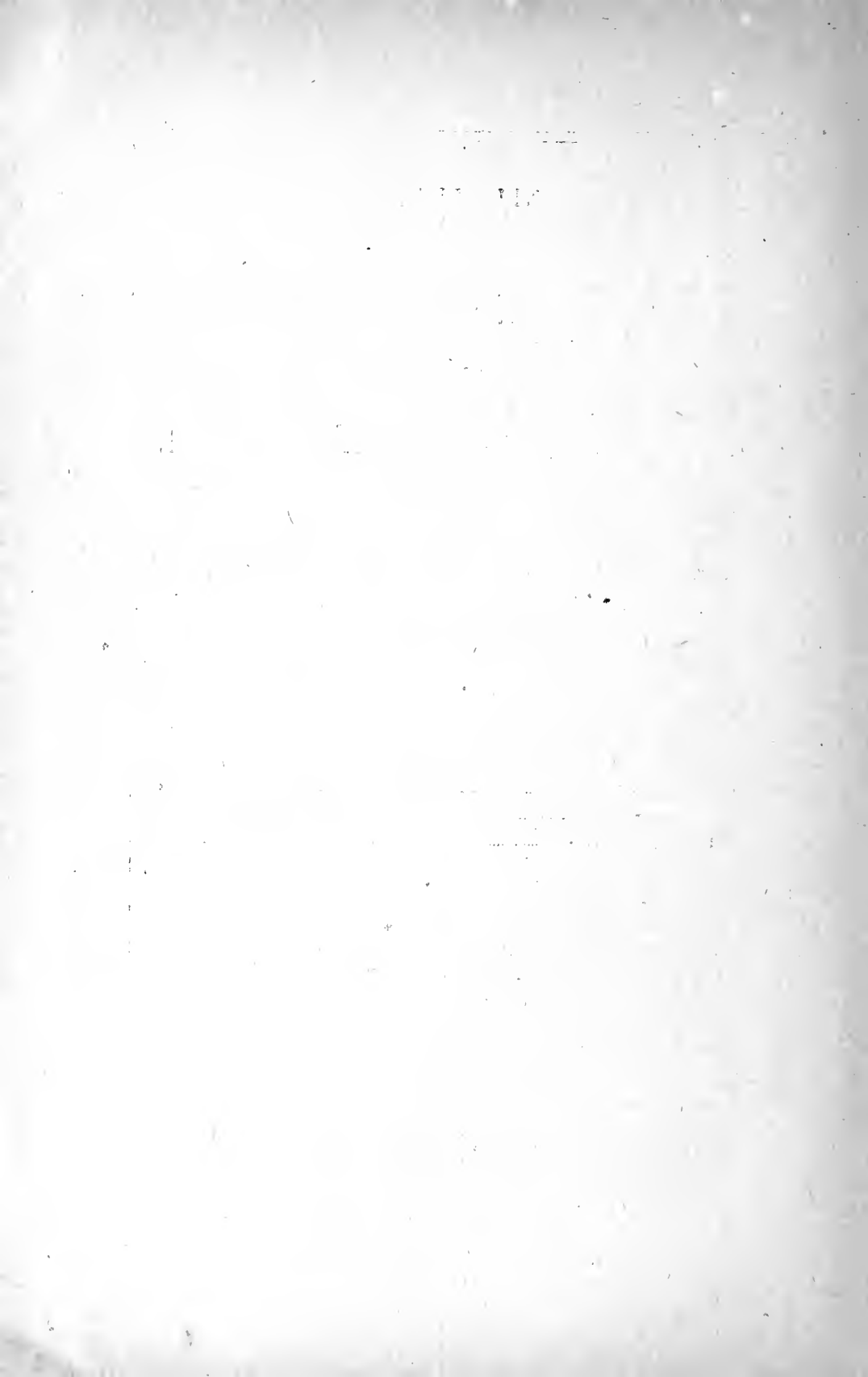

MINUTES.

The Centennial Association convened with Midway church, Montgomery County, in 20th annual session, at 11 o'clock a. m., Thursday, Oct. 17th, 1895

The introductory sermon was preached by Eld. W. J. Elliott, text Mark 14:38.

EVENING SESSION—2 O'CLOCK.

The Association was called to order by the Moderator, Geo. Williams.

After singing and prayer by Eld. J. W. Stewart, the letters from the churches were handed in and read by W. W. Patterson and J. A. Jenkins.

The Moderator made a verbal report for the Executive Committee, stating that there had been no business before them during the associational year.

The report on Foreign Missions was read and discussed.

The committee on Religious Exercises reported that Elder J. W. Stewart will preach at 7 o'clock tonight.

Hours of meeting and adjourning adopted as follows: Meet at 9 o'clock a. m., adjourn at 11 o'clock for preaching; and meet at 2 p. m., and adjourn at will.

Adjourned till 7 p. m. Sermon by Elder J. W. Stewart, text, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me."

FRIDAY.

MORNING SESSION—9 O'CLOCK A. M.

The 15th. Ps. was read, sang a hymn and prayer was offered by Elder J. M. Loflin.

The report on Home Missions was read and discussed. The committee on State Missions not being present, the Moderator requested W. W. Patterson to prepare a report on State Missions. Further discussion of Missions deferred until evening session.

Report of committee on State of the Churches and Associational Field was read. 11 o'clock, adjourned for preaching. J. A. Jenkins (licentiate) preached. Text, Job 16:19, "Behold my witness is in heaven and my record is on high."

EVENING SESSION—2 O'CLOCK.

Sang a hymn and prayer by S. J. Wing. A letter from Elder Chas Crawley was received and read.

A collection was taken up for the benefit of Elder Crawley. Five dollars was the amount collected. By request of W. W. Patterson, offered prayer in behalf of Elder Crawley.

The report on State Missions was read and adopted.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

SUMMARY OF WORK.

Number of men employed, 45 (this includes 11 colporters); days of service, 4,233; miles traveled, 25,083; sermons delivered, 1,792; addresses made, 449; churches constituted, 4; persons baptized, 186; received by letter, 318; re-stored, 20; Sunday Schools organized, 27; Sunday Schools addressed, 192; prayer meetings held, 418; regular preaching stations without churches, 515; visits to preaching stations, 139; churches visited, 649; total visits made, 5,053; pages of tracts distributed, 23,010; meeting houses finished, 3; money collected for meeting houses, \$2,741.72; money collected for State Missions, \$680.68.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

In looking over the report of the Foreign Mission Board of 1895, we find that God's blessings have been upon our labors; and there seems to be a greater interest in missions than ever before. A larger amount has been given for the work, and many baptisms have been reported on foreign fields.

Recent treaties between America and Japan have opened up that country to the missionaries. They are making rapid strides in civilization and are gladly accepting the religion of the Lord Jesus Christ.

In some parts of China the missionaries have been gladly received, while in other parts they have been persecuted and some put to death.

Brazil is clamorous for missionaries, and is gladly receiving the Gospel. A good work also is going on in Mexico.

Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel, is as much a commandment as any of the decalogue. How shall we go? go with your prayers and sympathies, go with your money, and go in person. Now there are many

who are willing to go and spend their lives in foreign lands, then let those who are not willing to make this great personal sacrifice pay liberally to send those who will go.

We see from the annual report of the Foreign Mission Board from May 1st, 1894, to May 1st, 1895, the total net receipts have been \$129,248.72, of which amount Alabama has paid \$7,593.87.

Notwithstanding the stringency of the times which has been unparalleled in the history of our country, the debt has been reduced from \$30,000 to \$20,000 in 12 months. The future is brightening for us. May God bless our efforts and crown our labors with great success.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Your committee on Home Missions beg leave to make the following report:

The subject of Missions is no new thing, it originated with the Master, "Go ye into all the world, commencing at Jerusalem," which means that we are to occupy till he comes. At home and abroad in our southern field there has been considerable effort to occupy. Our Home Board has in the field, missionaries, 381; weeks of labor, 16,288; churches and stations, 1,229; sermons and addresses, 34,478; baptisms, 4,470; received by letter, 4,035; total additions, 8,505; Sunday Schools, 429; pupils and teachers, 19,381; religious visits, 52,197; churches constituted, 133; houses of worship built, 67; Bibles and Testaments distributed, 1,150; tracts distributed, 390,750. This work is scattered over our entire Southern States and the Indian Territory, also the work of our board in Cuba.

Your committee reports the urgent need of money and request that our board will furnish means to defray the expenses of the men employed. It is our duty to help.

The demands of the times make it imperative that our preachers should be educated. The means of bringing this about, 1st. Our secular schools afford better advantages than the people are availing themselves of. 2nd. Our denominational schools of a higher class are offering facilities unsurpassed by any schools of the land for the training in the higher branches of education of our girls and boys. The Seminary at Louisville, Ky., offers theological opportunities that our churches cannot afford for our preachers to miss. Will we ignore these advantages and remain as we are? God forbid.

MORNING SESSION—9 O'CLCCK.

Religious services conducted by Elder J. M. Lofin.

Minutes of Thursday's and Friday's proceedings read and adopted.

Siloam church requested a letter of dismission from this Association.

The request was granted and the clerk was instructed to write the letter.

The report on Orphans' Home was read and adopted.

ORPHANS' HOME.

Our Orphans' Home is now permanently located at Evergreen, Ala.

The first steps taken towards its establishment were taken by Mrs. Woodson. Five years ago she gave to the Baptist Widows and Orphans' Home. This good sister has turned over to us all her real estate, worth several thousand dollars, to be after her death for this great purpose; except her Florida property, which she has given for immediate use.

The Home was not exactly started, however, till two years ago last March, when, in a small rented house, it was opened on the 10th day of March, with three inmates.

The Home is under the management of Rev. John W. Stewart. The inmates of the Home consist of a matron, a house keeper, a cook, and 45 orphan children. There are 24 girls and 21 boys, of which 11 have been sent out by adoption, and one by apprenticeship. The boys are taught to do farm work, and the girls do various kinds of house work.

The older children attend school at the Academy, and the younger ones are taught in the Home. They attend Sunday School and church, and Sunday afternoon they engage in singing and reciting Scripture. Nine of the children have been baptized. These have organized a "child's prayer-meeting," in which they themselves lead.

In November, 1893, to make room for our large and growing family a permanent house was purchased from Y. M. Rabb, consisting of a large, substantial brick residence of ten rooms, and 80 acres of land, lying on Main street. The property was bought for five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00), in three annual payments, with interest on the deferred payments. The first payment was made when due; the second, amounting to \$1,800 00, was due January 1st, 1895, on which a balance of \$273.00 is still due. The third and last payment, amounting to \$1,930.00, will be due January 1st, 1896.

Money is greatly needed to improve this property, so as to build four more dormitories, a dining-room, a kitchen and a school-room.

The current expenses of the Home are \$200.00 per month. I earnestly ask every Baptist church, every friend of the Home, and every one who wishes these poor children well, to send something to aid in making this last payment. It is the duty of Christians to aid in this noble work.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Sunday School is an auxiliary to the church, which seems to have come to stay. I think no instrumentality of modern times has wielded so widespread and powerful an influence for good upon some people as the Sunday School. All live, progressive Baptist churches, who have seized upon and vigorously used the opportunity, have found it a success. It is a fact that a very large per cent of the members being received into the churches, of the different denominations, come from that number trained and brought up in the Sunday School. Those churches, which have Sunday Schools, will show up a larger membership than those without. We also find that churches which have Sunday Schools contribute more to missions. I have a personal experience of thirty years in Sunday Schools; and I feel to-day the good effect, and thank God that I have been brought up under this influence. I prayerfully insist that every church in this Association which has no Sunday School will begin at once. I know a Baptist church in this

Association that organized a Sunday School this year, and during a protracted meeting, held in July, received into its membership seven Sunday School pupils.

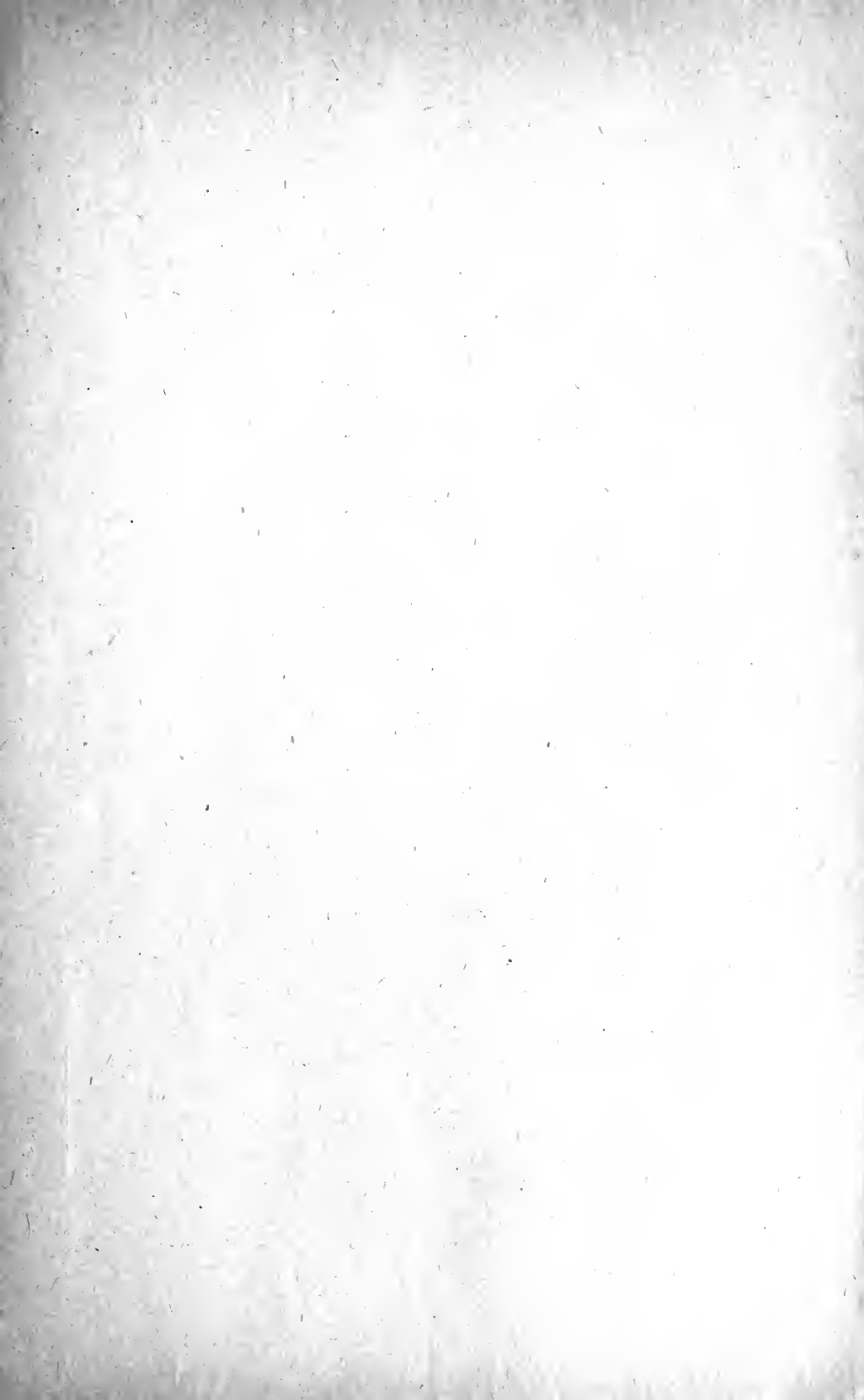
