FIRST DAY.

Wednesday, December 14th, 1892.

The North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in its Fifty-sixth Session at St. Panl's Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in the town of Goldsboro, N. C., Wednesday morning, December 14th, 1892, Bishop William W. Duncan in the chair.

The opening religious services were conducted by Bishop Duncan. Hymn number 228, "And are we yet alive?" was sung, and the Bishop led in prayer. The 2d chapter of the 1st Epistle of John was read by the Bishop, and hymn 440, "O for a heart to praise my God," was sung, after which Rev. W. S. Black, D. D., led in prayer.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BIBLE CAUSE.

The Committee on the Bible Cause having considered the same, respectfully present for the adoption of the Conference the following:

- 1. The distribution of the Scriptures lies at the foundation of the work of evangelizing the world, and is essentially involved in the extension of Christ's kingdom among all nations. No evangelical church can, therefore, overlook or neglect this work.
- 2. The Conference gladly recognizes the faithful and efficient service that is being done in this great department of church work by its agent, the American Bible Society, in both the home and foreign field; and also the call for continued and increased effort in order to keep pace with the expansion of the foreign missionary operations of the church, the supply of immigrants coming to our land, and the children and youth who are growing up among us.
- 3. As constituents of the American Bible Society, we consider it our duty to take an active part in this important work, and would encourage our people to more earnest and practical support: Therefore,

Resolved. That we take collections some time in the month of March, 1893, for this cause, and forward the same to Rev. T. H. Law, District Superintendent North and South Carolina, Spartanburg, S. C., and report the amount raised to the Annual Conference.

MEMOIR OF REV. THOMAS C. MOSES.

The subject of this memoir was born in Franklin County, N. C., in the year 1807. In his youth and early manhood he obtained a good English and Classical education, and spent several years of his life in academical work, which he made a good success. Of the time, the place and the circumstances of his conversion, and call to the work of the Gospel Ministry, we have no certain information. However, he made application and was received on trial in the North Carolina Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, at its session held in Pittsboro, N. C., December, 1844. After travelling nine years, being admonished by his failing health, he asked the Conference to grant him a location, but they preferred to give him a superannuated relation-which he sustained a few years, and again was in the field on the effective list. He travelled until 1876, when he again took a superannuated relation, where he remained until his death, which took place December 20, 1891, at his home in Center Township, Chatham County, N. C.

Brother Moses was a consecrated man, of firm faith, deep thought, and profound piety. He regarded no work too laborious for him to do, nor any sacrifice too great for him to make that he might advance the interests of the Redeemer's kingdom among men.

We are not informed as to the time of his marriage to Miss Sally Moore, of Franklin County. She was the mother of four children all of whom were raised and still live save one. His wife died in 1878. Two sons and one daughter still live.

Through all his long life I never heard of any stain attaching to his character. He was not slothful in business, he was fervent in spirit serving the Lord. I think of him as a sinner redeemed by the blood of Christ, justified by faith, and saved in his Father's many mansioned house, not made with hands, eternal in the heavens.

MEMOIR OF REV. ROBERT OSWALD BURTON, D. D.

Robert Oswald Burton was born near Lynchburg, in Campbell County, Va., June 30, 1811. He was educated at West Point Military Academy. He was twice married; the first time to Miss Elizabeth H

Joyner, March 29, 1842; the second time to Miss Mary Olivia Pearson, August 17, 1858.

He joined the Virginia Conference at Petersburg in 1833. He was ordained deacon in 1833, and elder in 1837. The following is a record of his appointments through a long and spotless ministry:

At the Annual Conference in Greensboro in 1889, he was placed upon the Supernumerary list, after having refused to be superannuated. In this relation he remained until the day of his death at his home in Halifax County, N. C., December 17, 1891.

Thus is compressed into a few words the technical statement of the ministerial labors of Robert O. Burton; thus are drawn the lines that mark the flow of the river of his life; but what words are sufficient to

describe the full and precious volume of that river's flow, or to paint the flowering and fruitful landscape that smiled along its banks? By what measure shall we take the height of his noble manhood, or calculate the results of his faithful and wonderful ministry? we are not sufficient for these things! But it is not difficult to fix the place of Robert O. Burton among his brethren. That place is not an ordinary one. He was one of our greatest preachers. He was one of the noblest endowed of all the watchmen that stood upon our walls; he held to his lips a trumpet that sent forth in silvery notes and sweetest cadence the messages of Mercy and the warnings of Justice with such emphasis and persuasive power as has been equaled by but few ministers of the Lord Jesus Christ. His ministry was a ministry of power. He had a wonderfully analytic mind for the teachings of the Scriptures. He seemed to comprehend, almost at a glance, the mind of the Spirit, and he delivered his sermons with all the power and passion of one under the divine conviction that he had a message "He sank the shaft down through lid and letter of the Word to the sweet waters," and refreshed his own soul and then gave to others. I have never heard a minister of greater power upon the great theme of the atonemeut. At times his spirit seemed almost unloosed, and, "in the fetters of the flesh," he seemed to be mating with the pure essences of Heaven. He was master of an oratory that was well nigh faultless and irresistible. In the superb strength and poetical refinements of his thought, he was without a model or a And the Lord honored his ministry; thousands of souls were won to Christ by his long and successful labors. The blessed Master, who sent him out, went with him and gave him a triumphant gospel.

As a minister in *the social life* of the world, as he went into the homes of our people, he was a pattern of grace and refinement. I have never seen a man of more gallant and courteous bearing toward the Christian womanhood of our land than Robert O. Burton. He was a prince of culture and ministerial propriety.

As a friend, there was hardly a limit to the strength of his devotion. He was true, though all the world should prove false.

He was a man of very positive convictions. He often stood alone in his opinions, but he was true even when standing *alone*.

Through a ministry of nearly three-score years he bore himself without blot or suspicion. He received his sword from the Master and the church; he wielded it for the cause of truth through many years; he returned it to its scabbard with "the hilt badly battered, but with the blade still keen," without ever bringing dishonor upon

the noble ranks of those who stood with him in the fight. He was brave as Cæsar; he was gentle as a maiden; he was eloquent as Apollos.

He had victory in death. Surrounded by his children, who watched by his bedside in love and tenderness, he heard the summons of the Master; and in faith and comforting and joyous assurance, he gathered up his feet and walked the paths of the skies, and entered into the glory of his Lord.

We believe he has not left a mate; there is not another like him. In nature and endowment, he bore kinship with the mighty men of earth.

As we pictured him in our love, as we knew him in the bonds of comradeship, we can in all sincerity say that, as a royal and kingly man, as a brave and noble spirit, as a gifted and able and fearless expounder of the Word of God, we have not known his superior, and we doubt if we have seen his equal.

MEMOIR OF REV. SAMUEL VINTON HOYLE.

Rev. Samuel Vinton Hoyle was born in Georgetown, D. C., January 7, 1836, and died in Jonesboro, N. C., May 4, 1892, aged fifty-six years, three months and twenty-seven days.

He was converted to God in a "camp-meeting," at a Methodist altar, when fourteen years of age. He became at once an active member of the Methodist Church, leading in public prayer and exhortation. He was licensed to preach when he was eighteen years of age, and his purpose then was to spend his life in the itinerant ministry of his church. From the first he laid himself and his all upon God's altar. He was received on trial into the travelling connection by the Virginia Conference at Norfolk in November, 1854. The published Minutes say at Lynchburg in 1856, but the family insist that the fact is as stated here.) He was ordained a Deacon by Bishop Early November 21, 1856, and was ordained an Elder by Bishop Kavanaugh November 28, 1858. He was a member of the Virginia Conference until 1869, when he was transferred to the Baltimore Conference, and in 1872 was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, of which he remained a member until his death. In these several Conferences Brother Hoyle was continuously on the effective list for more than

thirty-seven years, and filled various circuits and stations with great acceptability; serving by appointment as Chaplain in the Confederate army during the latter part of our civil war.

Young Hoyle, after receiving a good academical education, entered Dickinson College, Pennsylvania, which Institution he left when within one session of graduation in the regular A. B. course; but not until he had laid a solid foundation for continued and broad intellectual culture through life.

Brother Hoyle married twice. On January 26, 1865, he was happily married to Miss M. S. Simmons, of Mecklenburg County, Virginia. To them were born four sons, three of whom survive their father. His first wife died in the triumphs of gospel faith January 21, 1875. On May 3, 1876, Brother Hoyle was again happily married to Miss Nannie J. Phillips, of Mecklenburg County, Virginia. Of this marriage seven children were born, four sons and three daughters. His second wife and nine of his children survive him to mourn their irreparable loss. But he has left to them the heritage of a good name, and the assurance that he is ever with the Lord. May they have grace to preserve and improve the heritage he has left them!

In adverting briefly to the private and social life of this good man we find much to admire. In his private life Brother Hoyle was an exemplary Christian. He had strong faith in God; he enjoyed religion; and through life no stain rested upon his escutcheon. In his domestic life he was a kind and affectionate husband, a loving and firm father. He ruled well his own house. He was not penurious, but economical, and out of his salaries, often meagre, he provided well for his family; he was especially mindful of their intellectual and religious training. In the inner circle of his friends his social life was always pleasant, often charming. He was an unselfish man, and sought the happiness of his associates.

To the preaching of the gospel his whole life was given, and he was a strong preacher. He was a good pastor, but it is the preacher that we would consider. He combined several essential elements to high success in ministerial life:

- 1. He believed himself divinely called to this work. And with this firm conviction of his divine call to the work of the ministry, he went forth as God's ambassador with a message to the people, and therefore he spake as one having authority, and with the earnestness of one who felt that vital interests were at stake.
- 2. He was a man of *one* work. He did not waste his energies in other pursuits. Renouncing the world and obeying the call of God he gave himself without reserve to the ministry of the word. All

his powers were consecrated to the preaching of the gospel, and this continuously through life. His best, his all, was put into this work.

3. He was studious. He sought to bring "beaten oil" to the pulpit. He was an extemporaneous preacher. He wrote few, if any, sermons. But he did not go to his pulpit without studions preparation. His plan was to make brief notes, and then to think out his discourse very thoroughly. His thought was well matured, his language was largely unpremeditated. Yet from his general study he had an extensive vocabulary and a good command of language. His English was pure, his style was not redundant, his speech was often terse. He had the happy faculty of quickly selecting the right words so as to compress much into a short sentence.

4. Above all, Brother Hoyle was a man of prayer. He spent much time upon his knees. In his study he sought Divine help. In the pulpit he often preached in the power and demonstration of the Holy Ghost. No difference how well he had prepared his sermon, he felt that it could not accomplish great good without the special impartation of divine energy; and when he was going to preach he prayed mightily for the presence and help of the Spirit of God. Not only as to his personal life, but as to his work, he was a man of prayer.

No wonder that such a life closed well. Death, like a conrier, went to him on the field bearing from the Great Captain the order, "Come up higher." Bro. Hoyle was at his post as P. C. of Maxton and Caledonia churches, preached twice on the fourth Sabbath in April, on Monday conducted a funeral service, on Tuesday was decidedly unwell, and believing that he had a premonition of approaching death, took the train and came that evening to his home in Jonesboro. During the few remaining days he talked freely of his approaching death, from which his mind could not be diverted; expressed himself as exceedingly glad that he had spent his life as an humble minister of the gospel, declared his readiness for death, and expressed triumphant faith as to his victory over death and the grave, and of the blessed immortality upon which he was about to enter.

Physicians, his wife and children, and many Christian friends did all they could to prolong his life; despite all, after an illness of but a few hours more than a week, he breathed his last in the bosom of his family and went home to God.

God called his servant from the field, in the midst of the fight, but gave him leave to go by his earthly home and tarry there a week with his beloved family, and then report for orders above.

After an appropriate service in our church at Jonesboro, participated

in by several of our ministers, in the presence of a large congregation, we buried the mortal remains of our brother in the cemetery of that town, over which has been erected a suitable monument; but he has left a more enduring monument built by his labors in the church of God. His Conference and his many friends will cherish his memory here, and his spiritual children will rise up in eternity and call him blessed.

MEMOIR OF REV. J. W. NORTH, D. D.

Rev. John W. North was born in Williamsburg County, S. C., July 28th, 1828, and died at his home in Cleveland County, N. C., June 3d, 1892, in the 64th year of his age. He joined the church in 1846, and was converted June 14th, 1849. He was received on trial in the South Carolina Conference at Camden, S. C., December, 1849, and served the following charges: Barnwell Circuit, 1850; Sumterville Circuit, 1851; Santee Circuit, 1852-'53; Yorkville Station, 1854; Winnsboro and Chesterville, 1855; Yorkville Circuit, 1856-'57; Cokesbury Circuit, 1858-'59; Abbeville Circuit, 1860; in 1861 he sustained a supernumerary relation; Marion Street, Columbia, 1862; Santee Circuit, 1863-'64; Sumter Circuit, 1865-'66; in 1867-'68-'69 and 1870, Presiding Elder of Shelby District. In 1870, this territory being transferred to the North Carolina Conference, Dr. North became a member of this Conference. In 1871-'72-'73 he served Shelby Station; Shelby Circuit, 1874-'75-'76-'77; Shelby Station, 1878; Shelby Circuit, 1879; Laurinburg Station, 1880 '81-'82-'83; Mt. Zion Station, 1884-'85-'86-'87; St. John Station, 1888-'89; Jonesboro Circuit, 1890; Leasburg Circuit, 1891, where his health failed and he was compelled to give up his work. At the last session of our Conference in Greenville, at his own request, he was placed on the honored roll of superannuated preachers. Dr. North's active ministry embraced a period of forty-three consecutive years save two.

He first married a Miss Dye, of York County, S. C. She dying in 1862, he married Miss C. J. Wells, of Cleveland County, N. C. They were indeed "helpmeets" to him, and contributed largely to his usefulness as an itinerant Methodist preacher. His educational advantages in early life were limited, but his natural endowments being of a high order, he soon succeeded, by hard study, in qualifying himself for filling with great acceptability every position to which

he was called by his church. He read many books, and read them to profit, but he studied the Bible as he did no other book. As one has said, "The Bible was his text-book—he knew what was in it, and how to use it." His public prayers were uttered largely in its language. His sermons were freighted with proof-texts, and embellished with Scripture illustrations, and marked by originality, depth of thought and beauty of diction. In the pulpit he was impassionedbut graceful. Having an analytical and logical mind, he rightly divided the word of truth, giving to each "his portion in due season." To the sorrowing he was a son of consolation. His denunciations of sin and his appeals to the impenitent were almost irresistible. When on more pleasing themes of the gospel, especially the rewards of the faithful, he would carry his hearers away in imagination, and show them that great city, and describe in such glowing terms its mansions and thrones, as to make them feel that they were so near its gates that they could almost see the flash of its sheen, hear its melodies and feel the glow of its mingled fires." As a preacher he was indeed a tower of strength. He was not fond of controversy, but when the doctrine or polity of his church were assailed he stool ready to defend them, as but few men could. He understood our Discipline, and his opinion on questions of law always commanded attention and respect. Trinity College honored herself in conferring upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity, and in 1878 his brethren showed their appreciation of his worth by electing him to the General Conference. As a friend he was frank, cordial and true. He had a contempt for shams and hypocrisy. He was in the fullest sense a pious man-he "lived what he preached." He had a religious experience which often thrilled him with unutterable joy. We have frequently heard him say, "I was powerfully converted." We shall never forget a sermon we once heard him preach on the call to and qualification for the ministry, and the wonderful emphasis with which he said, "I may be tempted to doubt a great many things, but my conversion and call to the ministry I can never doubt." He was a tender and loving husband and a watchful and affectionate father. Always ardently attached to his family and home, this attachment steadly increased as he advanced in years. Home was emphatically "the dearest spot on earth" to him. But our brother has been called from the labors and conflicts of earth to the rewards of heaven. From his eloquent lips we shall never again hear the thrilling notes of the Gospel. Having been paralyzed, his mental forces were much impaired, but his memory retained the cheering invitations and precious promises of the Bible, and a short while before he passed away

he requested his faithful wife to read his favorite chapter, the last of Revelation; and we have no doubt, my brethren, but that he is now in that city where they "need no candle, neither light of the sun," "serving the Lamb" and "beholding His face"; and bearing "His name in his forehead." May his sorrowing widow and fatherless children, his hosts of friends, and we, his brethren in the ministry, meet him there.

MEMOIR OF REV. J. G. NELSON.

Joseph Gillespie Nelson was born March 16, 1862, and died at Hobgood, N. C., November 29, 1892, in the thirty-first year of his age. We know not the place of his birth. He was the son of an itinerant Methodist preacher, Rev. Jesse S. Nelson, of the Western North Carolina Conference. Trained at the altars of our church, he sought religion there, and was converted to God about the year 1882, at Greenville, N. C., under the ministry of Rev. S. V. Hoyle, whose memoir has just been read, and by whom he was preceded to the "House of Many Mansions" but a few short months. They have met on the unfading fields of glory eternal, the one a trophy of the other's ministry. Brother Nelson dated his call to the work of the ministry from his conversion, and lingered not to confer with flesh and blood, but at once said, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" He began ministerial life by serving Strait's Mission in 1883 as supply. He was admitted on trial for the itinerancy at the session of our Conference held December, 1884, at Wilmington, from which date he continued to receive annual appointments until December, 1891, when in much weakness of body, but strength of spirit, he received appointment to that field upon which he "laid his armor by," and went to his Heavenly inheritance. His appointments were as follows, viz:

In all these flelds there were and are seals to his ministry. His

reaping was especially large on the Hillsboro and Williamston Circuits.

On January 28, 1885, he was married to Miss Julia Humber, of Greenville, N. C., to which happy union three children were born unto him. The first a son, the joy of his heart, who at two years of age went to Heaven (his little body now rests in Willow Dale Cemetery of this city), and two little daughters. Maggie and Annie, who, with mother, now form a fatherles family circle.

Viewing Brother Nelson as a man physically, we see him of erect but slender stature, of medium height and weight, with light hair and dark eyes, whose brightness told of the lively soul that looked through them. His movement was nervous and quick, the effect of native fire that burned within him, spirited and strong in the zeal and heat of energetic youth. His body was too frail an instrument to be of lengthy service to such an ardent spirit in a world of so many trying environments. As a man intellectually, he was above the average, having remarkable quickness of perception and depth and clearness of penetration. From a child he was eager to acquire knowledge, so much so that when he was but eight or nine years of age, it was necessary to restrain him from school in order to protec his physical strength. His mind had power to retain, logically arrange, and with clearness and precision distribute its possessions.

As a preacher, he easily stood in the first rank among the younger men of our Conference. His themes, wisely chosen and well prepared, were delivered in a manner that would eatch and hold the attention of his hearers. There was no uncertainty as to his position on any question. You could know where he stood. He was bold in the declaration of conscientions convictions. He hated a mean thing, an overt act of wickedness, and unsparingly denounced it. man to draw you very close to him, or to hold you far from him. He had many noble qualities of mind and heart, and those who knew him best loved him most. What else shall we say of him, now that he has gone from among us? Shall we, for the pleasure of those who cry for perfection in others more than they cultivate it within themselves, point out a brother's defects and weaknessess? We answer, no. Let us ever more leave them in the oblivion of forgetfulness rather than write them on the memorial page of history. Let those who long to know them wait till God, who knows all hearts and who alone weighs all outward conduct, shall make them known. Brother Nelson's last sickness was long and painful. For months he would not believe his sickness was unto death, but with all the buoyancy of his spirit resisted every downward step of his disease. So persistent

was his battle for life that he could not be induced to speak of his departure until the last few days of his life. Then, being fully persuaded that it was the appointed time, he calmly and clearly expressed his faith in Christ, committed wife and children to God, who, he said, had been so good to him.

He had preached as long as he *could* preach; walked as long as he *could* walk; talked as long as he *could* talk; he prayed till the last request "made known to God" was answered; he breathed as long as he *could* breathe, and then, as gently declines the dying day, his spirit went away to the God who gave it, and now as the flaming faced King of Day throws his bright beams across the pine-perfumed plains of Eastern Carolina, they fall with golden touch upon the new-made grave of another itinerant Methodist preacher, the world's best type of a true Soldier of the Cross.

"Rejoice for a brother deceased,
Our loss is his infinite gain;
A soul out of prison released,
And freed from his bodily chain;
With songs let us follow his flight,
And mount with his spirit above;
Escaped to the Mansion of Light,
And lodged in the Eden of Love."

MEMOIR OF HON. D. W. BAIN.

On Wednesday afternoon, November 16, 1892, at his residence in Raleigh, N. C., the Hon. Donald W. Bain died, after a long and, at times, very painful illness. The cause of his death was valvular disease of the heart, from the effects of which he has been confined to his room for several months.

Mr. Bain was a native of the city of Raleigh and was born on the 2d day of April, 1841, hence he was aged fifty-one years, seven months and fourteen days. After receiving an education at the high schools of Raleigh and of South Lowell and Pittsboro, N. C., he became a clerk in the office of the Comptroller of North Carolina in 1857, which position he held until he became chief clerk in the State Treasurer's office, being appointed to it by State Treasurer Jonathan

Worth in 1865. He remained in this position, under the Treasurership of K. P. Battle, Dr. Sloan, David A. Jenkins and J. M. Worth, until 1884, when he was nominated and elected State Treasurer. In 1888 he was re-elected for a second term, and this year, 1892, he was re-elected for a third term, his popularity being so great as to break down all prejudice against a third term. In 1879 he was chosen as one of the Commissioners to adjust and renew the bonds issued by the State on account of the North Carolina Railroad. In all of the above positions of sacred and high trusts imposed in him, he rendered to his State the most efficient and faithful service, so much so that his name in North Carolina has become a synonym of efficiency and fidelity.

Mr. Bain was a prominent member of the Masonic fraternity. He succeeded his father as Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge in 1867, and filled this office to the day of his death. He has also, for years, been the Secretary of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, and also Grand Recorder of the Grand Council. For two terms, 1885 to 1887, he was Commander of the Knights Templar for the State of North Carolina. As a member of the Scottish Rite, he was the recipient of the thirty-two degrees—a high testimonial to his character as a member of the Masonic fraternity. He was also a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows. In these fraternities he was a bright light and a most beloved member.

From his boyhood Mr. Bain was a devoted member of Edenton Street Methodist Church, of Raleigh, N. C., and for many years one of its official members and Secretary of the Official Board. For many years he was Secretary of his District Conference, and was annually elected a lay delegate from the Raleigh District to the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, of which body he was the most highly appreciated and honored Secretary since 1883. He was elected by his Annual Conference to the General Conference of his church, held in Richmond in 1886, and the one in St. Louis, in 1890. His church will miss his efficient services most sadly, and will mourn his death most sincerely.

Mr. Bain had an honorable ancestry. His paternal grandfather came from Scotland and his paternal grandmother came from France.

January 26, 1865, he was married to Miss Adelaide V. Hill, a daughter of the late Dr. William G. Hill, who was for years a prominent citizen of Raleigh. To this union four children were born, three of whom, with his wife, survive to mourn and miss one of the best of fathers.

We cannot too highly eulogize the personal character and public life of Donald W. Bain. To this writer for years he was a dear friend and an intimate companion. We have often travelled together and occupied the same room and the same bed for weeks and months at a time, and the closest scrutiny afforded by this intimate personal contact with him, revealed in him one of the purest hearts, one of the sweetest spirits, and one of the loftiest characters we ever knew. He was deservedly one of the most popular men in the State. He was greatly admired for his upright and beautiful life and justly esteemed for his noble endowments of mind and heart. He will be sadly missed by his State and by his church, as well as by his afflicted family and personal friends. He died as he had lived, peacefully trusting in the merits of an atoning Savior. When told by his physician that he was dying, he expressed his readiness to depart, and said, "Let me go as quickly as possible."

As a mark of respect to his memory the city bell was tolled at his death, the State Capitol and Grand Lodge buildings were draped in mourning, the flags were floated at half-mast, and his body laid in state in the rotunda of the Capitol until Friday evening, November 18, at 3 o'clock, when the remains were carried to Edenton Street Church, followed by the Grand Lodge officers and Masons, the Odd Fellows, the Official Board of Edenton Street Church, the State officials and a very large concourse of people. At the church a vast audience had assembled. The funeral services were very impressive. The beautiful tributes paid him found a response in the hearts of those present, and tender, loving hands laid him to rest.

Thus closed the service designated to pay the last tribute of respect to the memory of one of the most generally beloved and one of the truest, best men that North Carolina ever produced. He was one of Nature's noblemen, and his precious memory will long linger in freshuess and beauty to help those whom he has left behind to meet him in the sky.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

We feel devoutly thankful for the marked interest manifested by our people in the cause of education. Never in the past has been thrown upon us such responsibilities, and never have we been so well prepared to meet the requirements of the hour. The relationship which has existed between the ages of the church have been educational as well as moral. "The things of the past have happened for ensamples," and have been written "for our admonition upon whom the ends of the world are come." Methodism was learned in a university, and the genius of the parent has descended to the child. John Wesley dropped a pebble in the ocean of human thought which created a ripple that increased the fury of some wave that in turn has affected another, and still another, until they beat and break upon the farthest shore. A thousand wheels, within the great wheel, have all been revolving, thus moving the hand upon the dial-plate of Time that points out changes and progress. We no longer revel in the memory of "good old times," but stand in the light of opportunities and advantages never possessed before.

John Wesley saw the beautiful form of Methodism in the rough and unpolished marble, and we have been chiseling away the pieces of stone that surrounded it until we have left bare the matchless piece of statuary. The leaven has leavened the whole lump. Methodists are not only more numerous than they have ever been, but are leading the world in thought and education. North Carolina Methodists have not been insensible to the opportunities and demands of the age, but are taking march with her sisters of every land. She has been rearing her school-houses, equipping her colleges, clearing the swamps and morasses of indifference and ignorance, and sending over hill and dale the echoes of progress and consecrated education.

TRINITY COLLEGE.

Among the several institutions of learning under the fostering care of the North Carolina Conference, we first call attention to Trinity College.

We are rejoiced to note the fact that Trinity College now stands equal to any institution of like grade in the land. Having been recently moved to Durham into its new and elegant buildings, it has greatly increased its capacity, both on the side of its work and on the side of its influence. It now numbers among its Faculty a corp of professors and instructors that represent the very best talent found in the great modern educational movement. In its new home, with its enlarged equipments,

the future of Trinity College is full of hope, and needs only the loyalty of the church to make its sphere of usefulness unsurpassed by any.

We feel glad at the degree of prosperity that has attended all of our institutions of learning, but we rejoice especially in the glorious prospect before Trinity. The ship has been launched, she is fully rigged, her sails are trimmed and set, and she only awaits the winds of a generous endowment to start her on her voyage of extraordinary usefulness to the church.

We submit herewith the generous proposition of Mr. B. N. Duke, of Durham, and recommend its acceptance by the Conference. The proposition is as follows:

DURHAM, N. C., December 13, 1892.

To the President and Board of Trustees of Trinity College, Durham, N. C.

GENTLEMEN:—In lieu of the insurance proposition made to the Western North Carolina Conference, the legality of which insurance is regarded by high legal authority as not being strictly in accordance with insurance laws, I therefore make the following proposition as a substitute:

- I. That, on condition that the Board of Trustees of Trinity College will provide annually, for the current expenses of the College, the sum of fifteen thousand dollars from all sources, including fees, Conference collections, private subscriptions, endowments, etc., I will agree to furnish to the Trustees, as a contribution from my brothers, sister and myself, the sum of seventy-five hundred dollars yearly for three consecutive years.
- 2. That this amount is to be paid into the College treasury as follows: I will place one dollar to the credit of the College treasury in bank as often as the Trustees from the several sources named shall place two dollars, to the amount of seventy-five hundred dollars on my part and fifteen thousand on your part annually for the period of three years.
- 3. That for the first year this seventy-five hundred dollars shall be as follows:

 As determined by donors ______\$2,500

 For scholarships, to be distributed among the Presiding Elder

Total \$7,500
4. For the second year this seventy-five hundred dollars shall be applied as follows:

Total \$7,500

5. For the third year this seventy-five hundred dollars shall be applied on the same plan as in the second year.

This proposition is suggested in view of the immediate needs of the College, the importance of increasing the patronage by scholarships and of binding the church, its people and its leaders to the College in such a way as to awaken their pride and consolidate their efforts in its behalf. It has in view also the importance and necessity of putting forth such efforts as will secure for the College an endowment of such amount as will give it an income from all sources of twenty thousand dollars or more by the end of these three years, independent of extra collections and private gifts. If the Board of Trustees will accept this proposition and proceed to make good their part, I will personally obligate myself, with others herein mentioned, to make good our part in proportion to the amount placed to the credit of the College treasury by the Board to the extent herein named.

In the matter of raising an endowment, it seems to me that it is entirely practicable to secure enough in each of the larger centers of Methodism in North Carolina to endow a single chair, and that efforts should be made at once looking to this end as early as possible.

The scholarships offered herein are meant to be placed so as to reach and be available for worthy, talented and needy young men in the several districts of both Conferences of the State, from which the Presiding Elders may select incumbents subject to the regulations prescribed by the Board, and to the approval of the President of the Faculty, much in the same manner in which Congressmen appoint students to the Naval Academy or the Military Academy at West Point. A sufficient number of these scholarships should be placed at the disposal of the head masters of our church preparatory schools and colleges, to be awarded to the most worthy and capable of the needy candidates for admission to College from these schools. This would have the effect of consolidating, endowing and uniting these church institutions to the College itself.

- 2. We recommend also that an assessment of \$5,000\$ be made by the Conference in order to meet our part of the obligation.
- 3. We further recommend that Prof. L. W. Crawford be recognized as the financial agent of the College within bounds of our Conference.
- 4. At the suggestion of the Board of Trustees we recommend that the terms of office of members of the said Board from the North Carolina Conference be as follows:

FOR SIX YEARS—Rev. S. D. Adams, Rev. E. A. Yates, J. S. Carr, B. N. Duke.

FOR FOUR YEARS-Hon. Walter Clark, Rev. M. L. Wood, Rev. W. S. Black, Hon. R. T. Gray.

FOR TWO YEARS—Rev. F. D. Swindeli, Rev. V. A. Sharpe, Rev. J. A. Cuninggim, Hon. T. J. Jarvis.

We further recommend that the Legislature of North Carolina, at its next meeting, be requested to amend the charter of Trinity College as follows:

- 1. There shall be added to the Board of Trustees, ex officio, the Treasurer and Financial Committee of three.
- 2. The Board shall have power, at any annual or regularly called meeting, to declare any place on the Board vacant, and shall proceed to fill the same, subject to confirmation by the Annual Conference.
- 3. All Trustees provided for in the charter of Trinity College shall be nominated by the Board, subject to confirmation by the Conference in which they respectively reside.
 - 4. All laws in conflict with this are hereby repealed.
 - 5. This amendment shall go into effect from and after its ratification.

GREENSBORO FEMALE COLLEGE.

We are glad also to note the continued progress and prosperity of this noble institution of learning. It is as well if not better located and as thoroughly equipped as any college in the South for young ladies. It has every comfort and convenience almost that modern improvement could possibly put within a college. The beauty, healthfulness and accessibility of situation, the solid financial basis of its matured prosperity, its high grade; the sound, elevated and intellectual and moral tone of its surroundings are such as to make it worthy of the confidence and patronage of our people.

LITTLETON FEMALE COLLEGE.

This Institution, we are delighted to know, continues to grow and do good work in the cause of female education. It is beautifully and healthily located and has a strong faculty, and thus commends itself to the favorable consideration of those who have daughters to educate. The students of this school are well cared for in every way—mentally, physically, morally and religiously. The Conference owns sixty-three shares of stock in this College, which gives the Conference a controlling interest in it.

We also heartily endorse this Institution of learning, and request the Bishop to appoint Rev. J. M. Rhodes as its President.

WESLEVAN FEMALE COLLEGE.

This College, we are glad to learn, has been doing good work during the past year. It is in a section of country where we need a school. It is accessible by rail and water from eighteen or twenty counties in our own Conference, and from six counties beyond the Chowan, in the Virginia Conference.

To us as a Church the prosperity of this College is of very great importance, while to Methodism in the northeastern section it is the very life.

This College has a full and competent faculty. The building is of brick; three stories high; large and comfortable; heated throughout with steam; situated in a beautiful campus, in a quiet and moral village, and among a cultured and refined people, so that the prospects for the future are encouraging.

Resolved, That we endorse most heartily Wesleyan Female College, and recommend it to the patronage of our people, and request the Bishop to appoint Rev. R. P. Troy President of said institution.

We recommend that the following names be added to the present Committee of Management, to-wit, R. B. John, U. Vaughn, B. B. Winborn.

- 5. That whereas, the Publishing House, in a pamphlet sent out during the year to the preachers of our connection, offering to the same an unusual privilege in the way of buying books, we hereby express our desire that the privilege be extended so far as to allow any preacher accepting the offer as set forth in the pamphlet, to buy one volume of any of its publications for his own use at the same rate.

6. That the Raleigh Christian Advocate, the organ of our own Conference, has done and is now doing a grand work for North Carolina Methodism, and that as a right-arm of the church, it should be read around every Methodist fireside in our State. We stress the importance of an effort on the part of our preachers to increase its number of subscribers during the ensuing year. We request the Bishop to appoint Rev. F. L. Reid, D. D., editor another year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The Board of Missions beg leave to offer the following report:

There have been thirty charges in the Domestic Mission field, more or less under the care of the Board during this year. In three of them the pastors were paid very little except what they received from the Board. In the others there was manifested some commendable purpose to assist the Board in supporting their pastors, and we trust the pastors have been kept above want, and generally speaking, in comfortable circumstances. The average paid from both sources was \$523.50. The other three pastors only received from all sources an average of \$265.

There have been reported through these operations the following results: 878 conversions; 912 accessions; 160 infants baptized; 470 adults baptized; nine new churches built or finished; twelve churches now under contract, and considerable amounts collected on the assessments made by the Annual Conference.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY-SCHOOL BOARD.

The Sunday-School Board beg leave to make the following report:

There are in the bounds of our Conference 592 Sunday-schools, an increase of 9. Number of officers and teachers, 4.397; an increase of 111. Number of scholars, 33,808; a decrease of 1,227. Amount expended for literature, \$6,386.57; a decrease of \$30.27. Contributed for Missions, \$1,295.85; a decrease of \$88.40. Contributed on "Children's Day," \$227.16; a decrease of \$132.97. Raised for other objects, \$2,994.88; an increase of \$101.95. Whole amount raised in Sunday-schools, \$11,749.53; an increase of \$695.38.

The Treasurer has given aid to 26 needy Sunday-schools this year from the "Children's Day" fund, amounting to \$211.10, leaving a deposit at the Publishing House of \$550.40, to which will be added 90 per cent. of the amount collected this year, making now on hand \$754.85.

Your Board would recommend, first, that our preachers give more attention to the organization of Mission Sunday-schools; second, that our Sunday-school supplies be purchased from Rev. T. J. Gattis, the Agent for Colportage and Sunday-schools.

We offer for adoption the following resolution:

"That where there are needy Sunday-schools desiring to purchase libraries, the Sunday-school Board, upon the recommendation of the preacher in charge, will furnish half the amount necessary."
