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## MINUTES.

PINE BLUFF BAPTIST CHURCH,
BLOUNT COUNTY, ALA., October 7, 1881.

The Warrior River Baptist Association met with the church above named at 11 o'clock, a. m.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Elder James Fields, from Eph. 4:4.

The body was called to order by Elder James Fields, former Moderator. The letters from the churches were read and names of messengers enrolled.

Petitionary letters from Warrior Creek, Pine Grove and Hopewell churches were received, and right hand of fellowship extended to the messengers, in behalf of the Association, by the Moderator.

Elected Elder H. W. Watson, Moderator; W. Y. Adams, Clerk; and J. D. Hendricks, Treasurer.

Cahaba Valley Association asked to open a correspondence by her messenger, Elder J. A. Glenn. Request granted and Brother Glenn invited to a seat.

Welcomed correspondents, Elder J. W. Dorman, from Canaan Association, and Elders W. J. Lee and C. A. Burns, from Sulphur Springs Association.

After recess the Association met in the house.

This having been made a special hour for hearing Report on Missions, it was called for, read, and after discussion, adopted. (C)

No State Mission work having been done in our bounds during the past year, parties and churches having made pledges for Mission work, were absolved from the payment of the same by vote of the body.

Finance Report read and adopted. (D.)

Read and adopted Reports on Temperance, (E.), and Education. (F.)

On motion, adjourned to meet at 8:30 o'clock, Monday morning.

SUNDAY MORNING.

Preaching at 9:30 o'clock by Elder J. A. Glenn, from 11 Cor. 5:19. Missionary Sermon at 11 o'clock, by Elder H. W. Watson, from Mat. 28:18, 19. 2'clock, by Elder A. Dorman. The services were well attended. Took up collection for Foreign Missions—\$10.00.

MONDAY MORNING.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. Limited speakers to five minutes.

Read and adopted Report on State of Religion. (G.)

Changed time of meeting from Friday before second Sabbath in October of each year, to Saturday before the third Sabbath in August.

TEMPERANCE.

We entreat our brethren to forward on the cause by every means attainable, especially by abstaining from spirituous liquors as a beverage themselves, and by teaching their children the principles of Temperance.

We would most respectfully nrge our churches to enforce rigid discipline against all members, who are addicted to intemperance. We believe the church of Christ to be the greatest power to which-the advocates of Temperance can look; indeed, we believe the church to be the parent of Temperance. And

shall the child not look to the parent for support?

May God lead us to the full realization of the great responsibility resting upon us, as instruments in His hands for leading the world to a higher plain of life.

Therefore, Resolved, that we withdraw fellowship from any church that holds in fellowship any person who makes, sells or gives away ardent spirits as a beverage.

(F.) We, your Committee on Education, do not think we can urge the necessity of an educated ministry too highly, from the fact, that we look to it as a guide, and expect it to combat with the enemies of our religion. We may expect innovations of a hurtful character to be made in our churches, and we already see the machination of the enemy of souls at work in our midst; the first must be cut off, the last defeated. We must fight the enemy with his own weapon—a cultivated intellect; and since we have the sword of the spirit, the word of God, we will be doubly armed, and the fore must fall before us, helpless, or scatter like chaff before the wind. We refer our young ministers to the advice given by Paul to Timothy.

The Bible is the best book on theology the minister can study. A thorough acquiantance with language, a knowledge of history, both ancient and modern,

are requisite to give comprehensiveness to the mind; therefore,

Resolved, that this Association recommend a liberal education to all our young ministers of the gospel, and that such steps be taken as will best promote this end.

#### STATE OF RELIGION.

(G.) Your Committee on State of Religion beg leave to report, that some of our churches have reported precious revivals, while others complain of coldness. Upon the whole we think that the State of Religion in our Association is by no means what it ought to be; and in order to raise the standard of christianity in our midst, we would recommend that our ministers preach more frequently upon experimental religion and practical Godliness, that at every church meeting, both minister and church preach and work as though the destiny of souls depended upon the present effort.

We further recommend, that in special protracted efforts by the church for the conversion of sinners, that an hour in each day be set apart and the anxious be invited to meet with the church and ministers for instruction and prayer, where each one can be instructed and prayed for. In this way "confusion and much bodily exercise which profiteth but little" will be avoided and true piety promoted.

Sabbath Schools should be organized in every church, and every Scriptural means should be used to show that the church of Christ is not of this world, but that it is divine, that each member is like Christ. Then the time will come when Zion 'in purity the world shall behold."

### CIRCULAR LETTER.

DEAR BRETHREN—We address you this year on systematic giving, and hope that you will not throw these lines away as so much trash, for it is reasonably to be expected that they are the last that will ever fall from our pen to you, yet we love the Warrior River Baptist Association, and continually pray for prosperity in her bounds; but other fields will hereafter claim our labor and efforts.

That it is the duty of every child of God to give something to advance the cause of Christ on earth, we hope no one has the hardihood to deny in this age of Gospel light; but we often have the phrase repeated, "charity begins at home," as if it were the inspired word of God; but it is not there; on the contrary, Christ, while on earth, commended the poor widow who gave her whole living into the treasury of God.

We have at this writing the minutes of your last session lying before us, and we find the total footing of the membership at that time to be one thousand one hundred and fifty-one. Now, what ought this number of Baptists in one body to do in the spread of the Gospel to regions beyond? Let us make a calculation on the basis of only one cent per week to the member—and who cannot pay that amount, especially when you spend foolishly three or four times that amount in something that does you no good, but harm? 1,151 multiplied by 52, the number of weeks in the year—the amount of five hundred and ninety-eight dollars and fifty-two cents—enough to keep a missionary in the destitute parts of the Association and to help send the Gospel to other regions that are perishing for the "bread of life." Do you say these are the vagaries of a wild brain? Be it so; but God will surely require of you a strict account of your stewardship, and then you will wish, but in vain, that you had been more wise in the disbursements of His store. While many of you could give four or five times the amount named without inconvenience to yourselves or families, there are none but could give that amount by just determining that it should be done.

Brethren, when we look and see what Christ has done for us and how little we are doing for him, it ought to make us hide our heads in very shame.

The religion of the Bible is a religion of sacrifice; and unless we are willing to sacrifice some of 'our lustful wishes, well may we doubt our very profession of Christ. He sacrificed ALL, that we might be made the heirs of God-and shall we make no sacrifice for Him? I cannot accept any other hypothesis than that of absolute indifference to the calls of the Gospel, as the cause why there is not a missionary in the destitute and waste places within the bounds of Warrior River Association. And why is it you are not doing something for other regions? This paper does not discuss the subject of pastoral support, for that is not giving, but a case of debt, as much so as the debt to your blacksmith, doctor, merchant or teacher, and brethren ought to be taught the truth on this point by the pastors. The Bible plan of giving is, let every one lay by in store on the first day of the week as God has prospered him. be carried out and then we shall see the treasury of the Lord full and overflowing. Brethren and sisters, let each one come up to the Lord's house every first day with his or her cent, and more if the Lord hath given more, and do our part in pushing on the car of salvation, until earth's remotest nations shall be blest with the news of salvation, and till no one of the inhabitants of earth can say, "no one has ever told me before." Amen.
