To Wesleyan's Friend

To a distinguished West Virginian — a great pioneer and builder — whose outstanding achievements in the fields of industry, citizenship and Christian education, have brought honor to his native state, the 1950 Murmurmontis is dedicated.

Michael Late Benedum, whom the Christian Advocate called the nation's leading Methodist layman, was born in Bridgeport, Harrison County, on July 16. 1869. When he was fourteen years of age, he went to work for twenty-five dollars a month in a grist mill in his home community.

Ten years later he was assistant general land agent of the South Penn Oil Company, and by the time he was thirty he was the leading independent oil producer of West Virginia. Before he was fifty, he had discovered and developed many of the largest oil fields in America, as well as in Mexico, South America and Roumania, and had attained recognition as the nation's foremost petroleum pioneer.

Although Mr. Benedum is today known throughout the world as the most successful oil pioneer in history, the greatest measure of his devotion and service has been to the church and to his fellow man. He has been identified with Methodism since childhood, and has demonstrated a

particular interest in the work of West Virginia Wesleyan College. His wise counsel has been extremely helpful in the rapid and sound development of the institution.

Through his discovery and development of oil fields throughout the world. Mr. Benedum has added untold billions of dollars to the national wealth of America and to that of other nations.

At the age of 80, he still actively directs a far-flung oil empire that includes several corporations engaged in the production, refining, transportation and distribution of crude oil and petroleum products. With becoming modesty, however, he is an officer and director of only one of the many corporate enterprises which he controls.

At the same time he carries on his manifold business activities, his alert mind is deeply concerned with the forward march of Christianity which he regards as the last bulwark against Communism and all other expressions of Godless materialism.

In recognition of his remarkable achievements and in particular appreciation of his outstanding contribution to Methodism and to all Christian institutions, we are pleased to dedicate the 1950 Murmurmontis to this distinguished West Virginian and great American.

The Pharos has for its objectives the complete coverage of all news for students, faculty, and friends; cultivating a constructive school spirit, and the advancement of the general objectives of the college.



Benzene Ring Boosts Top Chemistry Students

The Benzene Ring, oldest student organization on Wesleyan's Campus, was organized in 1921. The Ring is composed of outstanding students in chemistry, and who maintain a high academic standing.

This year the Ring underwent some radical changes. The major change was in the form of affiliation with ACS (American Chemical Society). Now the Ring is officially the "Benzene Ring Chapter of the American Chemical Society." Prominent men of science (particularly Wesleyan graduates) are imported to present

The pledging for these rushees was held at the home of Mrs. Reger, our sorority mother on November 23, 1949.





Coach Press Maravich began his first year at coaching at Wesleyan by building a team of one senior and four freshmen into a winning combination which captured fifth place in the Intercollegiate Conference during the season and placed second in the post-season tournament. The team pulled plenty of upsets during the year, but they also had some "bad nights" when they couldn't hold the pace of a blistering Morris-Harvey or Davis & Elkins.

Highlight of the regular season came when the ancient rival. Davis & Elkins, invaded the Bobcat lair and went home on the short end of a 72-63 score. This was the Senator's second loss in the conference, as they had already sewed up first place in the conference runnings. The Bobcats played magnificently, with Captain Sugar Malling taking rebounds beautifully, and center Jim Munnell holding down the towering Hap Huey who had scored 60 points in one game against Morris-Harvey.

As the tournament opened in Buckhannon, Wesleyan drew a bye in the first round and went into the Morris-Harvey fracas the definite underdogs. However, the 'Cats took an early lead before the brilliant George King could hit for the Golden Eagles. It was a thrilling contest throughout, with guard Ted Come dropping a swishing set shot from near mid-court with 15 seconds remaining to give Wesleyan the lead. Come was fouled as the final buzzer sounded and converted two fouls as Wesleyan upset the visitors. 74-70. The following night the Orange and Black again were victorious in a close contest, downing West Liberty 60-57. In the tourney final, though, the boys were just too tired to

repeat their earlier performance against D & E as Huey dropped in 32 points to lead the Senators to a 77-56 defeat of the Bobcats.







History of Alpha Sigma Phi

The tale of Alpha Sigma Phi, tenth oldest social fraternity in the collegiate realm, begins 105 years ago. December 6, 1845. This date marks the birth of a fraternal spirit echoed today throughout 74 eager chapters widely scattered over this great nation.

Founded at Yale in 1845 by Louis Manigault, Stephen Rhea, and Horace Weiser, Alpha Sigma Phi became a sophomore society. As the junior fraternities vied for control of Alpha Sigma Phi, the struggle became increasingly keen and bitter, even to the point of physical combat. The faculty then stepped in to suppress Alpha Sigma Phi and forbade the initiation of its pledges.

But the spirit of Alpha Sigma Phi's brotherhood had found its way into other schools and many chapters were installed, one of them being Beta Nu at West Virginia Wesleyan; its contemporary active members being com-

prised of those men at whose faces you now peer.

Alpha Sigma Phi, one of the oldest Greek letter societies on the Wesleyan campus, is the culmination of several fraternal mergers. The first occurred in 1933 when Xi Alpha Tau, a local "club" organized in 1923, was absorbed as Psi chapter of Alpha Kappa Pi. Then, in 1946, the greatest single step was taken in the enlargement of Alpha Sigma Phi when Alpha Kappa Pi and Alpha Sigma Phi consolidated to bring our chapter roster to 72.

But the final chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi has not been nor will it ever be penned, for Alpha Sigma Phi will surge ever onward with the zeal and boundless energy of youth, will strive relentlessly toward her high ideals and objectives, will instil in its men a spirit of brotherhood and the knowledge that whatever they do, wherever they may go, Alpha Sigma Phi is with them.

This year the men of Beta Nu Chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi were initially recognized on campus in their participation in Homecoming. The pledge dance was held at McThany's Tea Room. Following this event in December was a Christmas Dance held at the same place.

Shortly before Christmas vacation the Alpha Sigs joined the ladies of Alpha Xi Delta in an evening of caroling. Afterward, the weary songsters were revived with cookies and cocoa at the fraternity house.

The pledges, not to be outdone, held a dance at the Student Union with the actives as guests of honor. Music was by Dave Casto and his regime. Everyone had a fine



Tennis Team Expands Wesleyan's Sport Program

With official recognition from the athletic department of the college and the valuable assistance of a coach, interest mounted in the tennis team on our campus as the 1950 season opened. Provided that the team play five matches. Wesleyan sweaters would be awarded the participants according to Athletic Director C. B. "Cebe" Ross. Further encouragement was added by the college with the engagement of Mr. W. A. "Bill" Hallam to coach the group.

Not only Wesleyan, but the entire Conference recognized tennis as a major sport this season, rounding off the season with an all-Conference tournament opening on May 16 in Ogelby Park, Wheeling, Wesleyan entered this event, giving a good showing for the first year of their participation in such an event.

As it was required by the West Virginia Intercollegiate Conference that all matches be completed before the allstate tournament, it was not easy for Wesleyan to work off five matches due to the rainy weather. Postponements and difficulties in arranging schedules caused considerable trouble, and when a match was started, rain would bring it to a sudden stop.

The opener came with a visiting Fairmont team, which overpowered the locals 6-2. Wesleyan had very little practice on the courts, yet put up a strong battle. Freshman Steve Keoseian defeated a Falcon for the only singles victory for the 'Cats, R. L. Moore and Graham Keneweg captured a doubles victory over the visitors, but rain stopped one doubles match so Wesleyan remained behind.

After two postponements with W. Va. Tech and Potomac State, the locals traveled to Salem to start a match on May 1. The meet was originally scheduled for Buckhannon, but a Sunday night shower made the clay courts inaccessable so the contest was shifted to Salem, on the Tigers' all-weather courts. All went well until a midafternoon squall stopped the festivities. Arrangements were

made to finish the match, when the two teams' schedules permitted it.

West Virginia Tech invaded the Bobcat lair and went home victorious. This was the first contest of the year which rain did not cut short, but perhaps it would have been better for the Bobcats if a shower had intervened as at one point they led.

At the opening of the season, Stan Meyers rated the number one slot on the Orange and Black team. Merle Barnes, number two, followed in order by Graham Keneweg, R. L. Moore, Bill Gwennap, and Steve Koeseian. However, this order was switched occasionally according to the opposition, in an effort by Coach Hallam to find a combination which could win.

Generally speaking, the entire situation concerning tennis received quite a boost during the 1950 season. The awarding of letters and tutoring by Mr. Hallam added much to the atmosphere surrounding the sport, as Wesleyan once again became interested in expanding her sports realm and building up the tennis competition.

Therefore, with no interest shown by the students, the golf schedule was cancelled and the sport temporarily disbanded on our campus. Wesleyan had fielded a team for the three preceding years, as well as before the war, but with the entire squad graduating at the end of the 1949 season, interest dropped to a new low.

As Wesleyan has no golf course, the teams played their home matches on the Country Club grounds outside Buckhannon. No golf coach was appointed, as such, although Dave Reemsnyder did lend some assistance when his intramural program permitted. Thus with little connection between college and team, the players scheduled matches and won their share of them.

The 1949 team made a particularly fine showing, winning more than half of their contests from the West Virginia Intercollegiate Conference and others, such as West Virginia University. Bill Manser and Keith Queen appeared as letterman from the preceding year, and were joined by LeRoy Canfield, John Carpenter, Ray Hostetler, and John Myers.

With the cancellation of a full 15-match schedule for 1950, plans are being laid for another attempt next year. The West Virginia Intercollegiate Conference recognized golf as a major sport this year, arranging an all-state meet in Ogleby Park, Wheeling to determine the state champion college team. Thus with official recognition from the conference and a genuine interest from the Bobcat athletic department, it is hoped that next year will find a Wesleyan golf team entered in intercollegiate competition.

Professor Rossbach takes time out from a busy schedule in order to assist students. And it pays off.






'Cat Nine Shows Season Record of 3 Wins, 6 Losses

After getting away to a flying start with two conference victories in the first two games. Wesleyan's baseball fortunes fell as they were able to win but one more game all season. The Bobcats bested Alderson-Broaddus twice and Fairmont once to round out their victory column, while losing nine games. Rainy weather forced cancellation of three additional contests.

With regulars Bob Myers. Bob Sullivan. and Ab Takacs returning from last year's squad which had won 6 and lost 7. Coach C. B. Ross found it necessary to completely revamp his team around these stalwarts. Sore arms disturbed several of the players, as well as other minor injuries. The 'Cats could not find their batting eye this season, as the team average stood .237 for the first eleven games with three pitchers. Bob Keane, Sullivan, and

Matt Kuhn, leading the squad in percentage. Being pitchers, none of them played all the games, however.

The season opened with Sullivan twirling a two-hitter and topping A-B to the tune of 11-4. A second left-hander. Kuhn. won the second encounter 8-1, allowing only 3 hits to the Fairmont Falcons. These two games were an admirable opening for the year. but Saturday, April 22, proved the eventful day with W. Va. Tech supplying the first defeat of a six-game losing streak. Neither Sullivan nor Kuhn could stop the visitors as Tech dropped the locals 9-3.

Taking to the road, the Bobcats found their fortunes just as bad as they traveled to Potomac State to take an 11-7 defeat, even though they outhit the victors 12 to 7. Morris Harvey came to Buckhannon to drop the

Rossmen 15-6, in the next encounter, as four pitchers took the mound for the locals in an effort to stop the powerful Golden Eagles. A 17-9 loss to the Glenville Pioneers was next on the schedule, as Coach Ross was forced to call on his ace shortstop. Ab Takacs, to move to the pitcher's mound for 6 innings.

The Salem Tigers invaded the Bobcat lair and assumed the leadership of the Intercollegiate Conference with an 8-2 victory. This placed the Tigers well on their way toward what appeared to be their second straight Conference crown. Next, a trip to Bethany proved no better for Wesleyan as the Bisons downed the Bobcats, 6-1. This was the sixth straight defeat for the locals, as the pitching force was overworked and found lacking.

Lefty Bob Sullivan again silenced the bats of the Alderson-Broaddus Battlers to add his second victory of the year in an 11-9 encounter in Philippi. This was the third win for the Orange and Black for the season, and

proved to be their last. The second game with Fairmont found the Falcons taking the game, 7-4. A second meeting with Bethany was a close one as Sophomore hurler Bob Keane lost a heart-breaker, 6-5.

Weather conditions continuously hampered practices, as well as postponing games, so the Bobcats never really were allowed to have good workouts regularly. Senior catcher "Butch" Gentry pulled a shoulder muscle and was out of play for the last half of the season, while Sullivan developed a sore elbow in midseason. A combination of injuries and lack of practice made the team look ragged at times, but generally they played heads-up ball.

This was the last season for seniors Clint Allman. Butch Gentry. Bob Myers, Jim Primozic. Bob Sullivan and Ab Takacs, leaving Coach Ross with the same problem of rebuilding his team next year, as he faced this season. These men played an important role in the 1950 edition of the Bobcats, and will be badly missed in another year.

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
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
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
