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## MINUTES.

The Sipsey Association met in her seventh annual session with Pleasant Ridge Church, Saturday, Sunday and Monday, October 3, 4 and 5, 1896, Fayette county, Ala. The introductory sermon was delivered at 11 a. m. on Saturday, by Rev. J. R. Barnett from 1st Cor. 3:13. A large and attentive audience listened to the discourse, after which a recess of an hour and a half was given for refreshments, which were on the ground in abundance for both man and beast.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DEVOTION.

We, your Committee on Devotion, beg leave to report brother G. W. Devotional exercises at 10 o'clock conducted by brother James Mills, jr., and missionary sermon at 11 o'clock by Rev. J. R. Mayfield.

The missionary sermon was delivered by Rev. J. R. Mayfield to a large and attentive audience, from Romans 1:16, "For I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ; for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek."

*Report of Committee on Literature.*

We, your Committee, beg leave to report as follows: That we find our religious papers and periodicals much neglected, especially by the members of our denomination. We therefore recommend our state organ, *The Alabama Baptist*, the *Foreign Mission Journal*, the *State Mission Journal*, and the *Sabbath School Convention Series* to be used in our families and Sabbath Schools. And we urge that vigilance be used by every Christian parent to keep out all spurious, trashy and dangerous literature from our homes, schools and churches.

*Report of Committee on Temperance.*

Intemperance ruins the bright sons of fathers and mothers, brings many to jail and to the gallows. The Body being called to order, the report of Committee on Sabbath Schools was called for:

##### *Report on Sabbath Schools.*

We, your Committee on Sabbath Schools report that, from reading the letters, there are but seven Sabbath Schools reported in this Association, and that there has been a Sabbath School convention held in the First district, and, from the report, the Sabbath School interest seems to be retrograding, and we recommend that the churches make a strong effort to organize and maintain Sabbath Schools throughout the year. And we recommend that the two Districts come together in one Convention, at a time and place agreed on by the Association, and discuss such questions as the Sabbath School interest demands, and hereafter would recommend the Sabbath Schools to convene with Corinth church on Friday before the 5th Sabbath in August, 1897.

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### CONSTITUTION.

1. This Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different Churches in our union, who, on presenting their letters, shall be entitled to seats.

2. The Association thus formed, a majority of the members present shall choose by ballot, a Moderator and Clerk, who shall serve one year.

3. This Association shall be known as the Sipsy Baptist Association, which shall have the privilege to engage in missionary work in all its bearings, yet so that churches and individual members are left free, and that giving or withholding shall not be a bar to membership.

4. To give churches the best advice she can in all matters of difficulties, and if the union be broken between two or more churches, to inquire into the cause of the breach and use her best endeavors to remove the difficulty; provided the aggrieved has followed the instructions laid down in the 18th chapter of Matthew, but if the breach cannot be repaired, to withdraw from any church or churches which she may consider unsound in doctrine or immoral in practice, until the same can be reconciled.

5. The churches in our union shall transmit to every annual session of the Association a written communication, giving the names of the delegates, their number in fellowship, baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excluded and deceased, since the last session.

6. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates and no more. Any church failing to represent at any annual session, shall be required to give a reason for her failure at the next session.

7. Churches may be admitted into this Association who petition by letter and delegates, and upon examination, if found orderly and orthodox, may be received, at the discretion of the Association when the Moderator shall give the right hand of fellowship to said delegates.

8. Any church in our union may send queries to the Association, asking advice, when it shall be the duty of the Association to answer the same as she may think best.

9. Voting may be confined exclusively to the Body in all acts respecting their internal concerns.



10. The Association shall not adjourn any session until she shall have finished all business on hand, except in extraordinary cases.

11. The minutes of the Association shall be read, and corrected if necessary, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk, before the session rises.

12. The Association shall in all cases be governed by a majority of the members present, except to change or amend the Constitution.

13. Amendments to the Constitution may be made at any session when two-thirds of the members present are in favor of amendment.

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## ARTICLES OF FAITH.

ARTICLE 1. We believe there is only one true and living God, the Father, the Word, and the Holy Ghost.

2. We believe that the Scriptures, comprising the Old and New Testament, are the Word of God, the only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in the doctrine of Election through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth.

4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

5. We believe in man's incapacity by his own free will and ability, to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature.

6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God by the imputed righteousness of Christ only.

7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated, and sanctified by the Holy Ghost.

8. We believe that the Saints shall be preserved in Grace, and never fall finally away.

9. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Ordinances of Jesus Christ, and the true believers are the only subjects of Baptism, and that by Immersion is the only Apostolic mode.

10. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and in the General Judgement, and that the felicity of the righteous and punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

11. We believe that no minister has any right to administer the ordinances of the Church but one who is regularly baptized, called of God, and comes under the imposition of the hands of a Presbytery.

12. We believe that none but legally baptized members have a right to commune at the Lord's Table.

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## RULES OF DECORUM.

ART. 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. The Moderator shall be deemed judge of order, and shall have discretionary right to call to order at any time.

3. A member not satisfied with his decision, may appeal to the Association on the same day, but at no other time.

4. But one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise to his feet and address the Moderator, and, on obtaining permission, proceed.

5. The Moderator, when addressed by a member for permission to speak, shall signify the same in naming the person, or otherwise.

6. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject, or use words of personal reflection. Every

motion made and seconded, shall come under the consideration of the Association, unless withdrawn by him who made it.

7. Every case taken up by the Association shall be decided on or withdrawn before another shall be offered.

8. When a motion is taken up, after allowing time for debates, the Moderator shall take the voice of the Association in such mode as he may determine.

9. The Moderator shall announce the decision of the Body.

10. Any member wishing to retire shall obtain permission of the Moderator.

11. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association.

12. The appellation of "Brother" shall be used in the Association by members in their address to one another.

13. The names of members shall be called as often as the Association may direct.

14. No member shall be tolerated in any practice which tends to interrupt public speaking.

15. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided he appoint another to his seat during the time, but he shall not vote on any question unless the Association be equally divided.

16. Any member violating these rules, shall be reprovod by the Moderator, but only on the day the breach shall have been made.
