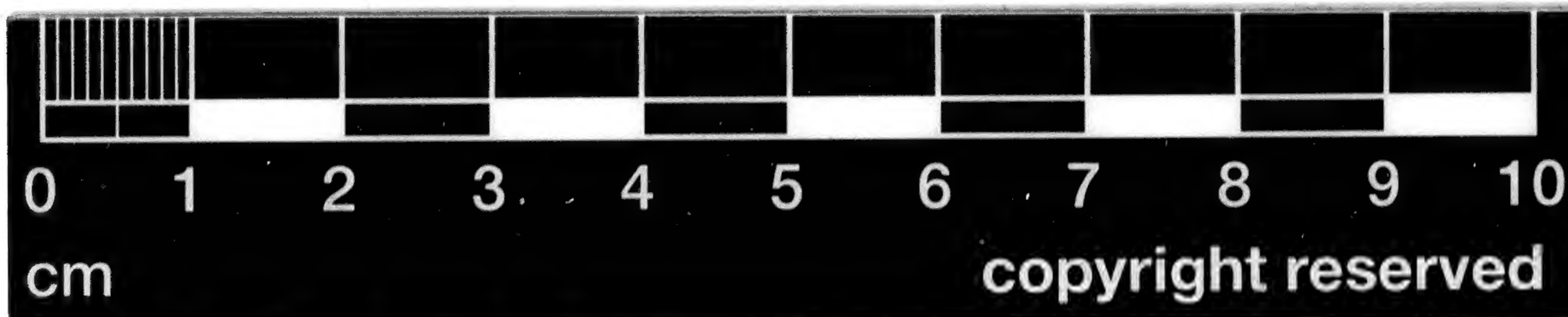

Dear Doctor.

I take the liberty of sending you a few specimens collected in the Yellowstone National Park while out with Genl. Sheridan's Party this summer. I am expected to make a report on the timber & general agricultural features of the route passed over. If you will allow me to trouble you so much, would you kindly return the labels from the specimens in the enclosed envelope with a correction or confirmation of my diagnosis. The five or six specimens are sent today in a small box by express.

The unnamed one is a beautiful tree found with *Picea Engelmannii* Parry, in rich moist soil at high altitudes along Fire Hole River, at the foot of Mt. Washburn & elsewhere. I think this species was never made to



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resent *A. grandis*, *Subalpina* + *Amabilis*
in different reports. It is I think the
analysis of Pacific T.M. reports.

The parasite grows very abundantly on
Pinus contorta in the Park about the Seeger
basins.

I enclose a copy of Sewal,
Sheridan's report for last year
