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
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JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS.

FIRST DAY.

The North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in its Forty-Ninth Session at Tryon Street Methodist church, in the city of Charlotte, N. C., on Wednesday, November 25th, 1885, at 94 o'clock A. M., Bishop JOHN C. KEENER presiding, who opened the Conference with religious services.

W. H. BOBBITT, P. E., stated that, upon the presentation of serious complaints, during the interval of the Annual Conference, against the moral character of L. L. HENDREN, Presiding Elder of the Statesville District, by three traveling elders, Bishop WILSON had appointed a committee of investigation consisting of six traveling preachers, viz: JOSEPH WHEELER, J. C. ROWE, P. F. W. STAMEY, M. V. SHERRILL, ZEBEDEE RUSH and G. W. IVEY, over which committee he had been appointed to preside, with G. W. IVEY as prosecutor, and that, after due investigation, the committee suspended the said L. L. HENDREN, and had formulated charges of gross immorality. He now presented to the Annual Conference all the papers in the case before the committee and asked for the proper disciplinary action; whereupon the Bishop appointed a committee of investigation composed of six elders, viz: JOSEPH WHEELER, J. C. ROWE, P. F. W. STAMEY, M. V. SHERRILL, ZEBEDEE RUSH and G. W. IVEY, to whom the said papers were referred.

A communication, signed by R. S. RIVES, Pastor, and E. POTTS, Trustee, of the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, of this city, was read, inviting the members of this Body to attend the Thanksgiving services in that church on to-morrow morning at 11 o'clock, on which occasion a discourse would be delivered by Rev. J. T. BAGWELL, D. D., of Winston, N. C.; also to attend a lecture at the same place to-morrow evening at $7\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock, by Bishop J. J. MOORE, D. D., of York, Pa.

The Secretary was instructed to respond that the Conference indulged the hope that both occasions would be a source of rich enjoyment to their congregation and visitors, and that as many of this Body, who could find it convenient to do so, would attend.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction by Bishop KEENER.

W. L. CUNINGGIM was elected Assistant Secretary to the Conference and Jas. H. SOUTHGATE, Recording Secretary.

Question 2 was rëcalled, viz:

"Who remain on trial?"

WILLIAM F. COFFIN, DUNCAN A. FUTRELL, JOSEPH G. NELSON, JAMES R. BETTS, WILLIAM W. ROSE, JOHN E. WOOSLEY and ALPHEUS E. WILEY, passed the examination of character, were approved by the Examining Committee and continued on trial.

BASCOM A. YORK passed the examination of character, but failing to appear before the committee of examination was continued on trial in the class of the first year.

THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY, November 27th, 1885.

The Conference convened at 9 o'clock, Bishop KEENER in the chair, and was opened with religious services conducted by Rev. T. H. PEGRAM.

On motion of F. L. REID, the call of the roll was dispensed with to-day and for the remainder of the session.

LUDOLPHUS E. THOMPSON, who was granted location at his request in 1883, having been recommended by the Quarterly Conference of Alamance Circuit, Durham District, according to the Discipline, was re-admitted.

An invitation was received from Mrs. Fox and Mrs. WILKES, President and Secretary of the Board of Managers of St. Peter's Home and Hospital of this city, to the members of the Conference to visit that institution when convenient.

On motion of R. O. BURTON, the Secretary was instructed to make suitable acknowledgment of the courtesy.

T. A. STONE was granted leave of absence from and after to-day.

D. B. NICHOLSON, lay delegate from the Wilmington District, was granted leave of absence from and after to-day, and W. J. PARKER, alternate, was announced as present.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction by the Bishop.

FOURTH DAY.

SATURDAY, November 28th, 1885.

The Conference assembled at 9 o'clock, Bishop KEENER in the chair, and was opened with religious services conducted by Rev. M. J. HUNT.

The journal of yesterday was read and approved.

- L. W. CRAWFORD presented the reports of Oak Institute and Jonesboro High School, which were read and referred by caption to the Board of Education.
- Rev. D. C. Kelly, D. D., Treasurer of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, was introduced to the Conference.

The hour of 12 o'clock to-day was set apart for the consideration of the interests of Foreign Missions.

- U. M. WAHAB, alternate from the Durham District, was announced as present in place of JAMES H. SOUTHGATE.
- J. F. MI. LER, lay delegate from New Berne District, was announced as present.
- F. C. ROBBINS, W. C. NORMAN, H. C. WALL and T J. DAILY were appointed on the Board of Education to supply vacancies.
- R. S. Webb and L. E. Stacy were excused from service on the committee on the appeal of A. N. Betts and N. A. Hooker and J. L. Keen were appointed in their places.

Question 10 was taken up, viz:

"What local preachers are elected deacons?"

DECATUR F. MORROW having been recommended, according to the Discipline, by the Quarterly Conference of Co-

lumbus Mission, Shelby District, was elected to deacon's orders.

L. L. NASH, from the committee to whom were referred the papers in reference to Paine Institute, submitted the following report, which was read:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE FOR PAINE INSTITUTE.

The committee to whom were referred certain papers in relation to the Paine Institute, located in the city of Augusta, Georgia, and designed for the education of colored ministers and teachers, for "The Colored Methodist Episcopal Church, of America," have had the same under consideration, and beg leave to submit the following report:

This is a connectional institute, organized by the authority of the General Conference of the M. E. Church, South, and has been in operation for nearly two years. The first year there were enrolled 125 pupils, and the second year there have been enrolled 146 pupils. The Board of Trustees having no house of their own in which to invite their pupils, and no means with which to build or buy suitable houses for the purpose, were compelled to open their school in a hired house, which was far from having such capacity and conveniences as were necessary for conducting a school of that grade, and yet their success has really been phenominal, and should be cause for profound gratitude to Almighty God. The object commends itself to every christian man—and especially to every Southern Methodist, and we are glad of the opportunity of placing upon record our words of sincere sympathy for the Paine Institute, whose object is the furnishing of the C. M. E. Church of America with an educated ministry and teachers, and through them disseminate the spirit of general education among our colored people.

We are glad to welcome to our Conference, Rev. W. C. Dunlap, "Commissioner of Education," acting under authority from the General Conference, and by appointment of Bishop McTyeire, to collect funds for purchasing suitable property for the school, and we hereby request Bishop Keener, President of our Conference, to allow Bro. Dunlap to present the claims of the institution at such time as may suit his convenience.

L. S. BURKHEAD, from the committee appointed at the last Annual Conference on the subject of a Division of the Conference, submitted the following report, representing a majority of the committee, which was read:

Resolved, That the following report be made to Conference:

Your committee appointed to propose a plan for a division of the North Carolina Conference, have, after a full and fair discussion and consideration of various propositions, failed to agree upon any plan. We, therefore, deem it inexpedient to memorialize the General Conference, and ask to be discharged from the further consideration of the subject.

L. S. Burkhead, representing a minority of the committee, presented, also, the following report, which was read:

MINORITY REPORT—DIVISION OF CONFERENCE.

WHEREAS, the majority of the committee have failed to propose any plan for the division of the North Carolina Conference; and whereas, we, the undersigned, honestly believe that the Conference should be divided, beg leave to submit the following minority report:

It will be remembered that, at the session of our Conference held in the city of Raleigh in December, 1882, a committee, consisting of Revs. C. M. Pepper, N. H. D. Wilson, H. T. Hudson, J. T. Bagwell and L. S. Burkhead, clerical; and E. J. Lilly, T. M. Jones, E. A. Thorne, R. R. Crawford and J. B. Connelly, laymen, was appointed to "consider and report upon the subject of the division of the North Carolina Conference." This committee did make a report which was adopted by the Conference on December 12th, 1882. The following are the resolutions:

Resolved 1, That we deem it wise and proper to look forward to an arrangement for the division of our Conference at the next General Conference.

Resolved 2, That, in our judgment, it will be proper for the Annual Conference of 1884 to appoint a committee consisting of one minister and one layman from each presiding elder's district, who shall propose a plan for the division of this Conference to be submitted to the Annual Conference of 1885, so that such plan may, when acted upon, be presented to the General Conference of 1886.

As the majority of the committee appointed under the last resolution, refuse to present any plan for division, we, a minority of said committee, believe that the time has come when the glory of God and the interests of our Church demand a division of the Conference. And we herewith submit some reasons for this belief.

1st. The Conference has grown too large and burdensome to be easily entertained at our annual sessions, except in a few of our largest towns and cities, while many of our smaller towns, both in the east and west, anxious to extend to us their hospitality, are deprived of the privilege.

and. The territory of our Conference stretches over a country about four hundred miles in length, embracing two totally dissimilar climates which endanger the health of the preachers and their families who do not remain long enough in either to become acclimated, and furthermore, this length of travel forces upon them bills of heavy expenses, which diminish the small pittance left them after their necessary expenses are paid at home.

3rd. The division of large churches and circuits tends to more rapid development, and we believe that this is equally true of large Conferences.

4th. There are in this Conference 74,888 church members, and 182 pastoral charges. An equal division would give each Conference 37,444 church members, and 91 pastoral charges. This would leave the number to be entertained at the annual sessions of each of the two Conferences about 175 persons, which would sufficiently tax the hospitality of our towns and cities.

5th. Our Conference is so large that the routine business consumes nearly all the time of our annual sessions, and there is little opportunity to specially emphasize the great interests of the church by *conferring together*, and thus creating the proper enthusiasm and harmony in behalf of education, missions, church literature and the other great connectional interests of our Church.

6th. We believe the spread of the gospel will be promoted by this measure,

and this is the great paramount interest of the Church. Grow and divide is the great law of Methodism.

Finally. Division is a foregone conclusion—a mere question of time, and we honestly believe that now is the auspicious time to divide our Conference. We have no Conference property but Trinity College (Davenport having been leased for a term of years,) and this can, and should be made the joint property of the two Conferences, and its annual commencements the rallying point for brotherly greetings and the unification of our glorious Methodism in North Carolina. It is, therefore,

Resolved, That we recommend the North Carolina Conference to memorialize the General Conference of the M. E. Church, South, which is to meet in Richmond, Va., in the month of May, 1886, to divide the North Carolina Conference according to the following plan, to-wit:

- I. To transfer to the North Carolina Conference all the territory of North Carolina now embraced in the Virginia and Holston Cenferences, and then divide the State *equitably* into an Eastern and Western North Carolina Conference.
- 2. Should the General Conference refuse to transfer the Holston territory, then we ask the transfer of that part of our State now embraced in the Virginia Conference, and divide equitably into an Eastern and Western North Carolina Conference.
- 3. If either the Virginia or Holston territory can be obtained, then to divide equitably into an Eastern and Western North Carolina Conference.
- 4. But if neither of the above territories can be obtained, then we request the General Conference to divide our present Conference equitably into an Eastern and Western North Carolina Conference.

JAMES WILLSON presented a resolution, passed by the Warrenten District Conference, requesting the appointment of a Sunday-school agent for this Annual Conference as contemplated in answer 2, paragraph 60 of the discipline, which was referred to the Sunday School Board.

Question 7 was rëcalled, viz:

"Who are the deacons of one year?"

CLATER W. SMITH, CHARLES O. DURANT, LAWRENCE O. WYCHE, BARNA B. HOLDER, EDWARD L. PELL and ALPHEUS McCullen, having been approved by the Examining Committee, and having passed the examination of character were continued deacons of one year.

WILLIAM J. CROWSON passed the examination of character, and was continued in the class of the third year.

The hour of 12 o'clock having arrived, the Bishop introduced the subject of Foreign Missions as the special order.

Dr. D. C. Kelly addressed the Conference. After which pledges were obtained from the preachers for a collection on their pastoral charges for Foreign Missions during the month of February next.

On motion of F. L. REID, the time of this morning's session was extended.

Rev. DAVID MORTON, D. D., Secretary of the Board of Church Extension, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, was introduced to the Conference.

Under question 18, "Who are superannuated?" the application of CHARLES M. ANDERSON for a superannuated relation was, on motion of W. H. MOORE, referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

T. S. CAMPBELL read the following memoir of JOHN W. LEWIS:

MEMOIR OF JOHN W. LEWIS.

Rev. John W. Lewis was brought up in his native county of Randolph, N. C. His family was among the best people of the county. He received such training in schools and business habits as fitted him for life's responsibilities and exerted upon his whole life and char, eter a salutary influence, We know not the date of his conversion and connection with the Church. But he entered on probation, the Virginia Conference in 1833 when about 25 years of age. He continued in the regular work fifty-two and a half years. The first year he was assigned as helper to Iredell circuit, second to Stokes circuit as helper; in 1835 in charge of Straits, 1836 Duplin, 1837 Iredell, 1838 and 1839 Rowan. From that time till his death he traveled circuits, often at great inconvenience and sacrifice of domestic privileges. His last charge was Abbott's Creek Mission.

He was consecrated, zealous and devoted to his work. He never complained of any appointment and always went to his work promptly and cheerfully. He discharged his duty according to his ability usually with much success. When in his prime, he was one of the most successful revivalists. Hundreds of persons in sections where he labored, were led to Christ by him, and few will receive a crown fuller of stars than his. He attended to all the interests of the Church. It is believed that he was instrumental in building more churches than any other member of the Conference. These stand as monuments to his zeal, good management and love of souls. He did hard work and did it well. He had a fine mind well stored with good things. His common sense and sound judgment were conspicuous traits. He was brother-in-law of the late Rev. James Reid and maternal

uncle of Rev. Dr. N. F. Reid. He was their loved and trusted friend. When Dr. Reid died, he wrote his biography and did it well.

In the community in which he lived for years every body had the utmost confidence in him and loved him devotedly. Ite had a bright, cheerful and deep piety that charmed and attracted both old and young. His was a full rounded character and one ripe for Heaven. He died at home in Thomasville, of paralysis, May 23, 1885. He has gone from labor to rest.

R. T. N. STEPHENSON read the following memoir of ROBERT P. BIBB:

MEMOIR OF ROBERT P. BIBB.

Rev. Robert P. Bibb was born and brought up in Nelson county, Virginia. His family was highly respected and pious.

His educational advantages were such as to develop and train his mind and cultivate his taste. He professed faith in Christ in early life, and his life and piety were consistent. Having united with the Methodist Church, he soon gave evidence that he was chosen of God for usefulness in the Church. He entered on trial in the Virginia Conference in 1836, and was sent as helper on Bedford circuit. The next year he was stationed in the town of Washington. Then on Tarboro circuit, next on Orange. He continued to labor with acceptability and usefulness on many fields of labor, until he became so enfeebled, that, in 1875, he asked to be placed in a superannuated relation.

He returned to his home at Tripity College, but did not lose his love of the gospel, but labored with the brethren on charges near him with his usual zeal and with a good degree of success.

He preached his last sermon at Prospect Church, Randolph circuit, July, 1884. From that time he gradually gave way until the 29th of June, 1885, he fell asleep in Jesus. On approaching the river he spoke as if it would afford him pleasure to pass over and be with the brethren who had gone before. Robert P. Bibb was a good preacher. He was conversant with many poetical works, and especially with Methodist Hymnology. His preaching was magnetic. People were delighted to hear him.

J. R. GRIFFITH read the following memoir of HENRY GRAY:

MEMOIR OF HENRY GRAY.

Rev. Henry Gray was born in Williamston, Martin county, N. C., March 23d, 1800, and died at his home near Orange Factory, Durham Co., N. C., Saturday, March 18th, 1885, and his remains now rest in the cemetery at

Mt. Bethel church, Durham circuit. Bro, Gray was converted at his home August 5th, 1832, and soon after connected himself with the Church, and was licensed to preach by Rev. Joseph Carson. He was a successful local preacher for six years. In 1838 he joined the North Carolina Conference, and was sent to the Neuse circuit, where he had over two hundred converts, and this was the beginning of Methodism in that section of Crayen county. In 1841 and 1842 Bro. Gray traveled Sampson circuit, and during the two years reported one thousand conversions. In 1845 and 1846 he was on Trent circuit from which he reported gracious times, over one thousand converts. The next five or six years he did only occasional work, being in poor health. In 1850 he was sent to Columbia circuit and reported over two hundred conversions. In 1851 and 1852 he traveled Mattamuskeet circuit from which he reported eight hundred conversions. In 1853 and 1854 he was sent to Roanoke circuit. In 1855 he was stationed at the Mission church, Raleigh, N. C., now Person street, from which he reports one hundred converts. In 1856 he was sent to Granville circuit. In 1857 and 1858 he was on Hillsboro and Uwharrie circuits, from which he reported two hundred converts. In 1859 his health failed so completely that he took a superannuated relation and remained in that relation until his death. In looking over Bro. Gray's work, we find that his success in winning souls to Christ was truly wonderful. During twenty years of active work he reports nearly five thousand conversions. A great man once said he is the greatest preacher, who brings most souls to Christ, and judging Father Gray by this standard we pronounce him a much grander man than the world has given him credit for. The greatness of his work will be seen, when the souls converted through his agency begin to shine as stars in his crown. They that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament, and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars forever and ever. Father Gray did a vast deal of good work after his superannuation, but it will take too much space to follow him through all of his devious paths of preaching, exhorting, singing, praying in season and out, until his strength was literally worn out in the service of the Lord. Thus full of years, abundant in labors, and mighty in faith this veteran of the cross has passed triumphantly to his reward. Sweet in spirit and gentle in manners he scattered benedictions all along the pathway of life and leaves to the world the rich legacy of a consistent and shining christian life.

T. S. CAMPBELL read the following memoir of JOHN W. FLOYD:

MEMOIR OF JOHN W. FLOYD.

Rev. John W. Floyd was born in Granville county, N. C., January 8th, 1822, and died in Boone, N. C., July 3d, 1885. His early life was subject

to religious influence and training to such an extent that he did not fall into the vices common to the young in that day. He became pious in his early years. He was licensed to preach and received on trial in the Conference in 1845, and was appointed helper on Davidson circuit, 1846 to Mocksville, 1847 to Alleghany, 1848 and 1849 to Taylorsville, 1850 to Raleigh circuit, and continued to labor in various charges until 1861, when, on account of throat affection and nervous prostration, he became superannuated which relation be sustained till death. After he became superannuated, he continued to serve the Church in any and every way he could holding prayer and class-meetings, and preaching when he could, showing a desire to advance the cause of God he dearly loved. To a considerable extent he was useful and successful. While not a fluent speaker he was sound and clear in his exposition and presentation of the Truth and edifying in preaching the word. When he retired from the pastoral work he was in comfortable circumstances, but with the close of the war adversity came, yet, he sought no aid from the Church. But Dr. Closs brought his case before the Financial Board which entered his name as a deserving claimant upon the Conference funds. If anything was given him none were more thankful. If he received nothing he never murmurred or complained against the Church. His resignation to the action of the Conference was beautiful and worthy of imitation. He was not able to do much, but did what he could in labor "working with his own hands." He was a consecrated man. His piety was of a high type. He lived in love and charity with his neighbors, and was regarded by them as a deeply pious man. In his sickness when asked as to his prospects be replied "My preparations have long been made and I have no choice to make between life and death."

J. R. GRIFFITH, for S. V. HOYLE, read the following memoir of CHARLES H. PHILLIPS:

MEMOIR OF CHARLES H. PHILLIPS.

Rev. Charles H. Phillips was born in Moore county, N. C., December 27th, 1814, converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, under the ministry of Rev. Jackey M. Bradley in 1841, and died at his home in Randolph county, N. C., May 19th, 1885. He was admitted on trial into North Carolina Conference at its session in Warrenton in the fall of 1850. In 1852 he was ordained deacon, and elder in 1854 by Bishop Pierce. In 1853 he was married to Lizzie Skeen, of Randolph county, who still lives with their two sons to mourn their loss.

His first appointment was to Fayetteville circuit in 1851. He served the Guilford circuit in 1852 and 1853, and thus continuously from year to year

he was in the itinerant field until 1885, when he was discharged from duty by the Captain of the Great Militant Host.

For two or three years he had been growing more feelble. But he persisted in doing his work against the earnest entreaties of his family and friends, "until the zeal of God's house had eaten him up." Though worn down with disease and labors he entered upon this, his last field, with full determination to make full proof of his ministry. It very soon became apparent to all but himself that he was stooping to the shore where departure is made for the "rest that remains for the people of God." Up to the second quarterly meeting he was at, or in reach of, every appointment. When the day came weather too inclement for the congregations to assemble only kept him from the house of God. April the 1st he was induced to abandon all idea of work until his health should improve. But O how he clung to his work and his people! He had them indeed in his heart.

Leisurely and in feebleness extreme he made his way home never to leave it again until devout men carried him to his burnal.

Disease was doing its work rapidly, and May 19th his spirit left the cumbering clay. He was hopeful to the last that he might recover, but as might have been expected, he was tranquil, ready, and satisfied to live or die. That God whom he had served so faithfully was with him and among his last words he said: "If I die, I'm going to heaven."

His piety was undoubted, his sympathies being easily aroused, his services were much sought by those who were afflicted. His sermons and prayers were full of comfort and encouragement to those who sighed for the "touch of vanished hand or the sound of a voice that was still." He was a good preacher, a man that wore well, and useful in every field that he ever-served. He regarded the four years spent on the Patrick and Henry circuits as his most successful years.

His preaching looked to the foundations of doctrine and experience tending to the conversion of sinners and the establishment of the people of God. A few days before his death he called his wife and said every congregation he ever served was vividly pictured before his mind and impressed upon his heart. But he rests from his labors and his works do follow him.

JAMES H. SOUTHGATE read the following memoir of BAXTER C. PHILLIPS:

MEMOIR OF BAXTER CLEGG PHILLIPS.

Rev. Baxter Clegg Phillips was born near Fair Haven, Moore county, N. C., on the 29th day of July, 1841, and died in Qurham, N. C., March 16th, 1885.

He professed faith in Christ at the age of thirteen, united with the Meth-

odist Episcopal Church, South, and thenceforth, through the scenes of young manhood, at home and in the war, maintained the confidence of his associates as an humble devoted follower of the blessed Master. He was licensed to preach at Center Church. Moore county, in the fall of 1866, and began work the next year as a supply on the Montgomery circuit.

The North Carolina Conference convened at Wilmington the same year, and he was admitted on trial in the traveling connection. During the years 1808–'69 '70 and '71 his labors were confined to the Pee Pee, now the Mt. Gilead circuit, and in 1872 he was sent to the Mattamuskeet circuit, but owing to feeble health and untavorable climatic influences he retained this appointment one year only, the place of his labors being changed to Jonesboro circuit, where he worked faithfully for four years, 1873–'76 inclusive.

During 1877-'78 and '79 he served the people of Laurinburg circuit; leaving it for Randleman's station in 1880. His work at this appointment in 1880-'81-'82 and '83 was of the highest order and brought into notice characteristics which stamped him a strong, growing influential man of God. He was pastor of Peison Street Church, Raleigh, during 1884, and at the Wilmington Conference of that year he was appointed to Trinity Church, Durham, where, after a few months of indefatigable, labor, he died, as only the true and faithful servant of God can die.

It was here that all the excellencies of mind and heart were called into lively exercise. His preaching was forceful, impressive, perspicuous and at times truly cloquent. "Repentance towards God and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ" seemed to be the end and aim of each discourse. He gave forth the marrow and fatness of the gospel from a mind well stored with the truth as it is in Jesus, and a heart that felt the burden of souls. He was endowed with that true oratorical power which compelled his hearers to listen attentively to his words, as he, with great liberty of speech and convincing argument, would declare the truth. As a pastor he was pre-eminent, as an organizer he was a grand success. No labor seemed too arduous, no obstacle too hard to be overcome, and like a skillful general he lead his people to certain victory.

Kind, generous and true, with an uncomprising love of right, he was an agreeable companion and a faithful friend. With his powerful intellect and eloquent tongue he fearlessly opposed with all the fire of his soul, whatever he considered wrong.

His work is done. The roadway of life ended abruptly in the "valley of the shadow," but his record was fairly made, his work fully rounded and from beyond the clouded shadow shine the rays of his life's good deeds to point out his pathway. Sad hearts and sorrowing sympathies followed him to his grave and linger now with a cherishing love, near those he has left behind.

JOSEPH D. ARNOLD read the following memoir of LEMUEL H. GIBBONS:

MEMOIR OF LEMUEL II. GIBBONS.

Rev. Lemuel II. Gibbons was born near LaGrange, Lenoir county, N. C., August 26th, 1844.

He was the son of a Methodist preacher, Rev. H. H. Gibbons, of the North Carolina Conference.

He was but six years of age when his father joined the ministry, and there were thus thrown around him the influences of a Church at whose altars, his own father ministered.

But Gibbons gave himself to God when but nine years of age, and remained a faithful member to the day of his death.

He joined the Church under the ministry of Rev. Paul J. Carraway.

When the dark cloud of war gathered over our country, and a call was made upon her sons to come to her defence, Bro. Gibbons, at the age of eighteen, entered the Confederate service and remained until the close of the war.

In 1869 he was licensed to preach and in 1870 joined the Conference, and responded cheerfully to every call made upon him to the very close of life.

He traveled successively the Carthage, Yanceyville, Oxford and Haw River circuits. Follow him on this round of appointments, and you will find his warm, life-long friends among the people he has served. He was loved and respected where he was best known. He thus gave his life to his Master, following the Godly example of his father.

When a son follows his father into the ministry, we have an example that may justly challenge the confidence and admiration of men. It is an unmistakable evidence of decided christian training.

Bro. Gibbons was a man of solid, sterling qualities. Quiet in his demeanor, firm in his purposes, faithful in his engagements. The summons came to the strong man when he was but fairly upon the arena of life. He had not passed into the "sear and yellow leaf" but, he fell in the front rank of effective men, in the full vigor of manhood, with a wife and happy family around him.

His work was done and the time of his departure at hand.

He died on the 11th day of June, 1885. The brethren among whom he willingly labored for fourteen years, this day write in a tribute of confidence and affection and invoke the blessings of our Common Father upon the bereaved and stricken in heart.

What greater comfort can sustain in the hour of death than a clear, well-defined consciousness that we have tried to know and to do the will of God concerning us. A consciousness that we have tried to follow the leading of

the Good Spirit with an eye single to the glory of God and the welfare of men. In such a case we have clearly a Divine right to comfort through our Lord Jesus Christ, and there is that within us that speaks with the authority of inspiration and says, "Well done, good and faithful servant."

HUGH F. WILEY read the following memoir of WILLIAM I. HULL:

MEMOIR OF WILLIAM I. HULL.

Rev. William Ireneus Hull was born in Cabarrus county, N. C., October 7th, 1854, and died at King's Mountain, N. C., February 2d, 1885, aged 30 years, 3 months and 21 days. He was the son of Rev. Joel Hull, a minister of the Lutheran Church. Bro. Hull was converted when about nine years old, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Palm Tree, South Fork circuit, under the ministry of Rev. John J. Prather. He was educated at Rutherford College. After he left college he went to Union county, N. C., where he was engaged in teaching for several years. On the 13th day of June, 1875, he was happily married to Miss Mary Ella Belk, daughter of Mr. D. P. Belk, of Union county. In 1877 he was licensed to preach at the fourth Quarterly Conference of Pleasant Grove circuit, Dr. Wm. H. Bobbitt presiding. He served the North Charlotte circuit as a supply, part of the year 1879, and at the Conference held in Wilson, December 1879, he was received on trial, and appointed by Bishop Wightman to the Topsail circuit. He served this charge three years, and was very acceptable and popular. At the Conference held at Durham, December, 1881, he was received into full connection, and ordained deacon by Bishop Pierce. In 1883 he traveled the Duplin circuit, and at the Conference held at Statesville, 1883, he was ordained elder by Bishop Keener, and appointed to Fifth Street Church, Wilmington, N. C. He entered upon the duties of this pastoral charge in feeble health, but by his devotion and consistent piety he soon won his way to the hearts of this people. He was much loved, and esteemed among them and bid fair to be eminently useful. But his course of usefulness was rapidly drawing to a close. In the early part of the year his health failed entirely, and on the third Sunday in April, 1884, he preached his last sermon. He continued, however, in charge of the church until the close of the Conference year, other ministers supplying his lack of service. His church paid his salary in full for the entire year, and in many other ways manifested their appreciation and sympathy, for their much beloved, but afflicted pastor. At the Conference held in Wilmington, December, 1884, Bro. Hull was placed in the superannuated relation. Soon after Conference he moved to King's Mountain for medical treatment. But such was the nature of his disease, that neither change of climate nor medical

skill could stay its progress. He gradually and constantly grew worse. But he had thoroughly conscerated himself to God, and was not alarmed at the approach of death. Though nearing the Dark Valley, his faith pierced the vista and rested upon the celestial glory of the Bright Beyond. He highly appreciated any kindness done for him during his affliction; often referred to his kind friends in Wilmington. He spoke affectionately and tenderly of their many kindnesses. A few weeks before his death, in referring to God's goodness to him during his illness, he said: "I have had a good time during my illness; I have really enjoyed it." Rev. H. F. Wiley says: "A few days before his death when taking leave of him, he requested me to return again the same evening. When I had come, and seated myself by him, he said, I am going to die, and I wanted to send love to our brethren of the Conference, and the Church, especially the church in Wilmington, and I want you to be the messenger of it." We then talked about the beautiful home of the good in Heaven. With a radiant smile, he said, "It is delightful to think of it." In this happy frame of mind, at 7 o'clock, February 2d, 1885, his gentle spirit passed peacefully away from earth, to his reward in Heaven.

Bro. Hull was modest and unobstrusive, but amiable and affectionate. He had a clear intellect, sound judgment, and above all a strong faith. His life was gentle; his death was peaceful. In his death the Church has lost a faithful minister, "but our loss is his gain." "Thanks be unto God which giveth us the victory, through our Lord Jesus Christ."

WILLIAM L. CUNINGGIM, for J. M. RHODES, read the following memoir of JOHN N. ANDREWS:

MEMOIR OF JOHN N. ANDREWS.

Rev. John N. Andrews, the son of Dr. S. A. and Mrs. Louisa P. Andrews, was born June 21st, 1826, and was married to Miss Saiah P. Crawford, January 14th, 1847. He professed religion at Holt's Mill, near Princeton, N. C., in 1849, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church at Goldsboro the same year, during the "great revival" under the ministry of Rev. Ira T. Wyche. He was licensed to preach in 1850, and supplied Snow Hill circuit in 1854. He joined the North Carolina Conference at Pittsboro, November, 1854, and was appointed to Smithville circuit. In 1856 and '57 he traveled the Roanoke circuit. In 1858 he was in charge of the Seamen's Bethel, Wilmington, N. C. In 1859 he was agent for Normal College. In 1860 he was sent to Warren circuit, and returned to the Seamen's Bethel 1861; 1862–'65 he traveled Everettsville circuit, and in 1866 he located; 1867–'69 he was again at the Seamen's Bethel; 1870–'73 he was pastor of Wayne circuit; 1874 he was sent to Mt. Olive circuit; 1875–'77 to Lenoir circuit, and 1878 to Washington station; 1879–'80 he traveled Edgecombe

circuit, and returned to Washington station 1881. In 1882 he was sent to Snow Hill circuit; 1883-'84 to Wayne circuit; 1885 to Roanoke circuit.

From the above we see that he spent nearly thirty-five years in the ministry, and more than thirty years in the itinerancy. During this time the good he did and the converts he made will not be known this side eternity. He was decidedly a revivalist, and when he did succeed he succeeded grandly. He was a very warm-hearted, magnetic man, and made friends everywhere, and many very strong friends. But no description of him can give to those who do not know him any adequate conception of his character, while those who did know him knew more of him than can possibly be gleaned from one short obituary. He was a man of decided native ability, and could, if he had followed, as he began, the practice of medicine, have amassed at least a competency, and have left his family in comfortable circumstances. But he spent his life in the ministry, and died poor, leaving a dependent widow.

As a preacher he was bold and fearless. To speak the truth or withhold was with him never a matter of policy. He preached with fervency, and frequently with great power. When at his best in the pulpit, he was one of the most effective preachers we ever heard. His style was very unique, and was all his own. He studied men, nature and the Bible and from these he drew the subject-matter of his sermons. We think his zeal, humility and consecration all increased with his years. He came to this work at the beginning of this year with the revival spirit, and this spirit remained with him to the last hour of his earthly existence. Having arranged to supply his work during his absence, he left the circuit two or three weeks before his death with the intention of visiting his children before the warm weather and the revival season came on. During this time he rode nearly four hundred miles, in company with his wife, visiting all his children, the immediate members of his family, his father and mother's graves, and other places of Having completed his visit he started back to his work, but died before he reached the parsonage.

He preached on Sunday at New Hope Church, one of his appointments, and administered the sacrament. This service was spoken of as one of much interest. On Monday evening he preached a funeral sermon, and buried one of the members of his Church at Tabor. At the grave he read and sung a hymn, assisted by his wife, and seemed happy. From the grave he went to the residence of Mr. W. W. Butts, expecting to return to Littleton the next day. Just after leaving the grave he said to his wife, "You must go to the parsonage, pack up the things, and travel with me on the circuit the rest of the year, and help me sing and pray in my meetings." After supper he retired in usual health. About to o'clock he called his wife, saying he was very sick. The family was aroused, and he was assisted to the porch, where he desired to go for air. He asked his wife to fan him,

which she did. He asked for soda water; drank it, standing, fell and died almost immediately, without even time to say good-bye or leave for his children a parting blessing. Such was the end of this servant of God. The good he has done will live, and it will be a long, long time before his name will be forgotten.

His remains were taken to Goldsboro, a funeral service was conducted by Rev. Dr. Burkhead in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, on the very spot where, thirty-six years ago, in an old academy, he united with the Church. The people of Goldsboro most gladly gave him a burial place in their own cemetery, by the side of his father and mother, where he awaits the resurrection.

The memorials were separately adopted.

JUNIUS T. HARRIS, on behalf of the Board of Missions, presented the following as the action of the Board in reference to the death of its Treasurer, WILLIAM C. DOUB:

The Missionary Board is called upon to chronicle the death of Prof. W. C. Doub, who, for several years, had been its honored and faithful treasurer. In his death, the Board lost an industrious, accurate, conscientious and punctual treasurer, the Church a devout, intelligent and worthy member, and the state, a cultured, upright and honorable citizen.

The Board and the whole Conference greatly miss his wisdom and devotion in the transaction of the business pertaining to our missionary operations. His place among us is hard to fill. But, while we deplore the loss to the Church below, we rejoice in the confident hope of his higher exaltation and more honorable service in the Church above. And while we pause to drop a tear at the grave of our fallen brother, we are sure that, though God bury his workmen, he will carry on his work to a glorious consummation.

JOHN R. BROOKS introduced the following resolution, which was read and unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, The Rev. Linus Parker, D. D., one of the Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and who presided so efficiently and satisfactorily at the last session of our Conference, has, by the Great Head of the Church, been taken from the labors of earth to the rewards of Heaven; therefore,

Resolved. That while we deplore the great loss which our beloved Church has sustained in the death of this eminent servant of Christ, we humbly sub-

mit to this dispensation of an inscrutable Providence, and earnestly pray the blessings of a merciful God on his sorely bereaved family.

APPENDIX.

(Document No. 1.) REPORT ON BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

The committee on Books and Periodicals offer the following report:

They have had before them the periodical literature of the Church, and a communication from the agent of the Publishing House at Nashville, and they have given these interests as careful consideration as was possible under the circumstances.

The committee rejoice at the prosperity and success of the Publishing House, and the high order of religious literature published under the auspices of our beloved Church.

This is eminently a scientific age. Many are running to and fro and knowledge is being increased. The Methodist Church believes that the culture of the intellect and the heart should be carried forward in equilibrio, and that that culture must necessarily be defective which leaves the heart and its best affections out of the curriculum. The pew should be enlightened as well as the pulpit; and, as faith comes by hearing, so does knowledge come by reading. The philosophy of religion and the intellectual forces of the age demand that the truths and principles of the Gospel strike deeper than the emotions and take their place beyond the flux and reflux of evanescent feeling. An intelligent understanding of a truth that rejoices the heart by no means lessens its value; and he who would hold the ground of his rejoicing firm unto the end must lodge them by prayerful thought, constant reading and reflection, deep in his understanding. In this day of cheap books, moral and religious monthlies and weeklies, no one has an excuse for ignorance.

McTyeire's "History of Methodism" ought to be in the hands of every member of the Church.

The Southern Quarterly Review ought to be read by every preacher and layman upon whom God has bestowed gifts for being leaders in the great advance of an intelligent and forceful Church. The Nashville Christian Advocate, the Advocate of Missions, and the Woman's Missionary Advocate ought to be household words in every family, and furnish regular household religious feasts for all, from the father down to the child of eight years.

And what shall we say more. For the time would fail to tell of the brain and heart food furnished by Marvin and Munsey, by Paine and Garland and Harrison, and a host of others, who have pushed the literature of our own Publishing House to the upper circle, where it stands in the front, face to face with the best work of the age.

With regard to the Sunday school periodicals, your committee beg to be indulged in some well-meant and friendly criticisms. This will be found in the following resolution passed by the committee, to-wit: While we are thankful for the efficiency of our Sunday school publications, we wish to see them more efficient, bringing out more clearly the distinctive doctrines of the Methodist Church as found in the sacred text, and emphasizing the spiritual application both in the Expository Notes and in the arrangement of the questions. With regard to the Abridged Hymn Book the following preamble and resolutions were also passed, to-wit:

WHEREAS, The Book Committee complain that the Abridged Hymn Book, ordered by the General Conference, has in many places been ruled out of our pulpits, in reply, be it therefore

Resolved, That it is the conviction of this committee that the publication of the Abridged Hymn Book was a mistake, and wherever it has been used, so far as we can learn, it has created confusion and failed to give satisfaction to our preachers and people.

The committee most heartily recommend the Methodist Armor and Catechism, published by Rev. Dr. Hudson, of this Conference, to all our people.

The committee also express themselves as pleased with the management and improvement of the Raleigh *Christian Advecate*, as the organ of the North Carolina Conference, and request the Presiding Bishop to re-appoint Rev. F. L. Reid as editor of said paper.

(Document No. 2.) REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The Board of Education beg leave to report as follows:

We have had under careful consideration for several days the Educational interests of our Church and the reports of colleges and schools of high grade owned, and in any other way connected with it. It gives us pleasure to report that there is a growing interest throughout the Conference on the great subject of Education, and we believe our people, as never before, realize the importance of giving their children the best educational advantages possible. Our colleges and schools generally are being well patronized, and where they are fully equipped and wisely managed, are succeeding, we believe, as never before. We regard this as a most hopeful feature of our work, and urge our ministers and laymen everywhere to do what they can to foster and build up good schools of all grades and encourage our people to give to their sons and daughters the best educational advantages they can.

Your board also recommends the appointment, by the Conference, of visiting committees to the schools reported, but not owned by the Church, whose duty it shall be, by frequent visitations and inspections, to put themselves in possession of all the facts in regard to said schools and report the same to this Conference at each annual session.

CENTRAL INSTITUTE FOR YOUNG LADIES

Is located in Warren county, N. C., twenty-one miles west of Weldon, in the town of Littleton, on the Raleigh and Gaston Railroad. The property is owned by a joint stock company and controlled by a board of directors, the majority of whom are Methodists.

Resolved, That we heartily commend this school to the patronage of our people and cordially invite the co-operation of all in building it up.

We request the presiding Bishop to appoint Rev. J. M. Rhodes principal of Central Institute, and that J. R. Griffith and Dr. T. P. Jerman be elected a visiting committee to the same.

OAK INSTITUTE

Is located at Mooresville, in Iredell county, twenty-five miles north of Charlotte by railroad. It is well equipped, efficiently managed, and offers superior advantages to pupils of both sexes. We commend it to the patronage of the people in that section.

We also request the Bishop to appoint Rev. T. L. Triplett principal of Oak Institute, and that the presiding elder of the Statesville District and the preacher at Mooresville be elected a visiting committee to the same.

JONESBORO HIGH SCHOOL

Is the property of the Fayetteville District Conference, is located in Moore county, in the town of Jonesboro on the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley R. R. It is a school of high grade, and has been well managed by an intelligent board of trustees.

It has been well patronized by the surrounding country and has given great satisfaction to its patrons. We commend it to the people as every way worthy their support.

We request the presiding Bishop to appoint Rev. W. O. Hightower principal of Jonesboro High School. We also request the Bishop to appoint Rev. A. W. Mangum, D. D., professor to the University of the State, located at Chapel Hill.

GREENSBORO FEMALE COLLEGE.

We are much gratified at the unparalleled prosperity of this excellent institution,

The liberality displayed by the company in expenditures for the equipment of the College and the improvement of the premises, as well as their good judgment in the selection of a faculty, can but afford the highest satisfaction to the friends of female education throughout the State.

We do not believe that Greensboro Female College ever maintained a higher standard of excellence or ever did better work for Methodism in North Carolina than it is now doing. We therefore heartily recommend the following:

Resolved 1st, That in Greensboro Female College the Methodist Church has an institution of learning, for the education of young ladies, of which it may

well be proud, and that those who entrust to it, under its present management, the education of their daughters, may be assured that they are not only well cared for, but enjoy advantages of instruction and culture unsurpassed by any school in the whole South.

Resolved 2d, That Revs. J. A. Cuninggim, A. W. Mangum and J. B. Connelly be appointed a visiting committee from this Conference to Greensboro Female College.

TRINITY COLLEGE.

From reports of the Committee of Management and of the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, and from other sources, the Board of Education gather the following facts add figures in reference to Trinity College:

- 1. Debt.—The total undisputed debt of the College is \$6,378.31. Of this amount \$2,752.00 is due the Endowment Fund of Trinity College; \$1,003.47, the Wachovia Bank; \$1 027.43, Dr. R. W. Thomas; \$660.41, Robert Gray; and \$928.00, W. S. Bradshaw. The interest on the above claims is all the above parties desire now. There is an unadjusted claim of \$735.52 to the Trinity Building and Loan Association.
- 2. Endowment.—By a series of resolutions passed at the session of the North Carolina Conference in 1884, it was resolved to raise \$100,000 for an Endowment Fund for Trinity College; that an effort would be made to raise at least \$20,000 annually; that Presiding Elders should hold educational meetings at suitable points, and also present the subject of endowment and patronage of the College to all the Quarterly Conferences; that pastors should co-operate with Presiding Elders in the work of securing the Endowment Fund, and in increasing the patronage of the College; and that cash and notes raised for the Endowment Fund be reported to the Conference Board of Education, and be paid over to the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees. Your Board of Education have no information that any educational meetings have been held by Presiding Elders, or that any efforts have been made by Presiding Elders or Pastors to secure endowment, and no cash nor notes raised for such purpose have been reported to the Board of Education. The Treasurer of the Board of Trustees reports that he has received for endowment \$50.00 from J. M. Watson, \$2.00 from J. M. McMichael, and \$2,700.00 from the estate of Dr. C. G. He also reports that about \$800 more will be realized from the same According to the last will and testament of the donor, the Siddell legacy is to be invested in United States bonds or secured by mortgage on real estate, and the interest thereof to be used as a loan fund to assist needy young men, and that those so assisted execute a verbal promise to reimburse the fund for the outlay. About one thousand dollars will soon be realized from the sale of a tract of land in Iredell county, donated by Mrs. Sarah Steele to the use of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and which, by the action of the last session of the Conference, was to be added to the endowment fund of Trinity College; and six hundred dollars are expected to be obtained in the near future from the estate of Mrs. Ann E. Earnhardt, of Rowan county, and which, according to the will of the testator, is to be applied

like the fund from the Siddell estate. A proper person should be appointed as Trustee of these funds to see that the wish of the grantors is respected, and the funds securely invested. As the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees has already been authorized by the Conference to receive, hold, and invest all funds raised for endowment by the Presiding Elders and Pastors, your Board think he is the proper person to have, hold and invest the funds received from all other sources whatever.

As by the action of the Board of Trustees at its meeting twelve months ago, and sanctioned by the North Carolina Conference at its last session, the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees was authorized to apply any endowment funds coming into his hands to pay off any pressing debts of the College, and to take a mortgage on the real estate of the College to secure the same, your Board of Education are of opinion that the President of the Board of Trustees should be authorized to execute such mortgage whenever such application shall be made.

3. First Year of Management.—According to a plan for the immediate relief of Trinity College agreed upon at the last session of the North Carolina Conference, the management of the College was placed for two years in a committee of three laymen. This committee have now had charge for a year, and they report a faculty of seven professors, a good preparatory and business department added to the four college classes, one hundred and forty-eight students enrolled during the year, which is a large increase over the patronage of the preceding year. Nineteen of these students being sons of preachers, and one the son of a professor, have received their tuition free. Twenty-three being unable to pay all as they go, have received tuition "on time," and ten of them expect to be ministers of the gospel; so that at least seven hundred dollars of tuitton have been given to preacher's sons, and about eight hundred dollars have been given to students "on time."

The aggregate of salaries of professors agreed to be paid was sixty-five hundred and fifty dollars, one thousand dollars were, according to the plan above mentioned, to be invested in much needed apparatus, furniture, &c., for the use of the college. The whole amount necessary, then, to meet the current expenses of the year was seventy-five hundred and fifty dollars. To make up this amount the committee have paid three thousand dollars, tuition has paid seventeen hundred and forty dollars, and the Conference by collection has paid as follows, by Districts:

making a total of \$1,300.48 paid by the Conference, and a grand total of \$6,040.48 received from all sources up to date, and leaving a deficiency of \$1,509.52 for expenses of the current year. There is still due for tuition for the year \$1,068.00, most, if not all, of which will be paid, but there will still be a deficiency of \$431.52, which is unprovided for.

The Committee of Management have fulfilled their part of the contract for the first year, and they hoped that the Conference would raise its promised \$2,500, so that there would be a surplus to carry over to the next year to make up for the \$1,000 less which the committee are to pay the second year, and thus continue the present organization of the faculty which is working so efficiently; but with a great deficiency for this the first year, the situation is not so encouraging. Your Board are of the opinion that the Conference was in honor and gratitude bound to raise the whole of the \$2,500 promised, but how to remedy the breech in the working of the plan caused by this great deficiency, your Board are at a loss to determine, unless as suggested in a resolution hereafter presented.

But your Board must urge that, as the Committee of Management propose to go forward and finish their two years' management, doing the best they can under the circumstances, that those who are, by the plan, charged with the collection of this fund, do exert themselves to raise their full assessment and, if possible, do as two of the Presiding Elders have done this year, exceed their assessment by a handsome sum.

Your Board would further urge that the plan of endowment as agreed upon last year, be pressed with prudent zeal. It is a vain hope which some seem to entertain that the present Committee of Management will eventually propose to purchase Trinity College, and run it as a college for the Methodists of North Carolina. A male college cannot be run successfully on the receipts of tuition. Aid from some other source must be obtained. With a college property, worth \$30,000, situated in a healthy section at a central point, and easy of access to all cur people, and with a nucleus of about five thousand dollars endowment fund, we ought to go forward adding to that fund by littles and by larger contributions until the one hundred thousand dollars are secured, and thus greatly enhance the usefulness of this importanc institution.

In view of the above facts the Educational Board recommend to the Conference the following resolutions:

- 1st. That we most gratefully appreciate the manly and christian liberality of Bros. J. W. Alspaugh, J. S. Carr and James A. Gray, in so nobly coming to the help of our College in the day of its need.
- 2d. That the Conference sincerely deplores its failure to raise the whole amount of money pledged for the first year and requests that the deficiency in said amount be, if possible, collected before the commencement in June next.
- 3d. That we renew our obligation to raise the twenty-five hundred dollars for the ensuing year.
- 4th. That Rev. J. F. Heitman be appointed by the Presiding Bishop a professor at Trinity College.
- 5th. That J. S. Carr, Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, and his successor in office, be appointed Trustee of the endowment fund received from the estates of Dr. C. G. Siddell, Mrs, Sarah Steele and Mrs. Ann E. Earnhardt, and from all other sources whatever, to have hold and invest according to the wishes of donors, under the direction of the Board of Trustees.

Your committee on Temperance desire to make the following report:

Whereas, the mission of the Church is to eradicate evil and implant good among the people; and whereas, the traffic in spirituous liquors is the most prolific source of evil, and the greatest hinderance to the work of the Church, throwing its baleful effec s across the hearth stone, into the pew, and even sometimes reaching the pulpit itself, enticing the young, conquering the middle aged and besotting the old, shading the glory of the nation, obstructing every legitimate line of business, and blighting the opening flowers of happiness in many a home circle; and finally, ruining for both worlds, those who prosecute the terrible business; therefore

Resolved 1st, That the Church has the right, and ought to oppose the Liquor Traffic by every proper means within her reach.

Resolved 2d, That we request the preachers to preach at least once during the next Conference year, on this subject, in each congregation, presenting the matters in every view practicable.

Resolved 3d. That we believe Prohibition by law, as absolutely essential to success in the temperance movement, and that we will promote its progress by every means within our power.

(Document No. 7.) REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

We, your committee on Church Property, beg leave to report as follows:

We find an increase in church buildings during the Conference year of 21. Increase in value of church buildings of \$49,998. Increase in number of parsonages 4. Increase in value \$11,045.

We find the following facts, and upon them present the resolutions following:

- 1st. That, in many instances, churches have been built upon lands for which deeds have not been obtained, that in others, deeds have a reversionary clause, or are made to individuals as trustees, and not in conformity with the requirements of the Discipline.
- 2d. That church buildings in some instances have gone into disuse and our Church is liable to lose them and the grounds on which they stand.
- 3d. That parsonages and furniture in some instances are improperly used and abused, on charges where they exist, by being rented out and otherwise.

That a large number of pastoral charges have no parsonages, which bears unequally upon the preachers sent to them and upon the charges themselves in the matter of assessments by the District stewards; therefore resolved

- 1st. That it shall be the duty of all quarterly conferences to inquire into titles, and where necessary to appoint efficient committees to procure deeds in proper form.
- 2d. That church buildings which have gone into disuse and are not likely to be used again, be sold and invested in other church buildings on the same charge.
- 3d. That the building of churches and parsonages on lands for which a proper deed has not been first obtained, be carefully avoided in all cases. That all our churches be made comfortable for congregations and Sunday schools by procuring stoves, &c. That our preachers urge upon boards of stewards and trustees the necessity of procuring proper locations and building houses for worship to comport favorably with the better class of residences in the community in which they are built.
- 3d. That, on pastoral charges without proper parsonages, the boards of stewards are expected to rent proper houses for their pastors, and such pastors are directed to report such sums as are paid for such rents, separately from their salaries and not as a part of the salary.

Therefore,

Resolved 1st, That we recognize the American Bible Society as an agency in the dissemination of truth and the accomplishment of good second only to the living ministry, and that in all possible ways we will co-operate with its work in our respective fields of labor.

Resolved 2d. That, in our pastoral work and intercourse with the people, we will specially inquire, and see to it, that all families coming within our knowledge are supplied with the Bible.

Resolved 3d, That we will encourage our people everywhere, by public collec-

tions and otherwise, to contribute to the great cause of sending the Bible to the destitute places throughout the world.
