In the midst of the last struggle, she whispered to her weeping husband—"It's all right; the way is clear! Farewell, Mr. Hodge. God bless you in your efforts to do and get good. Meet me in heaven." Thus "the light afflictions" of earth "which are but for a moment," are happily exchanged for "a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory."

DAILY BUSINESS SESSIONS.

FIRST DAY.

Johnson City, Tenn., October 15, 1885.

The Twenty-first Session of the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church assembled in the M. E. Church at Johnson City, Tennessee, at 9 o'clock this morning, the Rev. John F. Hurst, D. D., Presiding Bishop.

In the opening religious services the Bishop read the XXIV.

Psalm, and announced the 798 hymn-

"And are we yet alive,
And see each other's face?
Glory and praise to Jesus give,
For his redecining grace,"

after the singing of which he led the Conference in prayer.

Then followed the administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper under the direction of the Bishop, assisted by the Presiding Elders.

The Conference Roll was called by the Secretary of the last session, and forty-one members answered to their names.

After nomination by J. J. Manker, Thomas B. Russell was re-elected Secretary, and James H. Amis and Wiley M. Christian were chosen Assistant Secretaries.

George W. Coleman was appointed Statistical Secretary,

with J. D. Droke and M. C. Bruner as his assistants.

On motion it was agreed to appoint the Presiding Elders as a committee to nominate the Standing Committees. J. S. Petty immediately submitted the report of said committee, which was approved. [See Standing Committees.]

On motion of J. F. Spence, the Bar of the Conference was fixed on a line with the second pair of windows, counting from

the entrance of the church.

On motion of J. S. Petty the hour of meeting was fixed at 8:30 A. M.—one-half hour to be devoted to religious services—and the hour for adjournment at 12 o'clock, according to Sun Time.

The Twentieth Question was called, and after the approval of his character, J. J. Manker, Presiding Elder of the Chattanooga District, read his report, after which the Elders of his District were called and approved as follows: L. H. Massey, R. S. Sampson, J. A. Nicholson, T. C. Warner, G. W. Coleman, H. H. Burk, G. Julian, T. C. Carter, J. F. Spence, W. H.

Rogers and W. R. Long.

Under this same question the Greeneville District was called; but the Presiding Elder, J. S. Petty, after the passage of his character, stated that he was not ready to report his District, owing to the absence of some of the Pastors; however, the characters of the following Elders were approved: T. B. Russell, J. P. Milburn, J. H. Jennings, T. H. Hodge, M. Seaton, G. W. Jarvis, E. B. Clark, J. C. Wright, and N. G. Taylor.

The Kingston District was called and L. B. Caldwell read his report as Presiding Elder, his character having been approved. D. Richardson, A. C. Peters, A. B. Wright, A. E. Barnes, T. H. Russell and S. B. Scott, Elders of said District,

were approved.

The Knoxville District was called, but the Presiding Elder, C. B. Sparrow, having been transferred to the Genesee Conference, there was no Presiding Elder's report from that District. The Elders of this charge were called and passed as follows: M. A. Rule, J. A. Baker, J. M. Durham, R. J. Cooke, R. C. Robertson, P. H. Henry, J. A. Ruble, T. S. Walker, W. C. Daily, and R. Pierce.

T. R. West, after the passage of his character, read his report as Presiding Elder of the Morristown District, after which the Elders, W. Kinsland, B. Crist, J. B. Seaton, J. H. Amis, J. J. Robinette, W. T. Senter, P. H. Reed, T. W. Brown, J. L. Cardwell, A. G. Watkins, S. Greear, A. J. Greer and J. S. Hill

were called and approved.

It was the order of the Conference that each Pastor, in submitting his report, should state the amount of his collection for Missions, Church Extension, and Superannuated Preachers.

On motion of L. B. Caldwell, 9 o'clock to-morrow was desig-

nated as the hour for receiving the statistical reports.

On motion of T. H. Russell, the time of the session was extended.

T. C. Warner moved that a committee be appointed to collect the Conference monies privately. J. S. Hill moved, as a substitute, that the chairmen of the several committees receive said monies and report the same. The original motion was lost and the substitute prevailed.

A paper touching the interests of the American Bible Society was presented to the Conference and referred to the com-

mittee on Bible Cause.

The Bishop stated that the Conference was authorized to

draw on the Book Concern for a dividend of \$105.00, and the

draft was accordingly made.

R. S. Sampson was placed on the committee on Temperance in the place of G. W. Coleman, and J. W. Mann on the committee on Education instead of R. J. Cooke.

The committee on Public Worship announced that P. H. Reed would preach at 3 o'clock, and T. S. Walker at 7 P. M.

W. M. Haskell was placed on the committee of examination for the third year in lieu of R. Pierce, and T. C. Carter on the fourth year in place of R. J. Cooke.

L. B. Caldwell moved that the anniversaries of the Conference Societies be observed during the present session. The

motion prevailed.

After various announcements the doxology was sung and the benediction pronounced by Bishop Hurst.

SECOND DAY.

Johnson City, Tenn., Friday, Oct. 16, 1885.

The Conference convened at 8:30 o'clock, A. M., Bishop Hurst in the chair.

The devotions were conducted by W. M. Haskell.

The Journal was approved.

Some time was given to the collection of conference monies and statistics.

Mrs. A. C. Knight, Secretary of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Holston Conference, was introduced to the Conference, and the collections for that Society were, by order of the Conference, paid to her.

Rev. C. S. Long, Missionary from Japan, was introduced to

to the Conference.

The Conference being allowed to draw on the Chartered

Fund for \$30.00, the draft was made.

On motion of L. B. Caldwell the fractional collections were consolidated into even dollars and placed in the hands of the Treasurers of the several societies.

The Eighteenth Question was taken up, and the names of T. A. Cass, J. F. Morrison, W. D. Smith, M. R. M. Burk, A. J. Bruner, J. N. Baker, J. D. Lawson, J. N. Moore, J. P. Milburn, A. F. Creswell and J. K. P. Marshall were called, their characters approved, and they were continued in the Supernumerary Relation.

R. O. Ayers, J. B. Little and J. F. Perry were changed from

Supernumerary to Effective.

The name of J. B. Fitzgerald was called—he having heretofore occupied a supernumerary relation in the Conferenceand it was stated by his Presiding Elder that he had surrendered his Parchments and expressed his purpose to withdraw from the ministry; whereupon, on motion of N. G. Taylor, he was requested to recant his withdrawal; the motion unanimously prevailed, and he announced his recantation and received the immediate return of his Parchments. He was given Supernumerary Relation.

The name of J. W. Mann was called under this question, and, on motion of T. C. Carter, he was placed on the effective list, he having been given a Supernumerary Relation without his knowledge or consent by misapprehension at the session of the Conference held in Greeneville, Tenn., in October, 1884.

E. E. Pearman was granted an Effective relation and his

transfer to the Chio Conference was announced.

Question Nineteenth.—D. Carter, W. M. Haskell, L. Bogart, S. Tinker, W. C. Graves, J. R. Hughes, and S. W. Hyden were severally called and continued in the Superannuated Relation.

The death of W. B. Ballenger was announced by J. J. Manker. L. B. Cardwell, stated that he had some money in his possession raised for Brother Ballenger at the last session of the Conference, and, on motion of T. S. Walker, he was directed to place the same in the hands of the Board of Stewards.

Question Third. Geo. B. Cox having received proper re-

commendations, was continued on trial.

Question Fifth.—F. G. Mellor was continued as a Deacon of the first class. W. C. Miller was advanced to the second class of Deacons. J. K. P. Marshall was continued in the second class of Deacons.

Question Thirteenth.—S. G. Ketron and M. C. Bruner were

duly approved and elected to Elders' orders.

J. S. Petty presented a request from the Kingsport Quarterly Conference, endorsed by the Greeneville District Conference, asking the restoration of Credentials to John Malear. The request was granted.

T. C. Warner was granted leave of absence.

W. C. Graves was placed on the committee of examination

for local deacons, orders in place of D. Richardson.

On motion of L. B. Caldwell, it was ordered that the final fragments of the several Benevolent Collections be added together and passed into the hands of the Board of Stewards.

After announcements, the doxology was sung and the bene-

diction pronounced by T. C. Warner.

THIRD DAY.

JOHNSON CITY, TENN., October 17, 1885.

The Conference met at the hour appointed, Bishop Hurst in in the chair.

W. C. Graves conducted the prayer-meeting.

The Journal was approved.

On motion of T. B. Russell, J. W. Mann and J. A. Nicholson were appointed a committee to raise funds for the publication of the Conference Minutes,

Bishop Walden, Dr. Hartzell and Dr. Cranston were intro-

duced to the Conference.

On motion of W. H. Rogers, L. B. Caldwell and W. C. Daily were appointed a committee on memoirs. On motion of J. J. Manker, J. A. Nicholson was added to that committee.

A paper touching the interests of the Book Concerns at New York and Cincinnati was referred to the proper committee.

The Statistical Secretary called attention to the inaccuracies found in the statistical reports.

A document from the Freedmen's Aid Society was read, and

referred to the committee on that cause.

Question Second.—Stanley Haskin, recommended by the Chattanooga District, John W. Holden, by the Quarterly Conference of St. Paul's Church, Cincinnati, William R. Byerly, by the Greeneville District, and Charles O. Jones, by the Morristown District, were duly admitted on Trial. L. M. Wills, recommended by the Knoxville District, was not admitted on account of not being prepared in the requisite course of study. However, the Presiding Elder was instructed to employ him as supply in case he should be needed.

A paper looking to the entertainment of the next General Conference was read—the amount apportioned to this Conference on General Conference Expenses being \$133—and referred to the Presiding Elders, who were appointed a committee on that subject. Also a sub-committee was appointed

from each District, as follows:

Chattanooga District—Pastor of Chatata Circuit and J. W.

Ramsey.

Greeneville District—Pastor of Greeneville Station and W. M. Christian.

Kingston District—Pastor of Hamilton Circuit and Eli Sawyer. Knoxville District—Pastor 1st Church, Knoxville, and Wm. Rule.

Morristown District—Pastor of Fincastle Circuit and G. A. Shirley.

Question Fifth.—William T. Jones, Jacobus D. Droke, Mellvin M. Murrell were called forward, and after being very ably addressed by the Bishop and favorably recommended, were admitted into full connection, and W. T. Jones and M. M. Murrell were elected to Deacons' orders.

Wiley M. Christian and William H. Cox were duly elected

to Local Deacons' Orders.

R. K. Boyd, being in school at Drew Theological Seminary, was continued on Trial.

The transfer of Frederick W. Henck from the Central Tennessee Conference to this Conference was announced by the Bishop, and he was advanced to the second class of Deacons.

Bishop Walden took the chair, at the request of Bishop

Hurst.

Dr. Hartzell addressed the Conference, representing the work and interest of the Freedmen's Aid Society.

Dr. Cranston addressed the Conference touching the pub-

lishing interests of the Cincinnati Publishing House.

On motion of J. J. Manker the time of the session was extended.

- T. S. Walker moved that when the Conference adjourn it be to meet at 8 o'clock on Monday morning. The motion prevailed.
- L. B. Caldwell moved that John W. Burnett, local deacon on the Kingston District, be re-admitted. The motion prevailed.

On motion of J. F. Spence, the Conference, after announcements, adjourned, Bishop Walden pronouncing the benediction.

FOURTH DAY.

Johnson City, Tenn., October 19, 1885.

The Conference assembled at 8 o'clock, A. M., Bishop Hurst in the chair.

The devotional services were conducted by the Bishop.

The Journal was approved.

W. H. Rogers read the report of the committee on Bible Cause, which was approved.

On motion of L. B. Caldwell, W. H. Rogers was placed on

the committee on memoirs.

On motion of L. B. Caldwell the proper board of Trustees was authorized to sell a lot at Wartburg and apply the proceeds to the payment of a church debt.

L. B. Caldwell read the report of the committee on Freed-

men's Aid Society. It was approved.

L. H. Massey read the report of the committee on Church Extension. It was approved.

W. T. Senter, chairman of the Auditing Committee, report-

ed, and the report was accepted.

The Statistical Secretary read his report by aggregates, slight corrections were made, and the report was approved.

Athens, Tennessee, was fixed as the place for holding the

next session of the Conference.

The report of the committee on Sunday Schools was read by M. C. Bruner, and accepted by the Conference.

The report of the committee on Church Literature was ap-

proved, after being read by T. S. Walker.

By authority of the Conference, T. S. Walker returned the Parchments of John T. Shields to the Secretary.

G. W. Jarvis read his report as Treasurer of the Conference

Missionary Society. It was received.

The report on Temperance was presented and read by J. A.

Ruble, and approved by the Conference.

J. S. Hill read the report of the Board of Stewards. [See Report.]

At the request of the Bishop, T. S. Walker took the chair. The report on Sunday Schools was read by B. Crist. It was approved.

T. H. Russell read the report of the committee on District

Conference Records. Approved.

The committee on Tract Cause reported through J. D.

Droke, and the report was accepted.

M. C. Bruner read a resolution urging the importance of carrying out the Disciplinary plan in the management of the finances. It was approved.

J. A. Nicholson reported as Treasurer of the Episcopal

Fund. The report was accepted.

M. Seaton was granted a Supernumerary Relation at his own request.

Dr. A. H. Gilett addressed the Conference in the interest of our Sunday School work in the South and West.

J. H. Amis read the report of the committee on Education. The report was approved. [See Report.]

The Bishop returned and took the chair.

R. J. Cooke was granted a Supernumerary relation at his own request.

On motion of T. C. Carter, the Bishop was requested to appoint R. Pierce to Tullahoma College as President. The motion prevailed and he was so appointed.

Elihu Grant, of the Providence Conference, was introduced to the Conference.

N. G. Taylor read a paper endorsing the Blair Educational Bill, which was unanimously adopted. He also offered a paper encouraging the revival of class-meetings in all our churches, and it was adopted.

J. J. Robinette offered a resolution looking to purchase of school property in Morristown, Tennessee. It was adopted

by a vote of 20 against 19.

J. S. Petty read the report of the committee on Missions. Approved.

The Bishop announced the transfer of J. S. Hill to the

East Tennessee Conference.

Many resolutions of thanks were offered and unanimously approved.

J. H. Amis made his report as Treasurer of the Conference

Education Society. Accepted.

G. Julian and W. R. Long were placed on the Superannua-

ted list at their own request.

On motion of N. G. Taylor, W. H. Rogers was directed to pass the money in his hands for the Bible Cause to Dr. Savage.

On motion of W. T. Senter the Conference adjourned. Bishop Hurst conducted the closing religious services, and after a very instructive and tender address to the Conference, read the appointments for the present year. Benediction by the Bishop.

REPORTS.

EDUCATION.

From the numerous papers presented to the committee in reference to the status of the institutions of learning entrusted to the care and patronage of this Conference, we respectfully submit the following report:

EAST TENNESSEE WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

The scholastic year closing May 27th was marked with a good degree of prosperity. During the past five years the average annual enrollment has been 250, and from nine to eleven States have been represented in the halls of the University each year.

The moral and religious condition of the school is worthy of special notice; there being twenty-four young men on the roll preparing for the ministry, and these ministerial students, in connection with the University Y. M. C. A., formed a corps of Christian workers which did much to help in the revival of last winter in which 50 souls were brought into the kingdom of God.

The Trustees have recently purchased the Wilson property adjoining the University campus, consisting of two acres of ground and a building of eight rooms, which was used during the past year as a boarding hall for young ladies. During the past summer a two-story dormitory building was completed sufficiently large to accommodate twenty students. The rooms are so arranged and furnished that students desiring to board themselves can do so at a very slight cost.

The entire property now consists of 18 acres of land and six good buildings with capacity for the accommodation of 400 students, and if located in the city of Knoxville would be

worth at least \$50,000.

The Trustees continue the free tuition system, simply

charging an incidental fee of \$5.00 per term.

Resolved, That we are greatly gratified with the continued prosperity of the of the University, and do heartly commend it to the sympathies and patronage of the entire Conference.

Resolved, That we confirm the nominations by the Board of Trustees of Bishop J. M. Walden, Rev. T. C. Carter, Rev. J. J. Manker, Rev. T. R. West, Rev. J. W. Mann, I. E. Bryant

and Mitchell Gaston as Trustees of the University.

Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of J. J. Robinette, J. A. Baker, G. W. Jarvis, T. C. Warner and M. C. Bruner of the Holston, R. C. Bramlett, of the Georgia, A. Graybeal, of the Blue Ridge, and J. M. Carter, of the Central Tennessee Conference, as examining committee for the ensuing year.

CHATTANOOGA UNIVERSITY.

This institution is slowly but grandly materializing. The building is one of the most imposing and substantial in the city of Chattanooga. It is nearing completion, and will be ready for use in a few months. From this institution, when fully completed, organized and equipped, the church may reasonably expect great results in the work of Christian Education; and to it we cordially pledge our co-operation and support.

SEQUATCHIE COLLEGE.

This College is situated about midway between the extreme ends of the Sequatchie valley. It includes about 15 acres of land, and a large two-story brick building in good condition, a large brick building for a ladies' boarding hall, and several good dormitories. The past year has not been one of success. Prof. Newsons had charge a part of the year, but left in February. Prof. Stout has charge at present. We think this school is of vital importance to our church.

Resolved, That J. F. Spence and L. B. Caldwell be appoint-

ed a visiting committee to this institution.

WARREN COLLEGE.

This young institution, located at Fullen's, closed a successful year in May last, under the principalship of Prof. J. C. Wright.

We recommend that O. Painter and David Ellis be added to the Board of Trustees. We also recommend that the Presiding Elder of the Greeneville District, T. B. Russell, and F. G. Meller be appointed a visiting committee for the coming year.

KINGSLEY SEMINARY.

This institution, under the management of the Principal, Joseph H. Ketron, A. M., has been successful from the beginning. Students have been received from seven different States.

At the close of last year 416 different students had been received. Of this number 204 were boarders. The enrollment the past year reached 143.

About 80 teachers have been trained at Kingsley Seminary, and they have given general satisfaction. To meet the heavy demand for teachers, a Normal Class was organized early in I883. The past year 53 students were enrolled in this department.

Large numbers of the students have been converted each year, and have become active workers in the Church.

Some preparations have been made to erect a large, substantial and more commodious main building in which it is desired to open school at the beginning of next year, and it is hoped that our most sanguine expectations will be realized.

We, your committee, recommend the appointment of the Presiding Elder of the Greeneville District, the Pastor of the Kingsport Circuit and the Pastor of the Fall Branch Circuit as a visiting and examining committee.

HOLSTON SEMINARY.

We recommend the appointment of J. F. Spence, J. A. Ruble and the Presiding Elder of the Knoxville District a committee with full power to act in regard to the Holston Seminary property at New Market, Tennessee.

POWELL'S VALLEY SEMINARY.

This well-known school is beautifully situated in Powell's Valley, about six miles east of Fincastle, with Prof. J. F.

Swingle as Principal.

The building is a substantial two-story brick structure, valued at \$3,500. Some valuable improvements have recently been added—a good well within a few yards of the building has just been completed, and a good bell placed in the belfry.

The success of the school in the past is well known; the present prospects are good. We commend this institution to the patronage of the Morristown District, and as a committee of examination we recommend the appointment of the Presiding Elder, S. Greear, and J. B. Little.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Whereas, The Board of Education of the Methodist Episcopal Church has come to be recognized as a power for good in all parts of the Church, and underlying nearly every other form of Christian effort, so that hundreds of the youth of the Church have been aided in their efforts to obtain a higher education, and thousands more have been aroused and stimulated to similar efforts; and

Whereas, the system of aiding students without prejudice to their manhood, and thus encouraging and enabling them to enter our pulpits and mission fields at an earlier date and with better qualifications than otherwise would have been possible, and thus opening wide a door to the highest grade of Christian culture to the most indigent youths of our land; and

Whereas, The institutions under the patronage of the Holston Conference have again and again received liberal aid by donations from the Board, and have recently obtained the pledge of Rev. Dr. Kidder, the faithful and efficient Corresponding Secretary, of "more to follow"; therefore,

Resolved, That we extend our hearty thanks to the Board for the liberal aid given to our schools, and pledge ourselves to renewed efforts in advancing the interests of the Board among our people, and will faithfully urge the collection of

Children's Day in all our Churches.

FREEDMEN'S AID SOCIETY.

In the Freedmen's Aid Society we think we see the hand of God lifting the Central South to a higher level of Christian culture and moral strength. Perhaps no one agency of the Church is laying deeper and broader foundations to confirm and solidify its work than this Society. And if the success of the past is a prophecy of the future growth, we have only to work, pray and wonder. The amount of visible growth for the labor and money expended is perhaps excelled no where in the records of church work; therefore,

Resolved. That we most heartily approve of the appeal now made by the Society to raise the coming year \$250,000 to be

\ expended in this field.

Resolved, That we accept the apportionment of \$500 to the Holston Conference, and we hereby pledge ourselves to endeavor to raise our full assessment.

Resolved, That we request the Society to send to each Pastor in this Conference a copy of the new chart prepared by

the Society.

Resolved, That we most heartily approve of the setting apart of the second Sabbath in May as Freedmen's Aid and

Southern Education Day.

Resolved, That we recommend that the Pastors on that day present both in the congregation and in the Sunday School the cause of Christian Education, and take a collection for the Society, and where there is more than one congregation on the same pastoral charge, that the Pastor present the cause to each of them during the month of May, and take collections in each so far as practicable.

We recognize the wisdom of the last General Conference in endorsing *The Methodist Advocate*, which is invaluable to our work in the Central South. We hereby pledge our cordial support to that paper as our Local organ, and recommend the appointment of Dr. T. C. Carter as Editor for the coming year. T. S. WALKER, *Chairman*.

BIBLE CAUSE.

There is now, as has been for many years, an increasing demand for the word of God. To meet this ever increasing demand of the church and the family of nations, the British and Foreign Bible Societies, the American Bible Society, with their 200 Auxiliaries, are publishing the Holy Scriptures at the astonishing number of more than 25,000 copies a day, in some 300 languages and dialects. We thank God and take courage for the great work this Society is accomplishing at home and abroad; but not withstanding the encouragement, we greatly regret the embarrassment of the A. B. S. for the want of funds, which is crippling her in noble her work.

During the past year, 41,709 books were sent to Tennessee. Of these, 20,897 were grants, to be distributed to destitute

families and individuals.

In view of the foregoing, we pledge ourselves anew to aid this National Institution in her great work, and would offer

the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we, the members of the Holston Conference, again pledge ourselves to give this society our hearty support, and will take collections in all our charges to aid the great work it is doing.

Resolved, That we recommend the appointment of W. H.

Rogers as Bible Agent for the ensuing year.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Whereas, We believe that the interests of Sunday School work within the bounds of the Holston Conference can be ad-

vanced by thorough organization; therefore,

Resolved, That we do hereby organize the Holston Conference Sunday School Society, auxiliary to the Sunday School Union of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and that the following rules be and are hereby adopted for the control of the Society.

1. The officers of the Society shall consist of a President, one Vice-President for each Presiding Elder's District, a Sec-

retary and Treasurer.

2. The officers shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Sunday-Schools, and elected by the Conference.

3. The anniversary of the Society shall be held at such time during the Conference session as may be fixed on by the President and Secretary, in connection with the Committee on Public Worship.

4. The District Vice-Presidents, in connection with the Presiding Elder, shall arrange for a District Institute, under the

direction of the Presiding Elder, at least once a year.

5. It shall be the duty of the District Vice-Presidents to correspond with the agent of the Sunday-school Union concerning the condition of the work in their Districts, and do all they can to aid him in advancing the interests of Sunday-School work within the bounds of their Districts.

[The following report of the Greeneville District is inserted in the minutes at the special request of Bishop Hurst, because, owing to the absence of some of the pastors, the Presiding Elder was not ready to read his report when the other Districts were reported, nor was this report read afterward.—Editor.]

GREENEVILLE DISTRICT.

The year just closing has been to a number of the charges of the district one of unusual spiritual prosperity. Some of the revival meetings held by the pastors have been seasons of wonderful manifestations of divine power and grace. Over six hundred conversions, and about half that number of accessions to the church are reported.

The financial reports show, as a general thing, a smaller aggregate for ministerial support than last year, and the benevolent collections, though there are fewer blanks, are not, I judge, quite up to last year. To some extent this falling off in benevolences may be occasioned by the great scarcity of mon-

ey in the region where we have operated, the preachers, in some instances, being unable to collect 10 per cent. of the subscriptions taken by them for these objects. In some cases the collections would have been much larger had the pastors followed the instruction given by the Conference and the Discipline as to the time and method of raising the benevolent collections. The "better day" waited for never came. In organizing the Sunday-schools into missionary societies, which has received special attention, I anticipated a large gain in the collections for missions, especially from the circuits; this has not been fully realized. The pastors have met, in some instances, considerable opposition from officers and teachers; first, to the organization of the schools into missionary societies; and second, to taking a monthly collection in them for missions—the plea urged was, the collections taken each Sunday were barely sufficient to procure supplies for the school, and that charity should have respect to home needs before being exercised abroad. It is not so easy as some imagine to overcome this opposition where religious life is feeble and selfishness strong, and the question of money is so prominent. And strange as it may seem, this opposition has been most determined and outspoken in charges which have been liberally aided from the missionary treasury.

The observance of "Childrens' Day" was more general than ever before, and the collections creditable. Progress has been made in the revival of class-meetings on a number of the charges, and the Love Feasts have often proved to be times of refreshing. As a general thing our people are loyal to the church; they love her doctrines, polity, usages, and are op-

posed to the obliteration of the old landmarks.

To me it seems but justice to make mention of the pastoral charges in brief. Ervin Circuit, Bro. Geo. B. Cox, pastor, reports \$4 conversions, 63 accessions, and \$16.00 for benevolences. A donation of \$200 from the Board of Church Extension was received, and a new church is in course of erection in the vicinity of Patton's Chapel, and will be completed in a short time. At Ervin, the county seat of Unicoi county, effort is being made to build a church; a lot has been secured, logs are now at the mill, and we hope to see a neat house of worship erected in that town—which cannot boast of one at present—during the ensuing year, if we can get a little aid from abroad. Experience demonstrates that we cannot, as a Church, build up in a community, especially where we have much opposition, solidly, permanently, unless we secure houses of worship other than school houses.

Fall Branch Circuit, under the labors of Bro. S. G. Ketron, assisted by Bro. Absalom Bunn, a local preacher of the Kingsport Circuit, has had a year of great prosperity. There have been 130 conversions and 60 accessions. The claims for ministerial support have not been fully met, and the benevolent collections are not much larger than last year, owing, it may be, to the church enterprises which have been pushed forward to completion during the year. Two attractive churches have been dedicated, another is about completed, and still another is projected in an excellent neighborhood, where we have secured an eligible site, and hope to see a beautiful church erected during the coming year. No aid from the Board of Church Extension has been received or asked for in erecting any of these houses. Our District Camp Ground is within the bounds of this circuit. We had an enjoyable campmeeting, lasting near a week, during September, but not attended with such results as might have been secured could we have had a larger attendance of ministers. We are looking to important improvements of the ground, and earnestly insist that the brethren of the District will co-operate with the pastor and Presiding Elder in this matter, and in making our camp-meeting what it should be each year—a grand success.

For the past three years the Fullen's Circuit has been under the care of Bro. T. B. Russell, who has been earnest and zealous, faithful and efficient. Fullen's is the seat of Warren College, or Seminary, concerning which the committee on Education will make a full report. During a large portion of this year the pastor has labored under a heavy and constant burden, caused by the severe and protracted sickness of his wife, who is still feeble, without any substantial basis for hope of permanent recovery. Notwithstanding this, no interest of the church has been neglected. A large debt on the parsonage has been liquidated. The financial report is not what it ought to be—only about 80 per cent. of the claims for ministerial support has been paid, and the benevolent collections are far

below what they should be.

Greeneville was left to be supplied. I secured Bro. F. G. Mellor, who was appointed by Bishop Warren to the Crossville charge, Kingston district, but was unwilling, because of a severe affection of the eyes, to undergo the exposure incident to that work. He has done remarkably well. The charge is in excellent and growing condition, the claims for ministerial support fully met, all the collections taken, aggregating \$50.75, and could the subscriptions have been realized, the assessments in full would have been obtained.

Greeneville Circuit has been in charge of Bro. J. H. Jennings, and has enjoyed a good degree of prosperity. There have been 72 conversions, 75 accessions; benevolent collections aggregate \$33.00. A new church is being erected in the vicinity of Harrison's S. H., and will, I trust, be completed in a few months, and when completed will be the ninth church on this charge—all of them, with one exception—Speedwell, not yet completed—commodious and attractive houses of worship, and deeded to the M. E. Church.

Jonesboro Station was left to be supplied, but I procured no one to supply it during the year. We have no house of worship, and the charge is unable of itself to build one. Bro. M. Seaton has served the Jonesboro Circuit. He has labored under financial embarrassment during the entire year,—has done efficient work, but has received less than one half his claim. The Presiding Elder received a proportionate amount. I have no report of conversions, accessions, or of benevolence; the pastor not present yet.

Kingsport—Bro. G. W. Jarvis, pastor, reports 148 conversions, 48 accessions, and benevolent collections aggregating \$8.38. A lot estimated at \$350, on which it is proposed to erect the Kingsley Seminary building, has been secured; a parsonage at Bloomingdale is near completion; a church building at Ross's camp-ground is well begun; and other church enterprises have received attention, and will, I trust, in the near future assume form and permanence. Bro. Jarvis has given his undivided attention to the work of the church. I presume no man in the Conference has done harder, more constant, more efficient work than he. If faithful service always met with merited remuneration, he would not report, as he does, his salary but little more than half paid, and such a meager sum for benevolences. There is a deficiency in the claim of the Presiding Elder in proportion to that of the pastor. Kingsley Seminary is within the bounds of this charge, a report of which will be made by the committee on Education.

Oakland—Bro. E. B. Clark, pastor. 180 conversions, 80 accessions, and \$22 for benevolences are reported. 20 per cent. of the pastor's, and about 40 per cent. of the Presiding Elder's, claim remain unpaid. Bro. Clark has succeeded in building a comfortable parsonage at Oakland, where is located the largest and most prosperous Seminary in the district, and one of the best neighborhoods with which I am acquainted. A neat and commodious church—Weems's Chapel—is completed

and ready for dedication. Sulphur Spring church, which for years has been unfinished, though occupied, was nicely fitted up, and dedicated during the year.

Johnson City and Elizabethton have been for two years united and under the pastoral charge of Bro. T. H. Hodge. There has been at Johnson City considerable advancement made—valuable accessions, both by letter and from probation. This place ought to stand alone; there is need of a pastor here all the time. We have an excellent Sunday-school, a weekly prayer-meeting, and we feel like saying, all that is needed to make this a self-supporting, prosperous station, is greater liberality on the part of the church in general in the support of the pastor, and prompt, systematic work on the part of the Stewards in the matter of finance.

Elizabethton, twelve miles distant, has had some increase in numbers during the year. It has received half the time and service from the pastor, but has paid very little for ministerial support, or for benevolences. It desires to be formed into a separate charge, and promises to support a single man as pastor.

Roan Mountain, a small charge cut off from the Ervin Circuit two years ago, was left to be supplied. It was supplied for six months by Bro. T. W. Matney, Sr., when I relieved him and put Bro. W. R. McNeese in charge. Some dissatisfaction with my action iu making this change arose, and Bro. McNeese felt compelled to abandon the work. Bro. T. W. Matney, Jr., was then placed in charge, and rendered satisfaction. A new church has been erected at Roan Mountain station, and could the services of Bishop Hurst have been secured, my plan was to have it dedicated last Wednesday, (14th). I have no report from the pastor.

Bro. G. M. Stone was appointed to Taylorsville Circuit, but by reason of affliction in his family, did not take charge. In December I prevailed on Bro. S. Richardson, a member of the Virginia Conference, living in the bounds of the Kingsport charge, who sustained a supernumerary relation to his own Conference, to take pastoral charge, which he did. He was well received, and had he remained in health, would have been able to accomplish much more than was realized. A new church is well under way at Deep Spring, and will be, when completed, the best country church, I presume, in the Conference—costing near \$2,500. I have no report as to conversions, benevolences, &c. The pastor is not present at this time. An advance movement must be made on this work next year; a great deal has been lost through neglect.

Watanga has been supplied for the past two years by Bro. F. H. Little, a local preacher. He is deservedly popular, and has done excellent work. The stopping of the furnaces on Stony Creek has seriously affected the finances—many of our members, instead of being able to pay, as was their wont, liberally to support the church, are themselves now in need of aid to keep want at bay. I have not received a report from the Pastor.

MEMOIRS.

REV. W. B. BALLENGER.

Rev. W. B. Ballenger was born June 25, 1825, in Blount county, Tennessee. He professed religion in early life and joined the M. E. Church, South. After reaching manhood, being called to preach, he spent some time in school preparing himself for the work of the ministry. By close application to his calling he became an acceptable and efficient minister.

At the commencement of the late war, Bro. Ballenger united with the Union cause, for which he was arrested and imprisoned by the opposite authorities, and was subjected to many indignities. But after the cloud of war passed away he at once united with the old Methodist Episcopal Church and her ministry, and wrought faithfully in the Lord's vineyard till October 15, 1884, when he was called from labor to rest. He leaves an only son and a widow to mourn his loss. His widow is a devoted and efficient member of the M. E. Church.

MRS. PARTHENA E. MILLER,

Wife of Rev. Wm. C. Miller, passed from labor and suffering to rest and heaven, Feb. 6, 1885, at McDonald's, Bradley county, Tenn. She was in the 25th year of her age. Born May 12, 1860, and married Dec. 23d, 1875. She received Christ as her Savior in 1875, and joined the M. E. Church, in which she lived a consistent, devoted and happy Christian life till called to the Church triumphant in Heaven. She was taken sick soon after having moved to their new home, the Parsonage, at McDonald's station. Suffering greatly, she bore it patiently and with Christian courage—no murmuring word escaping her lips. Her mind was clear and calm to the very last. While conversing freely with her husband, on the Sab-

bath before her death, Bro. Miller asked her, if she should die, what he had better do with the three children, the youngest being only two months old? She said she wished his mother to take them and, with his aid, do the best she could for them. Bro. M. seeming to hesitate, she said, "you need not be the least embarrassed in talking to me about my death, or of my hope in God. I have thought of all this. I am not afraid to die; I shall be at rest, and done with suffering. I would love to live to aid you in caring for the children, but I am perfectly resigned to the will of God." Thus she passed over to the "shining shore." By those who knew her most intimately she was esteemed an amiable woman. While her education was limited, she was possessed of fine natural abilities—all the native elements of a perfect womanhood. She was cheerful and kind, uniformly so, yet firm in her convictions of right. Her home was pleasant and attractive to her husband—a place of rest and cheer and encouragement to him in his itinerant labors. Not a little of the success attending the labors of Bro. Wm. C. Miller, and of the love aud esteem in which he is held wherever he labors, was due to his gentle and faithful wife. The memory of that happy christian home will linger ever bright and cheering. Many friends and loved ones mingle their tears with the sorrowing husband, mourning her departure. But she sleeps in Jesus—

" * * * Blessed sleep,
From which none ever wake to weep,"

"Do you mourn when another star Shines out in the glittering sky? Do you weep when the raging noise of war And the storms of conflict die?

Then why do your tears run down, Why your hearts so sorely riven, For another gem in the Saviour's crown, And another soul in heaven."
