REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

We, your Committee on Associational Missions, beg to submit the following report:

1st. The foundation of all mission work lies in the individual, since in regeneration all persons are imbued with a spirit of missions, and it is the sense of this committee that we should use our best efforts to organize the churches, and especially the young people, in more systematic work for the Master. We therefore recommend that all our pastors, and in case there is no pastor, some deacon or other capable Baptist, proceed as early as possible to organize a Young People's Union and Sunday School in every church and community.

2d. That all our ministers and church workers be requested to preach, talk, work and pray for the success of all missions since we are unable to see why a spirit that opposes missions does not condemn us in opposing Christianity and destroying the hope of all that are now unsaved. We recommend that an earnest, capable evangelist should be employed to work only in the destitution of this Association for not less than three months—July, August and September next, and that the matter be referred to the Executive Committee for definite action, when the proper man can be secured and satisfactory arrangements can be made. It is further the opinion of this committee that every Baptist, and especially the ministers, should make sacrifices of time and property to reach every destitution and unsaved person in this Association and in the world. REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Foreign Missions beg to submit the following report:

By consulting the statistical report of the Foreign Board we find that there has been great progress made in all the fields where missionary operations are held, except in the countries of Japan and Africa.

We find that there are 196 missionaries and native helpers, with 735 baptisms and a membership of 3,801, being an increase of 308 since the last annual report.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Realizing as we do that next to preaching the ever-lasting gospel that there is nothing which bears a heavenlier aspect, or breathes purer fragrance than the education of the minds when directed in a proper moral channel, for it is in the school room the foundation is laid upon which the solid trust build. Therefore, we cannot be too careful as to how this foundation is laid. While we do not object to a system of education under the direction of the state, yet we, as Baptists, cannot afford to trust the training of our boys and girls to the state. Therefore, we earnestly urge on our people the vital importance of patronizing our denominational schools, for in no other department of education can we be assured of the proper moral as well as the intellectual training of our children. Above all the scientific training of the mind let us give our young people the advantage of a moral education, so that when every memento of greatness is lost in the general wreck of nature this foundation shall remain to swell the list of the mighty throng which have been clothed with the mantle of righteousness and their voices attuned to the melody of heaven for this principle like a tender flower planted in the fertile soil of a true heart will grow, and expand its foliage, and impart its fragrance till transplanted to bloom in perpetual vigor and unfading beauty in the "Paradise of God."

So again we say patronize our own schools, especially the Howard College, for boys, and the Judson Institute, for girls. We further urge upon the members of this Association the importance of ministerial education, and recommend that some steps be taken to assist young ministers in obtaining an education who are unable to educate themselves.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Your committee on State Missions beg leave to submit the following report:

We find, that notwithstanding the financial depression of the past year, the work has steadily advanced; but, in volume and results, is still far below the duty and the privilege of the denomination in this state, the desires of those who love the cause of Christ and the actual needs of the harvest field. The State Board has now in the field twenty-four missionaries.

Cash on hand and received from Nov. 1, 1895, to July 1, 1896,	55,575.00
Disbursements to July 1, 1896,	3,605.00

Leaves an indebtedness of \$51,970.00

We feel that the outlook is very encouraging. Indeed, from the best sources of information at hand, we are led to believe that it is brighter now than it has been within five years. This shows that there has been a campaign of education carried on among the rank and file, which we trust will be prosecuted with still greater vigor during the coming year.

We have no new methods or plans to suggest; but think it of the most importance that the principle and privilege of giving to be preached out this one of the last and greatest commands of the Master, be preached from the pulpit, taught in the Sunday Schools and in all the homes within

Read report on Home Missions, which was adopted without discussion.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

We, your Committee on Home Mission, beg leave to report the following:

We can do nothing better than to copy the report of the work of the Home Mission Board. The labors of our missionaries this year have been attended by the influence of the Divine spirit, so that only once before in all its history has the board been able to report such results. The number of missionaries has been a small decrease from the number reported the previous year, but larger than any other year in the board's history. The baptisms have been 5,617, only 304 less than last year. The receipts have been \$75,927.51 against \$76,770.91 last year. The estimated value of the board's property last year was \$99,430. The increase during the present year has been \$5,150, making the present total \$104,580. The board began the year with a debt of \$1,100 and ends the year with \$7,950 indebtedness incurred during the present year is \$6,850. Of this amount \$5,150 has been invested in property in New Orleans and El Paso, leaving the actual expenditure for the present year above receipts \$1,600.

Following is the work for the conventional year: Missionaries, 411; week of labor, 12,329; churches and stations, 1,626; sermons and addresses, 58,041; prayer meetings, 9,622; baptisms, 5,617; received by letter 6,672; total addition, 13,295; Sunday Schools organized, 372; teachers and pupils, 12,635; religious visits, 61,498; churches constituted, 106; houses of worship built, 92; houses of worship improved, 146; amount expended on houses of worship, \$36,209; Bibles and testaments distributed, 2,595; tracts distributed, pages, 726,675. The State Board or Alabama, Arkansas, District of Columbia, Florida, Georgia, Indian Territory, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, Western Arkansas and Western North Carolina are in co-operation with us in a part or the whole of their work. Brethren, we, your committee, urge that the churches be requested to heartily co-operate with the board in this work.

DIGEST OF LETTERS AND STATE OF CHURCHES.

Your committee beg to report that in many respects this has been one of the best years of the Associations existence. Some features are worthy of special emphasis. It has been a year marked by gracious revivals in many of our churches, the total number of baptisms being 167, and the net reported growth of our membership reaches the encouraging number of 302. Many flourishing Sunday Schools are reported, and we feel sure that there are others not reported in the letters. The financial report, while far from what it ought to be, is still gratifying as compared with that of last year. Two churches gave nothing to any of the boards. All contributed to minutes, and all reported by letter. We trust that next year will mark a great stride forward in the manifestation of the grace of

liberality on the part of our churches. The churches seem almost totally to have forgotten ministerial education, and we recommend early collections for that purpose.

Moved that Bro. Culbertson be instructed to go to the Southern Baptist Convention, also W. Y. Adams.

Moved that the Clerk be instructed to retain \$5.00 for his services and expend the remainder for minutes.

Resolved that the hearty thanks of the members of the Association are due and are hereby extended to the very hospitable people of Pilgrim Rest Church and community for their loving and sumptuous entertainment of the brethren during this Association.

Read following report on Sunday Schools.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your committee on Sunday Schools beg leave to submit the following report.

There is no work in connection with the church of more importance than that of the Sunday School. There is nothing which can take the place of the Sunday School. The preaching of the word from the sacred desk cannot supply the mission of the Sunday School. The Sunday School is really the church at work, a place where the little boys and girls are being taught the scriptures, which are able to make them wise unto salvation. The ministrations from the pulpit are rendered much more efficient by the work of the Sunday School, because the minds and hearts of its students are prepared to receive the truths of the gospel.

We are happy to note there has been a great awakening among the Christians of all denominations to the importance of Sunday Schools. We noticed in the letters from the various churches to the Association that nearly every church has a good Sunday School, and further, that most of the conversions were from the Sunday School. This is certainly encouraging and should stimulate us to work with still more zeal and energy in the Sunday School cause.

We are commanded to train up our children in nurture and admonition of the Lord, and, there is no better way, in connection with home training than through the Sunday School. Through the medium of the Sunday School we are enabled to reach a large class of children who would otherwise receive no religious training. A large percent of parents are not Christians, and of course their children do not receive religious training at home, and even among parents who profess to be followers of Christ, the religious training of the children is sadly neglected in the home.

The Sunday School has been truthfully termed the nursery of the church, for statistics show that a large percent of the accessions to the church are from the Sunday School and that nearly all the children brought up in the Sunday Schools become Christians, and efficient workers in the vineyard of the Lord, while a very small percent of those outside of the Sunday School ever become Christians, and those who do are not so zealous in the cause.

We your committee are of the opinion, that where it is practicable that we shall have denominational schools, that is, we should have Baptist Sunday Schools, not merely in name, but indeed and in truth, Sunday Schools where the peculiar tenets and doctrines which distinguish Baptist from all others are clearly taught. If our doctrines are worth anything at all they are worth being taught to our children, and to the world. If we have the truth as it is in Christ, and revealed in the New Testament, surely we ought not to cover it up, or be ashamed to maintain it boldly before the world. We are commanded to contend earnestly for the faith once delivered unto the saints, and to keep the ordinances pure as they were delivered unto us, and if we fail to do this, for fear of being called

selfish and bigoted, then we have more regards for the opinions of men than for the commands of God.

In conclusion if we are sincere in the belief that we as Baptists have the truth in its purity, let us teach it to our children and all mankind, the truth the whole truth, and nothing but the truth.

CONSTITUTION.

The name of the Association shall be "The Iowa Baptist Association."

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall perform such duties and perform them in such a manner as is ordinarily required of such officers. They shall be elected at or near the opening of each annual session of the body.

The membership of the Association shall be such churches as shall see fit and be permitted to represent themselves in its session, by delegates.

Each church shall be entitled to one delegate for each twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof, but each church shall be entitled to at least two delegates.

The object of this Association shall be the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom not only within its bounds, but throughout the world. It shall aid and encourage, by means of its influence, those grand institutions and agencies which, in the providence of God, have been established by the wise and good among our brethren for the spread of the Gospel throughout the world for the distribution of the Bible among those destitute of it, for the education of young men for the work of the ministry, as well as for the cause of education generally, for the promotion of the Sunday School cause, the cause of temperance, etc.

The Association shall employ such means and adopt such measures as shall seem best calculated to cultivate Christian unity and fellowship among the brethren within its bounds, to provoke the brethren to love and do good work, to stir up the pure minds of the brethren by way of remembrance, to secure individual advancement in the divine life, in every way as individuals, to illustrate to the world the reality of the religion of Jesus Christ.

BY-LAWS.

1. Preparatory to the organization of the Association an introductory sermon shall be preached by a member appointed at the previous meeting, and another shall be named at the same time to perform the duty in case of the failure of the first.

2. The service being performed, the Moderator, or if he be absent, the oldest minister present shall open the Association with prayer.

3. He shall call for letters from the churches, when the delegates shall present them and take their seats in order.

4. When the Association is regularly organized, as prescribed by the Constitution, the correspondence from other Associations shall be called for, the letters read and the messengers received by the right hand of fellowship from the moderator. The messenger shall be invited to seats in the Association and accorded the privilege of speaking on any subject before the body, but not of voting on any. Other brethren may be invited to seats with the same privilege and prohibition.

5. Subjects not named in the last minutes may, at the discretion of the Association, be taken up at any time when there is no business before the body.

6. Any subject not contained in the minutes must be regularly brought forward by motion which shall be seconded before it can be taken up. After this it shall be considered as property at the disposal of the Association, unless it be withdrawn by the mover.

7. No one shall speak often than three times on the same subject, unless permitted by the Association. The speaker shall always rise to his feet and address the Moderator.

8. Silence and decorum shall be observed by every member of the Association while the body is in session, and more especially in the time of debate. All personal reflections and remarks tending to wound the feelings of brethren shall be strictly avoided.

9. No member of the Association shall leave the house while the Association is in session without leave of the Moderator.

10. In order to expediate business, committees shall be raised at the discretion of the Association, who shall be named by the moderator.

11. The meeting of the Association shall, on each day of session, be opened and closed with prayer.

12. The minutes of each day shall be read at its beginning and close of business, after prayer, each succeeding day, when the names of the delegates shall be called, and the whole minutes of the session shall be read at its close and signed by the Moderator and Clerk.

13. Any alteration of these By-Laws may be made at any meeting of the Association by two-thirds of the members present.

RULES OF ORDER.

The rules of order usually observed by deliberative bodies of this kind shall be observed by this Association.

If any point of order be raised by any member of the body, it shall be decided by the Moderator, but appeal may be taken from his decision to the body.

"Well's Parliamentary Practice" shall be used as authority in regard to questions of order.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

There is one and but one God, who is a spirit, omniscient, omnipotent, omnipresent, eternal, unchangeable, infinite in goodness and wisdom, of inviolable truth, perfectly just, of immaculate holiness, the Creator of all things, the preserver of all, and the supreme ruler over all.

The Godhead is a trinity—Father, Son and Holy Ghost—three persons in one divine essence.

The Son is incarnate, thus uniting in himself the divine and the human nature, and becoming the mediator between God and man; man's final judge, and the one who has the object of our faith in the Redeemer and Savior of His people.

The Holy Spirit is the sanctifier and comforter of God's people. He is the agent of the divine work of regeneration of the new spiritual life produced in man in his regeneration.

The Holy Scriptures were given by divine inspiration as a revelation of God's will to man, and constitute to him an infallible rule of faith and practice.

Adam, the first man and woman, were created holy, and for a time served the Creator happily, living innocently and happy in His favor; but Adam, having been placed in the covenant of works, violated it and brought the penalty of the violation upon himself and his descendants.

All men partaking of the consequences of the fall, are both totally depraved and guilty of a total transgression of God's laws.

No man can free himself from his native depravity, or from condemnation. No man can save himself. There is no way of salvation but by Jesus Christ.

The Christian Sabbath is the first day of the week, and should be kept holy and consecrated to the service and worship of God in obedience to the command, "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy," and in commemoration of the resurrection on that day of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

The ordinances of the gospel are two, Baptism, and the Lord's supper. The Great Head of the Church requires the perpetual observance of these ordinances by the church as such and under their authority.

Baptism is the immersion of the believer in water by one duly qualified and authorized to administer the rite. It is prerequisite to church membership.

A gospel church is a company of Baptized believers, organized under the laws of its Great Head, for the advancement of God's kingdom in the world. The officers of the church are its pastors and deacons. Each church is an independent body, subject only to the commands of its Great Head. The work required of the church is missionary in its character. "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

The Holy Spirit continues the work of sanctification upon those whom He has regenerated to the end of life, and thus save all who are regenerated from apostasy.

All who will be finally saved were chosen of God the Father before the foundation of the world, and gave to Jesus Christ in the covenant of grace; yet all who will be lost will have rejected a preferred salvation.

The bodies of all who die will be raised from the dead and reunited to their spirits for the judgement of the great day.

In the last day Jesus Christ will come to judge the world, and having assembled all men before him, will pass sentence upon them according to their works.

Heaven is a place to which the righteous will be received, and made perfectly happy in the presence and enjoyment of God forever.

Hell is a place into which the wicked shall be cast, to suffer everlasting punishment for their sins.
