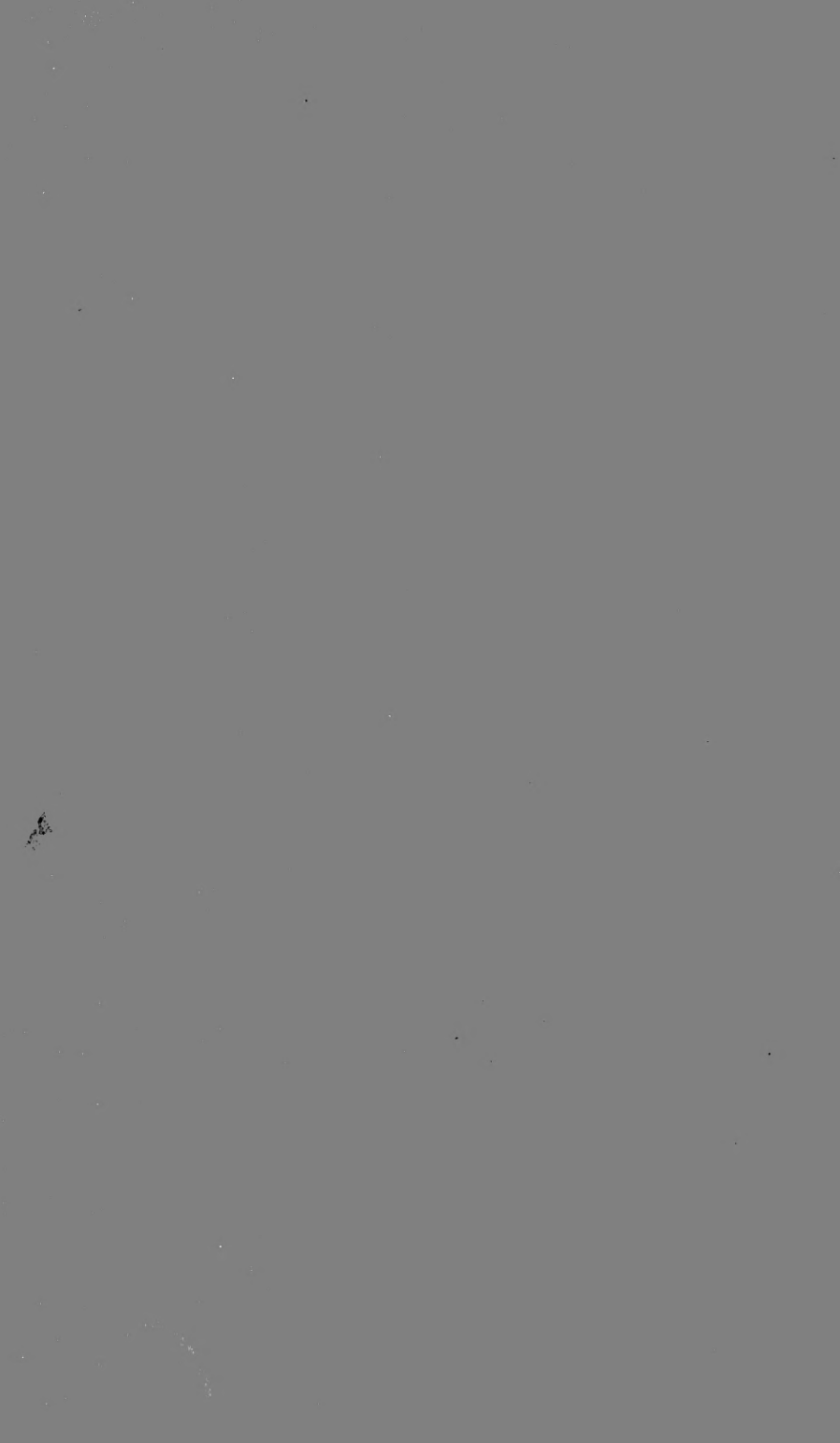

# MINUTES

BRADLEYTON CHURCH, BRADLEYTON ALABAMA,  
FRIDAY, OCTOBER 8TH, 1897.

Resolved, that the old Executive Board be continued as heretofore.

## REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD.

We your Executive Board beg leave to report as follows:  
 We find actual time served by Bro. Lloyd seven months, for which we contracted at \$15 per month, making a total of \$105.00

We recommend to discontinue the Colportage work, but continue the Executive Board for the purpose of raising money to employ an active man as missionary to work in the bounds of the Association during the months of July, August and September.

We further recommend that the books on hand be divided among the pastors of the Association to be sold, and the proceeds turned over to the Treasurer.

The Colporter and Evangelist reports that during the past Associational year he has preached 81 sermons, baptised 9 converts, held 78 religious conversations, attended 7 protracted meetings, married 3 couples and preached 5 funerals.

No accurate account of miles traveled or families visited has been kept.

He trusts much good has been done in the name of the blessed Master.

By urgent request he filled out an unexpired term at Panola, from June till September.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

"God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son that who-soever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." This gift of God was because of his love for a lost world. The work of the church is to fulfill the will of the Father as expressed in Christ's command to "preach the gospel to every creature" and for our aid and encouragement the Holy Spirit is promised. "Lo I am with you, etc."

We are sometimes told that the first churches were anti-mission or opposed to missions. They were omissions but not anti-missionaries.

Those that were scattered by the persecution about Stephen went "every where" Philip went into Samaria and the Lord was with him. They were only half Jews. Afterwards Philip went and preached to the Africans. Peter was convinced only by his remarkable vision that God would have the gospel preached to Gentile as well as Jew, and the church at Jerusalem rejoiced on hearing that the Gentiles had received the gospel. Barnabas sent by the first church



at Jerusalem up to Antioch, labored there with Saul a whole year, when the Lord said, "Separate unto me Barnabas and Saul unto the work whereunto I have called them." And they laid their hands on them and sent them away. And they preached the gospel throughout Asia Minor, and parts of Europe. The brethren of Macedonia supplied the wants of Paul while preaching to the heathen Corinthians, "2 Cor. xi." We are trying to do the same thing for nearly 200 brethren preaching in Foreign lands, and to do this need \$100,000.00 every year. Let us bear our part in this great work.
