

MINUTES.

FIRST DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

Friday, October 19.

The Warrior River Baptist Association convened in its Thirty-sixth Annual Session with Friendship Baptist Church, Friendship, Ala., on Friday, October 19, 1894.

The introductory sermon was preached by Elder Francis Tidwell. Text: "What have I now done, is there not a cause?" I Sam. xvii: 29.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The congregation, after singing a song of praise, were led in prayer by Elder W. M. Cole. The body was then called to order by the Moderator, A. Dorman. Brethren W. M. Cole, H. W. Head and John L. Ray were appointed as Reading Clerks, who read the letters from the various churches.

An invitation was extended to visiting ministers and brethren. The following accepted the invitation and were admitted to seats in the body and granted the courtesies of the floor, viz: Rev. A. W. McGaha, D. D., President of Howard College, and Rev. A. E. Burns, evangelist and representative of the State Board of Missions.

The election of officers was then ordered, which resulted in the choice of Elder A. Dorman, Moderator; J. B. Tidwell, Clerk, and I. T. Stephens, Treasurer.

Called for petitionary churches and received none.

The following brethren were appointed as a committee on devotion, to wit: A. F. Whitley, D. P. Coley and the delegates of Friendship Church.

Appointed correspondents to sister associations as follows:

The Committee on Devotion announced that Elder S. O. Howard would preach at night, and Rev. A. E. Burns Saturday at 11 o'clock a. m.

By vote the body postponed the appointment of a delegate to the State Convention until the next meeting.

On motion of Brother W. M. Cole the association voted to elect a delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention, and to pay all necessary expenses for attendance.

The election of the delegate was ordered by ballot and resulted in the choice of Elder Francis Tidwell.

By mutual consent Rev. A. W. McGaha agreed to preach at night instead of Elder S. O. Howard.

Brother A. E. Burns led in prayer, after which the body adjourned until 9 o'clock a. m. Saturday.

At night Dr. McGaha preached from the text: "Now, if I do that I would not, it is no more I that do it, but sin that dwelleth in me." Rom. vii: 20.

SECOND DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

Saturday, October 20, 9 a.m.

The association met pursuant to adjournment.

Prayer by Elder S. O. Howard.

Renewed the call for visiting brethren and ministers, and received Elder J. D. Pettit from Etowah Association.

Called for and read the report of Committee on Education. A. W. McGaha, D. D., discussed the report and made a strong,

sensible and feeling speech in behalf of ministerial education, at the close of which he asked for a subscription from the churches as a support for Brother J. B. Tidwell, who is in Howard College studying for the ministry.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Prayer by Elder H. W. Head.

The body ordered the Treasurer to pay to Brother J. B. Tidwell, as a supplement to the funds already subscribed, \$5.05, collected last session to pay the expenses of Elder F. Tidwell to the State Convention.

Read, and after heated discussion by Rev. A. E. Burns and others, adopted the report on missions, as follows:

We your Committee on Missions would submit the following:

In support of our belief in missionary work, we will quote the following Scriptures, viz:

"I will also give thee for a light to the Gentiles, that thou mayest be my salvation unto the end of the earth." Isaiah, xlix: 6. "And that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem." Luke, xxiv: 47. "And ye shall be witnesses unto me, both in Jerusalem and in all Judea, and in Samaria and to the uttermost parts of the earth." Acts, i: 8. "Ask of me and I shall give thee the heathen for thine inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for thy possession." Psalms, ii: 18.

Now we shall deal entirely with the practicability of the subject. The cause of missions is the cause of God. In view of this fact, we should consider what relation we sustain to it. We believe that every Baptist should contribute to the support of missions; but, instead, we find that not more than one-tenth give anything. Now we believe that the failure is largely because the pastors fail to bring the subject before their people. The pastor must himself be thoroughly missionary before he can influence his churches for missions. They are God's appointed leaders. If they are indifferent or afraid, comparatively little will be done. If strong and earnest, much will be accomplished. To influence his churches for missions, the pastor needs three things, to-wit: (1) Convictions. (2) Courage to speak them. (3) Consecration to lovingly, earnestly, patiently press them, until he brings things to pass. A missionary works for the coming of Christ's kingdom. God loved this work and gave His Son for it. Let us pray God to give us more of this good work. J. A. MAY, Chairman.

Read, and after discussion by Elder H. W. Head, adopted the report on temperance as follows:

Your Committee on Temperance would submit the following: We believe the evils of intemperance are plainly before the eyes of all intelligent people, and we think the time very near when the evil will be

driven from our land. Total abstinence is, we think, the only safe rule of practice, and we feel sure the only one sustained by God's word. Intemperance is a great evil which our churches must battle against. But we believe it is giving way before the light of the truth, and that the time has come when every Baptist should make a bold stand on the side of temperance and should unanimously rise against the invader that is burying hundreds of our race annually, and filling our land with widows and orphans. We think our churches ought to urge the people, earnestly, to abstain from intemperance. May the Lord help every follower of the blessed Christ to try to persuade men to live soberly. Let us pray the Lord in faith for the power of His Holy Spirit to aid us in leading men to higher planes of duty.

Suspended the regular order of business and reconsidered the reception of the obituary of Bro. James Fields, and by order of the body Elder H. W. Head, C. Turner and I. T. Stephens were appointed as a committee to append the same by adding the circumstances of his last hours on earth.

On motion the Association asks each church in the Asso-

ciation to collect \$2 each and remit to I. T. Stephens (Blountsville, Ala., for the expenses of Bro. Francis Tidwell to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Called for, and after argumentative discussion by H. W. Head and John L. Ray, adopted the report of Sabbath Schoo Committee, as follows:

Your Committee on Sabbath Schools would ask to say that we find no marked improvement in this work since our last meeting. About three-fourths of our churches have no schools. We think the failures are due largely to the following reasons: (1) Our churches are not comfortable enough for winter. (2) The churches are not well organized. (3) Our pastors are not pressing this work as they should. (4)

Our people have not considered this as being strictly a work of the church. Now, we believe that if all the pastors, who are the overseers as well as the servants of the churches, would organize their churches and reduce their work to system, they could overcome this indifference and bring all the churches into line, and each church would have a good Sabbath School.

OBITUARY OF

ELDER JAMES M. FIELDS.

Elder James M. Fields, youngest of a family of fifteen, was born in 1818 in McMinn county, Tennessee, and died December 20, 1892. He was orphaned at the early age of nine years, his mother having married the second time to an eminent Baptist preacher by the name of William Jones, and was brought up to hard work on the farm, supporting his step-father and his mother, who were too poor to afford the boy the advantages of even a meagre education. At the age of fifteen years he professed religion and joined the United Baptist Church at Concord, and was baptized by Elder Michael Sellers. About three years after joining the church he was married to Jamira Minton in Bray county, East Tennessee, who still survives him, and to whose union were born eight children, four of whom are still living, all of them having reached the age of maturity.

In the years of 1836-37 the famous split in Baptist ranks occurred, and as a result Elder Fields, who was then only nineteen years old, went to the Methodists, his wife joining them with him, where he remained two or three years; the Methodists, in the meantime, having licensed him to preach. His wife, however, remained with them eight or nine years. He left the Methodists and joined the Missionary Baptists at Yellow Creek Church, Cherokee county, Alabama, he having moved to that place from East Tennessee. Two months after uniting with the church at Yellow Creek he was liberated to talk in the church, which liberty he made the most of as long as he lived in the church or out of it. About two years later (in 1845) he was ordained to the full work of the ministry by the church at Mill Creek, Cherokee county, Alabama. The ordaining council consisted of Elders William Minett, Grogan and Dean Golightly, and others whose names are now forgotten. Soon after his ordination he was employed as missionary to the Cherokee Association, which position he held for two years, traveling from house to house exhorting, preaching and praying with and for the people at their homes. He then moved to Murphree's Valley, in Blount county, and settled with his family. He attached himself to the Muscle Shoals Association, working again as associational missionary,

two years after which he devoted himself to the pastorate, attending four churches for about forty years. And just here it would be exceedingly interesting to state the number baptized by him into our various churches, but the necessary data are not at hand. The writer, however, has frequently heard him tell that he had baptized over a thousand Methodists, including a number of Methodist preachers, our beloved Bro. J. T. Bayn being one of them.

While at work as missionary to the Cherokee Association he was attended by the late lamented Elder J. J. D. Renfroe.

Elder Fields was one of the pioneer preachers of this country, and did more to establish the Baptist cause in this country than any other man who has ever lived among us.

He was a man of extraordinary boldness. He exposed error wherever he found it, regardless of fear or favor; and, although in his old age, his general health was so impaired as to disable him for active work, yet his interest in the Master's cause never grew less, and the holy fire, that had made him a tower of strength in his young manhood, burned brightly on the altar of his heart till the hour of his death. His last words were a most powerful example of the triumph of the Christian faith. He died exclaiming that he had fought a good fight, that he had kept the faith, and was going to receive his crown.

Resolved, That we, as an Association, express our most tender sympathies and love to the widow and family.
