Sunday School Board:

The report of the Sunday School Board was presented and read by T. M. Grant, and the report was adopted. The report is as follows:

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Your Sunday School Board begs leave to submit the following report:

The Christian nurture and training of childhood and youth, we,

with our College of Bishops, accept as the first and greatest obligation imposed by the Master in His commission to the early disciples, and we hold that the Christian church does her work effectively in proportion to her faithfulness in her discharge of this obligation, which is just as binding upon us today as it was upon the early disciples.

We rejoice in the report of our Conference Superintendent of Sunday School Work that there has been general advancement in our Sunday School program and believe that more and more of our people are coming to regard the Sunday School as a real school, even a school of religion, and are finding in it a challenge for the best there is in us all.

We have recognized and tried to meet, in a measure at least, the need for trained workers and during the past year have held eighteen training schools (six standard and twelve non-standard) with an aggregate enrollment of 1,675, or practically one-fourth of the working force of all our Sunday Schools. All lines of Sunday School endeavor have been fostered and promoted.

Indicative of the growth and effectiveness of our Sunday School work we call attention to the fact that during the past quadrennium there has been an increase of over 10,000 in our Sunday School enrollment and 12,616 Sunday School pupils have been added to our church membership.

In order that we may continue to go forward during the coming year we recommend:

- 1. That we hold a standard training school in every district and a non-standard school in every community or circuit, where possible.
- 2. That part of all Sunday School Day receipts be set aside for expenditure in the district from which they come.
- 3. That we approve and recommend the observance of Children's Week in as many of our churches as practicable.
- 4. That a conference-wide Sunday School Conference be held, if practicable.
- 5. That rural schools be held in co-operation with the Mission Board.
- 6. That we go on record as favoring week-day religious instruction properly correlated with the work done in the Sunday School on Sunday.
- 7. That we urge building committees having in hand the building of additional or new equipment, to study carefully the religious needs of boys and girls, men and women, to the end that remodeling or new building be done in accordance with the requirements of our denomination.

- 8. That we urge the standardization of Sunday Schools and departments and that all our Sunday Schools use the Programs of Work outlined by the General Sunday School Board.
- That we approve the four-times-a-year circuit institute and recommend that it be used by all our circuits as a splendid means of cultivating our rural work.
- 10. That we express to Trinity College our appreciation for the use of office space now being used and for the loan of various members of the faculty for work in our standard training schools.
- 11. That we again co-operate with the Board of Managers of the Trinity College Summer School for Preachers in an attempt to provide credit courses for Sunday School workers.
- 12. That we heartily approve the Junaluska Training School for Leaders and urge our Sunday Schools, wherever possible, to send at least one representative to it next summer.

We are glad to report that we have been able to secure the services of Mr. L. L. Gobbel as Conference Superintendent of Sunday School Work and of Miss Georgia S. Keene as Elementary Superintendent for the coming year. We appreciate heartily the cooperation which the Conference gave them last year, and we bespeak for them the same hearty co-operation the coming year.

Salary of Conference S. S. Superintendent fixed at \$2700. Salary of Conference S. S. Elementary worker fixed at \$1200.

Methodist Summer School:

M. T. Plyler presented, and the Secretary read, the report of the Board of Managers of the Methodist Summer School. The report is as follows:

METHODIST SUMMER SCHOOL

The fifth session of the Methodist Summer School at Trinity College, June 7-16, proved to be the best yet held. The attendance went some 20 per cent beyond the previous session and the class of work done was far better for the entire period. This session was more a school in the class of work done.

Number of men taking undergraduate work: North Carolina Conference, 14; Western North Carolina Conference, 31; total, 45.

Number of credits received by courses: North Carolina Conference, 98; Western North Carolina Conference, 236; total, 334.

Organization and Administration of Sunday School Work by Professor Spence (12 lessons) and Principles of Religious Training by Professor Holton (12 lessons) were taken by 78 men; 24 received credits.

Professor Alva W. Taylor gave two courses a day, dealing with the country church. For this work, 30 received credit.

Dean Charles R. Brown, Yale Uuniversity; Dr. W. H. Morgan, Baltimore; Bishop H. M. Dubose and Dr. Alva W. Taylor were heard in pulpit and on platform.

Dr. W. I. Cranford met a large class each day and led them in their thinking.

The five years in which the Methodist Summer School has been at work have been years of preparation for still larger service. The effort to enlarge the scope of work from year to year has proven the value of this expanding effort. The coming year should go beyond all others. To this end the co-operation of all is urged.

Upon motion the Secretary was given authority to edit all papers presented to the Conference for publication in the Minutes.

Resolutions Tabled:

E. C. Sell offered resolutions relative to the time of holding the Annual Conference, and the same was laid on the table.

T. N. Ivey in Chair:

At the request of Bishop Denny, T. N. Ivey took the chair, and presided through the remainder of the morning session.

Gift to Louisburg College:

A. J. Parker announced a gift of \$10,000 to Louisburg College from Mr. R. H. Wright, of Durham. It was ordered that the thanks of the Conference be conveyed to Mr. Wright for the gift.

Substitution:

On motion it was ordered that J. H. Bridgers be substituted for J. A. Rooker on the new Board of Finance.

Visitor Introduced:

Dr. J. W. Perry, one of the secretaries of the Home Department of the Board of Missions, was introduced, and he addressed the Conference on the work represented by him.

Temperance and Social Service:

The report of the Board of Temperance and Social Service was presented and read by R. L. Davis, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

We believe the church must interpret the Bible to the State and Society in the matter of every day life; that Social Service means that the church should take a hand in solving the present day problems, touching the moral life and Christian character of the people. The tobacco habit, gambling, Sabbath observance, the teaching of the Bible in the schools, the divorce evil, reverence for law and enforcement of law are subjects that cannot be rightly solve: apart from the influence of the church and the proper interpretation of the word. The church should declare itself on all debatable questions that involve morality and Christianity.

The Bible in the Public Schools

We emphasize our statement of twelve months ago, that the safety of the home, the stability of our government and the hope of our civilization are dependent upon the truths found in the Bible, and that it is for the best interest of the home, of the church, and of the state that our children know its teaching. We urge the Christian teachers, superintendents and others in authority to make a place for this Book of books in the schools. We petition the Legislature to make a law that shall at least require the reading of the Bible in the school, and we request the County Superintendents of Public Instruction and the school committees to employ as teachers persons who have faith in the divinity of Jesus Christ and the divine origin of man.

North Carolina Social Service Conference

We endorse the program of the Social Service Conference of North Carolina to bring together from all parts of the state a citizens' committee of one hundred to consider prison conditions and ask for legislation to remedy any defects they may find.

Public Welfare.

Resolved, That the Conference is in earnest sympathy with the efforts of the superintendents of public welfare and juvenile courts looking to the better care of the neglected, dependent and delinquent children of the state. The committee requests that Conference grant Mrs. Clarence Johnson, the Commissioner of Public Welfare, a few minutes to represent this work.

The Cigarette Evil

This board emphasizes the law of this state prohibiting the selling or giving of cigarettes to minors under sixteen years of age. It urges the ministers to call attention to this law, its flagrant violation and the indifference of the officers to enforce it.

Gambling

We warn our people against this insidious evil. Many people do not discriminate between gambling and barter. In our judgment, gambling is betting on skill, ability, judgment or chance of a man, animal or thing, without a purpose to give compensation for the thing received. Betting on baseball, horse races, skill at cards, football and the like are contrary to the spirit of Christianity. The buying or selling of "contracts" in cotton, corn, wheat, bacon, sugar and such like is another and very insidious form. The state law, as given in Consolidated Statutes, Section 2142 and Section 2144 prohibits this form. Under the law no man has a right to buy the contract, unless he purposes to use in his business the cotton, wheat, or the article named. It is a matter of business for the cotton factory to go on the market and supply itself with cotton for the year that

is ahead and the same is true of other businesses, but it is gambling for the other fellow, whose only purpose is to bet on the contract, to buy and sell any such futures, who never expects to receive or deliver the article. We advise our preachers and leading laymen to read Chapter 39 on "gaming contracts and futures" in Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina, pages 620-622.

Sabbath Observance

The wide open Sunday advocates must be defeated or soon our Sabbath as a day of worship, meditation and prayer will be gone. We oppose the playing of baseball, golf, and like games on that day. We fear the automobile used on Sunday is often an agency for evil rather than a means of good. The tendency to commercialize the Sabbath, making it a day of traffic, travel, business and pleasure is wrong and we want to sound a word of alarm and call our people to God's way of observance: "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy. Six days shalt thou labor and do all thy work."

The Divorce Evil

The levity with which the state law and the courts treat the matter of divorce is to be deplored. It is so easy under state laws for a man or a woman to secure a divorce that some people have forgotten that in all instances but one it is wrong, sinful and adulterous. We urge our lawmakers to consider this growing evil. The committee believes that the divorce laws should be national, rather than state laws, in order that the same law may obtain in all the states.

Prohibition and the Eighteenth Amendment

Mr. Josephus Daniels says: "All government in a republic rests upon obedience to law. Disregard for law tears down the very basis of free government. It is gratifying that most citizens whether they approve of prohibition or not are observing the prohibition law. Disregard for law is the foundation of anarchy."

Mr. Williams Jennings Bryan says: "The violator of law is a respector of no statutes; it is a short step from running a still to robbing a bank. Experience shows that the professional bootlegger is at heart a MURDERER—he will kill whenever it is necessary for the carrying on of his business. A man who hardens himself to the point of taking human life will not hesitate to commit any other crime."

Attorney General Daugherty says: "As a citizen cannot choose what laws he will obey, so likewise those charged with law enforcement CANNOT CHOOSE what laws they will enforce. Those

charged with law enforcement must enforce all, the laws and all good citizens must obey all the laws. Neither can exercise any right of choice in this matter without placing themselves above the law."

The Anti-Saloon League and Recommendations

The board was glad to learn through the Superintendent of the N. C. Anti-Saloon League of the success attending their efforts and labors through the year. The recent primaries and election make it clear that the drys have gained three United States Senators—two in Pennsylvania, one in Nebraska and one in Ohio, and lost one in New Jersey; that the House of Representatives remains practically the same; and that therefore in spite of the bold statements of the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment wine and beer will not come back by the action of the next Congress.

The Superintendent further reports great progress in the state, ten or twelve counties where law enforcement was made an issue have elected dry sheriffs and other officers, and that a majority of the Legislature favor harmonizing the state law with the Federal law, which legislation this Conference has requested for three years. We recommend that the Conference request the Bishop to appoint R. L. Davis Superintendent of the North Carolina Anti-Saloon League for another year, and that the Conference appoint Prof. R. L. Flowers and Dr. W. B. North members of the Board of Trustees.

Mrs. Clarance Johnson, of the State Board of Charities and Public Welfare, was introduced and she addressed the Conference.

Conference Journals:

E. H. McWhorter offered a resolution providing for a wider distribution of the Conference Journals. After some discussion further consideration of the paper was postponed for the time being.

Orphanage:

W. H. Brown presented and read the report of the Orphanage Committee. T. B. Eldridge, of Raleigh, and A. S. Barnes spoke to the report. The report was adopted, and it is as follows:

METHODIST ORPHANAGE

We, your Orphanage Committee, feel that our Orphanage at Raleigh is doing one of the greatest works that is being done in Methodism in the North Carolina Conference. Its efforts along spiritual lines seem to be superior to those of almost any other institution. It holds an annual revival, at which this year every unchurched child in the Orphanage was converted and ,connected with the church. It has a splendid Sunday School and Epworth League, the latter being run entirely by the children.

We note with pleasure that the singing class, which goes out, not to collect money, but to entertain and enlighten the people as to our work, has made a distinct contribution to the Orphanage wherever it has gone. We would suggest that more of our preachers ask for its appearance in their churches.

We are glad to note that we have a fine eleven grade school whose graduates enter readily into any of our colleges, and that twenty-five of them are now students in our colleges.

The financial support for the past year has not been so good as formerly, which we regret very much, since provision must be made every day for 250 children. We therefore urge that our pastors put before our Sunday Schools and organized classes the needs of these children and ask them to support them as best they can.

We highly commend the Woman's Missionary Societies for the generous support they have given the institution.

We would call to the attention of our people who might be thinking of establishing some memorial to some one or some cause that they could not do better than erect at the Orphanage a memorial building.

We would suggest that our pastors keep before the people the splendid opportunity they have in this institution of placing their property through their wills where it will do the greatest possible good.

We note with pleasure the building program contemplated by the trustees as soon as funds are available which looks to the caring for of 500 children. This program calls for two dormitories, an industrial building, a baby cottage, a kitchin and dining hall.

For the information of the brethren we would say that the large gift made by Mr. S. C. Vann two years ago is not available for this building program, but is subject to the direction of the donor.

We recommend that the assessment equal to ten per cent of the pastor's salary on each charge be continued as heretofore.

We recommend that our pastors strive for a Thanksgiving offer-

ing for our Orphanage from every congregation and from every Sunday School.

Again we wish to express our appreciation of Brother A. S. Barnes as Superintendent, and recommend that he be reappointed for the ensuing year at the same salary, \$3600.

We ask the confirmation of Mr. J. L. Borden as trustee to take the place of Judge W. R. Allen, deceased.

We earnestly request that the Conference give the Orphanage Committee one-half the time on the evening of the Sunday School Board's Anniversary to demonstrate to the Conference the work of the Orphanage.

T. G. Vickers conveyed to the Conference fraternal greetings from the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church recently held in Henderson, N. C. On motion it was ordered that the Secretary make suitable response.

Church Property:

J. T. Stanford presented and read the report of the Committee on Church Property, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY

This is an age of great material development. Especially is this true in erecting church buildings. We hold property valued at more than five million dollars. A large part of this property is not insured. We urge the trustees to insure all church property. period in the world's history has humanity ever witnessed before such an advancement in road building. Many thousands of miles of good roads have been built or are now under construction. This means that it will be possible for the church attendance to be as good in the country in the winter as in summer.

We recommend that our country church buildings be made comfortable in winter as in summer, and thereby assist in doubling our attendance at church and Sunday School.

Most of our church buildings are of the one room type. It is impossible for us to do the best work, so long as this type of church

We therefore recommend that the proper authorities lay more

stress on Sunday School equipment, especially in providing more Sunday school rooms. Your Committee again calls your attention to the neglect of your church grounds. A church lot ought to be a thing of beauty and a joy forever. A great many churches have a rubbish heap in the back of the church. We do not think that this is well pleasing in God's sight. We recommend a church cleaning wherever needed and we know that it is needed at many places.

We, the Committee, recommend that this report or a copy be sent to the North Carolina Christian Advocate for publication, so that many thousands may read and act upon the suggestion.

The report of the Board of Lay Activities was presented and read by I. C. Wright. The report was adopted and is as follows:

REPORT OF LAY ACTIVITIES

We rejoice at the enlarged recognition of the laymen's movement as evidenced by the discipline and pledge ourselves to renewed activity, and suggest:

- 1. That the District and associate lay leaders seek and organize volunteer lay workers to cover the different districts.
- 2. That the District meetings be organized before Christmas according to the discipline.
- 3. That we offer our assistance in organizing the weaker places financially, with formation of budgets, every member canvasses, and before the end of the year that we assist in securing full payment of pledges.
- 4. That with the co-operation of our preachers we canvass all the high school graduates this spring and endeavor to have them all go to college.

Gifts to Trinity College:

W. A. Stanbury presented and read the following resolutions, and they were adopted:

Whereas, Messrs, J. B. and B. N. Duke have for many years taken and manifested a deep interest in the welfare of Trinity College, and

Whereas, Mr. J. B. Duke has added to his former gifts large donations in recent weeks, and

Whereas, he has shown complete unselfishness in these donations and has made his full confidence in the administration of the college evident, and

Whereas in these recent donations he has included one of \$50,000 to be applied to the erection of a building for the School of Religious Training when the alumni and other friends of the college shall have raised a like sum:

Therefore be it resolved:

That in addition to our purpose as a conference to do our full part in raising the second \$50,000 of this sum, we extend to Mr. J. B. Duke our most earnest and hearty appreciation, not for this gift only but for all interest and confidence hitherto manifested by him in Trinity College; and to Mr. B. N. Duke our thanks for his great material aid to the college, and for his constant and long-standing thoughtfulness for her prosperity.

Resolved further:

That the secretary of this conference be instructed to send to ${\rm Mr.~J.}$ B. Duke and to ${\rm Mr.~B.~N.}$ Duke a copy of this resolution.

W. W. Peele, W. A. Stanbury, John F. Bruton.

Education:

W. A. Stanbury presented and read the report of the Board of Education, which, after being amended was adopted. The report as amended is as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

We believe that emphasis could be laid on nothing which would get nearer to the sources of life than the Christian Education Movement. It has served to awaken the consciences of our people and has intensified not their interest in education only, but specifically in that type of education known as Christian. The importance of this type of education is fundamentally far-reaching, different from any merely secular and technical training and needs to be preached from our pulpits, published in our literature, taught in our institutions and followed universally by the great rank and file of our people.

We pledge our Conference to the hearty and earnest support of the plans of the General Conference and Board of Education in carrying on the Christian Education Movement. Also, we pledge ourselves to a belief that there ought to be a complete program of moral and religious training in the primary and high school grades of the public schools, and that there ought to be provided optional courses in religious and moral subjects to be offered in the state colleges and in the State University. As a committee to make a study of this subject and to report at the next annual Conference, we nominate H. M. North, H. E. Myers and W. A. Graham.

Trinity College

There is no Methodist in the State of North Carolina who ought not to take pride in and be thankful for the progress of Trinity College. Each year marks a hitherto unparalleled advance in the power and usefulness of this institution. There are now enrolled in the college 906 students, and this takes no account of 306 students enrolled during the summer term, all of whom took regular college work. Trinity Park School has been discontinued and the dormitories and lecture rooms hitherto used by it are now occupied by and used for college students.

The Administration and Trustees of the college are constantly making plans for larger development and are now planning for new buildings to take care of the certain increase in the number of students next year. Large donations have been made to the college, particularly by Mr. J. B. Duke, and the alumni of the college are laying plans to increase by large measure the annual income of the institution.

Of particular interest to the Church at large are the plans for the organization of a School of Religious Training and the erection of a building for its use, which school will bear the name of the honored and beloved and now lamented former president of the college, Bishop John C. Kilgo. The building is to be inscribed to his memory. We give this our most hearty approval and pledge the Conference to put what power she has behind the development and full organization of this school. R. L. Flowers and W. A. Stanbury are appointed a committee representing this Board to act with a like committee from the Board of Missions as direct representatives to co-operate with the Trustees of the College for carrying forward this whole undertaking.

We do not hope here to pay any adequate tribute to the life and services of Bishop Kilgo, but we do desire to record our conviction that to his stateman-like and inspired vision and to his mighty and unresting efforts in behalf of Trinity College and the cause of Christian education we owe the present day of victory more than to the services of any other man that our state has known. We reverently give God thanks for giving him to the State of North Carolina, to the Methodism of this State, to Trinity College and to our great church.

Greensboro College

From this historic college for women comes also a story of growth and achievement. The student-body is about the same size as last year, but the facilities are constantly being improved, this year notably in the erection of the Odell Memorial building, which building is in the main a gift from Mr. J. A. Odell in memory of his wife. We recommend that the Board of Trustees of this college be authorized to borrow the sum of \$50,000 to fund a debt incurred in the erection of this building. We further recommend that Rev. George F. Smith, representing the North Carolina Conference, whose term expires December 31st, 1922, be elected and confirmed as a trustee of Greensboro College.

Louisburg College

This junior college reports a good year of work. It is in need of more equipment and more room. Rev. L. S. Massey, last year president of the college, resigned in June of this year, and Prof. A. W. Mohn, of Kentucky, has been elected as his successor. Notable in the history of the college this year has been the gift of \$20,000 from Mr. R. H. Wright of Durham, the income from which is to be used to aid worthy girls. We recommend the election of Mr. R. H. Wright of Durham, as a trustee to fill the vacancy which has occurred in the class of 1923, and that A. D. Wilcox, C. S. Wallace and T. J. Gore be elected to succeed themselves for a term of three years from December 31st, 1922.

Carolina College

At the close of last scholastic year Rev. R. B. John, who had been president of this junior college for several years, tendered his resignation. As his successor the trustees have chosen Mr. Ernest J. Green. The enrollment is lightly larger than last year.

Special Committee

W. A. Stanbury and R. L. Flowers are appointed a committee to act with like committee from the Board of Missions and the Presiding Elders to consider ways and means of repaying through salaries during the first two or three years of young preachers in service, money borrowed for their collegiate and theological education.

Estimates

The following are the estimates and apportionments under the amount allotted to education for causes within our Conference and for Trinity College and for Greensboro College for Women for the ensuing year.

The \$5,000 appropriated to Trinity College additional to the appropriation of last year is to be applied to the support of a second chair in the Department of Biblical Literature. At least this much is to be appropriated annually for this cause. Any part of this appropriation not consumed by the support of the chair in any year is to be applied to the fund for the endowment of the chair, on the condition that the amount going to the chair is to be lessened by \$250 whenever \$5,000 is added to the \$80,000 endowment fund.

We recommend appointments as follows:

Christian Education Movement—Secretary, H. M. North. We recommend to the General Board that his salary be \$1200 for the ensuing year.

Trinity College-Prof. H. E. Spence.

Southern Methodist University—J. M. Ormond, Professor in Theological Department.

Scarritt Bible and Training School, Kansas City, Missouri—President, J. L. Cunninggim.

Boston University—Student, H. B. Hill. Yale Divinity School—Student, L. M. Hall, R. M. Price.

BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

We have raised on assessment for the year \$10,980.00 which is \$70.39 less than last year. Our donation fund will be handled by our own Treasurer this year, and thus a source of dissatisfaction will be eliminated. The Refunding Bond will still be required.

On account of the great demands on the General Board for loans, so great that it is exceedingly difficult to get a loan, we must provide a fund of our own, or suffer great embarrassment. Consequently we expect to bend all our energies toward securing a larger fund during the quadrennium. We are still hoping and praying that somebody may see this great need and help to meet it by some larger donations. We most heartily urge that our people make special effort to pay back the loans as they become due, as the work is hindered, and other charges retarded by your keeping what was loaned you. Only a few small amounts are now over due in this Conference.

We again remind our folks who contemplate building that plans will be furnished them by the architectual department of General Board on request. And further, that the Duke Commission will not give money unless plans are submitted for its approval.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DUKE FUND COMMISSION

For the information of your Board the Duke Fund Commission herewith transmits a full statement of the appropriations made from the fund for the year 1921-22.

Again this year the Commission, acting in co-operation with President W. P. Few for Trinity College, has labored to carry out the wishes of the donor, Mr. J. B. Duke, in building up the work of the country churches of North Carolina. The Commission is endeavoring to administer the fund promptly and directly, and in the most businesslike way so as to get the best results for the money expended. In seeking this end, the Commission requests the fullest and most accurate information possible from all concerned. This is most important in the building of churches and in doing other work in the field.

We would especially call attention to the following rule of the Commission: "A Building Committee expecting aid from the Duke Fund shall secure plans and specifications and submit the same with the application for aid to this Commission for its approval, or if the Building Committee should prefer, the Commission will gladly assist in securing said plans and specifications, but in no case will this Commission grant funds unless the plans and specifications have first been approved by this Commission."

The Commission would remind the North Carolina Conference that the term of Reverand J. E. Holden, representing the Board of Church Extension, expires with 1922. J. E. Holden re-elected.

Chapel Hill Commission:

M. T. Plyler presented, and W. H. Brown read the report of the Joint Commission on Work at Chapel Hill, which is as follows:

October 16, 1922.

REPORT OF JOINT COMMISSION

The Joint Commission for the work at Chapel Hill submits the following report:

A meeting of the Commission was held in March, 1922, at Chapel Hill when committees on plans and property were appointed. The work of planning and building an adequate parsonage was committed to the local church. The building is well planned for entertaining small groups of students. It is modern in all its appointments, and adequate for the usual demands that will be made upon it. The fall reception to the Methodist students will be held in it sometime in November.

The Property Committee has completed arrangements with the University Trustees whereby the Seton Barbee property can be purchased for the sum of \$14,000, and the Algernon Barbee store property, which has been purchased by the church, can be exchanged for certain fraternity lots at the rear of the Seton Barbee property, thus giving a property holding of 250 feet on Franklin Street, and 300 feet deep in the campus. By this property adjustment, the present church building can be remodeled for social purposes and become one unit of the new plant, the new church given an advantageous site, and sufficient land unoccupied for future development as demands shall necessitate. Your Commission instructed the Property Committee to proceed to secure all necessary legal papers for the transfer of these properties.

Mr. James Gamble Rogers has been chosen architect for the church. He is the architect of the Harkness Quadrangle at Yale, and the consulting architect for Yale University. He has visited Chapel Hill twice and is now working on the second draft of plans. As soon as the plans are accepted, and an estimate of the cost of the building ascertained, your commission desires to secure the balance of the necessary funds to complete the building program from the Methodists of the State. To this end, the Presiding Elders of the two conferences have been asked to name a leader in each district to co-operate with the campaign committee at Chapel Hill.

Board of Missions:

Walter Patten presented and read the report of the Board of Missions, and it was adopted. The report is as follows

REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS

The rapid march of world events, the inherent tendencies of human nature, the outbreaking of racial prejudices, make imperative that the Christian Church bring the thought and life of Jesus Christ to bear upon the political, national and international relations of the people of the world, if the world of mankind is to live together in peace and happiness.

Christianity has not only not failed, but never wavered in eternal truth. But men who sit in high places have failed to maintain faith with Jesus Christ and their people have been thrown into the throes of suspicion, jealousy, hatred and war. The faithful unto death standard bearers of the white cross of mercy, truth, love and brotherhood are the hope of Europe, cf Asia, of Africa, and of the The urgency to maintain the evangel of Jesus Christ was never more imperative. Our fidelity in maintaining our mission pledges reveals our faith in the efficacy of the Gospel of our Lord to bring "Good will to men". But money apart from personality is valueless. Where are the young men and women, with souls glowing with a zeal for the love and truth of Jesus Christ, who are to fill the places of the falling heroes of the Cross? We must maintain the ranks. Your Board is urgent in its appeal for trained young men and women consecrated to the service of Christ, and implore our ministers to preach upon the claims of God upon our youth.

World Peace

Your Board endorses the movement of the Christian Churches to maintain World Peace. To this end we would encourage fullest co-operation, and special sermons on Peace and Brotherhood.

Hospital Board

The work of the newly created Hospital Board is most heartily commended. We rejoice in the prospects of service that shall be rendered those with weary and broken bodies. We would also endorse the work now being conducted by the N. C. State Board of Health to suppress tuberculosis, malaria, typhoid fever, and all infectious and contagious diseases.

WILLIAMS NORMAL AND INDUSTRIAL INSTITUTE

The work being done by the Williams Normal and Industrial Institute of South Boston, Virginia, for colored young men and women is recommended, and we recommend that Rev. M. T. Plyler, Rev. A. D. Wilcox, R. H. Wright, Gen. J. S. Carr, and Hon. Josephus Daniels be appointed a committee to meet with similar committees from the Virginia and Baltimore Conferences in the interest of this institution.

Your Board maintains a co-operative spirit with the work at Chapel Hill, and heartily endorses the report of the Joint Commission, and urges that fullest support be given the church building program.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. A. D. Wilcox, Conference Missionary Secretary without salary.

Rev. R. M. Courtney, Thomasville, N. C., has been appointed Centenary Agent for the Western N. C. and the North Carolina Conferences. We endorse this plan of Centenary work and encourage full co-operation with the Centenary Secretary.

Epworth League Board:

H. I. Glass presented and read the report of the Epworth League Board, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD

The following is submitted as the report of the Epworth League Board:

It is with grateful joy that we are able again to report progress in this phase of the work of our Church. The report of our General Secretary to the General Conference of this year records that during the quadrennium, there was an increase of 1,796 Chapters and 64,918 members. With a growth in members, there has come an increase in offerings, and today The Epworth League is a real factor in the financial program of our Church.

It is most gratifying to report that this growth in the Church at large is to be found in part within the bounds of our own Conference. During the past year there has been an increase of 74 Chapters and 2742 members, but a greater growth than this we believe has been in an increased appreciation among our people of the place and work of the Epworth League in the program of the Church.

We have not yet, however, reached our goal. It is with distinct pride that we note the work of our Conference organization, and we gratefully acknowledge the splendid voluntary service being given by the President and those associated with him. The office of District Secretary has given further proof of its worth during the year and we record our appreciation of the efficient work being done by those who have given themselves so unselfishly through this channel of service. We again commend this corps of workers to our

Conference and bespeak for them your sympathetic co-operation.

We must continue to recognize the fact that the Epworth League has a distinctive place in the development of the spiritual life of our young people and in training them for effective service in the work of the kingdom. There is no other organization in our Church which is thus set to the accomplishment of these ends in the young life of our Church. The League continues to be recognized as our recruiting ground for the mission fields and the ministry. To these ends Mission Study is promoted and a Department of Life Service has been provided.

Looking to the continued development of this most important work, we, therefore, recommend:

- 1. That the efforts of our pastors be continued to the end that Epworth Leagues be organized in all charges wherever practicable. We recognize the fact that here, as well as in all the work of the church, we must look to the pastor for leadership.
- 2. That attention be directed definitely to the organization of Junior and Intermediate Chapters. The foundation for the work of the League is laid in the Junior Department. The intermediate work touches the life of our young people during its most critical period and experience has proved that it provides a program which meets effectively the needs of this period. We believe that the importance of this work cannot receive too great an emphasis at our hands.
- 3. That the regular observance of Anniversary Day be respectfully urged in congregations in which there are no Epworth Leagues, and Young Peoples' Day in congregations in which there are no League Chapters. The offering directed to be taken on this day is an important item in the League program. In this connection we call attention to the instructions given in the Dicipline concerning it.
- 4. That the work of our Epworth League Assembly be endorsed and that the services of our Conference President F. S. Love, be commended with grateful recognition of their value. We note with much satisfaction from his report that both from the point of view of attendance and constructive work done, the Assembly of this year was the best we have ever held. We heartily urge the support of all Chapters and the attendance of our young people.
- 5. That we strongly urge the support and attendance upon our District Institutes. We note with pleasure the splendid work which has been done in these during the year. Here again, we gratefully acknowledge the leadership of our District Secretaries.
 - 6. That all our Leagues make regular use of the space given

us in our Advocate. This will prove an effective means of promoting the work. We commend in this connection the service of our Editor, Rev. Daniel Lane.

7. That the attention of all League Chapters be directed to our League publications, namely, The Epworth Era, The Intermediate Epworthian, and the Junior Epworthian. They are in every sense worthy of our support, and most helpful in arranging the weekly program. We urge every Leaguer to own a copy of the Handbook. It is indispensable for organization and administration.

We desire to record again our desire and purpose to co-operate faithfully with our General Epworth League Board, our Conference Epworth League, and with our General Secretary.

Bible Board:

W. P. Constable presented and read the report of the Bible Society Board, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD

Bible reading and Bible study everywhere is the supreme need of the hour. The lack of knowledge of, and interest in the word of God is deplorable.

More dust and cobwebs than finger prints may be found on the Bibles in many of our homes. We would urge a united effort to bring about a larger interest in the "Word." "More finger prints and less dust." That we make a great effort to bring about a revival of interest, reading, and study of the Word of God in our homes and among our people. As an adjunct to the spread of the Word of God among our people and the nations of the earth we commend the American Bible Society and its splendid work.

It is the business of the Church to give the Bible to the whole world. Now this can be done most effectively and economically by a special organization for this purpose. The American Bible Society is a partnership of Christian people who combine for one special object to put into the hands of every person a printed copy of God's message to men, in their own tongue, and at a price they can afford to pay.

To secure accurate versions of Holy Scriptures in all the languages of the world is a complex and costly problem. Under the auspices of the Bible Society the most competent translators of different churches unite in producing correct versions. By organizing and subsidizing their labors the society secures a common text in each language and provides for its perfection and revision. It is giving great assistance in the distribution of the Bible—the common charter of all Christain faith in every human tongue.

For the best interest of the church's missionary enterprise the vernacular Scriptures are vital and indispensable. Instead of leaving each mission to print its own Bible, the Bible Society relieves Missionary Boards of this burdensome task. It thus secures immense economy in the production and distribution of editions. It deals with the difficulties of printing, binding, and transport, and renders these services without expense to the missions themselves.

The Bible Society brings together Christians of many communions and nations in this sacred task of the distribution of the Word of God. In these days when faithful Christians everywhere are being drawn into closer fellowship they discover that in the Society's enterprise the re-union of Christendom has already begun.

We therefore urge that a greater effort be made to bring about and encourage Bible reading and study among our people.

We call attention to Bible Sunday November 26, and ask our preachers to emphasize and magnify the Bible before our people and the claim of the American Bible Society be brought before our people and we enlist their sympathy in a larger measure.

Board of Christian Literature:

R. H. Broom presented and read the report of the Board of Christian Literature, and it was adopted. The report is as follows:

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

In making our fourth annual report we feel moved to stress the importance of earnestly encouraging our people not only to take but also to read the good publications of our Church. It is known that many of our official brethren neither open the Conference Organ nor carry it to their homes. As we see it, the safe, substantial progress of our several great enterprises, or organized activities, is largely determined by the literature published for their promotion. Ignorance of what is being done elsewhere and of the successful plans used will necessarily cause hurtful indifference. Our young people, for apparent reasons, ought to acquire the habit of reading every department of Church news, if Methodism is to serve its divinely appointed mission in the coming years. Our pastors themselves must, both by example and precept, lead in emphasizing this duty; and we suggest such texts as "Moreover, brethren, we do you to-wit of the grace of God bestowed on the Churches" "Give attendance to reading".

NORTH CAROLINA CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

In the report of the Methodist Board of Publication, whose annual meeting was held October 11, 1922, we find the following interesting financial statement, almost every item of which is gratifying:

As compared with the showing of 1921, the net earnings for 1922 are more than \$10,000 greater, and there is, therefore, no longer any necessity for an appropriation by our Conference to support and promote our Conference Organ. In these excellent things we sincerely rejoice, and we heartily commend the present management for the splendid paper being sent out each week. We trust, however, that the lengthy delinquent list will soon be very much sfortened, and that the strictest care be exercised in the character of advertisements.

As Dr. W. P. Few has been nominated to succeed himself as a member of the Methodist Board of Publication, we recommend his confirmation.

We request Bishop Denny to re-appoint Rev. T. A. Sikes as Business Manager of the Advocate for the year 1923 at a salary of \$4,000.

Since the Church, through the Quarterly Conference, provides a committee to assist the pastor in the circulation of Christian Literature, we think this plan preferable to high pressure campaigns and contests. Let there be systematic service throughout the year, the paper being presented on its own merits, securing, at the least, 2.500 new subscribers on the membership basis, aiming at reaching every home.

Christian Advocate

Our superior General Organ is vital to all our connectional interests, and these are decidedly more efficient for having such a channel of communication. Its steadily increasing circulation is highly deserved, and we are truly glad that our beloved Dr. T. N. Ivey has been continued at its helm for another quadrennium.

Other Publications

The Methodist Review, the Epworth Era, and our Sunday School literature are maintaining standards of excellence second to none, and we hope that more and more of our people will avail themselves of the advantage afforded by these helpful periodicals.

Publishing House

The Agents of our Publishing House, for some reason, failed to furnish this Board with a statistical exhibit of the vast business transacted during the past year, and we are not prepared to give out any definite information. Let our people be persuaded to purchase books of our own Church representatives.

Conference Journal

We believe that our Conference Journal, like our book of Discipline, ought to be placed by our pastors in every Methodist home, that our Church members may become more intelligent and more consecrated.

Our Deceased Members

This, the first Board of Christian Literature in our Conference, is sorely bereft by Rev. Charles Wesley Robinson's death. He was the Raleigh District's representative. We sadly miss this dear brother, whose spirit was sweet, whose manner was mild, and who is interest was intense in all the work of the Church. We trust that this faithful itinerant rests from his labors, and we are sure that his works do follow him.

The special committee to which was referred the resolutions of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church informing this Conference of their action in appointing a committee of six to confer with a like committee from the two Conferences in North Carolina of the M. E. Church, South, desires to report as follows:

We have heard with delight of this effort for closer co-operation of these two Methodisms having a common origin and being of one doctrine and life; and we would, therefore, recommend that this Conference appoint a committee of three, as has been done already by the Western N. C. Conference of the M. E. Church, South, to meet with the committee of six appointed by the N. C. Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church for doing the work enterprised.

Near East Relief:

Statistical Questions 24 to 40 were answered. (See General Minutes).

Josephus Daniels presented and read the following resolutions, and they were adopted:

NEAR EAST RELIEF

The General Conference of our church at its session in May memoralized "the Government of the United States to take whatever steps may be necessary to stop the persecutions which threaten the complete annihiliation of the Christians in the Near East and to give them such protection as will enable them to re-establish their desolated homes and to support themselves in decency and comfort."

This Conference has heard with deep humiliation and shame the recital of Bishop Cannon of the persecutions which in recent months has shocked the conscience of the world, embracing statements of eye-witnesses to cruelties and decrees evidencing the continued and systematic persecution of Christians. Bound by ties of humanity to our brethren in the Near East, and sensible of the obligations of this country to serve mankind, we reiterate and emphasize the demand of Christian peoples to make a way or find one by which the American government may throw its whole strength along with other Christian nations to end the era of massacre in Turkey.

The care of children and women and men driven into exile by inhuman practices makes an appeal to our liberality to which we must give prompt heed and generous response. The sufferings and privations of our neighbors in the Near East must be alleviated and every effort made by peoples and governments to give safety and security to those who live in the shadow of a nation whose hands reek with the bloods of martyrs.

JOHN CARLISLE KILGO

John Carlisle Kilgo, educator and bishop of the Southern Methodist Church, was born at Laurens, South Carolina, July 22, 1861, the son of James T. and Catherine Mason Kilgo. He married Fannie Turner, of Gaffney, South Carolina, December 20, 1882. To them were born five children: J. L. Kilgo, of Greenville, S. C.; Mrs. Edna Kilgo Elias; Mrs. Fannie K. Groome and John C. Kilgo, Jr., all of Charlotte. Walter Kilgo died in youth.

Bishop Kilgo was educated at various schools. In 1892 he received from Wofford College the degree of Master of Arts. In 1895 Randolph-Macon and Wofford Colleges conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity and in 1910 Tulane University the degree of Learned Doctor of Law.

From 1889 to 1890 John C. Kilgo was financial agent for Wofford College and from 1890 to 1894 he was professor of philosophy at Wofford. In 1894 he was elected president of Trinity College which position he held until May, 1910, when he was elected Bishop at the General Conference in Asheville. After his election to the Bishopric he was President Emertus of Trinity until 1917 when he resigned.

In 1894, 1898, 1902, 1906, 1910 he was a delegate to the General Conference.

In 1901 he attended the Ecumenical Conference in London and in 1911 the Ecumenical Conference in Toronto. In 1904 he was fraternal delegate of the Southern Methodist Church to the General Conference of the Methodist church in Los Angeles. There he made the greatest address of his life.

From the time of his election to the bishopric until 1920 he served faithfully the Annual Conferences assigned to his care. For the two years following, because of his physical condition he was relieved of his active duties by the kindness of his colleagues who came to his assistance.

Most of the time during the last few years of Bishop Kilgo's life was spent in pain. How much he suffered will

never be known. He was willing to go, but he saw much to be done, so that even when his strength was almost gone he wanted to try again. So firmly had he set his heart upon attending the session of the General Conference last Spring that although his days were numbered he determined to go in order to fellowship once more with the great leaders of the church. These days were full of joy to him. Although he spent little time in the Conference, he knew what was going on all the while. His friends were exceedingly mindful of him, at all times everywhere. In the dining room, the lobby of the hotel or in his room there was always a crowd of his friends watchful of his comfort.

Bishop Kilgo's last public speech was before the General Conference at Hot Springs in May. Those who saw and heard him knew that his work was done. The General Conference granted him the superannuate relation which he accepted in fine spirit. At the close of the Conference he started home with his brethren, but was forced to stop in Memphis a few weeks to recuperate before returning to Charlotte. On the morning of the 11th of August he died and was buried from Hawthorne Lane church. Bishop Candler and Bishop Denny, two of his good friends, officiated. He would have said "Let my boys bear me to my last resting place," and so they did.

The mere recounting of the tasks which the church set for John C. Kilgo and the suffering which he endured indicate somewhat the field he must have covered during his life. But the way in which these duties were performed could be told only in an extended biography.

What manner of man he was cannot even be gathered from the many things written of him at the time of his death. To one he was a "manful man"; to another, "a great prophet"; to another, "the greatest educator in our midst"; "prophet", "prince of pulpiteers," "evangelist", "executive", and so on.

He was really all of these and more—with a heart as tender as a child, and a will as strong as Gibraltar; with a vision as broad as the earth, and a task to enrich the ages, in the college he built; with a frail physical body and

a master intellect; with a fine sense of humor, and yet as devout as a mystic; with the drollery of an actor and the inspiration of a prophet that made his words blaze and burn and stir to action.

As Friend

There was never a better friend than John C. Kilgo. He made friends in all walks of life—the janitor of the college, the heathen boy pulling his jinarickshaw, the engineer who pulled his train, the president of the road, the awkward country boy, the governor of the State—the silent saints of earth had a great place in his heart.

Bishop Kilgo's friendship was not upon a material basis. He would not be used by his friends, nor would he be led by his friendship to any favoritism. Its basis was one of soul communion. He delighted to talk and walk with his friends.

To be a Trinity student was to have a chance at his friendship. He gloried in his boys. Nothing so moved his soul as to begin recounting the years of fellowship of the college. He followed "his boys" all around the world with his prayers and blessings.

His friendly spirit enabled him to discover many worthy men in humble settings, not only to discover them but to awake them to a new life and world. He let them know that he had faith in them. After all, is not this the divine method? His marvelous insight to discover hidden worth and his sterling personality with power to inspire and hold men to their best, combined to make hundreds of strong men in our state.

I doubt if even in his greatest flights of eloquence in the pulpit he was more attractive than he was in the home circle of his friends, pouring out his own soul to those who loved him.

With all of our love for him I have yet to find the boy who ever attempted to imitate him. His mannerisms were peculiarly his own and none of us could have followed him had we tried.

Dr. Kilgo lived himself into us and it was a blessed kind of fellowship, such as is not often found in life. We miss

him more as the day of his ascension passes. We miss the inspiration of his fellowship; the bugle call of the prophetic in our own pulpit utterances and the hallowed touch of our great high priest.

As Christian

Not only was John C. Kilgo the greatest friend any man ever had, but he was a Christian man. He must have had a wonderful conversion. The call to preach came to him soon after his conversion. His temperament and giant intellect would have made quite a different man but for the grace of God by which he was saved.

Bishop Kilgo believed in the methods used by the fathers. Nothing short of a clear-cut experience which vitally connected the seeker with the Lord would satisfy him. He was too sincere to presume that a penitent could be trained to become reconciled to God. It must be a complete surrender, with an implicit faith and an spirit to learn the secret of the Lord. No kind of compromise ever really settled anything. Any patronizing attitude to the Lord Jesus was repugnant to him. Jesus was not only the greatest teacher that ever lived; not merely an authority on morals. He was Lord and Master, the Son of God who came into the world to save sinners and He demanded absolute control. John C. Kilgo never sought the line of least resistence, nor would be approach the Lord or his work in a diplomatic way. It was always "Thus saith the Lord". He accepted without question the sovereignty of God. No man or body of men could make him bend his knees, but willingly and joyously would be bow before Him who was Lord of all. Conclusions came to him not by long lines of reasoning but like a flash from the eternal.

John Kilgo was a militant Christian who buckled on his armor as truly as any knight of old, but with entirely different motive. It was not to regain the empty tomb of the dead Christ, but he endeavored to enthrone the living Lord in every humble, contrite heart that believed.

A great lover, his devotion to the Lord Jesus knew no limit. For Him he would go anywhere and undertake any-

thing. It was the supreme joy of his life to be in a great evangelistic meeting when souls were being saved.

The Sunday afternoon hours in the old fashioned class meetings at the college were great ones. When every one present was approached on the subject of his relation to the Lord. Hundreds of men will remember how he came down the aisle after his talks with a personal appeal to each student or member of the faculty present and a "Lord bless you."

While it was John Kilgo's business to tell men the way to heaven I cannot conceive of his ever undertaking the task without knowing the way for himself. It was written of him that "when his spirit fared forth from his Charlotte home early Friday morning on the Great Adventure that it wasn't likely that he would be requiring any guide through the Valley of the Shadow, for he always knew where he had started in his earthly pilgrimage".

Truly he could have said:

"My good blade carves the casques of men, My tough lance thrusteth sure, My strength is as the strength of ten, Because my heart is rure."

As Educator

Trinity College selected John C. Kilgo as president because he was the man very much needed by the institution at that time. The college was poor and in debt; the friends who had helped had about given up; the church was impotent.

To such a task he gave himself for sixteen years, making friends for the college wherever he went, rallying the Methodist people to a realization of what they might be and how they could build out of this school a great institution.

The keynote of the rallying was "Christian Education". He believed that the church should educate, giving its young men training and at the same time molding their characters under its teaching so that they might know the true greatness of life, thus fitting them for world workers who should live not for what they could get out of the other man, but to give genuine Christian service in all walks of life.

To build the college would have been enough for another man. Not so with him for bricks and mortar could not make a college.

The church responded. Young men from the mountains to the seashore came. They caught his spirit. And today all over North Carolina, not only in Methodist circles, there are men who call him the greatest educator of the age. Every church in the state has benefited by his life work. Every educational institution in the commonwealth is indebted to him. Aycock knew him and loved him. His educational program for the state was inaugurated under this influence.

As Bishop

To the highest office in the church John C. Kilgo was called in 1910 to give his time and talents. While he recognized the use of organization he frequently showed impatience with those who sought to accomplish in that way what should have been done through personal initiative and inspiration.

Into all of the conferences which he held he brought a message on evangelism that so wrought itself into the lives of the preachers that great meetings were held and many people were brought into the church.

To the young preachers coming into the conferences he gave charges that were like unto the Master's talks to His Apostles. He desired above all else a clean ministry with a whole-hearted consecration. Through these he believed the Holy Spirit would work for the building of the Kingdom. He loved the Lord and he wanted everybody else to love Him.

In the conferences held by Bishop Kilgo the old time hymns were sung with great effect, whole congregations being moved as they sang with the spirit of the fathers. His knowledge of men and the Lord enabled him to rightly adjust and use the means to produce the effect. They were times of refreshing from the presence of the Lord. The appointments which he made in his conferences gave satisfaction, so that both the people and preachers were pleased.

his earthly ministry: fighting today on the field of honor, and the next wooing as with a mother's love the sinners back from sin; he rejoiced in the fullness of life with its labors, and when it was all over he smiled and died.

REV. MARSHALL ANDREW SMITH

(By H. M. Blair)

Rev. Marshall Andrew Smith, son of Marshall Andrew and Sarah Covington Smith, was born near Ellerbe Springs, Richmond County, N. C., August 2, 1851. Born in the atmosphere of a Christian home, he was brought up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord and trained in the best sense for the great work to which he was afterward called. His parents were of the sturdy Scotch-Irish element, to whom our state owes so much for the high type of her citizenship and that religious devotion which form the bulwark of our strength as a commonwealth. They were Methodists of the best type.

He was converted at his home church, Mount Pleasant, when about eighteen years of age. Almost immediately he felt called to preach. In common with the youth of his day it was no small undertaking to fit himself for obeying the call, as he felt that nothing less than the best training should be secured to fit one for this high and holy calling. The county schools had little to offer, but he availed himself of such as there was, studying under Prof. Skeene, who stood high as an educator, until prepared to enter college. He spent one year at Wofford College, then entering Trinity College he completed the course for his degree in two years.

In November, 1883, he appeared before the committee of examination for admission on trial in the North Carolina Conference at Statesville, N. C. In a class of fifteen it was apparent that M. A. Smith ranked at once among the foremost. At this conference he was appointed to the Manly Mission, which he continued to serve for four years, and left it a self-supporting charge. After that he served pastoral charges as follows:

Carthage circuit, one year; Mount Zion Station, four

years; Forest Hill, four years; Haywood Street, Asheville, one year; Statesville, four years; Centenary, Greensboro, one year; Monroe Station, one year; Wadesboro Station, four years; Waynesville Station, one year; Centenary, Greensboro, one year; Kenly Circuit, one year; Clinton, two years.

At the Conference held in Hickory in November, 1909, Brother Smith was transferred to the North Carolina Conference and was appointed to the Kenly Circuit. The following year he was appointed to Clinton, where he served two years. At the end of his second year at Clinton it seemed evident that his health was rapidly failing and he was placed on the superannuate list. For two years he lived in Raleigh, removing then to Greensboro, where his family still resides.

He was happily married December 28th, 1887, to Miss Sallie Jones, of Carey, N. C. Through all the years she has been a tower of strength to him in his work, and has been a faithful mother to the six children, three sons and three daughters, who survive.

Brother Smith was one of those conscientious Methodist preachers who believe that soul-saving is their chief business. Consequently he threw himself into the work without a thought of his own comfort or convenience. In the face of discouragements he stood like a hero and did his work as one who must give account to God rather than to men.

No sketch of Brother Smith could be complete without mention of his devotion to his Alma Mater. He loved Trinity College as few men among us, and for eight years he served faithfully as chairman of the Board of Education of his conference. This was at a time when there were smouldering fires, and his patient and concilitory spirit proved a valuable asset.

At an early period in his ministry a mutual friend in conversation with the writer incidentally paid high tribute to Brother Smith as a preacher. Said he, "I consider M. A. Smith a model Methodist preacher, both in the matter of his sermons and in the manner of his delivery." Combined with these qualities in the pulpit was the true pastor's

heart, and we are not surprised, therefore, to find in the wake of his itineracy many who testify to vast benefit received from his ministry.

He clung to his friends. Having once loved he loved always. The writer shares deeply the sense of bereavement felt by so many by his going away. How we all miss him! Until the shadows of affliction shut him in his kindly face was seen about our streets, greeting old friends with his cordial handshake. But now he is gone and we shall see and greet him no more on this side.

On December 6, 1921, he slipped quietly away to be with Him who said to His sorrowing disciples: "I shall come again and receive you unto myself, that where I am there ye may be also.

His body sleeps in the cemetery at Cary, where he was buried after funeral services conducted by Rev. J. H. Barnhardt, assisted by Rev. D. N. Caviness.

THOMAS JOHNSON BROWNING

Thomas Johnson Browning, son of Rev. Albert G. and Mrs. Susan Johnson Browning, was born in Bladen County, N. C., July 14th. 1841, and died in the home of his sister, Mrs. Laura E. Cox, Spring Glen, Fla., March 11th, 1922.

Brother Browning was converted and joined the M. E. Church, South, in Kinston, N. C., in 1852. How early after his conversion he felt called to the ministry as a life work, at what date he was licensed as a local preacher, or by what Quarterly Conference, we have no data. He was admitted into the N. C. Conference on trial in 1877, and was received into full connection and ordained deacon by Bishop Keener in 1882, and ordained elder by Bishop Key in 1887.

Brother Browning gave to the church a long, faithful and fruitful ministry. From 1877 to 1908 he served the following charges in the order given, interrupted by four periods of broken health and superannuation: 1877-78 Waccamaw Mission; 1879-80, Brunswick Circuit; 1881, Waccamaw Mission; 1882-83. Core Sound; 1884, superannuated; 1885, Core

Sound Mission; 1886, Waccamaw; 1887, Whiteville Circuit; 1888_89, Carver's Creek Circuit; 1890, Waccamaw Circuit; 1891, Brunswick Circuit; 1892-'93, Waccamaw Circuit; 1894, Columbus Circuit; 1895-'96 Bladen Street; 1897, Straits; 1898, superannuated; 1899-1900, Zion; 1901, superannuated; 1902-3-4, Waccamaw Circuit; 1905, Wilson Circuit; 1906-7, superannuated; 1908, New River. In 1909 he again took the superannuate relation, in which relation he died this year.

It will be noted in a study of the charges served by this faithful itinerant, that, with three exceptions, his whole ministerial life was spent within the bounds of the Wilmington District. There he served the hard charges, the poor charges, charges for which there was no clamor, and like the true under shepherd he was, went forth in search of lost sheep in obscure places. And he found them, many of them in swamp and lagoon, and brought them with shoutings of joy to the great Shepherd and Bishop of their souls. In all these hard charges, to which the best years of his consecrated life were given, his name still lingers as a man of God. He is lovingly remembered as one who served in the spirit of his Lord, and who counted it life's highest and holiest privilege to tell the wondrous story of redeeming love in the homes of the poor and lowly. Into many a humble cottage darkened by direct poverty, or broken by the violence of sin, he carried the light, and hope, and reconstructive forces of the gospel of Christ, when his only wage was the gratitude of a transfigured life, and the consciousness that he shared with his divine Master the joy of another soul redeemed.

This humble knight of the cross, whose memory we honor at this hour, had no brilliant genius, no transcendent gifts to lay upon the altar; but he had that which counts for infinitely more in life's final appraisement: a warm loving heart, a transparent soul, a sincerity that was never questioned, a mighty faith that never faltered, and a loyalty to his Lord on the hard fields of battle where only heroes draw the sword. Above all he knew Jesus Christ as a personal Saviour, and preached him always and everywhere in the terms of his own experience.

Brother Browning was never married. He lavished all his heart on his afflicted mother, for whom he cherished a filial devotion exquisite in its tenderness. If no other halo rested upon him, the self-effacing love he bore the woman who gave him to the world and the church of God, and the life-long sacrifices he made for her comfort, would alone make his life beautiful, and entitle him to everlasting remembrance among all who appreciate a noble soul.

From his death-bed no message has reached us; but none was necessary, for his consecrated life assures us that all was well, and that when the summons came he was ready. Having served his generation by the will of God with utmost fidelity, his moral dust now sleeps in the cemetery at Jacksonville, Fla., awaiting the blessed hour when the Lord shall claim his own.

"Servant of God, well done;
Rest from thy loved employ:
The battle fought, the victory won;

JAMES CARL DAVIS STROUD

James Carl Davis Stroud was born in Chatham County, North Carolina, eight miles south-west of Chapel Hill on July 9th, 1892. He was the son of Charles Henry Stroud and Mary Davis Stroud. His childhood was spent in his country home.

After attending the common schools of the community he went for further preparation to Whitsett Institute, to Rutherford College, and to Trinity Park School. He then entered the University of North Carolina, but did not continue in College long enough to take a degree.

After leaving the University he served as a supply on the Warren Circuit for several months in 1917. In November, 1918, he was admitted on trial into the Annual Conference at its session in Goldsboro. He was sent to the Hallsboro Circuit for his first appointment, and remained there one year. He served the Laurel Hill Circuit during the year 1920. The last two years of his ministry and life were spent on the Garner Circuit. It was in the parsonage there that he died shortly after midnight on the morning of November 1st, 1922.

He was married to Miss Lonnie Elizabeth Fuller, and to them was born one child, James Fuller Stroud, who at this time, is nearly three years old. His wife lives after him as do also his parents and his brother, Clifton, and Josephine, his sister.

Carl Stroud was especially bright, quick, and studious. He was ambitious to secure a good education. It is noteworthy that he completed his Conference course of study in three years. He brought abundant energy and zeal into his pastorates and was a most careful worker among the churches. He was of a pleasing personality with a good address, and a preacher of considerable ability. He had hardly preached long enough to determine what type of ministry his would be, but was just beginning to make for himself, a place in our ranks when he was called from us.

We had not looked for him to go so soon. Just thirty years to live and five to preach. He had not yet known the heat of the noontide nor the weariness of late evening. His feet were still wet with the dew of the morning, while the light of the early sun shown full upon his face. He left his plow standing in the field. How short a time it was and yet so much to do. Still our lives are not measured by length of years, but rather by how much we think and feel and love and serve during the time that we are living. There are those who sum up in a brief period what it would take others a generation to accomplish. Our friend did not live long, but he lived well, and his name will find its rightful place in that ever-lengthening and sacred roll of our honored dead.

As his body lay in state in the little parsonage at Garner, the children in the village passed in solemn procession by him to look once more on the face of their pastor whom they loved, and to pay their last tearful tribute to his memory. And some of us prayed that upon the shoulders of some little lad in that group might fall the mantle of the minister of the Gospel who had just gone.

The body of this young servant of God was laid to rest near the old Country Church among the hills of his childhood. There must of necessity be a hereafter where such lives as have been cut short in this world shall complete their growth and come to a full fruitage. And I feel that in that heavenly land among the followers of our Saviour, James Carl Stroud will be found in the active ranks going on from service to service and glory to glory.

MRS. D. H. TUTTLE

Ella Amelia Westcott Tuttle, daughter of George W. and Sallie Swain Westcott, was born in Brunswick County, near Southport, N. C., September 1, 1861. She passed to her reward at the home of Mr. J. M. Tuttle, Lenoir, N. C., on the morning of August 16, 1922, while accompanying her husband on a visit to his people in Caldwell County, N. C.

She professed faith in Christ and joined the M. E. Church, South, at Southport, N. C., when about fourteen years of age, under the pastorate of Rev. I. W. Avent. She was happily married to Rev. D. Herndon Tuttle of the N. C. Conference August 27, 1884. To this union seven children, two sons and five daughters were born, namely: Herndon W. Tuttle, Goldsboro; Miss M. Emeth Tuttle, Raleigh; Mrs. L. L. Sloop, Elm City; Mrs. I. C. Moser, Asheboro; B. Mark Tuttle, Wilmington; Mrs. Walter P. Hedden, New York City; Miss Sallie Mae Tuttle, Smithfield. All these together with an only sister, Miss Lou Wescott, and the bereaved husband, survive and were present when her body was laid to rest in the beautiful old cemetery at Smithfield.

During thirty-eight years she went with her husband into fourteen pastoral charges, doing well her part as helpmeet in the relation of wife and mother, as faithful worker in the church, and as wise companion in pastoral visitation. It is but her due that these pastorates in which she was co-worker should be designated: Southport; Fifth Avenue, Wilmington; Wilson; Tarboro; Central Church, Raleigh; Beaufort, Kinston, Elizabeth City, Fayetteville, Rocky

Mount; St. Pauls, Goldsboro; Henderson; Burlington; Washington, Smithfield from which place she passed to her reward.

The subject of this sketch possessed many traits that admirably equipped her for her work as a pastor's wife; constantly attentive to her husband's every need, often a companion in his pastoral visiting, often ministering to the needy in body or spirit, her tact, insight and sympathy were a valuable aid in performing the delicate tasks of pastoral ministration. One had but to know her in her home to realize how completely devoted she was as wife and mother. To those due her care she yielded herself in the beauty of unselfish service. In the many letters of sympathy received by the family were numerous beautiful tributes showing how she had endeared herslef to many individuals through kindly personal service. A young man in his 'teens wrote: "I have recently lost my father, and now one of the best friends I ever had." The following brief extracts taken from the Smithfield papers reveal the estimate in which she was held by her friends: ald says, "The life of the deceased was gentle, and like the still waters, deep in her heart she carried those she loved and her head was never weary, her step never failed in ministering to those who were dependent upon her." The Observer says, "We know of no woman who has presided over the Methodist parsonage during the past years who was loved and respected more than was Mrs. Everybody who knew her loved her for her Christian character and for her sterling worth."

In addition to church and home duties Mrs. Tuttle was deeply interested in all community interests and studied to keep herself informed in modern welfare problems. She was a valued companion and adviser of those carrying on this work in her community. Forgetful of self to an unusual degree, devoted to her family, thoughtful and kind to all, she lived and died well and we know where to find her.

SELINA ELIZABETH BUMPAS

Died in Raleigh, N. C., on March 20, 1922, in the evening, Mrs. Lina E. Bumpas, wife of Rev. Robah Bumpas, in the seventy-first year of her age, and after a long period of failing health. Her father's name was Dr. Rainey C. Baynes; her mother was Elizabeth Calhoun Graves, and she was born in Person county. There were born of this union six children, of whom three died in early infancy, and a fourth, a lovely little girl, in early childhood. She was an ideal pastor's wife, helping with the Sunday School and the missionary society, and in the broader activities of social service. Her personality and rare tact made her so sympathetic that she gained the whole heart of those in trouble. She would not spare herself, but would sit up with the sick, and then come home to her day's duties as usual. She was a woman of active mind and of a practical turn. She read medicine with her father, divinity with her husband, and the best literature to satisfy her own excellent taste for

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the good and beautiful. She was a letter writer, who gave pleasure to friends and help to those whom she could influence in this way.

The blessing of the peacemaker was also hers, for it was her delight to bring about a reconciliation and peace, where conflict and alienation had been present before.

While contemplating the life of this woman, wise unselfish, patient, loving, Christian, we are filled with a solemn joy to remember that such people do live among us, to point the way to heaven by making a little heaven's law to prevail on earth. Having served her generation she fell asleep, peacefully and painlessly at the last, having said of herself, "It is all right; I am willing and ready."

Ellen E. White, daughter of Thomas White and Susan Wall White, was born in Randolph County, N. C., Nov. 8, 1842; was early converted and joined the Methodist church; graduated at Greensboro Female College 1861; married Rev. R. A. Willis, of the North Carolina Conference, Nov. 24, 1864; served with him in the active work of the itineracy until his superannuation in 1908; since which she has resided with her daughter, Mrs. J. P. Kramer. in Elizabeth City, where she fell on sleep May 12, 1922.

For many years she has been one of the closest friends of the writer and his wife, and long before that she was near and dear to the parents of each. Thus he can speak advisedly of her life from her girlhood. It is not given to humanity to be perfect, but if Mrs. Willis had a fault the writer never discovered it nor heard of it. Unselfish, patient, gentle, zealous, wise, she was faithful in all the departments of life and faithful to the end.

As wife and mother, she left nothing to be desired. As a preacher's helper, she was almost without a peer. In her church work she was efficient with the efficiency of grace and love. While working in all the fields open to her, she will be best remembered because of her activity in the missionary work. She was interested in the missionary work of the women from the beginning. For many years she was the vice president of the North Carolina Conference Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and became its president in 1907. During her presidency the society was

called to settle some vexing questions and her gentle wisdom was invaluable. In 1913 she surrendered the active presidency into younger hands, but remained president emeritus unto her death, giving to those who followed after her the strength of her sympathy and her prayers. For years she has been president of the auxiliary in First Church, Elizabeth City. Her interest was deep, intelligent and wise. The church and its work was still first in her heart.

Her husband five children went before her; four children, Rev. R. H. Willis, Mrs. J. P. Kramer, and Misses Minnie and Emma Willis, follow in her footsteps. God grant to them and to her successors in the missionary work a spirit like her spirit and a victory like her victory.

She professed faith in Christ, and united with the church at Avon, in early life, and from then until the day of her death she lived a consistent Christian life. As the wife of an itinerant Methodist preacher she was a great blessing to the church wherever her lot was cast.
