

MINUTES.

Marshall, Alabama, October 20, 1899.

Friday, 11 a. m.—The Marshall Missionary Baptist Association met in its twelfth annual session with Beulah Church, Marshall Alabama, on the 20th of October, 1899.

Rev. I. M. Thompson read John xvii. Sang hymn, "Stand Up-Stand Up for Jesus." Rev. I. M. Thompson led the opening prayer, asking for God's Holy Spirit to guide the meeting, and praising God for the many blessings we have enjoyed since the last session. Sang hymn, "Brethren, We Have Met to Worship and Adore the Lord, Our God." The introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. I. M. Thompson. Text: Acts i:6-8. ject: "The Kingdom of Christ." Thompson, the Association received and recognized these brethren in their official capacity. Received correspondence as fol-Warrior River Association: Revs. S. R. Burson, J. G. B. Bynum, A. E. C. Sims, W. A. Whitfield. Gilliam Spring Association: W. J. Wright. Cherokee Association: Rev. J. J. Clayton. Called for Petitionary Letters, and received New Home Church with the following messengers: L. M. Teal and J. R. The moderator extended the right of fellowship to the Smith. messengers.

On motion of Rev. W. M. Scarbrough, the reading of the Constitution and Rules of Decorum was postponed until Saturday.

On motion of Rev. I. M. Thompson, the Committee on Deceased Ministers were requested to make their report at 10 a.m. on Saturday, and that thirty minutes be devoted to Memorial services.

On motion of Rev. J. M. McCord, the Committee on Missions were requested to make their report at 10:30 a. m. on Saturday, and that the time until noon be devoted to the discussion of Missions.

The Moderator appointed the committees as follows: On Nominations, J. P. Buchanan, S. D. McKinney and Lewis Turner. On Education, Rev. J. M. McCord. On Finance, J. P. Emmet, S. N. Gains and Joseph Creel. On Documents, J. F. Preskitt, Rev. G. A. Price and Rev. P. J. Corley.

The Devotional Committee reported preaching at night as fol-

lows: Rev. T. J. Weaver, at Beulah; Rev. J. A. McMurry, at Albertville. Adjourned to meet at 8:30 a. m. Dismissed by prayer, led by Rev. J. A. McMurry.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 21, 1899, 8:30 A. M.—The Association met pursuant to adjournment; sang hymn, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." The Moderator read Psalm exlvi. Rev. J. D. Jordan, the aged brother in Zion, led in fervent prayer. Read and adopted minutes of Friday.

On motion of Dr. W. M. Scarbrough, John L. Ray was elected

Treasurer.

The clerk read the Constitution and Rules of Decorum. Elected delegates to the State Convention, which meets in Gadsden, Ala., in November, as follows: Dr. W. M. Scarbrough, T. R. Hulsey, I. M. On motion of J. P. Emmet, the Association agreed to pay the expenses of the delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention. The moderator appointed Committee on Treasurer's Report, as follows: J. W. Hughes, J. J. Dodd, and L. O. Cox.

Brother Milner was humble and had won the confidence of his brethren so that they had frequently honored him with different positions of trust in the community, as well as in the Church and Association; and at the time of his death, and for several years previous he was the honored Clerk and Treasurer of this Association. REPORT ON MISSIONS.

We, your Committee, would submit the following report:—Our Lord said to his disciples that they should be witnesses unto Him, beginning at Jerusalem and go unto the uttermost parts of the earth. We think that in the community of the Church, and in the bounds of the Association, and in the State of Alabama, is the Jerusalem for us to begin, then to extend unto the uttermost parts of the earth. While we think there is an increase in inter-

est, we believe still greater interest onght to be kindled in some way in our churches for better and more efficient work to be done, in order that we may bring those with whom we are surrounded, who are lost, to a saving knowledge of Christ. Dear brethren, when our churches are awakened to the great importance of sustaining their pastors, that the end will be realized.

We are glad to report that our State Board will go to the State Conven-

tion out of debt, and in fine spirits; but as to the policy of the Board of

Missions for another year, we cannot tell what will be done.

Our Home Mission Board has been very successful during the past year as shown by the following statistics:

There were 845 persons Baptised as the visible results of our missionaries. Our Board went to the Convention out of debt, and decided to celebra: e the year 1900 by enlarging the work.

On motion of Rev. J. M. McCord, Roswell Church was granted a letter of dismission on request; said church wishing to unite with Gilliam Spring Association.

On motion of J. F. Preskitt, speeches were limited to ten min-

utes, except the chairmen of committees.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Intemperance is a monstrous evil which every Christian should try to destroy. We all have to pay for the support of the armies of policemen, detectives, lawyers, judges, whose chief occupation grows from the use of intoxicants, and for the prisons, penitentiaries and insane asylums, fifty to

eighty per cent of whose accupants are the victims, direct or indirect, of in-

Paul says:-"The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, long suffering,

gentleness, meekness, temperance; against such there is no law."
Nearly \$2,000,000,000 were spent last year for intoxicating liquors, opium, and tobacco in the United States. This is much more than the amount spent for food. As an absolute destruction, this would be an enormous loss, but it carries with it the loss of time, health, morals and human lives.

The sum of money spent for tobacco in its various form, annually, which goes into smoky air and into spittoons of different varieties, amounts to more than three times as much as the entire annual expenditure for the payment of the 300,000 teachers and the education of the 20,000,000 school children in the public schools of the United States

Intemperance ruins homes, poisons society and destroys souls.

Brethren, let us live sober, temperate lives, abstaining from every appearance of evil. Let us declare truceless war on intemperance in all its hideous forms, and let us oppose the same openly and with all of our God given powers.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

In educational lines, we have great reason for encouragement. Howard College, the pride of the denomination, is out of debt, but we owe a debt to the College which must be paid in boys. There is no better place for Baptist boys to get a collegiate education than in Howard College.

The Judson stands at the head of the list as an institution for the education of girls. It is also out of debt. Both of these institutions began the

present session with flattering prospects.
Your Committee would call special attention to Walnut Grove Baptist College, controlled by trustees from three associations, of which Marshall is one. This school, under the presidency of Rev. W. Y. Adams, is doing a fine work. The College now has about forty pupils and will in all probability have fifty or more before the beginning of next term. this Association would do well to send their sons and daughters to this school, preparatory to their entering the Howard and Judson.

We can not lay too much stress on Ministerial Education. Last year we

had 21 Ministerial students in Howard College and 13 in the Seminary.

Brother Willie Dyar was in Walnut Grove College last session as the beneficiary of this Association. He has entered this session, and we recommend that he be adopted as our beneficiary again and that every Church in the Association be requested to send a contribution for his benefit to Dr. C. C. Jones, Treasurer, Board of Ministerial Education, East Lake, Alabama.

When the physician examines his patient and finds the pulse and temperature in accord with each other, then there is nothing alarming; but when they are not in accord, then he knows there is something seriously wrong; so with the Church. We recommend that the pastors insist upon having a Sunday School the year round. We also, recommend the Southern Baptist Literature, published at Nashville, Tennessee.

Text, Luke ii, 49. "Wist not that I must be about my Father's business." Subject:—my Father's Business. The sermon was full of the missionary spirit and replete with many good sayings concerning our duty in attending to Our Father's Business.
