REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CERTAIN CASES REFERRED FOR THEIR INVESTIGATION.

The Committee to whom was referred for suitable investigation certain complaints against the following named brethren: W. H. Rogers, W. H. Duggan, Wm. C. Daily, Jesse A. Hyden, Patrick H. Reed, Jno. Spears, Jas. Cumming, Thos. H. Russell, and Thos. P. Rutherford, beg leave to present the following report:

Solemnly impressed with the duty and responsibility devolving on this Conference touching the exceedingly delicate and momentous issues involved in any action which it may take in reference to its scriptural and ecclesiastical relations to the great and terrible controversy now shaking the foundations of Church and State, your Committee feel constrained to preface their specific report on the cases of the brethren above mentioned, with a declaration of a few general facts, essential, in their judgement, to the proper exhibition, before the public mind of the causes and reasons of such recommendatory action on the part of the Conference

as is hereafter set forth.

The jurisdiction of the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church having been entirely dissolved over the Conferences of the slaveholding States, in May, 1845, by a Convention of Delegates formally appointed in pursuance of a "Plan of Separation" adopted by General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1844, the Church in the slaveholding States, in her primary assemblies, the Quarterly and Annual Conferences, with a unanimity unparalelled in ecclesiastical history, approved the course of the delegates, and declared her conviction that a separate and independent jurisdiction was necessary to her existence and prosperity. In the judgement of the wisest and best men throughout the South and Southwest at that time, (a conviction since attested by the most overwhelming proofs,) the continued agitation of the subject of slavery, and its actual and practical abolition in some portions of the South, not only rendered necessary, but absolutely demanded separation from the Northern portion of the Church, in order to the successful preaching of the Gospel in the South, and the establishment of Christ's Kingdom in the hearts of both master and slave.

The history of the Methodist Episcopal Church South since its formal organization in 1845, has furnished, and still furnishes, multiplied evidences of the wisdom and far reaching sagacity of the fathers and chief masters of Southern Methodism at that time, in having divorced themselves and flocks from the ecclesiastical jurisrisdiction of those who came amongst them as wolves in sheep's clothing, openly and covertly undermining the foundations of our social system, stirring up internal commotion, aiding and counselling the sedition and insurrection of our slaves, by alienating them from their masters and disaffecting them towards their

providential allotment.

It is with profound regret that it remains to be written, as the sequel of this unholy and anti-scriptural crusade of abolition fanaticism and higher-law infidelity against the Southern Institutions generally, that it has eventually culminated in the permanent and irrevocable dissolution of the Federal Government, and has forced upon the sovereign people of the Southern States (as the case of the Southern States).

ern Methodists in '44,) the ineradicable conviction that the only alternative left them in the Providence of God, is to appeal to the Sovereign of the Universe for the righteousness of their cause, and, under his blessing and guidance, to organize for themselves a Government founded upon the great principles of justice and equity, for mutual protection and for the better security of sll those rights of religion and good society guaranteed to us and all other people by the God of heaven. It cannot now be gainsayed, with all the light before us, that to the people of the Confederate States has been committed, in a sense true of no other people on the face of the globe, the guardianship and moral and intellectual culture of the African race, and that the Methodist Episcopal Church South is to a great extent, charged, in the Providence of God, with the religious destiny of the colored race.

Peculiarly and intimately related to the institution of domestic slavery in the Confederate States, as the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has ever been, and deeply involved as she is in the future weal of that people, it is gratifying to be able to state that still, as ever, she holds it to be her relgious duty to throw the whole weight of her influence, ministerial and lay, into the scale against the en-

croachments of religious fanaticism and infidelity.

It was no unnatural result, therefore, that the ministry and membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, alike because of her historical antecedents and her doctrinal peculiarities, touching Southern institutions generally and this institution specially, should be found arrayed side by side with the great masses of the Southern people in religiously contending in part for the same rights—political, civil and religious—for the security of which they were compelled, in 1844, to adopt measures for a separate and independent ecclesiastical organization.

And now, that the Abolitionists and Black Republicans of the North, and out of Northern churches, have inaugurated, without just provocatiou, causelessly and wickedly, a terrible and relentless warfare of invasion, plunder and wholesale confiscation, against all our rights of person, property and conscience, by an utter and base prostitution of all the sacred sanctions of constitutional liberty, with the repeatedly avowed object of subjugation or extermination, the people called Southern Methodists could not so far forget their past history, or become so blinded to their providential destiny, as not to perceive, with the clearness of a sunbeam, that the success of the Federal Government, in any form and under any circumstances, as at present related to this terrible controversy, could only eventuate in the utter destruction of Southern Methodism, as well as of true republican liberty.

And now, moreover, that the Southern States under the blessing and providence of Almighty God, have been enabled to organize themselves into a permanent Confederacy, with all the machinery of government in motion, and with all its resources, internal and foreign, laid under contribution for the preservation and perpetuity of our potitical, civil, and religious rights, your Committee, in common with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, as a whole, hold it to be the religious duty of her ministry and membership within the limits of this Confederacy, not only to be subject to the supreme authority of our country where they may reside, but also to use all laudable means to enjoin obedience to all established powers. The Scriptures and Discipline of our Church enjoin these obligatious. the duty with which your Committee has been charged, in behalf of the Conference of Southern Methodist preachers, invested with the spiritual oversight of a flock of perhaps fifty thousand souls, they beg leave to say they are pained at the very thought that any suspicion, much less well grounded complaint of disloyalty to our established Government, or of disaffection to, and want of sympathy with our Government in its earnest and mighty struggle against its ruthless foes for the blessings and rights of political and religious liberty, should lie against, or attach to, any member of this body.

They feel constrained furthermore to say, for the sake of not only themselves and this Conference, but for the sake of all the people of our various charges, that no member of this body is held obnoxious to complaints or allegations because of former or present opinions touching the abstract political questions of secession and revolution, and that such a representation of the acts of this body would be as false as malicious. But now that these questions have assumed a concrete form, and

under the inspiration of Abolition fanaticism have kindled the fires of the most brutal and ruthless war ever known in the history of man, involving every interest, political and religious, held to be most sacred and absolutely vital to the present and future weal of our people, it is the deliberate and religious conviction of your Committee that no patriot, no christian, and last of all, no christian minister who claims to be a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and a citizen of the Confederate States of America, and who is presumed to be even partially acquainted with the merits of this unhappy controversy, can throw the weight of his opinions, words or acts into the scales of our enemies against us with moral impunity, or with a conscience void of offence toward God and his fellow countrymen. Therefore, in the judgement of your Committee, the following simple principles are held to be true and unanswerable.

First. The word of God and Discipline of the M. E. Church, South, as far as it respects civil affairs, make it the religious duty of christians, and especially all christian ministers, to be subject to the supreme authority of the country where they may reside, and to use all laudable means to enjoin obedience to its established powers. See Rom. 13—1, 7; Tit., 3—1; 1 Pet., 3—13; also Articles of lished powers. See Rom. 13-1, 7; Tit. Religion, page 32 and 129 of Discipline.

Secondly. The Scriptures make it a duty to offer supplications, prayers and intercessions for rulers and all in authority, that we may lead quiet and peaceable lives, in all godliness and honesty. See 1 Tim., 2—1.

Thirdly. In a moral point of view a wilful and persistent violation of these preceptive truths of the Gospel and religious obligations, involve legitimately a grave

offense against the Word of God and Discipline of the Church.

Your Committee hold, therefore, that in applying these general principles as a test of moral character in this body, instead of being liable by such action to the imputation of instituting an inquisition into the peculiar abstract political dogmas of any member, we are only fulfilling our obligations to God and the Church

in thus guarding its purity and integrity.

1. Resolved, That in view of the manner in which Wm. C. Daily defined his present position in reference to his loyalty to, and support of the Confederate

Government, your Committee do hereby recommend the passage of his character.

2. Resolved, In the case of Thos. P. Rutherford, that for as much as he had opinions on that subject which he did not choose to communicate, and gave the Committee no satisfaction pro or con on the subject of the complaint alleged, he be discontinued.

Resolved, That in the case of Thos. H. Russel, it is the judgement of your Committee that our brother acted imprudently in organizing a class composed of persons transferred from a society on another circuit; but that he is believed to have acted without a knowledge of the facts, and intended no wrong, and should therefore be excused. And in view of the entire satisfaction he gave the Committee touching his fealty to our country, it is recommended that his character be passed.

In the case of James Cummings, that while the Committee dis-4, Resolved, approve and deplore his course touching this unhappy controversy, they do, nevertheless, in view of his advanced age and consequent infirmities, and in view of his former valuable services to the church, reccommend the passage of his char-

acter.

Resolved. That in the case of Jesse A. Hyden, it is the judgement of the Committee that while his course has been culpably inconsistent in reference to this controversy, no evidence appearing against his loyalty to our Government at present, but to the contrary; we do recommend the passage of his chara ster.

Resolved. That in the case of Patrick H. Reed, while his statements before the Committee do not satisfy them touching his loyalty, yet in view of the fact that he asks a location through us; the Committee recommend the passage

of his character, and the granting of his petition.
7. Resolved. That in the case of Wm. H. H. Duggan, while his statements before the Committee do not satisfy them concorning his loyalty, and, therefore, in their judgement, render him an improper person to receive an appointment in the regular pastoral work, the Committee would, however, recommend the passage of his character, and that he be left without an appointment for one

8. In the case of Wm. H. Rogers, your Committee would report that he has made before us and others ample protestations of loyalty; but we are pained to find evidence of want of veracity and, therefore, prefer the following charges and specifications.

Charge First. Duplicity.

Specification. In solemnly affirming to John H. Bruner that he, Rogers, was a Southern man and occupied precisely the same ground that he, Bruner, did, and then in affirming directly the contrary, time and again; and also in making similarly contradictory statements to John H. Woodfin.

Charge Second. Criminal Falsehood.

Specification. In saying that as he passed through the Town of Knoxville, the Confederate Authorities applied to him, Rogers, to bear certain documents to Wm. G. Brownlow, as they had confidence in him and supposed that he knew where Brownlow was; and that he, Rogers, conveyed said documents to Brownlow, whereas he made substantially contradictory statements before the Committee, both as to the fact of his knowing Brownlow's whereabouts, and of his bearing said documents to him

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH RECORDS.

Whereas, it appears that there have been great irregularity and want of uniformity in keeping the Church records in the various societies of our Church within the bounds of the Conference; and whereas it is believed that much confusion and misunderstanding might be avoided by adopting and carrying into effect a uniform system of keeping these records on our various circuits, stations and missions. Therefore,

Resolved, That as preachers in charge we will be more careful hereafter to observe the directions given on this subject in chap. 2, sec. 7 of our Book of

Discipline.

Resolved, That we will see that a blank book of suitable size be kept in each class for a Church register, in which there shall be a department for full members, probationers, baptized infants, colored members, and one also for the

marriages and deaths.

Resolved, That it be considered the special duty of the Presiding Elders to see that the plan contained in these resolutions be faithfully carried out, and that it be made a matter of inquiry at the examining Quarterly Conference of each circuit, station and mission.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education report, that the interests of education, within the bounds of our Conference, have suffered greatly in consequence of our national troubles is a fact but too well known to the Conference as well as to your Compared But from the facts which the Committee have been able to elicit, they are led to believe that these great interests have not been undervalued nor have they been lost sight of, but are only temporarily obscured by others more absorbing the subgreater.

more absorbing in their character.

The report from the Holston Conference Female College represents that institution in a condition ever more favorable than the circumstances of the times might allow us to expect. The last collegiate year closed with about 70 pupils, and the present session is progressing with the prospect of even a larger number. The of Board Institution has been recessarily diminished to suit the number of pupils in attendance, and the charges of board and tuition have been somewhat increased, yet we feel activity that the Institution is prudently managed, that its interests are in safe hands, and that will the return of peace it will quickly regain its former prosperity.

The report from the Athens Female College is encouraging 785 pupils were in attendance during the year ending June 27th, about 40 are now attending, with a good prospect of an increase in the number after the adjournment of Conference. We commend this school as well deserving the fostering care of

Conference.

In the absence of any formal report from Martha Washington Female College, we beg leave to state that from representations made by its President to members of this Committee, it appears that the school is progressing under the management of President Harris, with about 40 pupils in attendance. ceipts, as we are informed, have hitherto been rather more than sufficient to meet the current expenses. We cannot learn, however, that anything has been done towards liquidating the debt incurred in the purchase of the buildings.-The notes executed for the property have passed from the original owner into the hands of Messrs. Stewart, Buchanan, &Co., who are not only not solicitous about their present collection provided the interest be paid, but express a perfect willingness to receive back the property in lieu of the bond, both principal and interest if the trustees desire it, a fact indicating that the purchase of the property has not been injudicious.

Your Committee regret to state that the school at Emory and Henry College has of necessity been entirely suspended during the past year. The students have left its halls and are gone to fight the battles of the country. Efforts have been made to reopen the school but without success, and we are unwillingly

forced to the conclusion that its operations must remain suspended until the

return of peace and the successful establishment of our independence.

During the greater part of the past year the college buildings have been used as a hospital for sick and wounded soldiers, for which the Confederate Authorities pay the Trustees an annual rent of \$2500. The farm is rented to other parties for \$500 per annum, making an aggregate annual income of \$3000. The buildings and grounds have been carefully protected from injury while occupied by the soldiers.

Your Committee recommend that the communication from the Trustees of Shoal Creek Academy be received with favor, but prefer that the question of appointing the Rev. Wm. Hicks as Principal be left with the authority to

which it properly belongs.

In conclusion, your Committee would most earnestly recommend the members of the Holston Annual Conference, to give all the encouragement and support to the cause of education that these times of darkness will admit of; a cause on which the future success and power of our Confederacy must greatly depend. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BIBLE CAUSE.

The Committee upon the Bible Cause have considered the subject, and beg

leave to report:

That from all the information they can procure, there are many destitute of the Word of Life both among our citizens and soldiers, and that there is now no active organized effort in the bounds of our Conference, to supply this defi-This lack of active effort, however, is chiefly owing to the want of facilities for publishing the Holy Scriptures in the bounds of the Confederate States.

Yet inasmuch as there a few places, in the bounds of the Confederacy, where at least the New Testament is published, and as it is believed that the facilities for publishing the Scriptures should be, and will be, increased, your Committee are of the opinion that this body should take some efficient step to contribute to the increase of these facilities for the publication and to aid in the circulation of the Word of God.

We therefore reccommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the presiding Bishop is hereby respectfully requested to appoint W. W. Neal of this body as Bible Agent, whose duty it shall be to ascertain whether bibles or testamament can be procured, and if they can, to solicit funds with which to purchase them and superintend the circulation of the Scriptures in our bounds

CONFERENCE ORGAN.

Certain papers presented to Conference were referred to the committee on the State of the Church, consisting of T. Sullins, J. W. Dickey, A. W. Cummings, E. E. Wiley, and T. K. Catlett. The following is their report, which was adopted by the Conference.

The committee to whom were referred the papers in regard to the establish-

ment of a Religious Paper within our bounds, beg leave to report:

Being fully apprised of the great value of a religious weekly journal to ourselves and our membership, feeling sensibly the loss of our Nashville periodical from which we are now cut off, and having received liberal proposals from gentlemen not connected with this body, to co operate with the Conference in the

establishment of such an organ, therefore,

Resolved, That W. W. Neal, E. E. Wiley, T. K. Catlett, C. W. Charlton, J.

B. G. Kinslee, A. W. Cummings and C. Long be a Committee to meet at such time and place as they may elect, with full power to establish a paper for a Conference Organ, with the distinct understanding, 1st, that it shall be strictly a religious paper, and 2nd, that this Conference will incur no pecuniary responsibility whatever.

Resolved, If the above Committee shall determine to establish such a paper, the Presiding Elder of the Knoxville District, the Station preacher in Knoxville, and the preacher in charge of Knox Circuit, shall be a Publishing Com-

mittee for the same.

Resolved, That we as members of the Conference, will act as agents in procuring subscribers, and making collections for the paper, if it is resolved to establish it.

Resolved. That the Committee have power also to provide an Editor for the Paper.

FINANCIAL.

THE PLAN ADOPTED.

1. There shall be a Conference Financial Committee, constituted annually as follows: There shall be one lay-steward from every district within the Conference elected by the district stewards, either from their own number at their annual meeting, or from among the other stewards of the district, and one from among the preachers of the Conference for each district. All the financial interests of the Conference shall be referred to this committee, provided, always, that the failure of the lay-stewards, any or all of them, to attend the sessions of the Conference, shall in no wise hinder or invalidate the regular proceedings of that portion of the Financial Committee elected from the Conference.

2. The expenses incurred by the lay-stewards in attending the sessions of the Annual Conference shall be determined by the board of district stewards, and

paid by their respective districts.

3. There shall be elected annually by the fourth quarterly meeting of each eircuit, in addition to the legal number of seven stewards already provided for by the Discipline, a represensative for each society on said circuit not represent-

ed by one of the stewards.

4. There shall be a meeting in every district, of one steward from each station and circuit, whose duty it shall be to take into consideration the temporalities of the district, to estimate the presiding elder's entire claim, including quarterage, travelling and family expenses, and to apportion his entire claim, thus ascertained, among the several circuits and stations of his district accord-

ing to the relative ability of the several charges to pay.

5. It shall be the duty of this class of representatives to attend the first financial meeting held by the preacher in charge, of the several circuits and stations, (and also the quarterly meetings) and co-operate with the stewards in estimating the entire claims of the preacher, or preachers of said circuit, or station, including quarterage, family and traveling expenses, etc., and, when so determined, to apportion the entire claim, including that of the presiding elder, against said circuit or station, among the several societies of their respective charges; it being left to the discretion of those brethren who have families, to make, on their own fields of labor, such arrangements as they and their stewards may deem most judicious for raising their family supplies, whether it may be in money or in such produce as may be needed, and is equivalent to so much money in value.

6. When the first financial meeting of the circuits and stations has been convened, and the stewards and other class representatives have ascertained the entire claim against said station or circuit, and apportioned it to the several classes or societies, the preacher in charge shall recommend that each class have a committee of three, five or more appointed by election or otherwise, in each class or society, whose duty it shall be, at the earliest opportunity, to divide or distribute the amounts apportioned to the several classes among all the individual members of said classes, per head, according to the ability of each one to pay, thus providing for the entire claims of all the preachers, and diffusing the burden of ministerial support over all the church.

7. In order to meet the claims of the superanuated preachers, widows and orphans of deceased ministers, the preachers in charge of the several circuits and stations shall be required to raise a collection in each society; and that the stewards of the conference apportion the amount necessary to meet the claims of the bishops among the several districts, and that the presiding elders collect the same: and that in the event a preacher fails to do his duty as above required, he shall pay or forfeit to the conference five per cent. on his entire

receipts.

8. It shall be the duty of the Conference Financial Committee, constituted as heretofore provided, to receive the financial reports of all the preachers in charge of the districts, stations, circuits and missions, to be made out agreeable to the requirements of the Discipline; and also, at each conference, carefully to inquire into the pecuniary condition and resources of all those for whose benefit this collection is made, lest improper claimants be retained on the list of this class of beneficiaries.

9. The lay conference stewards shall have the privilege of voting and participating in all discussions arising either in the committee-meetings, or in the conference room, in reference to the financial interests of the Conference and

Church.

10. It shall be the duty of each steward and class-representative to present to each class at the end of the year an accurate list of all the names on their several class-rolls, with the amount assessed to each member, and the amount paid.

11. It shall be the duty of each presiding elder to see that every preacher in charge on the several circuits and stations of his district put into operation the plan hereinbefore set forth, and that every preacher in charge be required to scrupiously carry out this financial policy on all their charges, and among all their classes.

12. It is earnestly recommended that all the preachers unitedly co-operate throughout the bounds of our conference in carrying out uniformly and rigidly

this financial policy.

One hundred and seven ministers have been in their respective fields of labor the past year. When we compare the claims, receipts and deficiencies of this with former years, we find a very great improvement in meeting the claims of our preachers. The receipts over 1860, are \$2211.40, and over 1861 they are \$9978.48. The Conference and Bishop's collections also show an increase of nearly one hundred per cent. over the year 1861. We are pleased to note the healthy state of the church in financial matters, and hope to record the fact at our next session that every claim has been met.

We would once more appeal to the church—in its officers and membership -to support the Gospel. A little energy upon the part of the Stewards and a proper training of the membership, will secure not only the entire claim, but give a bonus to each minister within our bounds.

We would again urgently request every minister to present the claims of the gospel to their people, during this year, and the membership to give liberally ' that we may witness greater displays of the power of God, and realize the fact that it is "more blessed to give than receive."

REV. E. F. SEVIER, OF THE HOLSTON CONFERENCE.

A few years since, one of those extraordinary manifestations of God's power and goodness called "revivals," was in progress in Chattanooga For weeks it had continued; its influence widening day by day, until it reached the outer circle of sinners, where it found the author of this tribute. I was a self-conceited skeptic, so presumptuous as to sit in judgment upon the Christian religion, while knowing but little more of the Bible than a heathen. The revival threw its then seemingly singular influence about me, and for the first time in years, I was at the house of God. Something, I knew not then what it was, drew me there again. The sermon was over. An old gray-haired man started from the altar towards the back seat where I was. I had wronged him on one occasion by withholding the courtesy and respect that were his due. He came nearer

vas gone. The old man was an instrument for my good.

The revival ended. The world was a new one to me. How completely all things were changed the disbeliever cannot know. Time passed. A second revival came. One whom God had given me sought pardon for sin, and long and earnestly did she sue for it. Despair was about to chill her effort. Just before the services were closed, my friend—he was now my friend and I was his—slowly and solemnly repeated the words of the promise, "Whatsoever ye shall ask the Father in my name, He will give it you." The words went to the heart of her whom I loved most. The petition went up in His name, and from that time to this, she and I have been looking forward with an eye of faith to the sweets of heavenly recognition. Elbert F. Sevier has gone before us, but we know that his works live after him.

He was not an ordinary man. I khew him not in the earlier years of his ministry. When I first heard him preach, his work was well nigh finished, but his great mind was still unimpaired. He was in many respects a model preacher. Conscious of his strength he disdained the flowers of rhetoric, and marching boldly up to the subject, grasped it with a master's hand. He never begged a question. Believing the Bible, he planted his faith amid its truths, and boldly defied all opposers. He claimed everything for Christianity. He knew no compromise. To God all the praise was due and men were nothing. Without stopping to honor the skeptic with disputation, he looked down from his high stand point and demanded that ignorance should be healed. He was right.—Men who can but repeat the threadbare objections of debauched infidels, only deserve to be directed to go and learn that of which they ignorantly speak.

He was a proud man, but it was not objectionable pride. He was conscious of his power, and as he honored God who gave it, he was proud of it. Rising above the silly and sinful endeavor to please many, he laid bare the deformity of sin, and careless alike of praise and censure, preached for eternity. His commission, old as the cross and sealed by the man of sorrows, was, "PREACH THE GOSPEL." He did preach it. In youth, in manhood, and in old age; in wealth, in poverty, in happiness and in deepest afflictions, he, faithful to his mission and true to his Master, preached the Gospel of the Son of God with the great man's


power and the humble christian's simplicity.

But the days of his ministry are ended; he sleeps near the objects of his earthly affection. Where is his spirit? Who doubts? The disciple is with his Master. He rests from his labor. Rests, yes, that is the word. Heaven gives it: earth denies it. Rest in Heaven. How vast the plan! The Fall, the Atonement, the Resurrection—the Intercession of an ascended Saviour. What equals it? Thanks for it. Faith may console the pilgrim in earth's darkness, but a resurrection with the just—that is happiness. We truly believe that Elbert F. Sevier was, in the providence of God, the means of creating the hope of such a resurrection in many a heart. Let it be a tribute to his memory. 'The enough. May we be ready. The beleiver will not be forgotten. Death only separates for a time. The journey ended, what then?

Jehovah gave the miracle of the Cross as a pledge that then we shall meet again.
