## FIRST DAY.

# WEDNESDAY, December 6th, 1893.

The North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in its Fifty-seventh Session at Fifth Street Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in the city of Wilmington, N. C., Wednesday morning, 9:30 o'clock, December 6th, 1893, Bishop William W. Duncan in the chair.

On motion of E. A. Yates, the vote of yesterday's session of the Conference, referring the application of Thomas B. Swindell and others, regarding the transfer of the licensing of local preachers from the Quarterly to the District Conference.

W. S. Rone requested the privilege of taking a collection for T. J. Browning. The amount realized was \$51.40.

The Conference proceeded with the election of delegates to the General Conference.

In the second clerical ballot 124 votes were cast. E. A. Yates receiving 7.3 votes was declared elected.

In the third clerical ballot 121 votes were cast. No one receiving a majority of the votes cast, there was no election.

In the fourth clerical ballot 113 votes were cast. W. H.

Moore receiving 81 votes and W. S. Rone 68 votes were declared elected.

The Bishop announced that the Conference would elect three clerical and three lay alternate delegates, and, on motion, it was ordered that the clerical alternates be elected by a plurality vote.

In the clerical ballot 99 votes were cast, and F. L. Reid, J. A. Cuninggim and G. A. Oglesby receiving the highest number of votes were declared elected alternate delegates.

In the first ballot for alternate lay delegates 14 votes were cast, and O. H. Allen receiving 9 votes was declared elected.

In the second ballot for alternate lay delegates 14 votes were cast, and B. W. Ballard receiving 10 votes and T. A. Green 9 votes were declared elected.

R. B. John presented the appeal of D. D. Bailey, a local preacher expelled from the ministry and membership of the Church by the Quarterly Conference of Roper Station, Washington District, from the action of that Quarterly Conference.

G. A. Oglesby moved that the appeal be not sustained.

T. W. Guthrie moved, as a substitute, that the appeal be sustained. Substitute was adopted.

Bishop Duncan appointed as the Committee of Appeal the following: P. L. Herman, F. A. Bishop, T. J. Dailey, J. D. Pegram, J. Sandford, Z. T. Harrison, J. A. Hornaday, H. B. Anderson and B. B. Holder, with V. A. Sharpe as chairman. J. H. Hall, one of the assistant secretaries of the Conference, was designated as secretary to the committee.

F. L. Reid submitted the report of the Committee on Paine Institute, which was adopted. (Document No. 3, Appendix.)

The hour of 1 o'clock having arrived, by unanimous consent the time was extended in order to allow Rev. G. G.

Smith, D.D., to present to the Conference the interests of Paine Institute, Augusta, Ga.

On motion of E. A. Yates, it was ordered that when the Conference adjourns it do so to meet at 3 o'clock P. M., Sunday, for the Memorial Services.

At 1 o'clock and 20 minutes, on motion, the Conference adjourned.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF COLPORTAGE.

## MEMOIR OF REV. ROBERT B. GILLIAM.

The Rev. Robert B. Gilliam was born in the town of Oxford in the year 1828. He was the son of Dr. J. T. Gilliam, and his mother was a Miss Belden, of Fayetteville, hence on both sides he was well connected. His family was one of high social position, and gifted by nature with strong mental force, and some members of it have attained to positions of honor in civil affairs.

The subject of this memoir inherited to some degree the natural gifts of the family, and but for waywardness in his early life might have, by the use of the opportunities afforded him, become a man of large influence and usefulness. Too late he saw his mistake to remedy it, but when he became a preacher of the gospel, which he did after he had passed the prime of life, he strove diligently to redeem his lost opportunities by becoming a diligent student.

We have no data at hand from which we can be assisted in preparing a suitable sketch of his life, and we know too little of him to properly estimate his character. He was probably converted in mature life and from that time took active part in church work. He was already getting to be an old man when he was licensed to preach, having served the church for awhile as an exhorter. He was admitted on trial in the Conference at Charlotte, 1885, and was assigned to the Pitt Mission, which he served for four years with acceptability and usefulness. He was then sent to Jones Circuit, which he served with popularity as a preacher for three years and began his fourth year in feeble health, hoping to improve sufficiently for the year's work. But he grew worse and never reached an appointment, save in the town where he lived. He continued to grow worse, and on the 22d of February he passed peacefully through the gates of the grave to the rest and inheritance beyond.

In his last days, while still entertaining a hope of recovery, he expressed strong faith in God and resignation to His will. As a preacher he was earnest and persuasive and was instrumental in winning souls. It is said that he made it a rule to speak to everyone he met, if opportunity afforded, concerning religion, ofttimes stopping on the road to speak with men at work on their farms.

The laborer has gone to his reward. The Master said, "Come up higher," and cheerfully he obeyed the call and went over to receive his crown. On the other side we believe he mingles with the white robed multitude who abide with Him who loved them and gave Himself for them, and has a part in the song which goes forth as the

sound of many waters, praising Him who has redeemed them by His blood, and who makes them kings and priests forever.

#### MEMOIR OF REV. JAMES H. CORDON, D. D.

James H. Cordon was born in Washington, N. C., July 9, 1851. He received a good academic education at Bingham's School in this State. Early in his young manhood he entered the profession of law, in which he continued for several years. In 1872 he was married to Mattie Fowle Telfair. In 1874 he was converted to Christ. In 1877 he joined the North Carolina Annual Conference at its session in Salisbury. He received at the hands of the Conference the following appointments:

1878-'79-'80, Mattamuskeet Circuit.

1881-'82-'83-'84, South Edgecombe Circuit.

1885-'86, Statesville Station.

1887-'88, Wilson Station.

1889-'90-'91, Edenton Street Station.

1892, Wilson Station.

He received the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity from the University of North Carolina in 1890.

He died at Oxford, February 22, 1893, leaving a wife and five children.

Thus is given, in brief outline, the official record of one who numbered apostleship with us, and who was a brother tenderly beloved in life and tenderly lamented in death. It is not an easy task to throw upon the canvass the true and full portrait of our brother, or to fix his rank among his fellows. The contour of his manhood was not evenly and roundly developed. Heaven gave richly and with a lavish hand to him in many of the endowments of his nature; while she gave with a sparing hand in some others. His heart was a realm of boundless wealth, overflowing in its treasures of gold and frankincense and myrrh, the home of every sweet courtesy and the high seat of every noble affection; but he did not have that supreme poise to his powers, that sovereign command of himself that is essential to men of great endowment. In this memoir we are going to let love talk; but love shall be guided by truth. If we could only tell the story of his life *as it was*, if we could only paint the portrait of his character *as it was*, it would be a very lovable and sweet picture to behold, and we would not fear the effect of whatever blemish there might be.

It cannot be written down that our brother was what men call *a* strong character. He was not one of those men who form the framework of the communities in which they live, and who contribute largely in making the destiny of States. His life had another ministry. He was one of those choice spirits that heaven now and then sends to adorn and to brighten the face of the earth—a glorious and sweet sunbeam stealing into the hearts of men and bringing to them good cheer and strength and hopefulness. His was the ministry of beauty and fragrance and light. He took dullness and stiffness and the sombre hues from the face of society and threw over it the glory of morning and the blush of roses and the kisses of peace. And all this is a gracious ministry and needful to the happiness of the world.

Why has God made the birds to sing? and why has he made the flowers to bloom and to give fragrance? Some men would say there is no need for these things, and they would silence the voice of birds and blight the beauty of flowers. But God has given them a ministry-it is the ministry of adornment and beauty. They are sent to make the face of nature to smile and the heart of man to rejoice. So now and then God sends to earth those spirits whose peculiar ministry it is to brighten the face of life and to fill the heart with joy. Such a ministry we believe was given to James H. Cordon. In his voice there were the love-notes of happy birds; in his face there was the smile and fragrance of thousands of roses; in his heart there was a brother's warm love, tender and strong as woman's, that whispered to us of affection's shrine and of a realm where Jesus reigns and saints rejoice. What child, on his way to school, did not feel happier all the day long for having met him on the street? What heart, careworn and discouraged, did not feel a renewed purpose rise up within him from having grasped his hand and received his brother's greeting? What darkened home has not felt that an angel's visit had come to it when James Cordon crossed the threshold? What a luxury of joy, what a wealth of delight, what overflowings of soul his friends have had by the charm of his presence! In the pilgrimage of years we have not known a wealthier soul, a gentler spirit, or a more enjoyable friend. His was indeed a very sweet ministry to the hearts of men; and lovingly and tenderly did he perform it.

As a preacher Bro. Cordon was easily one of the foremost men in our ranks. He was a master of assemblies. He was princely in the elements of his power. He was exceedingly attractive as a speaker. He had all the gifts of a popular preacher. He was graceful in per-

son; he was noble in bearing; he was poetical in temperament; he was eloquent in thought; he was imaginative in treatment; he was tender in feeling; he was impassioned in delivery and refined in all the tastes of his soul. He was a consummate master of pathos and tenderness. He did not always use his great gifts. Sometimes he was wasteful of these rare treasures and did not enrich his discourses with them; but when he did bring himself up to his full power and to the use of his rare and princely gifts, there have been few men among us that could equal him in the imperial command that he had over great andicnees.

The people heard him gladly. He lived much in the hearts of his congregation and he gave back to them love for love. The Lord honored his preaching and gave him many seals to his ministry. He went not alone to the task given him. The blessed Savior, who sent him out, went with him and gave him a victorious gospel. Sometimes the path became rough to his feet; sometimes the world did not know the inner life of his soul ; sometimes his gentle spirit did not get the sympathy that it longed to receive from its friends ; sometimes he was misunderstood; sometimes his soul was assailed by the powers of darkness; sometimes the storm beat unkindly upon his soul; sometimes he went forth weeping-sowing in tears; but all these things drove him but closer to the sure path, and made him lean but the harder upon the arm of the Friend whom he knew and who walked in the path with him. It was our privilege to know him in the bonds of comradeship. It was given to us to lie in his bosom, and knowing him as we did, we can say that we believe there was never an hour when his soul wavered in its allegiance to the Lord Jesus.

When the final summons came he was ready and was tranquil amid alarms. He went knowingly down to the shore in the comforting assurance that he would "See his Pilot face to face when he had crossed the bar."

And so he had victory in death, and so he is ever with the Lord.

"Very pleasant hast thou been unto us, our brother; thy love to us was wonderful, passing the love of women."

#### MEMOIR OF REV. THOMAS W. S. PARKER.

Rev. Thomas W. S. Parker, son of Thomas B. and Rhoda Parker, was born June 6, 1865, at Mt. Nebo, Vadkin County, N. C., and died at Hillsville, Va., August 27, 1893.

He was reared in the faith of his parents (the Friends), but was converted under the ministry of Rev. R. M. Taylor, and joined the M. E. Church, South, in 1885. He was licensed to preach the following year, and in 1887 joined the North Carolina Conference at its session in Fayetteville. His appointments were as follows:

1888, Reddies' River Mission.

1889, Mt. Airy Circuit.

1890, Shelby Circuit.

1891, Church Street, Charlotte.

1892, Pleasant Garden Circuit.

1893, Spring Hope Circuit.

He was happily married to Miss Mamie Edwards, of Charlotte, N. C., October 28, 1891, who with one child survives him to mourn his untimely death.

Brother Parker was physically frail, and his zeal in the service of his Master made heavy drains upon his limited strength. But notwithstanding his frailty it was astonishing to know how much laborious work he could perform. He was a tireless worker in every field given him, and he died in the midst of labors abundant.

His early advantages for an education were limited, but he possessed a bright quick mind, which enabled him to make remarkable progress in the few years spent in the ministry. As a preacher he was successful in the presentation of the truth, and as a result hundreds were convicted and converted and the dormant life of the church quickened. He loved to preach, and I have seen him, as he held forth the Word of Life unto great crowds waiting upon his ministry, baptized, with the Holy Ghost; the truth he taught became indeed the power of God unto the salvation of many who believed.

Brother Parker was a man of God—faithful in his friendships, warm in his sympathies, tireless in his ministry of love and helpfulness to others. Many shall call him blessed in that day.

Early in the summer he was forced by impaired health to go to the western part of the State in quest of rest and improvement. While engaged in a protracted meeting in Hillsville, under circumstances most sad he entered into his Master's rest. During the week he had been preaching with great acceptability and in great

power, for God was giving him seals to his ministry. On Saturday night, August 26, he purchased some quinine, as he thought, to take upon retiring for a cold. A fatal mistake had been made, and morphine instead of quinine given. After retiring he became conscious of strange sensations unlike anything hitherto experienced. He remarked that he felt strange, and they offered to go after a physician, but he declined, saying he reckoned he would be all right by morning. Little did he or anyone else imagine that on the morrow he would enter into rest; be at home with Christ whom he preached so faithfully to others. The morning found him beyond the reach of human aid, too far from this shore, too near the other for us to call him back.

I knew him intimately. I shared his sorrows. I enjoyed our fellowship. I loved him for his own and his work's sake. He was a child of God, and is not among us to-day but at home with the Father.

May God comfort the wife, be a father to their child, and bring us together in His own kingdom. B. R. HALL.

# MEMOIR OF REV. J. T. FINLAYSON.

John Thomas Finlayson was born on the 20th day of October, A. D., 1855, and was received into the M. E. Church, South, at Princeton, N. C., on profession of faith in the year 1873. He was admitted on trial into the traveling connection of the North Carolina Annual Conference at its session held in Wilson in December, 1879, and served the following charges:

1880, Junior preacher on Smithfield Circuit.

1881, Hanner's Creek Mission.

1882-'83, Youngsville Circuit.

1884. Junior preacher on Tar River Circuit.

1885-'88, Lumberton Circuit.

1889-'91-Shelby Station.

1892-'93, Roper City Station, where, during the latter part of his second, which is the present year, his health became so much impaired that he was compelled to desist from labor and suffer the unpleasant experience of several weeks confinement to his bed. While the hand of affliction was thus being heavily pressed upon him, he was called upon to undergo a sorrow of quite a different character in the loss of his beloved wife, daughter of Rev. J. Saudford, D.D.,

with whom he had happily lived for several years. And although it seemed impossible from any human standpoint for him to endure the exposure and fatigue of a trip extending from Roper City to Lumberton, yet, excited by an ardent irrepressible love for his departed loved one, he accompanied her remains to the latter place for interment; ignorant of (and perhaps little earing if such should prove) the fact that he too would soon follow to the land where love reigns and sickness is unknown. Such, however, was the ease, for about nine days after *her* burial *his* redeemed spirit entered upon its eternal ministry of praise in the City of God. He died at the residence of his father-in-law on the 17th day of October, 1893.

Brother Finlayson was the descendant of Methodist ancestors, and was an humble sweet-spirited Christian gentleman. He possessed by nature an intellectual power above the average. This, with close application to study, soon brought him into prominence among his brethren in the Conference. During the present year, on his charge, Roper City Station, his ministry was crowned with a gracious revival resulting in the conversion of about thirty souls. For some hours previous to his death he was in a state of unconsciousness, but just before entering into that condition he was heard distinctly to exclaim, "Ho! every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters."

During a comparatively short life he was a great sufferer. For several years at least he writhed within the embrace of that dreadful disease, dyspepsia. But, believing as we do that "he looked not at the things which are seen but at the things which are unseen," his afflictions *have* worked out for him a "far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory."

In the quiet cemetery in the town of Lumberton, N. C., his mortal remains were laid to rest beside those of his wife and their only babe. Sleep on, young father, mother, babe! He who is "the resurrection and the life" will awaken thy dust at His coming.

#### MEMOIR OF REV. M. L. WOOD, D. D.

Rev. Marquis LaFayette Wood was born in Randolph County, N. C., near Concord Camp-ground, October 23, 1829, and died at the parsonage at Gibson Station, N. C., November 25, 1893. He was tenth in a family of fourteen children, seven sons and seven daughters. He was converted and joined the church in his fourteenth year; graduated at Trinity College (then called Normal College) in

1855, joined the North Carolina Conference at the session in Wilmington the same year, and filled the following appointments : 1856, Wilkes Circuit.

1857, Franklinsville Circuit.

1858-'59, Surry Circuit.

1850-'66, China Mission.

1867, Traveling and Lecturing on China.

1868-'70, Mt. Airy Station.

1871-'74, Salisbury District.

1875-'76, Iredell Circuit.

1877-'79, Greensboro District.

1880-'83, Charlotte District.

1884, President of Trinity College.

1885-'87, Shelby District.

1888-'91, Rockingham Station.

1892, Rockingham District.

1893, St. John Station.

He was ordained deacon at Goldsboro by Bishop Pierce in 1857, ordained elder at Columbia, Tenn., by Bishop Early, October 16, 1859. He went to Columbia to receive ordination previous to the meeting of his own Conference that he might make an earlier departure to the mission field.

Dr. Wood and wife, in company with Rev. Young J. Allen and wife, sailed from New York for China December 17, 1859. They went in no richly furnished modern steamer, but in a sailing vessel. They were seven months on the voyage, rounding the Cape of Good Hope. According to Dr. Allen's statement at Fayetteville Conference, 1887, the drinking water in the oaken casks got so low that it was black as ink, and the biscuit were mouldy and worm-eaten. There were weeks upon weeks when they were out of sight of land and every sign of human existence except themselves. They landed in Shanghai, China, July 13, 1860. Here, far on the frontier of Christ's kingdom, he and the little band of missionaries and their families faced the heathen forces of false religions, and battled for Christ's truth. It was during the time of our civil war, which cut off supplies and rendered their work the more difficult. Dr. Wood spent seven years in China, during which time his wife died and his own health failed, compelling his return home.

Dr. Wood was thrice married. On the eve of his departure for China, September 19, 1859, he was married at Greensboro to Miss Ellen E. Morphis, a most devoted Christian woman. To them were born, in China, two children, Edward and Charlie. Edward died in North Carolina in 1884. Charles A. Wood now lives in Winston, N. C.

In 1862 Dr. Wood's and his wife's health became so poor that they spent several months in Japan recruiting. His wife died in China March 16, 1864, leaving an infant five months old. The children were kindly cared for by Mr. and Mrs. T. P. Crawford of the Baptist Mission in Yung Chow.

March 2, 1869, he was married to Miss Carrie V. Pickett at Wilmington. To them were born three children, Fannie, Thomas and Maggie, all of whom survive him. Their mother died October 29, 1873, her youngest child then ten months old.

November 29, 1875, he was married at Statesville to Mrs. Amanda Alford Robbins, widow of Capt. J. A. Robbins, who fell in the service of the Southern arms in the late war. Mrs. Wood died in Rockingham, N. C., March 9, 1890. Her children are Miss Mamie Robbins and Hon. Gaston Robbins, member of Congress, Selma, Alabama.

The honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred on Dr. Wood in 1884 by Rutherford College and by the University of North Carolina. In this same year he was elected by the Trustees and appointed by the Bishop to the Presidency of Trinity College. This was a tribute to his profound scholarship, well deserved. Dr. B. Craven had almost wholly carried the college by himself, without assistance from the hundred thousand Methodists of North Carolina up to the time of his death in 1882. Dr. Wood's term of presidency came in the interval between Dr. Craven's death and these later years when the Methodists are beginning to learn that they owe something to the college. It was too much for human endurance, and Dr. Wood returned to the pastorate in 1885.

Dr. Wood was the ardent friend of education. Raised on a farm, and having no special advantages, he fitted himself for college, gradnated in 1855, and pursued the critical study of the Scriptures in their original tongues throughout his life. He had little patience with parents who neglected to give their children all possible advantages of an education. While Presiding Elder his second round of quarterly conferences were improvised into educational institutes at which the subject was thoronghly investigated.

Dr. Wood was like a father to the younger preachers. He laid broad and deep foundations on which we are now building. He labored and we have entered into the fruits of his labors. He was a leader in thought, dug deep into the mine of Scripture truth, and brought forth new things as well as old out of the Word. His was advanced thought in the sense of newer and deeper truths out of old texts. His preaching was such as everybody could understand, and his style of expression such that people would remember his savings,

and speak of them in after days. Hence it will take the light of judgment day to reveal all the influence of his teaching.

Dr. Wood's moral power was great. His life in any community represented a great moral force. People rose up before him, and did him reverence for his purity of character, his unflinching devotion to principle, his fearless utterance of truth. In Rockingham, where he spent five years at the last of his life, all classes and ages equally honored him. Those whose voices have been heard in the public councils of the land equally with others honored him for his integrity and profound learning. His last year was as pastor of St. John Station, the parsonage being at Gibson Station. His health, which had been poor for several years, gave way completely this year. He struggled manfully against his increasing infirmities. But three weeks before his death he was filling his appointments, preaching sitting in a chair. His mind was clear and he was himself to the last. His body gave out, his mind did not. Knowing by reason that his end was near, yet in spirit he never realized it. His last hours found him, in spirit, out in his work getting it in best shape for Conference.

> "His sword was in his hand Still warm for instant fight, Ready that moment, at command, Through rock and steel to smite."

He sent no last word to brethren of the Conference because his thoughts and spirit were before him in the thickest of the battle. He remarked that all others would receive an appointment at the approaching Conference but himself. But the Chief Bishop has given him an appointment on high, before we know ours, and he must be even now employed for the Master.

In admiration for his splendid courage and indomitable spirit, we almost forgot to mourn him as a friend, but when, amidst a pelting rain, and to the solemn "dust to dust, ashes to ashes," as read by Dr. Wm. H. Moore, his presiding elder, we saw his remains lowered into the grave by the side of those of his last wife, in Eastside Cemetery, Rockingham, N. C., and realized that this was the very last we should see of him on earth, grief at the parting touched all our hearts; *love for the man* rose supreme over every other emotion.

We cherish his memory as that of a friend whom we shall joyously meet in the land

"Where all our toils are o'er. Our suffering and our pain."

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

The Committee on Temperance after careful and prayerful consideration beg leave to offer the following for adoption by the Conference :

We recognize and deeply deplore the enormity of the great evil of intemperance, an evil which has been and is now, to a very considerable extent, casting its direful shadow over our beloved country and State, blasting more hopes, wrecking more homes, making more widows and orphans and destroying more lives than all other legalized evils and vices combined. We believe, nevertheless, and rejoice in the fact that the sentiment in favor of the temperance question is steadily growing among us, and we indulge the fond hope that the day is not far distant when the iniquitous liquor traffic, with all its attendant ills shall be driven from our midst.

<sup>1</sup> We desire as a great and growing church to maintain the position we have always held on this important question, separating ourselves from all unholy and political alliances, which are more injurious than helpful to the cause. Recognizing the purity of the church to be its distinguishing characteristic, we recommend that all our preachers and people see that the rules on temperance as laid down in our Book of Discipliue, chapter 5, page 128, be strictly and faithfully observed.

There have been reported 1,037 conversions; 944 accessions; 152 infants baptized; 452 adults baptized; 11 churches built or finished; 11 churches now under contract; 38 places where services are regularly conducted, where we have no church building; 130 Sunday-schools; 709 officers and teachers; 5,673 scholars; \$999.97 contributed for Sunday-schools; \$3,065.40 collected on all the Conference collections.

The Board is anxions to devise some plan by which to pay those serving our domestic missionary fields the full face of the drafts issued to them, or at least a much larger per cent, than we are now paying, which is only 67 per cent. this year.

The Board passed the following resolution, to be presented to the Conference, in regard to our missionary literature:

"Resolved, That we most heartily endorse and recommend to all our people The Methodist Review of Missions, The Sowers and Reapers and Dyke Builders, The Hand-Book of Missions, by Dr. John, and the leaflets which are for free distribution, all published at Nashville, and urge our preachers to use all proper means to secure their circulation."

The assessments for Foreign and Domestic Missions will be the same as they were last year, except there is no assessment for missionary debt.

We are told that if we will raise all the amounts assessed in the regular way there will be no further need of raising anything for the debt. But this must be done, else the remainder of the debt will still be an obligation upon us. Therefore, we urge for the coming year that the mark we set before us shall be-

1. To raise the assessment in full on every charge.

2. To raise the full assessment for the several Districts.

3. To raise the full assessment for both Foreign and Domestic Missions for the entire Conference.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

We are rejoiced to know that, notwithstanding the general prostration of business and the great financial depression felt throughout the land, our people have not lost interest in the great educational movement of the day. Education is still the watchword of the hour, and unto this cry the people are rallying as never before.

In no department of our work are we confronted with graver responsibilities, and never in the past have we been so well prepared to meet the requirements of the hour. We are a numerous people, and to hold our own as a church we must be leaders of thought as well as morals. Our institutions of learning are centers of light and the bulwark of our strength, and Methodism must not be insensible to the opportunities and demands upon her, but must take march with her sisters of every land.

We feel devoutly thankful for the marked progress and prosperity all

our institutions of learning have made during the year, notwithstanding the stringenev of the times.

We are happy to note that Trinity College, the only male college under the fostering care of the Conference, has had a prosperous and profitable year. With its new and elegant buildings, and with increased capacity for usefulness, both on the side of its work and on the side of its influence, it stands equal to any institution of like grade in the land. It has a large and harmonious Faculty that represents the best talent to be found anywhere engaged in educational work.

With its new equipments and enlarged capacity it requires more money for current expenses, but with a loyal and generous church behind it the college is full of hope and looks forward to a sphere of usefulness unsurpassed by any.

While the current expenses of the college have been greatly increased in its new home and field, yet we are informed by the financial committee that the income of the college for the present year will be large enough to easily meet all expenses.

We are rejoiced to note the degree of prosperity that has already attended this noble institution of learning in its new field, and hope that this is only the beginning of an unprecedented career of usefulness as a school.

The Board recommends the following:

I. That an assessment of \$5,000 be made by the Conference to help meet the current expenses of the college.

2. That Prof. L. W. Crawford be endorsed as the Financial Agent of Trinity College within the bounds of the Conference, and his duties to be prescribed by and his reports made to the Executive Committee of Trinity College.

3. That the following named gentlemen be appointed as Trustees of Trinity College: E. J. Parish, V. Ballard, W. H. Branson, H. J. Bass, A. H. Stokes and B. B. Nicholson.

4. That W. C. Norman be appointed in place of E. A. Yates, resigned.

#### GREENSBORO FEMALE COLLEGE.

We are happy to note the continued progress and prosperity of Greensboro Female College.

With its fine location and thorough equipment as a female college it is the equal of any in the South for young ladies. It has all the comforts and conveniences of modern improvement. It is beautiful for situation, healthy and easily to be reached. It is of high grade, and the intellectual and moral tone of its surroundings is sound and elevating, and in every sense the institution is worthy of the confidence and patronage of our people.

The Board recommend that Rev. F. L. Reid, D. D., be appointed President of Greensboro Female College.

#### LITTLETON FEMALE COLLEGE.

This noble institution of learning, we are glad to report, continues to grow and prosper, and is doing a good work in the cause of female education.

Its beautiful and healthy location, together with its large and commodious buildings and strong Faculty, commends itself readily to the favorable consideration of our people.

The young ladies of this school are well cared for in every way.

The Conference now owns a controlling interest in the property of this school, and it is hoped that the day is not far distant when it will be entirely under the control of the Conference.

*Resolved*, That we heartily endorse this institution of learning, and recommend that Rev. J. M. Rhodes be appointed its President.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

The Committee on Books and Periodicals respectfully submit the following report:

That the continued success of our Publishing House at Nashville is an index of the fact that our people are alive to this most important enterprise of the church, and that we commend the publishing interests of the church to the minds and hearts of our people.

That the increasing merit of the *Nashville Advocale* betokens an increasing appreciation of a connectional organ on the part of our people; that we urge our people to a heartier support, and that we expect the preachers especially to manifest a livelier interest in the matter of procuring subscribers.

That the *Quarterly Review*, as the exponent of the best thought of our Methodism, should receive the earnest support of our preachers and laymen and thus be able to maintain itself as the equal of any Church Review.

That the following periodicals are worthy of and do demand the earnest patronage of the church at large: *The Methodist Review of Missions*, *Woman's Missionary Advocate, Sowers and Reapers*, and Funk and Wagnall's *Missionary Review of the World*.

That the *Raleigh Christian Advocate*, our Conference organ, which has done so much good in the past, is becoming a growing necessity in every Methodist household within the bounds of our Conference; that we press its claims upon all who claim to be Methodists, and that we urge our preachers to a more strenuous effort in its behalf, in the way of bringing its subscription list to that point where it can compete successfully with the best equipped papers of our church. We request the Bishop to appoint Rev. F. L. Reid, D. D., and Rev. W. L. Grissom editors of the *Raleigh Christian Advocate*.

WHEREAS, the general policy has long prevailed in Southern Methodism of uniting two or more Annual Conferences in the support of our religious papers, and said policy has been demonstrated to be wise and successful; and

WHEREAS, we deem it wise to unite all North Carolina Methodism in the support of one paper, if it can be done peaceably and successfully; and

WHEREAS, the Western North Carolina Conference at its recent session at Charlotte, N. C., took the initiative step looking to a consolidation of the *Raleigh Christian Advocate* and the *Western Carolina Advocate*, by appointing a commission of five to confer with a similar commission from the North Carolina Conference touching the advisability of such a measure; therefore, be it

*Resolved 1.* That a commission, consisting of Rev. J. A. Cuninggim, D. D., Rev. S. D. Adams, Rev. W. C. Norman, Judge Walter Clark and W. H. Branson, be appointed to confer with the commission appointed by the Western North Carolina Conference touching a consolidation of the two papers, viz., the *Raleigh Christian Advocate* and the *Western Carolina Advocate*, on such terms as may be agreeable to the owners of said papers.

Resolved 2. That in the event of the consolidation of the two papers, the resulting paper shall be the organ of the North Carolina Conference; that we will encourage and help its circulation by all proper means, and that we will discourage the inauguration or conduct of any other newspaper within our bounds which might come in competition with said consolidated paper. Your Sunday-school Board begs leave to submit the following report: There are in the bounds of the North Carolina Conference 597 Sunday-schools, an increase of 5: number of officers and teachers 4,289, a decrease of 708; amount expended for literature \$5,398, a decrease of \$988.57; contributed for missions \$1,556.44, an increase of \$260.59; contributed on Children's Day \$144.34, a decrease of \$43.75; raised for other objects \$2,948.91, a decrease of \$345.97; whole amount raised in the Sunday-schools \$9,167.36, a decrease of \$2,582.72.

The report of Rev. J. T. Lyon, Treasurer, shows that \$155.48 has been paid out to aid in the purchase of literature for indigent schools and for libraries, leaving a balance to the credit of the Board of \$573.25.

The Board repeats the offer of last year to donate fifty per cent. of the amount necessary to purchase libraries for those schools which now have none, and urges upon the pastors of the Conference to publish this fact among their people, and to urge upon them to avail themselves of this offer.

We accept the following resolution, introduced by F. A. Bishop and J. B. Hurley:

*Resolved*, That a committee, consisting of three preachers and two laymen, be appointed to consider the wisdom of holding a Conference of the Epworth Leagues of the State, said committee to confer with a like committee from the Western Conference.

MEMORIAL NO. 5, as follows:

*Resolved*, That the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at its next session be memorialized to change the Discipline of the Church in the matter of Sunday-schools, that paragraph 237, Section V be stricken out and the following substituted therefor:

"Every Sunday-school of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, shall be under the supervision of a Sunday-school Board.

"The Sunday-school Board shall consist of the preacher in charge, who shall be *ex officio* chairman, the Sunday-school Committee appointed by the Quarterly Conference, the Secretarics and the Treasurer.

"A meeting of the Board shall be held just prior to the Fourth Quarterly Conference in each year, at which meeting every office, including that of teacher, shall be declared vacant.

"At said meeting the Superintendent shall be nominated by the Sunday-school Board and he shall be confirmed or rejected by the Fourth Quarterly Conference, and in case of vacancy the preacher in charge shall superintend or secure the superintending of the school until such time as the Superintendent nominated by the Sunday-school Board shall be confirmed by the Quarterly Conference. The other officers of the school, except teachers, shall be elected by the Sunday-school Board at its regular or called meeting. The teachers of the school shall be nominated by the Superintendent at its regular or called meeting, with the concurrence of the preacher in charge, and elected by the Board at said meeting.

"In case of the withdrawal of officers or teachers from the school they cease to be members of the Board, and the place of any officer or teacher habitually neglecting his or her duty or guilty of improper conduct may be declared vacant by the chairman of the committee.

"The last Quarterly Conference of each year shall appoint a committee of members of our church of not less than three nor more than nine for each Sunday-school in the charge, to be called the Committee on Sunday-schools, who shall be members of the Sunday-school Board, whose duty it shall be to aid the preacher in charge and the officers of the Sunday-schools in procuring suitable teachers, in promoting in all proper ways the attendance of children and adults on our Sundayschools, and at our regular public worship, and in raising money to meet the expenses of the schools of the charge. Of the committee the preacher in charge shall be chairman." P. M. BRIGGS, V. BALLARD.
