Dr. Thaddeus John Gurdak was born I June 19, 1944 to Thaddeus Sr. and fary Dawgiel Gurdak. As a college stuent, he recieved his B.A. in Theology in 366 from St. John's University in Minesota. He then went on to get his M.A. in e same field at the same school in 1968. hat same year, on August 17, he married iss Rebecca Komarek. Later, after havg three children - Stephen, Matthias, ind Anne - he recieved his Ph.D. in lassical Chinese Literature at the UniIrsity of Wisconsin, Madison in 1976.
In between the times he recieved his A. and his M.A., he worked in the Theogy department at Mt. Marty College in ankton, South Dakota. After recieving s M.A., Dr. Gurdak worked in the Re-
ligion Department at Yankton College in Yankton. After recieving his Ph.D., he came to work at West Virginia Wesleyan as an Associate Professor of Religion. Here he taught courses in Oriental Religions, Phenomenology of Religion and Christian Tradition. He also participated in teaching Chinese Language and taught in an Outreach course. He also taught Humanities, Honors Seminars, and participated in the Elderhostel Program.

On campus his activities included Omicron Delta Kappa, Phi Kappa Phi, being a CORE Advisor, being an Advisor to the social organization Sigma Theta Epsilon, and Chaplain to Episcopal Students at Wesleyan. Outside of Wesleyan, Dr. Gurdak was very busy with other activ-
ities, such as being an Ecumenical Delegate to the Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, and a Coach to the Upshur Conty Youth Soccer Association.

Dr. Gurdak was also an ordained priest of the Episcopal Church and Vicar of the Church of the Transfiguration in Buckhannon. Dr. Gurdak was an active member of the College Theology Society, and the Conference of Anglican Theologians.

We at the Yearbook Staff express our sympathy and hopes to Mrs. Rebecca Gurdak and am sorry to see such a wellrounded, caring, and involved man leave the Wesleyan Community. We think of him in our prayers every night. God bless him.

## You Take the Good

The year 1990 was one filled with many milestones, emotions and changes. The Oakland A's beat the San Francisco Giants in the World Series. Meanwhile, the 49 ers took the 24th Super Bowl title from the Denver Broncos.

Politically, the presidency was turned over to George Bush and his running mate Dan Quayle.

In world affairs one of the two biggest breakthroughs happend on March 24, 1989 when the worst oil spill in history occurred in Prince William Sound, Alaska. An Exxon oil tanker, Valdez, ran aground spilling a total of 11 million gallons of crude oil creating an environmental nightmare. Then in late May, tens of thousands of Chinese prodemocracy protesters gathered in Beijing's Tiananmen Square seeking political change. Thousands were killed and wounded in their pursuit of a democratic state. August marked the end of a 4.4 billion mile trip, that took 12 years to complete, by Voyager 2 as it arrived at the planet Neptune. A lot of scientific information and pictures were able to be sent back from this experiment. Another newsbreaker was the debut of the Stealth Bomber. Winning rave reviews from Pentegon officials this 530 million dollar project, although difficult to be detected on radar, was considered too expensive.

Finally on October 17 at 5:04 PM an earthquake measuring 7.0 on the Richter Scale, hit northern California destroying parts of Oakland and San Francisco. The damages were estimated to be over $\$ 2$ billion.

On a local level, 1990 was still a landmark year filled with emotion and changes. For starters, upon the students return to Wesleyan in the fall, they discovered that the Top of the SCOW had been remolded, the $\$ 2000$ face life was funded by our Quality of Life Fund.

Also this year, as in previous years, students became actively involved with occurrances on campus as well as within the community. Every thing from Barbara Lewis starting a mentorship program with French Creek Elementary School, to students protesting the placement of trees in front of Camden, to CROP walking to stop world hunger- the key was the involvement of Wesleyan's students.

In January Wesleyan held its Centennial kick-off celebration. The celebration was to continue through May 1991. Also in January, the American Boychoir performed in Wesley Capel.

All of these events, and many more, of 1990 enriched our lives, gave us joy and sadness, and added to our livesand Pandemonium - of being a Wesleyan student.

Michael Thompson, the captain of the Bobcats, won several awards, including First Team All-Conference, Conference Player of the Year, First Team All Area VIII, All South Atlantic Team, NAIA National Tournament MVP, All NAIA National Tournament Team, First Team NAIA All American, and First Team NSCAA/Met Life All American.

Atle Nesheim also won quite a few awards. He was chosen for the honors of most goals in a season by a Wesleyan player (25), most goals by a Wesleyan freshman (25), MVP of Pioneer Classic Tournament, First Team All Conference, All NAIA National Tournament Team, Most Outstanding Offensive Player of the NAIA National Tournament, Second Team NAIA All American, All South Atlantic Team, Eight game winning goals, and three game tying goals.

Colin Rocke won First Team All Conference, First Team All Area VIII, All South Atlantic Team, Second Team NSCAA/Met Life All American, Honorable Mention, NAIA All American, thirteen goals, and ten assists.
Shaun Davidson was chosen for First Team All Conference, First Team All Area VIII, All South Atlantic Team, and Honorable Mention, NAIA All American.

Stig Sevaldsen won All NAIA Tournament Team, Second Team All Conference, and the game winning assist in the National Championship match versus Boca Raton.

Petter Tronstad won First Team All Conference, Second Team All Area VIII, thirteen shutouts, 65 goals against the average, and three shutouts in NAIA National Tournament.

Many other members of the team also won awards. Sean Boyle received the honors of Second Team All Conference, two game winning assists, eleven goals, and four assists. Gabriel Okonkwo received Honorable Mention, All Conference, and had three goals, nine assists, and four game winning goals. David Nury won First Team All Conference. Ivor Jordal won Second Team All Conference and had nine goals and three assists. Thomas Bergesen received Honorable Mention, All Conference, had eight goais and eight assists, and had three game winning goals, all in conference play. Jeff Cook received Honorable Mention, All Conference.

Head Coach Derrick Leeson also received several honors after the season. He received the honors of Conference Coach
of the Year, South Atlantic Regional Coach of the Year, and NAIA Coaches Association Coach of the year.

In addition to the many awards that were won by the team members, last year was another first for the soccer program. Eric Norton and Nick Johnson were the first ever scholarship players from West Virginia in the history of the soccer progam at Wesleyan.

Although last year was anticipated by Leeson to be a tough year for the Bobcats, it was not. He had thought that the season might be difficult because of the fact that only a few of the team members from the previous year were returning to Wesleyan. However, judging from the number of individual awards the team members won and by the capturing of the national title, Leeson had nothing to worry about. The Bobcats were strong last year despite the number of new players.
