1. The Unity Baptist Association assembled in its Thirty-Second Annual Session with the Clanton Baptist Church, Chilton county, Ala., on Saturday, October 2, 1886. At 11 A. 27. Report on Missions was postponed till the hour of 11.

28. Report on Bible Schools was read by Eld. W. J. Ruddick. Discussed by J. S. Poole, W. J. Ruddick, W. B. Crumpton, G. W. Coburn, L. G. Skipper, C. H. Morgan, A. J. Brooks, (Eld. G. W. Mills in the chair), A. Andrews, H. W. Watson. On motion of C. H. Morgan report was adopted by a unanimous rising vote.

29. The question of the District Meetings and the S. S. Convention was referred to the special committee, G. W. Mills, Rufus Walker, Jacob Griffis.

30. The hour of 11 having arrived, the report on Missions was read by Eld. Falkner. Adopted, after discussion by W. B. Crumpton and A. Andrews.

31. On motion of Eld. Huckabee, a committee of five was appointed by the Moderator to recommend to the churches the amounts to be raised by them respectively, the amount called for by the State Board; also to recommend the Envelope system or plan. Committee, W. N. Huckabee, L. G. Skipper, J. M. Ponder, J. E. White, Jno. Moore.

32. On motion, adjourned till 1:30 P. M. Prayer by Eld. W. J. Elliott.

33. On reassembling sang "I am coming to the cross." Prayer by Eld. I. Bice.

34. On motion, debate was limited to 10 minutes to each speaker.

35. Report on Temperance was read by T. M. Henley. Discussed by I. Bice, W. N. Huckabee, W. J. Ruddick, L. G. Skipper, W. B. Crumpton, G. W. Coburn. Adopted.

36. No objection being made, Bro. K. Wells offered the following resolution, which was adopted :

Whereas, in the judgement of the many wise Brethren of this Association, the efficiency of this body would be greatly increased by a change in the time of its annual mseting. *Resolved*, That we meet on Thursday at 10 o'clock, before the third Sab-

Resolved, That we meet on Thursday at 10 o'clock, before the third Sabbath in September instead of on Saturday at 11 o'clock before first Sabbath in October.

Resolved, That instead of the Introductory sermon we have a Missionary sermon, and that the sermon be preached at night of the first day of the meeting of the Association.

Resolved, That the ninth article of the Constitution be so changed as to read two (2) delegates instead of three (3).

37. By leave, Eld. J. Falkner offiered the following preamble and resolutions taken from Act 62, State Convention Minutes, which, on motion, were adopted :

Wheareas, The constant desecration of the Sabbath by railroad companies and other public works is a disgrace to the country, and whereas we panies and other public works is a disgrace to the country, and whereas we believe it to be the duty of all Ghristians, in their individual or collective capacities, to take and maintain a position of unalterable opposition to such violation of this holy day, and believing it to be both the duty and privilege of this Association to enter its protest against the non-observance of the teaching of Ged's word on this subject. Be it therefore, *Resolved*, (1) That the running of railroad trains or engaging in any secular work, except works of charity and necessity, on the Sabbath day is sinful in the sight of God and is a desceration, that should not be tolerated

sinful in the sight of God, and is a desecration that should not be tolerated or allowed in any part of our country. Resolved, (2) That it is the duty of our Legislature, by stringent laws, to

prohibit such desecration, and to enact such penalties as shall make such prohibition effective.

Report on Education was read by Eld. Hardy Jones. 38. Discussed by W. B. Crumpton, J. Falkner and Hardy Jones. Amended by striking out that part of the report which refers to State University. Report as amended was then adopted.

39. Report on Periodic 1/s was read by J. M. Clay. After discussion by W. N. Huckabee, W. Wilkes, J. M. Clay and L. G. Skipper, the report was amended by substituting for "Kind Words," "Literature published at Atlanta, Ga., by Home Mission Board." Report as amended was then adopted.

40. Report on Deceased Ministers was read by J. A. Stephens. Adopted.

41. Report on Aged and Infirm Ministers was read by W. N. Huckabee. Discussed by W. N. Huckabee, J. Falkner. Amended by adding the name of Sister Goss. Report as amendad was then adopted.

42. Report on Finance was read by W. D. Sartor. Adopted.

43. Report on Special Committee was read by Geo. W. Mills. Discussed by J. Falkner, H. W. Watson, J. S. Poole, C. H. Morgan and W. N. Huckabee. On motion the report was re-committed for a fuller report.

44. On motion of W. N. Huckabee, the Sabbath School Convention of this Association was recognized as part of this Association.

Bro. T. M. Henley offered an amendment to the 45. Constitution which was adopted. (See Constitution.)

46. Committee on Preaching reported Eld. J. Falkner to preach the Missionary sermon. Eld. H. W. Watson, alternate.

47. Roll called and absentees marked.

48. Report of Special Committee was read and adopted.

49. J. M. Clay offered a resolution in regard to requesting the State Board, through a Committee, to use the funds from this Association for State Missions within her bounds. Discussed by W. B. Crumpton, W. N. Huckabee, A. Andrews, W. J. Ruddick, J. M. Clay, J. Falkner, L. G. Skipper. On motion of A. Andrews the resolution was laid on the table.

50. Eld. H. W. Watson made some remarks in regard to assisting Bro. J. M. Selman, of Pleasant Grove Church, in getting an education. Eld. Crumpton stated that upon a proper presentation of the matter by his church to the Board of Ministerial Education, Bro. J. M. Selman would be assisted towards procuring an education.

51. On motion of Eld. W. J. Ruddick the State Mission Board was requested to render assistence to Autaugaville Church.

52. On motion of K. Wells, an Executive Committee of five, with the Moderator as Chairman, was appointed, to which shall be referred all matters in the Association requiring its attention, not to conflict with the State Mission Board. Following is the Committee: A. J. Brooks, K. Wells, J. Falkner, Hardy Jones and L. G. Skipper.

55. The following resolution, offered by Bro. J. M. Clay, was adopted :

Resolved, That we favor the rigid enforcement of the laws and that Hygiene and Physiology be taught in the schools, and we think and believe that a knowledge of these studies will tend to the suppression of the use of ardent spirits.

56. The following resolution, offered by Bro. G. W. Coburn, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of the Association be and they are hereby tendered to the Clanton Church, and citizens of Clanton and community for their princely hospitality during our stay, and to the Methodist Church for their courtesy in extending to us the use of their house of worship.

57. On motion of K. Wells the sum of sixty-five dollars was appropriated to the Clerk for printing and distributing 800 copies of the minutes and his services, and the remainder in the hands of the Treasurer to be paid over to Eld. W. B. Crumpton, Corresponding Secretary State Board.

58. Bro. T. H. Henley exhibited a blank form of an Associational Church letter which he had received from the American Baptist Publication Society, and stated that if the association would adopt it the publication society promised to furnish the clerk, free of cost, copies enough to do the churches for two years. On motion, the blank letter was adopted.

59. The Treasurer read his report which, on motion, was adopted.

60 The following resolution offered by Eld. J. Falkner was adopted :

In order to obtain uniformity among our churches in hymn books used by them.

Resolved, That we recommend all the churches of this association to adopt and procure "The Baptist Hymnal," published by the American Baptist Publication Society, of Philadelphia, Pa., to be used in their respective churches, in their public worship.

61. The reading of the minutes of Monday was dispensed with.

62. Having finished the business of the Association, we sang "Sweet Bye and Bye," united in prayer with Eld. H. W. Watson, then adjourned to meet with the Plantersville Baptist Church, Plantersville, Dallas county, Alabama, on

Thursday, 10 a.m., before the third Sabbath in September, 1887.

REPORTS.

REPORT ON LETTERS AND DOCUMENTS.

We find on examining the letters from the churches that very many report revivals and large additions. For this we have reason to thank God and take courage. And we would urge the churches to train these new members for the Master's service.

We find that eleven of our churches report no Sabbath Schools.

We are glao to learn that so many report prayer meetings and have made contributions for the Mission cause during the past year.

We find that Pilgrims Rest Church has licensed Brother Jas. M. Todd to preach the Gospel.

Plantersville Church has asked that the next session of the association be held there. We so recommend it.

We notice that the Autaugaville Church has had no preaching during the past year, and asks for some suggestion in regard to their church and property. We would insist on the church holding fast to their organization and property, and recommend that the association take such action as shall give them a supply for the coming associational year.

Beth Salem Church reports through its delegate that they have had only occasional preaching, but no regular pastor.

All of our churches are represented this session either by letter or delegate, except Bethel.

We would recommend that Fellowship Church be placed in the First District, and that Sardis, Pleasant Grove and Chestnut Hill be placed in the Fourth District. Respectfully submitted,

REPORT ON BIBLE SCHOOLS.

To the Unity Association:

We have no information on this subject on which to base a report that will show the standing of the grand cause in the territory covered by your body.

We expected to have had the figures that would be reported to our Associational Convention as data from which we could report to this body the increase or decrease of this very important work.

The convention was not attended as it ought to have been; not one minister of our own association being present, and two from other associations, consequently we must look to other sources for information.

As far as we can learn the Bible School work is largely on the increase. Churches that to our knowledge have had no Bible School for a long time, now meet regularly every Lord's day for the study of God's word.

Brethren, we are glad of this, but one fact makes us sad, and it is this: The work of the Bible School is dependent in each church on a very few faithful men and women, whose hearts God has touched, and who have the salvation of souls at heart.

This aught not to be. The Bible Schools are church work and ought to be carried on by the church, and aught to have the sympathy, prayers and presence of every member of the church (who is not incapacitated from attending) every Sabbath day.

As to the importance of the Bible School work it is almost needless to say anything. We all know its beneficial influence on our older members by stimulating them to more zeal in the Master's causes; on our young members in training them for the Master's service, and stirring their minds with precious truths, that they may grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ; on our young people and children that they may be led to the Savior.

It is our belief that the grand object of all Bible School work should be the salvation of souls and the training of our rising church membership. We would urge upon our brethren in the ministry that they foster this grand interest. It is one that helps them in their pastorial work and stimulates them to a more earnest study of God's word. Let our teachers be men and women who know from experience that the Lord is good and then they can invite others to go with them.

Finally, brethren, do not let us *send* our children to the Bible School; let us *go* with them, that our presence may encourage others to do likewise.

Let us take that blessed word of God with us, and with the assistance of our helps we will get the benefit of the wisdom from the ablest minds in our denomination in its study.

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Missions submit the following report • We as an association do well as all the churches of which this body is composed profess to be missionary bodies. The question arises, "Do we show our faith by our works." There are connected with our churches about

members. The amount suggested by our State Board that they desired us to raise this year was \$700° At our last session the churches by their representatives were called on to state how much of this sum they would endeavor to raise in their respective churches, and the amount the delegates then said they would endeavor to raise aggregated \$668.33. How much of this sum has been raised? Your committee are unable to state. Some of the churches have exceeded the amounts there stated, but from the information we have received we fear that many of the churches have fallen short. At that time we had 1552 members. Seven hundred dollars divided among them would be about forty-five cents per member. If every member would contribute according to his ability we could raise a much larger amount. And when we see the fields all open to us, and already white to the harvest, shall we not say "Men of Israel, help?" Workers now in the field within our own state we have forty men, a part of the year we had sixty-five, for the whole or part of their time.

In foreign fields we have : In Mexico, 11; in Brazil, 12; in Africa, 9 and several native a sistants; in Italy, 14; in China, 32 missionaries and probably as many native assistants.

In the home mission field the Board has had the past year two hundred and fifty men. From peculiar circumstances the Cuban mission has been committed to this Board.

The glorious work and grand success of this mission, so far as we are informed, has not a parallel on the American continent.

Brethren, let us "come up to the help of the Lord against the mighty" lest the curse of Meroz should fall upon us. The Mecedonian cry, "Come over and help us" comes from every quarter.

Brethren, a great and grand opportunity is before us. "Let us go up and possess the land for we are able." "Let us expect great things from our God." "Let us attempt great things." In all our churches let us take up collections for this great work at least once a quarter, if not once a month or oftner, and let our prayers go up with our contributions. "To do good and communicate (that is to contribute), forget not, for with such sacrifices God is well pleased."

Your committee to whom was referred the subject of education beg leave to report that as God has endowed his creatures with mental faculties, it is our duties to cultivate them. We believe that such a course would arouse a general interest, and soon all our brethren would see the necessity and come up to help of the Lord against the mighty with contributions for their education.

But in our zeal for the young men, let us be reminded that woman, also, has excellent talents worthy of culture, for it is now manifest that her work is more available than we once thought. Since God is so signally blessing her organized mission work, let us not depress her usefulness by neglecting her education. For the girls we recommend the Judson and the Central Female Colleges, For the young men, Howard College and the Seminary at Louisville.

We are informed by the President of Howard College that Brother J. M. Kailen, from our association, is there this year, and has so demeaned him-

ARTICLE OF FAITH.

1. We believe in one only living and true God—the Father, Son and Holy Ghost; these three are one—1 Corinthians 8:6; Deuteronomy 6:4; Matthew 28:19; 2 Corinthians 13:14; 1 John 5:7.

2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only correct rule of faith and practice—2 Peter 1:21; 2 Timothy 3.16.

3. We believe in the doctrine of election, and that God chose His people in Christ before the foundation of the world, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth—1 Peter 1 2 5; Ephesians 1:4; 2 Thessalonians 2;13.

4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin-Romans 3:23; 5:12; 3:10.

5. We believe in man's inability to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature—Romans 5:6; John 6:44; Ephesians 2:1-5; 5 Philippians 2:13.

6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ-Romans 5.1; Galatians 2:16-20.

We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace and never finally fall away—2 Corinthians 12:9; Collossians 3:4; Romans 8;38–39.
 We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of the

8. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of the church of Christ, and that true believers are the only proper subjects, and that immersion only is baptism—Matthew 3:5, 6, 13, 16; Acts 2:37-38; Acts 8:38-39.

9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment. Acts 17:31; John 5:28-29.

10. We believe that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting—Matthew 25:46.

11. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances except those who are called of God and have been regularly baptised, approved by the church, and come under the impositions of hands by a Presbytery—1 Timothy 4:14; Acts 26:16.

bytery—1 Timothy 4:14; Acts 26:16. 12. We believe that none but regularly baptised believers have right to partake of the Lord's Supper—Acts 2:42-44; 2 Corinthians 6:14; I Corinthians 11:23, 29.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1.—This Association shall be known as the "THE UNITY BAP-TIST ASSOCIATION," and shall be composed of delegates from such churches as constitute, or may hereafter unite with this body. ART. 2—The design of its labors shall be to promote the cause of Christ and to encourage those objects supported by Baptists generally.

ART. 3—This Association shall hold its sessions Annually, at such a time and place as it may appoint.

ART. 4—The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer—to be elected at each session—who shall perform all the duties appertaining to such offices in similar bodies; and in case of the absence of any officer, one *pro tem*, shall be appointed by the Association until an election is declared.

ART. 5—A record of the proceedings of this Association shall be kept by the Clerk, and, as soon as practicable after the close of each session, he shall superintend the printing of the minutes thereof, and shall furnish each church with a suitable number of copies.

ART. 6—Any clurch subscribing to our Abstract of Faith may be admitted into this Association by the consent of the members in session.

ART. 7—Any church orthodox in faith and practice, which has complied with this Constitution may withdraw from this body by the consent of a majority of the members in session.

ART. 8—This Association, in regular session, may dissolve its connection with any church which may differ with it in doctrine or practice.

ART. 9—Any church of this Association, with thirty members or less, shall be entitled to two delegates, and one additional delegate for every additional twenty-five members or fractional part thereot.

ART. 10—It shall be the duty of each church to forward a written communication to every session, specifying the names of its delegates and the state of the church.

ART. 11—If a difficulty should arise in a church, which cannot be settled thereby, the church shall call aid from two or more sister churches; if the matter cannot then be adjusted, it shall be referred to the Association for advice.

ART. 12—All queries must be acted upon by the churches in which they may originate, and when they fail to be disposed of therein, must be reported, by letter, to the Association; the dicision thereof shall be considered an advisory answer.

ART. 13—This Association shall have a fund supplied by the voluntary contributions of the churches, and all moneys thus contributed shall be transmitted and paid over to the Finance Committee, and said committee to pay over to the Treasurer.

ART. 14—Any article of this Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the delegates present at any regular session.

Amendment to Constitution adopted October, 1886:

This body, realizing the great value of Sabbath Schools, will hold a Sabbath School Conventiou, annually, within its bounds, at such time and place as may be fixed.

RULES OF DECORUM.

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. The officers of the Association shall be chosen by the suffrages of the members present.

3. The Moderator shall be considered a judge of order, and shall have discretionary right to call to order at any time.

4. Any member not satisfied with his decision may appeal to the Association on the same day, but at no other time.

5. But one member shall speak at a time, and he shall rise, and, obtain-

ing permission, proceed; such permission being signified by the Moderator naming the person, or otherwise.

6. No person shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject; and every motion made and seconded, in order, shall come under the consideration of the Association, and be decided, unless withdrawn by him who made it.

7. Every case taken up by the Association shall be decided or withdrawn before another is offered.

8. When a question has been introduced, and sufficient time allowed for debate, the Moderator shall take the voice of the Association upon the subject; those in the affirmative shall make it known by saying aye, and those in the negative, nay. If a division on the question is called for, the decision shall be made by the members rising to their feet.

9. The appellation "brother" shall be used in the Association when one brother addresses another, but this article shall not be so construed as to. ignore the Moderator.

10. Any member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.

11. The names of the delegates shall be called as often as the Association shall direct.

12. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same priviliges of speaking as any other member, provided he appoints another to his seat; but shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided. He may also appoint committees necessary for transacting any business that may, from time to time, come before the Association.

13. Any member violating these rules shall be reproved by the Mod-

erator, but only on the day such violation occurs. 14. These rules shall be read at the opening of every session of the Association, and may be altered or amended whenever a majority of the members present shall deem it necessary.
