PROCEEDINGS.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Elder B. M. WARE, from Psalms 133 : 1, "Behold how good and pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity."

ORGANIZATION.

After an intermission of 30 minutes, the delegates assembled in the house and were called to order by the Moderator. After singing a hymn and being led in prayer by bro. DANIELL, the letters from the Churches were read, most of which contained cheering accounts of revivals.

Elected bro. W. W. MASON, Moderator, Elder C. A. STANTON, Clerk, and bro. J. W. ECHOLS, Treasurer.

AFTERNOON SESSION:

Elder S. Henderson being too feeble from indisposition to preach the Missionary Sermon, at the request of Elder C. A. Staton, (the alternate,) Elder I. T. Tichenor was requested to preach said sermon.

Appointed the next session of this body to be held with the Notasulga Baptist Church; bro. Handey to preach the Introductory Sermon, bro. Jones alternate; bro. Brown to preach the Missionary Sermon, bro. Ely alternate.

Amendments to the constitution were offered by bro. Newman, which were on motion, referred to a select Committee consisting of brethren Newman, A Miles, Granberry; Thomas and Jones. to report at the next session of the Association.

On motion, a Committee consisting of brethren Granberry, Stanton and Handey, were appointed to consider the propriety of re-establishing the general meeting system. Also to redistrict the Association and report Monday morning.

Adjourned to hear preaching at the stand. At 11 o'clock bro. Harris preached at the stand, followed by bro. Brown.

At 3 o'clock, P. M., bro. Daniell preached, followed by bro. Hand. Also at night, by bro. J. W. Williams, followed by bro. Stanton.

SABBATH EXERCISES.

At 9½ o'clock, the brethren engaged in a prayer-meeting at the stand. At 11 o'clock, A. M., Elder I. T. Tichenor preached the Missionary Sermon to a large and attentive audience, after which a collection was taken for Missions amounting in cash and pledges to \$

At the same hour Doctor, a colored brother, preached to the colored people at the house, and collection for African Missions amounting to \$6.30.

At 2 o'clock, Elder C. A. Stanton preached at the stand,

and bro. Ely to the blacks at the house ; Elder Joshua Mercer preached at night, followed by bro. Callaway.

The congregations were large and attentive and the brethren preached with zeal and energy and we hope the fruits of their labors may be gathered in days to come.

MONDAY MORNING, SEPT. 20TH.

Convened according to adjournment. Prayer by bro. J. D. Williams.

On motion, a Committee consisting of brethren Newman, Handey and Blakey, were appointed to correspond with the Agent of the Baptist Book Emporium at Montgomery in relation to a donation proposed to be made to this Association by said Emporium.

Read and adopted the report of the Committee on Documents. Appendix A.

Read and adopted the report of the Committee on Education. Appendix B.

Read and adopted the report of the Committee on Periodicals. Appendix C.

Read and adopted the report of the Committee on the State of the Churches. Appendix D.

Read and adopted the report of the Committee on Sabbath Schools. Appendix E.

Read and adopted the report of the Executive Committee, Appendix F.

Read the report of the Committee on Missions, which, on motion, was made the special order for 2 o'clock this evening.

Read and adopted the report of the Committee on the Southern Baptist Publication Society. Appendix G.

Appointed brethren Henderson, Battle and Echols, an Executive Committee for the ensuing Associational year.

The Committee to whom was referred the subject of re-establishing the general meeting system, made their report which, on motion, was laid on the table.

Read and adopted the report of the Committee on Finance. Adjourned to 2 o'clock, P. M.

Preaching at the stand at 11 o'clock, by bro. Brown followed by bro. Barrow.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Met according to adjournment.

The report of the Committee on Missions being the special order for this hour, it was taken up and after hearing an address on Missions from bro. Holman, it was adopted. Appendix H.

The following brethren agree to pay annually the amounts annexed to their names for the support of a native Indian preacher, viz : J. M. Newman \$10, C. Battle \$10, C. A. Battle \$10, J. W. Echols \$10, W. W. Mason \$10, B. Graves \$10, J. W. Swearingen \$10, A. C. Bennett \$5, S. Henderson \$5, W. P. Chilton \$10, H. H. Bacon \$10, J. M. Bennett \$10.

Bro. Henderson offered the following :

Resolved, That the thanks of this body be tendered to the brethren and friends of Cubahatchee Church for their kindness and hospitality extended to us during our session among them.

Instructed the Treasurer to pay the Clerk \$30 for his services and the balance of the Minute fund be appropriated to the printing and distribution of Minutes.

*Bro. Henderson offered the following :

Resolved, That twenty-five dollars of the unappropriated moneys in the hands of the Treasurer be paid the Clerk for bringing up the former records of this Association, and the balance be appropriated to the Board of Domestic Missions at Marion.

Adjourned to meet with the Notasulga Baptist Church, Macon County, Ala., on Friday before the third Sabbath in September, 1859.

The brethren engaged in singing a hymn, during which they extended to each other the parting hand, and they felt that it was good for brethren to dwell together in unity.

Report of the Committee on Documents.

Your Committee have carefully examined the letters and documents pertaining to the business of the Association, and find but few items necessary to be noticed in the report of the Committee.

The first and most important item to notice, is a resolution of the Cubahatchee Church, recommending the discontinuance of a missionary in the bounds of the Association. Also a similar suggestion from Pine Level Church: Your Committee fully concur in the recommendation of these Churches for the reasons set forth by them, viz: First—The expense incurred in the support of a missionary could be more profitably appropriated to the pressing necessities of Foreign and Domestic Missions, the Bible Board and Indian Missions; Second: The Committee are of opinion that most, if not all the Churches within the bounds of the Association, have their regular Pastors, whose duties it is, we think, to preach regularly to the colored congregations. The next item we notice, is the petition of three Churches for the next session of the Association to be held with them, viz: Tuskegee, Notasulga, and Farmville. The Delegates from these Churches having settled the matter between themselves and agreed upon Notasulga, which was concurred in by the Association.

Report of the Committee on Education.

Your Committee beg leave to report, that among the most pleasing indications furnished by the present state of our country, is the increased intense feeling on the subject of Education:

The history of the few past years has exhibited a most remarkable and gratifying change in this respect. Schools and Colleges have sprung up in almost every part of our State and have been endowed and sustained with a liberality worthy of our intelligent and free people.

Our own denomination has manifested its share of enterprise on this subject, and our numerous and popular institutions of learning are the best commendations of the generous spirit of our people. A new Female College under Baptist auspices, is about opening in the city of Tuscaloosa with flattering prospects of success. We trust that it may prove a blessing to that part of our State and a zealous and efficient co-worker with Judson and our own East Alabama Female College and the LaFayette Collegiate Institute. In Howard College, our denomination in the State feel a deep and abiding interest, and we rejoice in its increasing prosperity. We have learned with pleasure of the success which has attended the labors of bro.

W. S. Barton, the agent of the College, and we trust our brethren of this Association will give him a hearty welcome and respond generously to his calls. Since the last meeting of this Association a change has occurred in the Presidency of the East Alabama Female College. Bro. H. H. Bacon found it necessary to resign his position. The friends of the College regret that his failing health did not permit him to retain a position which he has filled with so much credit to himself and such general satisfaction to his patrons. But we take pleasure in stating that his place has been supplied by the election of bro. W. F. Perry, late Superintendent of Education in this State. From his known ability and experience as a teacher, the friends of the College hope for the happiest results to the Institution. They confidently expect that the high degree of prosperity hitherto enjoyed, will suffer no abatement under his administration.

The Collegiate Institute in Tuskegee has passed into the hands of an able Faculty composed of brethren P. W. Dodson, W. B. Jones and Mr. J. T. Park. They have recently opened under the most flattering prospects of success. This is, however, not a denominational enterprise.

In conclusion, your Committee congratulate the Association on the condition of the educational enterprises in which we are interested, and recommend a continuance of the same patronage and support they have hitherto afforded these institutions.

Report of the Committee on Missions.

Your Committee beg leave to report :

1st. In reference to our Associational missions we are happy to report that our missionary, Bro. Callaway, has done efficient service, and his labors have been much blessed, both as missionary and colporteur, and recommend, at least, the continuance of our colportage operations in our bounds.

2nd. Our general domestic operations under the supervision of the board at Marion claims our prompt attention. The tide of emigration and the acquisition of territory, has opened a new field for labor that ought speedily to be occupied. Providence seems to be pouring thousands of emigrants into our midst from different parts of the world with their superstition and idolatries which must affect our institutions unless promptly met by the gospel. Brethren, let us as we possess the men and the means try to make them available in supplying the wants of the great West that is now open before us. Brethren, let us go up and possess the land which the Lord has said he will give us.

3rd. The Foreign Mission field presents the most encouraging prospects in the history of its operations. The condition of Africa and China which claims the special attention of Southern Baptists presents the most inviting field for missionary labor. Now, brethren, let us promptly respond to their calls and as the most efficient means for its accomplishments we recommend that the pastors of the various churches of this Association be requested to bring these claims before their churches at least once a year. Executive Committee's Report.

Immediately after the adjournment of the last Association your Committee had a meeting and agreed to re-appoint our former Missionary and Colporteur, Rev. F. Callaway. The following is the result of the eight month's service he has rendered, for which we stipulated to pay him five hundred and fifty dollars. He has traveled 1500 miles, preached 207 sermons, besides making many lectures and exhortations—sold \$430 worth of religious books. He has been engaged something over eight months in this service; he as he was a portion of the time out of the proper limits of the body, he only expects to be compensated for the eight months. Bro. Callaway suggest that it is not necessary to employ a missionary to the colored people any longer by this body as the churches generally have a separate service for them at their places of worship. Your Committee would recommend, however, their successors be instructed to employ some efficient Colporteur to take charge of the book fund and self denomination-al and religious books, provided the salary for said Colporteur shall not be more than, say \$

In parting with bro. Callaway after an official connection with him for four years we must be allowed to say that our intercourse has been always of the most pleasant character. He has always been at his post and rendered efficient service. We commend him to God, and the word of his grace and trust that his last days may be as happy as his former ones have been useful. The Southern Baptist Publication Society owes its existence to circumstances familiar to us all. It is the creature of Southern Baptists, and for them to say whether or not it shall accomplish under the divine blessing all that an instrumentality is capable of doing, and which its friends and supporters in originating it. Your Committee believe that under all the circumstances, the Publication Society has done well thus far in carrying out its benevolent mission. It has already issued 222,175 volumes containing 82,775,666 pages while other important works are now in press and will soon be issued.

We also notice with pleasure that the Society has undertaken the publication of a suitable Sunday School literature for the Baptist of the South. At its last annual meeting a report was unanimously adopted, setting forth the expediency of merging the Publication Society in the Southern Baptist Convention to become a board of said Convention. Your Committee approve to the plan recommended and desire its consummation.

In conclusion, we would urge the churches of this Association to foster and support by their sympathy and patronage an Institution which has already done much and promises to do still more in supplying our people with a sound, healthful religious literature, until it shall have placed within the reach of all such books as are demanded for the perfecting of the saints—the illustration of our doctrine and ordinances and the awakening the conversion of sinners.
