belong to the type of
the broad truncate sinus,
so far as we have noticed:
although until within a
year I had been accus-
-tomed to classifying all
there as well as the other
form as V. cordifolia.



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I shall examine more carefully
next year into the other
forms - as well as those
in New Eng. which I remem-
ber to have seen, but can
not now tell certainly
how to class ~~them~~.

Of course this ^{specimen} only affords
a single additional proof
in regard to the general law
of ^{the} distribution of this species through
the Middle States.

Thank you for your note
in regard to Wolffia. I believe
I had seen all the references
of which you spoke, relating
to its distribution. I thought
considering its comparative
infrequency, a new locality
might be interesting to you.
