

MINUTES.

SATURDAY, October 2, 1880.

The Unity Baptist Association met in its twenty-sixth annual session with Bethesda Church, Antanga county, Ala.

At 11 o'clock A. M., Eler G. W. Mills preached the Introductory sermon, from Hosea, 4:6; "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge."

After an intermission for dinner, the delegates assembled in the church building. By request of Elder A. Andrews, Moderator of last session, Elder J. Falkner called the body to order, and, after reading the 90th Psalm, and singing the hymn—"How can I sink with such a prop?" offered prayer.

Elder A. Andrews in the chair, proceeded to business by appointing Eld's W. Wilkes, J. Falkner and bro. W. J. Zimmerman to read the letters

After a few appropriate remarks, thanking the body for the confidence reposed in him, and declaring his intention of discharging his duties to the best of his ability, without respect to person, he took the Moderator's seat.

On motion of J. H. Ray, a special committee on State Missions was appointed, as follows: J. H. Ray, G. W. Mills, K. Wells.

The Committee on Preaching reported as follows: Elder A. L. Blizard to preach to-night. Prayer-meeting to-morrow at 10 o'clock A. M., conducted by H. E. Longerier. Preaching at 11 o'clock by Elder W. Wilkes; at 2 P. M. by Elder J. Falkner; Sunday night by Elder A. Andrews.

On motion of W. J. Zimmerman, a public collection was ordered to be

taken up for missions at the close of the 11 o'clock sermon.

Adjourned, with singing and prayer by Elder W. Wilkes, to 9 o'clock A. M., Monday.

5 MINUTES.

SABBATH MORNING, 10 o'clock.

Prayer-meeting conducted by H. E. Longerier. Prayer offered by A. G. Patrick, G. P. Olive, T. F. Thomasson. At 11 o'clock Eld. W. Wilkes preached from Ezekiel, 34:26; after which, \$29.30 was collected for missions. At 2 o'clock P. M., Elder J. Falkner preached from Eph, 2:8. At night, Elder A. Andrews preached from Heb., 10.23. Elder A. L. Blizard preached Saturday night from Gen., 5:24

The congregations were very large, orderly and attentive. We have reason to believe that much good was accomplished in the name of Jesus.

Monday, 9 o'clock A. M.

The Association was called to order by the Moderator. After reading the 2nd Psalm and singing the hymn-"I love thy kingdom, Lord,"prayer by Elder A. L. Blizard.

Roll called and absentees marked Previous minutes read and adopted. The regular order of business-the reports of letters and documents -read by L. E. Davis.

LETTERS AND DOCUMENTS.

We have carefully examined all papers submitted to us, and find that several of our churches report glorious revivals, and some interesting Bible schools.

Shiloh church asks for assistance to erect a new church building. We

recommend their request to your consideration.

Several of the churches recommend that Elder A. L. Blizard be sent as our beneficiary to Howard College, and have sent up pledges to aid in sending him. We cheerfully recommend that an effort be made to raise funds to send him at once. Respectfully submitted.

ON MISSIONS.

Elder G. W. Mills, chairman of the Committee on the report of Missions, made his report, it being the regular order of business:

The subject of missions is greatly on the increase among the Bartist denomination. This is evident through the great work now being done in both home and foreign fields. We have many efficient missionaries, both men and women, engaged in the great work, yet they are inadequate to the demand. Others are anxious to go, hence the great demand for means. Our Home Mission Board is now supplying many destitute places in our own sunny land, and sending the gospel to the heathen on our western borders. These self-sacrificing missionaries must be supported, or abandon the fields. Other hodies are "coming up to the help of the Lord against the mighty." Let us unite our efforts with theirs in this glorious work. The command of Christ and the wants of the perishing call upon us to lend a helping hand. Can we be disobedient to the command of our Savior? or shall the "Macedonian ery" for help come to us in vain? Can we not give our sympathies, our prayers and our money? Nay, brethren, let us be obedient; let us go forward. Our State Mission Board is doing a good work; but as you have a special committee on State Missions, we will say nothing about their work. May the blessings of God attend our labors in the great work.

BIBLE SCHOOLS.

Elder A. L. Blizard, Chairman of the committee on Bible Schools,

submitted the following report:

Your committee are glad to know that the conviction is growing stronger and stronger that the Bible school has its foundation laid upon Bible authority; that its work must be done upon Bible principles; and that its success depends upon Divine blessings. Let us not relax our efforts until there is a prosperous Bible school in every church and neighborhood, a Bible in the hands of every man, woman and child, and the gospel preached to every creature within our bounds. Let there be no lack of funds, no want of sympathy, no cessation of labor, until the voice of prayer and the songs of praise shall be heard every Sabbath day throughout the Unity Association. Knowing that the prosperity of the churches depends in a great measure upon the interest manifested in the Bible schools and prayer-meetings, your committee would most earnestly recommend that, in connection with the Bible schools, the churches would organize prayer-meetings. Let us not read this report and lay it aside for "a more convenient season;" but let us bestir ourselves during the ensuing year, and that an honest, faithful effort be made to organize and maintain a Bible school and prayer-meeting in every church and neighborhood in our Association.

ON EDUCATION.

Report on Education, furnished by W. C. Adair, chairman of the com-

mittee, and read by Elder W. Wilkes, as follows:

Education may be divided into general, collegiate and ministerial. All people should have a general education; as many as may be so situated and capacitated as to avail themselves of it, should have a collegiate education; but ministerial education is what this report looks to, mainly. By this is meant that mental training which prepares one to think clearly and speak intelligibly, possessing a fund of knowledge with which to be furnished with matter of thought and utterance. We recommend Howard College as the best school for our young preachers to attend. We also recommend great prominence to be given to the support of any approved brother looking to his education for the ministry. We personally commend brother A. L. Blizard to the patronage of the churches, and hope this Association will now take steps for his support at Howard College.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe in one only living and true God-the Father, Son and Holy Ghost; these three are one-I Corinthians viii:6 Deuteronomy vi:4. Mutthew xxiii:19. II Corinthians xiii:14. I John v:7.

2 We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only correct rule of faith and practice.

II Peter i:21. II Timothy iii:16.

3. We believe in the doctrine of election, and that God chose His people in Christ before the foundation of the World, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth.—I Peter i:2-5. Ephesians i:4. II Thessalonians i:13.

4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.—Romans iii.23; v:12;

5. We believe in man's inability to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature. Romans v.6. John vi.44. Ephesians ii.1 5. Phillipians ii:13.

6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ.—Romans v:1. Galatians

- 7 We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace and never finally fall away.—Corinthians xii:9. Colossians iii:4. Romans viii: 38 39.
- 8. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of the Church of Christ, and that true believers are the only proper subjects, and that immersion only is baptism.—Mathew iii.5, 6, 13, 16. Acts vii 37 38. Acts vii:38-39.

9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judg-

ment. Acts xvii:31. John v:28 29.

10. We believe that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of

the wicked will be everlasting. Matthew xxv:6.

11. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances except those who are called of God, and have been regularly baptized, approved by the church, and come under the imposition of hands by a Presbytery .-- I Timothy v:22. Acts vi:16.

12. We believe that none tut regularly baptized believers have a right to partake of the Lord's Supper.---Acts ii:42-44. II Corinthi-

ans vi:14. I Corinthians xi:23-29.

RULES OF DECORUM.

 The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
 The officers of the Association shall be chosen by the suffrages of the members present.

3. The Moderator shall be considered a judge of order, and shall

have discretionary right to call to order at any time.

4. Any member not satisfied with his decision may appeal to the Association on the same day, but at no other time.

5. But one member shall speak at a time, and he shall rise, and, obtaining permission, proceed; such permission being signified by the

Moderator naming the person, or otherwise.

6. No person shall be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject; and every motion made and seconded, in order shall come under the consideration of the Association, and be decided, unless withdrawn by him who made it.

7. Every case taken up by the Association shall be decided or with-

drawn before another is offered.

8. When a question has been introduced, and sufficient time allowed for debate, the Moderator shall take the voice of the Association upon the subject; those in the affirmative shall make it known by saying aye, and those in the negative, nay. If a division of the question is called for, the decision shall be made by the members rising from their seats.

9. The appellation "brother" shall be used in the Association when

one brother addresses another.

10 Any member wishing to retire shall obtain permission from the Moderator.

11. The names of the delegates shall be called as often as the Assoeiation shall direct.

12. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speaking as any other member, provided he appoints another to his seat; but shall not vote, unless the Association be equally divided. He may also appoint committees necessary for transacting any business that may, from time to time, come before the Association.

13. Any member violating these rules shall be reproved by the Mod-

erator, but only on the day such violation occurs.

14. These rules shall be read at the opening of every session of the Association, and may be altered or amended whenever a majority of the members present shall deem it necessary.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be known as "The Unity Bartist Association," and shall be composed of delegates from such churches as constitute, or may hereafter unite with, this body.

ART. 2. The design of its labors shall be to promote the cause of Christ, and to encourage those objects supported by Baptists gener-

ally.

ART. 3. This Association shall hold its session annually, at such a

time and place as it may appoint.

ART. 4. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer—to be elected at each session—who shall perform all the duties appertaining to such offices in similar bodies; and in case of the absence of any officer, one pro tem. shall be appointed by the Association until an election is declared.

ART. 5. A record of the proceedings of this Association shall be kept by the Clerk, and as soon as practicable after the close of each session, he shall superintend the printing of the Minutes thereof, and

shall furnish each church with a suitable number of copies.

ART. 6. Any church subscribing to our Abstract of Faith may be admitted into this Association by the consent of the members in session.

ART. 7. Any church, orthodox in faith and practice, which has complied with this Constitution, may withdraw from this body by the consent of a majority of the members in session.

ART. 8. This Association, in regular session, may dissolve its connection with any church which may differ with it in doctrine or prac-

tice.

ART. 9. Any church of his Association with thirty members or less shall be entitled to three delegates, and one additional delegate for every additional twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof.

ART. 10. It shall be the duty of each church to forward a written communication to every session, specifying the names of its delegates

and the state of the church.

ART. 11. If a difficulty should arise in a church, which cannot be settled thereby, the church shall call aid from two or more sister churches; if the matter cannot then be adjusted, it shall be referred to the Association for advice.


ART. 12. All queries must be acted upon by the churches in which they may originate; and when they fail to be disposed of therein, must be reported, by letter, to the Association: the decision thereof

shall be considered an advisory answer.

ART. 13. This Association shall have a fund supplied by the voluntary contributions of the churches; and all moneys thus contributed shall be transmitted and paid over to the Finance Committee, and said committee to pay over to the Treasurer.

ART. 14. Any article of this Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the delegates present at any regular ses-

sion.



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
