SECOND DAY.

October 5th, 1892.

21. The Moderator appointed K. Wells, I. G. White and J. F. Johnson, as the committee on Apportionment.

22. J. W. Dunaway read the report on Letters and Documents. An amendment was offered that the association meet with Evergreen church, which was carried. The report, as amended, was then carried.

23. 10 a. m. Special order being the report on Ministerial Education, it was read by J. M. McCord, and then the association was addressed by Dr. W. C. Cleveland, President of the

Board, and J. M. McCord, who spoke especially on that part of the report pertaining to the Theological Seminary.

REPORTS.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

DEAR BRETHREN: Our Master's errand in the world was mission work, and if we are truly disciples of his, we must prove devotion to him by working together with him. He came into the world to save sinners. As the

plan of salvation was in the eternal mind of the adorable Trinity, Christ made it known through the simplicity of preaching the gospel, which he defines to be tidings of great joy which shall be to all people.—Luke 2:10. Which is in harmony with the predestination and God's eternal purpose to make known the riches of his glory through his church.—Eph. 3. And he emphasized the thought by saying that the gospel should be preached in all the world, beginning at Jerusalem — Luke 24:27.

The first work assigned to the disciples was their own country, Judea, making the churches at Jerusalem the base of their operations; then the home mission, Samaria, and then the regions beyond, being unlimited, takes the whole earth into the mission field. And God has honored his cause all along down through the centuries of the gospel era, and more especially in this century of ours, for the heathen is becoming our inheritance and the uttermost parts of the earth our habitation under modern operations; but as a light shines brighter nearest its center, and State Missions having become the base of missionary operations for Alabama Baptists, let us trim our lamps, dear brethren, so that they will shine with more effulgence. Owing to the money stringency, and the neglect of the churches to take collections, the State Board is in debt. It has had for a part of the year about fifty persons employed in State Mission work, some in towns and some in the country. We would urge the importance of the board being sustained by prayer and system in view of the work which is being done by it and the responsibilities upon it. The board has been organized seventeen years, and has received and disbursed \$8 000 annually in Alabama; and besides, it is the agent for the Home Mission Board and Foreign Mission Board. There passed through the Secretary's hands last year \$20,000. In view of the great need of information about missions, and the want of mission work, and in view of the desire of so many Christians to know more about it, we suggest that the churches make monthly collections, and that our sympathies and prayers go with our offerings to the end that Alabama Baptists may wield a savory influence, both in the State and elsewhere, until the glory of the Lord shall fill the whole earth.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission field comprises the entire territory of the Southern Baptist Convention, from Missouri to Florida, and from Maryland to Texas, and the island of Cuba. The work belongs strictly to the Convention, committed to a board located at Atlanta, Ga. This board has 365 missionaries employed, who labor in the cities, towns and destitute places—among the Germans, the Indians, negroes South, and Cuba. They report 5 274 baptisms, 179 churches organized, besides a great many received by letter and restored, and many Sunday-schools organized. The work of the board for ten years, and especially the past three years, is simply marvelous. God has recognized, and is still recognizing, the work, and honoring his children with his presence, giving power to his word and success to their labors. Your committee would call special attention to the Indians. What is to be done for the Indians must be done speedily, for it will soon remain for history alone to inform the world that the Red Man ever existed.

Cuban missions, under the wise management of Diaz, has accomplished a great work, though it has been confined to the city of Havana and surrounding towns. The entire island is now opened to the gospel. Let us not conclude that the work has been finished, for it is almost in its infancy. The field is constantly widening. As the tide of emigration has turned South, this people must have the gospel; the safety of our government, churches and society demand it, as well as the salvation of souls.

We should lift up our hearts to God with thanksgiving and everlasting praises to his name for the blessings which have attended the efforts of his children, and arm ourselves with faith and go forward, entering every door as rapidly as our Master opens to us. Brethren, the call has been for men

and money. God has given us men; we need money. Let us accept the motto of Diaz, "The field for Christ," yea the whole world.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

In this year of grace, 1892, the great heart of Christendom is being stirred in the cause of Missions, as perhaps never before since apostolic times. A floodtide of light is being poured upon the subject, and the grace of giving is being developed in the hearts of the followers of Christ, and the Holy Spirit is moving their consciences to "go forward" and possess the lands, whose doors are being thrown open, in order that "the heathen may be given to the Son for his inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for his possession." In times past there have been some Christians who honestly doubted the obligation resting on Christ's followers to engage in the work of Foreign Missions, but I take it for granted that this ignorance of the plainest teachings of God's Word does not exist now in the mind of any intelligent Bible student, who is willing to take Christ for his exemplar, and his imperative command as the rule of his life and action, so I will not waste your time discussing its overwhelming demands upon every true disciple of Jesus.

During the past few years the Foreign Mission work of Southern Baptists has grown amazingly, and our contributions have increased from \$20,000 to \$115,000. We now have over 100 missionaries in foreign lands, embracing China, Africa, Italy, Mexico, Brazil and Japan, and their efforts are being crowned in some of these fields with signal success.

Baptists are under an especial obligation to labor in this cause with a zeal that knows no abatement. God in his providence has placed them in the van in this grand work, and signally honored them above all others, both as to the heroic grandeur of character of the leaders who have marshalled their hosts, and the immeasurable results that have crowned their labors. Time and space do not admit of my going into an establishment of the reality of these assertions, but as a slight verification of its truthfulness, I will cite the following figures taken from the reports of the several denominations for the year 1883-84, the latest data now at hand:

It would appear from this exhibit that while Baptists gave not quite one-fourth of the amount contributed by the other five denominations together, the number of their converts exceeded those of all these denominations put together by 34,519, more than any one of them had.

But we are more especially interested in this work as carried on by Southern Baptists, and the following table is cited for our encouragement, as showing the surprising progress made in the last decade:

These facts call in trumpet tones to our Baptist brotherhood to press the work along the whole line, and reach forth their hands and gather the fruit of the seed sown by Carey, Judson, Marshman, Yates, and other pioneers in this great cause.

A campaign of education is now going on throughout our country on the subject of missions, and every lover of Christ should put his or her hand to the plough and contribute by every means in their power to advance this work committed by Jesus himself to his church never to be relaxed nor relinquished until "every creature" has been offered salvation through him who is "the Way, the Truth and the Life." It is proposed as a thank offering to God for his signal blessings in the past, to raise \$125,000 and send 100 missionaries to foreign lands as a centennial commemoration of our gratitude. It is a herculean enterprise, worthy of the Baptist denomination, but entirely practicable, if those who profess to love Christ in our Southern Zion are faithful to their obligations, will only contribute even moderately of the bountiful means committed to their stewardship by a beneficent heavenly Father.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

The demand for an educated ministry was never greater than now. A trained mind sored with knowledge and sanctified by God's grace, can be a great power in the Master's vineyard. The Lord is laying his hand on many young men in our churches, calling them into the ministry.

During last session there were 41 young ministers from Alabama attending school; of this number 28 were in Howard College, 11 in the seminary, and 2 in high schools. Churches and individuals contributed \$2,430 37 for their support.

At the last session of the Unity Association we promised to pay \$257.57 for this work. We paid \$118.72 of that, which was less than half. This year the Board asks for \$150. Will we pay it? We recommend that our churches take collections at once, and raise at least half the above amount, and forward it to G. W. Ellis, Montgomery, Ala., and collect the balance by the 1st of February, 1893.

We also recommend that the Sub-Board of Ministerial Education be composed of four brethren, one from each district, and that each member of the Board be instructed to look after the collection of these funds in his own district.

Your committee cannot close this report without calling attention to the Theological Institute, which meets annually at East Lake, and continues four weeks. The expense for the session is \$20, or \$5 per week. There is nothing better for pastors than this institute, and churches would do a good work by helping their pastors to secure its benefits.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Education in its slightest sense embraces a wider scope than is generally allowed, for it takes in the physical, moral and spiritual well-being of its recipient. Beginning in earliest life it should develop and cultivate all these faculties, until the entire man is rounded into a symmetrical whole. It means character building, in that sense that fits and qualifies one for the

highest degree of usefulness. The intellect is God-given, and together with the moral attributes marks man as the highest type of creation, and places him under a solemn obligation to employ these gifts for the glory of the Giver. To this end they should be sedulously educated and trained so that the highest degree of efficiency shall be attained, and the broadest usefulness secured. How shall this be best brought about? While children are under home influence and home life, the foundation should be laid, and deeply in the generous soil should be implanted those principles of virtue and religion, without which disastrous failure is inevitable. The moral faculties should be carefully fostered, and with "line upon line, and precept upon precept," the work should go on, impressing the truths of God's words until they are stamped on the heart in such lines that no after years can efface them. Along with this process, and in harmony with it, educate and develop the intellectual powers, so that the mind may attain its largest growth. The facilities offered in the schools of the present day afford ample means to meet this phase of our subject, and prominent among them stands our own Howard College, at East Lake, and the Judson Institute, at Marion, Ala. Every Baptist of this State, who has a son or daughter to educate, should send them to one of these institutions, not only because of their superior educational advantages, but because of the Christian influence thrown around their pupils.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Your Executive Committee report as follows for the associational year of 1891-92:

Immediately after the last session of your body the committee was called together to arrange matters referred to them by you. It was deemed wise by us to put in the field at once a good man to supply some destitution and do general colportage work, as well. To this end, after mature deliberation and several conferences, the services of Bro. F. M. Rollins was secured, with the endorsement and co operation of the State Mission Board, and he was put immediately to work. He was to raise on the field all possible, and the State Board to supply the deficit to make his salary to the amount of at least two hundred and fifty dollars. Bro. Rollins began his labors as early as possible, and was actively in the field something over one month, when he lost his horse, and notified the committee of his inability to supply himself with another, and asked to be relieved. Your committee, after fully discussing the matter, thought best to relieve him, and did so, and, owing to the pressure in money matters, and the general financial distress, concluded to advise the State Board that further effort would not be made to keep a man in the field the balance of the year.

Your committee recommended that the State Board pay Sister Ann Goss twenty-five dollars towards her support, which was done.

We desire to express our regrets that we could not see our way clear to arrange for preaching at Autaugaville church, but the remoteness of pastors to the work, and the lack of funds available, we thought would not permit our undertaking the work.

Bro. Rollins was paid for services rendered, so far as we can officially state, as follows:

REPORT ON BIBLE SCHOOLS.

To the Unity Association:

DEAR BRETHREN—Your committee on "Bible Study" or *Sunday-School Work*, beg to offer the following suggestions:

The foundation of all Christian work should be the Christian's Bible. From it we learn our relations to God the Father, and of the great love he has manifested to us, in that we have in His Son Jesus, salvation from sin, and the promised rewards of the life to come. It also teaches our obligations and duties in this present life, to God and our fellow man, and reveals to us our possible heirship to the glories of the great hereafter.

The Bible, then, is the Christian's chart and compass on his pilgrimage here below, through the shoals, breakers and quicksands of ignorance and sin; then how necessary that we should know all that can be learned, of this precious possession. The Bible, Book of Books!—how ready we should be at all times, to avail ourselves of every facility within our reach for helping us to understand more of its teachings, and to become more intimate with its commands, and to know more of its demands upon us. If this word of God is a "lamp unto our feet, and a light unto our path," how important it is for us to be able to use this illuminating and enlightening influence.

If there is a necessity for us to know anything of the Bible, this need makes it evident that we should know all that it is possible for us to learn from its sacred pages, and if we are to know its truths we must learn them by study and research. This much brings us to the point of considering the value and advantage of our Sunday-school system for Bible study.

The Master has taught us to value the tree by the quality of the fruit it bears. The degree of divine favor that has been put upon Sunday-school work—the fruit it has borne, toward the fulfillment of that precious promise, "When the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea," point with unerring certainty to its divine origin, and we lift our hearts in thankfulness to our God who has thus given His light and His truth to lead us.

The advantages for studying God's word, as is systematically arranged in our International Sunday school Series—the amount of brain, study and energy expended on the preparation of literature to throw light on that word, and its accessibility to every child in the land, makes it possible for every one of even ordinary ability, to possess a saving knowledge of the divine truth, and teachers of very limited advantages may, by the use of such helps as are to be had, fit themselves for imparting wholesome instruction. How necessary, then, it is that every church should have for every Sunday in the year, a live, active working Sunday-school, building its membership and community up into Bible scholars! and yet it is a lamentable fact, and one that calls for our attention and earnest effort, that there are churches amongst us, bearing the name of "Baptist," who not only have no Sunday-schools, but actually, by word and act, discourage this systematic and practical way of instructing our children in the divine truth.

A further deplorable truth is, that churches who are remiss in this virtue, have no substitute for acquiring the knowledge thus thoughtlessly slighted and the youth of such communities are growing up into men and women crippled and dwarfed in spiritual life, and the evil done them by this lack can never be remedied in after life.

The International System of Bible Study which carries the scholar through the Bible every seven years, and the light that he can get on the texts studied, are of such a superior nature that we cannot afford to have our children deprived of so great an advantage, besides, how great a weight of responsibility rests upon the parent, and how dare any one slight such a favorable opportunity! Brethren, our ministry should be more earnest in advocating this work before the churches, and let us covenant together never to stop until every church in our association shall become a Bible school, meeting every Lord's Day to inquire of His word.
