The introductory sermon was preached at 11 o'clock by Elder W. J. Beatty.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Bro. T. K. Harrison.

In behalf of the Association, the Moderator extended a cordial invitation to visiting brethren to occupy seats with us and to aid in the work of the Association.

#### REPORT ON BIBLE AND COLPORTAGE WORK.

We believe this work to be of vast importance to us as a denomination. The Bible, the only infallible guide to mankind, should be in every home; and that literature which is founded upon the same—which is indeed the only literature which can be

called Baptistic, should be distributed throughout the land. This is the great need of the age. The world should know, yes, we ourselves should know just what Baptists believe. Then we recommend that every pastor act as special colporteur in his respective field of labor, and that a small sum of \$30 or \$40 be raised by the churches of each pastor, whose duty it shall be to sell and distribute Bibles and other Baptist literature in his respective bounds, keeping the principal intact to be turned over to his successor.

#### REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Your Committee makes the following report :

At your last session the report on Sabbath Schools was not encouraging, but very significant; it represented the cause of Sabbath Schools in our midst as languishing and almost dead—Only twenty per cent. of the membership of the churches composing this Association engaged in the Sabbath School work, indicating a spiritual drouth and destitution without excuse and without a parallel in the history of the Union Baptist Association. If the church has no spiritual life, and its members are not growing in grace and in the knowledge of the truth as it is in Jesus Christ, then as a natural consequence the Sabbath School, the prayer-meeting, the missionary society and every other church enterprise will cease to exist except in name. Sabbath School work is Christian work, and Christian work is the offspring of love to God and love to our fellow-man. Paul says the love of Christ constrains us to work for Him and the promotion of His cause. This great principle of love, underlying the Christian religion, constrains Christians to occupy every field of labor open to them. Why has the Sabbath School, from a very small beginning, developed into such a wonderful system and power for good, and today is keeping pace with civilization and the spread of the Gospel? Note the fact that Sabbath Schools are in operation in every civilized nation of the world. Recognized not only as the great auxiliary of the church, but as the great instrument in the hands of God of sowing in the minds of unconverted men and women the seeds of divine truth which, under the blessing of God, germinate and bring forth fruit to the honor and glory of His name. Why is all this? How do we account for the wonderful success of Sabbath Schools throughout the Christian world? It is because Sabbath School work is Christian work, and God always blesses His children and the work of their hands when in the performance of Christian duty. Our Heavenly Father marked out the road for His children to travel, and directly over this path hang innumerable blessings; but we must remember that these spiritual blessings are suspended over one path only and that is the path of Christian duty. The fact that God has blessed the Sabbath School in such a wonderful degree is evidence, strong and conclusive, that this is the field of work for every Christian believer, old and young, male and female, high and low, rich and poor. All are invited to come in and work while it is day, because the night of death soon cometh when no man can work. Life is short, time is fleeting and opportunities to do good in the world will soon pass away forever. What a fearful responsibility rests upon the Christian? Shall we continue this do-nothing policy, and suffer when we come to die

the terrible reflection that we have lived to no purpose; that we have not been workers in the vineyard of the Lord, but drones in the hive? Or shall we wake up to our duties and responsibilities and capabilities, and "glorify God in our bodies and spirits which are His" by faithful work in the Sabbath School cause. And when we are called hence let us die with the harness on, with the comfort and consolation that, under God, we have lived to some purpose, and we may say, as Paul did, "I have fought a good fight, I have kept the faith, henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the Righteous Judge, shall give me in that day; and not to me only, but unto all them that love His appearing." In conclusion, we say that mission work is the grand object and purpose of the church here in the wor'd. Under God, the Sabbath School has been blessed as a means by which and through which the principles of missions and the plan of missionary operations are successfully taught. The Sabbath School, next to the pulpit, is the place to teach all the great moral and religious truths of the Bible; the place where we can thoroughly inform ourselves respecting the principles and doctrines of the gospel we profess, thereby enabling us to comply with the injunction of the Apostle: "But sanctify the Lord God in your hearts and be ready always to give an answer to any man that asketh you, a reason for the faith that is in you, with meekness and fear." 1st Peter, 3:15. Many precious promises are laid down in God's word encouraging the Christian to work for the Master, one of which is as follows: "And they that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament; and they that turn many to righteousness, as the stars forever and ever." That God's spirit may direct us respecting this important field of Christian labor, and that at the next meeting of this body we may receive a report of great things done in this line for the Master, is the prayer of your Committee.

#### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

We, your committee, submit the following report:

That we are keenly alive to the great importance of education and believe that institutions of learning of the right kind should be patronized and sustained. We are sensible of the distinction, however, between an education of the mind simply and an education of the mind and heart, and we recommend that only those schools and colleges be patronized which have for their aim the making of good and useful citizens and which inculcate in the heart and mind of the pupil the great principles of morality and religion.

We recommend the Howard and the Judson as worthy, and believe they should be patronized and sustained by our denomination.

We believe that, in these days of learning and progression, it is essential that we have a better educated ministry, and that our young men, who expect to make the preaching of the gospel their life work, should spare no effort in the fitting and preparing of themselves to the end that they may be the more efficient and useful in the service of the Master; and we strongly urge upon our churches the great necessity of aiding all such young men by their sympathy, prayers and money. The Howard College and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky., are our best institutions for the education and training of our ministry, and we urge that they receive our hearty support and liberal patronage.

The report was discussed by M. B. Curry, H. B. Chapel, J. A. Howard, W. L. White and J. H. Curry, and pending the discussion a motion was made to take a collection to assist in paying the debt of the Ministerial Board of Education, which resulted in the collection of \$6.60.

Bro. J. D. Ray was continued as the beneficiary of this Association to Howard College, and the churches requested to take collections for ministerial education as early as practicable. The report was then adopted.

Mission reports were submitted as follows:

#### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

The work of State Missions is one of the gravest problems that confronts us as a denomination. The importance of the work cannot be over-estimated. The success of Home and Foreign Missions in a great measure depends upon the prosecution of State Missions. If we do not give the gospel to our own people and develop them in the grace of giving, all mission work will be a failure. Hence the wisdom of our fathers in establishing the State Board of Missions. The object of this Board is to give the gospel to weak points in city, town and country. For the successful prosecution of the work the Board employs missionary pastors in towns and cities and assists in paying their salaries until said churches become self-sustaining. In this way many of our strongest and most benevolent churches in the State have been helped. In our mining districts there are many foreigners, and it has been rightly said, "If we do not Christianize them they will heathenize us." In Florence, Montgomery, Huntsville, Birmingham and vicinity, and many other places in the State, the Board has done and is doing a great work.

Its work in the country is of no less importance. By the employment of district evangelists the Board is trying to strengthen weak churches and arouse pastors to a sense of duty.

While much has been done, there remains much yet to be done. There are many places now where the Board would like to do work, and would but for a want of funds. This is our Board and it is dependent upon the voluntary offerings of the churches for money, which many of them fail to give.

To carry on its work the Board has either wisely or unwisely incurred a considerable debt. At the last meeting of the State Convention a plan of retrenchment and reform was adopted which will greatly reduce expenses and enable the Board to lessen its debt. The Book Department has been disposed of, and the Board no longer acts as agent for Sunday School literature, Judson Institute, Howard College, the Orphans' Home, or Ministerial Education, but recommends that all moneys for these purposes be sent directly to their respective Boards. Expenses of the home office were also reduced, so that it is claimed a thousand dollars (\$1,000) in all will be saved to the Board annually. It is to be hoped that we can go to the next Convention entirely free from debt.

While some mistakes have been made, yet on the whole under the wise leadership of our present efficient Corresponding Secretary, we have made great progress.

There is a tendency in many of our Associations to return to associational missions, but we would recommend that our Associ-

ation continue to co-operate with our State Board of Missions, and use every means in our power to get them to look after the destitution in our bounds. We would call special attention to the new towns being built on the Mobile & Ohio Railroad in Pickens county, and recommend that some action be taken by this Association to get the Board to take this work under special consideration.

We also recommend that pastors explain the object of State Missions to their respective churches and take regular collections therefor.

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Home Missions is an important and growing subject in all the Christian churches. Opportunities for mission work are constantly being developed of an importance that were never presented before, and in many cases we must avail ourselves of them now or the opportunity is lost forever. A glorification over the results of mission work and the Christian enlightenment that grows out of it is hardly what we want on the present occasion. So I propose to address myself to the business phase of the subject.

The consummation of the Spanish war will bring into the political jurisdiction of our country in some shape or other several of the West India Islands, Cuba, Porto Rico and others, which contain numerous populous and important cities. These Islands belong to our Southern Home Mission Board, at the head of which is that great and good man, Dr. Tichenor, of Atlanta, and it behooves our denomination to enter most earnestly into the effort to aid him in the diffusion of a knowledge of our principles among these people, and to see to it that the Baptists assert their privileges there. Hereafter we will not be hampered by the petty restrictions with which Spanish law has curtailed the freedom of religious worship. Such an occasion and opportunity never were accorded to our church before to strengthen our stakes and lengthen our cords, and such rapid and vigorous work never before was demanded at our hands. Our Board will require increased contributions to meet the growing and pressing demands upon it, and surely the staunch Baptists of the Union Association will not be laggard or remiss in assisting the grand work which is being undertaken by the worthy men who have the management of our Board in hand. If we have not within our body a suitable organization to carry on this important work, we should at once consider the matter and provide the means of discharging this onerous and responsible obligation of our denomination.

Neglect of our duties along this line imposed by the command of the Master has tended to diminish the growth and prosperity of our church and given encouragement to greater effort by other denominations, some of whom threaten us with the engraftment upon our governmental system of an established National religion, which has found painful and menacing illustration in the divers essays on that subject that have been written and published in respectable magazines and reviews in these latter days by some of their votaries, with thousands of approving readers, proposing a union of Church and State so utterly at variance with the spirit and entente of our republican institutions.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Our Foreign Mission work is carried on under the guidance of a board or committee located at Richmond, Va., with Rev. R. J. Willingham as Corresponding Secretary. The fields of labor are

China, Africa, Italy, Brazil, Mexico and Japan. In these fields we have seventy-six missionaries against eighty of last year, and one hundred and seventeen native assistants against one hundred and ten of last year. Seven hundred and one baptisms are reported against six hundred and sixty of last year. The great debt which has overshadowed us has been removed, and instead of \$13,532.79 debt over us as at the close of the last convention year, we had wiped that out, paid all expenses and were able to report \$2,975.96 cash balance. This indeed is gratifying. Let us thank God and take courage, and never go to the convention again with a debt. The only way to prevent this is for the pastors to take collections regularly and be prompt in remitting them. We would request all our pastors to send to Bro. Willingham for mission literature and scatter the same among their people, thus educating them in the great and grand cause of Christianizing the world.

#### REPORT ON ORPHANS' HOME.

The Baptist Orphans' Home, located at Evergreen, Ala., was organized in 1893. Contains at the present time forty-nine children—eighteen boys and thirty-one girls. Since its foundation there have been gathered in ninety children in all. Homes by adoption have been found for twenty-two in good Christian families.

The original cost of the Home was \$5,000.00 for eighty acres of land, with building containing ten rooms, to which has been added a brick building containing eleven rooms, costing \$3,500.00, for which we owe a balance of \$400.00. The Board is behind on current expenses \$400.00. It is the desire of the Board to dedicate this property October 1st free from debt. There is no enterprise in which we are engaged that should excite the benevolent hearts of our Baptist brotherhood more than the care and training of the helpless orphan. Therefore we especially recommend that the churches make regular contributions to this most worthy cause.

## REPORT ON DECEASED MINISTERS.

Your Committee report :

That in the providence of God we have lost one of our most loved and efficient ministers.

Milton Giles Lofton has been called from his labors on earth to "that rest which remaineth for the people of God." Brother Lofton was born July 19th, 1844. Married Miss M. A. Hanson August 25th, 1869. He professed faith in Christ and united with the Baptist Church of Christ at Unity on Saturday before the first Sabbath in May, 1867, and was baptized the next day by the pastor, Elder J. H. Cason. Brother Lofton was licensed to preach the gospel in December, 1867, was ordained a deacon of Unity Church June conference, 1867, was ordained to the full work of the ministry September, 1881, and departed this life November 13th, 1897.

We murmur not at the will of our Heavenly Father, but feel and mourn the loss of one who had just reached the meridian of his efficiency and usefulness. His churches have lost a faithful pastor and his congregations a truly sympathizing friend. Truly will his memory be enshrined upon our hearts. To his bereaved widow and children we extend our sympathy and condolence in this their great affliction.

## REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

There is no more potent instrument in shaping the character and destiny of the youth of our land than the reading of religious literature. We would most heartily recommend the careful and prayerful study of the Bible, for it is the best of classics; upon it are based all moral and social laws that are for the upbuilding of the world. We also desire that our State paper, The Alabama Baptist, should find its way into every home, because it is a Baptist paper and we should read it that our hearts may be brought into close touch with the doings of the Baptists of Alabama; that we may be in sympathy with the great interests of our denomination. We recommend the careful reading of the Foreign Mission Journal, the Home Field, in order that we may be brought into sympathy with the great cause of missions.

## REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee on Temperance report as follows:

We are sorry to believe that temperance has made no progress in our bounds for the last Associational year. There is no sin more blighting and degrading to the souls of men than intem-

perance. For not only do we see its effects upon manhood and boyhood, but their souls are being harvested in the drunkard's hell. Can we as Christians continue to remain indifferent and unconcerned in regard to this, the greatest of all evils? That hon-eyed word, "saloon," has caused more sorrow and grief than all the wars of the nineteenth century. With us this sin, intemperance, has caused more perjury than all other sins combined. Laws are ignored, and our penal code is a farce. The question is reduced to this—shall the world or the Church of Jesus Christ dominate? Can a child of God remain indifferent? Then let us align ourselves on the side of Him who, while on earth, "went about doing good."
