#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

We your Committee on Home Missions desire to submit the following report: By consulting the report of the Southern Baptist Convention of 1899, in contrast with that of 1898, we find we have 653 Missionaries in last report against 467 of 1898. The number of churches in last report 2,580 against 2,386 of 1898, showing an increase of 194 churches. Houses of worship built in the last conventional year, 92; houses of worship improved, 252; received by baptism this year, 6,552 against 4739 of last year. Showing an increase of 1,813 baptisms. Total addition this year by baptism and letter, 12,983 against 9,509 last year. Showing an increase of 3,474. There have been collected and expended in building houses of worship on the field this year, \$50,050.33 against \$56,385 46 last year. Showing a decrease of \$6,335 13.

The amount raised and expended on the field this year for home missions, \$65,818.18 against \$54,251 04 last year. Showing an increase of \$11,567.77 for home missions. Making a total raised and expended on the field, \$115,869.14 against a total of \$110,636 50 last year. Showing an increase of \$4,533 64.

We are glad to say that both the interest and work done are greatly increasing, especially in Cuba. The Lord has opened the way to Cuba for his people, and we are responsible for the result if we do not walk in and take the Island for Him. This calls for great interest on the part of every Baptist both of their means and labor. May the

blessings of God be upon the head in this great work for the Master.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We, your Committee on Foreign Missions, beg leave to report that our Foreign Mission work is gaining ground rapidly, which is gratifying to us. Our Foreign Mission Board has missionaries in six countries, viz: China, Japan, Africa, (which are Pagan,) Italy, Brazil, Mexico, (which are Papal.) Last year there were 845 baptisms by our Foreign Missionaries.

We are at present through our board supporting 82 Foreign Missionaries who are doing a glorious work in the spread of the Gospel. This is indeed gratifying to us, but we must remember that in China alone almost one-fourth of the population of the globe are dying without the Gospel. This should call forth more of our energies in the interests of lost, ruined men and women. Our needs may be easily expressed in the language of our Corresponding secretary who says. We need more prayer in faith, more pastors in earnest for missions, more people giving liberally for God's glory and the advancement of His Kingdom in the world. We recommend that each church in the Association send as large contributions as possible some time during the month of May to the Foreign Mission Board which will help the Board run its business without going in debt.

#### ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

We believe there is work that should be done. There are struggling churches which should be aided. We recommend that the churches of this association be re-

requested to contribute to the Associational Mission Fund, said Fund to be placed in the hands of the Executive Committee of the Association. We recommend further that this committee be instructed to use said fund to the best interest of the Master's cause in assisting weak churches to support pastors, and in such other ways as are deemed best.

REPORT ON THE ORPHANAGE.

I submit my report on Orphanage, the following facts formulated by the managers of Orphanage:

Our Orphanage has been in operation little more than six years. During this time we have received into it 49 boys and 69 girls, and out of it have gone 28 boys and 27 girls, leaving in the Institution 21 boys and 42 girls—63 in all.

The Home is situated on Main Street, next door to the Agricultural School, where no tuition is charged, and where all of our children, that are old enough, attend.

The boys are taught to work on the farm, and the girls to do various kinds of house work. The crop the boys were making this year, was greatly damaged by a hail-storm early in June.

Mrs C W Ansley, who had been matron since the Home began, retired from the work with the beginning of this year, and Mrs Jennie M Hardy, of Greensboro, was elected to fill that position.

It is gratifying to note the continued improvement in the domestic life of the children. The matron has arranged one of the rooms for a chapel, and every Sunday afternoon a happy band make melody their hearts to the Lord.

During this year the children have been put in uniforms, which adds much to their appearance and is no more expensive than their former dress. It promotes family life.

It takes about ten dollars a day to support the family, besides what they get in goods. They have no income except the offerings of their friends. "It is more blessed to give than receive."

#### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

It is a boast of Baptist people that they have ever been earnest workers in the cause of general education and some of the greatest struggles of our people have been over the maintenance of educational enterprises. We are happy therefore to be able to report that the debts which have so long hung over our two great Baptist Schools, the Howard and Judson have been paid. It should be a matter of very great rejoicing to us that these two institutions of learning no longer, have their usefulness hampered by a load of debt. We desire to call the attention of the association to our Baptist School at Walnut Grove. This school was established by joint action of the Marshall, Warrior River and Etowah Associations. The last session was a most successful one, and the present one has opened with the brightest prospects. We are of the opinion that no better community can be found than Walnut Grove, in which to place our boys and girls for mental and moral elevation. The school is under the able supervision of Rev W Y Adams, and we need make no statement as to his efficiency and fitness for this work. We believe this enterprise is full of promise to the Baptist people of this section, and we bespeak for it their hearty support.

Your committee suggests that the cause of ministerial education deserves some more substantial support from our people than the adoption of reports. We have now an opportunity to do something practical in this cause.

Bro D D Head has gone from this association to the Seminary to prepare himself for the ministry. He is without means to



support himself in that institution. We believe he is worthy the help of this association, and we therefore recommend that immediate steps be taken by this association, looking to his support.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

We, your committee on Sunday Schools report that while our churches have developed greater efficiency in Sunday Schools organizations and methods of work, there yet remains a great work to do. It is a fact that not 50 pr. ct. of our congregations are connected with our Sunday Schools. This must be remedied. What is known as the Home Department of the Sunday School should be vigorously worked by every church, whenever so worked the whole congregation can be enlisted in the school. Conventions of Sunday School worked in which plans and methods of work are discussed, are exceedingly helpful and we recommend that this association make it the duty of the Sunday

School Committee to hold at least four conventions in different parts of the county, and to this end that the chairman of this association exercise care in the selection of this committee.

### CONSTITUTION.

The name of this Association shall be "The Etowah Baptist Association."

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall perform such duties and perform them in such a manner as is ordinarily required of such officers. They shall be elected at or near the opening of each annual session of the body.

The membership of the Association shall be such churches as shall see fit and be permitted to represent themselves in its session by delegates.

Each church shall be entitled to one delegate for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof, but each church shall be entitled to at least two delegates.

The object of this Association shall be the advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom not only within its own bounds, but throughout the world. It shall aid and encourage, by means of its influence, those grand institutions and agencies which, in the providence of God, have been established by the wise and good among our brethren for the spread of the gospel throughout the world, for the distribution of the Bible among those destitute of it, for the education of young men for the work of the ministry, as well as for the cause of education generally, for the promotion of the Sunday School cause, the cause of temperance, etc.

The Association shall employ such means and adopt such measures as shall seem best calculated to cultivate Christian unity and Fellowship among the brethren within its bounds, to incite the brethren to love and good work, to stir up the pure minds of the brethren by way of remembrance, to secure individual advancement in the Divine life, in every way as individuals, to illustrate to the world the reality of the religion of Jesus Christ.

### BY-LAWS.

1. Preparatory to the organization of the Association an introductory sermon shall be preached by a member appointed at the previous meeting, and another shall be named at the same time to per-

form the duty in case of the failure of the first.

2. The service being performed, the Moderator, or if he be absent, the oldest minister present shall open the Association with prayer.

3. He shall call for letters from the churches, when the delegates shall present them and take their seats in order.

4. When the Association is regularly organized, as prescribed by the Constitution, the correspondence from other Associations shall be called for, the letters read and the messengers received by the right of fellowship from the Moderator. The messengers shall be invited to seats in the Association and accorded the privilege of speaking on any subject before the body, but not of voting on any. Other brethren may be invited to seats with the same privilege and prohibition.

5. Subjects not named in the last minutes may, at the discretion of the Association, be taken up at any time when there is no business before the body.

6. Any subjects not contained in minutes must be regularly brought before the body by motion which shall be seconded before it can be taken up. After this, it shall be considered as property at the disposal of the Association, unless it be withdrawn by the mover.

7. No one shall speak oftener than three times on the same subject, unless permitted by the Association. The speaker shall always rise to his feet and address the Moderator.

8. Silence and decorum shall be observed by every member of the Association while the body is in session, and more especially in the time of debate. All personal reflections and remarks tending to wound the feelings of the brethren shall be strictly avoided.

9. No member of the Association shall leave the house while the Association is in session without permission from the Moderator.

10. In order to expedite business, committees shall be appointed at the discretion of the Association, who shall be named by the Moderator.

11. The meeting of the Association shall, on each day of session, be opened and closed with prayer.

12. The minutes of each day shall be read at its beginning and close of business, after prayer, each succeeding, when names of the delegates shall be called. And the whole of the minutes of the session shall be read at its close and signed by the Moderator and Clerk.

13. Any alteration of these By Laws may be made at any meeting of the Association by two-thirds of the members present.

#### RULES OF ORDER.

The rules of order usually observed by deliberative bodies of this kind shall be observed by this Association.

If any point of order be raised by any member of the body, it shall be decided by the Moderator, but appeal may be taken from his decision to the body. "Wells' Parliamentary Practice" shall be used as authority in regard to questions of order.

## ARTICLES OF FAITH.

There is one and but one God, who is a Spirit, omniscient, omnipotent, omnipresent, eternal, unchangeable, infinite in goodness and wisdom, of inviolable truth, perfectly just, of immaculate holiness, the creator of all things, the preserver of all, and the supreme ruler over all. The Godhead is a trinity—Father, Son and Holy Ghost—three persons in one divine essence.

The Son became incarnate, thus uniting in himself the divine and human natures, that he might become the mediator between God and man; man's final judge, and by his life, death and resurrection, the Redeemer and Savior of his people.

The Holy Spirit is the sanctioner and comforter of God's people. He is, through the divine word, the author of the new spiritual life produced in man in his regeneration.

The Holy Scriptures were given by divine inspiration as a revelation of God's will to man concerning him, and constitute to him an infallible rule of faith and practice.

Adam and Eve, the first man and woman, were created holy, and for a time served the Creator acceptably, living innocently and happy in His favor, but Adam, having been placed under a covenant of works, violated it and brought the penalty of the violation upon himself and his descendants.

All men partaking of the consequences of the fall, are both totally depraved and guilty of actual transgression of God's laws.

No man can free himself from his native depravity, or from condemnation. No man can save himself. There is no way of salvation but by Jesus Christ.

The Christian Sabbath is the first day of the week, and should be kept Holy and consecrated to the service and worship of God in obedience to the command, "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it Holy," and in commemoration of the resurrection on that day of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

The ordinances of the gospel are two—Baptism and the Lord's Supper. The great head of the church requires the perpetual observance of these ordinances by the church as such and under their authority.

Baptism is the immersion of the believer in water by one duly qualified and authorized to administer the rite. It is prerequisite to church membership.

A gospel church is a company of Baptist believers, organized under the laws of its Great Head for the advancement of God's kingdom in the world. The officers of the church are its pastors and deacons. Each church is an independent body, subject only to the commands of its Great Head. The work required of the church is missionary in its character. "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

The Holy Spirit continues the work of sanctification upon those

whom he has regenerated to the end of life, and thus saves all who are regenerated from apostacy.

All who will be finally saved were chosen of God the father, before the foundation of the world, and gave to Jesus Christ in the covenant of grace; yet all who will be lost will have rejected a proffered salvation.

The bodies of all who die will be raised from the dead and reunited to their spirits for the judgment of the great day.

In the last day Jesus will come to judge the world, and having assembled all men before him, will pass sentence upon them according to their works.

Heaven is a place to which the righteous will be received and made perfectly happy in the presence and enjoyment of God forever.

Hell is a place into which the wicked shall be cast to suffer eternal punishment for their sins.
