HOLSTON CONFERENCE JOURNAL.

KNOXVILLE, TENN., October 9th, 1895.

The thirty-first annual session of the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened Convention in the First M. E. Church, in the city of Knoxville, at 9 o'clock A. M., October 9th, 1895, Bishop D. A. Goodsell, LL.D., presiding.

DECISIONS OF LAW.

The following questions of law were submitted to the Presiding Bishop by J. A. Ruble, Presiding Elder of the Clinton

Questions of Law District, for decision: "What is the status of a minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church who has entered another communion and accepted pastoral charge from the authorities of

that Church?"

Answer: The Bishop decided in the following words: "Any member of an Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church who joins another communion and accepts pastoral appointment from its authorities, does by that act withdraw as far as he can, from the Methodist Episcopal Church. If he neglects, or declines to send notice in writing of his withdrawal, the Conference is nevertheless at liberty to declare him withdrawn, upon being satisfied as to the facts in the case."

Question 2: "Has an Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church any jurisdiction over a located Elder in the matter of withdrawal?"

Answer: "The Annual Conference has no jurisdiction over the character or relation of a located Elder, except when he applies on his certificate of location for re-admission. If he withdraws from the Methodist Episcopal Church, he must do so through the Quarterly Conference, to which he belongs, but as to his credentials in case of withdrawal, the Annual Conference within whose bounds he lives at the time of his withdrawal, is the proper custodian of his credentials when returned."

Question 3: "In whom does the ownership of the credentials of a minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church exist?"

Answer: "These credentials are the property of the Methodist Episcopal Church, paid for by that Church and

loaned during good behavior to the minister entitled to receive them. In case of withdrawal or expulsion, the recipient is in honor bound to return the credentials to the custody of the Annual Conference, to which he belongs. The Conference may by custom, if it thinks best, permit the person withdrawing, to have the credentials returned to him as a matter of personal and historical interest, but the Secretary of the Conference, by order of the Conference, ought in my judgment, to prevent fraudulent use, to write upon them in such a way as to prevent elision or erasure, the equivalent of these words: 'Rendered invalid as to the Methodist Episcopal Church by the withdrawal of the within name from the ministry and membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church onday.....month, 18...'"

Be it resolved, That we recognize the value of an official organ for our church, and we feel that the Advocate Journal should be recognized as the official organ of our Conference, and would instruct our delegates to the General Conference to work to that end.

Resolved, That we look with pride on the success of our educational enterprises, and pledge ourselves to aid them to the extent of our ability.

Resolved, That it is the sense of this body that we should have equal representation in the General Conference.

Resolved, That we recognize the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors as the greatest source of evil, and that

its production and sale except for chemical and medicinal purposes is a crime against humanity, and as such cannot be regulated by license high nor low.

Resolved, That since the women of the M. E. Church are amongst its most devoted, earnest and faithful membership, we believe they should be admitted to its privileges and honors, and we hereby instruct our delegates to the General Conference to support every measure that will secure this end.

Resolved, That the thanks of this body be tendered to the citizens of this city for their kind and hospitable entertainment during the session of this Conference, and to the officers of the Conference for their efficient services.

REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS.

U. S. Grant University.—This excellent institution has had marked success during the past year. The colleges comprising the University, such as the College of Liberal Arts at Athens, the Schools of Theology and the College of Medicine at Chattanooga, have full working faculties, and the work done has been of the most satisfactory kind. The total number of students matriculated during the year reached to 614.

We are glad to note that the Spiritual interests of the students are watched over with jealous care by the Christian men and women to whom are committed the educational interest of our young people.

The School of Theology has already become a potent force in the carrying on of the work throughout our Southern Conferences. The number of its students is steadily increasing and the character of the work done is worthy of the highest commendation. The College of Medicine has made for itself an enviable reputation, enjoying support from Nova Scotia and Canada to Texas and California, including representatives in its classes from many of the intervening States.

Although not immediately under the authority of the University, and yet, in connection with it, is the Ritter Industrial School for Girls, conducted by the Woman's Home Missionary Society. This helpful and most needed school is also in a prosperous condition and is a great auxiliary in the far-reaching and important work of the institution. In view of these facts we are profoundly grateful to the Great Head of the Church for His fostering care, and pray that more and more His blessings may rest upon the labors of His servants, the entire faculty.

Resolved, therefore, That as ministers of the Holston Conference, holding a very intimate relation to the U. S. Grant University, we will continue to present its claims to the people and in every way to advance its interests.

2. That we recommend the appointment of R. J. Cooke, Vice-Chancellor; G. T. Newcomb, Dean of School of Theology; W. W. Hooper, M. R. M. Burk, E. C. Ferguson, Professors, and John S. Petty, Field Agent for said University.

3. We recommend Rev. J. F. Perry, J. J. Manker, I. H. Miller, J. J. Robinette, J. W. Mann, T. H. Hodge, as a Conference Board of Visitors for the ensuing year, and the Presiding Elders as visitors to the School of Theology.

Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society.—The aid given by this society to our University and affiliated schools has been generous and timely. Without this aid our educational work would be very much if not fatally crippled. We, therefore, desire to call our pastors' attention to the presenting of the claims of this society to their congregations and endeavor to raise the apportionment assigned this Conference.

Board of Education.—We are truly grateful to the General Educational Society for the substantial aid it has given our educational work both at U. S. Grant University and at other schools within the bounds of this Conference. U. S. Grant University alone received during its history \$20,000; therefore, that we show our appreciation of this very liberal aid, be it

Resolved, That the pastors of Holston Conference shall insist on the observance of Children's Day in all Sundayschools on their charges, using the official programme published by Dr. Payne; also that they assist in the collection of loans forwarding all collections for this society at once to Secretary Payne.

Holston Seminary-Located at New Market, Tenn., has great prosperity. The school opened August 20th, 1894, and enrolled during the year 103 pupils. J. M. Williams, Principal.

The Trustees, through J. M. Williams, Principal, spent about \$300 in improvements on buildings and grounds during the last vacation. The buildings are now in good repair, having been replastered, recovered, guttered and painted.

The school opened the present year August 12th, with an increased attendance.

The friends of this institution seem more determined than ever before to maintain here a school of high grade, that shall be an honor to the church.

This institution, as is well known to most of the members of the Holston Conference, is one of the oldest schools of this State, having been erected in 1833, chartered in 1838 as Holston College, name changed in 1874 to Holston Seminary. It has been in continuous operation since its erection, except during the civil war and about a year in 1892–'93. Present enrollment, 110.

Kingsley Seminary.—Kingsley Seminary, at Bloomingdale, Tennessee, founded eighteen years ago, has, from the beginning, been under the management of the present Principal, Joseph H. Ketron, A. M. It is situated in Sullivan county, and near the Tennessee and Virginia State line.

While the largest part of its patronage is from East Tennessee, Southwestern Virginia and Southeastern Kentucky, students have been received from twelve (12) different States. From the beginning,'812 different students have been received. Of this number, 451 have been non-residents. So far as known 177 have been trained for teaching, and forty-three have studied for the ministry. No boy or girl has ever been turned from its doors because of poverty.

Kingsley Seminary has, during these eighteen years, been meeting a real want in the territory from which most of its patronage comes.

The character of the school has been such as to secure the confidence of the people.

We endorse this school, and urge our people to aid in its further development.

Oakland Seminary—Situated at Baileyton, Greene county, Tenn. This school up to the present date has enrolled 195 students. Will probably enroll 250 by the opening of the second term. The Seminary building is a neat frame twostory building, 30x60 feet, divided into five recitation and study rooms. Besides this, last year the people of Baileyton and surrounding country erected a beautiful Auditorium, with a seating capacity of 1,500, with stage settings of the most beautiful designs, all of which to appreciate must be seen. The campus contains six acres, which is adorned with cottages and dormitories, some twenty in number, for the benefit of students wishing to board themselves. The school is under the principalship of Miss Ninnie Bailey, class of '87, U S. Grant University, with J. K. Malone and Miss Debbie Jones as assistants. Under this corps of teachers the course has been thoroughly revised and is now as thorough and strong as any preparatory school in East Tennessee. It is in the midst of its friends and owes its life to them. It is fourteen years old and has enrolled over 1,000 different students and graduated thirty-one of them.

The property is worth from \$8,000 to \$10,000.

Murphy College.—We have the present year eight teachers and an enrollment of 292 students, with a prospect of a large addition. There is under process of erection a Girls' Industrial Home, which will be ready for use for the beginning of next term. About \$1,200 has been raised, mainly by the Knoxville District, for building and improving purposes. A library room has been neatly fitted up by Rev. Dr. Rees, of Cincinnati, Ohio, at an expense of about \$100, and a handsome library valued at \$2,000, is the gift of Rev. S. R. Ferguson, a member of the Upper Iowa Conference. The prospect for the future of Murphy College is indeed flattering.

Wellspring Seminary.—This school is located in Powell's. Valley, and is now under the care of Prof. Walter Franklin, a graduate of U. S. Grant University, and his four assistants. The present session opened under favorable conditions, with an enrollment of 186. With a splendid property, worth \$2,000, and surrounded by a loyal Methodist people, this school should in the future be to our central University what it has been in the past, one of its strongest preparatory schools.

MEMOIRS.

MRS. BELLE MANN, WIFE OF REV. JOHN W. MANN, D. D.

The subject of this obituary, Belle Winton, was born October 9th, 1840, and was the daughter of Bobbie and Susan Winton, residents of Loudon county, and living near what is now known as Lenoir City, some twenty miles west of Knoxville. She received her education in the Athens Female College, under Dr. E. Rowley. Very early in life she was converted and united with the Methodist Church, in which her parents were leading spirits in the community where they lived.

She was of devout ancestry, and for the most part her people were Methodists. One grandfather and a cousin, namely: Wiley B. Winton, were Methodist preachers, the latter being at one time a member of the Holston Conference. On August 1st, 1861, she was united in marriage to the Rev. John W. Mann, who is still a member of the Holston Conference of the M. E. Church. He was at that time station preacher in Knoxville in the M. E. Church, South, that being the only Methodist denomination in this territory then. For nearly thirty-four years Sister Mann led the life of an itinerant Methodist preacher's wife—a statement full of significance and whose full meaning is only known to those whose lot it is to be thus associated to the church and the world.

Two children were born to them during these years, Maggie and Horace, both of whom live in our midst. Sister Mann was in many respects very much more than an ordinary woman; bright intellectually and of splendid social qualities, she was a very welcome visitor to all the circles of society into which she cared to go. But it was in her home and religious life where her character shone most beautifully. She was a motherly woman to all who needed her help, and there are many in every community in which she lived whose testimonies with reference to personal association would be of more weight than this bare statement which I make. She loved her children. Loving her own home, believing in its purity and in its highest good, she sought to make the homes of all the community like hers. She was a devout woman, regular in her habits of worship, and notwithstanding the fact that she was for many years very greatly afflicted with disease of throat and lungs, which had it come to many persons would have driven them from the active duties of life, she was a regular attendant upon the services of her church. Her presence was an inspiration to the pastor who knew her, for he was assured of the presence of a receptive mind and a sympathetic heart in her.

It is impossible in a brief service like this to say half that ought to be said with reference to this godly character. To do honor to her is to do honor to the thousands of Methodist ministers' wives who are to-day bearing the brunt of our itinerant system; and to pay tribute to her memory is but to pay tribute to the memory of noble womanhood everywhere. A life whose whole trend was heavenward, whose entire habit was that of goodness, was no accident. It was the outward manifestation of the indwelling of the Spirit divine.

Her final illness was a brief one of only about a week; and on April 22d, 1895, she died. At the midnight hour, as the clock indicated the coming of the new day, her spirit went out of the night of this world into the day of God Eternal. Her funeral obsequies were held at the family residence on the 24th, in the presence of a large concourse of the leading citizens of Knoxville. Her body was interred in old Gray Cemetery in this city, where it will lie until the Christ of the Resurrection shall come to judge the world. She leaves a devoted husband, our brother in the ministry, two children, four grandchildren, an aged mother, three brothers and one sister to mourn her loss and follow in her footsteps. She was a loving, faithful wife, a devoted mother, a consecrated follower of the Lord Jesus Christ. J. S. JONES.

RACHAEL P. KINDSLAND,

Daughter of Thomas and Rachael West, was born in Grainger county, Tenn., February 3d, 1842, and died at her home in the same county January 29th, 1895. September 9th, 1862, the subject of our sketch was united in marriage with Rev. Wm. Kindsland, a worthy and faithful member of Holston Conference M. E. Church, with whom she lived most happily for more than thirty-two years. To save this world involves sacrifices, privations and Christly self-denial, and when the heroic itinerant has gone home it is usual and just to speak of him as having in life illustrated these virtues to a degree that makes him at once the example and admiration of the Church. But it is true that the pastor in holding forth the Word of Life is thereby lifted into the ranks of God's chosen and honored elect. It is also true that the retiring wife in the quiet of the home, tenderly meeting the responsibilities of wife and mother, must possess and does illustrate the best qualities of christian character. Through the long years of Brother Kinsland's ministerial labors the dear departed one did her part nobly. The star is silent in its movement, the sunshine and dew come noiselessly, but what mighty forces; so the most effective enforcement of gospel truths is found in Christian womanhood, when, in the happy home, without the inspiration of the gaze of the multitudes, little ones are taught to say, "Now I lay me down to sleep." Sister Kindsland embraced faith in Christ and united with the church of her love in tender girlhood, and for more than forty years gave evidence of the abiding presence of the grace of God. One has defined home thus: "A golden setting, in which mother is the brightest gem."

Faithful in the obligations growing out of life's relations, when the fatal illness came she was patient, cheerful, triumphant. I heard a voice from heaven saying write, from henceforth blessed are the dead who die in the Lord, even so saith the spirit, they rest from their labors and their works do follow them. J. A. RUBLE.
