FIRST DAY, MORNING SESSION

Wednesday, September 3, 1947

The Southern Illinois Conference of The Methodist Church convened for its 96th Session and Ninth since Union in Niedringhaus Memorial Methodist Church, Granite City, Illinois at 10:30 A. M. September 3, 1947. Bishop J. Ralph Magee, resident Bishop of the Chicago Area, presiding.

Welcome—Hymn No. 162 "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing." Prayer—E. M. Leckrone. Addresses of Welcome—H. G. Hurley, Superintendent of East St. Louis District; Charles F. Reimers, Lay Leader of Granite City Niedringhaus Memorial Methodist Church and Paul Grigsby, Granite City Community High School. Bishop J. Ralph Magee responded for the Conference.

Roll Call-See Conference Directory.

Memorial Service—All joined in Responsive Reading Page 633, Second Reading. O. C. Smith led in prayer. F. D. Jenkins sang a Solo. Number 527, "For All the Saints Who From Their Labors Rest."

The Conference stood as Secretary E. M. Leckrone read the names of the Ministers, ministers wives and widows who were deceased during Conference year 1946-1947. (See list.)

Glenn F. Sharpe preached the Memorial sermon using the text found in John 11:28 "The Master is Come and Calleth for Thee."

Prayer offered by V. W. Corrie who presided during the service.

Communion Service—The Conference sang hymn No. 1 after which Bishop Magee led in the ritualistic service, assisted by the District Superintendents and local pastors.

N. C. Henderson made the motion, seconded by Paul Brown to take the first ballot for both Minister and Lay Delegates to Annual Conference immediately after the approval of Journal on Thursday morning.

C. L. Peterson moved, seconded by C. C. Hall, that a Committee be appointed to bring in a report of regulations governing the election of General Conference delegates.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' COMPOSITE REPORT

Bishop Magee, Members of the Conference, and Methodist Friends in Southern Illinois:

Greetings:

It is with a profound sense of gratitude to Almighty God for His guidance and blessing throughout the past year, and with a deep appreciation for the many courtesies and the splendid cooperation extended to us by the ministers and the laymen of the Conference that we, your District Superintendents, bring this our annual report.

We are grateful for the continued leadership and the fine brotherly spirit of our resident Bishop, and we extend to him our hearty welcome **as** he comes to preside over another session of our Annual Conference. We pledge him our loyal support in the future tasks of the Kingdom.

We are delighted with the privilege of meeting here in Granite City for this Conference, this being the first time an annual session has ever been held in this place. The pastors and the people of this Tri City area have cooperated beautifully in planning and preparing for our visit. We trust and pray that our meeting here may leave a mighty impact for righteousness upon the life of this great industrial area.

This composite report has to do primarily with the state and activities of the Church within the bounds of the Southern Illinois Conference. Time and space forbid indulgence in detailed statistical facts, interesting and profitable as that might be. We shall strive, therefore, to give you a general picture and let the Statistician and Treasurer fill in the details.

The Ministry

Our ministers of today live in a vastly different world to what the ministers did a half-century ago. In a single generation the world has moved from the horse and buggy stage to a streamlined era. And the influence of this change is to be noted in the Church and in the work of the Pastor. For instance it can be seen in the more modern trends of church architecture. It can be noted in the fact that the center pulpit in many places is giving way to the divided chancel. Many churches which gave little thought and consideration to more formal types of worship in the past, today have beautiful orders of worship with their processionals, entroits, responses, etc. Translations of the Bible in modern speech are coming to be very much in evidence. Church Secretaries and mimeograph machines are to be found in an increasing number of church offices. Directors of Christian Education, Ministers of Music, Leaders of Youth and Children's Work are being employed in ever greater numbers.

It is not surprising that the modern minister is called upon for more things, that he attends more meetings, raises more money, plans and supervises a bigger program than the minister of 50 years ago ever dreamed of doing. If John Wesley and Francis Asbury could tour one of our Conferences today and see what we are doing, they probably would not recognize us; and yet, we believe they would approve what we are doing. The Church and the Ministry of this present day are gearing their program to the tempo and the needs of modern life.

For the most part, our ministers have served faithfully and well during the past year. The records will reveal many fine accomplishments. And we all know, of course, that every faithful Pastor renders many services and does a great amount of good that is never revealed in the statistical tables.

The general health of our ministers has been very good this year, although there have been a few instances of serious illness. We are happy to report that most of these have now fully recovered and only one will be forced to retire for health reasons. Five men have reached the retirement age and will ask for that relationship during this Conference. We regret to see these men step aside from the active ranks but wish them many years for their well-earned rest.

Four ministers, two ministers' wives and one widow of a minister have passed to their eternal reward during the year. Appropriate Memorial Services were held for them in this morning's session of the Conference.

Chaplains

During the war, a number of our men went out from our Conference to serve the nation as Chaplains in its Armed Forces. Some have returned to the regular pastorate and are now serving within the Conference again. A few have transferred to other Conferences, while others remain in the Service, serving in hospitals or on special assignments overseas. We honor these men for their noble service. We rejoice in the return of those who have come back and will welcome the others at such time as they may be able to return. And for all of them we lift a prayer for God's guidance and continued blessing.

Enlistment and Training

There is an urgent need for new recruits within the ranks of the ministry. For a number of years, men have been retiring and dying at a much faster rate than young men have been entering the ministry. The cumulative effect is a desperate shortage of ministers today. This year there were 243 pastoral charges in the Southern Illinois Conference. Only 135 of these were served by regular members of the Conference: 6 were served by men on trial; and 108 were served by Supply Pastors. We honor these men who have stepped in to aid in this emergency; we recognize that there will always be a place and a need for some Accepted Supply Pastors; but we also know that this is not the way to build a strong Conference and a strong leadership for the Church.

The situation calls for a continued and vigorous program of ministerial enlistment. We commend the achievements along this line in our Summer Institutes and in the Stewardship Program this year. We recommend that this type of work be continued in whatever channels the opportunity comes and that the "follow-up program" for recruitment, recently inaugurated, be carried out faithfully and intelligently. We wish to commend to our Board of Ministerial Training for the excellent service they are rendering in the training of our young ministers, and for the help and inspiration they bring to our graduate preachers. We wish to express our high appreciation for the College of Christian Life held for the first time this year at Urbana. We urge our Pastors to take full advantage of all these opportunities for growth

We note with considerable satisfaction the increasing number of our young men who are going away for advanced training and preparation in our Seminaries. And yet, at the same time, we note with alarm the large number of these who do not return to serve in our own Conference. Several factors seem to contribute to this situation:

 $1. \$ Until within recent years, young men have not been encouraged too much to return to their own Conference.

2. The salary level of our Conference has been below that of many other Conferences where trained men have been sought after.

3. Higher pension ratings in other Conferences have proved to be an added incentive to young men to go elsewhere, giving them a greater sense of security for the future.

 And, in recent years, Conferences that meet in the Spring have had a decided advantage over those meeting in the Fall in securing Seminary graduates.

It is our belief that our Conference should do several things to help remedy this situation:

1. We should encourage our young men, who plan to enter the ministry, to get all the training they possibly can. God needs our best and the responsibilities of this age demand it more and more. But we should also encourage these young men to return and give the Church within the bounds of their own Conference the benefit of their training and their ability.

2. The Conference needs to do something about the establishment of a minimum salary level. While salaries generally have increased and some very substantially, yet the fact remains that the ministers in some charges still receive pitifully low salaries at a time when the cost of living is tremendously high. This ought not to be the case.

3. The Conference should begin to strengthen its pension system very substantially. This is already over-due.

4. Finally, it is our conviction that a Spring Conference would be of great advantage in meeting this problem of a shortage of ministers.

Our Parsonage Homes

The Parsonage Home is of special importance in the modern church program. Around it centers many church activities and interests, especially in the smaller communities where parish houses and social rooms are not available. The modern pastor and wife not only keep the home-fires burning for their own children but also for the children of God who come for business meetings, social gatherings, counsel and guidance. These parsonage homes are not only castles where queens and their children dwell safely but where others seek solace and security in their spiritual life. Into some of our parsonage homes, as in other homes, babies have been born this year; other children have been growing up; sickness has come, sometimes severe, and even death. But still these homes have functioned for the furtherance of the Kingdom of God. We sometimes wonder what the Church and the people would do if this influence was removed from their communities.

We are greatly concerned for the comfort and physical well-being of our parsonages families. We believe that every church should make its parsonages modern and as convenient as possible, that it should be kept in a good state of repair, decorated and made as attractive and comfortable as any of the better homes in the community. We are glad to report that the majority of our churches do this, although some parsonages are desperately in need of attention. A lot of churches are now providing kitchen ranges for the kitchen floor, window shades, and the heating system. This should by all means become a standard practice. We call this to the attention of our layme and particularly Parsonage Committees.

Three churches have purchased new parsonages this year, two have built new ones, and at least one more is preparing to build a new parsonage. Many have reported parsonage improvements during the year.

The Lay Program

Methodism has always been vibrant with spiritual strength and has moved with dynamic power and irresistible force in her passion for extending the Kingdom of Christ. This probably was never more true than it is today and one vitally interested, assuming an ever greater responsibility, and participating more and more in its work. This is as it should be. The Laymen's Program in our Conference moves forward from year to year with increased importance. Our Lay Leader and his Associates in the Districts and Sub-district Groups have given splendid leadership.

Laymen's Day was observed in most of the churches, with the laymen taking charge of the services on that Sunday. Many of our men's groups are conducting the Sunday evening service once a month. Most of the organized men's groups have regular meetings once a month for fellowship and study or a special program of one kind or another. A number of local groups have reported special projects for the year, either in the interest of the local church or some Conference enterprise; frequently both. Quite a few of our Sub-district Groups have regular Men's meetings once in a quarter. The annual Men's Rally was held in each District again this year and the laymen have taken an active part in the Stewardship Program.

The leadership and inspiration at the Conference and District levels must continue until it reaches into every local church. There are still many churches where the men have not been sufficiently stirred and challenged to produce any special activity on their part. And as long as this is true, the Church can not do its best work and reach as many people in those communities as it should.

Woman's Society of Christian Service

Since the day when the three Marys stood by the cross on which the Son of God was crucified, women, for the most part, have been faithful and devoted to the Cause of Christ. It is not surprising, therefore, that the women of Southern Illinois carry on their work with such devotion and loyalty.

The Conference and District Officers have promoted their work in a vigorous manner and we think the reports of the local societies will reveal some very fine achievements. The women have also taken a very active part in the Stewardship Program. In many of the smaller churches, the women's organizations supplement the pastor's salary and take care of most of the improvements. We are glad to note the number of societies that are giving missionary training and guidance to the children and youth. We call upon others to remember that this is also a part of your responsibility. And, while the majority of our churches do have organized Women's Societies, we must not forget that there are still quite a few that do not have and there are many others which might well bring their business and professional women together in Wesleyan Service Guilds. There is still work to be done.

Youth Work

The Methodist Movement has always been a youth movement. From its beginning at Oxford, where a small group of young men so conducted themselves that they were dubbed the "Holy Club" and later the "Methodists," through the famous Christmas Conference in Baltimore, when 2/3 of the preachers who came to meet Thomas Coke were under 30 years of age, through the early years of the missionary movement, to the present day, Methodism has been youth-minded. A movement that has had the long, long thoughts of youths so close to its heart could not help being forwardlooking, vigorous, and prophetic.

We are proud of our young people in Southern Illinois, and the work they are doing. The Conference-wide Rallies have been productive of much inspiration and a fine sense of unity and fellowship among the youth of the Conference. The District Conventions have brought about some challenging plans and goals for the coming year. Regular youth meetings are held in most of the sub-district groups with splendid interest and attendance. A large enrollment was reported in the Mid-winter Institutes. Our Summer Institutes were well attended and did an excellent piece of work. We are all conscious of the problems that center in such large Institutes and we look forward to additional Institutes in other parts of the Conference.

The youth work in many of our local churches has been of an exceptionally fine nature. Many of these groups carry on extensive programs with good interest and good results. And yet, we fear, that in too many instances the local church is not challenging and not reaching the youth of the community and even of our own Methodist homes as well as they should. We believe the greatest need and the place for greatest emphasis in our youth program is in the local church.

Conference Institutions

The Southern Illinois Conference has five institutions of which we are justly proud and through which we are rendering a most valuable Christian service. Since detailed reports will be made by each of these, we simply mention them here in general terms.

The Orphans' and Children's Home at Mt. Vernon continues to serve unfortunate children in a splendid way, giving them a home and Christian care. The home is in the best condition it has been in for many years, and Rev. Sowers and his staff are doing a marvelous piece of work.

The Old Folks' Home at Lawrenceville continues its ministry in a very fine way, providing a home and a wonderful Christian environment for a large family of people in the evening time of life. Brother Young is untiring in his labors for the home and faithful in his management of its affairs. He has a good staff.

Holden Hospital at Carbondale is rendering a great healing ministry under the supervision of Miss Pangburn. Dr. Hall has done a splendid piece of work in eliminating the debt on that institution. After ten years of service, Miss Graves resigned as Superintendent of Alton Memorial Hospital and Mr. Harry F. Tubergen came as the new Superintendent in April. He has made an outstanding beginning as the administrator of this magnificent hospital.

All these institutions represent the Church and Methodism in particular. The way they represent us depends largely on the interest we take in them and the support we give them. Let us stand by them in a loyal way.

Then, we should like to speak a little more at length of McKendree College. The Methodist concern for education is traditional. "Give Youth a Chance!" is a favorite Methodist idea, if not a slogan. John Wesley himself established Kingswood School. Before the Conference adjourned at Lovely Lane Chapel in 1784, it had voted to found a Christian college, and the young preachers who were getting only \$\$4 a year had taken up a collection to start the first building. Cokesbury College later burned to the ground, as did its successor, but Asbury and those other early leaders were not defeated.

Many Methodist academies and colleges were founded during the first part of the 19th century and today Methodism has 139 colleges and universities, 10 graduate schools of theology, 3 training schools, and a number of junior colleges and secondary schools. Our own McKendree was one of those schools founded back there more than a century ago and through all these years she has made a rich contribution to the Church, the nation, and the world. But today she faces perhaps the greatest challenge of her entire history.

Dr. Bracy's report will show a large increase in enrollment the past year and the prospects are favorable for an even larger enrollment next year. The financial situation is steadily improving. The Faculty is gradually being strengthened. Many needed repairs and improvements are under way. However, to really meet the challenge of this new day, we need to become fully accredited; we need at least two new buildings; we need to enlarge our Faculty and strengthen the work in several places. Consequenuy, the Campaign for Accreditation, Buildings and Endowment has been launched. 'The Conference has endorsed this program and voted to give its full cooperation. This will be one of our major tasks in this coming year. In order to succeed in this, we feel that we as ministers and laymen of Southern Illinois need to recapture something of the spirit of Wesley, and of Asbury, and others who raised up such institutions in the beginning. We must convince ourselves, first of all, of the great need for Christian Higher Education, and then go out to convince others. We need to remind ourselves that the hope of the Church and of Democracy and of civilization rests largely in these Christian schools. We must depend upon them to train our ministers, our missionaries, and other workers in the church. From them must go a great host of teachers into our public school systems, imbued with Christian ideals. From these centers must go young men of Christian integrity, young men dominated by Christian ideals and principles who will become civic leaders in local communities, officials in the nation, and statesmen in world affairs. From these schools must go Christian young people who will set up Christian homes throughout the nation. It was no idle statement when Bishop Lewis one time said, "We may as well give up our churches as to give up our Christian colleges."

We call upon our people to pray for this institution and this campaign, to inform themselves of the needs and the possibilities of McKendree, and then get behind the President, and the Board, and the Faculty, and help make this great effort a glorious success. The day of idle talk is over; the time of criticism is past; the hour for consecrated action is upon us. Let us move forward, under God, with courage and with confidence.

Other Phases of the Work

The general program of Christian Education, under the leadership of our Executive Secretary, has made notable progress this year. Dr. Harris, with the cooperation of the Board of Education, is strengthening the total work of Christian training and looking to the future with vision and courage. In our judgment, one of the greatest needs of the educational program in the local church is the right kind of officers and teachers, men and women of unquestioned Christian character and at the same time, capable and prepared for their responsibility in the church. We also need a greater spirit of cooperation on the part of parents.

Our Conference Board of Evangelism and its Chairman continue to give splendid leadership in the field of evangelism. Reports indicate that 2444 people were received into the church this year on confession of faith, and 2031 were received by transfer. Quite a bit of needed survey work has been done in certain communities and one new field has been opened up through the assistance of our Missionary-evangelist. We have great need for funds within the Conference to aid in the development of these new projects.

Giving to World Service and Conference Benevolences has increased \$14,011 this year over last year, although the division is a little different this year. Our churches were asked at the beginning of the year to accept a 10% increase in their goal and most of them did. There is still need for a great deal of cultivation and work to be done at this point, as we shall point out a bit later.

Pastors' salaries have been increased for next year in a half to twothirds of the Charges. Many of our churches are doing remarkably well in their ministerial support now but there are others which are still pitifully low, and the sad feature is that some of these are not the least bit concerned about the matter. Extensive property improvements have been made during the year. Three new churches have either been completed or are in the process of being constructed. Additional units have been added to several and at least six new organs have been installed during the year. Notable progress has been made by a few of our churches that still were carrying large debts, in fact two of these are now entirely out of debt. We rejoice in all this progress and improvement.

The East St. Louis District is in the process of erecting a lovely new District Parsonage in Lebanon. It is well planned and ideally situated and we think every church will be very proud of this residence when completed. We dare to hope that other Districts in the Conference will follow our example.

The Third Year of the Crusade

The response to the challenge of The Crusade for Christ leads us to believe that Methodism is still taking her Kingdom responsibilities seriously. Following unification, fear was expressed in some quarters lest we as Methodists settle back, content to boast of our great numbers and our glorious history, and lose the passion and the power to achieve new triumphs according to our ability. But in the first year of the Crusade our people poured over \$27,000,000 into the treasury of the Church to help rebuild and rehabilitate the war-torn world and to carry on the work of the Church's planning; this in addition to our regular giving. Last year, through the Program of Evangelism, over a million persons were won to Christ and the Church, and over 600 new preaching places were opened. This year the Program of Christian Stewardship has been carried forward with equal vigor and interest on the part of ministers and laymen alike.

We are glad to know that our Conference has had its part in this Crusade for Christ and made its contribution to the total effort. The results may not be all that many of us would have liked but we have done well and God only knows the total good that has come from this great effort.

The final results on this year's Stewardship Program will not be known until the end of the calendar year but preliminary reports reveal real progress. Just after Easter, we had 4,218 people recorded as tithers, 5,113 recorded as proportionate givers in other amounts, 5,522 people had dedicated a definite portion of their time and talent to Christian service, and 345 youth had given themselves for full-time Christian service.

During this year a rather comprehensive study has been made of the giving to the current expenses budgets and to the missionary and benevolent budgets of all the churches in every District. Some rather startling facts have been discovered. On an average, not more than 2/3 of the membership of our churches support the local budget regularly and a lot of these give no ways near their ability to give. Less than 50% of our membership give to World Service and Conference Benevolences regularly and the majority of these do not give in proportion to their ability. That is startling when you stop to think about it.

That 30 to 35% of the members of our churches who are not supporting the local budget regularly and that 50% or more who are not contributing to the missionary program of the church is too great a challenge for us to ignore. We must do something about it and we are glad to report something is being done about it.

In the first place, we think the Church itself is partly to blame for this situation. Too many churches have no definite, business-like, financial program. They set up no budget; they never inform their membership and constituency of the financial needs and program of the church; they never make an every-member canvass to lay these plans before the people individually and to challenge them with their own personal responsibility. We have business men in some of our churches who would never tolerate such poor practices in their own business but who seem little concerned about the financial program of their church. We have some Finance Committees who seem to think their efficiency is to be determined by the way they hold down the budget rather than by their vision of what the Church might do for the salvation and enrichment of the world and their ability to find the ways and means for getting it done. We need men and women on our Official Boards and on our Finance Committees who have a deep, earnest interest in the Kingdom of Christ, who have vision and faith and a sense of moral daring.

These facts need to be called to the attention of our people and are being asked to set up budgets, if they have not been doing that; establish sound business-like procedures; inform their people of their program; make an every-member canvass; and get the church on a good sound "Business In Our Religion". This has been accepted as a part of the Stewardship Program and reports are beginning to come in which indicate fine progress is being made. We call upon our Pastors and let none of us lose sight of the fact that this whole effort must be undergirded with a high sense of Christian Stewardship if we are to succeed in the fullest sense of the word.

The Crusade Must Continue

Stewardship cultivation must continue. It is essential to Christian living and to the extension of the Kingdom of Christ. As one committee reported to the District Conference, "Christian Stewardship is the way to world redemption from war, racial animosities, the liquor evil, gambling, labor and industrial strife, the menace of atheistic totalitarianism, crime, broken homes, immorality, poverty, ignorance, fear and hunger, etc." We must be deeply in earnest about it.

Evangelism must continue to be a passion within the heart-life of the Church. As we look out upon the sin and waywardness of humanity, we should pray for mankind as though everything depended upon God. Then, we should arise from our knees and go out and work, week after week and month after month, as though everything depended upon us. Evangelism is a "MUST" in the program of every real church.

Finally, we must increase our Church School enrollment and attendance during this coming year. This will be the culminating phase of the Crusade for Christ. The fact that over 28,000,000 people under 25 years of age in the United States are not enrolled in any church school gives startling evidence that we need to do something about this matter. Goals have been set and plans will be inaugurated in the near future and we believe the people of Southern Illinois will give themselves to this program in the same spirit they have the other phases of the Crusade. We call upon Pastors, local Boards of Education, Church School officers and teachers, sponsors and leaders of children's and youth work, parents and others, to rally to this great cause and let us really Crusade for Christ in this new conference year. The Crusade Must Continue!

Miscellaneous

We wish to just mention two or three other matters, not lightly but only briefly. We are glad to know that the Christian Advocate is going into so many Methodist homes. We feel every Methodist ought to subscribe for his official church paper and then read it. This is needful if we are to be informed churchmen and good servants of the Lord Jesus Christ. We commend Dr. Roy L. Smith for the excellent paper he continues to produce for us.

We rejoice in the wide use of The Upper Room among our people.

Never was there a time when we as individuals and as families needed to take time for prayer and meditation and the devotional reading of God's Word more than we do today. We earnestly urge our people to maintain family altars and to participate in the mid-week services at the church for prayer and the study of the Scriptures.

We are grateful for the use that is being made of the Radio by the Church within our Conference. We feel, however, that the Radio offers us a far greater challenge than we are meeting and we recommend some earnest thought and study on this matter.

We are glad to know that new interest and attention is being centered upon the church in the rural areas. We recognize the need and the problem that exists there. We are also aware that the solution is not an easy one, particularly in view of some of the things we mentioned in our discussion on the Ministry. But we pledge our best effort in helping the Church and the Conference to serve mankind most effectively whether it be in the country, the small town or the larger city. We must adjust our programs and direct our ministry in every community to the needs of the people in that particular place.

Change In Superintendents

Two members of the Cabinet will retire from their office at this Conference because their term has expired. Therefore, the other two Superintendents wish to express their appreciation for the privilege of working with these men this year. They have shown a fine brotherly spirit, and a most cooperative and helpful attitude in our common problems and responsibilities. We also wish to express our appreciation for the two men who have been named as their successors and to welcome them to their new places of leadership in our Conference. May the Lord bless all of us and help us to be a blessing.

In Conclusion

In conclusion, may we say that this is a great day for the Church of Jesus Christ. She occupies a peculiar position and an almost unparalleled opportunity. Think of what significance it is that when the scientists released atomic energy, they almost immediately became frightened at what they had done; and they have turned to the leaders of the Church for salvation. They know that only when men are redeemed are they safe with this amazing power.

It is our mission to proclaim the message of salvation, not only for the individual person, but for society. It is our business to help Christ make his Kingdom real in all of life. This will not be easy for secularism is arrayed against the Christian effort. People and nations depend upon the power of force rather than the power of the Spirit. Class prejudice, racial hatred, and international fear and misunderstanding are abroad. The influence of the liquor traffic and its attendant evils are widespread. We face a disintegration of American home-life, such as was never known, because of hasty marriages, gross infidelity, adult and child delinquency, and easy divorce laws. We can not ignore the fact that in our academic life, religion is all too often tolerated as an "extra." Gambling has reached such staggering proportions, we are told, that one hundred times as much money is spent on gambling in America as we Christians spend in evangelizing the world. It is not an easy day but it is a most challenging day.

We of the Methodist Church have a vast organization and mighty potential forces to lay at the feet of our Lord. Perhaps the youngest of the major denominations, Methodism has outstripped most of the others and stands today as the largest Protestant group in America. Her missionary program embraces the whole world and her activities in this field exceed that of any other church. No church excels her in the realm of education. Her colleges and universities outnumber those of other denominations and stand among the highest in accreditment and endowment. Her Publishing House is the largest in the world. There are more than 41,000 Methodist churches scattered over the nation and some of these will compare with the most beautiful in the land. God grant that we may keep the vision, that we may be true to the ideals and the principles that have helped to make our Church what it is today. God help us never to settle down to running an institution but keep us a living, growing fellowship.

Let it be said that we rejoice in the ecumenical fellowship that is growing today. We are glad to know that various churches are learning, more and more, to work together in a spirit that transcends our differences. In this fact lies a greater hope for all mankind.

We believe in the Church. We know that it is not a man-made institution but that it is a living fellowship in Christ and can only be a creative power and redemptive agency in and through His followers. If the Church is to meet the challenge of this day, we, her ministers and her laity must walk close to God and must give priority to the things of the Spirit.

Let us face the new year with great faith, high hope, and a deep sense of consecration.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING

The 27th Annual Session of the Pastors' School was held on the Campus of McKendree College June 16-26, 1947, with 40 undergraduate pastors, 68 ordained pastors and 12 faculty members present.

The spirit of fellowship experienced, the type of class work carried on was of exceptional high order.

The new intensive class work of the first week permitting the undergraduates to attend all special lectures of the Graduate classes was appreciated and very profitable.

Dr. Rockwell C. Smith, professor Rural Sociology and the Rural Ministry from Garrett Biblical Institute led the school into new appreciation of the work of the ministry and presented practical helpful facts concerning our task.

Dr. Henry M. Johnson of Chandler School of Theology, Emory University presented the work of Religious Education and The problems of Pastoral psychology to appreciative audiences.

Dr. Dawson C. Bryan from Houston, Texas, brought to the school by the Board of Evangelism, led in the work of this great field in a profitable way and preached each evening of the second week to appreciative audiences.

The College, led by its genial and efficient President, Dr. Carl Bracy, contributed in no small way to this most successful school.

The work of the faculty in conducting open forum on the great subject of Methodism at the evening services of the first week, and the devotional addresses were most interesting.

The support of the Commission on World Service in making possible the week of graduate lecturers was greatly appreciated.

Statement To Undergraduates And Accepted Supplies

1. It is imperative that you secure "The Student's Handbook" from the Methodist Publishing House. You cannot prepare your written work without this.

2. Traveling Preachers, Local Preachers, seeking ordination, and Accepted Supplies, will all pursue the regular Course of Study. Pay no attention to the Alternative Course.

3. All Undergraduates and all Accepted Supplies, not in College or Seminary, are required to attend Summer School.

4. Written work in the Course for Examination must be in the hands of the instructor, by the time Summer School opens, except for the Ad-mission Year. Written work in the Admission Year and in all Collateral subjects must be in by time specified by the Board.

5. Credits received in a college, seminary, or correspondence school, approved by the University Senate of The Methodist Church, may be substituted for subjects in the Course of Study, providing the same course, or its equivalent has been covered. An official transcript of such credits must be filed with the Registrar. In any case, the student will be requir-ed to attend those classes as an auditor, at the Summer School.

6. Any man transferring into this Conference, while in the Course of Study, must bring an official statement of standing and grades from the Registrar of his former Conference and file same with the Registrar of this Conference.

7. Each man coming up for Admission on Trial must file with the Registrar, a statement signed by the Registrar of the College from which he graduated, stating the date of graduation and the degree received, as proof of his graduation.

8. Candidates for Ordination must consult with the Dean and the Registrar relative to same.

Area Pastors' School

We heartily approve of the Area School held at Urbana in the month of July and urge our Pastors to plan to attend this school, which is to be continued in 1948.

THE ANNUAL REPORT BOARD OF EDUCATION Methodist Church, Southern Illinois Conference

Report Of Executive Secretary, October 1, 1946-August 1, 1947

We began our work as Executive Secretary of the Southern Illinois Conference on October 1, 1946. Although we had majored in this field of the ministry, the appointment to the office came with considerable sur-prise. We have tried to analyse the greatest need of the conference. We have been cautious in promoting the program in order that we make no serious mistakes that might jeopardize the work in the future. Our sur-vey of the field has convinced us that the most imperative need is in the area of Leadership Education. We suffer from a dearth of both lay and clerical leadership in the field of Christian Education. Our major emphasis in the future will be to develop this leadership. We cannot make much progress in Christian Education unless we develop a greater number of trained leaders.

The response to our efforts have been exceedingly fine. The pastors have opened their pulpits and cooperated splendially in promoting the work of Christian Education. We have not been able to get to all the churches that have asked us to come. We have tried to group our meetings and workers conferences so as to avoid as much duplication in travel as possible. We hope to reach a greater number of churches next year.

McKendree College has been very generous to provide space for our office, into which we have just moved. We have been adding equipment to the office so that we can be of greater service to the Conference.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Board of Education and the District Superintendents for their splendid spirit of cooperation in this field of work. The success or failure of the work of Christian Education in the conference rests first with the pastor, then the District Superintendents, we try to furnish the technique for the promotion of the work and do all that we can of the actual work.

Our time is fully occupied at this work, often fourteen and sixteen hours a day and seven days a week. We have not taken the time for a vacation this year. When we see how white the fields are for harvest we are challenged to every ounce of energy we have. We love God, we love the work, and we love people. Our greatest desire is to see more and better results in this very important field of the ministry. We are prayerful for your continued cooperation and your prayers in our behalf.

The Rally Day Offering is one of our main sources of income. Last year nearly every church in the Conference contributed to the Rally Day Fund. The Discipline requires that an offering for Rally Day be taken in each church. Last year the Annual Conference voted to set as a minimum goal a sum equal to ten cents per enrolled member in each church school. This is the recommendation of the Board of Education to the Annual Conference again this year.

We feel that the Board should pay its way and that we be of the greatest service to the Conference we can. Let every church do its utmost in the matter of financing the program of Christian Education and perhaps in the near future we can employ a full time Youth Worker.

VISITORS TO THEOLOGICAL SCHOOLS

Garrett

Dr. Hubert Hurley, a graduate of Garrett has visited the school during the last year and reported a good year at the Seminary. He reported more young men there in preparation for the ministry than ever before. This is good news when we are facing such a shortage of trained men for the ministry. The Board of Education and School of Ministerial Training urges visits to all our men in seminary and to encourage them to return to Southern Illinois Conference upon their completion of their work.

Iliff

Dr. C. C. Bracy, President of McKendree College, visited Iliff this past year and gave a splendid report of what is going on there. We encourage the attendance of our young men who are graduating from college to attend one of our Theological Schools.

Wesley Fundation At Urbana

It is encouraging to see the splendid work that is being done by this institution on the campus at the University of Illinois. We have a very fine plant there and Dr. Paul Burt is furnishing splendid leadership for our Methodist Young People who attend the University. This is truly "A home away from home," for multitudes of young people who are away from home

for the first time. Through the counselling of Dr. Burt and his associates, they have been able to help young people who were homesick and discouraged to remain in school. Gospel teams and Friendshap groups go out from the Wesley Foundation to nearby churches to hold religious services in needy places. Credit Bible courses are given to large numbers of students. Fellowship is one of the majors of Wesley Foundation. Of the 18,000 students enrolled in the University 3000 have expressed a Methodist preference. This challenges us to greater effort to help develop these potential leaders into efficient churchmen. The erection of a new sanctuary seems to be imperative to providing adequate worship facilities for the students, faculty members and membership of Trinity Church.

Student Christian Foundation At Carbondale

The Student Christian Foundation at Carbondale is an Interdenominational organization whose purpose is: "The Student Christian Foundation of Southern Illinois Normal University consists of groups of students and faculty of various races and creeds united by a common loyalty to Jesus Christ. In the fellowship of the Christian Church they seek to understand the will of God through worship, study, and action, and strive to realize it both in personal living and in working together toward a new society." The Foundation cooperates with the constituent denominations in their missionary and student programs. It sends out deputation teams to nearby churches to assist in religious and youth programs. It helps to minister to the lives of all on the campus who avail themselves of its services. One of the richest contributions to the total student life of the campus was Religious Emphasis Week. Outstanding religious leaders of several denominations assisted in this program. Credit courses are also taught in the Foundation. It also has furnished wholesome social and recreational opportunities for the students of the campus. We deplore the lack of attendance by a larger number of students.

Leadership Education

One of the imperative needs of the Conference is more and better lay leaders. The Board of Education is attempting to solve this need by the development of more trained leaders. This past year we have gained eight newly accredited deans, ten newly accredited instructors in addition to seventeen others who have been previously accredited. Our ambition is to increase our accredited instructors to the point where we can set up an Accredited Leadership School in every Sub-District of the Conference and staff it with our own accredited teachers. There have been several hundred Credit or Course Cards issued to those who have attended classes and schools where accredited teachers have taught.

Our most successful enterprise this year was our Conference Leadership School sponsored jointly by the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Board of Education. We had 120 enrolled in classes, and 114 course cards were issued, that means that some took more than one credit course. There were eighty individual students and faculty members enrolled in the school.

There were a number of Epworth Training Enterprises, some of them were accredited and some were not. There were well over 1000 in these enterprises. Then some of the Local Churches carried out non-credit enterprises that will enrich the leadership work in the local church.

Daily Vacation Bible Schools

During the month of May there were eight Daily Vacation Bible School Coaching Conferences held. 275 were enrolled in these conferences. These meetings were not supported as they should have been, but those who attended testified to the splendid help they received. Next year we are planning a similar series of meetings. To the present time 110 schools have reported an enrollment of 7100 pupils. More complete reports will be had at conference time. This is becoming a very valuable phase of our Christian Education Program, hundreds of children and youth make decisions for Christ and are converted in these schools.

Methodist Youth Fellowship Institutes

The Eldorado Institute was held July 7-12. There was a total of 1250 enrolled including faculty and sponsors. There were 71 conversions, and 79 full time life service decisions. H. M. Cady was elected as Dean for next year.

The McKendree Institute was held August 11-16. There was a total of 625 enrolled including faculty and sponsors. There were 102 conversions, 28 reclamations, and 23 full time life work decisions. Dale Harmon was elected dean of McKendree for next year.

The Youth Division Council is working toward a closer coordination of the work of our Institutes. We are planning for an Intermediate Camp for next year, this will help to reduce the number of intermediates in our Institutes. There is the possibility of the organization of another Institute within the bounds of the Olney District to save travel distance and the overcrowding of the present institutes.

Young Adult Institute

On June 27-28-29 a Young Adult Institute was held at McKendree College. Although the attendance was not large we accomplished some real progress in our Conference Young Adult Work. Dr. Leo Rippy of the Adult Division at Nashville was present and rendered valuable assistance. Paul Stevens has been elected as Director of Young Adult Work within the Adult Division and Miss Gladys Tedley of Carbondale was elected Young Adult President of the Conference. Plans are going forward for the complete organization of this work in the conference. It is a very fruitful and potent field.

College Of Christian Life

One of the most significant meetings of the year was the College of Christian Life held at Urbana, July 21-25. Fifty-five of our ministers attended this enterprise. It was a period of fellowship, inspiration and instruction. Bishop J. Ralph Magee was present throughout and his splendid leadership and fellowship was an inspiration to all. More was accomplished to bring together in the spirit of unity of the three conferences that compose the Chicago Area in one week than has been accomplished in the past quarter of a century. The School was both refreshing and a refresher to those who attended. Next year we expect many more from this conference

Pastors' School

Under the genial leadership of Dean Todd and Registrar Schwarzlose we had one of the best Pastors' Schools this year that we have had for several years. The first week was devoted intensively to class work with the undergraduates in the course of study, the second week was devoted to lectures by outstanding leaders and forum and discussion periods to formally review what was done in the lecture hours. This program proved very successful.

Crusade For Christ

This, the last year of this quadrennium, and the Crusade for Christ is to be devoted to an emphasis upon Church School Enrollment and Attendance. Our goal is two million new members in our Church Schools and the enlistment of 220,000 new workers and leaders in the Church School. This means an approximate gain of one-third over our present enrollment. We arc already making plans for reaching our goal in Southern Illinois. We have sent out survey cards to get the goal for our conference by districts. We have set the week of September 22-28 as Christian Education Week, and September 28 as Rally Day. This is to be followed up by a month of intensive visitation in the homes of the Church School members and constituents to enroll every available person in our Church School. Each Division of the Church School is to put forth a strenuous effort to realize their goal. If you want to know what your responsibility is in realizing this goal, take your present enrollment and add thirty-three and one-third per cent gain to that figure. Materials are already going out from the Crusade office to assist in this campaign. Avail yourself of all this material. You will find it very helpful. District and sub-district meetings will be held to promote this work. Get as many of your workers to attend these meetings as you can. We will succeed here in Southern Illinois.

Youth Division Report

The Youth Work under the leadership of R. J. Weiss and Paul Sims has gone forward this past year. The Annual Conference meeting was a success. The Mid-Year Rally at Centralia was also very successful. H. R. Bennett was the speaker, and constructive business was taken care of by the conference. The District Conventions were well attended although the representation was not as good as it should have been. The Institutes have been reported elsewhere in this report. The Leadership School at Clear Lake, Iowa, was attended by 13 youth and adult leaders. The budget of this division has been increased to provide for better development and promotion of the Youth work.

Children's Division

The work of the Children's Division of the Conference seems to be showing increasing interest. The past three years has been a course given in Children's work in the Conference Leadership School at McKendree College. Last November the director of Children's work attended the meeting of the National Methodist Christian Education Conference at Grand Rapids, Mich. This was a very fine and helpful meeting. In January the Executive Secretary had a four day itinerary in the Conference, one day in each district, with Miss Emma Jane Kramer of the General Board of Education of Nashville, Tenn., as a special Children's Worker. She was very helpful and the meetings were well attended. Many expressed a desire to have similar meetings next year. The last of April and the first of May we held eight district meetings in the interest of the Daily Vacation Bible School work. Mrs. Lacquement and Mrs. Webster of our own Conference assisted in the Children's work in these conferences. As a result, over 110 D. V. B. S. have been reported and 7100 pupils reported in those schools.

Adult Division

The most significant enterprise within the Adult Division this year was the launching of the Young Adult Conference meeting and organization. This is a very fruitful and potent group within the church and needs to be cultivated and encouraged for the church of the next generation is within this group. Plans are going forward for the complete organization of this group throughout the conference. It is the hope of this division that there be more adults enlisted in the Church School program. It is a fruitful field for the securing of an increase in enrollment.

McKendree College

This has been one of the most successful years for McKendree College during the past decade. The summary of attendance reveals we had 353 unrepeated in our enrollment in all departments and classes of the college. The spirit on the campus has been very good. There is a fine Christian atmosphere about the college. Many of our students have been G. Ls and are a very fine class of fellows. We have been taxed to the limit to take care of the men who have come. We have been somewhat handicapped for a lack of instructors, but this problem is clearing up. The prospects for this coming year are brighter than ever. We are limited by facilities to house men at the present time. More women are also applying this year. Many new improvements are being made about the campus and in the buildings. New furnishings are being placed in both of the resident halls. The dining room and library and chapel are being decorated and lighting fixtures modernized. New courses and instructors are being added. This year we will extend our one million dollar campaign for new buildings and improvements. We are making rapid progress toward full accreditation. We solicit the full support in making McKendree College what it should become and by your help will speedily become. Dr. Bracy has proved himself to be a very capable and competent president and leader in the conference. He is building goodwill for McKendree wherever he goes. Let us pray for him and the college that they may be a tremendous factor in Southern Illinois.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF MCKENDREE COLLEGE TO THE SOUTHERN ILLINOIS CONFERENCE

In Session At Granite City, Illinois

Bishop Magee and Members of the Southern Conference:

It is not possible in this brief report to give you in detail all the things that have been happening at McKendree. I shall endeavor to lift out those highlights of the past year for your serious consideration as I report on the progress of your College, and our plans for the days ahead.

Enrollment

The year 1946-47 saw a remarkable increase in college enrollments across the nation. McKendree shared in that increase. The enrollment for the year 1945-46 was 184 full-time students. The 1946-47 enrollment as summarized in our current catalog is as follows:

leaves the actual statistical enrollment for the school year 1946-47 as 353. Fifty-two percent of this number were veterans, and slightly in excess of one-half of these students were Methodists. Approximately one-tenth of our student body were engaged in or looking toward full-time Christian Service.

The prospects for the enrollment for the coming year point to an even larger number of students. The people of Lebanon are responding in a fine way to our appeal for housing for students. I expect our enrollment to increase by at least fifty over last year. This will depend upon the housing facilities that are made available in Lebanon and the number of persons planning to commute.

Faculty

The following new faculty members have been added to the staff during the summer months and will assume their new responsibilities with the opening of school.

Lewis B. Van Winkle, Dean-Registrar, is to succeed Dr. C. J. Stowell, who is being retained on the faculty as head of the Mathematics Department and Veterans' Counsellor. Dean Van Winkle is a member of the Illinois Conference, has his A. B. from Illinois Wesleyan University, a B. D. from Garertt Biblical Institute, and an M. A. from Northwestern University in Counselling and Guidance. He served pastorates in the Illinois Conference, and was Chaplain in World War II. He was Dean of Martin Junior College in Pulaski, Tennessee. He has done further graduate study at Vanderbilt University. Dean Van Winkle will fill a most important administrative position on the Campus and will have much to do with the direction of Mckendree's curriculum and guidance program in the days that are ahead.

Chester Bagg of Webster Groves, Missouri, is to head the Voice Department for the coming year. Mr. Bagg has his Bachelor of Music from De-Paux and his Master of Music Degree from Northwestern University. He has outstanding success in his voice and choral work, having recently directed the combined choirs of fifty-two churches for the Southern Baptist Association which recently met in St. Louis.

Miss Margaret Sapp of Centralia, Illinois, has been employed as Public School Music Supervisor. Miss Sapp has a lovely voice, comes from a Methodist family, and has a Bachelor of Music from MacMurray College, and at the end of next summer will have completed her work for the Master's degree from Chicago Musical College. She has had practical experiences in the public and high schools of Salem, Illinois.

Meredith F. Eller has been secured to replace R. P. Rice, the Head of the Department of Philosophy and Religion, who resigned to accept a position at West Virginia Wesleyan University. Mr. Eller has his A. B., S. T. B., and his Ph. D. with a major in Church History from Boston University. We are most fortunate in having a man of his scholastic background for our professor of Philosophy and Religion.

Mr. Ewing Baskette has accepted the position as Librarian. Mr. Baskette is well-trained and experienced as a Librarian. He holds the A. B. degree from Vanderbilt University, the LL. B. from Vanderbilt University, and the Bachelor's Degree in Library Science from Columbia University. Additional work was taken at George Peabody College.

Miss Elizabeth White Parks has been transferred from the field of English to teach speech and direct the public relations program of the College. She is to replace the Rev. F. C. Stelzriede as instructor in speech.

Mr. Fred Fleming of Belleville, Illinois, is to teach Biology, Mr. Fleming has both the B. S. and M. S. degrees and is well-qualified in the field of Biology. He will do much to strengthen the Science Department at the College.

Additional faculty members are needed before College opens this next week. Negotiations are under way and should be completed by September 9th.

It must be said that faculty members that are well-trained and fine Christian personalities cannot be had for the salaries that have been paid in McKendree in the days gone by. Our only hope is in raising our salary scale so as to be able to attract men and women of the caliber we want. We have made a good beginning this year.

The College purchased a large eight room house and has made it into two apartments for Faculty members. We feel quite happy that we have been able to provide these accommodations for two members of our staff and their families.

Financial Situation

McKendree's fiscal year closes May 15th. The figures given below are based on the auditor's report of that date for the past fiscal year.

Improvements

The reception rooms in the two dormitories are being renovated this week. These rooms will be completely redecorated and refurnished with attractive furniture. The Contract has been let for library repair, but is being held up at the present time because of a shortage of material. Eightyfour new library chairs have been purchased and are in the library for the opening of the fall semester.

During the past year we have purchased new equipment for our kitchen-electric dishwasher, large size potato peeler, and fifty quart electric mixer.

Before McKendree can achieve her rightful place and be all that she should, every building on the campus must be redecorated so as to make them attractive and cheerful. The Dining Hall and Chapel are next on our list. New lights for the Dining Hall, Library and additional indirect lighting for the Chapel have been ordered.

Religious Emphasis

McKendree cannot compete with the State Universities or the tax supported institutions. Our offerings must be so unique as to lift us out of this competition. The one thing above all other is that McKendree must be definitely religious—Christian in philosophy, ideals and in ethical practices.

Our speaker for the week of Religious Emphasis this year is to be Dr. James Chubb from the Board of Evangelism at Nashville, Tennessee. He is to be on our campus from October 12 to 16. We are praying that this week will set a fine spiritual tone for our school year.

New By-Laws

This last Board of Trustees meeting saw a revision of McKendree's By-Laws. Notable among the revisions was this paragraph. I quote from Article II, Section I. "These Trustees shall be elected by ballot and approved by the Southern Illinois Conference." This is a most significant step. This serves to emphasize the fact that McKendree is not only a church-related college, but that most definitely it is a Methodist College under the auspices of a Board of Trustees approved by the Southern Illinois Conference of the Methodist Church.

Radio Broadcast

In addition to the monthly broadcast over the W E B Q Methodist Hour, McKendree is to present a series of weekly programs over W J B V, Belleville, beginning this month. Mr. Paul Wnrowski, Station Manager, has agreed to secure a line from Lebanon to Belleville so that with the completion of the College studio within the year, three regular weekly broadcasts and eventually daily broadcasts can be made from the campus.

Our Goal

Our Goal is Accreditation by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. We cannot call for this examination until we have our house in order. Certain conditions must be met.

Our Scholarship Needs

Local churches, Methodist Men's Groups, W. S. C. S., and W. S. G. organizations can aid McKendree by offering scholarship aid. One church

this year is paying the ministerial tuition for two young men-\$180.00. However, this only pays one-half tuition cost, since these young men receive a ministerial scholarship of an equal amount. A layman in Southern Illinois has agreed to pay the tuition of a worthy student for the coming year. These are noble gestures on the part of such individuals.

Million Dollar Campaign

There are 80,000 Methodists in Southern Illinois. If those Methodists would become so concerned about McKendree as to give it \$10.00, our Million Dollar Campaign would be well along the way to success. We need at least \$300,000, preferably \$500,000, for a permanent endowment fund at McKendree. We need two new buildings—a Science Hall and a Gymnasium. At the present inflationary stage, it will take at least \$500,000, for these and the completion of renovation work.

Will the Methodists of Southern Illinois, who have for so long watched McKendree struggle—and who now have the opportunity of seeing McKendree really arrive—will these Methodists rally to the cause in this crucial hour in the history of the school? The answer depends on you who are here —the lay leaders and ministers of the Southern Illinois Annual Conference. You are the laison group between McKendree's possibilities and the great host of Southern Illinois Methodists. I covet your prayers for the success of this campaign. I covet your loyalty and your willingness to labor in behalf of McKendree—that all of us working together may be able to see our slogan, "A Million For McKendree," become an actuality.

In order that I may have much needed assistance in this campaign, I am, with approval of the Executive Committee, asking the Bishop to appoint the Rev. W. E. Bush as a Special Representative of McKendree College in its Million Dollar Campaign.

I proprose that the months of September 9th to February 15th be used for cultivation period in the campaign, that sub-district group meetings be held in each of the four districts dealing with various phases of the campaign; that each minister preach on some phase of Higher Christian Education and the McKendree Million Dollar Campaign on a Sunday designated by the calendar committee; that the McKendree Campaign and Canvass be made in each local church. The dates suggested for campaign are February 15th to Easter Sunday.

Conclusion

I submit this report knowing that it is a most ambitious program, but it is with one thought in mind, that we may see the day when McKendree College is a recognized Member of the North Central Association, is accepted by the University Senate of the Methodist Church,—and that it is an endowed Liberal Arts College, a college distinctly related to the Southern Illinois Conference—"Christian without apology and Methodist with pride."

AREA PROGRAM CRUSADE FOR CHRIST CHURCH SCHOOL ENROLLMENT AND ATTENDANCE

THE CHALLENGE

—To provide an effective program of Christian Education in every Church. —To increase the total enrollment in all Church Schools. —To lift the level of attendance at all sessions of the Church School. -To establish new Church Schools where needed.

-To guide persons of all ages in their Christian growth so as to result -in full commitment to Jesus Christ and His way of life. -in the achievement of a Christian philosophy of life. -in active membership in and devotion to His Church.

-in creative participation in building a Christian Society.

TWELVE POINT PROGRAM FOR INCREASING CHURCH SCHOOL ENROLLMENT AND ATTENDANCE

1. Appoint a Membership Chairman and a Committee. Center responsibility with them. Have them work with age group Superintendents. Re-port results to local church Board of Education and congregation.

2. Follow up absentees. Form a Membership Committee or have a Secretary for Absentees to follow them systematically before the next Sunday after the absence.

3. Visit Unchurched Families and Church Members not attending Church School. The week of October 5 is suggested. Urge all to attend. Probably your WSCS would gladly help in this.

4. In this visitation urge attendance at the Sunday morning Worship Service as an educational fundamental. Urge all year for adults and youth.

5. Provide adult leaders for youth. A youth counselor, and organize an active youth Council.

6. Provide new educational groups for young adults and adults when present groups do not meet the need.

7. Improve the Adult Home Department. Appoint a Superintendent for this, also choose visitors to develop the list and carry the materials to them.

8. Nursery children. Let no child in the community be forgotten if their parents are not adherents of another church.

9. Secure new leaders. Have a definite plan for discovering and enlisting these. Offer a thorough course of training for officers, teachers, other leaders.

10. Arrange other than Sunday Sessions. Such as vacation church school, parents groups, groups for children, youth, and adults. All of these should be counted as members of the Church School. Establish outpost classes in the community.

11. Hold Worker's Meetings. Pastor and Superintendent of the School meet with the local Church Board of Education and other workers at least quarterly. Let this group set goals, make plans, note progress and give recognition to departments, and classes.

12. Where the local Board of Education or Crusade Council is not organized it should be done.

Church School enrollment and attendance should be made the chief concern of the pastor and the Church School Superintendent in the last year of the Crusade. Every effort should be made to arouse the interest of the congregation, to enroll all new church members in the Church School, to maintain a good teaching and worship program for every session; to make good use of available space and equipment and plan to improve it.

REPORT OF THE MYF OF THE SOUTHERN ILLINOIS CONFERENCE

R. J. Weiss, Conference Youth Counselor

The Methodist Youth Fellowship's of our Conference have enjoyed a wonderful year in their Christian quests, and have given an unusually fine expression of Christian Stewardship.

In the Booth Festivals this year the Youth of our Conference gathered together 19,495.60 dollars worth of supplies for our Conference Institutions. The cash contributed by our youth in the Booth Festivals was \$11,825.41. This is a very substantial increase over last year. We hope for even a greater contribution this year.

The New Year's Watch night program of the Methodist Youth Fellowship was celebrated in a large number of the churches. With the youth this program is growing in importance.

The Mid-Year Institutes were both inspirational and well attended. With a very few exceptions every sub-district conducted a Mid-Year Institute. The Mid-Year Youth Rally held at Centralia First Church was attended by more than 800 young people of our Conference. It was the most successful attempt of a Mid-Year Meeting for our youth. Rev. H. R. Bennett, Pastor of the Niedringhaus Memorial Methodist Church, gave two very inspirational addresses. Each Conference Youth Officer shared effectively in the rally.

Our District Rallies were well attended. The programs were both challenging and inspirational. There were a number of young people who dedicated their lives to full time Christian Service.

The Institutes were well attended, programs were well planned and the results were very encouraging.

The Conference was honored by having its President, Paul Sims, chosen as one of the sixteen Youth Delegates to the Oslo Conference. The response for financial aid for the expense of sending the delegate to this Conference was so well subscribed to that Paul was privileged to be included in the caravans which traveled through Poland, and other war torn countries of Europe.

The National Conference of the Methodist Youth Fellowship this year was held in Stockton, California. James Weiss, Vice-President of the MYF of our Conference, was the official delegate in the absence of Paul Sims. He was accompanied by Tom Davenport and Lewis Young, both visiting delegates.

The Regional Conference, held at Clear Lake, Iowa, was attended by ten of our Conference Youth leaders and three adults.

The Area Planning Conference is to be held at East Bay Camp, Bloomington, Illinois, September 11 through 13. We are hoping to have fifty (50) of our Conference, District, and Sub-District officers to attend this Conference. Those attending the Conference last year enjoyed the fellowship and planning, and recommend that Southern Illinois Conference be better represented this year.

The Cleveland Conference, which will be an outstanding Youth Convocation, will be held December 30 through January 2. Our Conference quota is one hundred-one (101) Youth and eleven (11) adults. We are hoping to fill our quota.

The Methodist Youth Fund shows a fine increase over last year. The following amount was given by each District.

Mr. President and members of the Board of Directors of the Old Folks Home of the Southern Illinois Conference of the Methodist Church, I bring to you my third annual report as superintendent. I also bring greetings from our Large Family, including workers and members of the Home.

We are truly thankful to God for His constant watch-care and guidance through another year.

We wish to express gratitude for the service rendered by our staff, the Executive Committee, the Board of Trustees, the Board of Directors, and all the pastors, churches and friends of the Southern Illinois Conference. We make special mention of the fine support given by the Youth Fellowship through the Booth Festival. The members of the Home deserve honorable mention for their fine spirit of cooperation, in making the Home the fine place that it is.

We have held regular chapel services and have been honored by having such special visitors as Miss Ida Klingeberger, of India; Bishop C. D. Rockey, of India; Miss Sue Craig, Evanston, Ill.; Bishop J. C. Broomfield, St. Louis, Mo.; Mrs. Alice Binstead, Cardiff, Wales, and Miss Ella L. Perry, Dehli, India. We are always glad to have visitors.

We have visited many of the churches of the Conference during the year and greatly appreciate the fine fellowship of both pastors and people, this has been the source of much inspiration because of the kindness shown to me and the interest manifested in our Home.

The population of the Home as of September 1, 1946, was fifty-six. During the year four have passed to their eternal Home and four new members have been received making a total membership of fifty-six at this date. The oldest one will be one hundred years old next March 8.

The health of our members has been unusually good this year, we have had a large population, yet the deaths have been fewer.

Some rooms in the Home have been redecorated among which were the kitchen, dining room and dish room.

We have purchased two lots that are situated across Cedar Street North of the Old Folks Home.

We have had an excellent year, but we are looking forward with great anticipation when we can render more and better service to more aged people. We realize the need of new and better methods for our Institution. Dr. Karl P. Meister expresses our needs along this line in his report to the National Convention of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, when he says: "New methods of care are being adopted but too many Homes are still operated on policies and principles introduced many years ago. One obsolete method is the so-called 'minimum fee basis for admission.' Homes cannot operate on the idea that a person can be given life care for a minimum of anything less than the law of averages will require on the basis of the cost. Life expectancy must be taken into consideration as in the annuity field, and each applicant should be considered for admission on the merits of the case. The church cannot look longer with favor upon wornout methods in the care of the aged but must develop a plan which is Christian and socially, economically and scientifically correct." In a leaflet Dr. Meister says: "The Church must assume its share of the responsibility in the problem of care for the aged. It must be kept in mind that Government plans meet the physical needs only. Church plans add the 'plus' of Christian service. Without heart, there is no home."

With God's help may we do all we can as a church and as individuals to meet this need.

AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS OF THE OLD FOLKS HOME

Section 12. The superintendent of the Home shall be and he is hereby authorized to nominate an assistant superintendent of the Home when he deems such services are needed, the same to be elected by the Board of Directors; he is also authorized to engage the services of a secretary when he deems such services are needed. Both such employees shall be under the direction of the superintendent; both shall be members of the Methodist church and both shall be covered by the surety bond upon those officials of the Home handling funds thereof, and both shall be considered employees of the Home and shall be covered by any and all liability and compensation insurance covering employees of the Home.

The above Amendment was adopted by the Board of Directors of The Old Folks Home of the Southern Illinois Conference of the Methodist Church, in a called session at the seat of the Annual Conference, Granite City, Illinois, September 4, 1947.

MY EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT AS SUPERINTENDENT OF THE ORPHANS' AND CHILDREN'S HOME

August 19, 1947

Mr. President, Members of The Board of Managers of The Orphans' and Children's Home, The Southern Illinois Conference, and Friends: I bring you greetings from our large family (children and workers).

Words fail me when I would try to express our gratitude to God for blessings which have come to us in the Children's Home during the year. We do rejoice in the fact that God has led and blessed so richly all the efforts to which this Home is dedicated by the Southern Illinois Conference, in this particular phase of service in the Kingdom of our God.

In the success of the work here too much cannot be said in commendation for the loyalty and cooperation upon the part of the staff of workers in the Home, the Board of Managers, every church of the Southern Illinois Conference, contributing friends, and all who have shared by prayer or in any other way in the work of caring for dependent children who need care and help so much. The shortage of the proper type of help with the Home carrying the maximum number of children at all times has meant added burdens upon all workers, and in most every instance, this added service has been sacrificially and graciously given, and I am persuaded that all have heard the Christ of God afresh, saying again and again, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, ye have done it unto me."

We have been deeply grieved through the year because we were compelled to turn away so many needy and deserving children through the lack of means and workers to care for them. When the new building, which is now in process of construction, is completed, this will slightly relieve this situation.

Health: God has blessed in a remarkable way, the Home has maintained the excellent health record of the seven previous years. There has not been a single case of food poisoning, pnuemonia, serious accident nor death from any cause among the children or workers. We have an average population, including those of the administration building, of eighty-two (82) people, and it has not been necessary for our Staff Physician, (Dr. W. G. Parker) to make a single call during the year, and only eight such calls during the past eight years. We have, however, made a number of visits to his office that Dr. Parker might examine, give vaccinations, tonsillectomies, and all such medical care as needed.

The Kiwanis again volunteered to care for the expenses of all surgical and dental needs of our children. The Lions Club, in like manner, has cared for the expenses pertaining to the care of the children's eyes, as paying for their glasses, etc. Mrs. Maurice E. Smith has without any charge taken care of all X-Ray services needed for the children of the Home. All of this, we consider a most excellent gesture on the part of these good people.

At the time this report is being written, the health conditions of the children as a whole are such as would be difficult to surpass by any group of equal age and number.

Finance: The Children's Home, through the Unified Financial Plan for the Conference institutions, has received from our Conference Treasurer from September 1, 1946 to July 31, 1947 (eleven months) 12,511.72. There was received from this same source last year (twelve months) 11,432.62, an increase of 81,079.10. Designated gifts from September 1, 1946 to July 31, 1947 (eleven months) amounted to \$7,071.54. From this same source for the fiscal year of twelve months of the preceding year, there was received \$6,200.53, showing an increase from this source of \$871.01. From all other miscellaneous receipts for the eleven months covering the period from September 1, 1946 to July 31, 1947, we received \$26,989.03, compared to \$19,196.45 during the preceding fiscal year of twelve months, showing an increase from this source of \$7,792.58. Total receipts, from all sources for the eleven months of this fiscal year, were \$46,572.29, compared with the receipts of the preceding fiscal year of twelve months, which were \$36,830.60 giving us an increase of \$9,741.69. We do reioice in our thanksgiving to God that the good people of the Southern Illinois Conference have made such a fine increase in the support of their Children's Home.

The Auditor's Report shows a balance in the hands of the Treasurer at the end of the ficsal year of \$17,311.89, compared to \$11,568.85 the previous year, a gain of \$5,743.04.

The Board of Managers met May 2, 1947 and voted unanimously to proceed at once in the building of an additional unit to our Children's Home, said building to be 30 feet by 34 feet, two stories, fireproof of brick, steel and concrete, the first or ground floor to house the new bus and a modern one-hundred bed size laundry. The second floor of this new building will be divided into four rather large rooms, to be used as three bedrooms or living rooms, and one of these rooms to be used as a lounging room by the workers on their "days off," with three clothes closets, and a bathroom. The building, when completed and equipped, is estimated to cost between \$25,000.00 and \$30,000.00.

This makes the sixth consecutive year that we have been able to meet all bills every thirty days without borrowing money or drawing on our cash reserve. However, we may have to sell some of our securities before the new building is completed, but we are not going in debt.

We sincerely appreciate the fact that some of our very finest Christian stewards, out of their abundance, make very excellent and necessary contributions to this work, and that many in a heart-touching and most sacrificial spirit gladly share their meager incomes for the relief of homeless and dependent children. We feel most keenly that every contribution (large or small) coming to us for this work belongs to God and its use accounted for to Him as well as to the Southern Illinois Conference.

I have no words nor means by which to adequately express my sincere appreciation to all who have shared in maintaining and forwarding the work here in the Children's Home. I am truly thankful to God for having supplied us with such a fine cooperative staff of Christian workers; were we to use great space and time in naming all and each of them, trying to tell their fine Christian virtues, quality of work, etc., the half could not be told. Too much praise cannot be given to those of our workers who have given many years of the most faithful, sacrificial type of service to our Children's Home. The records show that the tenure of service continues to grow longer, and while the wage scale is far below that which I would like to see, it too, has improved for the scale is now treble what it was eight years ago.

We are grateful to Dr. Clark R. Yost, President of the Board of Managers for the gracious and brotherly cooperation given, to Rev. Clyde Todd, our Pastor and Secretary of the Board of Managers, to V. E. Richardson and N. T. Jones, members of the Building and Ground Committee, to Dr. W. G. Parker, our Staff Physician, who has proven himself efficient, willing and liberal in his professional services for the children of the Home over a span of many years.

I would like to recommend that V. E. Richardson and N. T. Jones, adding Oliver Jones, be re-elected as members of the Building and Grounds Committee, and that Dr. W. G. Parker be re-elected to the position of Staff Physician. At a call meeting of our Board of Managers May 7, 1947, Alvin Lacey Williams was elected to serve out the unexpired term of John Lannin as the official attorney for our Home. I recommend his re-election for the ensuing year, and that he be made a member of the Executive Committee and Board of Managers.

Without a single exception, we have had a most kindly reception from all the pastors and church leaders of the Southern Illinois Conference as we have represented the Children's Home. The many county courts and court officials of various counties with which we have had dealings, have in every instance treated us personally, and the Children's Home and its work with the utmost respect and consideration.

I could go on and on, trying to express my sincere appreciation and deepest gratitude to churches, organizations, individuals, etc. and still there would be a multitude of people and things of which I would like to write or speak, so may I close my thanksgiving by stating, "I include all in all that I have tried to say."

As Superintendent of the Orphans' and Children's Home for the past eight years, Mrs. Sowers having served the same length of time as Secretary, Bookkeeper and Matron, not cnly have we given our best, we have given our all to the task assigned to us during the eight years. We have spoken to churches, Bible schools, youth fellowship groups and other church organizations 1,474 times, traveled approximately 150,000 miles, not taken a single public collection, offering or subscription from the pulpit during that time for the Home, I have, with God's help, tried to give them a word picture of what the Southern Illinois Conference is trying to do for the homeless and helpless children, and left it up to them to either hand their contributions to me after the service or send it direct to the Home by mail, asking them to remember the Home in their prayers, their contributions and wills or life insurance. Whatever has been accomplished through my efforts for the Children's Home is due to the marvelous help received from God in meeting the many and complex duties with which I have been confronted. Too much credit cannot be given to the fine loyalty and cooperation upon the part of the Board of Managers, the fine staff of Christian workers, both in and out of the Home, and to the children themselves who live in the Home, and for whom the Home is operated.

In closing, let me say I have reasons to know "That they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength"; God's promises are true, "He is able to do exceedingly, abundantly, above all that we can ask or think"; and that He will supply our needs according to His riches and glory in Christ Jesus, as we love Him and keep His commandments.

ALTON MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

Superintendent Report for year 1946-1947

In common with all other institutions, Alton Memorial Hospital can report a very active but difficult year. However, I believe the year 1946-1947 has been eventful as definite progress has been made.

As we read the reports and figures contained in our Annual report, I believe our board will find a feeling of pride that our Hospital is carrying out its philanthropic responsibility.

We want our friends of Alton Memorial Hospital to know that while of necessity, much emphasis has been placed during the year upon improving the business and professional efficiency of the Hospital and it will be the sole aim to make our Hospital a better instrument of service in the healing of the sick.

The Medical Staff of the Hospital has been most gracious in their relations with the Hospital management. Their suggestions have been timely and very helpful. The officers elected for the ensuing year are: Dr. E. R. Quinn, President, Dr. C. D. Ehlert, Vice-president and Dr. D. D. Monroe, Secretary-Treasurer. The Staff membership now consists of about 77 Doctors which are divided as follows: Honorary Staff 8, Consulting Staff 19, Active Staff 17, and Associate Staff 33.

The Hospital has again received the unqualified approval of the various accrediting medical and surgical organizations.

Our Nurses Training School has also received the approval of the State Department of Registration and Education. Because of the concentrated efforts of the chairman of our Board of Directors, Rev. F. M. Hedger, and the lowering of tuition requirements to a minimum we are taking in a class of 25 students for Nurses Training September 8, 1947. The offering of scholarships and loan fund agreement will enable all girls to enter training who otherwise would lack the necessary requirements. Recruitment plans are now in the process of formation to show a movie to all interested youth groups in our congregations to stimulate further student enrollment. This movie has been used successfully by one of our Methodist Hospitals in the Central West. The title of it is "For You to Decide." It will be shown in conjunction with technicolor pictures of our hospital and its activities.

During the past year many meetings have been held by the various committees of our Board of Directors because of many complex problems confronting our institution. These meetings have been a source of much counsel to me and have served as a media for the betterment of the Hospital, its Staff, Personnel and Community.

The Executive Committee of the Board suggested the passage of a resolution which, I'm sure, will be ratified at our annual meeting, Monday, September 8, 1947, to the effect that the fiscal year of the Hospital be from January 1 to December 31 and further that the Annual Meeting be held the fourth Wednesday in the month of March.

In view of the passage of this Amendment it was proposed that the present Board of Directors and its officers remain as such until its proposed Annual Meeting and suggest that this resolution be confirmed by Conference.

On June 14, 1947, we had the honor of a visit and an inspection by Dr. Karl Meister, Executive Secretary of Methodist Hospitals and Homes. His advice was timely and many of his suggestions and recommendations for improvement have already been carried out leaving only minor recommendations for the ensuing year.

Our White Cross Auxiliary comprising of about 450 members has been most active during the past year giving much of their time as well as financial assistance wherever needed.

Our Pediatrics Department has been transferred to the new first floor Annex which was formerly occupied by Business Offices. This change gives the Hospital about 20 more Adult Beds.

Because of the various changes and improvements effected, we believe our financial position will continue to improve. The results from operations of the hospital during the past year indicate a small loss which has been offset by our generous other income donations. Our relations with the Ministers and Laymen of the Southern Illinois Conference have been most cordial and their renewed interest in our Hospital has been deeply appreciated.

This report is somewhat brief as I have given less than five months of supervision to our Hospital and I am looking forward to another year of still greater achievement and closer contact with the charges of the conference.

With the foregoing in mind, I wish to read the following statistics for the year ended August 31, 1947, which will conclude my report.

HOLDEN HOSPITAL ANNUAL MEETING August 14, 1947

The annual meeting of the Board of Directors of Holden Hospital Corporation was held August 14, 1947, in the parlor at the hospital at 10:00 A. M. with Rev. G. E. Whitten, president of the Board presiding.

The meeting was opened with a prayer by Dr. C. C. Hall, Chaplain of Holden Hospital.

Those present were Mr. J. D. Dill, Mr. C. T. Houghten, Mr. C. E. Dill, Rev. G. E. Whitten, Rev. F. O. Wilson, Rev. E. U. Yates, Rev. Paul Brown, Dr. Glenn Sharp, Dr. C. C. Hall, Dr C. R. Yost, Mrs. Mark Woodley, Mrs. Arthur Lee, Mrs. S. S. Ritchey, Mrs. John F. Daniels, Mrs. Fred Nave, Mrs. J. D. Dill, Miss Mattie B. Pangburn and Mrs. Joe F. Van Natta.

Dr. Whitten spoke briefly on the scripture "Believe thou on the Lord and He will direct thy path." He stated that God has wonderfully blessed Holden Hospital as an institution of healing. He said that as president of the Board of Directors of Holden Hospital he hadn't watched the work in the hospital for the past six years without appreciating the fine work of Dr. C. Hall, the Chaplain, and the splendid work of our Superintendent, Miss Mattie B. Pangburn. He stated that behind all of this fine work is the hand of God. He said that the hot weather brought him back in thought to 1938 when he was in Bethlehem and went up into the tower and saw the shepherds watching their sheep. The sheep seemed to know the voice of the shepherd and followed him. Even the lambs knew the shepherd and trusted him. He said, "Is it any wonder then that Jesus uses shepherd throughout His teachings?" He has certainly led us in our work in Holden Hospital. Rev. Whitten read the 23rd Psalm and commented on it. He said, "Think of the care, love and protection of God." "The Lord has been the Shepherd of this institution." It is providence that we have a Chaplain, fine Superintendent and Board. In our work God is our shepherd and we have nothing to fear.

Rev. Whitten stated that this was the last time he would preside at the Board meeting as he was going back into preaching after the Southern Illinois Conference meets in Granite City.

The minutes of the Annual board meeting of September 5, 1946, were read and approved.

Miss Mattie B. Pangburn, Superintendent of Holden Hospital, gave a splendid report covering her work for the past eleven months. Her report contained a most interesting comparison between the year 1940 and

1947 showing the growth and development of the various departments of the hospital.

A motion was made by Rev. Yates and seconded by Mr. J. D. Dill that the report be accepted and the superintendent be congratulated on her fine work and splendid report. Motion carried.

The treasurers report for the past eleven months ending July 31, 1947, was read and discussed by Mr. C. E. Dill, treasurer of Holden Hospital Corporation. His comparative statistics for the past 20 years were very interesting and enlightening.

A motion was made by Mr. Houghten and seconded by Rev. Brown that the report be accepted and placed on file. Motion carried.

Mr. J. D. Dill stated that Dr. John B. Benson when he was here for the bond burning ceremony July 17, 1947, suggested that we have a picture of Christi in the Hospital as this is a Christian institution. He stated that a picture of Christ had been sent to Holden Hospital from the Board of Hospitals and Homes and it has been framed and is ready to hang in the lobby. Mrs. O. E. Connett made the first donation toward framing.

A motion was made by Rev. Yates and seconded by Mrs. Lee that Miss Pangburn, Dr. Hall and Mr. Dill be commended for having the picture framed and that a letter of thanks be sent to the Board of Hospitals and Homes for the picture. Motion carried.

Dr. C. C. Hall spoke on his work as Chaplain of Holden Hospital and splendid work that is being done by the superintendent and her corps of fine workers. He stated that the work is really worth while and a hospital that maintains the services of a chaplain has a higher standing in its community.

Mr. J. D. Dill stated that the services rendered by Dr. Hall and Miss Pangburn cannot be measured. He made a motion which was seconded by Dr. Yost that we render a vote of thanks to the Superintendent and Chaplain for their splendid work. Motion carried.

A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. J. D. Dill and the members of the executive committee for their splendid work during the past year, by the board.

Dr. Yost spoke of Mr. F. M. Hewitt, Vice-president of our board who passed away since our last meeting. He said that Mr. Hewitt's sacrificial services, his deepening and abiding interest in Holden Hospital would be long remembered.

Mr. J. D. Dill, Chairman of the Executive Committee of Holden Hospital Corporation said that the executive committee is in complete agreement with the arrangements of our Chaplain.

A motion was made by Mr. Dill and seconded by Rev. Brown that Dr. C. C. Hall be employed for another year as Chaplain of Holden Hospital as per agreement with the executive committee. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Rev. Yates and seconded by Rev. Wilson that the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting be accepted and approved without reading. Motion carried.

Mr. J. D. Dill was appointed to write an article for the local papers concerning the annual meeting and work at Holden Hospital.

The following Committees were appointed by Rev. Whitten:

Nominating-Rev. Paul Brown, Rev. E. U. Yates, Mrs. S. S. Ritchey.

Finance-Mr. J. D. Dill, Mr. C. T. Houghten, Dr. Glenn Sharp, Dr. C. R. Yost, Rev. F. O. Wilson.

Building—Mrs. Fred Nave, Mrs. Mark Woodley, Mrs. Arthur Lee, Mrs. John Daniels, Mrs. J. D. Dill.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:45 for lunch and the committee meetings.

A most delicious luncheon was served to the board members by Miss Pangburn and her fine corps of workers.

The afternoon session of the annual meeting of the Board of Directors of Holden Hospital Corporation was called together promptly at 2:00 P. M.

A vote of thanks was extended to the hospital staff for the lovely luncheon and its gracious hospitality.

The report of the building committee was made by Mrs. Nave, the Chairman.

The Committee reported that the floors in the operating room and the delivery room had been recovered and the walls painted to reflect the light.

They recommend:

- 1. Air conditioning be placed in the operating room and the delivery room as soon as possible.
- Water coolers be placed in the fountains on each floor of the hospital.
- 3. Furnace in Chaplain's home be repaired at once.
- 4. That action be taken by the W. S. C. S. and the Southern Illinois Conference to meet the proposition of the Federal Government and the State of Illinois for a new addition to Holden Hospital and that the same be announced in the Annual Conference of 1947 and also be presented at the Executive Board meeting and the Annual meeting of the W. S. C. S. to be held in Carbondale in October, 1947, with the expectation that the W. S. C. S. at its annual meeting will endorse the proposition for real beginning.

A motion was made by Mrs. Nave and seconded by Mr. Dill that the recommendations of the Building be adopted. Motion carried.

The report of the finance committee was made by Dr. Yost, the secretary. He stated that the committee is grateful that all debts on Holden Hospital are paid.

They recommended:

- That without a campaign, we encourage the building of an endowment, and that the Executive Committee prepare the leaflets and distribute, setting forth to prospective donors the fine investment, opportunities offered through a Hospital endowment.
 We favor the replacement of the old building with a new wing
- 2. We favor the replacement of the old building with a new wing and the acceptance of the government offer of two dollars for every one raised by the friends of the hospital when conditions are favorable for starting the building program.

They asked the Executive Committee to inquire how long the government offer will be open.

A motion was made by Dr. Yost and seconded by Mr. J. D. Dill that the report of the finance committee be accepted and placed on file. Motion carried.

The report of the nominating committee was made by Rev. Brown, the chairman. The committee submitted the names of Rev. E. U. Yates, Dr. C. R. Yost, Mr. F. M. Hewitt, Jr., and the Pastor of the Grace Methodist Church of Carbondale, Illinois, for the class of 1950.

The committee submitted the names of J. D. Dill, as chairman, Mrs. W. B. McGinnis as Vice-chairman, Mrs. J. F. Van Netta as Secretary, the District Superintendent of the Carbondale District, Mr. F. M. Hewitt, Jr., the Pastor of the First Methodist Church, and the Pastor of the Grace Methodist Church to serve on the Executive Committee of Holden Hospital for the ensuing year.

A motion was made by Rev. Brown and seconded by Mr. J. D. Dill that the report be accepted and the class of 1950 be presented to the Annual Conference for their confirmation.

Rev. Brown stated that the Class of 1950 for the W. S. C. S. consisting of Mrs. O. E. Connett of Flora, Illinois, Mrs. A. E. Crepin and Mrs. Fred Nave of Carbondale, Illinois, and Mrs. Edna Wolfram of E. St. Louis, Ill., had been elected at their May meeting.

A motion was made by Dr. Hall and seconded by Mr. Dill that the names as presented by the W. S. C. S. be confirmed by the Board of Directors. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Rev. Brown and seconded by Mr. Dill that the report of the nominating committee be accepted and placed on file. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Mr. Dill and seconded by Rev. Brown that Dr. Hall make a report at the Annual Conference on the past, present and future of Holden Hospital. Motion carried.

No further business appearing, a motion was made by Rev. Brown and seconded by Mr. Dill that we adjourn. Motion carried.

The meeting was closed with a prayer by Dr. Yost.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM—SOUTHERN ILLINOIS CONFERENCE—YEAR OF 1947-1948

I. A REVIEW OF THE YEAR OF EVANGELISM.

1. Membership.

Our Church has experienced a remarkable growth during the Year of Evangelism (1,021,210 new members). A fine spirit and method of procedure has developed. Twice as many new members were received than is usual.

2. New Churches.

A total of 806 new churches were either organized or re-opened during the Year of Evangelism. We rejoice in this good record and ask that in our own Conference a careful study by the cabinet be made for the location and establishment of new churches during this year.

3. Daily Devotions in Every Home.

This major goal of the Year of Evangelism cannot be reported in actual figures. Much emphasis has been placed upon family altars throughout the whole of the year.

4. Fewer charges with no additions.

One of the encouraging aspects of the Year of Evangelism is that the number of charges which did not win a single person to Christ on confession of faith was reduced from 3,360 in 1945 to 936 in 1946.

II. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR OUR CONFERENCE EVANGELISTIC PROGRAM THIS YEAR.

1. Visitation and Public Evangelism.

We recommend a week of visitation evangelism in every charge (1) preceded by a careful survey of the community (2) and followed by a week of cultivation and spiritual guidance calls (3) which week is to be followed by a series of evangelistic services. By combining these two methods our evangelistic efforts will be more fruitful.

2. Evangelistic training conferences.

To assist pastors and laymen to become more effective in winning persons to Christ, our Board of Evangelism is projecting (1) our Fourth Annual Evangelistic Convention which will be held at Herrin, Illinois, on November 17 and 18, (2) a Workshop on Evangelism for all men in the ministry for less than ten years, (3) a School of Evangelism in the spring and (4) a districtwide simultaneous visitation and public evangelism effort in the East St. Louis district.

3. Assimilation of new members.

It is nothing short of tragic for a person to be won to Christ and then not be trained for Christian churchmanship. We, therefore, recommend that training classes in church membership for children, youth and addits be held in every Church where new members are received. Children's classes should be conducted during Lent. Adult classes should be formed as soon as five new members are to be received.

The new members should also be enrolled in Church School and Learning for Life School.

4. Cooperation with the Church School Advance.

The Board of Evangelism pledges its cooperation to the Board of Education in emphasizing the Church School during this last year of the Crusade for Christ quadrennium. We will assume particularly the responsibility of winning the parents to Christ and to enroll them in the Church School. We are asking each Church to form a Parents Cooperation League in which the parents of church school pupils will promise to attend Church School and Church regularly, read the Upper Room to the family each morning, and enroll in Parent Training courses.

5. Church Loyalty Crusade.

October 5th is the first Sunday of the six weeks Church Loyalty Campaign suggested by the Board of Evangelism. Many have absented themselves during the summer. This campaign when properly organized will reclaim their attendance.

6. Approved Evangelists.

We recommend the appointment of E. O. Allen as Conference Missionary Evangelist.

We recommend as approved evangelists, E. C. Chastain and E. O. Hobbs.

REPORT OF MISSIONARY-EVANGELIST

This is our fourth report as Missionary-Evangelist of the Southern Illinois Conference. We are finding a great need throughout the Conference relative to helping the weaker churches and also many fields where new churches should be organized.

Much of our work this year has been surveying. These new and neglected fields should be given a complete survey to find the many possibilities. Six months of this year has been given to Washington Park, in East St. Louis. December, January and February we surveyed that section which has a population of about 5000. We called at every home, making contact with about 60% of the people. Over 300 persons gave their preference as Methodist. A new church was organized. The Cress auto Parts Building is now being used for regular church services. A location at a cost of \$1500 has been bought, (\$800 has been paid on same), 46 members have been received, many of whom transferred from churches elsewhere. Eleven of them were converted and baptized. This new class is very anxious to move forward. They are now in a building program for the first floor of the new building at an estimated cost of \$7000. They have also set the budget for the coming year based on a pastor's salary of \$1000.

We believe that there are many fields in the Southern Illinois Conference where this may be done. One of our great needs is a Home Missionary Fund from which to draw in order to establish new churches.

The following is a summary of our year's work:

Conducted 9 revivals; planned and carried out 11 weeks of survey work; preached 159 messages; We have seen many turn to the Lord; Taught in 50 Bible Classes; Visited 10 public schools; Drove 9048 miles in connection with the work; Made 1895 house calls, (which is better than an average of 5 per day throughout the year.) Received salary, \$3000; Expenses, \$642.28; Raised for the Board of Evangelism, \$635.15.

We covet the prayers of the Conference in behalf of our work.

CONFERENCE EVANGELIST REPORT

"Evangelize or Fossilize" has been our motto for this past year of work. We feel that "the hour is come" when Christians must evangelize or humanity is doomed to perish by its own hands from the earth.

We have conducted 17 Evangelistic Crusades, preaching 325 times and ministering to the needs of over ten thousand people. There were 1009 definite committments at the altar. 1560 children attended special services conducted for them. We have found the most fertile field to be among the Children and Youth.

On the basis of Free-Will Offerings, we received \$4495.00 for our services.

This has been a rather strange year. I have preached only 315 times and have held only 11 revivals, yet all with good results. I have made 1200 calls. Due to sickness, we have spent part of the year supplying at Cisne and Geff. We love the work better every day and ask for your continued pravers.

REPORT OF EVANGELIST E. O. HOBBS

I have had a good year in evangelism. I have conducted 13 revivals for a total of 28 weeks; have preached 300 times, and have made many personal calls. All these revivals were in Methodist churches. I have had a total of 225 professions of conversion and sanctification, and great numbers have been quickened and revived. A number have united with the church as a result of the revivals.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

As Secretary of Town and Country Work, I bring you my first Annual Report. I have given considerable time and study this year to the problems of the Rural Church, its ministers and laymen. The work of your Secretary has been of a promotional nature. We feel that this is the most vital program our church has ever launched. If we help the Rural Church solve its problems, we will solve a lot of the problems of Our Conference and of even the world.

I have attended all District Conferences and Set-up meetings of our Conference, speaking in the interest of my department and distributing the available printed material of our Commission in New York. I have represented your Conference in a number of meetings of the Illinois Church Council for Rural Life and Rural Youth. Through the cooperation of the Dean of the School of Ministerial Training we were fortunate in having the services of Rockwell C. Smith as a Special Lecturer this summer. His messages were a help and an inspiration to the men of our Town and Country Churches.

One of the finest meetings of the year was the National Rural Life Conference held in Lincoln, Nebraska, July 29, 30, 31. Under the auspices of the Council of Bishops and the Department of Town and Country Work of the Board of Missions, eight Commissions prepared special advance studies to present to the Conference. The Conference was the first such ever held by the Methodist Church, and it indicated something of the growing importance of the Rural Church in our denomination's thinking and program. Through the cooperation of the churches of our Conference a sum of \$78578 was raised which sent a delegation of twelve (12) to the National Rural Life Conference in Lincoln; the district superintendents, one urban pastor, one rural pastor and one rural layman from each district. In addition to this group, the W. S. C. S. sent a delegate, and the Board of Education sent its Secretary, and assisted the Youth Group in sending a Rural Youth Delegate. Your Secretary acted as Chairman of the delegation, and paid expenses out of the money allowed by the Committee on World Service and Finance. There were sixteen delegates in all.

We make the following recommendations:

1. That Rural Life Sunday, the Sunday nearest Rogation Day, be held in all our churches. On that day the major emphasis should be on the seed, the soil, God's gifts, and man's labor. Service programs may be found in our new Book of Worship, or ordered direct from Dr. Elliott Fisher, 150 Fifth Ave., New York 11, N. Y.

2. That each Rural Pastor join the Rural Fellowship. For \$1.00 per year you will receive your bulletin and the Christian Fellowship Bulletin, both of which will give helpful ideas and articles on rural problems and opportunities. Send your money to the Editor, John B. Howes, Westminster, Md.

3. That we take as our major objective this year the problem of ministerial support for the Rural Pastor. Our greatest need at present is a minimum salary level. The city churches are strong enough to speak for themselves and they need no champions. These churches in the small towns, in the villages and along the country roads have been weakened through the years, and they need a voice to be heard all across Southern Illinois, which shall recall men to the strength and influence of these little country churches. A complaint that is heard on every hand is to the effect that Methodist ministers move too often. Actually, we are tending toward longer and more settled pastorates in the better paying charges and toward more frequent moves in the rural areas. When there is a shortage of preachers the rural areas suffer first. Assignment, tenure, and support

are bound up closely together. No amount of pious talk alone by Church leaders will solve these problems. It is our responsibility. We have talked about it for years. It is the feeling of some that responsible agencies of our Conference need to keep certain funds within the bounds of our Con-ference for stabilizing ministerial support. I plead with you for the sake of the men of your Conference who are living on a starvation salary, that you mobilize and organize for action.

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM BOARD OF EDUCATION

TENTATIVE PROGRAM FOR THE YEAR

1. That we make it our definite policy to work in the direction of Intermediate Institutes, beginning with one or more this year, if possible. And that we start a sinking fund for a Conference Camp Site and that a definite amount of reserve to be retained in the treasury, to be determined by the Executive Committee of the Board of Education, before any is taken out for a sinking fund.

That a printed News Sheet, instead of a mimeographed sheet, be 2. sent out from the office of the Executive Secretary to Pastors, Superintendents, and other church leaders.

That a committee from the Board of Education investigate our in-3. terests in the Student Christian Foundation at Carbondale, the following to serve as the committee: C. H. Todd, F. E. Harris, and Clyde Clark.

We recommend the following up of Christian Committments on the part of youth and that a list of these names be kept in the files of the Executive Secretary's office.

5. We urge that our pastors and church school officers and teachers use our Methodist literature and especially recommend our new literature.

6. We recommend that the askings for Rally Day fund be a minimum of a sum equal to 10 cents per enrolled members in the Sunday Church School.

7. The Board of Education recommends the establishment of an Intermediate Camp next year.

We also recommend the holding of a series of four District, Church School Superintendents and Officers Conferences, one in each of the Districts.

The Board of Education recommends the holding of a Hancraft and 9. Recreation Work Shop in Centralia, First Church, December 5-6.

10. We urge the very close cooperation of all pastors, Church School Superintendents and Officers as well as all other organizations in the church in reaching the goals for Increased enrollment and Attendance in the Church Schools.

11. We also urge the complete organization of the Young Adult Work of the Conference in local churches, Sub-Districts especially. We feel that this is one of the most potent groups in our church today and it needs to be organized and put to work.

12. We recommend the establishment of a Uniform Church School Standard for the entire Conference, that this standard be used in each church.

13. We also recommend that the Conference, District and Sub-district

Officers of the M. Y. F. be urged to attend the Area Planning Conference at Bloomington, September 11, 12, 13.

14. That the week of September 22-28 be observed as Christian Education Week if at all possible and that Sunday, September 28, be observed as Rally Day or some day as near that date as possible.

15. We recommend Monday, November 10, for the date of the Booth Festival.

16. We urge that the month of November be used as Home Visitation month as a part of the Crusade for Christ Program.

17. The Board of Education urges the cooperation of the pastors of each of the districts to select suitable young people as delegates to the National Youth Conference to be held in Cleveland, Ohio, December 30, to January 2.

18. The Discipline provides that the Annual Conference shall elect an equal number of laymen and ministers to the Board of Education, quadrennially the number and manner to be determined by the Annual Conference, etc., P. 1443.

We would like to recommend to the conference for its approval a plan that will determine the manner and number to be elected at the next Annual Conference:

We recommend N. C. Henderson to represent the Trustee as a member and chairman of the Orphans' and Children's Home Board.

We recommend:

That the Conference Trustees be authorized to sell the Pleasant Grove Church in Washington County, Carbondale District, and that the proceeds be given to the Beaucoup Church.

That the Conference Trustees be authorized to sell the Sailor Springs parsonage and that the proceeds be used to build a new parsonage at Bible Grove on the same charge.

The District Committee on Church Location met at Sailor Springs, Illinois, August 14, 1947, and passed the following resolution: "That the Committee declare the Methodist Parsonage of Sailor Springs abandoned and recommended to the Southern Illinois Annual Conference for disposal."

We recommend these gifts from the funds held by the Conference Trustees:

\$300 for the Stonefort Church, Harrisburg District.

\$300 for the Eddyville Church, Harrisburg District.

\$500 to the new Grace Methodist Church of Washington Park, Illinois, when the officers of the Church have \$3000.00 cash in hand to begin the erection of the building.

Resolved that at the time of the settlement of the Machin Estate of Albion, Illinois, C. C. Hall was appointed special trustee to receive bequests for the Old Folks' Home at Lawrenceville, Illinois, and the Orphans' and Children's Home at Mt. Vernon, Illinois, from the Executor of the Estate, Earl S. Bunting, and to act as custodian of such funds. That at the time of the appointment of C. C. Hall, as such special Trustee, he was authorized by the Board of Trustees of the Southern Illinois Annual Conference of the Methodist Church to execute transfers and assignments for and in behalf of the Old Folks' Home of Lawrenceville, Illinois, and the Orphans' and Children's Home at Mt. Vernon, Illinois, of the Methodist Church, and that this authority has continued and is in force and effect as of this date.

GENERAL REPORT OF CONFERENCE LAY ACTIVITIES Annual Conference—September, 1947

Throughout the past year Methodist men have placed emphasis on the third phase of the Crusade for Christ-"Stewardship." We have tried to

show the importance of stewardship in the many other phases than that of material wealth alone.

The basic principle of stewardship is:

"All that we have and all that we are belong to God; our time, our talents, our resources and our opportunities are all a trust from God to be used according to a divine plan."

Lay Activities throughout the Conference have included:

1. Regular monthly meetings of Methodist Men's clubs in many churches. Much time and program has been given on the various phases of Stewardship.

2. Men have been urged to give of their time, money and talents to the Church.

Men's groups have aided in increasing the number of Christian Advocate Subscriptions in the home.

4. Some groups have made an annual affair of a banquet to their ladies. Fellowship suppers for the men have been held.

5. Some groups have held open forums discussing the various phases of stewardship.

 Sunday evening testimonies have been led by some groups.
 Group Meetings and Banquets have been held with representation from each church in the area.

8. Laymen's Day Observances-throughout the Conference with laymen in complete charge of the Sunday Service in most churches.

9. Annual Spring Rally:

In May each District participated in a Spring Rally. With similar programs and the same speaker for each occasion a unity of thought and pur-pose was brought about. Approximately 2500 men attended these occasions.

10. Another special activity of the year included the presentation of three minute talks prepared by outstanding laymen of the country and presented by laymen of the local churches on Sunday mornings for a three months period.

Annual Conference Meeting and Banquet:

At this time Methodist men throughout the Conference have the opportunity of coming together for Christian fellowship. In our Conference meetings we share our program thoughts and ideas of the past year. We pick up new ideas for the coming year. With representation from throughout the Conference we close a year's active program.

Methodist men have participated in all phases of the Crusade for Christ and will meet the challenge of the new year.

REPORT OF THE WORLD PEACE COMMITTEE

The Christian people of the world are exceedingly inactive in one of the world's major problems-World Peace. We believe it is not so much indifference or lack of concern as it is the feeling of inability. But World Peace will have to come through Christian principles and policies and the Christian people must lead the way. And all the Christians of the world working together, under God, can bring about the reality of a World Peace.

During this week, September 2-8, there is a Conference of International Peace Organizations at St. Cygere, Nyon, near Geneva, Switzerland. The

Executive Secretary of the Commission on World Peace of the Methodist Church, Dr. Charles F. Boss, Jr., is the elected delegate to represent the National Peace Conference of the United States. Let us give this Conference our interest and prayers, and we should follow up and do whatever we can to cooperate in the plans they make at this Conference.

We urge the ministers and laymen of the Southern Illinois Conference to be aroused to our responsibility as individuals, World Peace Committees, churches and groups to more peace education by sermons, addresses, study classes, forums, discussion groups, dramas and visual education. Any possible action by individuals and groups to help in World Peace should be taken.

We suggest especially the attention of all our Methodists to the work of the United Nations. All people concerned recognize its weakness. But it is the only International Instrument we have, and until we have a better one, we should try to make the United Nations better, and give it our support.

We have asked the Commission on World Service and Finance for fifty dollars for the Conference Committee to use next year in promotion activity. The Commission on World Peace of the Methodist Church gives many suggestions for action during the year to the Chairman of the Conference Committee. Many of these are calls for immediate wires and letters to governmental representatives.

REPORT OF THE WORLD PEACE COMMITTEE

There have been many evidences of "listening" to these communications on the part of our governmental leaders during this last year.

The pamphlet "Register Christian Opinion" gives the names of the members of the United States Senate and House of Representatives arranged by States and Congressional Districts and the Standing Committees of the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States. It may be secured free from the Commission on World Peace of The Methodist Church, Rev. Charles F. Boss, Jr., Executive Secretary, 740 Rush St., Chicago 11, Illinois.

We believe the Methodist position as to conscientious objectors is sound and Christian (See Discipline paragraphs 2010, 2017-18), and that the Methodist who is a sincere conscientious objector ought not to have any feeling of suspicion or ill will be held against him.

We believe we ought to go on record as a Conference and urge individuals and churches to speak out against compulsory military training. Experience has proven that voluntary enlistment will provide the men we need for military service. In this atomic age the solution is certainly not that each male citizen of America will be trained in a military way. It would take only a few years for all the skills of the physical training of each man to be erased. We do not believe the militaristic viewpoint and philosophy of life at the very impressionable age of youth is the best thing or the thing needed, and the conditions in which our youth will be placed in compulsory military training will not be the most morally and spiritually wholesome.

We urge our Conference to become alert to every means of World Peace.

RESOLUTION ON TEMPERANCE

Whereas, the liquor traffic is one of the greatest sins in the world today. It is more ruthless than ever before, and our conditions are much worse than under the old saloon regime. The liquor crowd is spending vast sums of money to educate the rising generation to the drink habit, and to popularize it among the women and youth of the land, and

WHEREAS, the liquor traffic opposes everything for which the orthodox church stands, and is for everything that the church is against. It winks at crime and lawlessness, and defice righteousness and holiness, and

WHEREAS, the Anti-Saloon League of Illinois is now actively carrying on an aggressive war against the liquor traffic, comprehending agitation, education and legislation under the capable leadership of Dr. Dexheimer and his assistants.

Therefore, be it resolved that this Southern Illinois Annual Conference in its 1947 session go on record as being unitedly opposed to the whole liquor traffic. That we stand for temperance in things that are wholesome and for total abstinence as against moderation in the use of alcoholic beverages, narcotics and nicotines. That we continue on with untring efforts toward the complete extermination of beverage alcohol. That we cooperate with the Anti-Saloon League of Illinois; the W. C. T. U., and our own Methodist Temperance board in this fight against the liquot traffic.

We urge local options wherever and whenever possible, and the election of officers in every official position who are dry.

We further urge a complete Temperance educational program in our church schools at least once a quarter, and that our ministers in both large and small churches preach temperance sermons occasionally; and that every Methodist member do all in his power to set a right example from the standpoint of temperance before sinner.

5. The thoughtful care of the pastors and people of the cooperating churches has made our stay in the Tri-Cities wholly delightful.

A special word of praise is due the ladies and men of the church for their labor of love in preparing delicious food and refreshments for the many visitors.

The Conference is especially indebted to the City Library as headquarters for the Financial and Statistical forces of the Conference and the Y. M. C. A. for a counsel room for Bishop Magee and the Cabinet.

We have been helped by the sermons and the administration of our resident Bishop, J. Ralph Magee, and by the earnest addresses and sermons by all who appeared on the program.

We are grateful for the many advances in Kingdom work as shown by the financial and statistical reports, and we dare to believe that the gains will be even greater as we bring the Year of Stewardship to a close, and enter the Year of the Crusade For Christ In the Church School.

We Memorialize the General Conference of the Methodist Church that in a day in which spiritual ignorance is appalling we call upon the editors of our Church School literature to make all of our Church School material Bible-centered and evangelistic.

SOUTHERN ILLINOIS ANNUAL CONFERENCE METHODIST CHURCH.

We Memorialize the General Conference of the Methodist Church that due to the enlarged program of the General Board of Evangelism we request that the World Service percentage which they receive be increased to 2 percent.

SOUTHERN ILLINOIS ANNUAL CONFERENCE METHODIST CHURCH.

We Memorialize the General Conference of the Methodist Church that in order that our younger ministers be more adequately prepared we urge the General Conference to require chairs of evangelism in our seminaries and appoint a committee of ministers and laymen to restudy the whole curriculum of our seminaries in order to add courses which will help in this appreciation as well as offer practical assistance in pastoral work.

SOUTHERN ILLINOIS ANNUAL CONFERENCE METHODIST CHURCH.

We Memorialize the General Conference of the Methodist Church that the Conference Course of Study be properly balanced. We request that courses on various phases of evangelism be included in the curriculum.

SOUTHERN ILLINOIS ANNUAL CONFERENCE METHODIST CHURCH.

We Memorialize the General Conference of the Methodist Church that because of the increased propagandizing of the Roman Catholic faith in rural areas through missions and disemmination of tracts we urge the General Conference to call for 500 men who will spend their full time in evangelistic missions in needy areas, such as rural towns and urban communities where Protestantism needs to be propogated. These men shall be under the direction of the General Board of Evangelism_{wa} A church wide campaign shall be started to provide the money for their salaries.

SOUTHERN ILLINOIS ANNUAL CONFERENCE METHODIST CHURCH.

We memorialize the General Conference of the Methodist Church to insert in paragraph 1326 the following sentence, "In addition, each Annual Conference shall be entitled to elect either one minister or one layman to membership in the Board of Education," to take the place of this sentence, "In addition, upon nomination of its committee on education the Jurisdictional Conference shall elect one minister and one layman for each 300,000 members of major fraction thereof within the jurisdiction."

Further that the sentence, "Not more than three members of the board shall come from any one Annual Conference," shall be deleted.

SOUTHERN ILLINOIS CONFERENCE METHODIST CHURCH.

We memorialize the General Conference as follows:

In the Methodist Discipline of 1944, paragraph 1914, "The order of receiving persons into the church" ... the minister shall say: "You are come hither seeking union with The Methodist Church." Same paragraph the minister says: "We this day recognize you as members of The Methodist Church." The people shall say: "We rejoice to recognize you as members of The Methodist Church." Then the minister shall say: "We rejoice to recognize you as members of The Methodist Church."

In paragraph 1915, the minister shall say: "I receive you into The Methodist Church."

SOUTHERN ILLINOIS CONFERENCE METHODIST CHURCH.

We memorialize the General Conference:

At the last session of the New Jersey Conference the following memorial

to the 1948 General Conference was unanimously adopted, of which we now sincerely request your Conference approval and support.

WHEREAS, Children's Day was one of Methodism's numerous gifts to the world, and

WHEREAS. It was within the bounds of the New Jersev Conference. at Trinity Church, Merchantville, that the day was first observed on June 10. 1866. and

WHEREAS, Other religious groups have seen fit to appropriate the name of this day with all its original significance, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the New Jersey Conference memorialize the 1948 session of the General Conference to reestablish "Children's Day" with its beautiful traditions and rich historical significance in place of the present title, "Methodist Student Day," in anticipation of which each Annual Conference shall be circularized for its approval of this resolution.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

The World Service and Finance Commission, composed of the following members: (Pastors) E. M. Dycus, Chairman; Heber E. Burge, Secretary; M. B. Van Leer, Virgil W. Corrie, W. Clyde Bruce. (Laymen) J. R. Collins, Virgil Duncan, Floyd Bracy, Floyd Miller, Harvey Nooner, and C. L. Edwards, wish to present to the Ninth Session of the Southern Illinois Conference of The Methodist Church the following recommendations for its consideration:

1. We recommend that instead of the Institutional Fund, the askings for Conference Institutions be included as a part of Annual Conference Benevolences, in accordance with the provisions of The Methodist Discipline.

2. The opportionment for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall be \$160,000, to be divided 50% or \$80,000 for World Service, and 50% or \$80,000 for Annual Conference Benevolences.

The Claims to be paid from Annual Conference Benevolences shall be as follows:

- 22.5% to McKendree College. a.
- 22.5% to the Orphanage and Children's Home. b.
- 22.5% to the Old Folks' Home. c
- d. 8.75% to the Hospital Service Fund.
- e. 3.25% to the Conference Board of Evangelism.
- 3 % for Conference Missions, to be administered as approved f. by the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension.
- 1.5% to the Conference Board of Education, designated for g. Youth work under the direction of the Conference Youth Director.
- 16% for fixed sum distribution as ordered by the Commission h. on World Service and Finance.

Items included in the fixed sum distribution by order of the Commission are as follows:

- \$2,100 for Conference Treasurer's salary.
 \$300 for Conference Treasurer's office rent.
 \$500 (not to exceed) for expense and promotion by the Conference 3. Missionary Secretary.
- 4. \$ 500 (not to exceed) for the Pastor's Summer School at Lebanon.
 5. \$ 400 to supplement salary of Pastor of Methodist Church at Lebanon.
- \$ 400 for Christian Student Foundation at Carbondale.

- \$ 400 for Wesley Foundation at Urbana. 7.
- 200 for Town and Country Work. 8.
- 9. \$ 120 for Staff Members at Conference (\$5.00 each).
- 10. \$ 100 for Conference Secretary's expense. (1947-1948).
- 11. Ś 100 for Illinois Church Council.
- 50 (not to exceed) for expense of Chairman of Conference Com-12. mission on World Peace.
- \$ 700 (not to exceed) Board of Lay Activities. 13.

14. The remainder of the 16% of Annual Conference Benevolences may be used for expense and equipment for offices of the Treasurer and Secretary of the Conference, and for miscellaneous and emergency expense, as approved by the Commission on World Service and Finance.

The Booth Festival Cash and Supplies are free will offerings and do 4. not apply on the apportionment for World Service and Conference Benevo-The amount received for Booth Festival Cash shall be divided lences. equally to the following institutions: McKendree College, Orphans' and Children's Home and Old Folks' Home. The past year the amount of Booth Festival Cash received was about \$12,000. The Thanksgiving Offering, Christmas Offering, February McKendree Offering and Mothers' Day Offer-ing formerly taken for the Conference Institutions, shall be placed in the offering for World Service and Annual Conference Benevolences.

The salary of each District Superintendent shall be set at \$4200.00. Each Superintendent shall be allowed \$50.00 per month for house rent; also not to exceed \$1600 for travel and office expense, for which they are to present a monthly itemized voucher to the Conference Treasurer. A new District Superintendent's first moving expense from his charge to the district will be paid not to exceed \$75.00. This is not a part of his expense account.

6. For special opportunity, November will be for the Old Folks' Home, December for the Orphanage and Children's Home, February for McKendree College, and May for Hospital Service Fund, but the offerings shall be a part of World Service and Conference Benevolences.

On the basis of the pastor's cash salary, the Commission recommends the following apportionments:

d.	Administration Fund

The Administration Fund to be allocated as follows:

9. That Robert Davis, C. P. A. Robinson, Illinois, be employed to audit books of all institutions, boards, commissions, and treasurers of the Southern Illinois Conference, except those institutions, boards or agencies who have a C. F. A. audit, and the findings of such audit be published in the Journal. (See Paragraph 722 of 1944 Discipline). Each institution, board, commission or treasurer to be responsible for the expense of its own audit.

That each District Superintendent apportion to the churches for World Service and Annual Conference Benevolences.

11. That the following banks be authorized for Conference money:



MEMOIRS

HENRY IDEL

Rev. Henry Idel was born January 3, 1874, at Owensville, Mo., and departed this life December 18, 1946, at Huegely, Ill., thus reaching the age of 72 years, 11 months and 16 days. He was converted in an old fashioned



revival meeting in early life and united with the German Methodist Church.

As a young man he felt the call of God to preach the gospel. In answer to this call he entered Central Wesleyan College at Warrenton, Mo., where he worked his way through college. In June, 1901, he was graduated from the Theological Department. In September of the same year he entered the St. Louis German Methodist Conference and his first appointment was a home mission field at Huntsdale, Mo. On December 20, 1905, he was united in marriage with Amelia Leonard, of Beardstown, Ill., and they were privileged to labor together in the active pastorate for 35 years, and 11 years in the retired relation. Thus their happy wedded life and active work of the ministry extended for 41 years.

Mr. Idel served various churches in the German Methodist work with much success and witnessed some gracious revivals, seeing many souls saved and the work of the kingdom built up. At one

time he served as pastor at North Prairie and Hoyleton for 4 years.

In 1925 the German work merged with the English Methodist Church and Rev. Idel continued in active service for 11 years more. He spent 35 years in the active ministry. In 1936 he took the retired relation and located permanently at Huegely, Ill, where they have lived until his translation to our Heavenly Home on Wednesday, December 18, 1946, at 5 o'clock.

During his retired relation he was always very active in church and Sunday School and seldom missed a service, even going beyond his physical strength up until the second Sunday before his home-going.

Besides his bereaved wife and true companion, he leaves to mourn his loss, one brother, three sisters and other relatives and many friends.

Funeral service was held on Saturday, December 21, 1946, at 2:00 p. m., in the North Prairie church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Ray Brown, assisted by Dr. L. S. McKown, Rev. A. W. Hendrix, Rev. Carl Arnold and Rev. Gail Hines. Burial was in the North Prairie cemetery.

WILLIAM H. POOLE

Rev. W. H. Poole was born in Friendsville, Illinois, in 1863. After attending the Friendsville Academy, he taught school for several years there in Wabash County.

In 1890 he entered the Annual Conference at Mt. Carmel, and was assigned to the West Liberty Church. The following forty years of service were spent at various assignments. Among these were Noble, Albion, Effingham, Belleville, Carmi, Granite City, District Superintendent of Olney District, Edwardsville and Collinsville.

County, Ill. He attended Southern Illinois Normal and graduated from Teachers State Normal at Warrensburg, Mo. He was converted at the age of 14, a Christian all his continued life.

Rev. William P. MacVey was born in Toledo, Ohio, March 25, 1873. He entered the ministry when 18 years of age and had 50 years of active service on his retirement in 1944. Rev. and Mrs. MacVey made their home in



Baldwin, Kansas, after he retired until his last illness. He was ill for seven weeks and then moved to Holden Hospital, Carbondale, where he passed away on March 7, 1947, at the age of 73 years.

Rev. MacVey began his ministry serving one of the churches in Cincinnati, Ohio, from 1892 to the time he transferred to the Central Illinois Conference to serve the Methodist church at Pekin, in 1903. He became pastor of the Spencer Memorial Church, Rock Island, in 1906, and became President of Hedding College in 1907. He served churches at Grand Ridge, Streator and Watseka from which charge he transferred to First Church, Carbondale, in 1921, where he led in the building of the present church building. He was also active in the expansion program He of Holden Hospital. became of the Centralia Superintendent District in 1929, and on completion of the term became pastor at St. Paul Methodist Church, East St. Louis, and later at Cairo and Olney. Rev. MacVey was elected President of the Conference Claimants Society at the time of the unification of the churches and was very efficient in the organization and promotion of the society.

ALBERT RICHARDSON RANSOM

He was an extensive reader throughout his ministry, taking great pride in his library.

He joined the Southern Illinois Conference in 1907. He was ordained Deacon in 1909 and Elder in 1911. McKendree College honored him with a Doctor of Divinity degree. He completed forty years in the ministry, having served the following charges: Wheeler, Hutsonville, Bone Gap, Altamont, Effingham, Murphysboro, Belleville First, Harrisburg, Cairo, Olney, Fairfield First, Edwardsville St. John and Eldorado First. He was a member of General Conference in 1936. He was elected to Jurisdictional Conference in 1940, and in 1944. For five years, up to 1943, he was the dean of the School of Ministerial Training of the conference.



Dr. Ransom's contribution to the Kingdom of God, through the many avenues of service in the Church, has been great. He took an interest in all community affairs that were for the betterment of humanity. He had a special interest in the work of the American Bible Society. He took sick nine months before his death, but, as his doctor said, "the Lord touched his body, so that he was able to carry on his work to finish out the conference year." He preached his last sermon on the last Sunday before conference. He took quite ill after preaching this sermon. The end came on the first day of the 1947 conference. His going was announced at the close of the night service, at which Bishop Magee spoke. Dr. Ransom's name was on the program to pronounce the benediction, and when his death was announced instead, a wave of real sorrow passed over the vast crowd. The community of Eldorado thought so highly of Dr. Ransom that all the business houses were closed for two hours during the funeral.

In 1907 he was married to Miss Catherine Clark, of Newton, who survives. For forty years they enjoyed life together, with Mrs. Ransom proving a charming mistress of the parsonage and a help-meet in the work of the ministry in every sense of the word. The sons have a challenging example of a good father to remember. They are: Fletcher C. Ransom, a lawyer of Decatur; Dr. Gilbert T. Ransom, a physician of Fairfield; and Albert R. Ransom Jr., a chemist of Nashville, Tenn. He leaves three daughters-in-law whom he adored.

The funeral was held at First Church, in Eldorado, at 10:30 A. M., September 5, 1947. A second service was held at the Newton Church, at 3:00 P. M. Rev. M. C. Foltz, a very close friend, preached the sermon at both places. Others assisting were: Rev. C. R. Yost, Rev. F. F. Otto, Rev. W. L. Hanbaum, Rev. N. C. Henderson, and Rev. Paul Ott. STANDING RULES OF CONFERENCE

1. When any member of the Conference intends to object to the passage of the character of any member, he shall hand the name of such member to the President, who shall pass the name by and direct the case to be investigated.

2. When any one of our members is called from earth, it shall be the duty of the nearest pastor or district superintendent of the district to notify all the preachers in the district of such death and of the time set 'or the funeral service.

3. At each Annual Session of the Conference a publisher shall be elected to publish the Minutes of the next Annual Session of the Conference in the Journal and Year Book of the Conference, who shall be authorized to make arrangements and enter into contract for the publication in advance of the session.

4. The district superintendent of the district and the preacher in charge of the station where the Conference is to be held, together with the presidents of the several Conference societies, are instructed to arrange the program of religious exercises and, if practicable, secure their publication in the Christian Advocate.

5. The Board of Conference Claimants shall consist of six ministerial members of the Conference, each of whom shall serve three years, two being elected at each annual session of the Conference. The Conference shall add two lay members of the Conference to this Board, which members shall be elected annually. The Board shall organize each year by electing a president, secretary, and treasurer, whose names shall be published in the Conference Journal and Year Book.

6. When the names of candidates for admission on trial or for orders are called, they shall, if present, be called forward and introduced to the Conference.

7. All candidates for recognition of orders shall, unless excused by vote of the Conference, be examined in the same manner as candidates for ordination, and the Committee on Conference Relation shall inquire into the character and fitness for the traveling connection of each candidate for admission on trial, for admission into full connection, or for readmission into the Conference, and all persons desiring a change of relation or any

STANDING RULES OF CONFERENCE (Continued)

special appointment, except those taking the retired relation on reaching the age of voluntary retirement.

8. The Statistical Secretary and Conference Treasurer shall complete their work and compare their reports, and be ready to report to the Conference not later than the opening of the session of Friday morning.

9. No person in the second year's course of study shall be placed on the Statistician's or Treasurer's force.

10. The Stewards are authorized to take annually from the pro-rata due the claimants from The Book Concern a sum according to their discretion, not to exceed 10 per cent of their indebtedness to The Book Concern, until it shall be paid in full.

11. All reports of committees and resolutions shall be handed to the Secretary in duplicate.

12. No person shall have his orders recognized who comes from a church that requires a lower standard of literary qualifications than The Methodist Church, without passing an examination with us.

13. To admit on trial any candidate who is over thirty-five years of age, it shall require a two-thirds vote of all members present and voting, provided the two-thirds equal a majority of all members of the Conference.

14. We will recommend for admission into the Conference only those who are qualified and who propose to undertake regular pastoral work.

15. The plan for entertaining Annual Conference Session shall be as follows:

Sec. 1. The entertaining church shall provide lodging and breakfast for all ministerial members of the Conference, and their wives but not for any child or children; provided request for such entertainment is filed with the entertaining Church Committee on Entertainment at least seven days preceding the opening day of the Conference; except in the case of the Statistician and the Treasurer of the Conference and their respective Staffs of Assistants, whose entertainment on the same basis as above indicated shall begin as of Monday evening of Conference Week, rather than as of Wednesday evening as provided for in the case of all other Ministerial Members of the Conference and their wives; provided that the Statistician and the Treasurer of the Conference shall file with such Entertainment Committee, their names and the names of their Assistants at least seven days prior to the opening day of the Conference. If such notification shall not have been made according to the foregoing such Officers of the Conference and their Staffs of Assistants shall bear their own expenses and entertainment for Monday and Tuesday of Conference week, following which their entertainment shall be as provided for on the same basis as that affecting other Minsterial Members of the Conference.

Sec. 2. Conference Claimants and their wives, and widows of deceased ministers, shall be given full entertainment: provided that this provision shall not obtain for superannuates serving a charge. All such ministers shall come under the same provisions as those affecting ministers provided for in Sec. 1.

Sec. 3. Lay members of the Conference shall bear their own expense. We recommend that the church or churches represented by such lay members of the Conference shall provide for such member's expenses.

Sec. 4. The entertaining Church will be expected to secure room and

STANDING RULES OF CONFERENCE (Continued)

breakfast at a reasonable rate for those who bear their own expenses, and to see that noon and evening meals may be obtained at usual prices.

Sec. 5. If and when it shall appear that no invitation is forthcoming from the charges for the holding of the succeeding Annual Session of the Conference, the responsibility of arranging for and fixing the place of holding of such Annual Session of the Conference shall revert to the resident Bishop of the Area, and the District Superintendents of the Conference.

16. All members of the Conference under appointment as Conference Evangelists shall file with the Secretary of the Conference an annual report of their work of the past year, stating the number of revival meetings, held, together with the name of the place of holding of such meetings, indicating the number of professed conversions, reclamations, and accessions to the membership of the churches. Such reports to be filed in typewritten form, double-spaced, and in duplicate, for inclusion in the printed Journal and Year Book of the Conference.

17. The reports of all pastors to the Annual Conference shall be mailed or sent to the Conference Treasurer on or before Wednesday next prior to the Monday of Conference Week, addressed to the Conference Treasurer at his home address. In the absence of the receipt of such reports by the time indicated, the Conference Statistician and the Conference Treasurer shall be authorized to use the reports of the previous year from the charges so affected in compiling their reports to the Conference, and the names of all such delinquent charges and their pastors shall be published in the Conference Journal and Year Book for the year of such delinquency.

18. On the first day of the Conference, at the hour following the Communion Service, a memorial shall be held for the ministers and ministers' wives who have died during the year. The Bishop shall appoint someone to deliver the address, and also an alternate.

19. Any minister of the Conference desiring to be absent from any session or sessions of the Conference, shall report his desire to his District Superintendent who, if such excuse is granted, shall, in turn, report the names of such ministers so excused to the Secretary of the Conference, indicating the session or sessions of the Conference for which such excuse is granted. The Secretary of the Conference shall record the action in the Journal of Daily Proceedings.

20. Beginning October 1, 1938, Institutions employing a Conference member shall be required to pay annually into the Conference Claimants' Fund an amount equal to the disciplinary rate as stated in Paragraph 952, section 5.

21. The gold headed cane bequeathed to the Southern Illinois Conference by Dr. J. A. Scaritt shall be loaned to the man, residing within the bounds of the Conference, who has been a member of the Conference for the longest term of years. It shall be returned to the Conference on his death or earlier at his election. If the member to whom the cane shall have been loaned shall remove from the territory of the Conference the cane shall be returned and loaned to the next one in line. In case two or more members shall have the same number of years

In case two or more members shall have the same number of years of membership, then the cane shall be loaned to the older or oldest of this number.

22. The Conference Secretary and the publisher of the Journal and Year Book of the Conference shall edit the Minutes of each session of the Conference before the same are printed. The printed Minutes of the Conference shall be the official record of the Conference. The publishers of the Journal and Year Book of the Conference shall furnish one copy of the Journal and Year Book, without cost, to each retired minister of the Conference, and to each widow of deceased members of the Conference.

23. All members of the Conference, together with all Accepted Supply Pastors of the Conference shall, immediately following the close of the Annual Session of the Conference, notify the Secretary of the Conference, in writing, of his or her correct mailing address, and shall, in the event of ad interim changes of such address, notify the Secretary of the Conference, in writing of such change and of their new mailing address. The addresses so provided shall be published annually in the Conference Journal and Year Book, and the Secretary shall, at all times maintain a corrected list of all such ministers in his files for reference.

24. It shall require the vote of two-thirds of those present and voting to change or suspend any of these rules, except the rule determining the admission on trial in the Conference of any Candidate who has passed his thirty-fifth birthday, which rule has its own provisions.

25. Official Program. The Printed program, subject to necessary changes, shall be the official program of the Conference.

26. Official Records. The Minutes kept by the Secretary of the Conference when approved by the Committee on Daily Journal, shall be the Official Record of the Conference.

27. Assistants. The Assistants to the Secretary, the Statisticians, and the Treasurer of the Conference shall when named by such Officers, be considered elected.

28. All matters not pertaining to the regular business of this Conference shall be referred to the Committee on General Reference and Procedure.

25. Should any omissions in the Disciplinary Questions, or oversight of any necessary matter for the completion of the Work of this Conference occur, the same shall be referred to the Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents for adjustment.

30. The roll call shall be taken by all present signing the slips prepared for that purpose and presenting them to the Secretaries.

31. All members of the Conference desiring to have their vote recorded shall be within the bar of the Conference at the time the vote is received, providing that such members as may be working on the staffs of the Statistician or Treasurer may be privileged to file absentee vote with the Secretary of the Conference.

32. All announcements must be in writing and given to the Conference Secretary for reading.

33. Motions on the floor of the conference must be given to the Secretary in writing for the purpose of accuracy.

34. All material for the Journal shall be filed with the Secretary in duplicate, double-spaced, and type-written at the time of their presentation or immediately following the session in which they are presented. Materials that are not in the hands of the Secretary within five days following the adjournment of Conference may be excluded from the Journal.

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
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
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
