## REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS.

### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD.

As Executive Board, we beg leave to report, that in the month of November, after the meeting of the Association, we held a meeting, and finding that there was not a sufficient amount pledged by the churches and individuals to undertake the employment of a missionary, the meeting adjourned until Saturday before the 5th Sunday in March, 1891, with the understanding that members of the Board were to apply to the churches for pledges upon which to base their actions in the employment of a missionary. At the time appointed there were but two members present, owing to excessive rains; and another meeting was appointed for Saturday before the 5th Sunday in May, at which time we entered into a contract with Brother J. F. Sims, at \$40.00 per month, until the meeting of the association. We also agreed to pay Brother C. C. Lloyd fifty dollars, supplemental to what he should receive from three weak churches in the bounds of this association, viz: New Ebenezer, Mountain Hill and Panola.

Bro. Sims began his work the 1st of June, and continued until the 8th of October, being four and a quarter months. During this time he traveled 661 miles, preached 53 sermons, held worship with 10 families, and assisted in the ordination of two deacons. His work has been done at seven destitute places, viz: 1st Sunday at Trainum's and Old Providence school houses; 2nd Sunday at Bradleyton and Perry; 3rd Sunday, two services at Saville, all in Crenshaw county; 4th Sunday at Sanders' and Andress' school houses, Butler county; also three days at Indian Creek church, four at Antioch, and two at Panola. At four places he protracted for a few days.

Congregations good, except at two places. He says further: I find plenty of people in that country, but the majority seem devoted to the gods of this world. He has collected on the field \$3 25, has been previously paid \$15 00. The amount due him is \$146 75. Brother Lloyd has been paid \$10 00. The amount due him is \$40 00.

#### REPORT ON HOME AND STATE MISSIONS.

##### HOME.

The present outlook in both these fields is encouraging. We find that the home Board has been pushing its work in Alabama, Georgia, Arkansas, Cuba, Florida, Indian Territory, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, Tennessee, Texas, West Virginia and Virginia, among the foreigners, colored people, and wherever there is need.

The work is increasing and gaining strength with its progress; but making equal pace with this progress is the growing demand for earnest, efficient work in all these important openings. There is imperative need of more people and more money at work in the home field.

##### STATE.

We have reason to thank God for the progress our State Mission Board has made. Its responsibilities have increased with its progress. New towns are springing up and being peopled with foreigners. The tide of immigration is pouring into Alabama. We must lead them by pointing to the Lamb of God, the only hope for dying sinners. We can do this by holding up the hands of our State Board in sending united petitions to a throne of grace. Men to preach the gospel and means to support them.

Both the Home and State Boards earnestly ask your sympathy and co-operation. We recommend that we respond to the full extent of our usefulness by giving our money and our prayers. "Pray ye that the Lord send more laborers into the harvest."

#### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Your committee suggests that "religious" is a very broad word; that it includes a great many "isms," both good and bad; that what a great many good intentioned people consider good religious literature, is evidently, in the estimation of other good people, considered bad. To discriminate be-

tween the good and bad is the part of prudence and wisdom. Error must be met by us on the threshold of church and home and heart. Opportunities broad and deep and influential are afforded us, and it is at our own peril we fail to grasp them. The Bible, God's revealed word to man, as a foundation for thought and practice, stands first and foremost, and cannot be too highly recommended. In addition we recommend that the brethren search out Baptist periodicals that weekly and monthly teach the peculiar doctrines of our churches, that the brethren may be "built up in our holy faith."

For information as to State work we urge the patronage of the "Alabama Baptist;" for information as to Foreign work we commend the Home and Foreign Journal. We further encourage the use of the Baptist Hymnal, which, we are gratified to learn, has already been adopted by many of our churches.

#### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The reports now coming to us daily from all parts of the State are very encouraging.

The schools have all opened with larger attendance than ever before. The progress of the centuries has been led on by Christian education.

As the seeds are sown the demand increases. We want more schools and more money and pupils in those we have.

Education without Christ in it is worse than no education. As a safeguard against this danger, it is important that we support denominational schools. Howard College has had the most gratifying opening of its history.

There are now 140 matriculates, and others coming every day. Judson Institute at Marion, Ala., stands, and has long stood, the compeer of any female college in the South. It is growing continually, and this year marks one of the grandest movements forward she has ever made.

They have a faculty unexcelled, magnificent grounds, buildings and general outfit. We now have in this grand institution 130 pupils, and still they come.

Among other good colleges and high schools are the Alabama Central Female College, Tuscaloosa, Ala., also worthy your patronage.

We believe it to be the duty of all God's people to stand by these colleges, especially Howard College and Judson Institute.

As long as they are as good as, or better than, can be found elsewhere, it is not only our privilege, but our duty, to put our sons and daughters, with the money and prayers of our country, into these institutions.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your committee on Foreign Missions beg leave to report, that from examining the minutes of the Southern Baptist Convention our denomination is sending missionaries to the following countries, to-wit: Italy, Brazil, Mexico, Japan, Africa and China.

In Italy we have two males, one female, and 21 native assistants; 14 churches with 275 members; 25 baptized last year; money expended, \$18,907.75.

In Brazil we have 6 males, 5 females, with 8 native assistants; 7 churches, 382 members; 83 baptized last year. Money expended, \$13,225.1.

In Mexico we have 8 males, 13 females, with 11 native assistants; 28 churches, 855 members; 147 baptized last year. Money expended, \$27,364.68.

In Japan we have 2 males, 2 females, 1 native assistant, 1 church, 15 members; 3 baptized last year. Money expended, \$3,842.50.

In Africa we have 5 males, 5 females, with 6 native assistants, 3 churches, 58 members; 5 baptized last year. Money expended, \$9,554.66.



In China we have 15 males, 22 females, with 29 native assistants, 14 churches, 790 members; baptized 98 last year. Money expended, \$25,837.32.

Total amount of money expended in foreign lands, \$99,199.57.

Expenses of the Foreign Mission Board, \$15,267.43.
