REPORT ON BAPTIST YOUNG PEOPLE'S UNION.

We, your Committee on Baptist Young People's Union, find that there are only three unions in the Association, all of which

have been either organized or reorganized within the past few months. These unions are located at Jasper, Carbon Hill and Oakman, and seem to be doing very good work. We have seen that a great many of our young people will become members of the B. Y. P. U. and engage in its work when they will not readily work in direct unison with the church. In this way they gradually become active and useful members of the church. We recommend that as far as it is practical B. Y. P. U.'s be organized and maintained in all the churches of this Association.

SUNDAY.

MORNING SESSION.

At 9 A. M. met pursuant to adjournment, and after devotional exercises, was called to order.

W. B. Crumpton, Corresponding Secretary State Board of Missions, was received.

On motion one hour was given to the discussion of Denominational Education. Was spoken to by W. B. Earnest, W. B. Crumpton and others, then adopted.

On motion, the clerk was authorized to abbreviate the Report on Denominational Education.

REPORT ON DENOMINATIONAL EDUCATION.

We take it for granted that by the words "Denominational Education" is meant education or information on the doctrines, teachings and practices of our denomination, together with some knowledge of its progress, work and history.

That it is important for us to be well informed on the doctrines, teachings and practices of our denomination, and know something of its history, progress and work, is quite obvious.

As Paul says, "We should be ever ready to give a reason for the faith that is in us."

We cannot study the doctrines and teachings of our denomination without being strengthened in our Christianity and becoming more loyal to our church.

We cannot be loyal and zealous to that cause of which we are ignorant, and we cannot fail to become interested in a just and righteous cause on which we are well informed.

Let us study to know the doctrines and teachings of our beloved denomination; and let us study to inform ourselves as much as we can on the history of our church, and learn of the noble work and progress it has made and is making, and thus be inspired to more zeal in our church work.

We should all take and read the Alabama Baptist and the Southern Baptist, published at Memphis, Tenn., and the Birmingham Baptist, published at Birmingham, Ala., and all other denominational history and literature we well can; and last, but not least, let us read prayerfully and thoughtfully each day that Book of books, dictated by Him who spoke as never man spake, and written by men who wrote as the Holy Spirit moved them; for in this sacred Book, without embellishment, without comment, without adding to or taking from, are found lessons full of wisdom and of truth. We think every doctrine and teaching of our denomination to be true.

We ought not to forget our denominational schools in the State. The Judson, of Marion, for the education of our girls, a school now excellent for proficiency along all the lines of work; also Howard College at East Lake, for our boys. The Howard is now out of debt, SHE IS FREE, and is now under the management of one of the best corps of teachers it has had for years.

Brethren, we are looking forward for the greatest opening of the Howard this coming session that has ever been in her history.

Ten facts about Howard College:

1. Howard College was established in 1841. Its graduates are among the recognized leaders in professional and business life.

2. Its present location, East Lake, is one of the most beautiful, healthful and moral suburbs of Birmingham. While the college enjoys the quiet of the country, it is connected with the city by electric cars.

3. The following new improvements have been added within the last year: Hot and cold baths, a well-equipped gymnasium, patent single desks for all recitation rooms.

4. An experienced matron will be employed next session to preside over the dining-room, look after the preparation of special dishes for the sick, etc. This will insure satisfactory service in the "Mess Hall."

5. The policy of Howard is to give a broad and thorough education at the least possible cost to the students for such grade of work. The increase in the number of courses offered is for the purpose of meeting, as far as possible, the different demands of different students, that each may get what he needs to prepare him for his chosen vocation.

6. Within the last six months, on account of new life, new industries, new capital, our college property, with all other in and around Birmingham, has enhanced in value, being worth more to-day than at any time since location of the college at East Lake.

7. The proper development of the student's mental, moral and physical being, and his preparation for usefulness, happiness and success in life, are considered the true ends of education.

8. Military discipline is practiced as means of developing physical strength and gracefulness, politeness, deference, obedience and attention. But above the military is the controlling power of ethical influences, the doctrine of Human Character, by which the student is led to understand his duties to himself, his fellows and his Creator.

9. The Howard students are noted in East Lake and Birmingham for their gentlemanly bearing and upright conduct.

10. During the session of 1899 and 1900 there will be lecture courses on Science, Education, Business and the Professions.

These lectures will be delivered by twenty specialists, whose services have been secured for that purpose, and will be free to the students. This course will be an opportunity seldom enjoyed by the students of any college.

I hope and trust that the day will speedily come when every young man of Alabama will have the glorious opportunity of attending the Howard. All of us who can should support her with our boys.

Now, lastly, let us remember the Seminary located at Louisville, Ky., now directed by her new President, Dr. Mullan, for the further equipment of the ministerial students of the Howard.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

We, your Committee on State Missions, beg to submit the following report:

It there ever was a time in the history of our organized work when the Baptists of Alabama needed to bestir themselves in behalf of the salvation of souls and in the denominational interests of their own State, we believe that time is now. At the next regular meeting of our State Convention will be the first time almost, if not altogether, since we have been organized into a convention, that we will be able to report all of the interests fostered by our denomination in the State out of debt.

During the present year over \$38,000 have been raised and paid out on denominational debts. We believe this is only a slight indication of what can be done, if we will only perfect our local organizations, and then put our heads and hearts together in this great common cause. So while we are complimenting ourselves over past successes, let us not forget that our obligations are greatly increased, and that our opportunities to lengthen our stakes and strengthen our cords were never so favorable.

The work of the year has not only strengthened our own faith in the cause, but it has and will continue to give us an advantage which no other denomination has in getting hold of the people. They will not only believe in Baptist principles; they will believe in Baptist zeal. Again, we have advantages in organization and in the general advance in business over the country that have not been ours for some time, if ever before. With Bro. Crumpton, our old secretary, again in charge to superintend the work, and with two assistant secretaries, one in the northern, the other in the southern part of the State, viz. Brothers Sandlin and Preston, we don't see why great improvements should not be made along all lines of our work. We believe our present methods of work to be good, if not the best. We have had for prosecuting this work the Associations that can and will employ and support their own missionaries, while the Board strengthens the weak places, by helping to support the pastors, encourage the work through its agents, and collects funds wherever it can. But while other things are so favorable, there is another fact which deserves our attention. The Board is wholly dependent on the churches for support in this work, and it has no means in hand at present by which to continue in business. Brethren, let us give our attention and our best energies to this the Master's cause. Respectfully submitted,

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Home Missions report thus: The field of the Home Mission Board covers the entire South and the Island of Cuba, and there is not a State or Territory within its borders in which the Board has not men preaching the Gospel to the desti-

tute. The number of missionaries was 467, which has been increased this year to 653. These missionaries are preaching the Gospel, making religious visits to the sick and needy, establishing Sunday schools, organizing churches, building church houses, and distributing Bibles, Testaments, tracts and other religious literature. Seventeen thousand four hundred and twenty-four weeks of labor were performed by these missionaries; sermons and addresses delivered, 64,718, reaching with the Gospel probably 300,000 people. They added to the churches 12,983 members. They constituted 194 new churches, built 92 houses of worship, improved 252 houses of worship, organized 512 Sunday schools into which they gathered more than 10,000 children, made 108,336 religious visits, put into homes 17,104 Bibles and Testaments, and scattered 1,260,572 pages of tracts. The work of Home Missions demands and should receive, for its own sake, the support of every lover of his country and his Lord. Of all the objects which appeal to Christian hearts, there is surely none more important or more imperative than that of carrying the Gospel to the destitute and neglected of our own land. Upon the prosecution of Home Missions the future welfare of our country very largely depends. The character of the coming American citizen, the growth and efficiency of our denomination, and the extension of the cause of Christ, are all involved in this great enterprise. But there is another reason why we should engage most heartily in Home Missions. This reason grows out of the bearing of Home Mission Work upon the evangelization of the world. Foreign and Home Missions are linked together. The success of that wider enterprise which looks to the redemption of humanity is largely dependent upon the evangelization of our own land. Therefore we should aid and encourage Home Mission Work. Respectfully submitted,

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Foreign Missions beg leave to report that from our observations on the subject, we feel that we can state that God has graciously and abundantly blessed the efforts of his people in spreading the joyful news of salvation through a crucified Christ throughout the remotest corners of earth. We rejoice that wherever the glad tidings are proclaimed religious liberty and civilization have taken the place of fanaticism and barbarism. God has blessed the work of Baptist missionaries, although they have often been compelled not only to fight the black idolatry of the nations, but the errors and superstitions of those who under the guise of Christ have sought to delude those who were hungering for the pure Word. We call upon every church in this Association to come to the help of the Lord against the mighty. We can, by our financial aid, willingly made, by God's help, assist in holding up the hands of our noble brethren who are

holding aloft the blood-stained banner of the cross in the darkest portions of the world. We recommend that each church of this Association do take greater interest in this work, and that at our next session a larger number of letters will indicate that this suggestion has been more generally complied with here in Alabama. Something over \$109,000 was contributed during the last conventional year. Missionaries in the field, males 35, females 47; number of churches, 100; outstanding stations, 140; baptised during the year, 845; contributions on the field, \$7,110.20. Since the Spanish-American war more fields are open; let us go over and occupy them. Respectfully submitted,

S. districts at its last session, and superintendents appointed over each district, and two of this committee to organize having been appointed superintendents, and it having been made their duty to organize Sunday schools and hold conventions or rallies, we turned the work over to these superintendents. Hence, we do not see the need of both committees; therefore we recommend that this committee be discontinued, and that the S. S. districts remain as they are, and that superintendents be appointed over these districts each year, and that they make reports of their work to the Association and also to the S. S. Convention. MORNING SESSION.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

We, your Committee on Temperance, having been appointed since our arrival on the ground, must submit a brief and imperfect report. We think this subject of greatest importance, and are pleased to note that the Religious press and our Associations and Conventions from the least to the greatest are giving it a constantly increased agitation. And we hope and pray that by by this means and the individual efforts of all of God's people, on all lines and in every way, disapproving, and with heart and soul and body, by word and deed, condemning the liquor traffic, it may be speedily checked and thoroughly broken up, never more to blight a Christian home or hinder a Christian cause. Your committee feel assured that total abstinence is the only safe ground for any one who has the name of Christ upon him. For every such one is commanded to depart from iniquity. And that the liquor business in its entirety is iniquitous we are forced to believe, or conclude, by any logical course of reasoning we employ. We do not believe in long reports, but we believe in a long pull, a strong pull and a pull altogether to wipe the liquor traffic from the face of the earth. And we believe the Baptist people, who have ever been leaders in great reforms, inspired by the Great I Am, are under this inspiration destined soon to accomplish this great and glorious end. And may all the religious world awaken to the responsibility of the hour, and see the awful consequences of delay, and hasten to help in the grand consummation.

If we fail to provide the best, they are almost sure to get the worst; for Satan and his angels are more active and energetic in sowing tares than the good are to sow wheat. The Holy Spirit hath said: "The children of this world are in their generation wiser than the children of light." Luke 16:8. Then it is clearly the duty of Christian parents to occupy the ground first. General Forest was once asked by an admiring lady friend to explain how he managed always to win his battles. The rugged old warrior bluntly replied: "Madam, I got there first with the most men." That is the idea—pre-occupation. If we can first store the mind with useful knowledge there will not only be no room for vice, but there will be no taste for it. Let us, then, out of this great abundance of cheap literature, good, bad and indifferent, select the best and store the mind with good and useful knowledge.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee on Sunday Schools beg leave to report as follows:

At the last meeting of this Association, that prince of Sunday school workers, Bro. J. H. McGuire, recommended in his report "That the territory embraced in this Association be, for convenience, divided into four Sunday School Districts, and that in each district there be held annually, or quarterly, a District Sunday School Convention for each district, and that a District Chairman and Secretary be appointed by this Association, whose duty it will be to call and hold said district conventions."

In accordance with this recommendation the following divisions were made, and Superintendents appointed:

First District—Jasper, Samaria, New Prospect, Coal City, Mt. Carmel and Pleasant Grove. W. G. Davis, Superintendent.

Second District—Carbon Hill, Townley, Saragossa, Liberty Grove and Liberty. R. V. Goss, Superintendent.

Third District—Oakman, Bethel, Lebanon, Mt. Zion, Providence, Pleasant Field and Parrish. J. S. Watts, Superintendent.

Fourth District—Berry Station, Bethabara, Bethlehem, Union Grove, Sulphur Springs, Mt. Joy, Oragonia and New Hope. R. A. Baker, Superintendent.

Your committee has heard from the Superintendents of the First, Second and Third Districts, who report schools in every church in their several districts, which is cause for great rejoicing among us all. We have not heard from the Superintendent of the Fourth District, but hope to have a report of his work at this time. We also hope to have reports from all the Superintendents giving fuller details of their work, telling us of their rallies and work generally.

According to previous appointment our annual Sunday School Convention met with the Baptist Church at Carbon Hill. A good programme was carried out, interspersed with good music. There were many good and interesting speeches made, and some most excellent papers read by some of the ladies. The meeting was well attended, mostly by the people of Carbon Hill and vicinity.

All who attended enjoyed the convention greatly, and it is hoped that much good will come from it. However, there were two things which caused some sadness and disappointment:

1st. The absence of delegates from churches in the country. The Sunday School cause can never be carried to that high degree of success which every follower of Christ should desire until all the workers of our Association come together as one man and consecrate their lives to God's cause to be used by Him as He sees fit. If the place of meeting or the time of meeting

is objectionable, or if there is anything else in the way, let's discuss these things in a brotherly spirit and get at that which is best, and not allow our Master's cause to drag.

2nd If we are not mistaken there was only one minister at the convention, and he lived at Carbon Hill. Now we want it distinctly understood that what we state is in no sense in a spirit of criticism, or intended as a discourtesy, but prompted by a desire to do that which will honor and glorify our Master's cause most. When we consider the ignorance of God's word, and that it is through His word only that the people are to be saved, and when saved it must be through the teaching of His word that His followers are to be made strong and effective workers; and when we know that no church can do the work for which it was instituted without the earnest study of God's word; and that 85 out of every 100 who are taken into the church come through the Sunday school, we cannot understand how any Christian can be indifferent to the work. The ministers are the acknowledged leaders of all good work, and the Sunday School workers of our Association must have their help before the work can succeed as it ought.

We should be grateful to God because the Sunday School cause is taking such a hold on the world as was never known before.

Your Chairman had one of the greatest desires of his life gratified in that he was permitted to attend the meeting of the International Sunday School Convention held in Atlanta last April.

The Sunday school is no longer regarded as a place suited to old women and children only. At the Atlanta convention there was not only the best workers from every State in the United States, but also the best workers from foreign countries. There were editors of our biggest daily papers, Congressmen, Senators, Governors, and in ex-member of the President's Cabinet, and the noblest, best and smartest women in our country, and that the world ever saw, who had come together to devise ways and means to farther the great Sunday School cause.

There were five hundred children dressed in white who made the sweetest music that will ever be heard this side of Heaven.

And there it was announced that our own State, Alabama, was the first State in the South which had organized all of her counties in the Sunday School work, and she was proudly proclaimed a "Banner State."

Verily, verily, this is a great work we are engaged in, and it is not one that we can take up and lay down as we may feel inclined, for Jesus said: "No man, having put his hand to the plow, and looking back, is fit for the Kingdom of God." Luke 9:62.

lishment 122 children gathered from the various counties of the State. and from the counties, in part, which compose our Association. We find from Walker six, Tuscaloosa nine have been received. We further find that under the very efficient management of our beloved brother, J. W. Stewart, the orphans are not only provided with a home, such things as are necessary to happiness and comfort, but they are, when old enough, placed in school, and in addition are taught, the boys to do farm work and the girls house work. We further find that the management, when requested, and when they find the applicants suitable persons to take and rear children, allow such persons to adopt as their own child one of the children from the Home. We find the Home is in debt to the amount of \$1,000. And, brethren, this debt is not all. The howling blasts of winter are almost upon them. Our prayers, our sympathies nor our talks cannot clothe nor feed these children who have been so unfortunate as to be left alone in the world. Will you not help?
