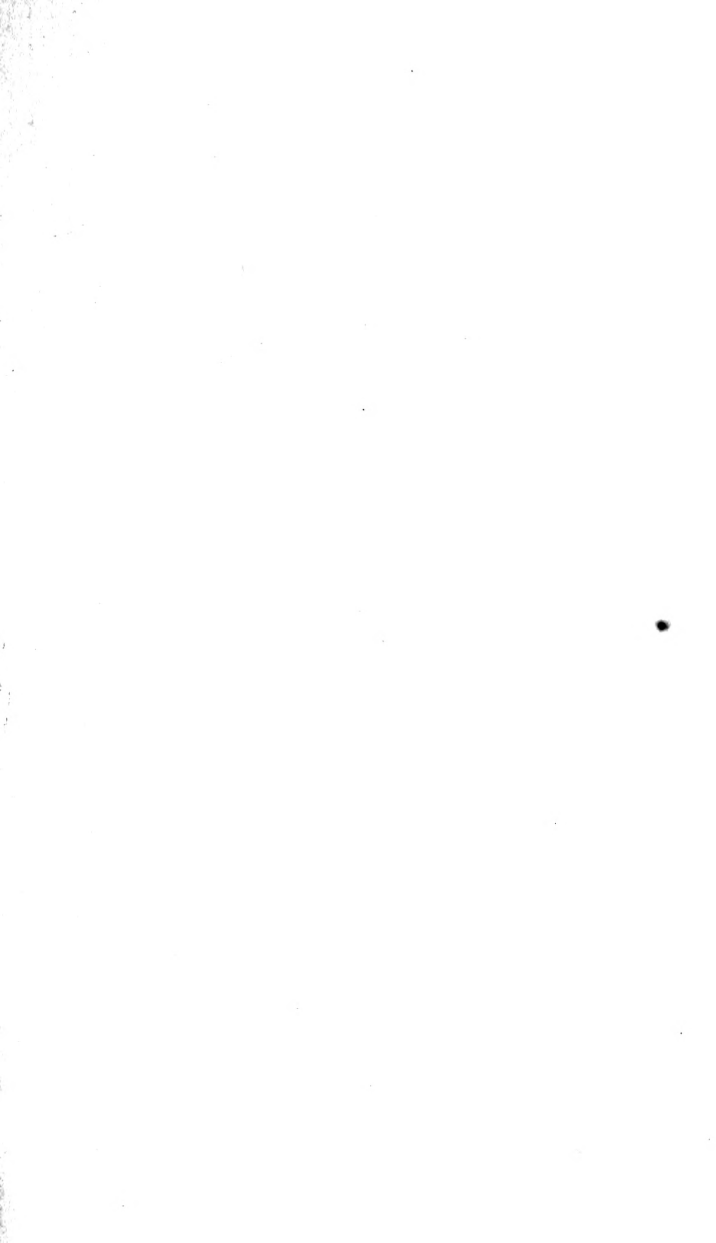


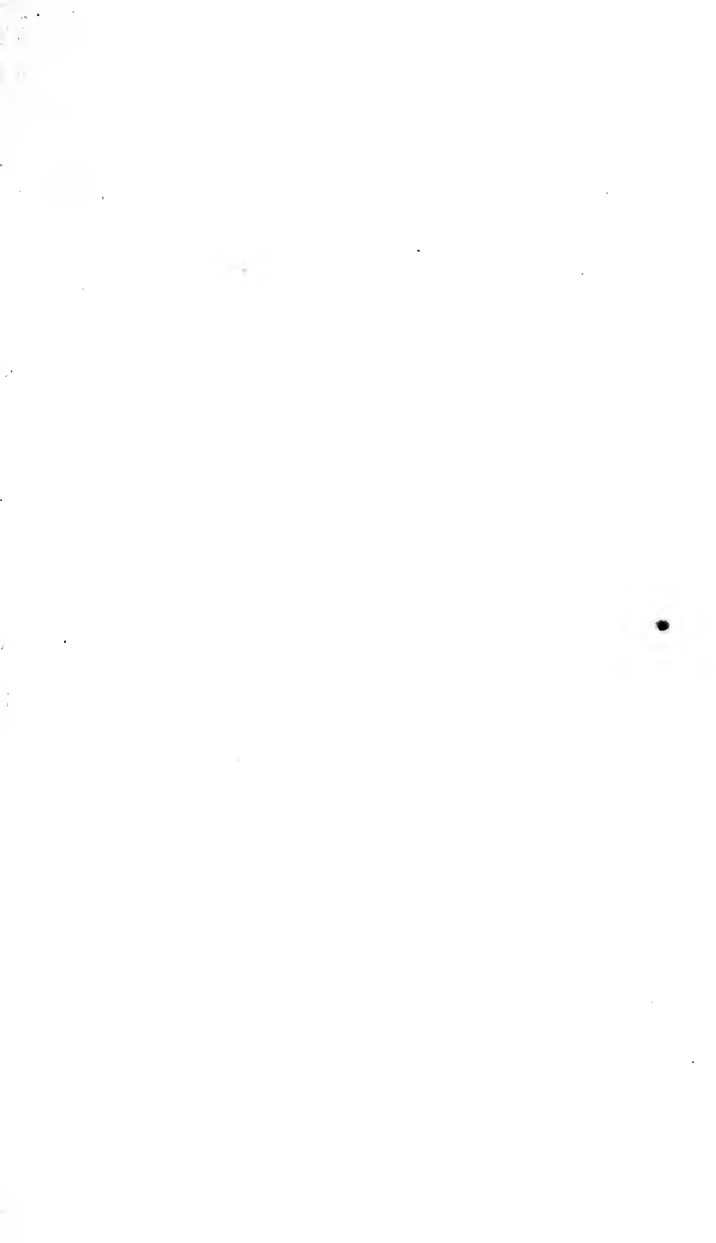
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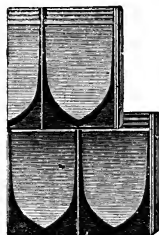

RULES OF CONFERENCE.

I. When any member of this Conference intends to object to the passage of the character of any other member, he shall hand the name of such member to the President, who shall pass the name by and direct the case to be investigated.

II. When any one of our members is called from earth, it shall be the duty of the nearest pastor, or the Presiding Elder of the district, to notify all the preachers in the district of such death, and of the time set for the funeral services.

III. At each session of Conference a publisher shall be elected to publish the minutes of the next session, who shall be authorized to make arrangements and to enter into a contract for the publication in advance of the session.

IV. The Presiding Elder of the district, and the preacher in charge of the station where the Conference is to be held, together with the Presidents of the several Conference societies, are instructed to arrange the program of religious exercises, and, if practicable, secure their publication in the Central Christian Advocate.

V. The Board of Stewards shall consist of six members, each of whom shall serve three years—two being appointed at each session of the Conference. The Board shall organize by the appointment of a President, Secretary and Treasurer, whose names shall be published, and who shall serve one year.

VI. When the names for candidates for admission on trial or for orders are called, they shall, if present, be called forward and introduced to the Conference.

VII. All candidates for recognition of orders shall, unless excused by vote of the Conference, be examined in the same manner as candidates for ordination, and the Committee on Conference Relations shall inquire into the character and fitness for the traveling connection of each candidate for admission on trial, for admission into full connection, or for readmission into the Conference; and the Conference Board of Education shall be a Standing Committee to examine and report to the Conference upon the admissibility of certificates of grades from literary and theological institutions in lieu of an examination by the Conference Board of Examiners.

VIII. There shall be a meeting of the Statistical Secretaries with the Conference Treasurer at 8 o'clock on Saturday morning, for the purpose of comparing the money reported in the statistical tables.

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IX. When a minister in the active work dies, the district in which he dies shall provide a monument for him, at a cost of not less than fifty dollars; and when a superannuated member dies, the Presiding Elder in whose district he falls shall make apportionment to the other districts.

X. Each Presiding Elder, at the close of his term, shall prepare a report of his district, not to exceed one thousand words, for publication in the minutes.

XI. The Stewards are authorized to take annually from the pro rata due the claimants from the Book Concern, a sum according to their discretion, not to exceed ten per cent of their indebtedness to the Book Concern, until it shall be paid in full.

XII. All reports of committees and resolutions shall be handed to the Secretary in duplicate.

XIII. No one shall be admitted on trial in the Conference who is more than thirty-five years of age.

XIV. It shall require two-thirds of those present and voting to change or suspend any of these rules.

The Statistical Secretary presented his report, which was adopted.

The collection of Friday night, amounting to \$111, was ordered to be given as a special gift to West China.

The Treasurer presented his report, which was adopted.

On motion of J. Y. Reid it was ordered that a column for Domestic Missions and one for Monument Fund be placed in the minutes.

The Committee on Semi-Centennial Observance reported and their report was adopted.

Question XI was taken up: "Are there any recommendations for Deacon's Orders?"

After report of the Board of Examiners, and representation by their Presiding Elders, J. B. Crowder, and J. R. Campbell were elected to Deacon's Orders, as Local Deacons.

Question XII was taken up: "What others have been elected and ordained Elders?"

S. O. Sheridan, after report of Examiners and representations by the Presiding Elder was elected to Elder's Orders, as Local Elder.

Question VII was taken up: "Who have been admitted into full membership?"

On due representation, report of Examiners and of the Committee on Conference Relation, R. S. Young and George Greer were admitted into full connection and elected to Deacon's Orders.

J. E. Watson was discontinued.

J. W. Turner was continued in the class of the second year.

Drs. T. H. Hagerty, J. F. Corrington of the St. Louis

Conference and J. L. Taylor of the Missouri Conference Methodist Episcopal Church, South, were introduced.

The Committee on Sunday Schools and Tracts presented their report, which was adopted.

On request of R. D. Woodley the Trustees of the Woburn Church on Mulberry Grove Circuit were authorized to sell the building.

A like request was granted Rev. J. Y. Reid for Mt. Pleasant Church, on the Omaha Circuit in the Mt. Carmel district.

The Conference requested the Bishop to appoint L. Cramp agent of the Henrietta Hospital in East St. Louis, and J. C. Kinison Missionary of the Sunday School Union.

The Bishop delivered an address to the class admitted into full membership.

On motion of J. W. Van Cleve the Board of Stewards was ordered to get drafts instead of money for the Conference Claimants and that the distribution be made on Friday.

On motion, a balance from the collection of Friday night amounting to \$3.57, was turned over to the Board of Stewards.

J. H. Jones was appointed to preach the Missionary Sermon. W. H. Pool, alternate.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction by N. Crow.

The Committee on Memoirs presented its report, memoirs being read as follows: of James L. Wallar, by John Leeper; of John D. Gillham, by C. A. Beckett; of William Wallis, by L. W. Thrall; of William B. Bruner, by J. W.

Smith; of Joseph W. Franklin, by J. D. Hennessey; of James A. Thrapp, by J. G. Tucker; of Emily Mulvaney, by J. G. Dee.

After appropriate remarks by a number of members of the Conference, the report of the committee was adopted and Conference adjourned with the benediction by John Leeper.

SIXTH DAY.

Monday, Sept. 23, 1901.

After devotional services led by J. B. Ravenscroft, O. H. Clark, by appointment by the Bishop, took the chair, and the minutes of the previous session were read, amended and approved.

Reports from the following committees were presented and adopted: Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education, Domestic Missions, Church Insurance, Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, Board of Education, American Bible Society, Deaconess Work, Education, including report of Executive Committee and Treasurer of the Twentieth Century Thank-Offering Fund, District Journals, Woman's Home Missionary Society, Twentieth Century Thank-Offering Class Meeting, Epworth League and Temperance.

The Bishop took the chair and the Custodian of the Conference Educational Fund presented his report, which was adopted.

Announcement was made that the Conference love-feast collection amounted to \$69.21.

On motion, the Custodian of the Conference Educational Fund was released from requiring security on loans.

F. M. Van Treese presented the names of the Committee on Church Location and Church Extension and they were appointed.

Dr. M. H. Chamberlain, President of McKendree College, Rev. F. L. Mahle, Presiding Elder of the Belleville district German Methodist Episcopal Church, and Dr. C. B. Spencer, Editor of The Central Christian Advocate, were introduced and Dr. Spencer addressed the Conference.

Question IV was taken up: "Who are admitted on trial?"

After report of Examiners and due representation, U. C. Smothers, P. H. Glotfelty, W. H. Whitlock, S. B. Edmonson and J. O. Hawk were admitted on trial.

On motion of J. W. Flint, N. Crow, Presiding Elder of Mt. Vernon district, was authorized to appoint P. H. Hearn as a supply.

L. R. Nichols was received on trial, his Elder's Orders recognized and he was placed in studies of first year.

The relation of H. L. Merrick was changed from Effective to Supernumerary.

R. S. Young was left without appointment to attend school.

The Conference requested the Bishop to appoint W. D. White, Superintendent Anti-Saloon League for Southern Illinois.

The relation of N. B. Cooksey was changed from Supernumerary to Effective, and the Bishop was requested to appoint him Conference Evangelist.

The Committee on Resolutions presented their report, which, after being amended, was adopted.

By request of the Secretary of the Board of Stewards F. L. Thompson was associated with him on the Board.

A collection to defray expenses incurred by the Conference was taken, amounting to \$14.28.

Jas. W. Turner, a probationer of the second class, was transferred to the Detroit Conference.

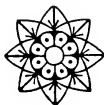

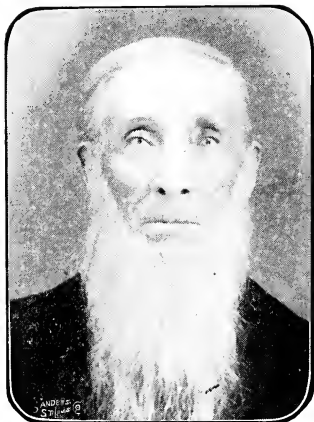

Memoirs.

REV. JAMES ALLISON THRAPP.

Rev. James Allison Thrapp was born in Wayne County, Ohio, December 4, 1822. He was converted in his eleventh year and at once united with the church. In 1838 he came to Illinois with his parents, who settled near the present site of Olney, in what is now Richland County, but was then included in Lawrence County. In 1849 he received license to exhort, and was licensed to preach in 1852.

He was admitted into the Southern Illinois Conference on trial in 1856, was admitted in full connection and ordained deacon in 1858, and was ordained an elder in 1860. With the exception of the year 1884-5, in which he held the supernumerary relation, his active ministry continued until 1892, when he was given the superannuated

relation. In the period between his admission and his superannuation he served the following charges: Fairview, Granville Mission, Prairieton, Palestine, New Hebron, Georgetown, Fairfield, Xenia, Mason, Wesley Circuit, Sumner, Mt. Carmel Circuit, Enfield, Tamara (twice), Freeburg, Clement, Pocahontas, Chester, Altamont, Patoka, Mulberry Grove, New Douglas and Donnellson.

From the time of his superannuation he made his home with his daughter, Mrs. J. H. Webb, until his death, January 8, 1901. He was twice married, first to Miss Sarah Bell. Of this union were born four children of whom only one, Mrs. Lake, who resides near Vandalia, survives. In 1859 he married Miss Angie Edson. Of this marriage were born two daughters, Mrs. J. H. Webb, of Vandalia, Ill., and Mrs. Madge Clark, of Donnellson, Ill., both of whom are living.

His personal character and his ministerial aims were exceptionally high. He succeeded in uniting an uncompromising fidelity to his convictions and a rare sweetness of disposition. No breath of suspicion ever tarnished his ministerial reputation. As a pastor he was sympathetic, attentive, faithful. The kindness of his expression won for him a ready access to the hearts of the people, and he was held in long and loving remembrance by those who had been permitted to enjoy his pastoral care.

He retained to the last almost unimpaired his mental powers. As his physical powers failed his spiritual perceptions seemed to grow stronger and clearer. His death came after a brief illness, and was such that in it the old statement, "Methodists die well," was abundantly fulfilled. He quietly fell asleep and so rests from his labors. His funeral was held in the First Methodist Episcopal Church in Vandalia January 10, 1901. His body rests in beautiful South Hill Cemetery in that city.

REV. J. W. FRANKLIN.

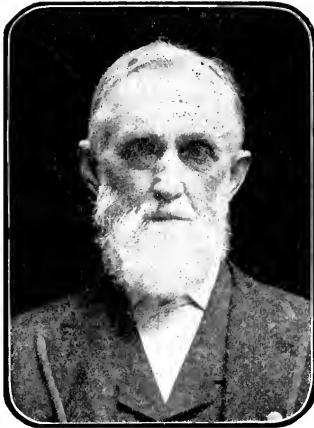
Rev. J. W. Franklin was born in Crittenden County, Kentucky, October 9, 1837. Died in Pinckneyville, Ill., July 5, 1901, aged 63 years, 8 months, 16 days. United in the holy bonds of matrimony to Miss Ruth Taylor March 31, 1859.

In October, 1861, Brother Franklin enlisted in the service of his country, assigned to Battery K, First Illinois Light Artillery, and for more than two years endured the hardships and dangers of army life in defense of his country. He was a brave, true soldier. His health failing, he was honorably discharged in November, 1863.

In 1864 in Johnson County, Illinois, under the ministry of Rev.

G. W. Hughey, he was graciously brought into a sacred relation to Christ, and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church. Removing from thence to Kentucky, he was licensed to preach by Rev. W. A. Dodson, presiding elder during, the year 1869, and admitted into the Kentucky Conference on trial the same year. The year of 1871 he was received into full connection and ordained deacon. Two years later he was ordained elder.

Rev. Franklin served the following charges while pastor in the Kentucky Conference, viz.: Logan, Hopkinsville, Madisonville, Greenville and Milburn. In 1882 he came into the Southern Illinois

Conference and filled charges as follows: Harrisburg, Opdyke, Benton, Tamaroa, Elkhaville, and Godfrey. Declining health compelled him to take a supernumerary relation in 1890, and, being convinced later that his disability would continue permanent, he took the superannuated relation and adopted Pinckneyville, Ill., as his permanent home. Relative to this city he was a useful citizen and a beacon light to the people. The deceased was a man of cool, clear, deliberate judgment. As a result his religion was one of principle rather than that of the emotional, and yet he was a man of deep feeling. He

was meek, quiet and unassuming. All who knew him had the utmost confidence in him; he was a pure, holy man, the sweetest dispositioned superannuate I ever knew. More than once in the pulpit, in the home, and on the street, he said: "The blood of Jesus Christ cleanses from all sin," and I trust that blood for salvation.

Rev. Franklin's last illness, which continued five weeks, was the manifestation of wondrous triumphing grace; it was Bethel and Mt. Nebo to his soul. Space admits of but a few of his beautified expressions. Early in his sickness, being visited by Rev. C. W. Sabine, he was interrogated as to how he felt, and replied: "Happy as a prince. I tell you, my brother, I have got it right; I have not tested this religion for more than thirty years for nothing. I am sure of my ground." To his pastor he said: "The way is as clear as the sun after a storm; it grows brighter." To his neighbors and endeared wife, it was one expression after another of victory and heavenly vision. Among his visions he told the wife he saw her mother, his mother and relations; also his own brother, who died in the army. "Yes, I see an innumerable company that have been washed in the blood of the lamb." He essayed that the Gospel "I have preached to others sustains me now; I am saved by faith; I have perfect trust." He exclaimed as loud as he could speak, "Glory to God," and evoked all present to join him in saying, "Glory to God," which they did. The veil was gradually falling; the end was near; he knew it, whereupon he said: "Yea, though I walk through the Valley and Shadow of Death, I fear no evil; Thy rod and Thy staff support me." Then turning on his side he quietly breathed his last breath and fell asleep in the arms of Jesus almost without a struggle. Surely his end was peaceful and glorious.

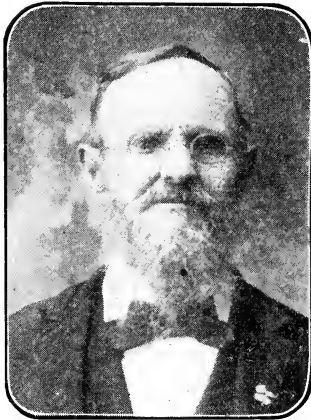

REV. WM. B. BRUNER.

Rev. William B. Bruner was born near Harrodsburg, Monroe County, Indiana, July 28, 1826, and died at his home in Tamaroa, Ill., Friday morning, July 5, 1901, lacking but twenty-three days of being 75 years of age. He was married in 1852 to Mary A. Moran, of Tea Creek, Jennings County, Indiana. She lived but a few years after their marriage. On January 14, 1857, he married Mary Zeigler. To them were born six children, two of whom died in infancy. On September 15, 1897, he married Kate J. Cox, of Tamaroa, who, with four of his children, survives him.

Bro. Bruner was converted when he was a boy 12 years old. Be-

fore he was 17 he had begun exhorting and holding protracted meetings, and the Lord blessed his labors and gave him souls for his hire. Just when he entered the actual work of the ministry it is impossible to say. Certain it is that for a time he worked as a local preacher. In 1858 he was admitted into the Southern Illinois Con-

ference at its session at Olney, Ill., having been ordained by the Indiana Conference. He remained a member of the Southern Illinois Conference until his death. His first appointment in this Conference was to New Haven in 1859, and since that time his appointments have been as follows: 1860, Raleigh Circuit; 1861, Raleigh; 1862, Chaplain Fifty-sixth Illinois Volunteer Infantry; 1863, Benton; 1864, De Soto; 1865, Nashville; 1866, Grayville; 1867, Mt. Erie; 1868, Fairfield Station; 1869, Pinckneyville; 1870-2, Tamaroa Station; 1873, Richview; 1874, Hebron; 1875, Sumner; 1876, Greenville Circuit; 1877, Greencastle; 1878, Edwardsville Circuit; 1879, Ramsey; 1880, Xenia, 1881-90, superannuated; 1891, supernumerary; 1892, Smithboro Circuit; 1893-01, superannuated. During the last years of his life he travelled quite extensively, lecturing and preaching in the interest of the Bible Cause, Temperance and Sabbath Observance.

The whole of Brother Bruner's active ministry was during the heroic period of the Southern Illinois Conference, and many of the younger preachers of the Conference are today enjoying the fruits of his self-sacrificing labors. He loved his church. He was always faithful and true in the discharge of his duties. His sermons on the doctrines of our church are said to have been masterly utterances. He was full of zeal. He loved righteousness and dealt with sin unsparingly. And yet, to the last, he kept sweet, and was filled with compassionate tenderness for the erring and fallen. The last few months of his life were rich in Christian experience. A constant and pervading joy filled his soul. When the summons came to go it came quickly. To the very end his hope was strong and his trust in God implicit. Sunday morning, July 7, he was laid to rest.

REV. JOHN DEW GILLHAM, D. D.

Rev. John Dew Gillham, D. D., was born in Jersey County, Illinois, September 7, 1834.

At the age of 14 he was thrown upon his own resources, his parents having died when he was quite young. He labored hard during the summer and attended school in the winter, working for his board. Thus, by hard study and patient application, he acquired a good knowledge of books and science.

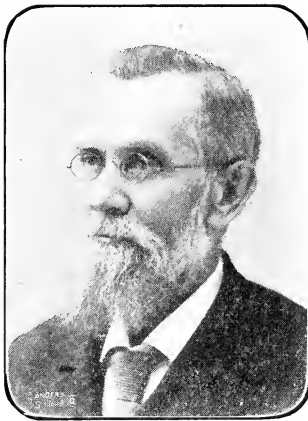
He was married to Melissa I. Smith, September 16, 1857. To this union were born six children, all of whom, with the wife and mother, died some years ago. On October 20, 1875, while pastor at Nashville, Ill., he was married to Sarah A. Shepherd. To this union seven children were born, all of whom are living.

At the age of 22 he was licensed to preach in the Methodist Episcopal Church, and in 1856 entered the Southern Illinois Conference on trial. He was ordained a deacon and received into the Conference by Bishop T. A. Morris at Olney, Ill., Oct. 10, 1858. He was ordained an elder Oct. 21, 1860, at Bunker Hill, Ill., by Bishop Matthew Simpson. Since entering the Conference he has served the following pastoral charges: Gillespie, Litchfield, Kane, Upper Alton, Edwardsville, Salem, Nashville, Centralia, Cairo, Belleville, Carbondale. He was twice appointed as pastor at Litchfield and Centralia. Breaking in health at Centralia the second term, he took a supperannuated relation and located there. He was appointed to the Lebanon district as presiding elder September 28, 1885, serving in this capacity for the term of six years.

He was elected to represent his Conference as a delegate to the

General Conference which met at Omaha, Neb., in May, 1892. He was also elected an alternate and served in the General Conference when the session was held in Philadelphia. June 10, 1891, McKendree College at Lebanon, Ill., honored him with the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

He enlisted from Edwardsville, Ill., in the One Hundred and Seventeenth Regiment Illinois Volunteer Infantry, September 26, 1862, and was commissioned Chaplain of the Regiment. On account of ill health he resigned his office May 16, 1864. Most of his time in the

service was spent at Fort Pickering, Tenn. The above mentioned Regiment was in the Third Brigade, Third Division, Sixteenth Army Corps.

He was a member of the Masonic Fraternity, being unaffiliated, however, at the time of his death. He served this order as Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Illinois from 1880 to 1884. He also held Demit from Tancred Commandery No. 54, Knights Templar, located at Belleville, Ill. He was for a number of years the Prelate of this Commandery.

He took a supernumerary relation to the Conference in September, 1893, which was changed to a superannuated relation in 1895,

since which time he has been more or less afflicted. The last few months he had suffered much and finally looked longingly for the end, which came at 1 p. m. Wednesday, May 15, 1901. He was careful of the work committed to him by the church; he was an affectionate husband, and a solicitous father.

The funeral service was held in our church at Centralia, Ill., Friday afternoon, May 17, 1901, being conducted by the presiding elder of the Vandalia district, Rev. J. W. Flint, D. D., assisted by several members of the Conference. The interment was in the city cemetery at Centralia.

REV. JAMES L. WALLAR, D. D.

James L. Wallar was born near Burlington, Vermont, November 24, 1819, and died at Centralia, Illinois, December 15, 1900. His early life was spent on a farm in Vermont, and in learning the trade of a marble cutter.

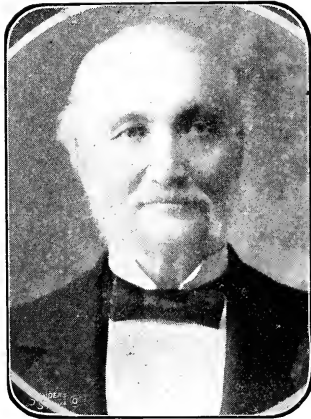
In 1836 he moved to Zanesville, Ohio, where he read law, and was admitted to the bar. He practiced his profession until the beginning of the Civil War.

He was married in January, 1847, to Frances Elizabeth Gammon. Seven children were born of this union. His wife died at Centralia, Ill., June 26, 1887. On July 4, 1888, he was married to Mrs. Jeannette E. McCord, of Centralia, Ill. At the first call for troops at the beginning of the Civil War he enlisted in the three months' service. He was elected Captain of Company H, Eighteenth Ohio Volunteer Infantry. In August, 1863, he raised Company A of the Second West Virginia Cavalry for three years. He was promoted to the rank of Major. As a veteran he was re-elected and promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, which he held to the close of the war.

Soon after the close of the war he moved to Illinois and settled in Richland County, where he engaged in farming. In a few years he entered the ministry; was received on trial in the Southern Illinois Conference at Centralia, in 1866; he was received into full connection at DuQuoin, Ill., in 1868, and ordained deacon by Bishop E. S. Janes. He was ordained elder in 1870 by Bishop Simpson. Brother Wallar served the following charges: Georgetown, Newton, Robinson, Sumner, Carmi, Cairo, Mt. Carmel and Fairfield. At the session of the Conference at Salem in 1879 he was appointed presiding elder of Mt. Carmel district, which he served for four years. In 1883 he was appointed pastor of Effingham station, which he served for three years, and Centralia the following three years. At the close of his pastorate at Centralia he received a supernumerary relation,

which he held to the close of life. By the appointment of the presiding elder he was pastor at McLeansboro for five years.

He was delegate to the General Conference, which was held in New York City in 1888. McKendree College honored him by the de-

gree of Doctor of Divinity. Brother Wallar was a preacher of more than ordinary ability. He was especially helpful to young men. He was a true man and a faithful servant of the church. He rests from his labors and his works follow him. Peace to his memory.

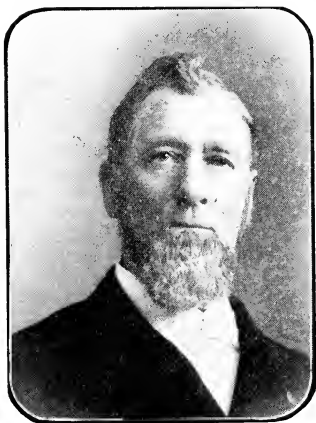

REV. WM. WALLIS, A. M., D. D.

Rev. William Wallis, A. M., D. D., was born in Parsingtown, Kings County, Ireland, June 5, 1836. His ancestors were from England and were of Puritan blood. He emigrated with his father to America in 1839, and settled in Hamilton County, Illinois. His father died a year later, leaving him an orphan. His early years were spent on a farm and at 15 he joined the Methodist Episcopal Church. He began teaching at 19, thereby earning money to attend college, and in September, 1856, he entered the preparatory department of Mc-

Kendree College. While yet a student, in May, 1861, he enlisted for three months' service in the Union Army, joining the First Missouri Regiment Infantry Volunteers. He returned to McKendree in the fall and graduated the following June, with the degree of A. B. Three years later he received from his Alma Mater the degree of A. M., and in 1900 the degree of D. D.

In August, 1862, he enlisted as a private in Company C, One Hundred and Seventeenth Illinois Infantry, Volunteers, and soon rose to the rank of First Lieutenant. On August 24, 1863, he was detailed Assistant Adjutant Inspector General of the First Brigade.

Fifth Division, Sixteenth Army Corps, and remained on the Brigadier General's Staff until June 3, 1864. In the reports of his commanding officer to the Secretary of War, he was twice commended by name, for his coolness, bravery and efficiency. He was mustered out of service, August 5, 1865, and preached his first sermon the following Sabbath. He kept his Christian character unsullied throughout his army life.

He was admitted on trial to the Southern Illinois Conference October 2, 1865, and received into full connection and ordained deacon by Bishop Ames in 1867. Two years later he was ordained elder by Bishop Thompson.

He filled the following appointments: Mascoutah, Professor of

Ancient Languages in Illinois Female College, East St. Louis, Collinsville, Brighton, Edwardsville, Piasa and Fidelity, Effingham, Centralia, Olney, Carlyle, Ashley and Richview; presiding elder of Mt. Vernon district, Carbondale; presiding elder of Olney district, Effingham. He was for four years statistical secretary of the Conference, was a delegate to the General Conference of 1896, and a reserve delegate to the General Conferences of 1892 and 1900. He was for many years a trustee of McKendree College.

In May, 1899, his health broke down. During the following year it grew worse. He was compelled to give up all work, and felt that he was "passing into the shadows." He removed with his family to Lebanon August 30, 1900, and was granted the superannuate relation by his Conference the following month. On the 15th of March, 1901, after three weeks of great suffering, he entered into rest. His funeral services were held in our church at Lebanon March 17. The remains were interred in College Cemetery.

Brother Wallis was a patient and courageous sufferer. His character was of a soldierly type. He loved the army reunions. He was a man of sincerity and moral earnestness, and was in the home, just what he was in the world. As a preacher he was orthodox, evangelical, earnest and practical. His exceptional business ability, his great carefulness and attention to detail, and his intense love for the honor and integrity of the church rendered his services of great value. His religious experience was cloudless. Dr. Wallis had two brothers and four sisters, of whom only one, Mrs. Margaret Wright, survives him. He married on September 8, 1868, Miss Eva Hain, of Salem, Ill. Five children, four sons and a daughter, were the fruit of this union, all of whom, with their mother, are living.

REPORTS OF THE COMMITTEES.

SUNDAY-SCHOOLS AND TRACTS.

We, your Committee on Sunday-schools and Tracts, beg leave to submit the following report:

1. We recognize in the Sunday-school one of the most important factors in the religious and educational life, not only of our own age, but of the ages to come, since the Sunday-school teaches the Bible and brings the Gospel to vast multitudes in the respective periods of childhood. The total Sunday-school population in the United States is more than 12,000,000, of whom there are in the Methodist Episcopal Church over 31,000 Sunday-schools, with 350,000 officers and teachers, and more than 2,600,000 scholars.

2. Inasmuch as the education of the young in religion is of the highest importance, great care should be exercised in the selection of teachers. The pastor and superintendent should aid in the selection for the instruction of our children, men and women of earnest, Christian character with a knowledge of the Bible and aptness in teaching. We hope the time is not far distant when every teacher in our Sunday-schools shall be a follower of Jesus Christ with a living experience.

3. We believe the literature for the Sunday-schools published by our Book Concern is the best for the purpose that can be obtained. We urge that our pastors and presiding elders everywhere see that our literature is used in the Sunday-schools.

4. We recommend that wherever practicable the Home Department and Cradle Roll be established in connection with our Sunday-schools. We recommend that the Conference elect a Conference Vice-President of the Sunday-school Union of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and charge him with the establishment of the Home Department and Cradle Roll in each Sunday-school.

5. Inasmuch as the Sunday-school Union of our church aids every year about 3,500 needy schools with literature and has no resources except the collection in the churches, we urge that an offering be given for this cause in all our charges, and especially that the Sunday nearest Christmas be set apart in all our schools for a Christmas contribution to the Sunday-school Union of our church.

TRACTS.

The Tract Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church aids in the circulation of religious literature throughout the entire world. It is circulating literature in at least twelve languages in the United States alone, and in more than twenty languages in foreign lands. Every year it gives away 11,000,000 pages of tracts in the United States alone, besides sending \$10,000 to our mission stations for aid in the publication and circulation of religious literature. During the past year it has distributed tracts to the soldiers in nearly all our camps, to the sailors and marines wherever access could be obtained, to the prisons and public institutions throughout our land wherever application was made, and to thousands of pastors for circulation in their charges.

2. We recommend that the pastors in our Conference avail themselves more generally of the liberal offer of the Tract Society, which provides that every pastor who will make application can receive from the Society, free, in the form of tracts, one-half of the last collection of his charge for the Tract Society.

3. We recommend that our pastors send to the Book Concern for the catalogue of tracts which will be sent free; and that they examine the abundant store of tracts published under the auspices of our church. Tracts are cheap, being sold at the uniform rate of 16 pages for 1 cent, so that \$1 will purchase 1,600 pages of tracts.

4. Inasmuch as the Tract Society needs \$50,000 per annum in order to carry on its work throughout the church and the world, we urge that a collection be taken for this Society in all our churches during the coming year, and that our support, both morally and financially, be given to the efforts of this Society to spread Christian literature throughout the world.

EDUCATIONAL.

Your Committee on Education respectfully submits the following report:

There never was an hour when the demand for Christian education was so great as it is now. Service to humanity is service to Christ. We should seek for ourselves and for our children the best possible preparation for such service. In many cases this implies a thorough college education. The relatively small number of our boys

and girls who are in college anywhere indicates that a great awakening upon this subject is needed. It is of vast importance that education should be under Christian influences. The fragmentary culture obtained in institutions for higher education which neglect the proper cultivation of the religious nature is one of the perils of our times.

We call attention to the splendid opportunities for thorough education afforded by McKendree College. We congratulate President Chamberlin and the church on the prosperity which the college has enjoyed under his able administration, and we appeal to those who are possessed of means to support him in his tireless and heroic efforts to increase the Endowment Fund of the college. The college year has opened with a large enrollment of students. We believe that many more of our young people should be there. We wish to emphasize the great and growing need of thorough training on the part of candidates for the ministry. Every young man having the ministry in view should obtain a thorough college education if possible, even though great sacrifice be necessary to its attainment. We also urge the importance, wherever it is possible, of attendance, after graduation at college, but not before then, upon some one of our theological schools. We highly appreciate the work done for us through the Board of Education of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

During the past year aid has been given to sixteen students within the bounds of the Southern Illinois Conference. The amount of assistance rendered us is \$147.65 in advance of our own contribution to this cause the previous year.

We recommend that Children's Day be universally observed and that the collections of that day be sacredly given to this cause in accordance with the directions of the Discipline.

McKENDREE COLLEGE.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee of McKendree College experience much pleasure in being able to report that the past year has been one of much encouragement to the authorities of the institution because of the advancement made in every line of its endeavor.

The purpose, named in antecedent reports, of adhering to high-grade collegiate work, and thorough academic preparation therefor, to the exclusion of the superficial work contained in commercial, or business courses, as also correspondence courses—much too common in many of our institutions—has been strictly maintained. The wisdom of such a policy is amply verified by the high standing McKendree maintains among the best colleges of the country; by the

coming of students from other colleges, where indiscriminate work is allowed, and by the advanced grade of our students, all of whom matriculate with the desire, and most of the number with the settled purpose, of completing full courses of study, either classical or scientific. The administration, heartily supported by the faculty, urge upon all students, the value and importance of the classical course. In this era of educational "reform," when many colleges are disposed, in the interest of so-called "practical" courses of study, to discount the ancient classics, it is a phenomenal fact that 77 per cent of our last year's college students pursued the classical course, and that the entire graduating class, last June, were from that department. When, several years ago, the commercial and correspondence courses were eliminated from the work, it was thought that our revenues would be seriously impaired because of decreased enrollments. The converse of this has proven true. Last year was no exception to the facts named in antecedent reports, viz.: An increase in the number of students over the year immediately preceding. As an item showing the feeling which is obtaining concerning the grade of work at McKendree, the receipt of letters, from young people expressing fear that their acquirements would not admit of their being accepted as students, are not infrequent. This is named as an evidence of the position McKendree holds, not only in college circles, but in the public mind generally.

There is not a dollar of indebtedness against the institution. The buildings are in good condition. Valuable additions are being constantly made to the library, and a new structure is badly needed for that purpose.

The faculty is faithful, capable, self-sacrificing, and its members have the cordial good will of the students.

During the past year, but little has been added to the endowment. It being "Thank-Offering Year," it was believed that something might be done within the limits of the Conference territory, but the extraordinary drouth cut short all hope from that source, as is elsewhere explained in the report of the Secretary and Treasurer of the Thank Offering Fund.

Dr. Pearson's subscription of \$20,000 toward the endowment of the college, conditioned upon the institution raising an additional \$80,000 has been by him generously extended. About \$40,000 of this amount can be counted as in sight, \$15,000 of which has been promised during the year. These promises of money cannot be counted an asset until the whole amount is subscribed. The remaining \$40,000 should be secured from the well-to-do friends of education; from those who feel the importance of maintaining the cause of Christian

education, as represented in this pioneer college, and the oldest existing institution of learning, for higher education, of Methodism. When it is secured the promises are already out for improvements and additions to the college which will prove a surprise to the educational public, and start McKendree on a university career.

The number of young men and women eager for an education and without the means to avail themselves of its advantages here at McKendree, and who apply for help to assist in realizing their desires, would prove a surprise to this Conference. Many get help in loans from the General Educational Fund of the church, on the individual notes of applicants. If the educational fund of this Conference were placed on a like footing by removing the requirements that applicants should give security for loans, numbers could secure help, who, under existing conditions, cannot avail themselves of the uses of this fund. The suggestion is ventured that the Conference favorably consider the question of abrogating the rule requiring security on such loans, putting them on the same footing with the fund of the General Educational Society of the church.

The outlook for McKendree in every particular is encouraging, and the President experiences undiminished faith, that, with the earnest co-operation of this Conference, the \$100,000 endowment will be raised, to be succeeded, in turn, by even greater and immediate results.

TWENTIETH CENTURY THANK OFFERING FUND.
 REPORT OF SECRETARY AND TREASURER.

As secretary and treasurer of the Twentieth Century Thank Offering Fund, I submit the following

REPORT.

Last year I reported the amount contributed to the payment of Church Indebtedness, Conference Claimant Fund, and McKendree College—the three objects designated by the Conference for which special efforts should be made—to be \$7,350.51.

I also reported that the commissions which had been appointed at the Mt. Carmel Conference, under the call of the presiding elders, had held sessions, appointed sub-commissions for the canvass of their respective districts, and that by a simultaneous effort, at such time as might be fixed by the Conference, it was believed that satisfactory results in the form of contributions would follow. In pursuance of these suggestions, such date for a simultaneous effort was fixed by the late Conference, and, for the sake of economy, the presiding elders were made secretaries of their respective districts with directions to report to the Conference, or permanent secretary, the result of such meetings as well as other contributions which might be made to the Thank Offering Fund.

On the 11th inst., estimating that the work of the year was practically closed, and that the figures were all in, I addressed a letter to each of the presiding elders requesting returns relative to the Thank Offerings which had been made during the year, for the objects above specified.

The following are the returns reported:

The report from the last named district was made by the Rev. J. A. Scarritt, and contemplates the amount paid by the Cairo charge, to the credit of its local indebtedness.

I should not omit to state here that Rev. C. W. Sabine sent me a personal contribution to the amount of \$18 toward the endowment

of the college, and that I paid the same over to the treasurer of that fund.

It is also proper to state the fact that during the year I have secured promises of \$15,000 toward the endowment of the college conditioned that—in like manner with promises made last year—the sum of \$80,000 be raised, to claim the subscription of Dr. Pearson, in the sum of \$20,000.

The exhibit made in the matter of the Twentieth Century Thank Offering, as contained in the tabular statement above—since two of the objects specified by the Conference are without credits—may prove disappointing, but from those reporting, because of the extraordinary drouth, it was named as a matter of difficulty to meet the regular apportionments to the various benevolences of the church with its constituency, shorn of its resources, because of the universal failure of certain of the crops within the territory of this Conference.

The \$10 I reported as having been received last year from Rev. J. A. Scarritt, to the credit of the Conference Claimant Fund, I paid over to Rev. J. G. Tucker, the Conference treasurer.

I desire to tender to the Conference my grateful acknowledgments for its confidence in assigning me to this post, even though I had not the honor of being one of its members, and since the period for thank offerings has expired, I presume a further continuance of the commission will cease to be a necessity.

This is costly, but absolutely essential. The Bible Society work must expand with the nation, since the Bible is the nation's greatest need; therefore,

That having heard with pleasure the address at this Conference of Dr. Pearson, the field agent, and believing that the literature that he has recommended for our use in our congregations, will be helpful in giving desired information concerning Bible work, that we apply to him for the needed literature. REPORT ON CHURCH INSURANCE.

From information given us by our Board of Insurance, we are pleased to know it has met with a royal reception, and is meeting a great need as it now protects more than ten thousand five hundred policy-holders, representing more than thirteen million dollars in risks.

The carefulness of administration is shown by the fact that since its organization it has sustained a much less ratio of loss than old line companies, and, besides paying every dollar due, has accumulated more than one hundred and seventy thousand dollars in net assets.

The company insures the homes and goods of our preachers, and all property held by the church, writing its policies for the total amount desired up to three-fourth' valuation of the property, and protects itself against excessive loss by proper re-insurance. It receives its premium in annual installments, and rebates its saving annually, yet by its system and rebates more than 50 per cent of the cost of annual policies in stock companies, so making it possible for every church to be protected.

More than one-half of the 10,000 policy-holders were unable to meet the requirements of stock companies, and in several of these cases our policies have saved the societies from annihilation.

We urge all our people to use their own company, for every policy given to another company, by that much, prevents the best results possible to our own, and may keep just out of reach the help sorely needed by some struggling church.

We recommend that said committee be authorized to issue a circular setting forth the proposed contents of the Souvenir Minutes and the price of the same, and that subscriptions be taken in every congregation before the next session of the Conference.

REPORT NO. 2.

We beg leave to submit the following report relative to the records of early Methodism in Southern Illinois as contained in the Minutes of the Illinois Conference.

We recommend that the Secretary of this Conference be instructed to send the following communication to the Illinois Conference at its ensuing session in Beardstown, Ill., beginning October 2, 1901:

Whereas, prior to 1852, the Illinois Conference included the territory now covered by the Southern Illinois Conference, and

Whereas, Methodism in Illinois was planted within the bounds of the Southern Illinois Conference, and had there for a considerable time its sole existence and development; and

Whereas, the Illinois Conference has sole possession of the records of events which took place outside of their own bounds while the Conference on the ground where they occurred is without any official record of its own early history; therefore,

Resolved, That the Illinois Conference be and hereby is requested to grant permission to its Secretary to allow the Southern Illinois Conference, through its appointed representative, to take a copy of the Minutes of all the sessions of the Illinois Conference prior to its division in 1852.

We further recommend that the Secretary be instructed to proceed to take a copy of the Minutes of the Illinois Conference, as pro-

vided in the foregoing resolution, as soon as he shall receive information that such permission has been granted, defraying all necessary expenses, and presenting his bill therefor to the next session of this Conference. Respectfully submitted,

RULES OF CONFERENCE.

I. When any member of this Conference intends to object to the passage of the character of any other member, he shall hand the name of such member to the President, who shall pass the name by and direct the case to be investigated.

II. When any one of our members is called from earth, it shall be the duty of the nearest pastor, or Presiding Elder of the district, to notify all the preachers in the district of such death, and of the time set for the funeral services.

III. At each session of Conference a publisher shall be elected to publish the minutes of the next session, who shall be authorized to make arrangements and enter into a contract for the publication in advance of the session.

IV. The Presiding Elder of the district, and the preacher in charge of the station where the Conference is to be held, together with the Presidents of the several Conference societies, are instructed to arrange the program of religious exercises, and, if practicable, secure their publication in the Central Christian Advocate.

V. The Board of Stewards shall consist of six members, each of whom shall serve three years—two being appointed at each session of the Conference. The Board shall organize by the appointment of a President, Secretary and Treasurer, whose names shall be published, and who shall serve one year.

VI. When the names for candidates for admission on trial or for orders are called, they shall, if present, be called forward and introduced to the Conference.

VII. All candidates for recognition of orders shall, unless excused by vote of the Conference, be examined in the same manner as candidates for ordination, and the Committee on Conference Relations shall inquire into the character and fitness for the traveling connection of each candidate for admission on trial, for admission into full connection, or for readmission into the Conference.

VIII. There shall be a meeting of the Statistical Secretaries with the Conference Treasurer at 8 o'clock on Saturday morning, for the purpose of comparing the money reported in the statistical tables.

IX. When a member of the annual conference dies, the conference shall provide a monument for him at a cost of not less than Fifty Dollars. The conference to elect annually a custodian of Monument Fund who shall apportion the amount necessary to this fund to the several charges on the basis of the amount paid by the charge for pastoral support the previous year. The pastor to report this under the head of other collections. The publisher of the minutes will reserve a column in the statistical tables for this report.

X. Each Presiding Elder, at the close of his term, shall prepare a report of his district, not to exceed one thousand words, for publication in the minutes.

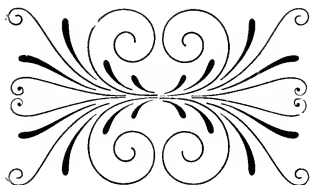
XI. The Stewards are authorized to take annually from the pro

rata due the claimants from the Book concern, a sum according to their discretion, not to exceed ten per cent of their indebtedness to the Book Concern, until it shall be paid in full.

XII. All reports of committees and resolutions shall be handed to the Secretary in duplicate.

XIII. No one shall be admitted on trial in the Conference who is more than thirty-five years of age.

XIV. It shall require two-thirds of those present and voting to change or suspend any of these rules.

The committee on Domestic Missions read report, and it was adopted. The committee on Sunday School Union and Tract Society reported, and the report was adopted.

A resolution concerning the Preacher's Aid Society was adopted. The committee on Resolutions read its report, which, after being amended, was adopted.

The relation of N. B. Cooksey was, at his request, changed from Effective to Supernumerary. The Bishop was requested to appoint Wm. Carson Conference Evangelist. The transfers to this conference and from this conference were announced by the Bishop. The committee on Class Meetings read their report, and it was adopted.

A collection amounting to \$34.12 was taken to defray the expense of the Conference Historical Society.

The following were appointed District Missionary Secretaries: Alton, J. N. Eason; Lebanon, L. G. Cummins; Mt. Vernon, C. C. Hall; Mt. Carmel, Ressho Robertson; Olney, L. W. Porter; and Vandalia, Albert Harris.

The committee on Conference Relations, to which was referred examination papers of certain brethren, made a report, and the report was adopted.

The Fourth question was taken up: "Who have been received on trial?" J. E. Shaffer, Chas. Sullivan, Lemuel Mifflin, C. R. Phillips, M. B. Holloway, C. E. Leitzell and L. S. Ellison.

On motion, those falling below the required grade are required to bring up the books in which they are deficient. On motion the Presiding Elder was permitted to employ H. L. Johnson as a supply. F. M. Van'Treese moved that the Board of Examiners be requested to be more careful in the work of examinations, and that they report their work to the conference, and that each candidate be furnished a copy of questions for examinations.

The committee on Conference Deaconess Work reported, and the report was adopted. The committee on

Church Extension, read its report, which was adopted.

On motion a collection was taken to defray the incidental expenses connected with the conference.

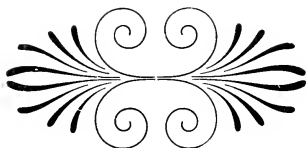

LEWIS ADAM HARPER.

Lewis Adam Harper was born in Edwards county, Illinois, November 12, 1827. He was married November 5, 1850, to Phoebe Jane Roberts. She lived but a few years after their marriage. March 13, 1864, he was married to Sarah Mason, but she, too, was soon taken from him. He was then married September 18, 1868, to Angie E. Hays, who now survives him. He was the father of eleven children, only four of whom are now living. About two years since he suffered a severe attack of la grippe, from which he never fully recovered. January 24, 1902, he was taken suddenly ill; on the 28th he was stricken with paralysis and died the same evening.

In December, 1852, he was converted at the Woodland church,

on the Jeffersonville circuit. He was licensed to preach in 1857; received on trial in the Southern Illinois conference in 1858; received into full connection, and ordained deacon by Bishop Simpson in 1860, and elder by Bishop Ames in 1862. He was thirty-three years in the active ministry, during which time he served the following charges: Shiloh, Harrisonville, Chester, Xenia, Fairview, Hebron, Equality, DeSoto, Walnut Hill, Mt. Vernon Circuit, Spring Garden, Greencastle, Litchfield, Johnsonville, Avena, Mason, Irvington, Johnsonville, Benton, Jeffersonville, Clay City and Mt. Erie. He was superannuated in 1891, and from that time made his home in Mt. Erie. He held his last public service January 19, 1902, when

he preached with more than usual energy and power. The text was "We are Ambassadors for Christ."—2 Cor., 5:20.

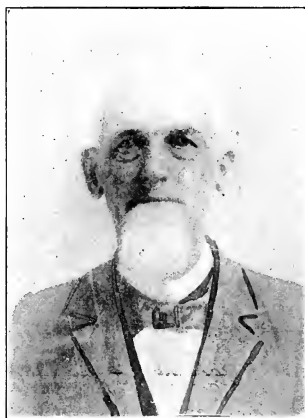
As he realized the end was near, he called his relatives and friends to his bedside and asked them to pray, and then expressed himself as ready for the change. His last utterance was, "The way is so bright."

Silas Green was born in Columbia, Hamilton county, Ohio, March 17, 1827. He died at Steelville, Illinois, December 14, 1901.

1858, received on trial in the Kansas Conference in 1860, ordained deacon in 1862, and elder in 1864. In 1863 he was transferred to the Kentucky Conference, where he labored with marked success, in some of the most trying fields, for nineteen years, four of which he was presiding elder of the Greenville district. In 1882 he was transferred to the Southern Illinois Conference. He served the following charges: Golconda, Enfield, Robinson, Albion, Murphysboro, Corinth, Mt. Vernon Circuit, Equality, Dahlgren, Galatia, McLeansboro Circuit, Jonesboro, and was in his second year at Steelville at the time of his death.

He was married three times, two of his companions having preceded him to the eternal world. To the second union was born one son, Charles C. Green, now living in California. His third

marriage was November 13, 1873, to Sallie C. Thompson. To them were born four children, three of whom, with the mother, survive him.

Brother Green was a profound thinker, forcible speaker, sound theologian, and a loyal Methodist preacher. To understand him was to appreciate and love him.

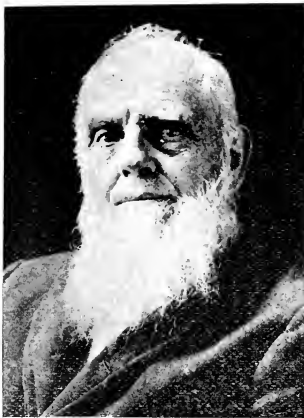
His funeral was held in First church, Anna, Illinois, conducted by the pastor and others. The body was laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery of that city.

He served as chaplain of the Eighty-seventh Illinois infantry from 1862 to 1863, being honorably discharged on account of sunstroke. After forty years in the active ministry, he superannuated in 1890, spending his retired life in Newton, Ill.

His ministry was a very fruitful one. He was an excellent and

helpful pastor, and as a preacher was Methodistic, interesting and a successful revivalist.

He possessed several elements of strength in his beautiful Christian character, but possibly none stronger than that of being a peacemaker, a phrase which was frequently applied to him.

During his superannuate life he continued a student, retaining a deep interest in the welfare of the church and the nation.

His life came suddenly but peaceably to a close March 26, 1902. He leaves a companion, three sons other relatives and a host of friends.

The funeral was held in the Methodist church in Newton, conducted by Presiding Elder F. W. Loy, assisted by the pastor and other ministers, after which the body was laid to rest in the Newton cemetery.

WILLIAM GAINSFORD HALE.

William Gainsford Hale died at Newburnside, Ill., August 6, 1902. He was born at New Hebron, Crawford county, Ill., July 19, 1858. He was of Methodist parentage. His father, Rev. Peter Hale, was for many years a local preacher in the church. His

mother, who is still living, was a fine example of Christian character and devotion to the church of her choice.

When he was three years old his parents removed to a farm in the southern part of the county, where he remained until he reached his majority. He attended school at Lebanon, Ohio, in 1874, at which time he was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal church. For three years following he taught school in his native county. October 21, 1880, he was married to Miss Mattie

Boyd, of Crawford county, Ill. Together they attended school at Danville, Ind., in 1880-81. He then taught school two years in Robinson, Ill. In September, 1883, he was admitted to the Southern Illinois Conference on trial. He served the following charges: Rose Hill, Oblong, Wakefield, Belmont, Walnut Hill, Altamont, West Liberty, Elizabethtown and Newburnsides. He was ordained deacon by Bishop Ninde in 1885, and elder by Bishop Foss in 1887. In the years 1887-88 he was a student in Grant Memorial University, Chattanooga, Tenn. The years 1893-96 he was a student in Garrett Biblical Institute, Evanston, Ill., graduating with the class of '96.

October 16, 1898, his companion died at Robinson, Ill., leaving him with a family of five children. In September, 1900, he was united in marriage to Miss Mary Huron, of Topeka, Kas., who with the children of the former marriage, survive him.

He was a minister of the gospel, willingly consecrating all his energies to the work of the church. He was the main instrument in planning and erecting four churches during his ministry, the last of which he was to have dedicated August 30, 1902. Since his death this new church building has been named for him, Hale Chapel. It is said that this house, a neat frame building, replaces the last log meeting house in the Southern Illinois Conference. His zeal for his Master's work caused him to overtax his strength and hastened the crisis which resulted in his death. In his last sickness he frequently said to his wife and family, "It is so good to be ready." His mind seemed to be in holy fellowship with his God. The remains were taken to Robinsou, Ill., where the funeral was conducted by the pastor of the church, the Rev. J. W. McNeil. The body was laid to rest in the Robinson cemetery.

WILLIAM H. HORMEL.

William H. Hormel was born June 9, 1863, in Champaign county, Ill., and died June 11, 1902, in Coffeen, Ill. He was converted at the age of twenty years, and joined the Methodist Episcopal church. He was soon licensed to preach, and attended school for several years.

He joined the St. Louis Conference in 1891 at Springfield, Mo. In 1893 he was ordained deacon and in 1895 elder. He transferred to the Missouri Conference in 1895, and in 1899 back to the St. Louis Conference. In the fall of 1901 he transferred to the Southern Illinois Conference, and was stationed at Coffeen, Ill.

MICAJAH HOUSE.

Micajah House was born in Washington county, Ill., April 9, 1825. He died at his home in Greenville, Ill., April 18, 1902. He was converted at the early age of thirteen years, and united with the Methodist Episcopal church, in which he remained a faithful member and a much loved minister until he was called to the church triumphant.

He was twice married, first to Miss Margaret Whittenberg, in 1843, who died at Murphysboro, Ill., in June, 1882, and to Mrs. Lucy A. Wetmore, in 1884, who survives him.

He entered the Southern Illinois Conference, on trial, in 1857, and was received into full connection and ordained deacon in 1859. Vernon, 1861; Ashley, 1862-3; Jonesboro, 1864-5; Dongola, 1867; Salem Circuit, 1868-9; Greenville, 1870-71; Nashville, 1872-3; Du Quoin, 1874-5; Chester, 1876-7; Jonesboro, 1878-9; Murphysboro, 1880-82; Pinckneyville, 1883-4; Mound City, 1885.

At the conference of 1886 he was granted the superannuated relation on account of failing health. He was never again able to enter the active work of the ministry. Following his retirement he made his home in Greenville, where he was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. Those who knew him best loved him most, and looked upon him as a man of real worth and substantial piety. He was never demonstrative. His daily walk and conversation made it plain that he was a man of God.

HARRIET LOGAN NALL.

Harriet Logan Nall was born at Apple Creek, Mo., December 18, 1818, and died June 29, 1902, in Cairo, Ill. By birth, lineal heritage and life work she has been in line with the heroic pioneers of the Mississippi valley.

REPORTS OF THE COMMITTEES.

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND TRACTS.

We, your committee on Sunday Schools and Tracts, submit the following report:

We recognize the Sunday School as one of the most important factors in the life of the church, both present and future. That our children may receive the most wholesome instruction we urge that both pastors and superintendents give the most careful attention to the selection of teachers, and of the literature used in the School. We believe there is no better Sunday School literature published than that issued by our own publishing house. Our own publications are the best for our own schools. We urge pastors and Presiding Elders to press this matter until all our schools are supplied with our own literature.

We recommend the appointment of a Vice President in each District to aid and direct in the introduction of modern and progressive methods and materials in the work of the schools.

We wish to give our hearty approval of the Temperance lesson, and hope that the opportunity to teach it will be vigorously seized by all our teachers.

Our Sunday School Union is a mighty factor in establishing and maintaining Schools, a veritable Good Samaritan among the needy, and it is not receiving the support it should have from our people. We urge our pastors to give the people full information concerning its work, and an opportunity to contribute more liberally to it.

TRACTS.

The Tract Society aids in the circulation of religious tracts in many languages in this and many foreign countries.

We recommend that the pastors avail themselves of the liberal offer of the society which provides that every pastor who makes application may receive from the Society tracts free of charge, to the value of one half the amount his charge contributes to the Society.

The Society needs \$50,000.00 per annum to properly carry on its work. Our Conference paid this year \$229.00 to it, an average of \$38.00 per District. Our contributions ought to be at least multiplied by five. We urge a most faithful presentation of the claims of this most excellent benevolence.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

Methodism, from the time of its founding, has stood committed to the highest possible intellectual culture of the people. We also hold that to fail to develop the moral nature is to miss the highest

purpose of God concerning his people. We therefore deplore the idea largely prevalent that the growth of the one retards the development of the other, and call upon our ministers throughout the conference to continually hold before our young people the privilege and duty of a high degree of Christian Education.

Furthermore, we can not, as Methodist ministers, give any support to non-Christian schools of higher education; but feel it to be our duty to give our whole influence in the support of our own church schools.

In presenting the matter of a choice of schools to our young people contemplating scholastic training, we stand pledged to present the rightful claim of our own conference school, McKendree College, before any other.

Under the able administration of President M. H. Chamberlin and the Executive committee, McKendree College presents indications of a healthful growth which are highly satisfactory to this Conference. The good results obtained by the painstaking managers of the institution are fully set forth in the Report of the Executive Committee, which is herewith submitted and incorporated in this report.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE,
MCKENDREE COLLEGE.

The past year was one of uninterrupted prosperity, while the current one, which opened on the 16th inst., shows a matriculated enrollment in excess of the corresponding period of last year.

The grade of our students continues to improve, and it can be recorded to McKendree's credit that over eighty per cent. of our students for last year, in the college department, were pursuing the classical course, while the enrollment, thus far, for the current year, promises to maintain this significant fact.

The records, as has been the case for the past seven years, attest the fact that there is no indebtedness of any character against the institution, while our increasing revenues, arising from the steadily augmenting number of students, adds to the income of our faculty.

The buildings are in good condition, and, during the year, the chapel has been redecorated and equipped with electric lights, making the same one of the handsomest rooms of that character in the state.

Several hundred volumes have been added to the library during the year, which fact warrants calling attention to the sore need of a new library building, since we have not now the space for shelving all of our nearly 10,000 volumes.

The productive endowment amounts to \$36,795,73, all of which is loaned out on the best of real estate security, and at a rate of not less than six per cent. per annum.

No increase of the endowment has been made during the year, though the president reports about \$50,000, of the 80,000 he is endeavoring to secure, as being conditionally promised. Thirty thousand more must be secured to claim the pledge of Dr. Pearsons in the sum of \$20,000, which, under a third extension of time by him made, will expire January 1st, 1903. Dr. Pearsons has ex-

pressed this as his final favor in the way of time limit, so that it becomes a matter of vital concern that the remaining \$30,000 be secured during the ensuing three months.

President Chamberlain has other sources from which to expect added help, but the serious consequences which would result from a failure to raise the whole amount within the allotted time gives him no small amount of solicitude as to the outcome.

At the late session of the Joint Board of Trustees it was resolved on motion of its clerical representatives, that the conference should undertake to raise the sum of \$20,000, as an auxiliary movement to the efforts being made by the president. If this might be accomplished the larger portion of the deficiency would be covered and the whole amount unquestionably secured.

The College in all its history was never in better condition, both morally and financially, than at the present moment, and needs but the securing of this \$100,000 to favorably settle in the public mind the question of the permanency of its past seventy-five years of significant history.

That accomplished, further and more important developments will promptly follow, since promises which will effect such results have already been made by those abundantly able to promote such advancement.

3. That the Commission be instructed to make an equitable apportionment of the \$10,000 to the ministers and charges of the Conference.

4. That the ministers be instructed to raise the apportionment before January 1, 1903, in cash or solvent paper, and each member of the Conference pledge his utmost efforts by personal contribution and by personal canvas of the membership of his charge to secure the full amount apportioned.

5. That an itinerary of the Conference by President Chamberlin, be arranged for holding mass meetings and making personal representation of McKendree's crisis at important centers of the Conference. The pastors of contiguous charges are asked to urge the attendance of laymen upon those meetings.

6. The Presiding Elders are instructed to urge the claims of McKendree, and this pledge at the first quarterly Conference of

in behalf of McKendree College in order to secure the \$100,000 endowment fund, made possible by the generous conditional gift of Dr. Pearsons of Chicago.

2. That a fund be solicited from our charges as a special Conference Claimant's fund.

3. That before January 1st 1903, provisions be made to cancel all remaining indebtedness on our churches and parsonages within the bounds of our Conference.

4. That the Presiding Elders be continued District Secretaries to report all Twentieth Century Thank Offerings to the Conference Secretary, and that Dr. M. H. Chamberlin be retained Conference Secretary and Treasurer of said fund to report further amounts that may be secured for the above mentioned objects.

CHURCH INSURANCE.

Every church and parsonage should be insured. People who give their money for these buildings have a right to expect that insurance will always be maintained. Neglect may mean serious financial loss and loss of the confidence of the community, particularly since the General Conference has removed the last excuse by organizing our insurance company upon a plan that places protection within the reach of every church.

We are informed that the business increased 40 per cent. during the last year; that the total now is over 15,000 policies, amounting to over \$16,000,000.00. Approximately 5,000 policy holders are dependant upon our company for protection, being unable to meet the terms of stock companies. This great service to Methodism could not be rendered but for the co-operation of the more fortunately situated.

While this large business has been accumulating, over \$65,000 losses have been paid promptly in every case, annual dividends of 10 per cent. have been returned to policy holders, being more than twice the dividends realized by all the stock-holders of the old line companies in this country, on an average, during the past twenty years, and Methodism has been saved from extermination in some localities where rebuilding would have been impossible but for our company's assistance.

Surely in view of these facts we should see to it that the rest of our churches get in line as promptly as possible. The personal effects and homes of members of the Conference can also be insured.

FRATERNAL GREETINGS.

REPORT OF PRESIDING ELDER R. D. WOODLEY,
OF THE LEBANON DISTRICT.

In April 1897 when Bishop Fitzgerald appointed me to succeed Dr. O. H. Clark on the Lebanon District, I found the twenty-five appointments then contained in the District, filled by twenty-four regular pastors and one supply. The supply, J. W. Turner, has since graduated from Garrett and is now a member of the Michigan Conference. Twelve of the twenty-four men are doing effective work in other districts of our own Conference, one of whom is now a Presiding Elder. One of the number in the district when I came to it is a supernumerary member of another Conference, and two are supernumerary members of this Conference. Two now occupy the superannuated relation, and seven, Brothers Herdman, Jones, Harris, Shumard, Farmer, Sweeny and McCollom have continued with us all through the years. None of the twenty-five have been called home to Heaven.

A peculiar feature of our district work is that three of our present Presiding Elders were pastors in our district when the Bishops put them in charge of districts; and among the five men who were my associates in my first cabinet work under Bishop Merrill, two are now occupying leading appointments in the Lebanon District.

The district is doing well on ministerial support, and has increased estimates and receipts for the pastors every year of the administration. Six years ago the estimate for pastor's support was \$14,953.00. The year now closing it is \$17,987.00, a gain of \$3,034.00, and this without change of boundary, except to receive one appointment paying very little when it came to us. The deficit on pastor's salary at the beginning of our term was \$590.00, the smallest found among our districts, and this reputation has been sustained yearly, and reduced. until last year it was but \$377.00. May the district continue in this honorable way until every pastor shall be promised a comfortable support, and every dollar promised be paid.

Considering our small membership on this side of the state, and that we are not a wealthy church; the district was at flood tide on benevolence when we were placed in charge. My predecessor had special fitness for pushing benevolence; he keeps pushing, and on such persistent pushing, with our environments, in territory where membership is small and possibility of increase limited, it is difficult to advance. And we do well to hold on. But outside of a special gift, to a promising field for a few years, for which we received credit, because the charge where the brother lived paid its apportionment, the district, the year now closing, pays for Missions the largest sum in its history, and does this at the expense of no other benevolent object.

The district has very little indebtedness on its property; does not owe a dollar to the Board of Church Extension; its present indebtedness is wholly new. Summit Avenue, East Saint Louis, where we have carried some debt for parsonage, street improvements and pipe organ, under the industrious leadership of J. W. Van Cleve, the pastor, has been relieved, and the last dollar of the debt paid.

Three beautiful churches, costing \$18,000.00 have been built, and other church buildings to the amount of \$5,000.00 have been rebuilt, remodeled and improved. Three substantial but inexpensive buildings are now in process of erection, one at Keysport, a town of about 800 people, where we have had neither organization nor church building, but under the management of D. T. Harris, of Beaver Creek, organization was effected early in the year, and now the building follows. Mt. Zion on the Troy work, is building a neat church to take the place of the old one, which had reached the stage where repairs would not answer. New Baden, a little city of about one thousand, on the Southern railway, had no English speaking services. Z. J. Farmer, of Trenton Station, took up the place as an afternoon appointment, organized first a Sunday School, then a class; and Sunday, the 25th inst., with rejoicing, they laid the corner stone of a building which will reflect credit upon our work when completed.

Five good parsonages with modern conveniences have been built, costing about \$10,000.00. Two of these, one at Troy, and the other at Tilden, the present year. Greenville sold the old parsonage and reinvested it with an additional \$400.00 in a building more conveniently located. Other substantial improvements have been made on a number of our parsonages aggregating about \$3,000.00, thus rendering the homes of our preachers generally comfortable, and some of them elegant.

During the term a number of new societies have been organized. The latest is our new enterprise at Winstanley Park, East St. Louis, where Brother J. B. House, at one time member of this Conference, and others associated with him, gave Summit Avenue Fourth Quarterly Conference such pleasing assurances that Boards of Trustees and Stewards were appointed and we have their request to the Bishop to send them a pastor.

Our property is generally insured now in the Church Company of Chicago, and the title to property throughout the district, is generally without a cloud. In all respects the direction of the discipline, so far as possible; regarding the instruction of children, the Missionary society, and other benevolent work has been carried out. Our Sunday Schools use our own literature; are generally organized into Missionary Societies, and the children brought to regard favorably our work, and contribute to its support. Organization is generally thorough. The Epworth League, W. F. M. S. and W. H. M. S. including the labor of our deaconess are doing consecrated, effective work within our bounds-

Our territory promises rich results through the regular and persistent use of the every day means of grace. But I regret to say our conditions do not seem to favor great revivals. No pastors are more faithful, No section of the Conference has more talent in the pulpit, nor more culture in the pew, yet we do not have great revivals. Ours is the German section of the state, and we meet here conditions which seem to prevent great ingatherings. We grow slowly but naturally, through the power of the Master in our organization.

Within the bounds of the Lebanon District is located our only Conference school, McKendree College. This venerable seat of

Learning has a history worthy the honored name it bears—McKendree. It has a brilliant future significant in helping to shape conditions in the middle west. It is still active, still vigorous, with a promising future. It now enters its 83d year with hope. Dr. Chamberlin, an alumnus, commences his ninth year as its president. During his administration the college has been freed from an embarrassing debt, has an endowment of \$36,975,73, with hope for more. The attendance at the opening of the year is encouraging, and its faculty consecrated to the work.

My relation to the pastors and the people in the district has been pleasant. I shall remember with pleasure their kindness in their homes. Their patience with me when vexing questions required decision. Their sympathy, prayers and material assistance in the present year, when it seemed that my oldest son must die from accident. Their letters helped myself and family. Their prayers with ours, supported surgeon's skill in the most delicate operations, and saved our boy. The relation so pleasantly sustained now closes. But the echo of the kindness will remain 'till we meet "over there."

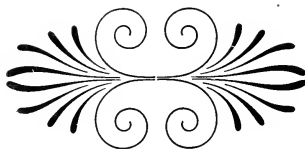

Summary of Semi-Centennial Sermon,

By REV. J. A. SCARRITT, D. D.

DELIVERED AT FAIRFIELD, ILLINOIS, SEPTEMBER, 1902.

“And this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith. Who is he that overcometh the world but he that believeth that Jesus is the Son of God?”—I John, 5: 4-5.

Will it be said that our text is commonplace, and our theme insipid?

Not by the pious. With healthy relish and ardent hungering for wholesome aliment, such are blessed and filled with the manna of gospel truth.

If any loathe the true bread of heaven it is because of vitiated appetite and morbid taste, and these need medicine rather than meat.

We have in this passage of scripture an important statement, especially interesting to God's militant host. Faith—“our faith”—is victorious. There is added a challenge for all comers to find a substitute or a parallel.

But the words directly relate to a sequel, a consumation, the result of something that is necessarily antecedent.

Overcoming is the result of effort, surmounting obstacles, subduing opposing forces. “Victory” implies conflict, war, not battles contemplated, but campaigns in process. Victory is the consummation of all this.

The heroism of overcoming is estimated by the potency of opposing forces. So the glory of victory is measured by the principles and powers involved in the conflict. “Who is he that overcometh but he that believeth that Jesus is the Son of God?”

While we study the problems of life, and the deep things of God, let us remember that secret things belong unto the Lord, but those things which are revealed belong unto us and our children forever. We may not presumptuously pry into questions beyond our capacity, yet we may—and to attain our best we must—investigate carefully, understand clearly and utilize thoroughly the “things which are revealed.”

“Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free.” One further prefatory suggestion. The direction, scope and method of our inquiries are plainly indexed for our guidance.

Would we know God? He is revealed, dimly, in His works; clearer, in His word; clearest and best in the divine incarnation, called “Jesus” in the text, in whom “dwelleth all the fulness of the Godhead bodily.” Would we know ourselves? Our education begins with intuition, is advanced by experience, and reaches a pivotal stage by intellectual development, with reason as a vaunting guide. These resources for knowledge are valuable in a limited

sphere, relating mainly to material things, and finite beings. But the best of man, and all of God, are spiritual, and if we would know both, and their relations, it must be by spiritual discernment.

This conclusion is logical, and scriptural as well. "The natural man receiveth not the things of the spirit of God, for they are foolishness unto Him, neither can He know them, because they are spiritually discerned." What we need is light, spiritual light, that we may discern spiritual things. Behold in the moral heavens "The sun of righteousness arise with healing in His wings." Hear Him, "I come, a light into the world." Hear of Him, "In Him was life and the life was the light of men."

Here is the "Emmanuel" of promise, God in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself. It is well that our spiritual vision be cleared, and our apprehension of divine things be quickened, for the conflict implied and the victory mentioned in the text are in and of this spiritual realm.

"For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities and powers * * * and against spiritual wickedness in high places."

Whence then this contention? What the conflicting forces? Where the arena? What interests are involved, and the sequel? With such an outline before us we shrink from an exhaustive canvass and shall not note separately and in order the several phases of the subject which blend together, but attempt only a summary, hoping that serious thought may be awakened and directed in fields of inquiry both pleasant and profitable.

As we begin our inquiries relative to human life and destiny we are confronted at the outset with environments which are incongruous, touching us at many points, and bearing upon us with varied effect.

We are alternately dazzled and dazed, pleased and offended; in the morning we bask in sunshine and mellow breezes; in the evening we are driven by fearful tempests and enveloped with horrible darkness. Today we live, tomorrow we die.

Forces which make up the sum of our environments are out of harmony, incompatible and antagonistic one to another. All this, more in moral than in material spheres, more inexplicable, more damaging. Here is the conflict. Truth is opposed to falsehood, and the essential nature of each renders agreement impossible. Where light is, darkness cannot be.

The whole may be summed up, Righteousness versus Sin. These truths are axiomatic. The argument is wasted. There is, at the bar of every inquisitor, the indubitable testimony of his own consciousness. Doubt and differ as we may about other things, this strife is a stupendous fact. It is a conflict of moral forces, the arena is the moral and spiritual realm, the dominion sought is the world, not the physical world, but the dominant reigning power and proprietor, Man, to whom the world is given as a home and heritage, with tenure well defined and conditional.

But some will say, "Did not God create all things, and pronounce everything good? Whence then cometh evil?" We should be careful not to raise this question as an insinuation, lest

we charge God foolishly and wickedly, in trying to excuse ourselves. Yet we may reverently seek to know ourselves, and our relations to righteousness under God's moral government.

We believe and are sure that God made everything that was made, and all was good. In making man good, and great in that goodness, so that he might live in honor, meriting approbation, it is clear that by an inexorable law of necessity he must be endowed with an attribute, in the use of which his actions will be the exponent of a moral quality. That attribute is "volition."

Here is the key to the situation. Man holds it because God gave it to him. With it and in its proper use man is good and great.

There can be no virtue in an act that is wholly mechanical. If fate alone impels, honor and moral responsibility cannot exist. The development of great endowments and the exercise of high prerogatives produce results correspondingly great. This is true alike for weal and for woe.

With the piety, purity and peace of our first parents in Eden there existed the possibility of all that has occurred, good and bad. God has created nothing since, but "let them have dominion;" and in the legitimate use of the things which the Lord made, good results follow, and in the abuse of the same good things, evil occurs, "working death * * * by that which is good."

Here, then is the origin of both righteousness and sin in the human heart, under conditions which render neither possible without the possibility of its opposite. Truth and righteousness, as to God, are eternal, and as unchangeable as His nature and attributes. But as to man or any finite creature, righteousness is not a creation, but a product—the result of a decision upon an option. Upon this decision hinges human destiny. "As righteousness tendeth to life, so he that pursueth evil pursueth it to his own death."

"By one man sin entered into the world and death by sin, and so death passed upon all men for that all have sinned." Sin is an individual transgression of the law of God; and the turpitude of the offense appears in the motive which prompts the act. In man's relation to the Divine government the whole case may be simply stated as "opposition of the will of the creature to the will of the Creator." Each offense is rebellion—treason—and therefore a capital offense. "The soul that sinneth it shall die."

With the introduction of sin cometh discord and strife. Indeed, "the carnal mind is enmity against God, for it is not subject to the law of God, neither, indeed, can be." So prevalent is this taint that it is said, "There is none that doeth good, no, not one." The whole world lieth in wickedness. "Taken captive by the devil at his will." "To whom ye yield yourselves servants to obey, his servants ye are to whom ye obey whether of sin unto death, or obedience unto righteousness."

(We cannot now diverge to inquire what part the tempter—Satan—had in the seduction of our first parents from loyalty. His fall was doubtless as ours—"kept not his first estate." We may as easily account for a devil as for a sinner, and about in the same way. Both are facts.)

We need not discuss these plain truths—but we would emphasize

them, that everyone may be deeply impressed that our relation to all that is comprehended in sin and salvation is direct and personal, that the hazard and the hope are as though no other beings were in the category.

To each it is said "Work out your own salvation." It is also said that "no man liveth to himself," and "One sinner destroyeth much good." On the other hand, those who are loyal are called to become "Co-workers together" with each other, and with the Champion of our text by whom cometh victory through faith. So the contention becomes common, world-wide in its range; and commensurate with the successive generations of mankind.

The arena is where the antagonistic forces meet, the moral world, in each human heart. Assin is personal, so is salvation.

People are born one by one, they sin one by one, they die one by one; and after this the judgment. "Everyone of us shall give account of himself to God." When Adam sinned God called him to account for his sin because it was his sin. When Cain sinned; God called him to account, and he was not accused of the sin of Adam—but the blood of Abel. Let us not waste our time and talent raving over the folly of Esau, the treachery of Judas or the murderous clamor of those who sought the destruction of their own—and the world's only Saviour. "Except ye repent ye shall all likewise perish."

Reviewing briefly, we conclude: First—that this great irrepressible conflict is a moral struggle in the spiritual realm, yet involving all intellectual and physical faculties and functions, which are, or may become, tributary to the formation of character and the working out of destiny. Second—That the campaign and conquest is in the world and for the world of mankind with all legitimate belongings and appurtenances. Third—That man himself holds the fort, each for himself, and elects his destiny whether of "sin unto death," or "of righteousness unto life eternal." The sequel is a prophecy and a promise of victory through faith, and that faith is defined both as to its character and object. "Who is he that overcometh the world; but he that believeth that Jesus is the son of God?"

Faith comprehends much. Like food, it embraces everything in one important line of human necessity. Without food the individual cannot live and utilize the various functions of body, mind and soul. Without faith society cannot live. Fraternity, with its unmeasured possibilities, has no place or power; and practically the world without faith would be as though it contained but one inhabitant; and he an imbecile. So, in our relations to God. "Without Faith it is impossible to please Him," and he that cometh to God must believe." Is the inquiry raised, what is this Faith and what its object? Sublime, and simple as sublime, difficult to describe, because so simple. All-pervading as the sunshine, we feel its warmth but it eludes our touch. A powerful factor in every form of human activity and enjoyment, yet the only evidence of its existence is itself.

Subtle as its counterpart in the material realm, it draws, and holds together elements which may affiliate. It is "attraction" and "cohesion." It is an endowment, innate. Its first and perhaps its

best exercise is intuitive. In the animal we call it instinct, and in them, it begins and ends with that. But with the human it is broadened by intelligence directed by volition and becomes an inspiration. Here is the pivot on which destiny turns.

Abraham believed God, was justified, became and remained the friend of God. Lot chose him all the plain of Jordan and "pitched his tent towards Sodom."

Moses, with all that this world can give in easy reach through worldly alliance, refused to continue that alliance, choosing the heritage of the people of God, "for he had respect to the recompense of reward." Esau sold his birthright for a mess of pottage.

The governing attribute; choice, was the same in each case, with no coercion; but the pressure of motive turned the scale and faith furnished the incentive. How pertinent the charge, "have faith in God;" and its supplement, "ye believe in God, believe also in me." Supreme faith in anything else or less than the Infinite, brings us into an Alliance with that which is inferior to ourselves, and therefore weakens and degrades.

To believe in God, to take hold of the immutable with mind and soul, is to secure an anchorage "sure and steadfast." Wonderful transition! Marvelous and merciful alliance! Victory! victory by faith in Christ. "As many as received him to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on his name." Victory by force, even if possible, would destroy the prize. But to win by the influence of noble incentive, inducing a choice for the right, is to enhance the value and exalt the excellence of both victor and vanquished. In such a case; enmity is destroyed and a transformation follows which brings in a willing, happy captive. Paradox indeed! The victory is over self, resisting evil and opening the door of the heart to all good. "That they may recover themselves from the snare of the devil." "He that ruleth his own spirit is better than he that taketh a city." The stream of evil disappears, because the fountain is purified, and all that God has made is subordinated to good. The victory is complete, the gain is total. "For all things are yours, and ye are Christ's, and Christ is God's." "Thanks be to God which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

We repeat what we said in the beginning—the text is of special interest to those who are of God's Militant host.

Brethren, we are of that honored company "Called to be saints." Called also to be Apostles, Ministers, Servants of God, wholly given up to the work of the Lord, commissioned ambassadors for Christ. In that capacity we are here assembled. This day is review day with us as a Conference. You are pleased to make it monumental, marking the fiftieth milestone in our Conference life. Technically, this is correct, as it is just a half century since we were organized into a Conference under our present name. But if we were celebrating the beginning of organized Methodism in Illinois, which for many years had its home, and made its history, in the territory now embraced in our conference; it should have been a *centennial* occasion, and should have occurred about two years ago, and in connection with the 20th Century Memorial program.

(This, in fidelity to facts, and in equity to heroic pioneers.)

I feel authorized, therefore, to bear to you the Greeting of Methodists and Methodist preachers in Illinois of the entire century just closed. It was my privilege to be personally and intimately acquainted with many of those pioneers. Their prayers, their songs of praise, their shouts of triumph, were channels of blessed benediction to my young life in the "long ago," and the mystic echoes linger with marvelous clearness in my heart of hearts, while I extend to you this fraternal message as from the departed, who, though "being dead, yet speaketh." They labored; "and ye are entered in to their labors." They triumphed by grace, through faith. That grace is vouchsafed unto us on the same terms. May I "exhort you that ye should earnestly contend for *the faith* which was once delivered to the saints."

But our review to-day is more especially of the past five decades, and from the title page of our first annual Conference Minutes we read record and inscription as follows:

"THE FIRST SESSION
of the
SOUTHERN ILLINOIS CONFERENCE
of the
METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Commenced in the city of Belleville, Illinois, on Wednesday, October 27th, 1852, at 8 o'clock A. M., Bishop Edward R. Ames presiding. James Leaton was elected Secretary and Vincent Ridgely Assistant Secretary.

The usual religious services were held at the opening and close of each session.

The business of the Conference was transacted with unusual harmony and despatch and the conference closed on Saturday, October 30th, at 9 o'clock P. M., after a session of only four days."

A few outline notes will help you to appreciate, in a measure, the changes that have occurred since our genesis as a conference.

At that first session five Presiding Elders reported 48 Pastors with their charges. The aggregate membership was 14,948, probationers, 2558, local preachers, 239, Sunday Schools, 184, churches 117, Parsonages, 28. Pastoral support is indicated by the following: The five presiding Elders reported the sum of their receipts for the year at \$2097, an average of about \$420 each. The receipts of preachers averaged less than \$300. At that Conference fifteen charges were placed on the mission list and \$1675 appropriation was divided among them from the general missionary treasury. We entered our first year with the same number of districts and with fifty-seven pastoral charges and a preacher for each. Of these pastors, twenty-six were on trial, ten in the first year and sixteen in the second. The Presiding Elders were—Alton District, W. W. Mitchell; Lebanon District, James B. Corrington; Jonesboro District, E. Joy; Mt. Vernon District, J. I. Richardson; Mt. Carmel District, Norman Allyn.

It is proper to state, as an interesting fact, that the faculty of McKendree College, consisting of a president and three professors, reported their work and their receipts, as other preachers; they

having rendered their services under the plan and conditions for ministerial support. The receipts on salary for the year were \$600 for the president, and \$500 for each of the professors.

The "Itinerancy" meant much in those days. Entering the Conference was joining the "traveling connection." In representing young men for admission it was common for the Presiding Elders to speak of their qualifications, and reach a climax in the elastic remark, "He travels very acceptably"—and there was more in it than mere humor. Traveling and moving were by horse power. There were more byways than highways, both were bad—take which you would, "before you got there, you would wish you had taken the other." Annual conferences were, to most of us, a long way off and but one railroad in the state, a little, crude affair from the Illinois river to Springfield, and back the next day, perhaps.

At the close of our first year we reported at Mt. Carmel, Oct. 26-30, 1853. To be there in time for examinations, we who were probationers, and in the course, must start from Alton on Thursday the week preceding, and journey the entire width of the state, arriving at Mt. Carmel on Saturday P. M., having fallen in with others by the way until our procession was imposing—all by horse. We were met on the street by the pastor, Rev. Wm. Cliffe, of blessed memory, and promptly assigned to places of entertainment, ours being with C. O. B. Goforth, in whose pleasant and hospitable home we met a warm welcome and a royal reception. Bro. Goforth knew how to provide what we young preachers needed and wanted, and accordingly showed us, first the stable, the watering trough, the corn crib, the hay loft, and handing us a bright new curry comb, with brush to match, he gave us the edifying assurance that "if our horses were not taken care of, it would not be his fault."

Next day—Sunday—we attended the dedication of the church by Rev. John Van Cleve, afterwards D. D. That was an honored edifice. Its first great occasion was our annual Conference, its last benefaction, with its beloved congregation, was to entertain us as a Conference three years ago. On Monday and Tuesday the classes were examined and on Wednesday the Conference opened with Bishop Levi Scott presiding. On the Monday following the conference adjourned and those well-kept horses were started westward—homeward. After an absence of two full busy, happy weeks we arrived at the little mission parsonage in Middle Alton, not to stay, or even rest, but to pack up, and load up, and go back almost over the same road to Walnut Hill circuit—east of where *Centralia now is*—and the work near Mt. Vernon. Here we found a place to drive a stake. After crossing the state two and a half times, we are ready to *begin to "travel"* one of the best circuits in the Conference.

I give this not as an extreme case, but rather as a sample. It shows, perhaps, rather a minimum of hardship, and a maximum of blessings. But you can see a little of the difference between then and now. Don't mistake by supposing that all this time, toil and travel were lost. Far from it. We spent very little money—had but little. Some good stewards or brethren at one end of the route would furnish teams to move us; Methodist farmers and other friends on the way would cheerfully feed and shelter us. We would

sometimes preach, and always pray in their homes. Frequently they would arrange campmeetings so as to catch the preachers as they passed to and from Conference. Thus we were in work, and worship, always and everywhere.

Many thoughtful people of to-day, wonder how it was possible to plant churches and furnish pastoral service and oversight over such large districts of country with so few ordained ministers, and such crude methods of communication for expansive work. The explanation is found in the unparalleled adaptation of our Church Polity to existing conditions. The elastic, yet strong connectional features are seen in our itinerancy, in our local preachers, and in our class leaders. The figures I gave of our first Conference showed 58 pastors, 239 local preachers, and doubtless as many class leaders. So that while the pastor or preacher in charge could not be present oftener than once in two, or four weeks, yet these local preachers filled appointments in the intervals and the class leaders met the membership weekly for religious inquiry, exhortations and prayer. "Methodism" may mean more, but it surely does not mean less than *method in work*. Conditions change—modifications are necessary. But let us not forget, that in order to the best results the whole church must be trained to methodic consecrated activity. I say *consecrated* activity, for our phenomenal development in intelligence, wealth and power will only be a blessing to us and the world, when all are employed for the promotion of righteousness. We teach, that, with ability and opportunity, there comes corresponding obligation, and according to our fidelity in the use and improvement of what is given, will be results now, and rewards hereafter.

The band of charter members of this Conference was not large. Less than half a hundred answered first roll-call. All who were then the "Fathers" have long since entered into rest, and of those who were then the "boys," but four remain. Three of these are waiting in retirement for their discharge. But they wait in patient hope and blessed expectation. You hear cheering words from them annually. To you and (more) to me, they are Brethren beloved. T. A. Eaton, G. W. Waggoner and Hiram Sears are with us to-day in love and sympathy. Though absent in body, and I only of the remaining quartette am permitted to stand with you in person, yet I take no questionable liberty when I unite the greeting of the four, in the voice of one. I can almost hear our senior, the saintly Eaton say, "God bless the Brethren of the Southern Illinois Conference," and there comes from all our hearts, a sincere—Amen.

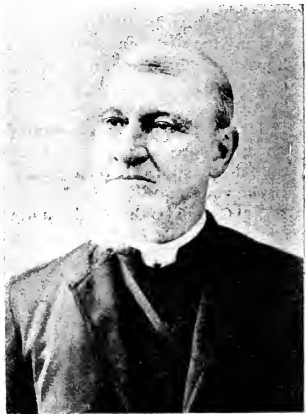

RECORD OF MEMBERS OF THE CONFERENCE.

The following is believed to be a complete record of all that it aims to set forth concerning every man who has ever been a member of the Southern Illinois Conference. It is intended to show how each member was received, what disposition was made of those whose names are not now on the conference roll, the various appointments and relations held by each during his connection with the Southern Illinois Conference, and the relation now held by each of the present members of the Conference. The names of the original members, including all those who had been admitted on trial previous to the organization of the Conference, are printed in large capitals, while those who were admitted at that session are in small capitals. The General Conference of 1856, placed the German work in the Illinois, Iowa and Missouri Conferences, in the Southern Illinois Conference. This went into effect in 1857. In 1864 this work was placed in the Southwest German Conference. These changes have been expressed by the term transferred making it appear as if there was a great influx from the Illinois Conference in 1857, and a great exodus to the Southwest German Conference in 1864. All the names and appointments connected with the German work are printed in italics, so as to be easily distinguishable. I wish to acknowledge my indebtedness to the compilation made by Rev. E. A. Hoyt in 1884.

PERIOD I—1793-1811.

The object in view is to give, in outline, a history of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Southern Illinois—its planting, growth and present condition. Our range, as to time, exceeds a century—from 1793 to 1902; as to field of operations, it includes nearly one-third of the noble state of Illinois. This field is the river-bound section of the state, south of an east and west line, grazing Litchfield and Effingham, with the Wabash on the east, the Ohio on the south, and the Mississippi and Illinois on the west.

Although French traders, voyageurs and even settlers, had been in Illinois from the time of LaSalle's exploration in 1683, and had built forts and trading stations at various points, as Peoria, Kaskaskia and Cahokia, yet there was no ingress of English-speaking people until near the close of the eighteenth century. The earliest immigration of this class of settlers was chiefly from Virginia in 1781, two or three years subsequent to the conquest of Illinois from the British, by Colonel Clark. Several of these settlers had followed the standard of the intrepid colonel, as volunteers, through forest and flood, from Kaskaskia to Vincennes. The location chosen by them for settle-

ment was in what is now Monroe county, a few miles southwest of Waterloo. But, eager to possess the rich, virgin soil, they soon pushed their settlements toward the north, through St. Clair and Madison counties, reaching, within a short time, the present sites of Quincy, Jacksonville and Springfield.

The religious element of these pioneers, in so far as such element had an existence, was chiefly Baptist. They were zealous, however, not only as Baptists, but as Christians. They did much toward the evangelization of the early settlers. Among their converts was Captain Joseph Ogle, who soon became a Methodist, the first representative of that denomination in the territory. It was not long until he was made a class-leader. This was in 1793, while his home was near the site of the present town of O'Fallon. He was good material for the sub-pastorate, being "scrupulously honest, punctual and strict in the performance of all his engagements." He was appointed to his position by Rev. Joseph Lillard, the first Methodist preacher who visited the new country, and who, according to some authorities, organized the first Methodist church in Illinois, at New Design, in 1793. This pioneer evangelist had been a traveling preacher in Kentucky, but now sustained a local relation. He was regarded as a "good man, and truly pious, though somewhat eccentric."

After a lapse of four or five years he was succeeded by Rev. John Clark, "a very conscientious, devout man," who traveled his circuit afoot, because his Savior had walked on His preaching tours in Galilee and Judea. Hosea Riggs, a local preacher from Pennsylvania, took up his residence in St. Clair county, near the close of the century, and seeing the need of religious work, reorganized the class that had been placed under the watch-care of Capt. Ogle, and formed another at Goshen, near Edwardsville. Zealous and enterprising as a Christian worker, he, while doing all within his own power toward building up the Church, felt that in order to the realization of success he must obtain helpers from abroad. With this end in view he visited, in 1803, the Western Conference at Mt. Gerizim, Ky., and secured the appointment of Benjamin Young as missionary to Illinois. This appointment was the first formal recognition of the growing work by the authorities of the Church. As nearly as can be determined, the circuit which this lone itinerant formed extended from near the mouth of the Kaskaskia to Wood river, near Alton, embracing five principal appointments—Kaskaskia, New Design, Shiloh, Goshen and Wood River—these strung along a nearly one-hundred-mile stretch of newly settled lands bordering the Mississippi. But the intrepid missionary, who, in journeying across the wilderness to reach his field of work, had faced the fierce Kickapoo Indians and recovered from them his stolen horse, was equal to the demands of the situation in traversing this extended circuit, and in confronting prevalent wickedness among the godless pioneers. He reported at the end of his year sixty-seven members, among them Rev. Thomas Harrison, who was for many years, in Belleville and vicinity, a useful worker in the Church.

Joseph Oglesby succeeded to the charge of Illinois circuit in 1804. The Lord blessed his labors to such extent that he was

enabled to report to Conference 120 members, a number almost double that of the preceding year.

Under his successor, Charles Matheny, in 1805, the Methodists built, at Goshen, near Edwardsville, their first house of worship in Illinois. It was a humble structure of logs, with puncheon floor and seats. The second was built at Shiloh, six miles northeast of Belleville, in 1807, under the leadership of Rev. Jesse Walker. This noted preacher was a Virginian, a man of deep conviction, "a student of the Bible and of human nature," one possessed of remarkable powers of endurance, who could go for days without food, could sleep in the forest and travel without roads, and who withal was hopeful, courageous and pious. Such was the man in charge of the Illinois circuit in 1807. To his regular work, which was full of exactions, he added the holding of three camp meetings during the summer, two at Goshen, one at Shiloh. At two of these he was favored with the presence of his presiding elder, Rev. William McKendree, afterward a bishop, who preached with remarkable power, stilling a threatening mob and leading to the conversion of many sinners.

Succeeded by John Clingan in 1807, Walker was reappointed to the circuit the next year. Abraham Amos, "a large, muscular man, vehement in voice and gesture," and who "sometimes while preaching brought his fist down with such violence as to split the book-board"—if there happened to be one—was in charge in 1890, and was followed by Daniel Fraley, "who organized the first society at Union Grove," near Summerfield, St. Clair county, a point that afterward became somewhat noted as the seat of the first session of the Illinois Conference. In 1811 Walker was again in charge of this circuit, with George A. Colbert as colleague. With an increase during the year of 135 members, there was now an enrollment of 767 Methodists in the Illinois and Cash River circuits, the latter charge having been recently organized in the extreme southern part of the settled territory.

The first settlements were almost invariably located along the courses of the Ohio and Mississippi rivers and of their affluents, as the Wabash, Little Wabash, Kaskaskia, Cash and other streams. About this time new points, as Shawneetown, Salt Works, New Haven, Bigbay, Fort Massac and Greenville appeared on the itinerant's map. Under the supervision of such far-seeing, dauntless presiding elders as McKendree and Parker, the circuit preachers, who went everywhere preaching the word with all boldness, were instrumental in the conversion of many of the pioneers.

The service they rendered was one that tried to the extreme their courage, endurance and faith, The people—many of them were rude and vicious—gambling, counterfeiting and horse stealing being common sins—the country new and unimproved, the roads ungraded, pathways through forests and swamps, the streams unbridged and in many places unfordable; the prairies overgrown in summer with a tangle of vegetation that sometimes overtopped the traveler, and that, besides hindering, almost smothered him, harboring stinging insects, that feasted, to the injury, frequently, to the

death of his horse. The swamps abounded with mosquitoes that in their season rendered life almost unendurable; the clearings were but patches of corn, potatoes and pumpkins surrounding the cabins of the settlers, while the cabins were small, rude in structure, often consisting each of only a single room, which served as sitting-room, bed-room, parlor, kitchen and workshop, except in cases in which the enterprising occupants had built an added room, or pushed the walls high enough to permit of an unlighted and unwarmed garret.

The people were extremely poor, having no money, some of them not seeing nor handling a dollar from one year's end to that of another. They had but little furniture in their homes, and but few implements, or contrivances for agricultural or mechanical work. For years they lacked ploughs adapted to the breaking up of the prairies. They hunted, fished and toiled at a disadvantage for a precarious livelihood. If, at any time, they were favored with crops beyond their immediate necessities, they could, with difficulty, make profitable disposition of the surplus, since there was no market within reach, and scarcely any facilities for transportation to distant points. Their only trading mart was New Orleans, a thousand miles away to the south, to be reached only after a laborious and hazardous river voyage, during the making of which they were subject to the dangers of navigation, the dread influence of a malarious climate and, upon their return, to the repeated attacks of bands of free-booters and marauders.

The itinerants preached to these people in their cabins—since of churches there were almost none—preached to them without money and without price, often receiving no earthly reward other than the rude but willing hospitality of their interested hearers.

In mild weather, cabin preaching was supplemented by two-days' meetings, held in the groves; also by camp-meetings. The attendance at the camp-meeting was sometimes, strange as it may seem, in view of the sparse population, counted by the thousand, as the people, hungry for fellowship as well as for the gospel, repaired to the meeting from points thirty or forty miles distant. In the conduct of these assemblies the preachers bore not only the heavy strain of earnest, persistent pulpit and altar work toward saving men, but oftentimes, in addition, the abuse and bitter persecution of hardened sinners who, smarting under the reproofs of the pulpit, would interrupt the services, waylay the preachers and maltreat them and their horses. To the credit of these faithful men of God, be it placed upon record, that they boldly faced their resentful foes, rebuked wrong-doing in its every phase and, so far from making any display of the white feather, wore in distinction from the common dress *broad-brimmed* hats and *straight-breasted* coats—a sort of preacher's uniform—by which, wherever they went, they were easily recognized.

The itinerants, frequently absent from home weeks, even months, at a time, traveling their long rounds from appointment to appointment, often unable to find lodging, sleeping in the forest, exposed to the chilling damps, the attacks of wild beasts and, in some cases, of wilder men, had a constant experience of the undesirable.

Their self-denying service gained no plaudits from the world-at-large, opened no avenues to wealth or preferment, exhibited no glare of earthly good to the devoted itinerant. What wonder then that, as the conference year was closing, the weary worker, with no material reward, other than the little, disciplinary pittance allowed and oftentimes with but a part of that—would resolve to locate, hoping that thus, while still preaching to his neighbors, he could, in some measure enjoy the rest and comfort of home. Wending his way on horseback to Conference a hundred, or even two or three hundred miles distant, he there met his brethren, who had toiled and suffered in like manner and measure with himself, and some of whom had, for reasons similar to his own purposed withdrawal from the work; but who, when under the uplifting influence of Christian fellowship, of brotherly greetings and recitals of trials and triumphs, as they entered upon the duties of the annual session, singing their opening hymn—

“And are we yet alive
And see each other's face?
Glory and praise to Jesus give,
For His redeeming grace,”—

they caught again the spirit of their mission, so that by the time they reached the last stanza—

“Let us take up the cross
Till we the crown obtain;
And gladly reckon all things loss,
So we may Jesus gain,”—

they had lost sight of their discouragements and counted their trials as but light afflictions that would work, if borne in the right spirit, to their spiritual uplifting. The hour for adjournment having come, they gladly received their appointments for the ensuing year, and with freshened zeal hastened to their allotted fields of labor.

It is not strange that some, in view of the hardness of their lot, fainted by the wayside; but it is strange, it is almost the miracle of the age, that, as a body, they held on their course, until worn out with labor and exposure, flesh and blood could no longer endure the strain.

To these self-denying itinerants of a century ago the church of Jesus Christ, in all its branches, in this country and in this century, is under lasting obligation. Surely the people called Methodists will not be forgetful of those pioneers who, taking their lives in their hands, breasted the tides of wickedness and saved to our country from utter godlessness and viciousness some of its fairest states, and to the Church a promising field for the employment of its consecrated energies in the work of saving souls.

PERIOD II.—1812-1823.

The Western Conference, which at the beginning of the nineteenth century embraced all our national territory west of the Alleghanies and north of Georgia, was divided in 1812 into two Conferences, the Ohio and Tennessee. The latter included the southern half of Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississippi, Missouri, Indiana and Illinois. In

this reduced range, ample as it seems to us, the itinerants had more of the home feeling than formerly, although to some of them it was still a two or three hundred mile horseback ride to Conference. Four years later their extended field was still farther reduced, when the western part of the Tennessee Conference was detached and formed into the Missouri Conference. This included Missouri, Illinois and the western half of Indiana.

While, in the period just reviewed, every session of the Annual Conference had been held outside the Illinois territory, in this, four of the yearly gatherings convened within its bounds; two—those of 1816 and 1820—at Shiloh, and two—those of 1817 and 1818—at Goshen.

At the beginning of the present period one district included all the circuits in Illinois. Among the new points marked on the enlarging map of the traveling preacher were Mt. Carmel, Mt. Vernon, Brownsville, Columbia, Cave-in-Rock, Carmi, Alton and Sharon. These places were not, at the time under review, separate stations, but the heads of large circuits and were, in process of time, in most instances, detached and formed into independent charges. For several years following 1812 there was but little increase in membership. This lack of growth was chargeable, no doubt, to the disturbed condition of the country, as the war of 1812 was in progress, and the Indians, being in the main allies of Great Britain, were active in their hostilities. Not until 1818 was there an encouraging increase reported. This was 332 over the enumeration of the preceding year. The charges were now five in number—Illinois and Shoal Creek, Okaw, Cash River, Bigbay and Wabash. The aggregate membership was 1,452, and the active ministerial force eight, with a goodly contingent of local preachers and exhorters.

Politically this was an interesting epoch. The population of the territory having reached, as it was claimed, 40,000, Illinois was in 1818 admitted to statehood, with Vandalia as its capital. The increase of inhabitants was largely due to the pacified condition of the country, the war of 1812 having secured us the possession of New Orleans and the Gulf coast, thus giving assurance of profitable trade, and the Indians having buried the hatchet, affording promise of safety to the settlers. Not only these, but the Kickapoos, the leading hostiles of Illinois, had sold their 10,000,000 acres of choice land in the central portion of the State, thereby opening to settlement a district both rich and extensive. Thus, with an enlarged area for settlement, an increased immigration, and *statehood*—the highest ideal of new territorial communities—all things betokened prosperity. Methodism, having contributed to the advance, enjoyed, of right, the outlook.

Among the leading preachers of this era we find Jesse Walker still holding a prominent place on the Conference list, and giving proof of his rightful claim to eminence by his untiring devotion to the work of the Lord. Samuel H. Thompson greets us, a man zealous, courteous, sympathetic, liberal; one who for thirty years bore aloft the banner of the Cross, traveling for a term through cold and heat, a district covering two-thirds of the state; an officer of the

Church, excelling in administration and breathing the spirit of peace and good will. On his death bed, having preached a sermon of great power, one that led to many awakenings, to a congregation assembled at his own request, he closed the service—closed, indeed, his whole *life* service—by saying: “My work is done and I am ready to go at my Master’s bidding.”

William Beauchamp, in early life a traveling preacher in the East, had come to Illinois as agent of the Methodist colony that in 1818 settled at Mt. Carmel. Absorbed in his work as surveyor and director of the company’s lands, he still found time and heart to labor for the spiritual welfare of the colonists, teaching the youth, preaching the gospel and organizing a church society. Versed in theology, abounding in labors and full of the Christian spirit, at the same time eloquent and persuasive, he was everywhere welcomed as a herald of the gospel.

Jesse Haile “had no compromise to make with sin in any form.” He preached boldly against slavery at a time when, by many, it was deemed politic to make only guarded utterances in denunciation of “the sum of all villianies.”

Josiah Patterson has the unique distinction of being the first itinerant whose life-long ministry was wholly confined to the limits of Illinois. He was a man of faith and prayer, and was instrumental in the conversion of many souls.

John Dew attracts attention as a superior man, who, after doing good work for nearly thirty years as preacher, presiding elder and college president, was laid to rest in 1840, in a humble grave at Summerfield, where, in an open field, his ashes still repose.

But as time failed the Apostle to recount the deeds of the Hebrew worthies, so space fails us for the reproduction of the list of the flaming evangelists of the early years of Illinois Methodism. As specimens of them we refer to John Scripps, Hackaliah Vredenburg, Oreenath Fisher and Jacob Whitesides, men who gave proof of their Divine call to the ministry by their zeal, their spirituality and their personal sacrifices.

Of prominent local workers there was a goodly number: John Moore, of the vicinity of Waterloo, who built a large brick house, devoting its principal room, without charge, to be used as long as it was wanted as a regular preaching place; Samuel Mitchell, of Belleville, who, faithful to his call as a laborer in the Lord’s vineyard, besides left two sons, John T. and James, to become prominent itinerants; Zadoc Casey, of Mt. Vernon, a natural orator, who was prominent for forty years, not only as a local preacher, but also as lieutenant-governor of the state, and as member of the legislature and of congress; Nathaniel Pinckard, of Alton, who, in his earlier years had been a missionary in the island of Jamaica; Bennett Maxey, his neighbor, who, as a good yoke-fellow, worked with him, filling alternately the same appointments; John D. Gilham, of Jersey county, whose efforts were directed to the building up of a flourishing society in his own neighborhood; William Padon, of Sharon, for many years a diligent steward of the grace of God, and Nathan Scarritt, near Alton, who, having selected a site on the prairie for his home, before beginning the work of erection, knelt

in prayer, invoking God's blessing upon the enterprise, and who sent out from that consecrated home two sons, Nathan and Jothan A., to the ministry, the latter of whom, in well preserved age, we still have with us in the Conference work.

PERIOD III.—1824-1851.

By the General Conference of 1824, the Missouri Conference was divided into two sections, the Mississippi River being the dividing line. The western portion retained the name, while the eastern, which was now extended, to include with Illinois the entire State of Indiana, was termed the Illinois Conference. This domain, embracing two large growing States, was subsequently extended to include parts of Wisconsin and Iowa, as fast as settlements were made in these territories.

The two Conferences held a joint session in 1824, at Padfield's, or Union Grove, four miles southeast of Lebanon. Three bishops favored this dual session with their presence—Roberts, who presided, McKendree and Soule.

The main order of business was transacted in the usual line, only the allotments of Conference funds and the appointments of the preachers being separately made.

The work within the Illinois Conference was organized into three districts, two of these being in Indiana and one in Illinois. A single charge—Vermillion—in the latter State, was, on the ground of convenience, put into one of the Indiana districts.

The Illinois district was composed of nine circuits—Mt. Carmel, Wabash, Cash River, Mt. Vernon, Kaskaskia, Illinois, Mississippi, Sangamon and Shoal Creek. A glance at the map will reveal the fact, judging from the localities named, that these circuits might be so extended and shaped as to include the entire territory of the Southern Illinois Conference, as afterward constituted, and besides, a section of three or four counties to the north, now a part of the territory of the Illinois Conference.

In the earlier part of this period new names appear on the Conference list, as Alton, Lebanon, Belleville, Lawrenceville, Palestine, Carlyle, Maysville, McLeansboro, Edwardsville, Nashville, Upper Alton, Staunton, Jonesboro and Vandalia.

The entire membership reported in 1824 was 3,732—an increase of 500 in one year. The greater number of these, probably four-fifths, were within our present Conference bounds, but exactly how many cannot now be determined.

The preponderance in our favor was soon overcome in consequence of the more rapid settlement of the territory to the north of our bounds, the fertile lands laid open by the removal of the Indians, these receiving not only the immigration from abroad, but even drawing many settlers from the southern part of the State.

The Conference roll, composed in good part of names already mentioned, was greatly lengthened by the additions made from year to year. Some of the more prominent of these were: Peter Cartwright, Peter Akers, Charles M. Holliday, Edward R. Ames, Richard Hargrave, George Locke, Asahel L. Phelps, William L. Deneen, Stith M. Otwell, Alfred W. Arrington, Wilson Pitner,

Simeon Walker, James B. Woolard, John VanCleve, George W. Robbins, James B. Corrington, Hooper Crews, John Thatcher, Ephraim Joy, John H. Hill, John T. Mitchell, Erastus Wentworth, Thomas A. Eaton, Jotham A. Scarritt, Hiram Sears, Levi C. English, James Leaton, John S. Barger, Norman Allyn, William Cliffe, Thomas Randle, George W. Waggoner.

Long as the list is, it would be greatly extended if made to include all deserving of mention. Our limits forbid even the briefest individual characterization of this list of worthies, which for a quarter of a century furnished many of the delegates to General Conference; also most of the presiding elders, some of whom served almost continuously on the districts. Edward R. Ames was elevated to the episcopacy, Charles M. Holliday and John T. Mitchell to the book agency, Peter Akers and Erastus Wentworth to the college presidency. A. W. Arrington was a prodigy of eloquence, Wilson Pitner a bundle of eccentricities, while the others, the most of them at least, were well-balanced, earnest, capable men.

That we may have just conception of the spirit of these men and of those associated with them, let us take seats in the Conference room while they are in session. We find ourselves in the company of half a hundred or more plain men, plain spoken and plainly dressed. Their singing swells to the roof in ringing notes of heartfelt praise; their fervent prayers betoken the wrestling of the suppliants with God. They sit with closed doors during the time devoted to the examination of character, one of their number serving as door-keeper. This exclusion of the public is justified, if not rendered necessary, by reason of the strictness of the investigation. Instead of the "Nothing against him,"—that in these later years we hear promptly offered in response to the question of passing a brother's character on the mere mention of his name, pronounced sometimes even in the plural with reference to all the preachers of a district, or of a class, at once, a sort of wholesale indorsement that reminds us of Franklin's suggestion to his father, when salting down a barrel of meat for winter use, that it would be a great saving of time to say grace over it all at once,—there is close inquisition made into the habits, disposition, ministerial conduct, rulings and teachings of each member of the Conference. If any one has left his charge, neglected filling his appointments, unduly mixed himself with politics, or stood for civil office, has failed to render prompt and full statement of his receipts, or has heedlessly incurred debt; has used disrespectful language to his brethren, or acted in a manner unbecoming his calling; has preached strange doctrines or encouraged those who did,—he is subject to interrogation, reproof or formal trial, before being taken out of the glare of the Conference search-light. Sometimes members are questioned as to their opinions, as to the abolition of slavery, or as to affiliation with abolition societies. A speculative preacher is admonished by vote not to agitate the subject of the sufferings of the Divine nature of Christ, while others are rebuked because of their supposed leanings toward Pelagianism, or other shade ing heretical belief. A member whose name was called before reported as guilty of immoral conduct, committed after

his arrival at the seat of Conference, was subjected to immediate trial in the presence of the whole body. Witnesses were called in, and their testimony given. Upon the evidence he was found guilty, and expelled,—all this at a single sitting.

Not always is the action of a somber hue. A brother of another church is permitted, at his own request, to address the Conference in the interest of an interdenominational agency, it being understood that he wished to urge its substitution for one the Church had instituted. While courteously granting his request, a brother was selected to voice the sentiment of the Conference in answer to the appeal. In his rejoinder, this brother pursued such a judicious line of remark, that he received the thanks of the body, both for what he had said and for what he had refrained from saying.

Men who were willing to subject themselves to such scrutiny as we have witnessed and to receive reproof for what was wrong in their spirit, conduct or teaching, could be relied upon to demand right action on the part of others. Without dissent, they condemned the dance, gaming, theater-going, horse-racing, dram-drinking, Sabbath desecration, criminal bankruptcy, and other forms of prevalent iniquity. But while reproving the sin wherever found, and by whomever committed, even if by one of their own number, they sought by all means to save the sinner.

Having thus inhaled the atmosphere of the Conference room, it may be well to take a view of their out-door field of work. Their charges are ordinarily of great extent, a single circuit sometimes embracing three or four counties. Preaching appointments in lieu of accessibility are strung around these, often to the number of twenty or thirty. At each of these in order the itinerant delivers his gospel message, closing the service with a class meeting. To this work he devotes every day of the week as well as Sunday—unless one be reserved for rest—until having completed his round he reaches home, and devotes a little time—two or three days, it may be—to the care of his family. His rest consists, not in inaction, but in change of work. Sometimes his field is the mission instead of the well-organized circuit. This is likely to be of greater extent, more sparsely settled and counting fewer religious people than the circuit. The number of missions varied from four or five—Grand Prairie, Jonesboro, Golconda, Brownsville and Macoupin, in the thirties, to twelve or fifteen some years later. As the preacher in charge of a mission had but little assurance of support from those to whom he ministered, a small payment from the funds of the treasury of the then infant Missionary Society was made to him. This, in some cases, was supplemented by contributions from the hard-worked and ill-paid circuit preachers who, while having a very slender support themselves, were willing to share the little they had with a brother in worse financial condition.

All these years there was growth in numbers. From 1824 to 1831 the increase was 7,105, the entire membership the latter year being 10,346. By 1841 the reported increase was 17,242, the number in society, as the phrase ran, being 27,588, together with 453

local preachers. Much of this increase was in territory beyond the limits of Southern Illinois.

Trying as were the conditions under which their ordinary work was carried on, the itinerants were sometimes brought face to face with rampant forces of evil that for a time threatened the general welfare. One of these was slavery propagandism. While Illinois had been admitted as a free state, and forming as it did a part of the Northwestern Territory, which, by the Ordinance of 1787, had been forever consecrated to freedom, could not have gained admission on any other basis, still there was, in defiance of this solemn compact, a concerted movement to effect by constitutional amendment the legalization of slavery. This movement, adroitly engineered by leading politicians, culminated in 1824, when it was ordered that a vote be taken on the proposed amendment. As the majority of the people were of southern birth and training, and, as many favored the legalization of slavery, or were indifferent with regard to the question, there was serious ground for apprehension of the success of the movement. The Methodists, as a body, were opposed to slavery, many of them having emigrated from slave states in order to be free from its blighting influence. Its preachers being men of enlightened views and philanthropic impulses, and in some cases having had in their own families experience of the curse of slavery, were, almost to a man, opposed to its legalization. Their general acquaintance with the people of the new State, their habit of public speaking and their high standard of morals fitted them well for the demands of leadership. Some of them entered heartily into the canvass. Cartwright, especially, rendered heroic service, leading at various points the friends of freedom to victory at the polls. The struggle ended in the overwhelming defeat of the proposed constitutional amendment.

The perplexities of the growing Church were not all of external origin. The Protestant Methodist or *Radical* movement, as it was commonly designated, organized in 1830, threatened throughout the connection the loss of many members; in some localities even the disintegration of the Church. The contention of the Radicals was for lay representation in the councils of the Church, and for a non-episcopal government, to be administered by a president elected for a specified term, instead of by a bishop, ordained for life service. The republican dress of the proposed reforms commended them to many Methodists who believed in government by the people. On the other hand, the recognized efficiency of the Methodist Episcopal economy, and the feeling on the part of many members of the Church that in due time all crooked things would be made straight—all needed reforms effected within its ranks—held the great body of the membership to their ecclesiastical moorings. The storm passed over without causing a violent disruption, or even a large defection of members; only a handful of seceding churches being organized within our bounds.

All these years private houses were in general use as preaching places. These were in time succeeded in communities in which public sentiment was favorable, by the use of district school houses

as chapels, in which all denominations shared. Only in a few places, and these chiefly in the larger towns, had churches been erected. Under the improved condition of society that we have now reached, the church building became a necessity. Not unfrequently in the country places and villages these first structures were of logs, a land owner donating the site and sometimes the material, while his neighbors came together and upreared the sanctuary. *In a community more wealthy, liberal or enterprising, the frame or brick building, but usually devoid of architectural pretensions and destitute of ornamentation, both within and without, became the place of worship.

Not for many years did the purses, tastes and convictions of the Methodists approve of the construction of costly, showy churches.

In the original conception of the framers of our system, the parsonage was a part of the ideal outfit of a charge. Its realization was, in many cases, long delayed. A substitute was the rented house which the people supplied for the pastor's use. It must be admitted, however, that in some instances, at least, possibly in many, through lack of interest on the part of church officials, or through motives of economy, the cost of rent was deducted from the estimated salary, or from the *needed* salary, and thus the preacher really paid the rent.

In its architectural development, the parsonage was several degrees below that of the Church, the home of the preacher and his family being severely plain, the main thought of those concerned in its construction being that of inclosing the largest amount of space at the least possible cost, so as to afford room for a family. In process of time, be it stated to the credit of the people, the parsonage was put upon a level, as to outlay and convenience for comfort, with other residences in its vicinity.

We find, in 1845, the first statistics that distinguish the membership residing in Southern Illinois from that of the entire Conference. From these we learn that there were three districts within our part of the Conference territory—the Lebanon, Sparta and Mt. Carmel, and that the membership, including probationers, was: Lebanon district, 3,437; Sparta, 3,136; Mt. Carmel, 4,213—a total of 10,786. Five years later the figures are: Lebanon, 3,718; Sparta, 3,811; Mt. Carmel, 4,663—a total of 12,192, showing an increase of 1,406.

In 1847 there were reported in the whole Conference 211 churches and 35 parsonages.

PERIOD IV.—1852-1873.

In 1852 the territory of the Illinois Conference was, by the action of the General Conference, divided into two sections by a somewhat broken east and west line drawn from the Illinois river, at the mouth of Macoupin creek, to the Wabash. The northern section retained the name, while the southern was termed the Southern Illinois Conference.

*A writer in the Central Christian Advocate recently stated the belief that with the erection in Johnson county of Hale Chapel, in 1902, the last log church in the Conference had been displaced.

The first session of this new Conference was held at Belleville, Oct. 27-30, 1852, under the presidency of Bishop E. A. Ames. It was fitting that one who had been licensed to preach, and who had entered upon ministerial work within its bounds, as a co-worker with many of its members, should occupy the chair of the Conference at this, its opening session.

Embraced within its limits were five districts—Alton, Lebanon, Mt. Carmel, Mt. Vernon and Jonesboro. Forty-six charges, sixteen of which were recognized as being in need of missionary appropriations, made up its field for pastoral and evangelistic work. These districts and charges were manned by a force of sixty-five itinerants, who dealt out the bread of life to a membership of 14,948, and to thousands of people outside of the fold of the Church. One hundred and eighty-four Sunday Schools, with 1,420 officers and teachers and 7,073 scholars, were under their general oversight. The number of churches was 117, and of parsonages 28. Such was the field at the organization of the Conference, and such the equipment of its working force.

The Conference roll was largely composed of the names of men who had labored for years in the southern section of the state. New names, however, appear on the list at the opening of the period, or are added during its progress, as G. W. Hughey, J. D. Gillham, N. E. Cobleigh, F. M. Woolard, J. Earp, B. R. Pierce, J. S. Morrison, John Leeper, Robert Allyn, O. H. Clark, M. N. Powers, N. Hawley and the Brothers Walker and Lingenfelter. Others are worthy of places, those of men who in their respective fields, district, charge or college, did good service in the Master's cause.

Of local workers, whose names are like precious ointment poured forth, are Benjamin Hypes of Lebanon, for many years a tower of strength to Church and college; Edward M. West, a local preacher of polish, influence and ability, at Edwardsville; Charles T. Pace, long the home leader at Mt. Vernon, and in 1880 a member of the General Conference; Dr. F. B. Haller of Vandalia, who for years, under the pressure of a very heavy practice, almost invariably found time to attend public service and the weekly prayer-meeting; Rev. William Hadley of Collinsville, faithful to the cause of Christ through the vicissitudes of a lengthened pilgrimage; Calvin Kinder, a loyal, liberal and energetic leader in the American Bottom; Michael Brown of Brighton, long an honored patriarch of the local Church; B. H. West of Belleville, a man of decided convictions, intelligent, conscientious; Richard Weber, of Galatia, a tower of financial strength to local interests; I. N. Jacquess of Mt. Carmel, a public-spirited, earnest, conscientious man; Thomas Casey of Jefferson county, a worker for years in camp-meetings, firm, devoted and sweet-spirited, a friend of the Union in the days of secession, and who, in 1868, on his death-bed, when testifying to the supporting grace of God, added, with a smile, that it did no harm to have a little good politics mixed up with one's religion.

For years preceding 1860, there had been gradual advance in the temporal support of the ministry. From the specified disciplinary allowance of \$100 a year to each preacher,—in the earlier part of the century even a less amount; an equal sum to his wife—if he

had one—and a smaller allotment to each of his children under a certain age, together with table expenses, making in all to an ordinary family \$250 to \$300 for its yearly sustenance, there began to be paid, in exceptional cases, an increased salary, ranging in amount from \$300 to \$600.

The advance, while slow, was general. In the fifties the statistics show various charges paying for pastoral support from \$500 to \$700, in a few instances a larger sum. Not until 1865 did any charge reach \$1,000. Cairo was the first to do this, but several others, as well as some of the districts, were close in the wake, as Lebanon district, \$900; Aiton, Kimmundy and Bunker Hill stations and Salem district, each \$800; Effingham \$840, and Walnut Hill \$850. The next year, instead of shrinkage, there was a further increase, each of seventeen charges and districts reaching, or exceeding, \$800, three of these making up the round \$1,000 apiece, while Cairo, still in the lead, passed on to \$1,235. Thus, almost at a bound, a higher level of ministerial support was gained.

Almost from the inception of the German work in the Ohio Valley, in 1836, under William Nast and his associates, the Illinois Conference, looking to the conversion of the many German immigrants, who had taken up their abode in Monroe, St. Clair and Madison counties, gave a pressing invitation to German evangelists to come and labor within its bounds, and also opened its doors to transfers, speaking the language of the Fatherland. Some of these, in answer to the call coming on, churches were built up. These churches, at first feeble, were encouraged by the conference, and to some extent, until they became self-sustaining, were financially aided.

At the time of the formation of the Southern Illinois Conference, this German work within its bounds was not placed under its charge, but was cared for by other agencies. In 1857 two districts, composed of German Methodists, one located in Missouri, in and around St. Louis, the other lying to the east of this, in Illinois, were attached to this Conference. The Illinois district contained ten or twelve charges, among them Alton, Belleville, Edwardsville and Nashville, which soon showed a respectable standing as to membership, church property and evangelistic appliances.

At the request of the German Methodists, this work throughout the country was, in 1864, separately organized as the German Methodist Episcopal Church. From that time the statistics of the two German districts, which have not been included in the summaries given in these pages, ceased to swell our Conference reports.

That a Methodist Conference, in the prosecution of its mission for the salvation of men, would favor reform movements with reference to subjects involving morals, was to be expected. From the very first, action was taken in the annual sessions condemnatory of prevalent sins. By this action the members of the Church were entreated to avoid contamination of the evil, while preachers were urged to declare the whole counsel of God in its rebuke.

Even as regarded the tobacco habit, which some Christians,

then as now, were slow to stamp as immoral, there was repeated expression of disapproval. A committee, in 1837, was raised to inquire into the evils resulting from the use of tobacco. In 1846 it was moved that it be the duty of each preacher to ascertain the exact number of tobacco *chewers*, *smokers* and *snuffers* within his charge, and the *expense* thereby incurred, and to report the same at the next session of Conference. This resolution failed of adoption, possibly because of its making the pastor a book-keeper for the tobacco users; but there was no abatement of the feeling in opposition to the use of tobacco.

At the next session "the using of tobacco in any form, unless taken medicinally," was denounced, while it was further declared that "this use was inconsistent with the holy duties of the Christian minister and opposed to the spirit of Christianity." In view of such action at that time, it need occasion no surprise to find that in 1868, several years prior to the adoption by the General Conference of the rule now in force, prohibitive of the use of tobacco by ministers, our Conference enacted a rule to the effect that no minister persisting in the habit of using tobacco should be received on trial, recommended for orders, or admitted to membership.

More emphatic still were its denunciations of the drink habit. It was repeatedly declared that "the evils arising from the sale and use of intoxicating liquors, as a beverage, were of enormous magnitude; that the amount of poverty, disgrace and misery caused by intemperance was incalculable; that the crimes committed under alcoholic stimulus embraced a vast majority of criminal acts, and that intemperance was sweeping an appalling number into drunkards' graves, and, it was to be feared, into the drunkards' hell." Hence, appeal was time and again made to Christians and citizens to encourage sobriety and abstinence by word and example, to join in efforts to promote the spread of temperance principles and "to withhold their support at the polls from any man who was not in favor of a strong prohibitory law."

Sabbath desecration came in for frequent rebuke—work, travel, pleasure seeking on the holy day being deplored and condemned—while ministers and people were exhorted to make the Lord's Day not only one of rest from toil, but one of preparation for the enjoyment of the unending Sabbath that remains for the people of God.

Other prevalent evils were not overlooked, but especially in the later years of the anti-slavery agitation, the Church was called upon to maintain a proper attitude of resistance toward the master evil of the day—slavery. While, through fear of imperiling Methodists residing in slave territory, there was for a time deprecation of radical measures, yet, in the progress of the "irrepressible conflict" the Conference resolved that slavery, as then existing, was an unmitigated evil, that the claim of its apologists, that "it was not a sin in itself," was ill based, and that the emancipation policy of President Lincoln was not only right and just, but the policy demanded by the times, since slavery, the real cause of the rebellion, the peril of the Union, and the "sum of all villainies" was deserving of universal execration and complete overthrow.

Holding such views, it is not strange that when the adherents of slavery attempted to destroy the Union which they could no longer control, the Conference stood as one man for the national cause. Through the terrific conflict that ensued they prayed for the Union, they spoke in its behalf, they hazarded their lives in its defense. More than one of their number, while at work in his charge, was threatened with (or in danger of) assassination. Conference having resolved that it was the duty of all men, especially of Christians, to aid to the full extent with their means and, if need be, their lives, the Union cause, many of its members, leaving their charges for the time, entered the Union army, some as chaplains, some as officers or private soldiers.

In 1861, we find on the Conference roll six chaplains; in 1862, nine; in 1863, eleven; and in 1864, eight. The number of ministers in the army, aside from chaplains, cannot be determined, as only the names of chaplains were retained on the list of members, but it is probable that, counting with these other officers and private soldiers, the number during the progress of the war was nearly one-half the able-bodied members of the Conference. Certainly, in view of their ready enlistment, there was no room for captious critics to question the loyalty of the body.

In 1862, one decade from date of Conference organization, the churches reported were 207; the parsonages, 47; the number of members and probationers, 19,251. This was a gain in members during the term, of 4,305, but as compared with the report of 1861, a loss of 3,381. This decrease may be charged to the disturbed condition of the country during the first year of the Civil war, many non-combatants having removed from the border, and many enlisted men having permitted their membership to lapse.

Normal conditions being restored, with increased immigration and successful ministerial work, the next decade to 1872, shows the number of members and probationers to be 26,032, a gain of 6,781; of churches, 307, an increase of 100; and of parsonages, 77, a gain of 30.

The Conference, organized with five districts, soon entered, in so far as regards districts, upon the most changeful epoch in its history. In 1854 Salem district was added to the list; in 1857, Equality; and in 1858, Litchfield; while in 1862, Litchfield and Jonesboro disappeared, and Shawneetown came into view, to change its name next year to Harrisburg. In 1874, Carbondale, a revival of Cairo district, was given a place, while Harrisburg was absorbed, chiefly by Mt. Carmel, and in 1876, Carbondale by Mt. Vernon. Subsequent to these changes there were six districts—Alton, Lebanon, Mt. Carmel, Mt. Vernon, Olney and Vandalia,—which, without change as to number or designation, and with only slight modification as to boundaries, have composed the district list for more than a quarter of a century.

From its organization the Methodist Episcopal Church was a missionary church, the missionary spirit permeating its life. Through the first half century of its existence, however, its efforts and bestowments were of necessity, directed chiefly to the home, in

distinction from the foreign, field. Assuredly this was the case as regards the Western Conferences, the Illinois among them. Engaged in building up a membership in a newly settled region, with but few churches, schools and other appliances for evangelistic work, and with a meagerly supported ministry, all their resources were needed at home. Pressing might be the wants of the far-off heathen millions, but more pressing, in their judgment, were the needs of the destitute people near their own doors. For these heathen of their own communities their most persistent efforts were put forth.

Still, from the formation, in the early part of the century, of the Sunday School Union, the Tract, the Missionary and the Bible Societies, collections, small in amount, it is true, but such as people of limited means could afford to give, were taken yearly in the congregations in support of these agencies. By 1845 these contributions for missionary and benevolent purposes amounted to \$1,500; by 1850, to \$3,000; by 1865, an exceptional year, to \$10,953. In the later years of the present period, after the formation of the Freedman's Aid, the Ministerial Education and the Church Extension Boards, also the Woman's Foreign and the Woman's Home Missionary Societies, and under the influence of enlarged business operations, an expanded currency and a quickened spirit of philanthropy, these annual offerings reached an average of \$10,938, and had become invested with such degree of importance as to determine in the minds of many the standing of the charge and the efficiency of the pastor.

Near the close of this period, in 1869, and in accordance with legislation of the General Conference, a vote of both the laity and the ministry was taken, to determine whether lay representation should be authorized by the General Conference. This long-mooted question was thus brought up for final settlement. Both bodies in our Conference voted in favor of the measure, the expression of the ministerial members being 68 to 13. As the required majority throughout the whole connection was secured, lay members from that time took their seats among the law-makers of the Church.

By the same General Conference our polity was farther modified by the authorization of the District Conference, an official body composed of the members of the Annual Conference within a presiding elder's district, together with the local preachers, exhorters, district stewards, class leaders and Sunday school superintendents, the representation of the two classes last named, however, being limited to one of each from each charge.

The districts, without exception, promptly availed themselves of the offered agency, a District Conference being organized in each, and, with a single temporary exception, maintained to the present. The design of the framers of this new piece of ecclesiastical machinery was to increase by instruction, drill and conference the efficiency of the lay-workers, of whom it was almost wholly composed, and to enlist them in active work towards the upbuilding of the Church.

PERIOD V.—1874-1902.

The events of four-score years reviewed, we have now reached

the last period to be covered by our outline history. The opening of each of the other periods after the first was marked by a change in name, or in Conference boundaries, but with the beginning of this no such change was made. Our Conference continues as the Southern Illinois within the same lines as those marked out in 1852.

The working ministerial force is much the same as it was during the latter half of the last period. Changes, it is true, have occurred, but in the main, such as through individual choice or providential dispensation might have been anticipated. Brothers Cliffe, Hamilton, Morrison, Mitchell and Thatcher have fallen at their posts, soon to be followed to the better world by Risley, Corington, VanCleve and Hawley. Some have transferred to other Conferences, while a few have been lost from the army of the Lord through their own misdirection.

New names are found on our Conference roll to become more numerous from year to year, some by transfer from other Conferences, but much the greater number from the ranks of the earnest young laymen of our own, who have felt, acknowledged and responded to the Divine call to the ministry.

Among the transfers to the Conference is Dr. John W. Locke, from Indiana, who, as college president, pastor and presiding elder, as well as because of his social characteristics, brotherly disposition and scholarly attainments, at once takes and maintains a high place in our ranks.

Lay-workers, too—there are in great number, almost every charge furnishing them—men and women eminent for their devotion to the work of the Church and for their skillful direction of agencies for its upbuilding. Such, indeed, is their number in this closing period of our research that we refer readers to the Church registers, the Quarterly Conference records and the annual list of appointments.

The membership of the Church, including probationers and local preachers, has reached 25,826, while the churches number 304, with an estimated value of \$619,150; the parsonages 77, worth \$87,558; the Sunday schools 366, with officers and teachers 3,038, and scholars 22,713; the charges number 136, many of them being stations in distinction from circuits, and the districts 8, as already named—Alton, Lebanon, Mt. Carmel, Mt. Vernon, Olney, Carbondale and Harrisburg, the last two soon to be absorbed. Among the charges we find Fairfield, Netwon, Robinson, Grayville, Metropolis, Carbondale, Murphysboro, DuQuoin, Centralia, Litchfield, Bunker Hill, Jerseyville, Brighton, East St. Louis and Flora.

Methodism, born in a university, but with a mission from the first to the poor and ignorant, has always fostered educational agencies. This Conference has aided to sustain several institutions of learning, as the Olney, Mt. Carmel and Mt. Vernon Academies, the Belleville and Metropolis Seminaries, and the Hayward Collegiate Institute at Fairfield. More closely related to it than any one of these was the Southern Illinois Female College at Salem, which for several years was under its ownership and direction. For a time the Conference motto was, "One college for young men, one for

young women, and a high-school for both sexes at every county seat." Providing for too many schools, the plan broke down of its own weight.

As far back as 1827, a petition asking for the establishment of a Seminary was presented to Conference. The next year Lebanon was named as the seat of such institution, and its already organized Seminary was adopted, subject to stipulated action on the part of its trustees. In 1829, through a desire to have the co-operation of the Missouri Conference in support of the contemplated school, as well as the existence of some feeling of jealousy with regard to the location, no final action was taken; but the next year the Conference accepted the proposals of the management of the Lebanon Seminary,—by this time known as the McKendrian College, adopting the institution, empowering a committee to appoint a president, and requiring each preacher to open subscriptions and solicit donations in its behalf. Three years later, the trustees reporting the main building in an advanced stage of preparation, pledges to the amount of \$235 were given by the members, these pledges ranging from \$10 to \$20, measuring, under the conditions, a high degree of self-sacrifice on the part of the donors. Rev. Peter Akers, D. D., was elected president. In 1838, Conference assumed control of the Institution. Thenceforward, nearly every year, action was taken in promotion of the interests of McKendree College, the name having been modified by action of the legislature in 1839, at the time of its granting a new charter. This action was directed to the regulation of its course of study, the meeting of its financial obligations and the enlargement of its facilities. In 1845 the entire faculty—Dr. Erastus Wentworth and his colleagues,—were salaried on the plane of ministerial support, each professor receiving the disciplinary allowance of a preacher, and this sum collected in large measure by the class-leaders in the various charges throughout the Conference.

Notwithstanding that the disruption of the Church in 1844, and the division of the Conference in 1852, greatly diminished its patronage, and that a little later the Civil war laid claim to many of its students,—some of whose voices never again gladdened its halls,—McKendree maintained its work of Christian education.

In 1852 Dr. Akers was again called to the presidency, to be succeeded by Dr. N. Cobleigh in 1859, and by Dr. R. Allyn in 1863 under whose able administrations the college took on a new career of prosperity. Young ladies were admitted to its classes in 1869, and have ever since brightened its life.

For years a heavy indebtedness pressed as a nightmare upon the Institution until, as the result of a prolonged and united effort on the part of its friends in 1879, the whole burden was, with the last day of the year, removed. New obligations, injudiciously incurred by its management in 1887, pressed heavily, until in 1893, there was partial relief afforded. In 1895, under the direction of President Chamberlin, there was full discharge of its liabilities. Liberal bestowments improved the buildings, enlarged the library and increased the endowment, so that now, in 1902, the college free from

debt, with increased resources and varied courses of study, gives promise of continued usefulness .

The Epworth League was organized in 1889 by the voluntary merging of a half dozen young people's societies. This auxiliary of church work, with its several departments, its well conceived line of services, its enthusiasm and zeal, has already been the instrument of effecting good results. Chapters have been organized in nearly all the charges, and in many cases are well sustained, Hundreds, even thousands, of the young people of the church are, through the agency of the League, in training for successful work in the Sunday School and the church and for the higher illustration of the Christian character and life.

The General Conference of 1888 authorized the appointment of deaconesses and the institution of a Deaconess's Home. The deaconesses, young women of proper age, ability and disposition, licensed by the church, accredited by a Conference Board, and working subject to the direction of a superintendent or pastor, to the relief of the poor, the sick, the helpless and the sinful, are helpers in the ministerial calling.

Although, as a Conference, we are still without a Deaconess Home within our bounds, yet at various points, as Alton, Belleville, Centralia, East St. Louis and DuQuoin, the churches have been refreshed and strengthened through the good results flowing from the gentle, Christ-like ministry of these devoted disciples of Him who went about doing good.

From a tangle of conflicting plans and theories submitted to the General Conference of 1900, relating to woman's work in the Church, there was suddenly and unexpectedly evolved, to the astonishment of friend and foe alike, a measure that adopted, secured the introduction of women, when chosen under legal forms by Electoral Conferences, as lay delegates to the General Conference. Thus a knotty question, the cause of a quarter century's wrangling and of much twisting of St. Paul's directions pertaining to the work of women in the Church, was suddenly settled to the gratification of nearly all concerned. Without exception the delegates from this Conference supported the measure.

At the same session final action was taken on a proposed constitution for the Methodist Episcopal Church, which, upon submission to the Annual Conferences, receiving the requisite majority—our Conference vote standing 104 in favor to 15 against—became, as announced by the Episcopal Board, the organic law of the Church.

Having a written Constitution—something that the great British Empire lacks—we are now, with God's blessing, resting upon our zealous efforts, in full pursuit, as a Church, of the realization of the ideal that filled the soul of our honored founder, when he exclaimed, "The world is my parish!"

We have now glanced at the events and characters, successes and defeats, of a term exceeding a century—1793-1902; we have traversed our field from north to south and from river to river; we have gathered up some of the threads of our ecclesiastical spinning.

Our final cast as to numbers and results is: Districts, 6;

charges, 188; members of Conference, 207; members of the Church, including probationers, 40,849; Sunday schools, 461, with officers and teachers, 5,010, and scholars, 39,581; number of churches, 489, valued at \$843,749; number of parsonages, 158, worth \$153,200; number of Epworth leagues, 307, of Junior leagues, 122; amount of missionary and benevolent contributions for 1902, including those of the Woman's Foreign and Home Missionary societies, \$24,205; support of pastors, presiding elders and bishops, \$137,277; current expenses for churches and Sunday schools, \$31,394, and McKendree College, with its property, appliances, endowment and reputation.

Under the liberal and progressive Church legislation of the last few years, with trammels to Christian effort removed, with enlarged lists of active workers, with deaconesses at home and missionaries in the foreign field, with the varied helps and appliances of philanthropic agencies, with a live, religious press—one of which, the *Central Christian Advocate*—had its birth in our field, we feel in contrasting our condition at the opening of the twentieth century with that of our fathers at the beginning of the nineteenth, like exclaiming from the depths of our grateful souls, "What hath God wrought?" To him be all the glory.

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RULES OF CONFERENCE.

I. When any member of this Conference intends to object to the passage of the character of any other member, he shall hand the name of such member to the President, who shall pass the name by and direct the case to be investigated.

II. When any one of our members is called from earth, it shall be the duty of the nearest pastor, or Presiding Elder of the district, to notify all the preachers in the district of such death, and of the time set for the funeral services.

III. At each session of Conference a publisher shall be elected to publish the minutes of the next session, who shall be authorized to make arrangements and enter into a contract for the publication in advance of the session.

IV. The Presiding Elder of the district, and the preacher in charge of the station where the Conference is to be held, together with the presidents of the several Conference societies, are instructed to arrange the program of religious exercises, and, if practicable, secure their publication in the Central Christian Advocate.

V. The Board of Stewards shall consist of six members, each of whom shall serve three years—two being appointed at each session of the Conference. The Board shall organize by the appointment of a president, secretary and treasurer, whose names shall be published, and who shall serve one year.

VI. When the names of candidates for admission on trial or for orders are called, they shall, if present, be called forward and introduced to the Conference.

VII. All candidates for recognition of orders shall, unless excused by vote of the Conference, be examined in the same manner as candidates for ordination, and the Committee on Conference Relations shall inquire into the character and fitness for the traveling connection of each candidate for admission on trial, for admission into full connection, or for readmission into the Conference.

VIII. There shall be a meeting of the Statistical Secretaries with the Conference Treasurer at 8 o'clock on Saturday morning, for the purpose of comparing the money reported in the statistical tables.

IX. When a member of the annual Conference dies, the Conference shall provide a monument for him at a cost of not less than fifty dollars. The Conference to elect annually a custodian of Monument Fund who shall apportion the amount necessary to this fund to the several charges on the basis of the amount paid by the charge for pastoral support the previous year. The pastor to report this under the head of other collections. The publisher of the minutes will reserve a column in the statistical tables for this report.

X. Each Presiding Elder, at the close of his term, shall prepare

a report of his district, not to exceed one thousand words, for publication in the minutes.

XI. The Stewards are authorized to take annually from the pro rata due the claimants from the Book Concern, a sum according to their discretion, not to exceed ten per cent of their indebtedness to the Book Concern, until it shall be paid in full.

XII. All reports of committees and resolutions shall be handed to the Secretary in duplicate.

XIII. No one shall be admitted on trial in the Conference who is more than thirty-five years of age.

XIV. It shall require two-thirds of those present and voting to change or suspend any of these rules.

The Secretary is authorized to send to pastors receiving less than \$500 cash salary one dozen copies of the minutes; \$500 and less than \$700, one and one-half dozen copies; \$700 and less than \$1000, two dozen copies; \$1000 and over, two and one-half dozen copies; each Presiding Elder, two dozen copies.

The rules governing the previous session of the Conference were adopted for this session.

On motion of T. H. Herdman, the Presiding Elders were directed to pass to the Committee on Reference the names of persons who had left their work.

J. B. Ravenscroft was appointed to conduct devotions at the opening of the session Friday morning. After announcements the Conference stood adjourned by expiration of time. The Bishop pronounced the benediction.

THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 25, 1903.

The Conference assembled at 8:30 o'clock, Bishop Walden in the chair; devotions were conducted by J. B. Ravenscroft. The minutes of the previous sessions were read and approved.

Dr. E. W. Feigenbaum, of Edwardsville, was introduced and addressed the Conference in behalf of the Superannuates Endowment Fund.

Question 7 was called: "Who have been admitted into full membership, and elected to Deacon's orders?" Philip R. Glotfelty, Jacob O. Hawk, Stewart B. Edmonson, Walter H. Whitlock; after passage of their characters, report of the Board of Examiners, and the Committee on Conference Relations, disciplinary examination by the Bishop, and recommendation by their Presiding Elders, were admitted and elected.

On motion of O. H. Clark, it was ordered that pastors report the amount raised on their charge for Conference claimants.

Question 3 was called: "Who have been received on credentials, and from what churches?" George R. Hall, an Elder in the M. E. Church South, was received and his Elder's orders recognized. David A. Roberts, an Elder in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, after report of Committee on Ministerial Qualifications, and disciplinary examination by the Bishop, was received, recognized as a Deacon, and placed in the third year class of our course of our study. Arthur M. Dixon, a Deacon in the M. E. Church South, after report of Committee on Ministerial Qualifications, received his orders as a Deacon, and he was placed in the third year class of our course of study.

The order of the day, the election of delegates to the General Conference, was taken up; on nomination by the Presiding

Elders, J. N. Eason, N. D. Sweeney, Robert Morris, L. W. Porter, S. S. Smith and W. H. Pool were appointed tellers. On nomination of the Secretary, M. L. Cole, J. M. Adams, and J. S. Cummins were appointed secretaries to the tellers. J. F. Harmon moved that in case more than four persons received above the requisite number of votes to elect, those having the highest number should be declared delegates elect. The ballot was taken.

Horace Reed, D. D., Presiding Elder of Decatur District, Illinois Conference, and the Rev. J. E. Watson, pastor of the U. B. Church of Mt. Vernon, were introduced.

The tellers were authorized to receive, in their room, the ballots of the secretaries and employes of the Conference. The tellers and secretaries retired with the ballot.

Dr. J. R. Harker, President of the Woman's College, Jacksonville, Illinois, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

On motion of O. H. Clark, a deputation was ordered to convey to the Lay Electoral Conference the fraternal greetings of this body, and invite them to a joint session at 5 o'clock this afternoon. O. H. Clark, John Leeper and T. DeWitte Peake were appointed.

On motion of J. D. Hennessey the time was extended. On motion of J. A. Scarritt it was ordered that when we adjourn it be to meet at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon. On motion of C. C. Hall it was ordered that the order of the day be resumed at the afternoon session.

W. H. Webster of the Book Concern addressed the Conference.

Dr. M. N. Powers was appointed to conduct devotions at 1:30 o'clock. On motion of J. W. Smith the Conference adjourned; the benediction was pronounced by Bishop Walden.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference assembled at 1:30 o'clock p. m., J. A. Scarritt in the chair by appointment of the Bishop. Devotions were conducted by M. N. Powers. The Bishop took the chair.

The report of tellers on the ballot for delegates to the General Conference was announced. The total number of votes cast was 152; necessary to a choice, 77. One ballot was cast out because improperly made.

J. F. Harmon received 95 votes, and was declared elected; F. W. Loy received 93 votes, and was declared elected; J. W. Flint received 89 votes, and was declared elected; N. Crow received 84 votes, and was declared elected. C. D. Shumard and F. M. Van Treese, having received 36 votes each (the next highest number cast), were, on motion of O. H. Clark, declared elected delegates to rank by seniority.

R. D. Woodley was appointed to conduct the devotions Saturday morning.

The Secretary was authorized, on motion of C. W. Sabine, to destroy the ballots cast for delegates.

On motion of W. H. Neil the Presiding Elders were requested to nominate and the Secretary to publish in the minutes a list of standing committees for next year.

On motion of J. F. Harmon the Statistical Secretary was authorized to mention in a separate item in his report the support provided for our Conference Deaconess by the Summit Avenue Church, E. St. Louis.

After announcements, on motion of C. C. Hall, the Conference adjourned; the Bishop gave the benediction.

JOINT SESSION.

The Conference assembled at 5 o'clock p. m., Bishop Walden in the chair. The Lay Electoral Conference was escorted to seats within the bar and introduced by O. H. Clark. The lay delegates-elect were given seats on the platform. The Conference was in turn introduced to the laymen by the Bishop.

R. W. Ropiquet, of Belleville, was introduced and addressed the session on behalf of the laymen. J. F. Harmon, of E. St. Louis, was introduced and responded on behalf of the ministers. Bishop Walden then gave an address.

The lay delegates-elect, R. L. Stratton of Mt. Vernon, Mrs. E. A. Hypes of Carbondale, J. D. Madding of Lawrenceville, and Dr. E. W. Feigenbaum of Edwardsville, were introduced.

On motion of J. B. Ravenscroft the session adjourned. Bishop Walden gave the benediction.

FOURTH DAY.

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 26, 1903.

The Conference assembled at 8:30 o'clock, Bishop Walden in the chair. R. D. Woodley conducted devotions. The minutes of the previous sessions were read and approved.

Question 13 was called: "Was the character of each preacher examined?"

The roll of effective Elders was called, their characters passed, and they reported their work.

G. E. Groves and P. A. Smith were excused on account of sickness.

C. O. Morris and H. L. Merrick, after report of Committee on Conference Relations, were changed from effective to supernumerary relation. W. L. Cunningham, after report of Committee on Conference Relations, was changed from supernumerary to effective relation.

The character of C. E. Baker, G. R. Goodman and H. L. Merrick, whose names had been referred to the Committee on Reference, was, on report of that Committee, passed.

F. M. Van Treese presented the report of the Commission on Boundries ordered by the Conference of last year.

The Rev. I. P. Langley, pastor of the Baptist Church, and the Rev. H. B. Douglas, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, of Mt. Vernon, were introduced. Horace Reed, D. D., Presiding Elder of the Decatur District, Illinois Conference, and President of the Illinois Anti-Saloon League, was introduced and addressed the Conference in the interest of the League.

Question 10 was called: "What members have completed the Conference course of study?"

George R. Greer and Charles Koehler, after report of the Board of Examiners, were passed in their studies, and elected to Elder's orders. Samuel Albrecht was credited with studies in which he passed, and continued in studies of the fourth year. J. L. Donovan was continued in his present relation, and fourth year class, with the request that he locate, his Presiding Elder to communicate with him and call his attention to this action.

Question 9 was called: "What members are in studies of the fourth year?" After report of their work, passage of characters, report of the Board of Examiners and recommendation by their Presiding Elders, F. M. James, Robert Morris, J. H.

Meyer, G. W. Hanks, J. D. Shaddrick, E. B. Fyke, C. H. Gerkin, C. E. Hoon and B. F. Utley were advanced to the studies of the fourth year. C. O. Morris, after passage of his character, was continued in studies of the third year. The characters of T. H. Adams and J. W. Bond were passed.

On motion of O. H. Clark the registrar was directed to furnish records of their examinations to members transferred from the Conference.

Question 5 was called: "Who have been continued on trial?" After report of their work, report of the Board of Examiners, and recommendations of Presiding Elders, Frank O. Wilson, Charles L. Peterson, Walter A. Allen, John E. Shaffer, Charles R. Phillips, Marlow B. Holloway, Charles E. Leitzell, Louis S. Ellison, Charles Sullivan and Ulysses C. Smothers, were continued on trial and advanced to studies of the second year. Victor W. Thrall was continued on trial in studies of the second year.

Question 6 was called: "Who have been discontinued?" Lemuel Mifflin and Daniel W. Hopkins.

Question 22 was called: "Who are the supernumerary preachers?" After report of the Committee on Conference Relations, L. E. Cole, W. J. Hopper, J. W. Jackson, N. Stauffer, C. S. Tritt, J. C. Orr, Lemuel Cramp and J. E. Burk were continued; Adam Yingst was continued with the request that he locate. B. F. Sheffer and N. B. Cooksey were changed from supernumerary to effective.

Question 18 was called: "Who have withdrawn?" W. V. Kirkpatrick.

Question 23 was called: "Who are the superannuated preachers?" After report of Committee on Conference Relations, or personal representation J. H. Bennett, J. J. Boyer, C. W. Bonner, J. L. Cunningham, W. F. Davis, J. P. Dew, T. A. Eaton, J. A. Hampton, M. L. King, R. W. Laughlin, C. D. Lingenfelter, V. D. Lingenfelter, J. H. McGriff, Wm. McMorrow, J. M. Mulvaney, J. W. Nall, Caloway Nash, Daniel Oglesby, D. A. Perrin, B. R. Pierce, J. R. Reef, J. P. Rutherford, G. W. Scawthon, Hiram Sears, J. W. Tennyson, Wm. Tilroe, G. W. Waggoner, and L. S. Walker, were continued. John Weeden and G. M. Whitzel were continued and the Secretary instructed to call their attention to the disciplinary provisions governing their case.

On motion of J. B. Ravenscroft it was ordered that when we adjourn, it be to meet at 1:30 o'clock p. m.

Robert Forbes, D. D., first assistant corresponding secretary of the Board of Church Extension, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

A telegram from Dr. M. C. B. Mason, of the Freedman's Aid and Southern Education Society, was announced, stating that because of the death of his only brother he could not be present at the session of the Conference.

C. A. Beckett was appointed to lead the devotions at 1:30 o'clock. On motion of J. A. Scarritt the Conference adjourned; the Bishop gave the benediction.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference assembled at 1:30 o'clock, J. A. Scarritt in the chair by appointment of the Bishop. C. A. Beckett conducted devotions. The Bishop took the chair. On motion of S. P. Groves the stewards were excused.

Question 4 was called: "Who have been received on trial?" After report of Committee on Ministerial Qualifications, the Board of Examiners, and recommendation by the Presiding Elders, Cameron Harmon, Fred L. Cook, Ray M. Brown, Ewin T. Carroll, Willard I. Terhune and Harry Smoot were received.

On motion of N. Crow to suspend rule 13, in order to receive John W. Smith, the vote was announced, ayes 62; nays 48. The rule was not suspended.

The report of the Committee on the Superannuates Endowment Fund was presented. Dr. E. W. Feigenbaum was introduced and addressed the Conference. The report was adopted. On motion of O. H. Clark the Secretary was ordered to print the report of the Committee, but not the constitution and by laws of the association.

On motion of T. E. Sisson the appointment of a Conference Railroad Secretary was ordered. T. E. Sisson was appointed.

President M. H. Chamberlin, of McKendree College, the Rev. J. W. Robinson, of North India Conference and the Rev. David Gay, of the Illinois Conference, were introduced.

J. T. Keenan and B. S. Smith were appointed members of the Board of Examiners.

A memorial from the Mt. Carmel District Conference was presented. On motion of F. M. Van Treese, a committee

of three was ordered to consider the memorial and report at the next session of the Conference: J. Y. Reid, J. A. Taylor and Caloway Nash were appointed.

C. D. Shumard, Presiding Elder of Lebanon District, reported the sale of a church within the bounds of Freeburg charge, and requested that the Quarterly Conference be authorized to expend the money, received from the sale, in church improvements within said charge. The Bishop stated that the money was at the disposal of the Quarterly Conference for church improvements within the charge, if applied in harmony with the Discipline.

On motion of J. F. Harmon, the Conference agreed to a recess until 4 o'clock, after hearing the report of the Committee on Education, and the address by President Chamberlin. The Committee on Education reported; adopted. Dr. Chamberlin addressed the Conference in behalf of McKendree College.

At 4 o'clock the Conference reassembled, J. F. Harmon in the chair by appointment of the Bishop. The reports of Committees on Periodicals, Class Meetings, Temperance, Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, Domestic Missionary Society, Deaconess Board, Church Extension Board, Freedman's Aid and Southern Education Society, District Conference Journal, Woman's Home Missionary Society, Tracts and Sunday Schools and the Conference Historical Society were read and adopted. The Statistical Secretary reported. The Board of Stewards reported, and the report was adopted.

On motion of L. W. Thrall a session for the ordination and memorial services was ordered at 2:30 o'clock p. m., Sunday.

The report of the Committee on American Bible Society was read and adopted. The Treasurer presented his report. It was adopted. An unclaimed balance of \$7.18 remaining in the hands of the Treasurer was, on motion of O. H. Clark, ordered paid to the Conference Historical Society.

On motion of John Leeper it was ordered that when we adjourn it be to meet at the close of the address by Dr. Forbes at the 7:30 o'clock service. On motion of Dr. Besse, the Conference adjourned. Dr. O. H. Clark gave the benediction.

EVENING SESSION.

The Conference assembled at 9 o'clock p. m., J. F. Harmon in the chair by appointment of the Bishop.

The report of the Committee on Resolutions was read and

adopted. The report of the Committee on Sabbath observance was read and adopted. The Board of Stewards submitted a supplemental report which was adopted.

After a statement by J. A. Scarritt, relative to the expenses incurred by the Conference Historical Society, a collection amounting to \$46.37 was taken.

The Bishop took the chair; question 30 was called: "Where shall the next Conference be held?" J. N. Eason nominated Litchfield. On motion of C. L. York the invitation was accepted with the thanks of the Conference.

The Presiding Elders were appointed a Committee to apportion \$10,000 to the charges for Conference claimants, and also the benevolences.

Question 11 was called: "What others have been elected and ordained Deacons?" Ewin T. Carroll and Wm. J. Whitsett, after report of Board of Examiners, and recommendation of Presiding Elders were elected.

Question 21 was called: "What other personal notation should be made?" The orders of Wm. N. Nesbit, an Elder in the M. E. Church South, were recognized.

The Bishop was requested to appoint J. C. Kinison, Missionary of the American Sunday School Union, T. H. Herdman, Conference Historian, to leave C. D. McCammon, Walter H. Whitlock, U. C. Smothers, Harry Smoot and T. P. Brannum without appointment to attend one of our schools; and Wm. Carson, Conference Evangelist.

The Board of Examiners were authorized to furnish John W. Smith a certificate of his examinations.

Douglas Shouse was appointed to preach the annual Missionary Sermon; alternate, T. E. Sisson. The Presiding Elders presented nominations for Triers of appeals, the Boards of Church Location, the Board of Church Extension, and the list of Standing Committees for next year.

T. H. Herdman, custodian of the Conference Educational Fund, submitted his report; was adopted.

The Presiding Elders were authorized to appoint the Missionary Secretaries, and hand names of same to the Secretary. C. E. Baker was granted a supernumerary relation. The Secretary of the Board of Stewards was directed to send the greetings of the Conference to the superannuated members who live beyond the bounds of the Conference.

On motion of S. P. Groves, it was ordered that when we

adjourn it be to meet at 8 o'clock Monday morning. On motion of J. B. Ravenscroft, the Conference adjourned. The benediction was pronounced by Bishop Walden.

FIFTH DAY.

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 27, 1903.

The Conference assembled at 2:30 o'clock p. m.; Bishop Walden in the chair; prayer was offered by J. W. Flint, and the following were ordained Deacons: Philip R. Glotfelty, Jacob O. Hawk, Stewart B. Edmondson, Walter H. Whitlock, Ewin T. Carroll and Wm. J. Whitsett.

The following were ordained Elders: George Greer and Charles Koehler.

The Memorial Service was held at 4 o'clock; T. H. Herdman, chairman of the Committee on Memoirs, in the chair by appointment of the Bishop.

The obituary of Mrs. W. F. Davis was read by T. H. Herdman; of S. O. Kepley, by D. Shouse; of Mrs. B. F. Sheffer by J. Y. Reid; of W. E. Ravenscroft, by J. W. Cummins; of Mrs. M. House, by J. B. Ravenscroft; of Wm. M. Owens, by J. G. Tucker.

The benediction was pronounced by O. H. Clark.

J. C. Kinison presented his report, as custodian of the Conference Monument Fund; it was adopted. A supplemental report of the Board of Stewards was presented and adopted.

The matter of additional funds for the Conference Historical Society was, on motion of J. A. Scarritt, referred to the managers of the society.

A resolution was offered by N. Crow, as follows:

RESOLUTION.

"Whereas, there is a great scarcity of men in the Southern Illinois Conference, to fill our charges, which greatly hinders and embarrasses our work, and believing that those reared on our soil are best adapted to the work in our Conference, we therefore, ask all our people to earnestly pray that God may raise up laborers among us, for our field; and that we call upon our people for renewed loyalty to our ministry and conference. And, as a Conference, we will keep before the people the needs and possibilities of Southern Illinois, and in every legitimate way will encourage a more liberal support of our ministry."

On motion of J. G. Tucker a collection was ordered for the janitor of the church. The collection amounted to \$10.90. The Trustees of the church, declining to receive the collection for this purpose, it was, on motion of J. A. Taylor, turned over to the Board of Stewards.

Question 13 was recalled.

J. K. Hunter was excused; C. B. Whitesides reported; P. T. Brannum was excused; H. C. Merrick reported.

On motion of J. W. Cummins, the printed minutes of the Conference was made the official record of the Conference.

On motion of J. A. Scarritt the Secretary was ordered to

send a copy of the minutes to the superannuates and Conference claimants. Presiding Elder Shumard made an order relative to the distribution of minutes; adopted.

On motion of O. H. Clark it was ordered that after the reading and approval of the minutes, and the reading of the appointments, the Conference stand adjourned *sine die*.

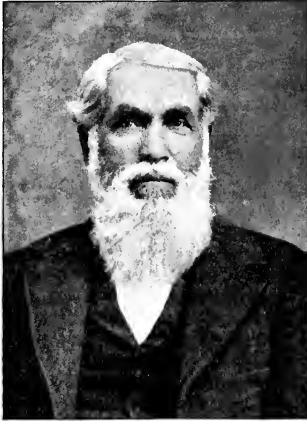


MEMOIRS.

REV. WILLIAM M. OWEN.

William M. Owen was born in Barren County, Ky., November 22, 1827. In 1837 his father, with the family, removed to Illinois and settled on a farm in Wayne County. The family has resided here continuously since. In 1843, when 16 years old, young William was converted to God at a campmeeting held near old Ebenezer Church. He united with the church at the same time. In 1850 he was married to Miss Nancy C. Owen. Three sons and three daughters were born to them

Soon after he united with the church he was made a class-leader; in the same year that he was married he was licensed to exhort.

In 1852 he was licensed to preach. A year later he was received on trial in the Southern Illinois Conference. In 1855 he was admitted into full connection in the Conference, and ordained deacon. The same year he located. He was readmitted to the Conference in 1871, and was actively engaged until 1878, when he located again. This was his relation to the Conference at the time of his death.

During his connection with the Conference he served as pastor at Pinckneyville, Raleigh, Liberty, Fairfield Circuit, Jeffersonville and Bellmont. His work in these appointments in no wise fully represents his services to the church as a preacher of the gospel. He was engaged in preaching near his home with very rare exceptions

every Sunday. At camp-meetings, in special revival meetings and in school-houses, he rendered efficient service. In the aggregate some hundreds of persons were led to Christ through his ministry. He with his family held membership in the church in Fairfield, Ill.

He died Monday morning, December 22, 1902, after a brief illness of pneumonia. The funeral services were conducted by the writer, assisted by the Rev. S. E. Taylor, of the Presbyterian Church, Fairfield, and Rev. Wm. Ellis. The body was laid to rest in the city cemetery.

REV. SAMUEL O. KEPLEY.

Samuel Oscar Kepley, son of Elijah and Susan Kepley, was born in Washington County, Ind., May 12, 1872, and died at Springer, New Mexico, January 7, 1903.

The family moved to Illinois in 1875. Brother Kepley was converted in his fifteenth year, and at once dedicated his life to earnest Christian service. After the advantages of the common school had been well used, he attended Hayward Collegiate Institute, at Fairfield; Orchard City Business College, at Flora; and Austin College, at Effingham; he graduated and received his degree at the last named institution. He was married May 12, 1897, to Miss Addie B. Crouse. Three children, two daughters and one son, were born of this union.

Brother Kepley taught school for five years. His call to the ministry becoming clear to him, he turned his attention to this sacred vocation. He was licensed to preach and admitted on trial into the Southern Illinois Conference in 1898, and appointed to Hagerstown, which charge he served for two years.

In September, 1900, he was received into full connection and ordained deacon by Bishop W. X. Ninde. He was appointed to Sailor Springs, and served two years. He finished the course of study and was ordained elder by Bishop J. H. Vincent, September 28, 1902, and appointed to Sailor Springs for the third year. He entered upon the work with his usual earnestness, but it soon became apparent that his health was failing. About the middle of November, on the advice of his physician, he ceased to preach.

December 23, he left for the milder climate of New Mexico, believing this to be the last hope of saving his life; this hope was to be disappointed, for the disease had so taken hold on him that its ravages refused to be stayed. January 7, 1903 he quietly yielded his spirit and was no more among men, for God had taken him.

He was a young man of much promise, being well educated, industrious and deeply pious. The funeral service at Sailor Springs was conducted by the writer, his Presiding Elder, assisted by Rev. Douglas Shouse, of Newton, and other members of the Conference. The interment was made at Ingraham, Ill.

REV. WILLIAM RAVENSCROFT.

The Rev. William Ravenscroft, who died at Owensboro, Ky., July 24, 1903, was born in Staffordshire, England, June 20, 1824, and was therefore 79 years, 1 month and 4 days old. He joined the Indiana Conference in 1857 and for seventeen years did the work of a Methodist preacher within its bounds.

He came to Illinois and was engaged in business at Olney for three years. In 1877 he was readmitted into the Southern Illinois Conference. In this connection he served the following charges: Robinson, 1877-79; McLeansboro, 1880-81; Corinth, 1882; Mount Vernon Circuit, 1883; Greenville, 1884-86; Shipman, 1887-89; Edwardsville, 1890-93; Presiding Elder of the Alton District, 1894-96. In 1897, on account of enfeebled health, he took the superannuate relation, which he sustained at the time of his death.

Brother Ravenscroft was married to Miss Catherine Jackson, at New Albany, Ind., June 24, 1849. To them six children were born, one son and five daughters. One daughter died at Robinson several years ago. His home was broken up a year ago the 13th day of July by the death of his wife, since which time he has made his home with his children.

Brother Ravenscroft was cheerful in disposition and dignified in manner. His appearance was always that of a neat, careful Christian gentleman. In the pulpit he was careful in speech, reverend in manner, and sound in theology.

The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. J. W. Cummins, at the home of Brother Ravenscroft's daughter, Mrs E. M. Spring, in Olney, Ill., and the remains were buried in the city cemetery.

MRS. LUCY A. HOUSE.

Mrs. Lucy A. House was born in Auburn, N. Y., December 9, 1832, and was married to Stephen R. Wetmore at the age of sixteen. She was left a widow after thirty-three years, and was married, the second time, to Rev. M. House, whom she survived ten months.

She was a devoted and happy Christian wife and mother. Her conversion dates back to her childhood home. She was ever ready to speak a kind word and lend a helping hand; she never turned the needy unaided from her door, and was ever doing good where the world never knew.

After severe suffering, in happy consciousness, she passed away at 3 p. m., on the 18th of February, 1903, bidding all a sweet farewell. In her last moments she was unable to speak, but listened with glowing countenance while her daughter sang "The Home of the Soul," and "In that City."

Funeral services were held at her daughter's residence, 1907 North Grand Avenue, St. Louis, Mo., and at the M. E. church, Greenville, Ill., where her body was laid to rest in Montrose Cemetery. She leaves two daughters, two granddaughters, two grandsons and three sisters to mourn her loss.

ADDIE (LOGSDON) SHEFFER.

Addie (Logsdon) Sheffer, second daughter of Rev. D. J. and Annie Logsdon, was born in Munfordsville, Kentucky, Dec. 24, 1865, died at Dawson Springs, Kentucky, April 28, 1903.

When a child she moved, with her parents, to Union County, Kentucky, where she resided until January 10, 1890, when she was married to B. F. Sheffer, a young man just entering the Methodist ministry, and like a sunbeam shed light on his life for a little more than thirteen years. Having been converted at her father's family altar when but a child, and sanctified wholly, three months before her marriage, she possessed that divine grace so necessary in the work, privations and trials of a Methodist preacher's wife. In childhood she joined the Baptist Church at Seven Gums, Kentucky, of which she remained a member till after her marriage, then joined the Methodist Church.

The work never seemed a burden to her, but a pleasure; and though her health was bad for years, causing her much pain in body, she always manifested a bright Christian spirit, and repeatedly gave unquestionable assurance that she was ready to depart and be with Jesus. And when the moment came she folded her hands on her bosom and went to sleep.

Her funeral services were conducted by Rev. U. S. Tabor and Rev. J. M. Everett, at Corydon, Kentucky, where her remains were laid to rest.

MRS. ELIZABETH DAVIS.

Elizabeth Leadbetter was born in Shelby County, Ill., April 10, 1830. She died in Sullivan County, Ill., May 15, 1903. In early life she removed, with her parents, to Illinoistown, which place occupied in part the present site of East St. Louis.

She was married to William F. Davis, Oct. 23, 1845. At a protracted meeting, held in Fayette County, she was converted. She at once began to work for the Master: after spending a day in prayer for the conversion of her husband, she was rejoiced to find him yielding to the wooings of the Spirit, and uniting with the Methodist Episcopal Church. She became an active Sunday School worker. When her husband entered the ministry, she engaged heartily in his plans, and was to him, indeed, a willing helper. In revival work and in the instruction of those seeking Christ, she was zealous and efficient.

Genial in spirit, firm in conviction and earnest in her life, she was fitted to be the instrument of good to sin-burdened souls.

Her bereaved and afflicted husband, and five children, all beyond the years of childhood, are left to mourn their loss. *



REPORTS OF THE COMMITTEES.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND TRACTS.

In view of the great work of the Sabbath school in the upbuilding of the church, we urge that both pastor and superintendent give the most careful attention to the selection of teachers and of the literature used in the school. We recommend that our pastors do all they can to hold teachers meetings, normal classes and to organize the schools into missionary societies; also to adopt the Royal Army plans and to follow out the plan of Dr. Neely in grading and studies for the school.

TRACTS.

The Tract Society of the M. E. Church circulates religious literature in about twelve languages in the United States, and in more than twenty languages in foreign lands. It gives away 11,000,000 pages of tracts in the United States, and sends \$12,000 annually to our foreign missions for aid in the publication and circulation of religious literature. Distribution of tracts is made to soldiers, sailors, prisoners and public institutions, and pastors, for circulation. We recommend that our pastors avail themselves more generally of the liberal offer of the society. Inasmuch as the society needs \$50,000 per annum in order to carry on its work, we urge a more liberal collection.

COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

Our natural faculties are the gift of God. Their development and culture are among our highest duties. True education comprises the development of the faculties of the soul, as well as those of the mind. Therefore, those institutions of learning which provide culture for the mind alone do not meet the requirements of the followers of Christ.

For this reason Methodism early entered the educational field, and for this reason our educational institutions are among our richest inheritances.

Of all such heritages, the most precious, because of its age, its associations, achievements and possibilities is the one which God has committed to the especial care of our own Conference, McKendree College. We therefore submit the report of its Executive Committee, and embody the same in this report.

McKENDREE COLLEGE.
EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The past year has been one of progress in the varied departments of the College, while the present session is opening under the most favorable auspices. A noticeable feature is the constant im-

provement in the grade of our students; a fact especially noteworthy in the new matriculates for the current year, which opened on the 15th instant.

A gymnasium, a much needed adjunct to our college work, is now in progress of construction, under order of the Executive Committee, with the members of which the Joint Board, at its late annual session, left the question of its construction. The building is to be a neat structure, built of pressed brick, one story in height, covered with a metallic roof, and 40 by 80 feet in dimensions. The fund with which this building is being erected was created by a donation in the sum of \$2,000, by the late Mr. Andrew Eissenmeyer, of Trenton; the same to be, under the terms of his gift, appropriated toward the erection of a building on the college campus. This gift, secured by the President in 1898, was turned over by him to the Treasurer of the College, who loaned it out until the principal and interest now amount to about \$2,500, for which sum the erection of the building was contracted, so that, when it is completed, there will be no debt on the structure.

President Chamberlin continues his work in the effort to raise the added \$100,000 endowment, and has secured and now holds, including the \$20,000 of Dr. Pearsons, the sum of \$73,513 in thoroughly solvent subscriptions.

The Commission appointed at the late session of this Conference to co-operate with the President in the matter of the endowment, and to devise some means of equitable apportionment whereby such co-operation might be effected, after maturing a plan early in April, sent out circulars, together with subscription papers asking from each charge contributions to the amount of thirty per cent of the pastor's salary. As a result of this endeavor returns have been made as follows: written pledges to the amount of \$812.50 have been secured, and the sum of \$1,016 in unwritten promises. Of the written promises one subscription of \$100 and another of \$25 were conditioned that the whole amount be subscribed by June 1st and August 1st, respectively. The time having expired on the above named subscriptions, representing \$125, would reduce the \$812.50 of written promises to \$687.50. If the promises in the sum of \$1,016 were reduced to writing and made a part of the whole amount necessary to be presented to Dr. Pearsons before the College could claim his pledge of \$20,000, they, together with the \$687.50 of available written subscriptions, would aggregate \$1,703.50.

On the assumption that all the promises included in the above sum of \$1,703.50 were reduced to writing, the total amount of subscriptions, including those secured by President Chamberlin, would make an aggregate of \$75,276.50, leaving a balance of \$24,723.50 yet to raise to reach the whole amount of \$100,000.

The College has never been in better condition than at present. It holds, in educational circles, high grade standing because of the thoroughness of its work and the fine capabilities of its Board of Instruction. The utmost harmony prevails between Faculty and students.

The cash paid into the endowment during the past year amounts to \$850, making the aggregate of productive endowment funds \$37,645.73.

The Library is having constant additions made to it and, as heretofore reported, its shelf room is overcrowded and a new building is badly needed. The energy of McKendree's friends should be given in earnest effort to increase the endowment subscriptions until the desired sum of \$100,000 is reached. That accomplished and the rich legacy of the three-quarters of a century, made by the oldest college in Illinois, will be established in the public faith and greater things will quickly follow in the way of its expansion, some of which are already promised.

The Conference will rejoice in the fact that, during the past winter, under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. Resolved. That we, the members of the Southern Illinois Conference, are the uncompromising foes of this monster evil; and that our personal convictions should be regarded as above partizanship.

Resolved. That we endorse the present Anti-Saloon League movement of Illinois as a practical agency of the Church for opposition to the Saloon. We approve the proposition of the League to become an actual church federation, and basis of union for activity by all the foes of the Saloon. As it has proposed to turn over the

entire management of its policy and affairs to a board composed of representatives chosen by the different churches and state organizations, we recommend the appointment of a committee composed of John Harmon, W. T. Morris, M. N. Powers, Thos. Marshall and John Mitchell, to meet the other representatives to devise a plan.

Resolved, That we are in hearty sympathy with the Hepburn bill regarding the transportation of liquors between the several states and foreign countries.

Resolved, That we express our gratification at the marked revival of interest in temperance during the past year, as manifested by the sustained, insistent demand by thousands of our best citizens upon the legislature just adjourned, for the passage of a simple, comprehensive local option law. Also, that we renew our efforts for securing the passage of the original local option bill, as reported favorably by the House committee, and declare our belief in the efficiency of the Illinois Anti-Saloon League as the agency of the united church for accomplishing that result; and urge co-operation by the several churches in its plans for enlisting the church membership and securing funds for carrying on the campaign.

MEMORIAL FROM OLNEY DISTRICT.

WHEREAS, There is provision made in our book of Discipline for using the grades made by our theological students in the text books of approved institutions of learning, instead of requiring them to pass examination on the text books of the Conference Course, and considerable confusion, and great dissatisfaction results therefrom, with regard to some text books used by some of these institutions, and also some of the instructions given by some professors; therefore,

Resolved, (1) That we, the members of Olney District Conference, in Conference assembled, memorialize the Southern Illinois Conference at its next annual session, respectfully urging that they in turn memorialize our General Conference at its next session, in the month of May of the year 1904; respectfully praying:

(1) That they either discontinue, and forbid such substitution of text books, or unqualifiedly require all our institutions of learning to use such text books as are of orthodox authorship, and in strict harmony with the doctrines of the Methodist Episcopal Church as voiced in the twenty-five Articles of Religion and Ritual found in our book of Discipline and also as found in our original standards of faith. And *Resolved*, (2) That we most earnestly pray said General Conference to take such steps in their wisdom, as will effectually stop, and henceforth forbid all institutions of learning under our supervision employing such instructors or professors as will not insist upon the truth of God as voiced in said doctrines and standards of faith. And secondly,

WHEREAS, A persistent effort is being made to have all reference to amusements expunged from our book of Discipline, which would open wider the flood-gates of worldliness, and let in its demoralizing influence upon us; therefore,

Resolved, That we, in like manner, memorialize our General Conference at its session in the month of May, in the year 1904, respectfully and importunately praying that they leave paragraph 248 of our book of Discipline as it is; and if any change whatever is made therein, that they more emphatically legislate against these amusements that are so effectually paralyzing the spiritual power of some branches of the Christian church.

DOMESTIC MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

1. We recommend that the sum of \$2,000 be apportioned to the several districts to be raised in the manner of raising other benevolences, and that each district be allowed the amounts raised in its bounds; but in case of there being a field of exceptional need, the Presiding Elder may, by vote, make an appropriation for its support from the general fund.

2. In case there should be no exceptional field, we recommend that each of the Presiding Elders be entitled to draw and use the amount raised in his district.

3. We rejoice to note the material increase over last year. The amount raised last year was \$383; this year \$1,304, an increase of \$511. We urge the importance of this collection, and herewith nominate a corresponding secretary whose duty it shall be to call the attention of the pastors and people to the necessity of this work, and since the hour devoted to its interests at the present session of the Conference was so inspiring, we urge the continuance of this custom, that the interest thus represented may be duly emphasized.

4. We keenly appreciate the interest and enthusiasm of the Presiding Elders as manifested in the above mentioned anniversary.

We recommend the election of the following officers: president, T. H. Herdman; vice president, John Leeper; secretary, C. A. Beckett; treasurer, W. T. Morris; corresponding secretary, J. G. Harmon. Managers: C. W. Sabine, J. E. Nickerson, L. W. Porter.

Resolved, That the Southern Illinois Conference shall include all that part of the state of Illinois south of the following line, viz:—Beginning at a point on the Mississippi River at the north-west corner of Calhoun County, thence east along the north line of said county to the Illinois River; thence down the Illinois River to Columbiana; thence east to the north-east corner of Jersey Co., leaving Carrolton and Rockbridge in the Illinois Conference; thence in a south-easterly direction, leaving Chesterfield in the Illinois Conference and Litchfield in the Southern Illinois Conference; thence to Hillsboro, leaving Hillsboro in the Illinois Conference; thence to the north-west corner of Fayette County: thence along the north line of Fayette County and Effingham County to the west line of Cumberland County, leaving Herrick and Holliday in the Southern Illinois Conference: thence south to the south-west corner of Cumberland County: thence east along the south line of Cumberland and Clark Counties to the Wabash River.

In addition to this have given bed, blankets, sheets, comfortables and pillows. All the work of the year has been in connection with Summit Avenue M. E. Church, East St. Louis, Illinois.

REPORT OF F. M. VAN TREESE, PRESIDING ELDER
OF ALTON DISTRICT.

When Bishop Merrill appointed me Presiding Elder of Alton District, there were twenty-four charges and twenty-three pastors. Plainview, a small station paying \$300, was left to be supplied. One of my first official acts was to appoint my predecessor, W. E. Ravenscroft, to fill that vacancy; this was his last appointment. If Bishop Walden gives his official consent to the change in the boundry line between the Illinois and the Southern Illinois Conference, I will turn over to my successor thirty-one charges. This will make an increase of seven stations: four of these additional charges come from the development of the work in the original territory: the other three are from the territory acquired.

Alton District now has fourteen stations, seven half stations and ten circuits. We occupy the north-west corner of the Southern Illinois Conference—the garden spot of Illinois. At the last session of the Illinois and the Southern Illinois Conferences a commission from each Conference was appointed to consider the wisdom of changing the boundry between the two Conferences. That commission met at Litchfield and unanimously recommended a resolution, (see report), transferring Batchtown, Hamburg and Herrick to our Conference. The Batchtown circuit has a parsonage worth \$500, and two churches valued at \$2,800. They paid this year for pastoral support \$525. Hamburg has a parsonage valued at \$400, and three good churches valued at \$3,200, and paid the pastor \$425. Herrick has a good church worth \$2,000. Herrick is made the head of a circuit. Total membership transferred to our Conference is about 400. Dr. David Gay served the Batchtown work; I appointed Fred L. Cook to Hamburg work and H. B. Pollock to Herrick circuit. Early in the Conference year J. W. Abel of Granite City transferred to the Des Moines Conference; and later, R. P. Carson of Ramsey transferred to the Iowa Conference. Cameron Harmon, L. P., was appointed to fill the vacancy at Granite City; J. W. Webster of Fillmore was moved to Ramsey and V. B. Sullens, L. P., was appointed to Fillmore; P. J. Rinehart of Plainview transferred to the Northwest Indiana Conference, and G. W. Randle of Coffeen transferred to the Illinois Conference.

Three new churches have been built in the District this year. At Granite City a new and beautiful church has been erected on a lot donated by the Neidringhaus trustees, valued at \$5,000. The church has rock foundations and walls of pressed brick; when all the rooms are thrown together it will seat 800 people. The church cost \$19,000; over \$11,000 has been paid, balance is subscribed. East Alton has built a modern church costing \$1,700. Hamburg has a new church nearly completed, which will cost about \$2,000. Dr. E. W. Eiegenbaum, a generous layman of Edwardsville, bought from the M. E. Church South at Glen Carbon, their church and turned it over to our people at that place for their use. M. H. Ewers has a subscription of about \$6,000 to remodel and modernize First Church, Alton. Washington Street Alton Church has an offer from Mr.

and Mrs. Edward Levis to give two beautiful lots. It is proposed to sell the present church and build on the lots donated. In the near future we will have a beautiful church and parsonage in a desirable part of the city. The floods during the month of June destroyed much property. The greatest damage was seen in Venice; the church and parsonage were swept from their foundation, the parsonage damaged, the church almost ruined, our people scattered. I called upon the pastors of the district to take collections and send money to the pastor, C. O. McMullen; they generously sent him \$277.

On the Grafton charge Plainview paid a troublesome debt of \$160. A fund is on hand to improve the buildings at Grafton, Shiloh and Plainview. Coffeen has paid \$314 on parsonage debt and painted the parsonage. Reeds Chapel on Herrick charge has expended \$160 in repairs and improvements. Dorchester and Corrington Chapels, both on the Gillespie work, have been improved \$75 and \$60 respectively. Hornsby church has repaired and improved at a cost of \$125; Ramsey has built a new barn worth \$200; New Douglas has added another room to the parsonage. Medora church has been re-seated and expended \$500 in repairs and improvements.

This has not been a great year for revivals. The winter weather made the roads almost impassable. J. N. Eason had a great revival at Litchfield; C. L. York had a good meeting at Brighton; Samuel Thero had a revival at each of his three preaching places; D. T. Harris had conversions at New Douglas and Sorrento; Dr. Gay had a good revival at Batchtown. Fred L. Cook had revivals all over his circuit; E. L. Carson had two or three good meetings on the Elsayh charge. Chas. W. Koehler had a revival at Donnellson; E. Barnes had a good meeting at Gillespie; Cameron Harmon had almost a continuous revival at Granite City. Good meetings have been held that greatly strengthened the church that are not mentioned above. In all, there have been about 500 conversions and additions to the church.

The cause of missions has been given special attention. Four district missionary conventions were held during the month of May. Every charge was represented in these conventions; the sermons and addresses were inspiring and helpful. The district has made a steady and healthy increase every year; the year before I took charge the district reported \$985, and this year the reports show that we have more than met our apportionment. Commendable progress has been made in all the benevolent claims of the church; the preachers deserve great praise. The salaries of our preachers are entirely too low; there is an effort on the part of some of our people to keep them below the living point. The year before I took charge the average cash salary paid in Alton District was \$504, the last report shows an improvement to \$584. We will never be able to hold our young men in this needy field unless our people, out of their abundance, make a better provision for the preacher and his family. More than one charge in the district gives the promise of better salary next year. Let us hope as our people in-

crease in this world's goods they will be more liberal in the support of the ministry.

Dr. E. W. Fiegenbaum, of Edwardsville, the son of Rev. William Fiegenbaum for fifty years an effective minister of the German M. E. Church, has become greatly interested in providing an adequate support for our worthy superannuates and their widows. He, with four other well known business men and laymen of our church, viz.: S. M. Grubbs, of Litchfield; J. C. Eissenmeyer, of Trenton; T. S. Marshall, of Salem; and S. M. Mitchell of Mt. Carmel have secured letters of Incorporation under the laws of the State of Illinois for The Superannuates' Endowment Fund of the Methodist Episcopal Church. This fund is to be so managed that it will not interfere with any plan now in operation to provide relief for our Conference claimants. Subscriptions are to be taken to bring this fund up to \$100,000 before any dividends are declared.

I wish to record my gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for his providential care. During the six years I have enjoyed uninterrupted good health: I have not missed an appointment on account of personal illness. The Lord has manifested Himself graciously; I have enjoyed His presence. He has given us success as the printed reports will show. I can not enter into detail, and report each preacher's work. The best part of a minister's work can not be reported. My relation to the pastors has been pleasant and fraternal; I could not ask for better men or truer friends and co-laborers. My quarterly visits have made me acquainted with many laymen who are loyal and faithful sons of the fathers of Methodism; I am sure they will welcome, pray for and help whoever the Bishop may appoint as my successor. Alton District is an inviting field, it possesses great possibilities. Paul said to Timothy, "This is a true saying, if a man desires the office of a bishop he desireth a good thing." I would say, after six years of pleasant association with the preachers and laymen of the District, if any man desires the office of Presiding Elder of Alton District he desires a good thing.

REPORT OF N. CROW, PRESIDING ELDER OF MT. VERNON DISTRICT.

To Bishop Walden and Members of Southern Illinois Conference:—I herewith submit my report. The work in the Mt. Vernon District this year has been somewhat retarded by floods, bad weather, unusually bad roads, prevalence of contagious diseases in some localities, the transfer of some of our pastors and the resignation of some supplies: but notwithstanding these hindrances, commendable success has crowned the earnest endeavors of our pastors, and we are able to report progress in all departments of church work and life.

The evangelistic spirit, characteristic of true Methodism, has by no means departed from us, and our pastors, instinct with revival fervor and with a genuine passion for souls, have toiled faithfully and, in some instances, heroically for the salvation of the multitude of the lost, fructifying in the conversion of 1,000 souls. But there is a strange unaccountable fact, that there is not a corresponding increase in permanent accessions to the church. During our incumbency there have been not less than 7,000 conversions reported to us, yet the net gain in membership will scarcely reach 1,500.

While the trend of religious life seems more to the philanthropic and practical, we believe the spiritual thermometer registers a greater degree of intensity among our people than ever before, and the undercurrent of spiritual life is deeper and broader; yet, the general spiritual condition of our people is far from ideal, and in some instances is exceedingly low. We find ourselves unable to shake off the conviction that our churches are suffering more for lack of house to house visitation on the part of our pastors; more close, searching and loving pastoral oversight, and more distinctive Methodist preaching, together with a wise and firm enforcement of discipline, than from any other cause. The regrettable fact remains, that our churches are not exerting the moral influence and power over existing evil political, commercial and social conditions, they should; and they are not being recognized as a moral force to be reckoned with by the aggressive elements of wickedness as they should. In the cities and larger towns the churches are not reaching the masses, and our pastors, as a rule, preach to small congregations; but in the rural districts, in the villages and on the circuits the pastors have the right of way. And it occurs to us that the larger opportunities for the Methodist Episcopal Church are in the country places, which are now being neglected, if not forsaken, by other protestant denominations.

Catching the inspiration of the great Cleveland Convention, this year has been characterized by a marked increase in missionary intelligence and interest. Early in December, a mass missionary convention was held at Tamaroa, which did much to arouse our people and pastors. This was followed by missionary quarterly meetings and councils which did much good. Bishop Thoburn and Dr. Oldham spent three days with us at different points in the district. With this one exception we have been unable, during our term as presiding elder, to secure the services of any of our bishops or connectional men, and all that has been done was without the inspiration and helpfulness of their presence, addresses, sermons, lectures or songs. Our woman's missionary societies, while not an host numerically, are towers of strength in conserving and promoting the missionary life, spirit and intelligence. The real value of these cannot be measured by the ordinary methods of estimating the power and influence of societies, as they are the greatest missionary forces in the church. We only regret that all our women of Methodism are not actively identified with these societies.

Our Epworth Leagues, while not so strong in numbers and not so noisy as formerly, are crystalizing into living educational forces in the young life of the church, and are becoming more helpful to themselves and to the pastors. A most inspiring and helpful District convention was held last June in Mound City. We have not been unmindful of the importance of the religious instruction of children, and have been careful to put due emphasis on it in the quarterly conferences, and we believe there has been an increase in the number of classes formed for religious instruction and an improvement in the character of the instruction given in our Sunday schools. We do fear that this, the greatest opportunity of the church, is sadly slighted. In our judgment, there is no substitute for the personal supervision of this work by the pastor, himself. To preach to and catechise the children, it seems to us, is a golden opportunity that angels might covet. We also fear that the imperfect instruction given in our Junior Leagues and Sunday schools has largely taken the place of religious instruction in the home.

A clear, deep, rich religious experience and intelligence are the fountains from which all true Christian beneficence springs. Appreciating this, our pastors, as a rule, have been diligent in instructing our people in the nature, design and work of our great connectional societies, and our churches are growing in such an intelligent appreciation of them as will send continuous streams of offerings into the treasuries of these great arms of the church. The year has been rich in material progress—building, repairing, improving churches and parsonages and paying old indebtedness. Churches have been built and dedicated at Dareville, Greenbrier and White Oak on Waltonville circuit; at Oak Grove on Jonesboro circuit, this having taken the place of the last log church in our Conference. The one at Beech Grove on Ullin circuit will be dedicated soon after Conference. Oak Grove on Joppa circuit is now ready for dedication, and churches will be built at Unity and Beech Ridge on Olive Branch circuit, Boaz on Joppa circuit, and Black School House on Crab Orchard circuit. The five last named are places where we have never had churches. A commodious brick residence in the heart of the city has been purchased by our people at Du Quoin for a parsonage, and will be ready for occupancy after Conference. First Church, Mt. Vernon, have remodeled their parsonage, making it as good as any in the Conference. Murphysboro has let the contract for a three-thousand dollar parsonage. There have been many small improvements on church and parsonage property.

During the year a burdensome debt of long standing, on our church property at Anna, has been paid. The debt at Cairo, which has overshadowed our church there for twelve years, which was \$7,500 six years ago, has, under the efficient leadership of Dr. J. A. Scarritt, been reduced to \$1,400, and we now have more hope for our cause at that place. There will not be an embarrassing debt on our property in the District left to our successor. One of our most serious problems is that of pastoral support. Many of our hard-

working pastors are paid but little better than good farm hands. This has been a matter of deep solicitude to us, and we have endeavored to have the assessments increased and all paid, and while there are deficiencies on pastors' claims, they were never better paid. Our people are advancing steadily in ministerial support; we have an increase of \$1,100 over any other year. A number of charges have signified their intention to increase their assessments the coming year, and we prophesy better support for our pastors. If our charges do not increase the amounts for pastoral support, our cause will suffer, for to secure the ministerial services demanded for the salaries, is an impossibility.

Six years ago the irresponsible tramp preacher, boasting that he was not connected with any of the churches, but was out on his own hook; who spent his time denouncing presiding elders, bishops and the Methodist church, and took collections for the "cause," which was himself, had free access to many of our churches and many pastors found themselves almost helpless when he was abroad. Against him and trustees who allowed him to use our churches, we have waged an unceasing opposition, making it a rule to put such trustees out of office at the next quarterly conference, till now he cannot use any of our pulpits, and he has gone to a more congenial clime, and peace now reigns where ecclesiastical anarchy was almost supreme.

During our term on the District, twenty-one have been licensed to preach, ten of whom are in the active work, four are now in school seeking a better preparation for the ministry. Being instrumental in starting this large number of men in the ministry we regard as being a work of no secondary importance, for many of these will be preaching the gospel of the Son of God after we have gone hence. Two men, Brothers Keplinger and Green, both in the active work, have passed away. Two superannuates, Brothers Bruner and Franklin, have also finished their course and gone to their eternal reward. During these six years seventy-five pastors have been with us in the work of the District. They have been loyal and true to the cause of the Master, and for them we have nothing but love in our heart. We have tried to be as loyal to them as they have been to us. We do feel that no Presiding Elder could have been more heartily sustained in all his plans and work than we have been by the pastors who have served in the Mt. Vernon District with us. Our visits to their charges and in their homes have been bright spots in our life. We have the same appreciation of our splendid laymen, and shall never forget their many acts of kindness to us.

In conclusion, we desire to take a brief retrospective view of the six years' work. During these there has been a gain of twenty-nine churches and an increase of five parsonages; five churches have been remodeled; an increase of seven pastoral charges; an increase of 1500 members and 100 probationers; paid on old indebtedness, \$17,670; a net gain in the valuation of church property of \$19,000; an increase in pastoral support of \$7,000; an increase in contributions to the benevolences of \$2,500; an increase of Sunday Schools, with an increase of officers, teachers and scholars of 2160.

The Committee on Credentials reported. On motion, report seating all delegates present, was adopted. On motion Conference adjourned to meet at 2 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference convened at 2 p. m., after devotional exercises the Committee on Permanent Organization reported, recommending that the temporary organization be made permanent. The Committee on Rules of Order reported, a substitute for this report was offered and adopted. This substitute authorized an informal ballot placing persons in nomination, said persons to be balloted for until the required number be elected. The Committee on Resolutions reported as follows:

Resolved, We, the members of the Lay Electoral Conference of the Southern Illinois Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in behalf of the laity of the Conference, reaffirm our loyal adherence to the principles, polity, doctrines and discipline of our church; believing that the Methodists can only be successful in their mission while they, and to the extent that they so remain, true to the principles that have characterized Methodism in the past. We are opposed to any change in the Discipline that will place us before the world as compromising with evil, or surrendering our principles.

We affirm our unalterable opposition to the liquor traffic in all its forms and phases, and call upon every Methodist to take a bold, firm stand for its total annihilation, and in favor of God and Home and Native Land.

Since Methodism, to be true, must be a spiritual power, and this depends upon the spiritual life of its members, we recommend the re-establishment of the family altars wherever abandoned, and the regular attendance upon the means of grace, especially the prayer and class meetings, by all our members.

The failure of the laity to properly support the ministry of our Conference is a blot upon its fair name. This ought not to be. Christian stewardship is one of the foundations of a true religious life. We therefore recommend the adoption of the plan of systematic giving by our members, confident that this will supply every need and make it possible for our Conference and every charge to do its full duty in supporting the ministry and meeting the benevolent needs of our church.

To the Baptist Church of Mt. Vernon and its pastor, for the use of this church, and to the good people of Mt. Vernon, for their hospitality shown to the members of this Conference, we return our sincere thanks.
