STUDENT LIFE

ore than 900 students entered Morris this fall, representing the largest enrollment in the 85-year history of the institution.

Classes began August 26 with 933 students. This is an 18 percent increase over the 792 who attended last fall.

This year's increased enrollment includes 325 freshmen and 56 transfer students. Morris students represent 43 South Carolina counties and 19 states. Some hail from as far away as California.

Not only are classes full this semester, residence halls are also full. According to Jerome Smith, Morris' director of residential life, 698 students are residing on campus.

Although enrollment at the college has more than doubled during Dr. Richardson's presidency, he says Morris is still "a developing institution."


Monique's Acceptance . . .






These students were nominated and selected based on their academic achievement, service to the community, leadership in extracurricular activities and potential for continued success.

The students were accompanied by Dr. Joyce C. Hicks, an associate professor of political science.







The workshop was conducted by Dr. Wyatt Tee Walker, senior minister of Canaan Baptist Church of Christ in New York's Harlem Community.

A campus, community-wide worship service was held in the auditorium at 8 p.m. on Wednesay, September 15. The opening convocation was held Thursday, September 16 at 10:00 a.m. in the auditorium.

Called "Harlem's Renaissance Man" because of his multiple gifts and varied careers, Walker is a national figure as a theologian, human rights activist, urbanologist, and international peace advocate.

Dr. Walker enjoys an enviable record as a pastor/scholar in the national community. He is a double-graduate of Virginia Union University and holds an earned doctorate from Colgate-Rochester Divinity School.

Dr. Walker is also an energetic businessman. He has developed more than 33 million dollars of affordable housing in Central Harlem under the aegis of the Canann Church. Dr. Walker has served as chairman of the board of Freedom

National Bank where he was a director for 10 years and spent a decade as urban affairs specialist to Nelson A. Rockefeller.

This Harlem pastor has been active in the international peace movement and the struggle against apartheid in South Africa and Namibia.

In the early 1960's, Walker was chief of staff to Martin Luther King, Jr. and presently serves as special assistant to the Rev. Jesse Jackson.

Roberts, a graduate of Union Theological Seminary and Princeton Theological Seminary, is chairman of the executive board of the New Era State Baptist Convention.







Additionally, Dr. Costen was the founder and chairman of the board of the Harbison Development Corporation.

Dr. Costen is highly sought as a speaker on college and seminary campuses, in professional associations and in churches of many denominations.

Dr. Luns C. Richardson was honored Thursday, April 21, by the Sumter Chamber of Commerce for his commitment to education and outstanding service to the community and state. A reception was held in his honor at Central Carolina Technical College.

Dr. Richardson was described as a "unique educator."

"Under any circumstance — whatever he is called on to do in this community — he does so in a quiet and dedicated manner," said Attorney Raymond Schwartz. "He is one of the outstanding Sumterites in our community."

Several dignitaries were on hand, including Sen. Phil Leventis, Sumter City Councilman Miles Hodge, Cliff Goodwin and South Carolina Supreme Court Justice Ernest Finney.

Dr. Richardson said he appreciated all those who have supported him and Morris.

"Any success that Morris College has had is due in large measure to your confidence and support," he said. "Morris College has given to Sumter, and Sumter has given to it. It's been a mutual affair."

COMMENCEMENT . . . 1994

The Rev. Jesse Jackson beat the drum of social and moral consciousness at Morris College's 1994 commencement, calling for an end to violence in the black communities.

The ceremony marked the end of the 1993-94 academic year and another historic moment in the life of Morris College.

The near-capacity audience at the Garrick-Boykin Human development Center included alumni, Board of Trustee members and local luminaries.

The excitement and enthusiasm which permeated this event signaled that commencement 1994 was extraordinary in every way.

Rev. Jackson told about 100 graduates and 2,100 others that actively nurturing children can teach them self-respect and non-violence.

"It is our burden, our challenge, to reclaim our children," said Rev. Jackson, who received an honorary doctorate from Morris in 1977 at a previous commencement appearance. "We must make it our agenda to reclaim them, not dismiss them."

Rev. Jackson, a Greenville, SC, native and founder and president of the Rainbow Coalition, praised the efforts of historically black colleges such as Morris in standing firm against racial prejudices of the past and in educating the children of black America.

"Black colleges have served their mission well," he said. "Now, black colleges are coming under attack as unnecessary. The fact is, if the black colleges were to close, white colleges, by and large, would not accept these students. Where would they go?".

The nation needs black-majority colleges as long as it has black-majority jails, Jackson said, saying that although blacks make up only 12 percent of the population, they make up 52 percent of those in the nation's jails.
