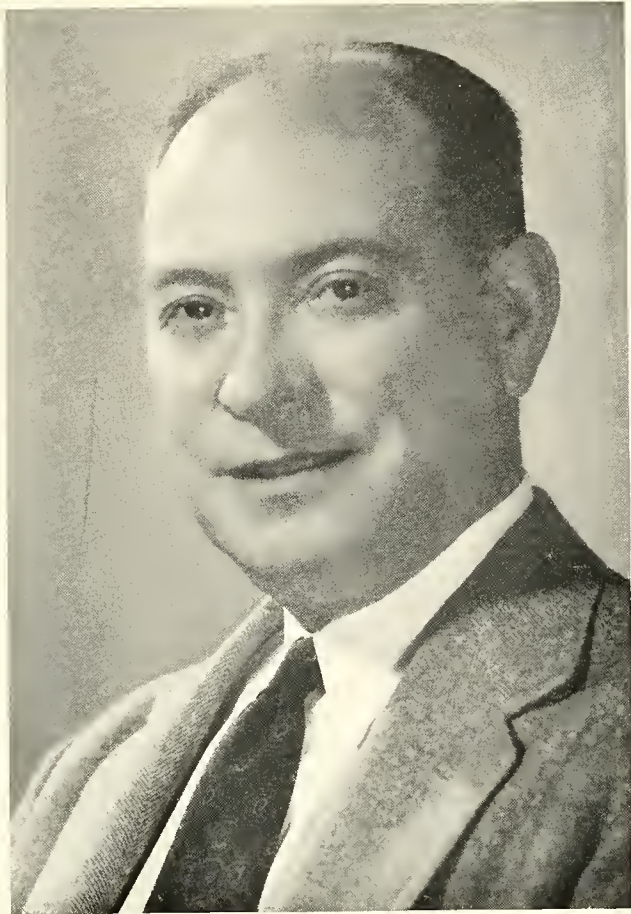

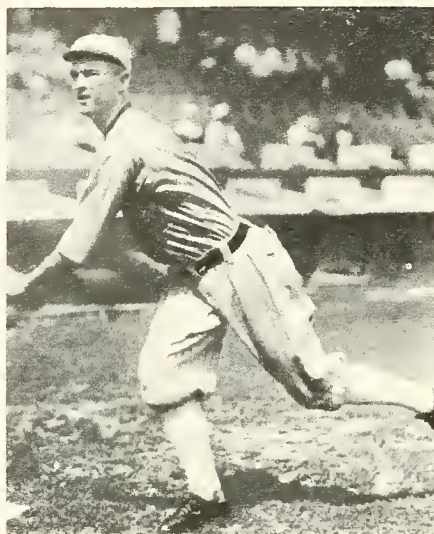


Distinguished Graduates

(This is the sixth in a series)

DAVID DANFORTH

Class of 1915



Few of our many distinguished graduates may lay claim to longer or more colorful careers than that of David Danforth. Father, grandfather, educator, practicing dentist, and twenty-one years as a professional baseball player mark Dr. Danforth as one of our most unusual and inspiring graduates.

The son of a physician, Danforth was born on March 7, 1890 in Granger, Texas. His local reputation as a pitcher was enough to make him the object of interest to many universities and colleges. Selecting Baylor, he lived up to expectations during the 1910 and 1911 seasons. Baylor won the 1911 Texas Collegiate Championship behind Danforth's inspiring mound work. He won all of his starts that year and finished the season by pitching a no-hit, no-run final game of the season.

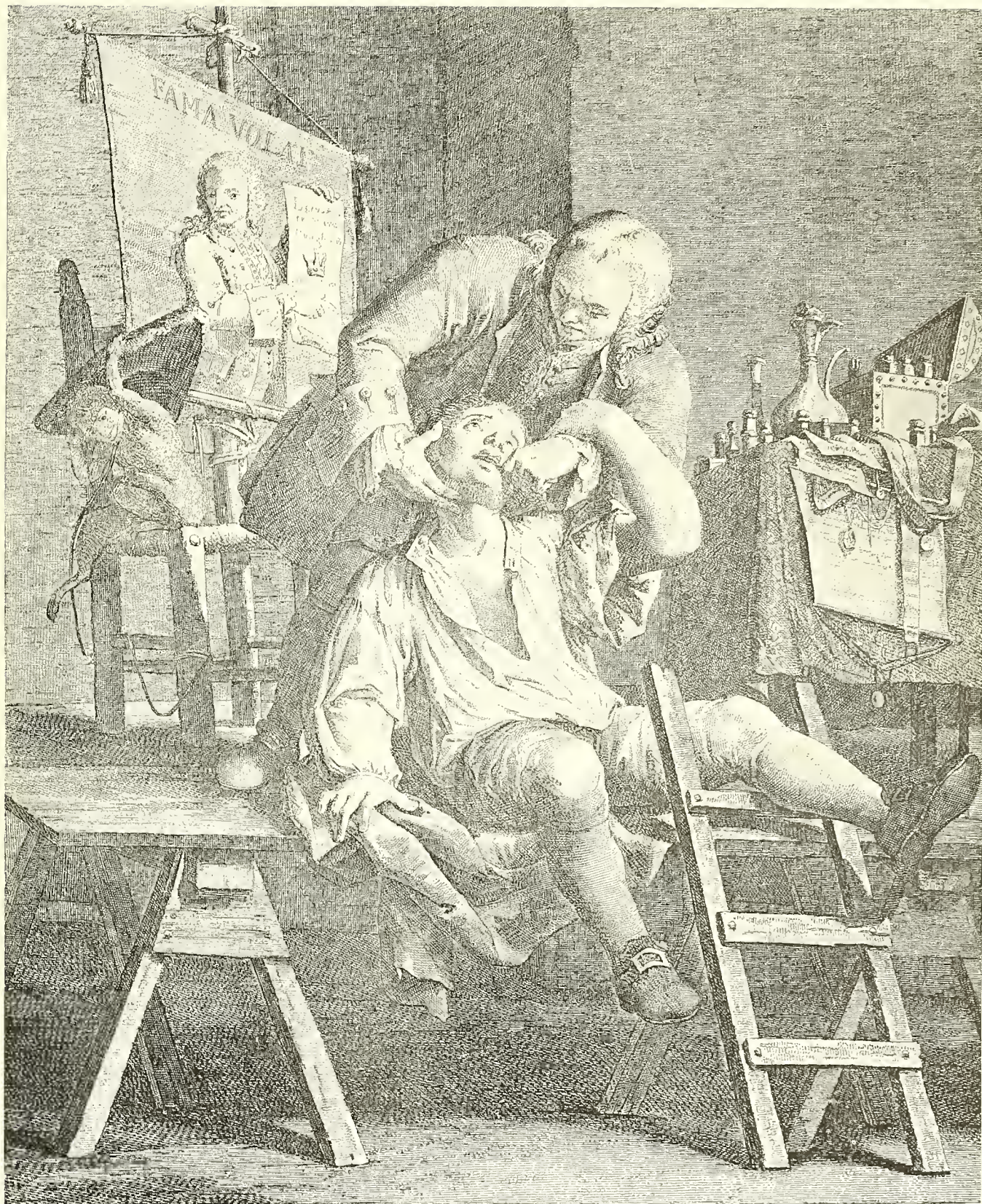
The Philadelphia Athletics' scouts noticed Danforth's fine work at Baylor and awarded him his first major league contract in 1911. It was the legendary Connie Mack who called Dave into his first big league game. The score was tied 1-1 with White Sox players on second and third bases; two men were out. Danforth retired the side by getting the powerful Ping Bodie to hit to Eddie Collins for the out. The Athletics went on to win the game and the pennant that year and beat a good Giants club in the World Series. Thus his first year in the majors was with a series winning club; a feat he was to repeat in 1917 with the Chicago White Sox.

Matriculating at Maryland in 1913, Danforth was currently on the Baltimore Orioles pitching staff, where he was to remain until his senior year when he was sold to Louisville of the American Association. During these years he was aided in his dual career by his manager, Jack Dunn, who was thoughtful enough to assign him a private room where he could study his textbooks and the lecture notes his classmates sent him when he was unable to attend class because of his baseball duties.

It was through Dean Timothy Heatwole's kindly consideration that Dave was allowed to miss so much time from lectures and clinics, and by the Dean's permission a friend was on hand to receive Danforth's diploma at the 1915 Spring Commencement since Dave had earlier left the campus to report to the Louisville Colonels.

1915 was destined to be a big year for the young dentist, for it was during this year that he produced an 18 win and 17 loss record with the Colonels; climaxing the season by producing 51 strikeouts during the last four games. The local fans labeled him as "The Saturday Matinee Idol" and "Dandy Dave," while the less emotional but no less enthusiastic big league scouts paid their tribute in the form of a contract with the Chicago White Sox for the following season. During the next four years with the Sox the young southpaw won 23 decisions.


For twelve years following graduation from the school, Danforth's life was strictly that of a professional baseball player. Sensing the end of his days as a professional athlete, in 1927 Dr. Danforth returned to the Baltimore College of Dental Surgery for a postgraduate review of the professional activities he had so long put aside, as well as to observe the many advancements in the field since his graduation. Having served on the faculty from 1928 until 1937, Dr. Danforth is well known to many of our graduates, and is remembered by all as a kindly and intelligent gentleman. In 1933 he opened his own practice on Greenmount Avenue in this city where he is presently practicing.

The Interfraternity Council is composed of nine members—two from each fraternity and the president of the Student Senate.

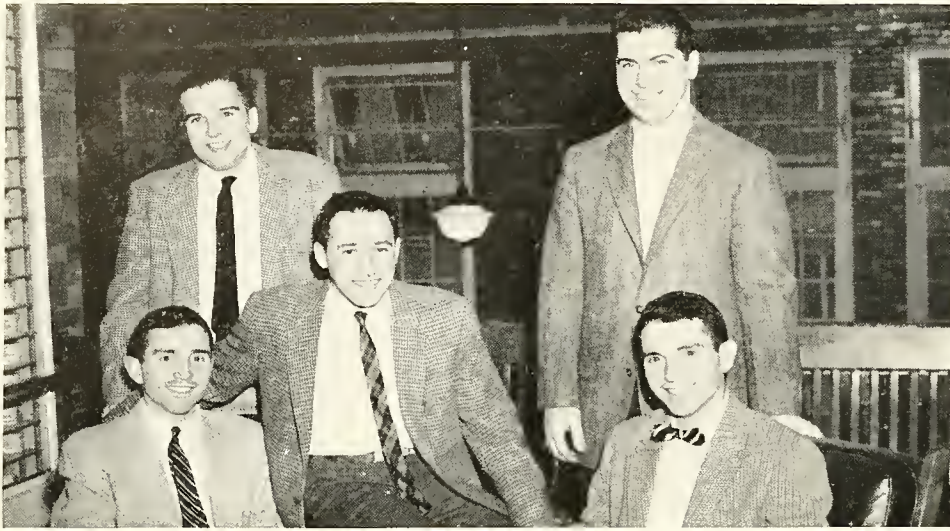
As in the past, the I.F.C. has tried to impartially govern those activities of the fraternities connected with school regulations and to create and maintain interfraternal feelings throughout the student body.

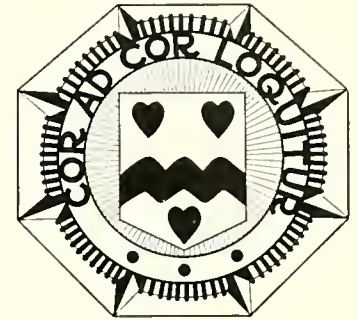
NEWMAN CLUB

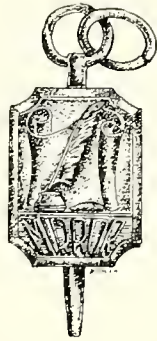

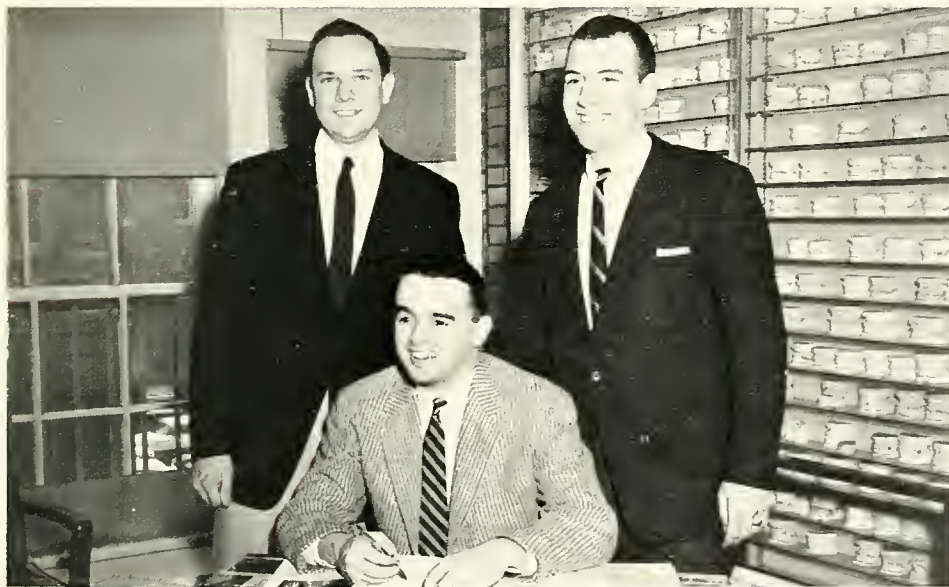

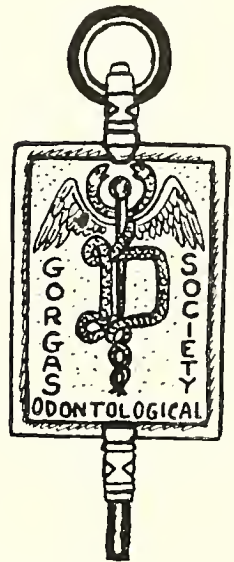
GORGAS ODONTOLOGICAL SOCIETY
