HOLSTON CONFERENCE JOURNAL.

DAILY BUSINESS SESSIONS.

CLINCH STREET, M. E. CHURCH,
KNOXVILLE, TENNESSEE, October 12, 1887.

The Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met in its twenty-third annual session in this city this morning at nine o'clock, Bishop E. G. Andrews, of Washington, D. C., presiding.

The Conference was opened by singing hymn 770, "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord." In this the ministers all joined and gave evidence of the interest they have in the Christian work.

Bishop Andrews read the LIII. chapter of Isaiah and selections from the New Testament.

After the singing of hymn 393, "Just as I am, without one plea," the administration of the Lord's Supper took place under the personal supervision of Bishop Andrews, assisted by the Presiding Elders. This was an impressive ceremony.

Rev. T. B. Russell, last year's Secretary, called the roll, and forty-two members were present and answered to their names.

T. B. Russell was then re-elected Secretary with T. S. Walker and J. H. Amis, Assistants.

J. S. Petty was elected Statistical Secretary, with T. H. Hodges, J. F. Perry and C. O. Jones, Assistants.

On motion it was agreed that Conference should meet at 8:30 and adjourn at 11:45 a. m., and that the first half hour would be devoted to prayer meeting services.

A motion was then made and carried that the Presiding Elders should constitute a committee whose duty it should be to nominate suitable persons for the Standing Committees. Their report was presented by J. J. Robinette and adopted. [See Standing Committees.]

The Bar of the Conference was fixed at the opposite side of the third window from the pulpit.

The Bishop stated that the Conference was authorized to draw on the Chartered Fund for \$30; also on the Book Concern, a dividend of \$151, and the drafts were ordered.

A paper on Episcopal Fund was referred to the Presiding Elders.

A paper on General Conference Expenses was referred to the proper committee.

Question eighteen was called: "Who are the Supernumerary Preachers?" The following were called and passed under this class: T. A. Cass, M. R. M. Burk, A. J. Bruner, J. N. Baker, F. M. Cones, A. F. Creswell, J. B. Fitzgerald, J. K. P. Marshall, J. N. Moore, J. D. Lawson, A. G. Watkins, J. W. Burnett and S. Tinker, the latter being transferred from the superannuated list to supernumerary list.

Question nineteen: "Who are the Superannuated Preachers?" The following were found under this class: W. M. Haskell, L. Bogart, W. C. Graves, W. H. Rogers, A. J. Greer, S. W. Hyden, D. B. Lawton, G. Julian.

W. R. Long was transferred to the effective class from the superannuated.

Dr. A. E. P. Albert, Editor of the *Southwestern Christian Advocate*, published at New Orleans, was present and being introduced to the Conference by Bishop Andrews, made a few appropriate remarks. He urged upon the ministers the importance of a more united work among the white and colored Methodists of the South.

The twentieth question was taken up: "Was the Character of each Preacher Examined?" and J. J. Robinette, Presiding Elder of the Chattanooga District, after the passage of his character, read his report, and the effective Elders of his district, namely, H. H. Burk, W. C. Miller, R. J. Cooke, J. F. Perry, W. D. Smith, G. M. Stone, T. C. Carter, R. S. Sampson, J. F. Spence, F. W. Henck, E. S. Lewis and J. J. Manker were approved.

The Bishop announced the transfer of T. C. Warner to the Southern California Conference.

Continuing the examination of character and the reports of Districts, T. B. Russell, Presiding Elder of the Greeneville District, next read a report of the progress and proceedings in his district, which shows that he has put in a year of arduous labor; that he is thoroughly familiar with every department of the work, and that the results are such as must be very gratifying. Then the following Elders were approved: E. B. Clark, F. G. Mellor, T. H. Hodge, S. G. Ketron, T. S. Walker, M. Seaton and B. Crist.

At his own request E. B. Clark was granted a superannuated relation and he was allowed to draw upon the funds of the present year.

On motion the Conference adjourned to meet at 2 o'clock, p. m., for the purpose of receiving statistical reports and benevolent money.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference assembled pursuant to adjournment, W. H. Rogers in the chair. Devotions conducted by E. S. Lewis.

On motion F. W. Henck was made Treasurer of Church Extension collections instead of J. A. Ruble.

W. M. Haskell was placed on the Committee on Tracts.

On motion the Conference adjourned, W. M. Haskell pronouncing the benediction.

SECOND DAY.

KNOXVILLE, TENNESSEE, October 13, 1887.

The Conference met at the appointed hour. The service was conducted by Rev. M. A. Rule.

The first day's proceedings were read and passed after roll call.

Statistical Secretary, Rev. J. S. Petty, announced that he would receive additional reports during the morning session.

Question twenty was resumed, namely, the passage of each Elder's character.

L. B. Caldwell, Presiding Elder of the Kingston District, after the passage of his character, represented the District of which he has charge, and the effective Elders were approved as follows: S. B. Scott, A. E. Barnes, A. C. Peters, D. Richardson, A. B. Wright, J. C. Wright and T. H. Russell.

J. W. Mann, Presiding Elder of the Knoxville District, read his report, his character having been approved, and the effective Elders of his District were passed as follows: R. C. Robertson, W. C. Daily, I. A. Pearce, P. H. Henry, J. A. Nicholson, J. M. Durham, W. T. Senter, M. A. Rule, J. A. Baker, R. O. Ayers, J. A. Ruble.

Rev. W. C. Daily was placed on the Supernumerary list at his own request.

T. R. West, Presiding Elder of the Morristown District, was approved and he read his report, after which the effective Elders of said District were passed as follows: J. B. Little, J. H. Amis, W. Kinsland, J. S. Petty, P. H. Reed, J. L. Caldwell, G. W. Jarvis, S. Greear.

The character of J. B. Seaton, against whom some charges were preferred, was continued until he could be present in person.

Rev. T. S. Walker offered appropriate resolutions of condolence in which the Conference extended to Rev. J. A. Ruble and wife its heartfelt sympathies in their affliction, caused by the recent loss of a child.

The annual report of the Board of Trustees of Grant Memorial University was presented and read by Dr. Spence. The report was accepted and referred to the Committee on Education.

Dr. A. J. Kynett, Secretary of the Church Extension Society, was introduced by Bishop Andrews and made a few plain and practical remarks concerning church extension work.

Rev. A. L. S. Bateman, of the Ohio Conference, was introduced.

Adjourned, with the benediction, by Rev. W. H. Rogers.

THIRD DAY.

KNOXVILLE, TENNESSEE, October 14, 1887.

The Conference assembled at the usual hour, the prayer meeting being led by J. J. Manker. Bishop Andrews took the chair at 9 o'clock and the Journal was read and approved.

On motion of Thomas B. Russell, 10 o'clock was fixed as the order of the day for the election of delegates to the General Conference which will convene in New York, May 1st, 1888.

A. E. Barnes was granted a supernumerary relation at his own request.

Rev. C. D. Munsey, of the Cincinnati Conference, was introduced.

The fifth question: "Who are Admitted into full Connection?" was taken up, whereupon R. K. Boyd, C. O. Jones and W. R. Byerly, after answering the disciplinary questions, were duly admitted, and C. O. Jones and W. R. Byerly were elected to Deacons' Orders. R. K. Boyd having been ordained as a Local Deacon he was elected to Elders' Orders.

The order of the day was taken up, E. S. Lewis, J. A. Nicholson, G. W. Jarvis, B. Crist, W. C. Daily and J. D. Droke being appointed tellers. The first ballot resulted in the election of Dr. T. C. Carter; the second in the election of Dr. J. F. Spence; the third in the election of J. J. Robinette and T. S. Walker, reserves.

Dr. P. M. Bartlet, President of Maryville College, was introduced to the Conference.

Question fourth: "Who are Discontinued.?" was called. Under this question Stanley Haskin was, on motion of Dr. Caldwell, discontinued on account of ill health.

Question third: "Who Remain on Trial?" Answer: J. N. Kendall, A. M. Rose, J. L. McKenzie, J. W. McGee, A. G. Cadle and M. H. Monroe. The last two did not pass the examination in the first year's course of study.

J. K. P. Marshall and G. B. Cox were continued as Deacons of the first class.

M. M. Murrell, W. T. Jones, J. D. Droke, were duly elected to Elders' Orders.

J. B. Little was granted a supernumerary relation at his own request.

Rev. Robert Steudel, of the Presbyterian Church, was received and recognized as a Traveling Elder.

Rev. J. W. Dinkins, coming from the Baptist Church, was recognized as a Local Elder.

Conference adjourned by limitation, W. C. Daily pronouncing the benediction.

FOURTH DAY.

KNOXVILLE TENNESSEE, October 15th, 1887.

The Conference met at 8:30 o'clock, W. C. Daily leading the the prayer meeting.

At 9 o'clock the Journal was read, approved and business resumed.

On motion of Dr. Cooke the Bishop was requested to appoint Rev T. C. Carter, D. D., Editor of *The Methodist Advocate*.

On motion of Dr. Carter R. K. Boyd was allowed to go without appointment in order to attend school.

The case of J. B. Seaton was called. He explained why he had not filled his appointments and his character passed.

Cleveland was selected as the place for holding the next Conference.

The question of limitation of the ratio of representation in the General Conference was presented and lost by a vote of 9 ayes and 32 nays.

On motion of Dr. Caldwell M. C. Bruner was continued in the Supernumerary relation.

Question second: "Who are admitted on Trial?" was taken up, and James L. Neely, from the Chattanooga District, John D. Winchester, from the Kingston District, William R. McNeese, from the Greeneville District, Isaac H. Reneau, from the Knoxville District, and William D. Gorman, from the Morristown District were duly admitted.

Under question tenth: "What Local Preachers have been elected Deacons?" G. W. Broome, W. D. Gorman, J. W. Baldwin and W. S. Cagle were severally elected.

Question sixteen: "What Local Deacons have been elected Elders?" was taken up, and H. J. Henry and H. B. Ogle were elected.

Rev. A. P. Smith, of the Baptist Church, Rev. D. N. McInturff and Dr. C. S. Long, of the Blue Ridge Conference, and

Rev. Dr. Stowe, of the Western Book Concern, were introduced to the Conference, and Dr. Stowe represented the Book Concern at Cincinnati as being in a prosperous condition.

The Committee on Bible Cause reported, and the report was adopted on motion of Dr. Spence.

The Committee on Education reported through its chairman, President Lewis, and the report was approved by items and then adopted as a whole.

On motion of Dr. Spence the Conference agreed to meet at 2 o'clock this afternoon, and on motion of W. M. Haskell it agreed to meet in its final session for the present year at 8 o'clock Monday morning, the 17th.

Dr. J. H. Vincent was introduced and spoke with great interest to the Conference in respect to the Sunday School work of our Church.

Conference adjourned by expiration of time.

Benediction by W. R. Long.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference met agreeable to motion above, Dr. Clark in the chair. Religious services by Dr. Carter.

H. H. Burk, Treasurer of Episcopal Fund, reported, and the report was adopted.

W. T. Senter, Treasurer of the Educational Society, presented his report, and on motion of Dr. Manker the amount on hand was appropriated to some needy Theological Students in Chattanooga University.

Dr. Manker then read the report of the Committee on Church Extension, including amounts collected for the same, and on motion the report was adopted, and the money ordered paid to Dr. Stowe, our Book Agent at Cincinnati.

G. B. Cox read the report of the Conference Stewards, which, on motion of Dr. Manker, was re-committed, Dr. Manker and J. B. Fitzgerald being added to the Board on motion of T. H. Russell.

B. Crist read the report of the Committee on Freedman's Aid, including money received therefor, and the report was adopted.

J. N. Baker, Treasurer of the General Conference Expense Fund, reported and the report was adopted and the money paid to Dr. Stowe.

G. W. Jarvis, Treasurer of the Conference Missionary Society, read his report and the money received was paid to Cranston and Stowe, for which the treasurer holds receipt.

On motion of Dr. Manker the Conference adjourned and Dr. Spence pronounced the benediction.

FIFTH DAY.

KNOXVILLE, TENNESSEE, October 17th, 1887.

The Conference met at 8 o'clock, a. m., Bishop Andrews in the chair. W. H. Rogers led the prayer meeting. The minutes of Saturday's Session were read and approved.

J. A. Ruble read the report of the Committee on Temperance, which was adopted.

J. H. Amis read the report on District Conference Records and it was approved.

G. B. Cox presented and read the report of the Conference Board of Stewards, distributing the money on hand among the claimants. [See Report.] A special collection was taken for Mrs. Cobleigh, amounting to \$24.50, and one for Rev. E. B. Clark, amounting to \$15. These collections were suggested by Dr. Spence.

J. B. Fitzgerald presented a lot of ground to the Conference by deed of conveyance, for the benefit of Conference Claimants, and the same was thankfully received.

The Statistical Secretary, J. S. Petty, read the statistical tables in their general aggregates and the report was adopted. [See Statistics.]

W. M. Haskell reported the collections for the Tract cause, which report was approved.

The Committee on Sunday Schools reported through J. A. Nicholson and the report was approved.

The memoir of Rev. N. G. Taylor, D.D., was read by Dr. Manker and approved by the Conference.

On motion of T. B. Russell J. B. Fitzgerald was placed on the effective list. T. A. Cass was placed on the same list on motion of J. J. Robinette.

The Bishop announced the transfer of D. S. Hodsdon from the South Kansas, and A. B. Riker from the Ohio Conferences.

C. O. Jones was granted a location at his own request.

Dr. T. C. Carter addressed the Conference in regard to the *Methodist Advocate* and *The Southland Reading Circle*.

Various complimentary resolutions were offered and unanimously adopted. [See Resolutions.]

President Lewis made some statements in reference to the Chattanooga University.

Committees of examination and other Conference officers for the ensuing year were announced by the Bishop.

Thomas B. Russell read the report of the Committee on Missions which was concurred in by the Bishop and adopted by the Conference.

Dr. Spence moved, that after the closing religious service and reading the appointments, the Conference stand adjourned, and the motion prevailed. Rev. W. C. Daily led in prayer, and the Bishop made appropriate remarks and read the appointments. Benediction by the Bishop.

REPORTS.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The educational interests of this Conference are numerous and important, and furnish a strong basis for confidence in the development and permanence of the general work of our Church in the South. The year has been a prosperous one, and its close finds larger numbers, both of students and instructors, at work in our institutions of learning, than ever before. Better advantages continually open before our young men and women, and better results attend their labors. Our Universities and Seminaries merit a large tribute of attention at the hands of all our people.

GRANT MEMORIAL UNIVERSITY.

At no time in the history of this Institution has there been such prosperity as during the year now closing. The enrollment for the past year was 303.

The Faculty consists of 14 teachers. The endowment fund has been greatly increased from bequests, subscriptions, donations and pledges; nearly \$100,000 has been secured. We heartily endorse Grant University and commend it to our people.

Resolved, That we request the Bishop to appoint Dr. John F. Spence, President, and Rev. J. C. Wright, Professor, in Grant Memorial University, and that we confirm the following Trustees for said Institution:

Term to expire in 1889—John F. Spence, J. H. Hornsby, David A. Bolton, J. K. P. Marshall, Halbert B. Case.

CHATTANOOGA UNIVERSITY.

This Institution was formally dedicated on the closing day of the last Conference session. Whatever may be said of external embarrassments, its scholastic work has been prosecuted with zeal and much success. The exercises of Commencement

week were numerous and interesting, and showed the high order of the work accomplished. The new year has begun with a fair attendance of students, and the prospects are excellent. New students are constantly arriving, and a new measure of confidence in the institution is manifest in the community. Its central location, its magnificent equipment, its strong faculty, and its broad plans for ministering to the educational necessities of all our white Conferences in the Central South, commend it to the sympathies and the support of all our people.

Resolved, That we hereby request the presiding Bishop to appoint Rev. E. S. Lewis, A. M., President of, and Rev. J. J. Manker, D. D., and Rev. Robert Steudel, Professors, in Chattanooga University; and

Resolved, That the Conference elect Rev. A. B. Riker a Trustee in the same University, for the term of three years.

WARREN COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE.

This Institution is having continued prosperity.

Prof. J. M. Williams, Prof. E. A. Long, Miss Mary Luter, and Miss Bell Long, all former students of the Grant Memorial University, compose the Faculty.

With this strong corps of teachers this Institution offers advantages equal to any school in upper East Tennessee.

Resolved, That we commend the aforesaid school to our people and the friends of a liberal education within the bounds of its patronizing territory.

POWELL'S VALLEY SEMINARY.

The Trustees of this Institution report unusual prosperity. The enrollment the past year was very gratifying.

The school is now under the direction of Prof. J. W. P. Massey, as Principal, and I. A. Armstrong, Assistant, both graduates of Grant University. Some improvements have been made upon the property of this Institution during the past year. We heartily commend this school to the friends of a liberal education.

PARROTTSVILLE SEMINARY.

This Institution is located in the pleasant and growing village of Parrottsville, Cocke County, Tennessee.

The property is valued at \$4,000, and has recently been secured and deeded to the Methodist Episcopal Church.

The building is large and with ample room for 200 students. It has entered upon its first year's work and already has an enrollment of 80 students.

We welcome this seminary into the ranks of our Academical Schools and commend it to the people of its patronizing territory.

OAKLAND SEMINARY,

Located at Laurel Gap, Greene County, Tennessee, has a splendid building, and is admirably located. There are some fifteen cottages where students may board themselves.

While this Institution is only five years old, it had during the past year four of its students in the Senior Class of the Grant University.

Prof. J. M. Bailey, A. M., Principal, is aided by a corps of able teachers; this school gives promise of great usefulness to the Church.

KINGSLEY SEMINARY.

For ten years this Institution has been under the able management of Prof. Joseph H. Ketron, A. M.

It is located in upper East Tennessee, near the Virginia line, and has a large patronizing territory. The Principal, Prof. Ketron, is not only a successful educator in the literary field, but a faithful Christian toiler, training his students for Christ and the Church.

We most heartily commend this school to our people in upper East Tennessee.

Resolved, That we appoint Dr. Spence, Dr. Mann, and W. T. Senter a special Committee to consider what ought to be done with our school property in New Market and report to the Conference before adjournment.

MEMOIRS.

REV. DANIEL CARTER.

Bro. Carter was born and raised in Jefferson county (where his entire life was spent) in 1813 and was converted in early life. Was licensed to preach, about the year 1850, and worked as a Local Preacher until the re-organization of the Methodist Episcopal Church, when he became a member of this Conference in which he did six or seven years' work. During the last several years he has held a Superannuated relation, doing what labor he could in the ministry. He loved the Church, and aided it out of his means to the best of his ability. He died in faith, August 30th, 1887.

REV. JOHN W. HOLDEN.

Died suddenly, of hemorrhage of the lungs, in Titusville, Fla., Rev. J. W. Holden.

The subject of this notice was born at Connersville, Tenn., October 29, 1858. Early in life he gave his heart to Jesus and cast in his lot with God's people in the McKendree M. E. Church South, Tennessee, whither the family had moved. From that period until his death his life has been one continued sermon, illustrative of the religion he professed.

He loved the House of God, and was never absent from any of its services unless providentially hindered. Like his blessed Master, he went about doing good. Always ready to speak a word of warning, counsel or encouragement to those whom he met.

While living at Nashville, Tenn., he became a member of the Young Men's Christian Association, and engaged in this work with all his heart. He carried the glad news of salvation through Jesus' blood, not only to those whom he chanced to meet by the way, but also to the prisoner in his cell—to the house of the destitute and the bedside of the sick and dying. He was instant in season, and out of season.

After some time, the family removing to Cincinnati, Ohio, he placed his membership in the St. Paul M. E. Church, and was transferred to the Young Men's Christian Association there. Soon after he became a teacher in the Sabbath School, and was chosen class leader in the church.

Here he began preparations for the full work of the ministry—his chosen life-work—when he was stricken down with that dread disease, consumption. After he had somewhat recovered from this first attack, the family removed to Chattanooga, Tenn., where his health was very much improved. He afterward joined the Holston Conference, East Tenn., and entered upon his first charge in the Asylum Street M. E. Church, Knoxville, where he preached about thirteen months, when on account of failing health, he was compelled to give up work there and seek a milder climate. During his eight months sojourn in Florida, he was a sufferer most of the time, but until the last three months of his life he was able to go about and do some business. He bore his sickness with christian patience and fortitude, awaiting the summons to come up higher, and receive the glorious reward.

"Blessed are they that do His commandments, that they may have right to the tree of life, and may enter in through the gates into the city."

NATHANIEL G. TAYLOR, D. D.

Nathaniel G. Taylor was born of wealthy and influential parents at Elizabethton, Carter County, Tennessee, December 29th, 1819. His early life was favorable to the development of the noble traits of which he was by nature possessed. The home was pervaded by the sweet and holy influences of a consistent religious life, as well as the refinement and elegance of the best society of the State.

After a careful preparatory training in the best schools of his native East Tennessee, Nathaniel was graduated in the full classical course, in Princeton College, receiving the first honors of his class, in 1840.

He then studied law and entered upon the practice of his profession. Very soon after this, about 1841, he attended a Camp-meeting at the old Brush Camp-ground, where an inci-

dent occurred which gave a new impulse and direction to his entire after life. One evening just at the beginning of the service a severe thunder storm arose. In company with his sister, a beautiful and accomplished young lady who had just graduated and returned from College, he with another young gentleman stood in the door of the tent gazing with admiration and awe upon the angry heavens, when by a lightning stroke, his sister and the young man at her side fell dead at his feet. In that awful moment the ambitions and honors upon which his heart had been fixed were revealed to his mind in their true light as the merest trifles, and the solemn realities of eternity were seen and felt to be man's chief and highest concern. From that hour he was a new man. He immediately sought religion, was converted, and at once began to employ his almost matchless eloquence in calling sinners to repentance. From that time until his death he continued to preach, not, indeed, as a regular traveling preacher, but in connection with his ordinary business and political engagements. He served two terms in the U. S. Congress, and was Commissioner of Indian Affairs during President Johnson's administration. His public addresses throughout the State of Tennessee in behalf of the Union during the exciting discussions on the subject of secession, and his appeals before New England audiences in behalf of his suffering fellow citizens of East Tennessee during the war, were perhaps his most notable public service.

It is said that Edward Everett pronounced the speech delivered by Dr. Taylor in Faneuil Hall, Boston, to be one of the greatest ever delivered in America by any orator on any occasion.

The mighty persuasive power of those New England speeches was evidenced by the sum of nearly or quite \$200,000 contributed in the North for the relief of the suffering people of East Tennessee.

Dr. Taylor was a Lay Delegate from the Holston Conference in the General Conference in 1872, and in October of the same year joined the Itinerant ranks in the Holston Conference, of which he remained a member until his death.

In 1842 he was united in marriage with Miss Emma Haynes, who with six sons and three daughters, survives him, one son, Robert L., being the present Governor of Tennessee.

In person, voice, manner, intellect, imagination and ready command of language Dr. Taylor was almost an ideal orator. In the pulpit or on the platform he had few peers.

He was as simple and sincere, as generous and noble as he was great. Indeed these were conspicuous elements of his greatness. In the most heated political contests he was always fair and magnanimous, bearing defeat without resentment, and

wearing the honors of victory so graciously that even his defeated antagonists could not but admire and love him.

But no brief obituary notice can do justice to the splendid abilities and virtues of this illustrious man of God.

Only those whose privilege it was to see and hear, and know him can know how really great and good a man he was, but to such the sweet charm of his eloquence and of his manly and beautiful Christian character will linger as a lovely, soul-inspiring vision as long as life and memory last.

During his later years, when he was evidently and consciously walking near the border line of the better land, his religious experiences were very deep and rich, and his preaching was with great fervor and power. Death to him came with no surprise and no terror. He was fully ready and looked forward to his release with most rapturous delight.

He died at his home in the bosom of his family, April 1st, 1887, in the 68th year of his age.

His last words, addressed to his children, were :

“Take care of mama, live in love, do right, die in peace.”

How characteristic of the man—simple, tender, beautiful!

On motion, it was decided to proceed to the election of delegates to the General Conference. Charles McGlothlan, Ellis M. Devaney, and W. B. French were appointed tellers.

The first ballot resulted in the election of Wiley M. Christian, First Lay Delegate, and Halbert B. Case, Second Lay Delegate to the General Conference.

The first ballot for Reserve Lay Delegates to the General Conference resulted in the election of George W. Hill and John W. Adams in the order named.

On motion, the Conference adjourned to meet at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Conference met at the appointed time, Rudolph A. Brown in the chair.

The minutes of the morning session were approved.

The Committee on Memorials reported as follows, which report was unanimously adopted :

WHEREAS, It has pleased our Heavenly Father, in his good providence, to remove from earth our loved companion, friend, and brother, the Honorable John W. Ramsey, we deem it just and proper, as well our privilege and pleasure, to place upon our minutes an expression of our appreciation of Brother Ramsey as citizen, friend, and Christian gentleman.

We recognize in Brother John W. Ramsey a man of noble moral courage, who dared to stand by the right and uphold the eternal principles of justice and human liberty in times of the most trying ordeal in the history of this country. Such men will go down in history as heroes.

We recognize in him a staunch friend and defender of the Methodist Episcopal Church in its struggle for existence, in a time when moral and physical courage was necessary to preserve our blessed Church from the assaults of countless foes. It was by such men as these that it became possible to resuscitate our Church in this South-land.

We recognize in him a friend of our educational institutions from which have come the band of noble young men and young women who are now holding aloft the glorious banner of Methodism in the South. For these young men and women, he always had a kind word, and he never tired in his labors to advance their interests.

In short, we recognize in our departed brother a high type of Christian gentleman, patriotic citizen, and faithful friend ; and in his removal from us by the hand of Providence, we are bereft of a useful and valuable member and associate, whose loss we deeply and sincerely mourn. But bowing to the will of God, in whose hand are the destinies of all, we are resigned to Him, knowing that "He doeth all things well," and living in the hope of a blissfull re-union with our departed brother in the land where dwells our blessed Savior forever.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Lay Electoral Conference be requested to furnish a copy of these expressions to the *Chattanooga Methodist Advocate* for publication, and to submit another copy to the widow of our departed brother.

The following paper on Prohibition, presented by J. T. Jones, was unanimously adopted :

WHEREAS, The proposed prohibitory amendment to the Constitution of the great State of Tennessee was defeated on the 29th ultimo, but our faith in Prohibition is stronger now than it was before the Prohibition canvas ; and

WHEREAS, It has been fully demonstrated and verified that liquor is the greatest curse of the age ; therefore,

Resolved by this Lay Electoral Conference, That we will use all honorable means to obtain local option by and through the next session of our Legislature, as the people cannot try to amend the Constitution again before 1893.

A collection was taken to aid in publishing the minutes.

Daniel W. Remine presented the following resolution indorsing the *Methodist Advocate*, which resolution was adopted by the Conference :

Resolved, That we indorse the course of the Rev. Thomas C. Carter, D. D., in the publication of the *Methodist Advocate*, and promise him our hearty support and co-operation in the future and recommend our people to sustain him with their means and prayers in his efforts for the right.

The Conference adopted the following resolutions of thanks :

Resolved, That the thanks of this Conference are hereby tendered to the citizens of Knoxville for their hospitality in opening their doors for the entertainment of the delegates, and also to the Rev. I. A. Pierce for assigning each delegate to a good home.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Lay Conference are due, and are hereby tendered, to the members of the Second Presbyterian Church, for the use of their chapel in which to hold the Conference.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction.
