products of the Christian Home, the Christian College and the Christian Church blending in a mature womanhood. Having received much from these three institutions, she gave back to them without stint her loyalty and devotion. Her life should be a lasting inspiration to the young women of the church, and especially of the League. These young people will not soon forget her spirit of cheerfulness and service as it was manifested in her leadership in all wholesome recreation and religious work.

She was so young to go. We had thought she would have been with us for a long time to bring to full fruitage what her life had so richly promised; and it seemed that she could not be spared. After all, though, our lives and our worth are not measured by the number of years we spend on earth. Iver Ellis Cade lived more in thirty years than many women have in seventy; and she, being dead, yet speaketh.

They placed her body in the cemetery at Durham, where her father and mother and grandparents were buried. The dust of summer and the snows of winter shall fall there until time grows old and the end shall come, and our Lord will tell us why these things should be. Until that hour may grace, mercy and peace from God, the Father, God, the Son and God, the Holy Ghost abide with those who wait and sorrow.

MRS. SUSIE SOUTHERLAND LEE

The subject of this memoir, Mrs. Susie Sutherland Lee, wife of Rev. T. W. Lee, one of the younger members of the North Carolina Conference, was born in Kenansville, N. C., December 19, 1889, and died of influenza-pneumonia in Mayesville, N. C., October 10, 1918.

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Mrs. Lee grew up in the Presbyterian Church, having joined that church on confession of faith in early childhood, and in its enriching fellowship she might have spent all of her life but for the one event that means everything to a genuine, highsouled woman; she fell in love, and the object of her affection, in the providence of God, proved to be a young Methodist preacher, just out of college who had come to take up the responsibilities of an itinerant on the Kenansville circuit, in the bounds of which she lived. Love called to her, and like Rebecca of old, she said, "I will go," and on October the 14, 1914, she plighted her troth to her young preacher-husband giving her hand and heart to share with him the joys and sorrows, the victories and the defeats of an itinerant's life. She immediately joined her husband's Church, as the proper thing for a loyal wife to do, and to the hour of her lamented death she continued a devout, earnest Christian, having laid her life, and all the possibilities of it in love's name, a living sacrifice on the Methodist altar.

Hand in hand the husband and his devoted young wife turned their faces with eagerness toward the great tasks, the high and holy ministries to which they believed that God had called them, and in the joy and radiance of love's young dream they saw the enchanted paths of service stretching away through the vista of the lengthening years even down to old age, the hush of the twilight, and life's calm evening crowned at last with the benediction of God: "Well done, thou good and faithful servants, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

But alas for the phantom of human hope, and the dreams of youth that never come true! Only for a little while, only for a few miles of the mortal journey, did this beautiful spirit walk by the side of God's young prophet, cheering him, comforting him, inspiring him to do his best. Their young lives have scarcely fused in the pure white flame of love's holy passion, and the orange blossoms of the bridal wreath have barely wilted under the touch of time before the hands that clasped so lovingly at the bridal altar are wrenched asunder at the open grave. In the awful scourge of influenza that swept the state and nation in 1918 she fell its victim, and all life's tasks were done.

To us who see so dimly and with such blurred vision, her life work had just begun; but surely God never blunders, and faith and sweet submission must leave it all to Him.

The glory of motherhood had crowned her young life, and she left a sweet little babe eight months old. love's supreme gift, in whose pure prattling presence the lonely husband may live over again the few brief years of wedded bliss, and find in its holy companionship a bond and a voice that will make the past more than a memory.

One who knew Mrs. Lee well pays her this beautiful tribute: "Our community suffered an irreparable loss in her death. Hers was a bright, cheerful disposition, carrying sunshine and happiness with her always. Her heart and home were ever open to all who came to her for comfort and counsel; all given so gently and so modestly. Her influence over the young was marvellous. Both old and young loved and appreciated her. She was never

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too busy (though she was never idle) to help others. She was the most devoted and happy wife and mother I ever knew. Her great ambition was to see and help her preacher-husband grow and develop in his noble work."

Love would have kept her longer, and why the dear Lord called her so early, with the dew of youth still upon her, and with her work seemingly not half done, and from the little parsonage home where she reigned with such queenly grace, and of which she was the light and joy, we may not now inquire. Perhaps he needed her for some larger task in some fairer world. And so we will think of her as still living, still loving, still learning, still busy. until earth's shadows lift and we shall know even as we are known.

ADDENDUM TO REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF TRINITY COLLEGE

In view of the discussion now carried on for some time concerning an earlier date for the meeting of the North Carolina Conference and in view of the increasing difficulties in the way of getting entertainment for the Conference, and since in this connection Trinity College has come to the minds of at least some members of the Conference, it seems in order for to speak a word in behalf of the College.

If the Conference now or later should decide upon an earlier date for its annual sessions and should find the difficulties in the time-honored method of entertainment become too great, then Trinity College will gladly make available its whole plant and resources for such uses as the Conference might wish. The College could easily accommodate the Conference, but the meeting of the Conference would of course have to be held before the opening of college.

This postscript to the report of the Board of Trustees of Trinity College is not intended as an official communication and was not written with a view to influencing the mind of the Conference on this important subject, but merely to say that the College is anxious to serve the Conference in this as in every other way when its services may be needed.

REPORT No. 1-BOARD OF MISSIONS

The Board of Missions suggests to the Conference the following policy for the next five years:

First: That Mission charges be classified according to the probable time in which they will become self-sustaining.

Class "A." Those charges that may become self-sustaining in two years.

Those charges that may become self-sustaining in Class "B." four years.

Class "C." Those charges that may become self-sustaining in six years.

Class "D." Those charges that are likely to remain dependent on the Board for an indefinite time.

Second (A.) In the expenditure of money the Board shall use the money secured by assessments on the Conference and the Duke fund in making the regular apportionment to charges already established. This is not to be interpreted as prohibiting the use of unused money that might remain in the fund in the establishment of new work should such work become necessary.

Second (B.) In the use of the Centenary fund, which is 10 10% of the total amount of Centenary money paid by this Conference to the Joint Centenary Commission, we suggest the following division:

First: That 10,000 of the first year's payment be placed in a reserve fund. This reserve fund is to enable the Board of Missions to pay preachers on Mission Charges without recourse to borrowing. This will make the Mission Board solvent.

Second: That 50% of the balance after the \$10,000 is subtracted shall be used to enterprise new Mission work and as an emergency and conditional appropriation fund.

NOTE:—By emergency appropriation we mean that a certain amount shall be put in the hands of the Executive Committee of the Board of Missions to make such appropriations as may be called for and recommended by the proper officials in the interim between sessions of the Annual Conference.

By conditional appropriation we mean an appropriation that is made to the charge upon condition that the charge raise an amount that is set by the Executive Committee of the Board of Missions.

Third: That the remaining 50% of the fund be used:

"A." To defray the expense of the Board of Missions and the office of the Missionary Secretary.

"B." To provide a fund for the Methodist Summer School at Trinity College or other educational development features that may be endorsed by the Annual Conference.

"C." To increase the appropriations in the Mission Charges already formed, when, in the judgment of the Board of Missions and the Presiding Elders, such increase is necessary.

It is suggested that the enterprising of new Mission work shall take the following lines of development:

First: That methods be introduced in the cotton mill sections for the development of the Cotton Mill Churches, and for further Mission development in the larger towns and cities.

Second: That new stress shall be placed on developing the country church.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE METHODIST MUTUAL FIRE INSURANCE COMPANY

Your Board of Directors beg leave to report that they have gone into the affairs of the Methodist Mutual Fire Insurance Company, together with the aid of a Certified Public Accountant, and after a thorough investigation have found the books of Secretary and Treasurer are in excellent condition.

There is in force at the present time \$786,714.00 of insurance covering church property and personal effects of preachers belonging to the two conferences. The past year was the best in the history of the Company. A very large increase was made in the amount of insurance in force and the assets have also very materially increased. A dividend of 20% is being returned to the policyholders on renewal policies. This dividend which represents a direct saving to the Church gives great satisfaction to the various Boards of Trustees.

Your Board recommends that each pastor be required to furnish as a part of his report to the Annual Conference such information as is necessary regarding insurance on church property, this report to be made on blanks to be furnished by the Company.

We recommend the election of M. T. Plyler as a director, his term to expire in 1924.

Your Board would urge the members of the Conference and each Board of Trustees holding property for the church within bounds of the Conference to see that such property is adequately protected in our Company.

Green Hill, and that at that meeting action be taken looking to the purchase, if circumstances allow, of Liberty Hall—the building referred to—which shall be used as a home for a superannuate of the Conference.

Be it further resolved that a Committee of three be appointed by the Bishop to investigate the situation and see what are the possibilities of purchase and other financial steps necessary and report to the next meeting of the Historical Society. Be it still further resolved that the Western North Carolina Conference be requested to join in this movement.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE METHODIST SUMMER SCHOOL

The Board of Managers of the Methodist Summer School respectfully submit the following report for the year 1919:

The Second session, June 3-13 was highly successful. A most capable faculty, with Rev. H. E. Spence as Dean, gave instruction in the undergraduate courses. Fifty-six undergraduates received nine days instruction in their respective studies. Thirty-four of these came from the Western North Carolina Conference and twentytwo from the North Carolina Conference. Ten of these passed satisfactory examinations in all their subjects; others passed in a part of their work.

In the graduate department, one hundred preachers registered. Dr. F. N. Parker, of Emory University lectured each morning on the Person and Work of Jesus Christ. Other speakers filled their places on the Program. We mention a few of them.

Dr. Charles L. Goodell, of New York spoke on the "Heralds of a Passion" and Dr. Harris Elliott Kirk, of Baltimore presented Isaiah's Message to the Modern Man. Dr. George Albert Coe, of Union Theological Seminary, N. Y., dealt with his specialty, religious Education. Rev. Thurston B. Price discussed evangelistic methods, and Dr. W. P. Few was heard in public addresses.

Larger plans are being laid for the next term, June 9-18, 1920. Two new courses in Sunday School work and one in the rural church are to be offered and the presence of laymen and laywomen is to be sought. Talent of national and international note is to be secured and all courses are to be free to all.

To continue the work, we are asking that the same financial support as given in the past be continued by the Conferences. Could the Sunday School Boards contribute something to aid in the work to be done in forwarding the Sunday Schools, the money would be well spent.

We would remind the Boards of Education and the Boards of Missions of each Conference that the terms of four of the Managers expire this year, viz: H. M. North and W. W. Peele, of the North Carolina Conference, and G. T. Rowe and C. H. Ireland, of the Western North Carolina Conference. According to the plan of organization, the respective Boards nominate and the conference elects the nominees for filling all vacancies in the Board of Managers. That the entire ministry may be free to share in the benefits of the coming session, we respectfully suggest and ask the Conference to urge that the Presiding Elders encourage their preachers to arrange supplies, or to suspend services on the Second Sunday in June, that they may attend the school next year.

SPIRITUAL LIFE OF THE CHURCH

It is a fact most evident to every student of human affairs that a period of transition is a time fraught with many perils to the spiritual welfare of men. Old restraints are loosened, and the powers of sin that rule unregenerate hearts have new opportunities to assert themselves outwardly. Religion oftentimes takes on a worldly form, and the great matter of salvation from sin degenerates into formality and a program of human activities.

That we are in the throes of such a period is manifest by the materialism of our day and the attendant economic and social unrest; by the tides of godlessness in our so-called Christian land; by many strange and unevangelical doctrines appearing on every side; and by worldliness in the Church of God. These conditions lay upon the Christian ministry a weighty responsibility and challenge us in no uncertain terms to give full proof of our apostolic ministry.

We, the members of the Cabinet, being agreed among ourselves, call upon our brethren of the North Carolina Conference to join with us in the following:

First: That we, during the Conference session, keep before ourselves the God-imposed responsibility that rests upon us as ambassadors of Christ. To the end that we may this year lead men to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ we will give ourselves to private and public prayer that the Holy Spirit may make manifest to us the wonderful grace of Christ, and that our whole Conference may be charged with His Pentecostal power.

Second: That we make a solemn resolve before God that we will be more earnest students of His word and much given to prayer. In our public and private ministry we will be vigilant that we be not drawn into secular affairs. In love we will cry out against all forms of sin, and with all earnestness proclaim the Evangel of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Third: We recognize that there are many uplift and reform movements that are doing much to better the conditions of men, and they deserve our sympathy and commendation. Seeing, however, that these matters are being looked after by our laymen, we will not turn aside from our high calling to dissipate our energies in these interests, but we will give our whole energy and time to the ministry unto which we have been called. Fourth: While we have no interest in a campaign for church members or an evangelistic drive as such, we feel most profoundly the need of a spiritual awakening. To this end we will give ourselves through prayer and a study of the Word of God and work among our people that we may experience this year a mighty turning toward God. We will call upon our Sunday School Officers and Teachers and our godly laymen to keep to the forefront throughout the year the evangelistic appeal. We will give men and women an opportunity to accept Christ at our regular services, and at some time during the year we will hold in all our churches a revival meeting. In all of this we will give prominence to the Scriptural doctrines of sin, repentence, and salvation through Christ, seeking on all occasions to lead the unregenerate into an experimental knowledge of saving grace, and to establish all who are in our communion in Christian faith and practice.

marked success." We find great encouragement in the fact that our Superintendent has done very little this year in the way of passing the hat and yet all the needs of the institution have been amply met. The Orphanage is now caring for 241 children and we regret that this is its full capacity.

We are gratified with the growth of the endowment and would urge upon our pastors to lay this important part of our cause upon the minds and hearts of our people on every possible occasion. Nothing could put the institution upon so safe a basis as a splendid endowment.

We note with thankfulness that the plan of supporting individual orphans by Sunday Schools and organized classes and individuals, which was in such high favor last year, is even more popular this year and is gathering momentum at a rapid rate. In this connection we wish to express our appreciation to the women of our Conference for the clothing of such a large number of our children. We wish also to express our appreciation of the deep interest of the Atwater family in the Orphanage as seen in their proposal to erect at the Orphanage an Atwater Building to cost about \$50,000. We wish to express our appreciation of the bequest of \$10,000 by Mr. Z. W. Lyon, of Oxford, of the bequest of from seven to ten thousand dollars by Miss Litella Edens, of Rowland, of more than \$100,000 by Mr. Will Ormond of Green County, and of \$1,000 by Mr. A. H. Vann, of Franklinton for the beautifying of the Orphanage grounds.

We note with pleasure the offer of Mr. J. W. Ward, of Rowland, to be one of twenty-five to give \$1,000 each for the erection of a Baby Cottage or Industrial Building at the Orphanage. And since it is a recommendation of the Board of Trustees and of your committee that such a building be erected we urge the preachers to put this on the minds of our people that it may speedily materialize.

We thank God for the spiritual atmosphere at our Orphanage and for the earnest and faithful efforts put forth to save every child that enters there. We rejoice in the fact that an annual revival is held in the institution and that at the close of the last one every child there had made a profession of religion and joined the church except a few wee tots who are on probation.

We request the pastors who have not already done so to hold a Thanksgiving service on Thanksgiving or as near thereto as possible and give our people a chance to contribute to this institution.

We suggest to those who shall have in charge the next drive in the church that the Orphanages in our church be included in the askings. We feel that this is proper since this is both a Missionary and an Educational enterprise of the highest order. We note that a sister denomination in the State is including in her great drive now on \$610,000 for its Orphanage.

RECOMMENDATIONS

First: That we keep before the minds of our people the pressing need of an Industrial Building for the vocational training of our boys That when sufficient funds become available the Executive Committee shall have authority to proceed with the erection of such a building.

Second: That we admit children into our Orphanage under five years of age, provided we can secure the necessary funds for the erection of a Baby Cottage. In the event that funds should become available the Executive Committee shall have the power to build such a cottage.

Third: That the matter of publishing an Orphanage paper be left in the hands of the Executive Committee, and if they deem it expedient to publish an organ for dissemination of Orphanage news they shall have authority to establish the same.

Fourth: That either the Board of Education or the Board of Missions, preferably the Board of Education, give the Orphanage a place on their program with the privilege of having a speaker present the work of the institution.

Fifth: That the assessment equal to 10% of the pastor's salary on each charge be continued as heretofore.

We ask the confirmation of the election by the Board of Trustees of Dr. Albert Anderson as trustee in place of Q. K. Nimocks, resigned, and of the following for a term expiring in 1924:

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Your Sunday School Board submits the following report:

We wish to call once more the attention of the Conference to the need of renewed activity in the line of Sunday School endeavor. More than a year has passed since the allies emerged victorious from the fearful conflict which threatened civilization. In spite of the promise of better days, we have seen little improvement in the moral conditions of the world. Chaos and confusion still reign. Social and industrial turmoil continually threaten our land with even worse conditions than prevailed during the war. Something must be done to help remedy these conditions. It is the belief of your Board that the most effective way of meeting these difficulties and solving the problems confronting us is through a constructive policy of religious education, including all agencies that may be drafted in this great emergency. It is a recognized fact that only the ideals implanted in youth are of lasting value; that the truths learned around the fireside are most influential; and that the Sunday School is the most effective public agency for the promulgation of the ideals of the Kingdom of God. We are, therefore, especially urgent for hearty coöperation and assistance on the part of our pastors and laymen.

Our work has been greatly handicapped this year by our failure to secure an executive officer for more than half the year. We are glad to report, however, that we have at last secured an efficient man in Brother J. T. Jerome, a local preacher, and a son of Rev. C. P. Jerome of our own Conference. His report is encouraging and we hope for great things in our work in the immediate future.

We have the following recommendations to make for the ensuing year:

1. That we coöperate heartily with the General Sunday School Board in its plans for an evangelistic campaign in the Sunday School.

2. That we promote and maintain a closer district organization and provide adequate financial provision for the same.

3. That the Executive Committee be empowered to secure the assistance of an elmentary worker, either for whole time or in part, if the services of a suitable person may be secured.

4. That we coöperate with the officers of the Wesley Bible Class Federation in holding a session of that body within our bounds this year.

5. That we encourage the establishing of training schools whereever practical.

6. That our Executive Committee work in coöperation with the Board of Directors of the Trinity College Summer School for preachers in putting a course in that school for training our pastors and other Sunday School workers in religious education.

7. That we invite Mr. M. W. Brabham, our former Field Secretary and now Rural Specialist of the General Sunday School Board, to make a study of one district in our Conference and report his findings and make recommendations at the next meeting of our board.

8. That we adopt the Standard Plan for Centenary Conservation and set apart December 28 as special Missionary Day in the Sunday Schools. 9. That we urge our people to attend the Junaluska Training School for Sunday School workers.

10. That we make provisions for securing statistics on Sunday School work towards the clase of the year, and arrange to make a demonstration of our work by districts and in comparison with other conferences, at the next session of our Conference.

11. That we request the North Carolina Advocate to allow the Field Secretary of each conference at least two columns each week in that paper.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SER-VICE, NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE, NOV. 20, 1919

PRACTICAL CHRISTIANITY

The practical religion of Jesus is revealed in the expression, "He went about doing good," and this was manifested no less when he drove the money changers from the Temple than when he healed the woman by the wayside. The followers of Jesus Christ must be "doers of the Word" and not hearers only. The church today is realizing more fully than ever before its position in the world, and is not satisfied to deal in theories and religious philosophy but wants to be doing something that is constantly making the world a better place in which to live. It is not only teaching in the abstract but is asserting itself in the concrete, and because of this the church is becoming more powerful for the good of man than ever before.

CAPITAL AND LABOR

In this day of strikes and strained relation between capital and labor, it behooves the church to teach clearly the doctrine of human rights and, as far as possible, bring the religion of the Lord Jesus Christ in its essence, to bear upon the settlement of all these difficulties.

MILITARISM

We deplore the fact that, since the close of the war, there seems to be a spirit of militarism abroad in the land and a call for military instruction through our schools and colleges, as well as an expensive standing army. We believe the recent war was fought for liberty and human rights and are hoping that there will be no other to follow. We believe that the "League of Nations" can be so organized and constituted that differences between nations in the future shall be settled by arbitration on the basis of justice and there will be no need to appeal to arms. Our Lord was the "Prince of Peace" rather than the king of armies.

THE NEGRO QUESTION

The negroes as a people are still a child race. Though some have made wonderful development mentally and morally since coming to America, the race is not yet capable of self-development or selfgovernment. It behooves the white man, therefore, to prove his friendship by assisting him in securing christian education and putting into practice the Golden Rule in all our dealings with him. This we are satisfied will be the most effective way to put an end to race riots.

PROFITEERING

Christianity exemplified in commercial life means a square deal to the other fellow. Men professing christianity should never be guilty of profiteering. Your committee has noted the conferences of merchants and state food commissioner held in the State and their effort to settle this question by fixing a uniform profit. Our conviction is a profit of more than forty per cent is unjust and subjects the dealer to the criticism of profiteering.

THE CIGARETTE

We believe the cigarette is an evil and that its use is injurious. The law of the State forbids its sale or gift to anyone under sixteen. Our conviction is that this law is not properly enforced. We give our endorsement to it and call on the citizens and officers to see to its enforcement.

WORLD LEAGUE AGAINST ALCOHOLISM

We wish to endorse, also, the world league against alcoholism which was organized in Washington, D. C., last June. To us it seems necessary that the liquor traffic, which antagonizes all the work of the church, will have to be destroyed in the missionary fields before our church can work to the best advantage through hospitals, schools, and churches.

LYNCHING

We again desire to put ourselves on record as opposed to mob law. God's Word calls upon us to submit ourselves to the ordinances of men; and mob law, regardless of the crime that may provoke it, is unjustifiable, rather it adds one heinous crime to another.

THE ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE

Your Board was gratified by the report of the Anti-Saloon League, brought through its superintendent. The prayer and activity of the church for the past hundred years have been rewarded by the overthrow of the liquor traffic. The Eighteenth Amendment of the

Federal Constitution changes the attitude of the government towards liquor for that of license to prohibition, and the enforcement code recently passed by Congress provides the machinery by which the law shall be executed. We are delighted that this code places the responsibility for law-enforcement on the Honorable D. C. Roper, Commissioner of Revenue, and we instruct the Secretary of this board to write to Mr. Roper and assure him of our coöperation in this work. We are glad of the part that our church has been able to take in this splendid work and we urge our people to give their united support in every possible way to the Anti-Saloon League in all of its efforts to enforce the law and help establish prohibition in the other nations of the earth. We are glad to hear that there is a probability of overthrowing the liquor traffic in some of the States of Mexico, Scotland, portions of South Africa, and some of the Scandinavian countries in the next twelve months. We give our endorsement to the work of the W. C. T. U. and like temperance organizations.

We recommend that the Conference request the Bishop to appoint Rev. R. L. Ravis Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of North Carolina, and Rev. J. Robert Moose, field Secretary of the League.

CONFERENCE FOR SOCIAL WORKERS

The Board desires to call attention to the Conference of Social Workers similar to the one held at Lake Junaluska last August which will be held at the same place next summer, and it hopes that before that time the churches and Sunday schools will give attention to the provisions of the Discipline laid down in paragraphs 113 and 320, which provide that every church and Sunday school shall have a committee on Social Service. The responsibility is placed upon the pastors and Sunday school superintendents to see that these committees are provided. It is hoped that at least the chairmen of these committees will attend the meeting at Lake Junaluska next summer, and that the church or the Sunday school, as the case may be, will defray the expenses.

We urge that our Pastors carry out the Disciplinary requirements with regard to the American Bible Society, and especially the observance of Bible Sunday at the time indicated or as near thereto as possible, informing our congregations of the splendid work accomplished by the Society and also that a special collection be taken at that time to further its work. When the people are informed they give liberally. That the proceeds of this special collection be forwarded direct to Rev. M. B. Porter at Richmond, Va. We pray God that He will bless the efforts of the Society and enable it to achieve larger success in making it possible that His Word shall be furnished to the World. Because if this world is ever saved and its kingdoms won for Christ, it must be done by the Sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God.

REPORT No. 2 OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

Your Board of Missions congratulates the Conference upon the remarkable success of the Missionary Centenary Campaign. The total amount of subscriptions is \$1,774,000.00 for the five year period. This added to the ordinary sources of Missionary income will produce \$2,540,000.00. About 75% of the first years quota has already been collected.

We pledge our support to the evangelistic campaign which is now in preparation. We urge the Conference to as loyal a support of this feature as it gave in the Campaign for the raising of money. With such a support the Conference will surely reap a wonderful harvest of souls.

We are fully conscious of the unusual responsibility that is placed upon us in the judicious spending of the vastly increased missionary money within the bounds of our Conference. We desire to avoid extravagance on one hand and hoarding on the other.

Perhaps, for the first time in the history of the Conference, the requests of the Presiding Elders for appropriations in the various districts have been met almost in full. Also for the first time a minimum salary of \$1,000 per year is provided with two exceptions and conditional appropriations have been made in these two cases which when met will give \$1,000 salary there. This does not apply to student preachers.

The Board respectfully requests the Bishop to appoint Rev. A. D. Wilcox Conference Missionary Secretary for the coming year.

M. T. Plyler and A. D. Wilcox have been appointed to meet with a Committee from the W. N. C. to study the situation at Chapel Hill and to recommend a policy for the future of our church there.

Again we desire to extend our thanks to Mr. J. B. Duke for the continued support which he is rendering to Conference Missions in the sum of \$5,000 per year.

We recommend appropriations from the Duke fund as follows: South Alamance, \$100; East Burlington. \$200; Pearl Mill and Eno, \$200; Rougemont, \$200; Kennekeet, \$300; Hemp, \$400; Roseboro, \$200; Dover, \$200; Vandemere, \$200; Pamlico, \$350; Princeton. \$400; Millbrook, \$300; Richmond, \$300; Lumberton, \$300; Rosemary, \$500; Pinetops, \$350; Kenansville, \$500.

REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD

The Epworth League Board begs leave to submit the following report:

We are glad to be able to report progress in this department of the work of our church. This is indicated in the report of our General Secretary of the organization during the past year of 327 Chapters and of our Conference Secretary of the organization of 22 Chapters. Not only is this true with reference to the organization of Chapters, but the report of the activities of the several departments of the Leagues in our Conference is encouraging, some of which we have pledged already this year for the African Special and the building program for Paine College, \$1,539.15 and raised last year for all purposes, \$4,239.69.

While this is true, we cannot, and we dare not, overlook the fact that there are many churches in our Conference in which there are no Leagues and no other organization in which our young people are being enlisted and trained for service as contemplated by the Epworth League. In view of this fact, and the contributions which the League has made and is making in supplying preachers, missionaries, and other workers trained for service in our church, and the call which is being made throughout our church just now for enlistment for life service among our young people that our full Centenary program may be made possible, it would seem clear that this great interest of our Church should receive our most careful and prayerful attention. As one means of promoting the work of the League we ask the assistance of the members of the Conference in making the survey of our field planned by the Central office and to be undertaken by your Board.

We wish to express our desire to coöperate in every possible way in promoting the Church-wide revival toward which our Church is looking, and we would respectfully urge our pastors to use their young people as far as is possible in their plans for this work.

We desire to commend the Epworth League Assembly which has been held for the past two years at Louisburg College. It is both educational and inspirational in its plan, and undertakes also to minister to as well as develop the social life of our young people by sending those who attend back to their respective congregations prepared to lead in this phase of their work. It is gratifying to be able to report an appreciable increase in the attendance at its last meeting. In this connection we would express our appreciation of the faithful work of Rev. F. S. Love, President of the Conference Epworth League, as well as that of the other Conference officers.

We recognize the fact that the use of the League literature will aid materially in promoting the work of the League. We recommend, therefore, that our pastors urge our young people to subscribe liberally to the League publications. We recommend that the Anniversary of the Epworth League be held on Saturday night of Conference week at the next session of our Annual Conference.

We desire to renew our pledge for the faithful coöperation of the Conference Epworth League Board with the Conference Epworth League, as well as with our General Secretary and the General Epworth League Board.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION, NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

The paramount task that now awaits the educational forces of our Church is the approaching campaign for funds to endow and equip our schools and colleges. It has been well said that our educational institutions are to the enterprises to the Church what the base of supplies is to the Army. Since our Church, under the providence of God, has laid out plans for the larger service for the Kingdom of God, at home and abroad, it is an imminent necessity that we so equip and endow our educational institutions that they can provide the Church with an intelligent, well-trained laity and ministry. It is our conviction that we should so equip and endow our colleges and theological schools as to make it possible for every man who is called of God to enter our ministry to secure such training of mind and heart as will enable him to become the most effective minister of Christ.

At the annual meeting of our General Board of Education in May of this year a commission was created to have direction and control of the campaign in the interest of Christian education. Bishop James Cannon, Jr., has been chosen President of the commission. The preparations for this campaign are to begin in May, 1920, and consummated by the canvass for funds in April or May, 1921. We record our most hearty approval of this timely and necessary enterprise, and we call upon our ministers and laymen to give their unqualified support as was given the Centenary Campaign for Missions.

We are happy to note the prosperity and good work of our schools and colleges. Without exception, the dormitories in all our instituions are crowded to over-flowing and are only embarrassed by lack of equipment to meet the growing needs.

TRINITY COLLEGE

The gifts to Trinity College are more important this year than for any other year in the history of the college, excepting only the year 1912 when the gifts to the college amounted to approximately one million and a half dollars. The assets of the college, including endowment and equipment are at present \$2,691,995.94. We recommend that the whole appropriation of this Conference this year be used for the running expenses of the Biblical Department, if in the discretion of the administration it be needed. If any portion of the appropriation should be left, the same shall be applied to the Foundation Fund of the Biblical Department. We recommend the confirmation of the following trustees: Rev. H. M. North, Mr. W. E. Springer, and Rev. J. C. Wooten.

GREENSBORD COLLEGE FOR WOMEN

We are glad to note the continued prosperity and widening influence of Greensboro College for Women. We express our appreciation of the donations to the College during the year, including the promise of \$100,000.00 by Mr. J. A. Odell of Greensboro, for an auditorium and conservatory of music, to be built in memory of his wife. Mrs. Mary J. Odell. Your Board recommends that we confirm the election of Mr. E. A. Poe as trustee, representing the North Carolina Conference.

LOUISBURG COLLEGE

The report of the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College gives evidence of its effective service to the Church. The crowded condition of the school renders a new dormitory necessary. We recommend the confirmation of the following trustees: Rev. A. D. Wilcox, Mr. C. S. Wallace and Mr. Felix Harvey to succeed themselves.

CAROLINA COLLEGE

Carolina College is one of our younger institutions, and we express our joy over its growth. We record our sorrow over the death of two of our faithful trustees, Mr. J. W. Carter, and Mr. William W. Ormond. We also express our appreciation of their service and benefactions. Your Board recommends the confirmation of the following trustees: For term expiring 1925, Rev. J. E. Underwood, Rev. G. T. Adams, Mr. B. B. Adams, Mr. A. E. White, Dr. J. H. Judd, Rev. J. D. Bundy and Rev. H. M. North, for term expiring 1923; F. W. Carter in place of J. W. Carter, deceased.

LITTLETON COLLEGE

Littleton College has for many years rendered good service to the Church, and we report with sorrow its destruction by fire and its consequent discontinuance.

SUMMER SCHOOL

The Summer School held this year at Trinity College under the auspices of the Western North Carolina and the North Carolina conferences proved beyond doubt its value as a permanent institution. We give to the school our unqualified endorsement, and nominate Rev. W. W. Peele and Rev. H. M. North to succeed themselves as members of the Board of Managers.

TRINITY PARK SCHOOL

We are glad to note the prosperity and efficient service of Trinity Park School. We recommend that the apportionment to the School be applied as last year, viz.: for the payment of tuition of ministers' sons and candidates for the ministry, and remainder, if any, to be used at the discretion of the faculty for loans to worthy students, or for running expenses, or both.

We nominate C. J. Harrell to represent our Board at the annual meeting of the Educational Association of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

We nominate the following as an *ad interim* committee of our Board to take up during the year such matters with the Educational Campaign Commission as may require attention: Rev. H. M. North, Col. J. F. Bruton, Prof. R. L. Flowers, Rev. M. Bradshaw, and Rev. W. W. Peele.

We are setting aside each year a part of our regular funds for this cause, and will bend all our energies this year to increase our present fund to the amount named above. And we most earnestly ask all our pastors to take an hour to set this cause in its deserved light before our folks.

We wish again to warn our folks against tying up their property in Building and Loan Associations and then coming to borrow of us. as we lend on first mortgage. Rev. E. H. McWhorter was elected to confer with the Board of Missions, and representatives of the Board of Church Extension of the Western Conference, in regard to building an adequate church at Chapel Hill.

REPORT OF BOARD ON LAY ACTIVITIES

Your Board on Lay Activities begs leave to offer some suggestions as to specific ways by which, it is hoped, the coördination and massing of all our forces achieved in the great Centenary undertaking may be made permanent, and by which our laymen may become more useful to the Church and the causes of the Kingdom of God.

First of all, to be useful in the Church they must be "Men of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom." and more attention should be paid to family religion and family worship, especially as it is adapted to children. Our laymen should hold themselves and their money in stewardship to the Master. That not only means the tenth of their income, but of their time.

All our laymen are urged to do their full share in the coming evangelistic concentration that the Church is planning for. To this end let them do their best to increase church attendance and let them aid the pastors by holding services in churches that have insufficient preaching services.

Working for the North, Carolina Christian Advocate is a good field for a layman's service and in spreading good reading in general, especially for the young. Through committees on Social Service and organized Sunday school classes the laymen ought to relieve the pastors of community and welfare work.

The Sunday school is the best organized arm of the Church and offers now even more than ever a golden opportunity for those who would build soundness into the characters of the oncoming generations. Especial efforts should be made this year to raise pastors' salaries wherever this can be done.

We ask our laymen to follow the leadership of the preachers; we ask the preachers to seek all possible ways to train and use the laymen, and we ask the presiding elders in their quarterly conference rounds to map our specific tasks for laymen to undertake.

We recommend Mr. Y. T. Ormond for reëlection as Conference Lay Leader.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Having prayerfully and diligently considered the important interests committed unto us as your Board of Christian Literature, we report as follows: It is pleasing to note that our equipment in this department of our work is becoming more adequate and efficient. Certainly the demands upon us, for evident reasons, are greater and more serious than ever lefore, and we earnestly emphasize the necessity of a more thorough circulation of Chritian Literature among all our membership. This is especially essential, if we would prevent our young people from being dangerously hurt by improper impression from print and picture, and so influence and inform them as that they shall be readily available for life-service in the Church; if we would qualify our official members for loyalty and progressiveness. We, therefore, request our pastors carefully to study this situation and zealously to suit their best efforts to supplying it most fully, feeling it imperative that such investment of thought, time, and toil be made.

North Carolina Christian Advocate. This, our consolidated paper. is now six months old, and furnishes an encouraging account of itself. The joint Board of Publication is working harmoniously and effectively, and we sanguinely hope that we shall find it fortunate that we have combined our resources with those of the Western North Carolina Conference. With 5,000 additional subscribers for the year, we infer that the new subscription of \$2.00 is in no considerable measure preventive of progress. Though we sensitively share in the general disappointment of not having an enlarged and otherwise improved paper, we not only heartily commend the editors for their energy, enterprise, and efficiency, but also sincerely assure them that they may ever expect the members of this Conference cheerfully and constantly to coöperate with them in preparing a periodical in the safest sense worthy of our Methodism, and in placing the same in our constituency's every abode. Therefore, to aid in promoting and performing these consecrated purposes, we urgently recommend-

1. That every pastor, early in the approaching year, put on and push to the finish a thoroughly organized every-home drive, taking his allotment as a minimum, and simultaneously soliciting renewals.

2. That our laity be frequently reminded to patronize our Advocate Job Printing Department.

3. That the accumulation of a sufficiently substantial endowment be encouraged privately and publicly.

4. That the pastors and presiding elders, during the year, seek to secure twenty-five hundred new subscribers, to be apportioned to districts, as follows:

And that the apportionment of these figures to the pastoral charges be made by the Presiding Elders, assisted by the District Stewards.

Having had before us the report of the Methodist Board of Publication, Incorporated, with charter of said corporation and contract entered into between the Board of Publication of the North Carolina Conference and the Board of Publication of the Western North Carolina Conference attached, we recommend that this contract be rewritten so as to acknowledge the agreement by the North Carolina Conference Board of Publication to pay in money into the common fund of the Methodist Board of Publication, Inscorporated, a total of \$18,449.96, as having been met in full.

Having been informed that Bishop Darlington, by request, appointed, in the Western North Carolina Conference a Commissioner to confer with the Board of Publication, Inc., and a similar Commissioner from the North Carolina Conference, we, therefore, recommend that the Bishop appoint such Commissioner.

Other publications. We believe all our literature, whether in the interest of Church, Sunday school, or Missions, to be as good as the best, and that it is deserving of more liberal and loyal use.

The Christian Advocate, The Methodist Review, The Voice, and The Epworth Era are all superior periodicals, and their circulation ought to be so largely increased that their publication would be without financial loss.

The whole church has good reason gratefully to rejoice in the continued prosperity of our publishing house, as the most recent statement of gains is truly gratifying.

We request that Bishop Darlington appoint as Editor of *The Christian Advocate*, T. N. Ivey, and as Editor of the North Carolina *Christian Advocate*, L. S. Massey.
