FIRST DAY.

WEDNESDAY, December 9th, 1896.

The North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in its Sixtieth Session in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Kinston, N. C., Wednesday morning, 9 o'clock, December 9th, Bishop Alpheus W. Wilson in the chair.

On motion of A. R. Raven, J. T. Kendall was granted permission to make a statement to the Conference.

Bishop Wilson appointed E. A. Yates and R. A. Willis to express the thanks of the Conference to Mr. Washington Duke for his large and generous donation to the endowment fund to Trinity College.

At the request of W. S. Black a collection was taken for R. P. Troy. It amounted to \$104.20.

Revs. J. H. Weaver, D. D., and J. J. Renn, D. D., of the Western North Carolina Conference, were introduced to the Conference.

Question 4 was called, viz: "Who are admitted into full connection?"

Robert W. Bailey, Solon A. Cotton, Samuel Leffers, Rufus Bradley, Raleigh A. Bruton, Allison L. Ormond, having passed the examination of character and having been approved by the Examining Committee, were examined by the Bishop in open Conference and admitted into full connection.

W. W. Smith, LL.D., representing the Board of Education

of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, addressed the Conference on the question of education.

J. C. Kilgo introduced the following resolutions :

Among the many vital questions appealing to the Church for solution, none is of greater importance than education. The principles of our religion inspire the largest intellectual aspirations, as well as the greatest spiritual development. The Church has, therefore, always defended education, and through the centuries been the source of our educational progress. Should the Church cease to be interested in education, ignorance would multiply, and all real educational progress would be at an end.

But besides the history of the Church in education, it is bound by the highest interests of our individual and social life to maintain an aggressive educational policy. Infidelity has fled itself in science and enthroned itself in colleges and universities, and by a distorted and incomplete idea of education, has wrought great harm. Along with all education must go a purpose to build up a faith in God, the only secure foundation for national or individual life. Otherwise, the worst results are to be expected from education.

In our own State, as well as in other States, there is a conflict between the State and Church in educational work, and especially in the work of higher education. In many ways this want of sympathy is manifested, and the Church is forced to carry forward its educational work in the face of this opposition. Many of our people do not understand the position of the Church in education, and there are many sincere people outside of the Church who do not understand it. The time has come for this Conference to define its position in education, and settle an educational policy that it will defend and develop.

Therefore be it

RESOLVED, 1st. That we commit ourselves uncompromisingly to Christian education, and insist that our people in their homes teach their children the doctrines of Christ, and patronize those common schools whose influences will not be harmful, and that they patronize those colleges that give positive instruction in the truths of the Bible.

2nd. That we regard the free public schools a necessity to the State, and we declare ourselves fully in sympathy with them. These schools are for the people, and should be made efficient. We favor a sufficient tax to operate them at least six or eight months in the year, and we pledge ourselves to do all in our power to develop a public sentiment that will secure this result.

3rd. That while we do not think it the function of the State to teach

religion in its colleges, and while we recognize the fact that there are many citizens who do not wish to patronize Church colleges, and while we have no disposition to exterminate or do injury to State colleges, yet, as citizens of North Carolina, as well as members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, we do not believe that it is just to the Church to tax its members to carry on an educational work to the injury of Church colleges, or to put the State colleges in unfair competition with the Church colleges. We believe that it is out of harmony with the principles of our government and morally wrong for the State to undertake to furnish free higher education to the few at the expense of the many, and that all free tuitions in the State University, in so far as they are based upon the appropriation of public monies, should be discontinued.

That we request the legislature to discontinue the appropriation of public money for free scholarships and tuitions at the University.

4th. Knowing that the income from tuitions is not sufficient to meet the current expenses of a college or university, we are not opposed to appropriations to the University, but we think these appropriations should be limited to such amounts as are necessary to meet the deficiency in current expenses after tuitions have been collected from all students, except those to whom private scholarships have been given.

5th. That as the aim of the State in the establishment of the Normal and Industrial College at Greensboro, N. C., and the Agricultural and Mechanical College at Raleigh, N. C., was to provide technical and not higher literary education, that we declare ourselves in sympathy with them as long as they adhere to their original purpose, but we are opposed to any policy that will in any way divert them from this aim.

On motion of J. A. Cuninggim, the Bishop was requested to draw his draft on the Treasurer of the Conference Trustees for two hundred and three dollars and ninety-one cents in favor of the Joint Board of Finance.

J. R. Sawyer presented report of the Sunday School Board. It was amended by striking out the section regarding Sunday School Secretary. The report was then withdrawn.

W. C. Norman presented the report of the Special Committee appointed to consider a paper from the State Board of Charities, and it was adopted. (See Document No. 10 of Appendix.)

Rev. T. H. Law, D. D., District Superintendent for the American Bible Society for the District of North and South Carolina, was introduced to the Conference.

The unfinished business, the consideration of the resolutions introduced by E. A. Yates and others, regarding Christian education, which was pending at the close of the session of yesterday, was taken up.

L. L. Smith moved the following amendment: "Strike out all after the word 'efficient' in line 3 of the 2nd resolution and substitute therefor the following: 'That within the constitutional limits of taxation we recommend an increased appropriation for common schools.'"

The amendment was accepted, and the resolutions as amended were adopted.

The report of the Board of Education was presented, and re-committed to the Board.

Question 18 was called, viz: "Who are superannuated?"

L. S. Massey, from the Committee on Conference Relations, submitted a report recommending that M. C. Thomas, N. A. Hooker, J. B. Martin, T. B. Reeks, T. Page Ricaud, J. C. McCall, Solomon Pool and R. P. Troy be granted a superannuated relation, which was adopted.

J. N. Cole submitted the report of the Committee on Books and Periodicals.

W. B. Harker presented a minority report from certain members of the Committee.

J. W. Jenkins moved that the minority report be substituted for that part of the report of the Committee relating to the question of a Conference organ.

On motion of M. C. Thomas, L. W. Crawford was granted permission to make statements and to speak to the question under consideration.

W. S. Rone moved that when we adjourn we do so to meet at 3 o'clock, P. M.

On motion of W. H. Townsend, the Commission from the Western North Carolina Conference, composed of J. R. Brooks, J. H. Weaver, J. J. Renn and C. H. Ireland, was granted permission to speak on the question under consideration.

At 1.07, pending the consideration of the newspaper question, Conference adjourned.

APPENDIX.

MEMOIR OF REV. GEORGE E. WYCHE.

Rev. George E. Wyche, son of William E. and Sally Wyche, of Granville county, N. C., joined the North Carolina Conference at Greensboro in 1856.

I have not been able to learn the date of his birth nor the time and place of his conversion.

His first work was the Williamston Circuit, H. H. Gibbons being the senior preacher on the charge. In 1858 he served the New Berne circuit. At the Conference of that year, held at New Berne, he was received into full connection, and was ordained deacon by Bishop Kavanaugh. In 1859 he served the Fayetteville circuit; 1860, the Nashville circuit. At the close of the year at Salisbury he was ordained elder by Bishop Paine, and was sent to the Franklinsville circuit. In 1862 he was preacher in charge of the Stokes circuit; 1863, of the South Guilford circuit; 1864-'65 of the Troy circuit; 1866, of the Uwharrie circuit; 1867, again on the Stokes circuit; 1868-'69, Portsmouth, Oeracoke and Hatteras; 1870-'71 Wilkes circuit. This was his last charge—fifteen years of faithful itinerant service, in which many, many souls had been turned unto righteousness, and darkened lives had been brought into the light, had been given to the Church. Just after that time his mind failed. At the Annual Conference at Charlotte he was placed on the superannuated list, and on December 12th, 1877, was put in the Insane Asylum at Raleigh, N. C., where he remained till his death, February 28th, 1895.

Twenty-five years seem a long time for a man to be under a cloud—to be cut off from the society of kindred and friends; but Eternity will give him long and sweet communion with them. Most of his classmates and those who entered the ministry before him are with him in the presence of God and the holy angels. May we all meet them there.

MEMOIR OF REV. R. L. WARLICK

Rev. Robert L. Warlick was born in Burke county, N. C. near Table Rock, June 7th, 1856.

Brother Warlick was converted under the ministry of Rev. G. W. Ivey and was licensed to preach in 1880, under the pastorate of Rev. S. V. Hoyle—Rev. J. S. Nelson, Presiding Elder. In December of the same year, he was received on trial into the North Carolina Conference, at the session held at Winston, N. C. He passed his examination in order and was ordained deacon in 1882 by Bishop Keener at Raleigh, N. C., where he was received into full connection, and in 1884 was ordained elder by Bishop Parker in Wilmington, N. C. From our annual minutes we learn that he served the following charges: 1881, junior preacher on Morganton circuit, 1882, Onslow circuit; 1883-4, Pilot Mountain Mission; 1885, West Uwharrie circuit; 1886, Junior Preacher on Clinton circuit; 1887-88, Carver's Creek circuit; 1889, Brunswick circuit; 1890, Swan Quarter circuit; 1891-92, Magnolia circuit; 1893, Greenville circuit; 1894-5, Dare circuit.

At the Conference held in Elizabeth City in December, 1895, he was appointed to Ocracoke and Portsmouth, where he arrived on the 10th of January, 1896, and began his work.

On Saturday morning, 25th of January, he went to his first appointment at Portsmouth. He preached Saturday night and went home with brother James Mayor to spend the night. At bed time he retired, bright and cheerful as usual, apparently perfectly well. There was no disturbance during the night. The family slept in quietness. Next morning, when called for breakfast, there was no response from the preacher's room. Brother Mayor entered and found his pastor had answered a higher call.

The rustling of the messenger's pinions was not heard. No mortal knows at what hour the tenement was unlocked and the spirit of Robert L. Warlick was summoned into the presence of his Lord.

Away from home, alone, in the silent hours of the night, he was released from earth's conflicts.

Brother Warlick was loyal to his Church and faithful to the vows he had taken, so that wherever sent, he went cheerfully, accepting his appointment as his heritage to cultivate for his Lord. He labored for souls and was successful. Cheerful in disposition, quiet

in his manners, humble in heart, he impressed himself upon the people as a good man, and very many thank God that he passed through the world.

On the 9th of March, 1857, he was happily married to Miss Dora Castin, of Onslow county, who, with her two little boys, is left in the shadow of a great bereavement. He was devoted to his family and his married life was full of joy.

His wife was not permitted to minister unto him in the last hour, and hear the last utterances as his immortal spirit was passing from earth. In the quiet of her home, on that bright Sunday morning, while perhaps, praying for her husband's success in delivering the message, she was stricken with the startling declaration "Brother Warlick is not, for God has taken him."

His remains were carried to Tabernacle church, in Onslow county, and there laid to rest in the quiet country grave-yard, to await the resurrection morn.

“At midnight came the cry,
‘To meet thy Lord prepare!’
He woke, and caught his Captain's eye,
Then, strong in faith and prayer,
His spirit, with a bound,
Left its encumb'ring clay;
His tent at sunrise, on the ground,
A darkened ruin lay.”

MEMOIR OF REV. T. W. GUTHRIE.

The Rev. Thomas William Guthrie, son of James Claiborne Guthrie and Nancy Polk Clegg, his wife, was born in Chatham county, North Carolina, December the 21st, 1828, and died at his home, in the town of Rockingham, N. C., March the 13th, 1896.

He was reared in a Christian home, and fairly well educated for that day. When twelve years old he was converted and joined the Church. At an early age he was licensed to preach, and was admitted on trial in the North Carolina Conference in 1851 at Salisbury, Bishop Andrew presiding. He was received into full connection at

the session of the Conference held in Raleigh in 1853, and there ordained deacon by Bishop Paine; and he was ordained elder by Bishop Andrew at the Conference held in Wilmington in 1855. He filled the following appointments: 1852, Currituck; 1853, Roanoke circuit; 1854, Hillsboro; 1855, Beaufort and Straits; 1856, Tarboro; 1857-58, Plymouth; 1859, Fifth Street, Wilmington; 1860, Salisbury Station; 1861-62, Front Street, Wilmington; 1863-64, Louisburg; 1865, Smithville; 1866-68, Fayetteville; 1869-72, Rockingham; 1873-76, Laurinburg; 1877-78, Wadesboro; 1879-80, Lilesville circuit; 1881, junior preacher on Lilesville circuit; 1882-83, St. John's Station. During the year 1883 he was removed by Bishop Keener from St. John's Station to the Charlotte District, which he served as presiding elder the balance of that and the three next succeeding years; 1887-88, presiding elder of the Wilmington District; 1889, Lilesville circuit; 1890, Salisbury Station; 1891-02, presiding elder of the Shelby District; at the close of the Conference year 1892 he was transferred from the Western North Carolina Conference, of which he was a member by virtue of his appointment in its territory at the time of its creation by the General Conference, to the North Carolina Conference, and for the year 1893 was a supernumerary; 1894-95, Richmond circuit; 1896, junior preacher on Rockingham Station.

As indicated by his appointments, Bro. Guthrie was a man of good abilities. As a preacher he had few equals. His forceful reasoning and his remarkable descriptive powers placed him easily among the first public speakers of his State. He was prolific of new thought and phases of thought. Intelligent people of the town in which he made his home for almost three decades, say that his preaching was always fresh, original and strong.

Bro. Guthrie was a companionable man, kind neighbor, and liberal in his gifts to the institutions of the Church and to the poor. So true was this trait in his character that it was deemed worthy of special mention.

In September, 1859, Rev. Thomas W. Guthrie was happily married to Miss Emily P. Robbins, of Washington, N. C. Rev. William E. Pell solemnizing the rites of matrimony between them. Of this union were born four children, two sons and two daughters, all of whom, with their mother, survive their father. The children are all happily married and succeeding well in the world. They are, without exception, members of our Church.

On the 31st day of December, 1868, Bro. Guthrie went as a pastor,

removing his family with him, to Rockingham, and that town afterwards, almost continuously, was the place of his residence. There he provided a good home, reared his children, and there he fell on sleep.

His last illness was not long protracted. He was conscious almost to the last and expressed himself as ready to die. The end came. The funeral service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. T. Lyon, in the presence of a large congregation in our Church at Rockingham, and, after the reading of the burial service at the grave by the same minister, the mortal remains of Rev. Thomas William Guthrie were interred in the Steele Cemetery of that town.

He was a man of rare intellectual power, whose death we mourn, and for whose family we fervently pray. J. T. GIBBS.

MEMOIR OF REV. T. C. LOVIN.

The Rev. Thomas Curtis Lovin was born in Richmond county, N. C., October 20th, 1850. Of his parentage and early life we have no source of information at hand, but suppose from his youth, manners and pure character that the home influences under which he was reared must have been benign and Christian. In early life he gave his heart to the Lord and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Called of God to preach the Gospel, he prepared himself for the work by securing such educational advantages as lay within his reach.

While at Rutherford College, in 1885, he was licensed to preach.

At the ensuing Annual Conference, held at Charlotte, he was admitted on trial in the traveling connection, and was assigned to the Brunswick circuit, which he served with fidelity and made many warm friends; 1887 he traveled the Wilkes circuit; 1888 the Montgomery circuit; 1889-90 the Onslow; 1891 the Carteret. He was ordained deacon at Fayetteville 1887 by Bishop Key, and elder at Greensboro 1889 by Bishop Hargrove.

In January, 1887, he was married to Miss Sallie Haywood, of his own native county. It was a fortunate marriage for him. Prudent, intelligent, pious, she was truly a help-meet for him, and the charm

of a happy married life was theirs, marred only by the early and sore physical affliction which came to him.

While on his way to Onslow, in the extreme cold weather of that winter, he was exposed by travel to some of its severest cold, which brought on an attack of typhoid pneumonia, and for weeks he hovered between life and death. He never was well again. A severe pulmonary trouble followed, which finally ended his life. For three years after, he continued to work in much weakness and suffering, but with unabated fidelity.

At the Conference of 1891, at Greenville, he asked for a superannuated relation. To do this was a great trial, for he loved the work of the ministry with an intense devotion.

In his enforced retirement there came to him ever and anon a heart-yearning to take again his place in the ranks with his brethren. He preached when he could and often to the edification and pleasure of his hearers.

On April 14th of the present year he passed from his suffering to the better and heavenly country.

Bro. Lovin was possessed of good natural mental ability. His life was pure, his purposes noble, his character well formed after the Christly model.

His end was peaceful. When dying he said: "I have a home above," quoted a part of the hymn

"Children of the heavenly king,"

and then repeated, "Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death I will fear no evil, for thou art with me."

He asked his friends to meet him in heaven, spoke comforting words of parting to his grief-stricken wife, and then gently as the day dies when the sun, coronalled with golden splendor, sinks into the west, so gently he fell asleep in Jesus, to awake amid the unfolding glories of the eternal day.

MEMOIR OF REV. DANIEL REID.

Rev. Daniel Reid, son of Capt. Daniel and Sarah M. E. Reid, was born in Washington, N. C., October 22d, 1850, and died in Jacksonville, N. C., June 17th, 1896, after 18 days illness. The funeral was conducted by his presiding elder, Rev. W. S. Rone, and Bro. J. T. Kendall and others also were present. He was converted in New Berne, N. C., in 1879, through the instrumentality of Mrs. Daniel McPherson, and joined the M. E. Church, South, and was licensed to exhort the same year. He was licensed to preach in 1880, in which vocation he did much good assisting the preachers in charge of Craven and Jones circuits.

In 1887 he supplied Core Sound Mission; 1888 Bath circuit. At the end of this year (1888) he was received on trial in the North Carolina Conference at New Berne, N. C., after which he served the following charges: Vanceboro circuit, 1889; Kennekeet circuit, 1890; Sampson circuit, 1891; Carver's Creek circuit, 1892; Brunswick circuit, 1893-04; Onslow circuit, 1895-96—to his death. At the Conference in Wilson, N. C., 1890, he was admitted into full connection, and ordained deacon by Bishop Keener. In December, 1892, he was ordained elder in Goldsboro, N. C., by Bishop Duncan. He was twice married, and leaves a widow with seven little children—may the Lord take care of them.

Bro. Reid's parents were members of the Presbyterian Church, and devout Christians, who, to use his father's own words, "Both together lovingly and solemnly gave him to the Lord, and promised to educate him for His service in the ministry." The results of the late war, however, prevented this "solemn promise" from being executed. Nevertheless, the Lord did most wonderfully recognize this early dedication by calling him to preach his Gospel and giving him many seals to his ministry. He had naturally a good mind, and was a good preacher; but more than all, he was a good man. One of his prominent members said after his death, that "In many traits of his character he was the most Christ-like of any one he had ever known. He was quite unselfish—charitable almost to a fault; it was easy for him to follow the standard Mr. Wesley advocated: "Let our superfluities give way to another's necessities, and our necessities to another's extremities." It was his highest pleasure to live and labor for the benefit of others.

His standard of piety was high. While holding a revival on the Brunswick circuit, he received a special baptism of the Holy Spirit, which seemed almost to overpower him at the time; but gaining strength, he rose to his feet, claiming perfect love, or entire sanctification, and made a most wonderful and powerful appeal to the congregation. This fiery baptism upon the preacher resulted in the greatest revival that section of the country had ever witnessed. From that time he preached and labored with more acceptability and efficiency than before, and seemed to have a more constant enjoyment of the presence of the Holy Spirit.

The Wilmington District Conference was held on his charge at Jacksonville this year. About the beginning of the Conference he said to a friend that his experience for a little while was not always as bright as it had been, but that he must have it again in all of its fullness. This he sought and obtained during the session of the Conference, and only a short while before he was taken with the illness which proved to be fatal.

While his friends did not apprehend any immediate danger of death, yet he did himself believe that he would never recover. But he said to the same friend with whom he had the first conversation about his experience, that he was again on the mountain top, and was ready for anything that God might appoint.

Before taking leave of the world, he attempted to sing some old familiar hymns, and peacefully passed away to that reward awaiting the finally faithful.

MEMOIR OF REV. J. W. GIBSON.

Rev. John Washington Gibson, son of Eli and Elizabeth Gibson, was born April the 16th, 1866, and died in Richmond county, N. C., at the home of his brother-in-law, Daniel Lytch, July the 10th, 1896.

Bro. Gibson, after attending other preparatory schools, completed the course of study at Oak Ridge Institute, and spent one year at Trinity College.

He was married on December the 23d, 1891, to Miss Sallie A. Smith, daughter of Rev. N. McN. and Flora A. Smith. He was licensed to preach in the fall of 1892, was received on trial into the North Carolina Conference in December, 1893, at Wilmington, North

Carolina. His first charge was Spring Hope circuit, a large field of labor, with nine appointments and a membership of about 600.

He served Spring Hope circuit two years and made full proof of his ministry. He thoroughly organized his work, establishing Sunday Schools at nearly every point, building one church at Spring Hope and letting out the contract for another. His people were devoted to him, they considered him a consecrated man and a good preacher. His ministry among them gave them loftier ideas of Christian life and stimulated them to holier living. It was while on Spring Hope circuit that he was stricken down with pneumonia, and, being full of zeal for his Lord, he entered upon his work before he had fully recovered; cold settled in his throat and lungs, from which he never recovered.

He was appointed to Swan Quarter circuit at our last Conference. He bravely went to his work, but only remained there a short time. Though his association with his people was brief, yet his moral heroism enthroned him in their hearts as a true servant of God.

At the advice of his physician, he went further up the country among his people, where his relatives and friends hoped he would improve in health, but God willed otherwise. He spent most of his time during his sickness with his parents, near Gibson Station, N. C., but would visit, as he had strength to do so, among his people.

While in school at Oak Ridge Institute, his father wrote to the principal of the school to ascertain how John was progressing. Among other good things the principal said: "John is one of our very best students; he has talents and is improving them."

Rev. G. A. Oglesby, his first presiding elder, says: "Bro. Gibson impressed me from the beginning as an unusually good man." Had he lived he would have been among the most useful men of our Conference.

Bro. Gibson was devoted to his aged parents. His letters to them when he was first taken sick were full of filial tenderness, love and abiding faith in God. He was one of the most grateful persons for kindnesses shown him during his sickness that the writer has ever known. He was thoughtful to show his gratitude when he could not speak above a whisper and was unable to raise his head.

While in the vigor of young manhood, laying large plans for the future, he was called to close earth's labors and to enter upon heaven's reward. With nothing undone that loved ones and friends could do, the shades of life's evening gathered about him, the flesh failed, but

the evidences of the reality of eternal life were manifest in his abiding faith and triumphant entrance through death's gates into the city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God.

A devoted wife, two sweet children and many relatives and friends have heavy hearts, but they have hope. They know if they are faithful as was their departed loved one that they will meet him where sorrow and sighing, pain and death are felt and feared no more.

MEMOIR OF REV. W. B. DOUB.

Rev. William Blake Doub was born in Raleigh, N. C., January 20th, 1852, and died at his post in Durham, N. C., August 3d, 1896, in the 45th year of his age. He was the eldest son of Prof. W. C. Doub, who for many years was one of our most prominent Christian educators. His paternal and maternal grandfathers, Rev. Peter Doub and Rev. Bennet T. Blake, were for many years honored leaders in the North Carolina Conference, and in the development of his character young Doub had blended in him many of the noblest qualities of his honored ancestors.

When quite a boy he was converted to God, and from the beginning to the close of his Christian career he maintained the highest type of Christian living.

Bro. Doub was blessed in early life with superior educational advantages. After finishing his academical course he entered Trinity College, where he was honored and loved by both faculty and students on account of the beauty of his spotless life and his diligence as a student. He went forth from his alma mater with a well-trained mind to engage in life's pursuits. After remaining a few years in business life, he became fully impressed that he was called to the sacred work of the Christian ministry, and accordingly on July the 1st, 1876, at a quarterly conference held at Earpsboro, on the Rolesville circuit, he was licensed to preach, Rev. Junius P. Moore being presiding elder. He joined the North Carolina Conference at Greensboro, December, 1876, and was appointed junior preacher on the Pee Dee circuit, Rev. M. V. Sherrill being preacher in charge.

He served the following charges: Pee Dee circuit, J. P., 1877; Pekin circuit, P. C., 1878; Plymouth station, 1879-80; Williamston, 1881-82-83; Carthage circuit, 1884 85-86-87; Jonesboro, 1888-89; Laurinburg, 1890-91; Rockingham, 1892-93-94; Main Street, 1895-96

He was ordained deacon by Bishop Geo. F. Pierce at the Conference in Charlotte in 1878, and was ordained elder by Bishop Keener in 1880, at the Conference held in Winston.

He was united in marriage, January 7th, 1880, to Miss Josie S. Bryan, of Jonesboro, N. C. Ten children were born to them, four of whom preceded the father into the heavenly home, while six remain with the stricken mother to share her griefs and burdens. Added to this home circle are his own brother, Landon C. Doub, and the step-mother and two half sisters and a half brother, who loved him devotedly and mourn for him sincerely. Then there are in Durham and elsewhere multitudes to whom he had preached and for whom he had prayed, who, with his brethren in the ministry, all feel a personal loss in his death.

No truer man, none more thoroughly conscientious, and none more fully consecrated, ever moved among us than W. B. Doub. He was transparently honest and good and holy.

Sweet-spirited and gentle toward all with whom he came in touch, yet firm and unwavering in his fidelity to truth and duty, he challenged the respect and love of his brethren in the ministry and the abiding affection of the charges he served. As a preacher, he went not into the sanctuary with "unbeaten oil," but fresh from the divine treasury, he was always instructive, and often his sermons were strong in argument, illustration and spiritual power.

He was for several years Secretary of the Board of Missions of the North Carolina Conference, and we all know how he was in love with his work and did all he could to increase the interest of his brethren in this great and broad department of work for Christ.

Painstaking and industrious in all of his work, looking diligently after every interest of the church committed to his hands, always a true and faithful shepherd of the flock over which the Holy Ghost had made him overseer, through summer's heat and winter's cold, for nearly twenty years, with a glad heart and willing mind, he did the work of an itinerant Methodist preacher, warning sinners, pointing penitents to the Lamb of God, confirming the saints and carrying comfort to the homes of the afflicted and sorrowing. Who can estimate the good accomplished by such a life?

The funeral services were conducted from Main street church, Durham, in the midst of the weeping flock, who greatly mourned the death of their beloved shepherd. The solemn exercises were conducted by Rev. Dr. Jesse A. Cuninggim, presiding elder of the District, assisted by Rev. Dr. E. A. Yates, Revs. Jno. N. Cole, L. E. Thompson, N. E. Coltrane, R. W. Bailey, Reuben Hibbard, A. A. Pruden and W. C. Norman. We laid his body to rest in the city cemetery hard by the sleeping remains of Baxter Phillips Junius T. Harris and V. A. Sharpe, his former comrades in the kingdom and patience of Jesus.

Sweet be thy rest, dear brother. Thy memory will be precious to us, and thy life, pure and true and lovely, will be to us an inspiration until we stand with thee "within the portal of light beneath a dawn whose day shall know no cloud nor close."

MEMOIR OF REV. J. B. BAILEY.

James Belmore Bailey was born in Suffolk, Va., October 9, 1818, and died in Wilmington, N. C., August 13, 1896, in his 78th year.

When 13 years old upon the death of his father, he went to Mississippi to reside with his uncle, Joseph Hannaford, where he remained until grown. At an early age he began to teach school and soon became a popular and successful teacher. He was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church while quite young, and very soon obtained license to preach. About the year 1844 he returned to Suffolk and was employed by Rev. Thomas Crowder as a junior preacher in his district. While he regarded teaching his special work, he several times served as a supply and as junior preacher within the bounds of the Virginia Conference. In the year 1850 he decided to enter the traveling connection, and in November of that year he was admitted on trial into the North Carolina Conference at Greensboro. In 1858 he was received into full connection, and at the Conference held in Raleigh in 1862 he was ordained elder by Bishop Early. He successfully served the following charges: 1857, Columbia circuit; 1858, Neuse circuit; 1859-60, Snow Hill circuit; 1861-62, Topsail circuit; 1863, Smithville circuit; 1864-65, Bladen

circuit; 1866-69, Neuse circuit; 1870-71, Kenansville circuit; 1872-73, Cokesbury circuit; 1874, Buckhorn circuit; 1875, Whiteville circuit; 1876-79, Topsail circuit; 1880-82, Monroe circuit; 1883-84, Elizabeth circuit; 1885-88, Lincolnton circuit; 1889, Gastonia circuit; 1890, Cherryville circuit.

At the division of the Conference in 1890, he was left in the Western North Carolina Conference, but at the close of that year he was placed upon the superannuated list and transferred to the North Carolina Conference. In this Conference he has continued in the superannuated relation until his death.

In the year 1849 he was happily married to Miss Margaret G. Arline, of Gates county, N. C., who, with two sons and three grand-children, live to mourn their loss.

Bro. Bailey was modest, unassuming and retiring in disposition, and yet in the social circle he was pleasant and entertaining. He was positive in his convictions, strong in his attachments and confiding in his nature and character.

As a preacher he was practical, edifying and instructive. He preached not himself, but Christ Jesus the Lord. Under his ministry believers were stimulated and encouraged, sinners were awakened and many souls were brought to Christ.

He was never in good health, and through much of his life was a great sufferer, and yet for 34 years, without break, he did the work of a traveling preacher, and while on the retired list, and up to his last sickness, filled regular appointments every month. He was always glad to preach the Gospel as circumstances would allow, that he might "finish his course with joy, and the ministry which he had received of the Lord Jesus."

His end was as becometh the Gospel of Christ. Assured that his work was done, full of years, full of peace and full of eternal life, he gently laid aside his mortal frame and entered into rest.

"Soldier of Christ, well done!
Praise be thy new employ;
And while eternal ages run,
Rest in thy Saviour's joy."

MEMOIR OF REV. J. B. BOBBITT.

The Rev. James Burrow Bobbitt, son of Sherwood Haywood and Annie Eliza Bobbitt, was born in Halifax county, N. C., April 23d, 1835, and died in Raleigh September 1st, 1896. He was converted and joined the Methodist Church at Centenary, Warren county, at the age of 15 years. He was one of the class of thirteen who joined the North Carolina Conference at Wilmington, November, 1855. Six of his class-mates preceded him to heaven, while six of us still abide in our tents, hoping to strike them at the command of our great Captain and enter the land of promise.

He was ordained deacon at Golsboro, November, 1857, by Bishop G. F. Pierce, and was ordained elder at Beaufort, November, 1859, by Bishop John Early. He served the Church in the following relations: 1856, P. C. of Duplin circuit; 1857, Germantown circuit; 1858, Hillsboro station; 1859, Normal College and High Point; 1860, Raleigh circuit; 1861, Tarboro station; 1862, supernumerary at New Berne, L. S. Burkhead P. C.; 1863-64, Statesville station; 1865-66, Wake circuit; 1867, Beaufort station; 1868, he purchased the organ of the North Carolina Conference, "The Episcopal Methodist," and was duly appointed editor; 1869, his appointment as editor was renewed. During that year he changed the name of the paper to "Raleigh Christian Advocate," and was consecutively appointed editor until 1878, when, having sold the "Advocate" to Revs. Black and Reid, he was assigned to Cary circuit; 1880, agent of Trinity College; 1881, Edenton Street, Raleigh, with Rev. A. A. Boshamer, P. C.; 1882-83, Rockingham station; 1884-85, Cary circuit; 1886, his wife's health was so impaired he carried her to Baltimore, and was transferred to that Conference; 1887, returning to North Carolina, he was appointed to Boundary Street, Goldsboro, where he succeeded in building "St. John's" church; 1888, he was financial agent for Trinity College; he was also one of its trustees for several years; 1889-90, on Rolesville circuit, Rev. B. C. Allred, P. C.; 1891-94, he sustained a supernumerary relation in connection with Central, Raleigh, and was in the same relation with Edenton Street, 1895-96, to the date of his death. Thus we find he was in the pastorate 17 years, agent for Trinity College 2 years, owner and editor of the Conference organ 10 years, and without regular work 11 years.

Dr. Bobbitt was endowed with more than ordinary ability. He

preached well, and occasionally with great power. In some of his pastorates he had extensive revivals and good success in all his church work. He was a successful manager of business matters, as was evidenced during his ownership of the "Advocate" and in the prosperity of his own personal affairs. As a writer and editor, he showed force and skill, so that the paper grew in popularity under his control. For five or six years before his death he had been afflicted with a most distressing form of asthma. His pastor, Rev. W. C. Norman, says: "His sufferings were very great, but in patience he recognized the chastening hand of his Lord. His faith grew more and more triumphant as he neared the end of his pilgrimage. It was my privilege to visit him and to talk and pray with him in his last days, and always his testimony to the sustaining power of God's grace was unequivocal; and his greatest joy was manifested when in communion with God." Oh, the blessed exchange from earth to Heaven, which brings perfected communion with God forever.

His brother, Rev. W. H. Bobbitt, of such precious memory, with two brothers and two sisters, had gone before him, while Thomas J. Bobbitt of Littleton; Haywood Bobbitt and Mrs. M. E. Eidson, of Elkin, and Mrs. M. R. Arrington, of Halifax county, N. C., still live to mourn their loss.

Dr. Bobbitt was twice married. On November 17th, 1858, to Miss Mary M. Miller, of New Berne, N. C. Of this union there were five children, two of whom, with their mother, preceded him to the world of spirits. His second marriage, with Miss Hattie M. Hervey, of Raleigh, occurred October 1st, 1860. His last wife, with three sons of the first marriage—Dr. W. H. Bobbitt, J. H. Bobbitt, druggist, and Alexander Bobbitt, all of Raleigh, survive the husband and father. Their devotion to, and care of, him through this long period of suffering, was beautiful. May the Great Shepherd and Bishop of their souls comfort and keep them unto eternal life.

The funeral services were held from Edenton Street church, conducted by Rev. W. C. Norman, assisted by Dr. J. C. Kilgo, Rev. J. N. Cole and Rev. L. Branson; after which he was interred in Oakwood cemetery to await the resurrection morn. Oh, the glories of that day! May our whole class, with garments made white in the blood of the Lamb, be glorified together with Him.

WHEREAS, the Minutes of the two Conferences in the State show that the Church raised and expended during the last year \$11,221 for Home Missionary work, and \$18,098 for Foreign Missionary work; and

WHEREAS, the life and activities of the Methodist Church have been, and are, projected upon the basic proposition of the Holy Scripture that "the poor have the Gospel preached unto them;" therefore,

RESOLVED, That all our preachers and laymen are hereby advised to keep their zeal revived in this charity work, carrying the Gospel to the poor, the bound and the outcasts, counting it an honor to do this gladly for Jesus' sake.

RESOLVED, That we will seek ways of doing this as far as possible, as the means at our disposal will permit.

RESOLVED, That the "State Board of Public Charities" is hereby requested to use its influence with the Board of Commissioners in the several counties to have the Gospel service at the county houses systematized on the plan of the State institutions at Raleigh, and that the traveling expenses of ministers in such service be paid by the said Board out of the county funds; and

We recommend the appointment of a committee to co-operate with committees from other churches to memorialize the Legislature to provide for a chaplaincy for the State farms.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Your Board begs leave to submit the following report: We are much pleased with the hopeful outlook of the Sunday School interest as represented to us in a communication from the Sunday School Editor and referred to us by you to-day. We heartily endorse the Sunday School literature published by our Editor, and exceedingly regret to notice that so few teachers are using the "Sunday School Magazine," which, in our judgment, is not excelled by any publication of its kind.

We urge upon our people the use of our literature and re-affirm our condemnation of any substitution therefor; and we again beseech our people to give the Bible more prominence in all of our Sunday Schools.

We again offer the following recommendations for adoption:

1st. That the Sunday School District Conferences shall hereafter be composed of one delegate from each Sunday School having less than one hundred members, and two delegates from each school having one hundred or more members, each Sunday School to be permitted to elect its own delegates.

2d. That a joint anniversary of the Sunday School Board and Epworth League Committee be held annually, on Thursday night, during the session of the Annual Conference, and that a suitable programme for the same be published by the chairman of said boards.

3rd. That a joint meeting of the Epworth Leagues and Sunday Schools or their representatives, to be appointed by the same, be held annually, not later than the last of July, the time and place of the first meeting to be determined by the chairman of the Epworth League Committee and the chairman of the Sunday School Board, and the Conference to appoint time and place for subsequent meetings.

4th. That there be in connection with each District Conference a meeting of the workers in Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues, and that the presiding elders are requested to appoint the time of holding the District Conferences early enough in the week to enable them to devote two days, if necessary, to the consideration of these interests.

Your Board, realizes the great importance of the Sunday School work, as shown by the fact that about 85 per cent. of the Church membership to-day comes from this institution; yet, notwithstanding this, we recognize and deplore the sad inefficiency of the great majority of its officers and teachers, and urge upon them the importance of more careful preparation for this great work.

Our Treasurer's report shows a balance on hand from last year of \$93.33, half of which goes to the Board of Education.

The Board of Finance reports due us \$127.02, making a total of \$173.65 now on hand for distribution to needy Sunday Schools.

This Board continues its offer to donate funds to indigent Sunday Schools for the purpose of supplying them with our Church literature, provided in every instance that the school so aided shall have raised for this purpose a sum equal to that asked for, not to exceed the amount of \$25, and we urge upon those schools in need of literature and unable to purchase the same, to apply to this fund for aid. All applications so made must be made through our Secretary, Rev. J. O. Guthrie, as no aid can be obtained except upon his endorsement, and all moneys raised on Children's Day shall be forwarded to said Secretary, who will forward the same to the Treasurer taking his receipt therefor.

We rejoice in the assurance that Trinity College is now entering upon the brightest and most prosperous period of her already miraculous history. She is indeed having a resurrection with power. In all respects that constitute a first-class college, she is now abreast with our best Southern institutions. The great opportunities and possibilities now within her reach promise to give her a range of influence second to none. We wish to emphasize the fact that Trinity College is, in the broadest sense, a distinctively Christian College—Christ is her one ideal, and Christian manhood the inspiring goal towards which she moves. She is committed to the one business of the education of our sons, according to the teachings of the Man of Galilee, which shall fit them to serve their generation, according to the will of God, both in Church and State.

BURLINGTON AND JONESBORO ACADEMIES.

These schools have been accepted as fitting schools to Trinity College, and we commend them to our people as worthy of their confidence and patronage.

GREENSBORO FEMALE COLLEGE.

This time-honored Institution has had a most prosperous year. It is firmly fixed in the confidence of our people, and, under the wise and efficient management of President Peacock, it has increased its efficiency in every department. Neither the head nor the heart of our girls suffers in this Institution. Every teacher in its Faculty is a Methodist—a regular communicant. Its atmosphere is decidedly and positively Christian.

We do not hesitate to commend this Institution to the most favorable consideration of all our people.

LITTLETON FEMALE COLLEGE.

The Conference owns a controlling interest in this Institution, and, by virtue of that fact, has a special interest in all that pertains to its welfare.

It is doing honest and faithful work. All things considered, no institution among us is doing better. President Rhodes has made this his life-work, and his consecrated efforts in behalf of Littleton Female College have been an incalculable blessing in the bounds of the Conference.

We would urge our people to rally to this Institution and make an earnest effort to put it in the front rank with Southern colleges. We recommend that J. M. Rhodes be appointed its President.

LOUISBURG FEMALE COLLEGE.

This Institution is now under new management, and is in the hands of Professor Davis and his accomplished daughters. It is a distinctively Methodist school, well located in a healthful and cultured community. We commend it with confidence to our people.

GENERAL BOARD.

Your Board would again recommend the continuance of the plan of the General Board, as adopted by the last Annual Conference, believing that this plan can be made very helpful in our general educational work.

The Board asks that Professor W. I. Crawford be appointed Secretary of the General Board, in carrying out the aim and policy of the General Board.

The Board recommends the continuance of the assessment of \$600 for Paine Institute.

RESOLVED, 1st. That, in arranging for "Children's Day," our pastors be requested to emphasize and lay especial stress upon the subject of Christian education, and, as far as practicable, preach a special sermon on that subject, with distinctive reference to the institutions of learning under our own management.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The Board of Missions begs leave to present the following report:

Owing to the irreparable loss of the Board in the death of its Secretary during the past year, we are not able to report the various statistics of the work of those charges under our aid; but from the reports which have come into our hands we believe that the work of the year has at least reached its usual efficiency.

The Board is impressed with the great possibility of good to the cause we represent in the work of a special Conference Secretary. We therefore request the Bishop to appoint a Conference Missionary Secretary for the ensuing year, who shall be paid by this Board a salary of \$1,250, and allowed not more than \$400 for his traveling and other necessary expenses of his office.

The following resolution was presented by J. E. Underwood and A. R. Raven and unanimously adopted by the Board:

“RESOLVED, That we greatly appreciate the faithful labors of Rev. G. A. Oglesby as Missionary Secretary, and greatly regret the necessity of his giving up the work.”

Appreciating the necessity of larger information on this most vital subject, Christian Missions, we are glad that we can recommend as among the best, and as the very best for us, the “Methodist Review of Missions, the

“World for Christ,” the “Woman’s Missionary Advocate,” the “Little Worker,” and “Our Homes.”

It affords us great pleasure to learn that the W. P. & H. M. Society of our Conference, appreciating the necessity of an industrial school in Eastern North Carolina, purposes in the near future making an effort to establish such a school. We heartily endorse the action of these good women and commend their labor to our people.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

I. OUR PUBLISHING HOUSE.

Your Committee desires to express its gratification at the work done by our Publishing House. It is furnishing the Methodist world with a literature in every way worthy of the great Church which it represents. We urge upon our people that, in the important matter of creating and furnishing their libraries, they deal with our Publishing House, and thus secure a pure and elevating literature free from poison and from strange doctrine.

We most heartily commend "The Christian Advocate," "The Methodist Review" and "The Review of Missions" to our people. These form a class of periodical literature of the highest order. We know of no religious

journal that we regard as of greater worth than "The Christian Advocate." It should have a very general circulation among our people.

II. The Methodist Armor, by the late Dr. Hudson, and The Life of Braxton Craven, by Professor Jerome Doub. are two books by North Carolina authors that we desire especially to commend to our people. The Life of Braxton Craven is a timely biography of one of the great spirits of our North Carolina Methodism. It is written in a very pure and attractive style, and should be of enjoyable interest to the reading public. The life of this great Carolinian and the founder of Trinity College, is full of inspiration to our young men. Let our people put this worthy book into their homes.

OUR SUNDAY SCHOOL LITERATURE.

We desire to express our high appreciation of the Sunday School literature issued by our Publishing House. We believe that our Sunday School literature is in every way worthy of use by every Sunday School in Southern Methodism. Your Committee desires to very earnestly commend it to our people generally. We are under the conviction that there is none better, and we trust our people will not turn aside to other sources for their Sunday School supplies.

III. BAPTISM IN A NUT SHELL.

This rare little tract is one of the cleverest and most Scriptural presentations of the doctrine of Baptism that is afforded us in all the great mass of literature on this subject.

We respectfully ask the Book Committee of our Publishing House to use a fund out of the profits of this business for the purpose of giving this very valuable tract to the Church free of cost. It should have a circulation to the utmost bounds of our Church, and in the regions beyond.

IV. CONFERENCE ORGAN.

Whereas the Advocate Publishing Company puts the price of the paper at \$1.50 per annum, cash in advance, and concedes to the Conference the right and privilege of electing an editor to represent us upon the North Carolina Christian Advocate, with full editorial prerogatives, provided three thousand dollars of stock is taken by the 1st of November next, and agree to pay said editor fifteen hundred dollars per annum, your Committee presents the name of Rev. T. N. Ivey for election as Editor for this Conference of the North Carolina Christian Advocate for the term of two years.

If, for any cause, this office should become vacant before the next session of our Conference, the Board of Presiding Elders of this Conference shall

be authorized, if they think it expedient, to elect another Editor to serve until the next session of our Conference in 1897.

In consideration of this arrangement, we recommend the adoption of the North Carolina Christian Advocate as the organ of this Conference; and we commend it most heartily to our people, and pledge ourselves faithfully to work for a large increase in its circulation among our people.

We request the presiding Bishop to appoint Rev. W. L. Grissom as business manager of the North Carolina Christian Advocate.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BIBLE CAUSE.

The Committee on the Bible Cause has had set before it by the last annual report of the American Bible Society and by statements of its District Superintendent, many interesting facts connected with this great department of Christian evangelization, the distribution of God's blessed Word.

1. Some of them are of special importance in relation to our Foreign Mission work. In the necessary business of translating, printing and distributing the Scriptures in foreign lands, to which we send missionaries, the report of the A. B. S. shows that there has been marked progress in late years. And during the last year the Society expended upon the Foreign work over \$208,000, distributed 890,000 volumes of the Scriptures, and employed 443 colporteurs, besides supplying freely hundreds of our missionaries with as many volumes as they could use in their work. And it is specially interesting and gratifying to us to note that signal success seems to have attended this work in several of the fields where our own Church has missions; as, for instance, China, where nearly 400,000 volumes were circulated last year, and the circulation has doubled in the last two years; Japan, where "a great and effectual door" has been opened for the Scriptures through the favor of civil and military officers, and the circulation exceeded 250,000 volumes; and Brazil, where the report marks "a great advance upon all previous records."

2. In the Home field the work has been maintained up to about its usual standard. Notwithstanding the fact that for 80 years the American Bible Society has been scattering the Scriptures broadcast in this land, and endeavoring to teach the people supplied, yet last year it distributed more than 860,000 volumes in the United States. In this way it has put the

Word, in their own tongues, into the hands of the immigrants landing on our shores, and into the hands of many poor and needy, as the orphans in our orphanages, and other destitute people. It has also continued its plan of Sunday School Supply, by which over 22,000 Bibles were put into the hands of children who did not own one before; and many of these within the bounds of this Conference.

3. It is matter of regret and concern that, in the face of all this grand work, so valuable to the Church at home and abroad, the receipts of the Society have fallen off to such an extent as to excite grave apprehensions as to the continuation of the work upon the same scale as in the past. The funds received last year fell \$83,000 short of meeting the actual expenses of the work; and the falling off has continued to a greater degree during this present year.

In view of these facts, it is gratifying to know that the contributions of this Conference for the present year are somewhat in advance of last year's, amounting to about \$350. But this amount would no doubt be much larger if every pastor would present the cause and take up a collection for it, as required by our Discipline, and if our people understood the character of the great and important work which the A. B. S. is doing for us.

We therefore present the following resolutions for adoption by the Conference:

1st. That our pastors inform themselves with regard to the facts and principles of this Bible work, that they may be able duly to present it to their people.

2d. That our people be urged to contribute as liberally as they can for the relief of the A. B. S. in its present emergency, that its blessed work be not hindered.

Sessions of the North Carolina Conference.

The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in February, 1837. In 1851, and again in 1870, North Carolina territory in the South Carolina Conference was transferred to this Conference. In 1860 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining N. C. territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the N. C. Conference. So now the two Conferences embrace the whole of North Carolina.
