## MINUTES.

UNITY CHURCH,  
FAYETTE COUNTY, ALA., Oct. 13, 1900.

On Saturday, October 13th, 1900, the New River Baptist Association met with Unity Church, Fayette county, Alabama, at 11 o'clock a. m. The introductory sermon was preached by Elder J. S. Townsend from Tim. 3:15. The sermon was instructive. After the sermon, the congregation was dismissed for refreshments which were served on the premises, in great abundance, for the people and beasts. Each one did justice to the occasion.

At 2:30 p. m. the delegates reassembled in the commodious church house, and after signing, Scripture reading, and prayer, Rev. G. W. Gravlee, former Moderator, called the Association to order, for permanent reorganization. Rev. J. S. Shirley and brother S. W. Clements acting as reading clerks, and the letters from the churches were placed on the table, as names were called. The letters were then read by the clerks, and names of churches and delegates were enrolled as follows:

At this juncture Rev. A. N. Reeves challenged the seats of delegates from Mt. Lebanon church, on the ground that said church was not in harmony with the Association, whereupon a committee of five, consisting of J. E. Cox, G. H. White, G. W. Black, W. S. Bobo and J. S. Shirley, were appointed to investigate the validity of said challenge.

Eld. W. S. Waldrop, of Yellow Creek Association, and brother J. M. Stewart, acting as tellers, the Association permanently organized, by electing Elders G. W. Gravlee and J. E. Cox, Moderator and Clerk, respectively, and Sam. W. Clements, Corresponding Secretary.

The Constitution, Articles of Faith and Rules of Decorum were read by brother S. W. Clements, at the request of the Moderator.

Petitionary letters for admission into this Body were called for, and brethren J. M. Stewart, E. P. Goodwin presented a letter from Fayette, a new church organized in the new town of Fayette. The Moderator extended the hand of welcome to these brethren.

On motion, adjourned until 9 o'clock a. m. tomorrow, (Sunday).

The congregation was led in prayer by brother J. H. Meharg.

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#### SUNDAY, OCTOBER 14, 1900.

The report of the Committee on Sunday Schools was called for and read by W. F. Nichols, Chairman.

Your Committee on Sunday Schools submit the following report:—We did not meet in Convention as requested by this Body in its last session, yet we feel the importance of the wonderful work done by the Sunday Schools. We simply neglected our duty. We recommend this Body to appoint, as it did last session, a Sabbath School committee, composed of one member of each church of this Association, to work a Sabbath School in every church, using the Sabbath School Literature published in Nashville, Tenn., by Southern Baptist Convention.

Pending the adoption of the report, speeches were made by W. F. Nichols, H. T. Shirley, T. J. Garrison, G. H. White and others.

At 11 o'clock on Sunday, Rev. G. W. Gravlee, (the appointee to preach at this hour,) after reading the Scripture lesson, and prayer, read a text from Luke 24:47. He was at his best, and preached a good sermon to a large and attentive congregation; after which, a collection for Missions was taken, amounting to \$5.65. The Body then adjourned until 8 o'clock a. m. Monday. Prayer by W. J. Blankenship.

MONDAY, OCTOBER 15, 1900.

Delegates assembled pursuant to adjournment, at 8 o'clock a. m. The Body was called to order by the Moderator, and, after song service, was led in prayer by Rev. J. S. Townsend.

On motion, Rev. G. H. White was granted leave of absence on account of sickness in his family.

On motion, a Committee on Deceased Ministers was appointed, consisting of Elds. J. S. Shirley, J. S. Townsend, and Deacon L. B. Harbin.

The Committee appointed to investigate the validity of the challenge, as to the rights and seats of Mount Lebanon delegates as members of this Body, (after suspending the regular order of business) reported:

Your Committee, appointed to investigate the ground and validity of the challenge, refusing rights and seats of delegates of Mt. Lebanon church, as members of this Association, submit the following report: Whereas, at the request of 15 or 16 members of Mt. Lebanon church, who claimed to be aggrieved by a majority of said church, did appoint committees at the sessions of 1898 and 1899, to visit said church and investigate the cause of said grievance, and, whereas, said Mt. Lebanon church rejected said committees, and by resolution, ignored the authority of the Association to appoint such committee, refused to let the matter and cause of said grievance be investigated, therefore, it is the sense of this Committee, that, inasmuch as said church defied the authority and ignored the act of the Association and rejected said com-

mittees, the ground of challenge was reasonable, and validity of the challenge indubitable. We suggest that this Body drop from the roll, the name of Mount Lebanon church, on account of her persistent refusal to respect the authority of this Body to advise as to methods, and labor through committees, in bringing peace and union, when and where needed in our churches. This is painful, but in our judgment, it is the only alternative. Fraternally,

Resolved, That the New River Baptist Association, now in session, recommend these brethren and sisters, as worthy the confidence and Christian fellowship of any of our churches, and advise any Baptist church, to which they may apply for admittance into fellowship, to receive them without letters, or, that they may be organized into a local church, provided the cause of Christ demands such organization. T. Holiman into her fellowship without a letter from Rocky Mount church, from which the said Holiman had been excluded. Also, requesting this Body to investigate the act of Rocky Mount church in the exclusion of said Holiman, which she did, and found no error in discipline or act in said exclusion.

#### MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We, your Committee on Ministerial Education, make the following report: Since there has been no appli-

cation to your Committee for aid, nothing has been done. However, we recommend that churches in our union take up collections during the year for this important work, the same to be sent to the Ministers' fund of Howard College. A. N. REEVES, Ch'n.

#### ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Missions submit the following report: There has been no Mission work done in our bounds. We find there are Mission funds in the hands of the Treasurer, amounting to \$43.72, and feel sure that the entire amount pledged last session would have been paid, had Mission work been done—or begun. As we believe the work is greatly needed, we recommend that the Board prosecute the work, and call a meeting and ascertain from the various churches of this Body at once, the amount they can pay to prosecute the work in our bounds. We find that our State, Home and Foreign fields need help, for the need of work increases, as well as the need of funds.

Not having learned from statistics the amount paid, we recommend that the Treasurer be instructed to pay all Mission money now in his hands, to the different Secretaries of Boards—is contemplated by those who paid the funds, as requested by this Body.

If church members would abstain from every appearance of evil, drunkenness would cease in our churches. We, therefore, urge prohibition. Bretheren, the time has now come, when God's people should take a firm stand against this evil, and for God and Christianity.

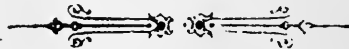

## CONSTITUTION.

ART. 1. This Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our union, who on producing letters, shall be entitled to seats.

ART. 2. This Association shall be known by the name of the New River Baptist Association, which shall have the privilege to enact and carry out missionary purposes in all their bearings; yet so that churches and individual members are left free, and that giving or withholding shall not be a bar to fellowship.

ART. 3. To give churches the best advice she can in all matters of difficulty, and if the union be broken between any of the sister churches to inquire into the cause of the breach and use her best endeavors to remove the difficulty; but if the breach cannot be repaired, to withdraw from any church or churches which she may look upon as being unsound in principal or immoral in practice until the same be reclaimed.

ART. 4. The churches in our union shall transmit to every annual session of the Association a written communion, specifying the names of their delegates, their number in fellowship, baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and deceased since the last session of the Association, the state of their Sabbath Schools and prayer meetings, and the number of ordained ministers and licensed preachers, with their postoffices which shall be read and minuted accordingly.

ART. 5. Every church in our union shall be entitled to representation in the following manner: Each church shall be entitled to send three delegates and no more, Any church failing to represent herself as above prescribed, shall state her reasons at the next session.

ART. 6. The Association thus formed a majority of the members present shall choose by ballot a Moderator and Clerk, who shall serve one year.

ART. 7. Churches may be admitted into this union who petition by letter and delegates and upon nomination, if found orthodox and orderly shall be received by the Association, which shall be manifested by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

ART. 8. Every query sent up to the Association by any church in the union, shall be read and put to a vote by the Moderator whether it shall be debated, and if there be a majority for it, it shall be taken up and investigated, but if not shall be withdrawn; provided, always, that those be first considered which affect the union of the churches.

ART. 9. Voting shall be confined exclusively to the body in all acts respecting their internal concerns.

ART. 10. The Association shall not adjourn any session until she shall have finished all the business on hand, except in extraordinary cases.

ART. 11. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if necessary, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the session rises.

ART. 12. The Association shall, in all cases, be governed by a majority of the members presents.

ART. 13. Amendments to this Constitution may be made at any session of the Association when a majority of its members present shall deem it necessary

## ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe there is one only true and living God, and three persons in the Godhead, the Father the Son and the Holy Ghost.
2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the word of God, and the only rules of faith and practice.
3. We believe in the doctrine of human depravity; that it disables man from keeping the law for life, and that man's recovery and final salvation depends entirely upon the provision which Christ has made, and offered upon the condition of faith.
4. We believe in the doctrine of election through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth,
5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only by the merits of Jesus Christ.
6. We believe the saints shall persevere in grace, and not one of them shall finally fall away.
7. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and the general judgment, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

## AS FOR GOSPEL ORDER.

1. We believe that the visible church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers who have gained Christian fellowship with each other, and have given themselves up to the Lord, and one to another, and have agreed to keep a godly discipline according to the rules of the Gospel.
2. We believe that Jesus Christ is the great head of the church, and only law giver, and that the government is with the body, and is the privilege of each individual; and that the discipline of the church is intended for the reclaiming of the Christian who may be disorderly either in principle or practice, and must be faithfully kept up for God's glory and unity of the churches.
3. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers are the only proper subjects, and conscientiously do believe the true mode of baptism is immersion.
4. We believe that none have the right to administer the ordinances but ministers of the Gospel, regularly ordained to that office.
5. We believe that none but those regularly baptized have a right to participate in the Lord's Supper.

## RULES OF DECORUM.

1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.
2. To expedite business, committees may be appointed at the direction of the Association.
3. The Moderator shall be deemed judge of order, and shall have the right to call to order at any time, and any brother not satisfied with his decision on any point of order, may appeal to the Association, on the same day, but at no other time.
4. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association, except withdrawn by him who made it.
5. Every case taken up by the Association shall be decided or withdrawn before another shall be offered.
6. Every person who shall speak in debate shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator, and not be interrupted while speak-



ing, unless he depart from the subject, or use words of personal reflection.

7. The Moderator, when addressed for leave to speak, shall signify the right of the applicant by naming him or otherwise.

8. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject, without leave of the Association.

9. No member shall be tolerated in any practice which tends to interrupt public speaking.

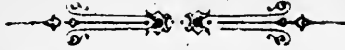
10. Any person wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.

11. The Moderator shall give the casting vote, and shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided he appoint another to his seat during the time.

12. The appellation of Brother shall be used in our address one to another.

13. The names of delegates shall be called as often as the Association may direct.

14. Any member violating the above rules may be reprov'd as the Association thinks proper, only on the day the offense shall have occurred.
