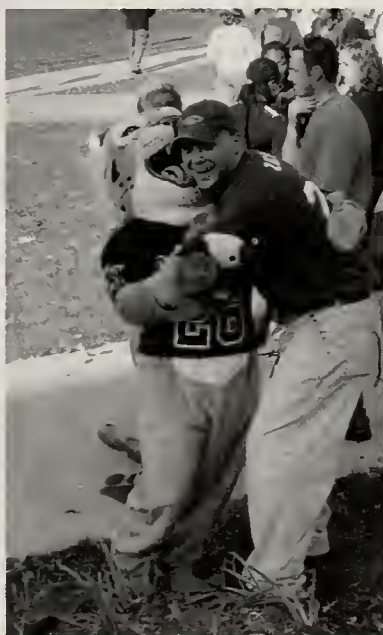

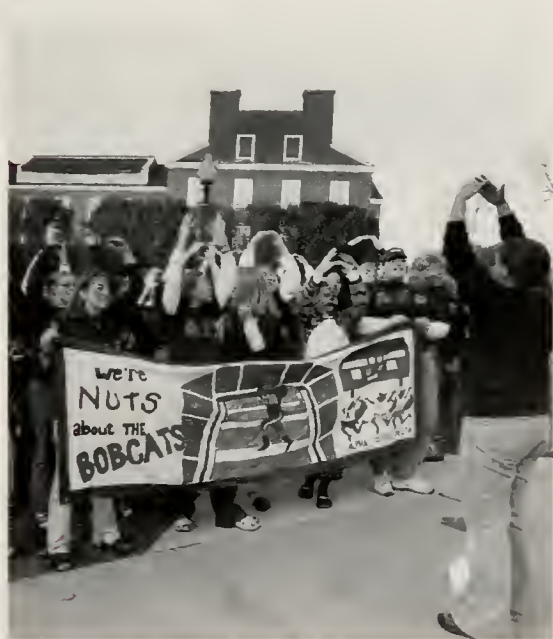
Homecoming 2001

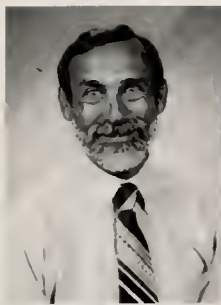

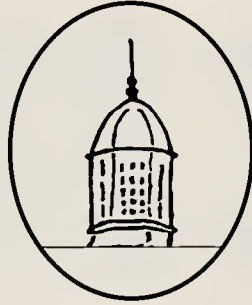

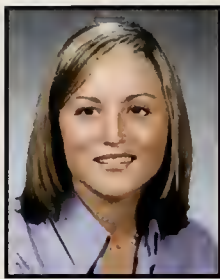

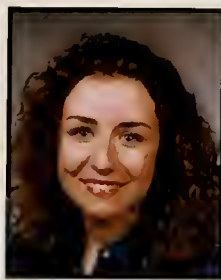

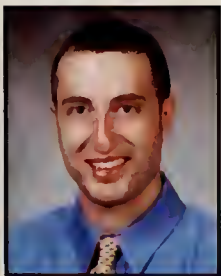
Theater

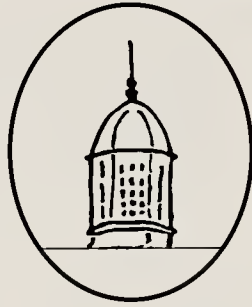

Model United Nations

The opportunity to become an active participant in the diplomatic process serves a two-fold purpose for education. First, it allows students to learn the history, customs, and culture of a land that is not their own and to step away from being an American and take on the identity of a foreign country. Second, it proves an effective educational tool when it comes to grasping the concepts and issues that make up international politics in the world in which we live. Model United Nations serves this purpose by taking the college student from the role an American into the role of a foreign national. This hands-on interaction with others who have assumed different nationalities allows the individual to come face to face with the rapidly growing world of international politics.

This spring, students from Dr. Kwame Boateng's Model United Nations class were afforded the opportunity to participate in the Harvard Model United Nations Convention in Boston, Massachusetts. The group took on the identity of representatives of the United Republic of Tanzania, a rapidly developing African republic. Setting aside inherent political motivations and becoming a citizen of a foreign land was not an easy task. However, the group spent two weeks in strategy meetings planning for the conferences and was finally ready to participate in the international forum for the continuance of peace.

After arriving in Boston, the group was met with a growing list of international problems that would be up for debate. Schools from Canada, the United States, and South America were in attendance representing the assembled nations of the world. Since the point of the conference is to educate as well as develop viable solutions to pressing world issues, it was necessary to begin the moment of arrival. Assembling early each morning and breaking periodically throughout the day, the delegates actively pursued solutions to the perplexing issues of the time.

This experience was valuable for the delegates, as they were able to work with representatives from other nations and learn how difficult it is to maintain peace. If the objective of the the United Nations is to see to the furtherance of international peace and security, then the objective of the Model United Nations is to prepare students for interaction in the real world. From this experience, the delegation learned that it takes a combination of patience, dedication, and strong negotiation ability to secure a mutually beneficial multilateral diplomatic solution. 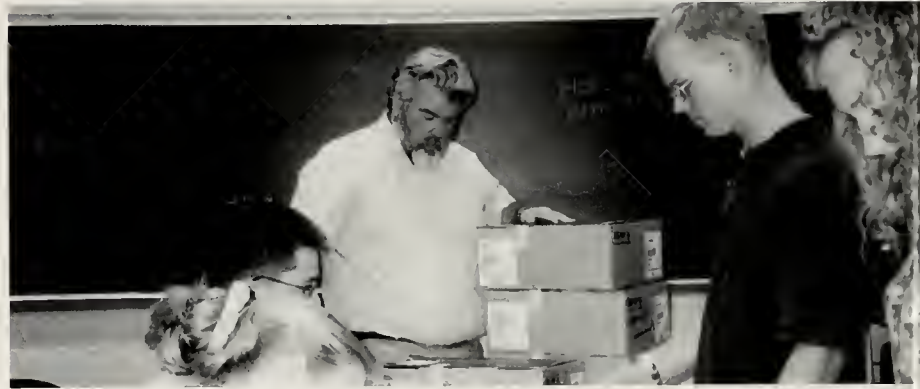

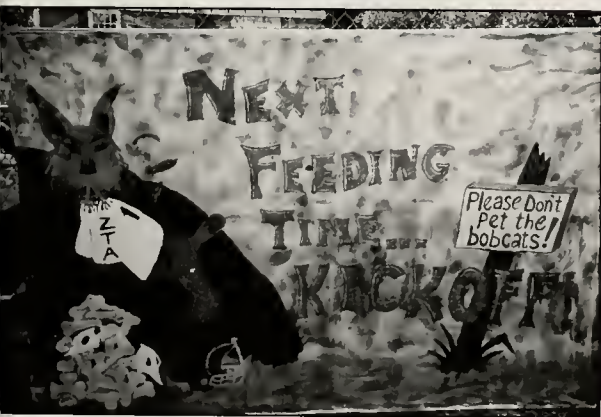
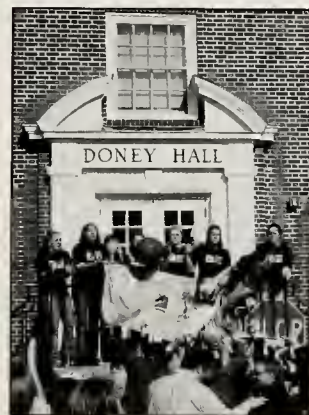

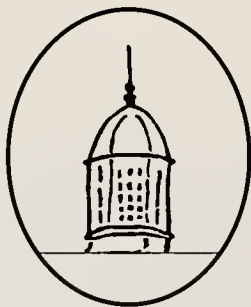

Bobcats' winning streak helps with an improved season

The West Virginia Wesleyan College Bobcats opened their 2001 season against Lenoir-Rhyne College on September 8, 2001. The 28-55 final score in favor of Lenoir-Rhyne was not indicative of just how close the ball game was the entire day. Senior running back Duriel Cobb, who would be a force for the Bobcats the whole season, scored the 'Cats first touchdown of the year.

First blood was drawn by West Virginia State College on September 29, and the Bobcats lost their third game of the season, 7-21.

In front of a capacity Homecoming crowd at Ross Field on October 20, the Bobcats of WVWC went toe to toe with the defending WVIAC champions, Fairmont State College, only to

come up a couple plays shy. The final score was 17-27 in favor of Fairmont. Cobb once again led the 'Cats on the ground with 77 yards on 24 carries. Defensively, senior safety Gashor Dixon led the team in tackles with 9 each, while freshman Alan Krutulis, junior Chris Morgan and sophomore Don Meyer each recorded a sack.

Wesleyan ended its 2-game winning streak by dropping its last ball game to the league-leading Glenville State Pioneers, 37-14 on November 10. Cobb broke the 1000-yard mark for the season by racking up 55 yards on 16 carries. Junior nose guard Gary Woltz led all tacklers with 14, including 2 tackles for loss. Glenville combined for 21 points on 3 passes to secure the WVIAC Championship. The Bobcats

ended the 2001 season with a 3-6 overall record and 3-4 in the WVIAC. Several members of the 2001 Bobcats were given post-season honors as well.

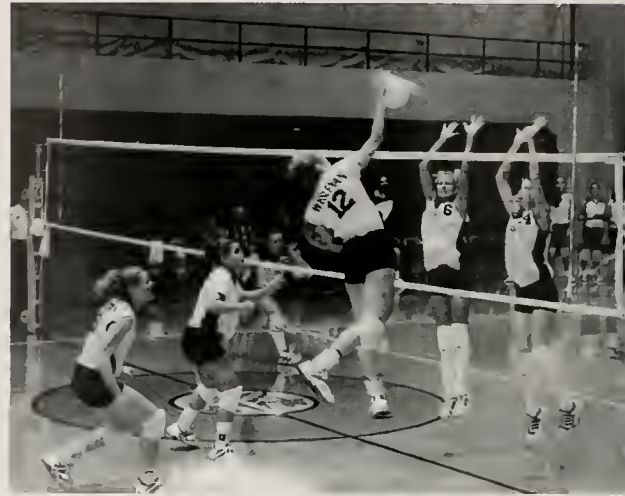
Several members of the Lady Bobcat Volleyball team were given high honors for the 2001 season.

Bobcats score a win as WVIAC Champs

With 7 seniors, the West Virginia Wesleyan College men's basketball team had a stellar season. They finished as regular season WVIAC Champions, cracked their way into the national Top-25 for the first time in program history, and made an appearance in the NCAA Division II National Tournament. They finished the year with an impressive 21-8 overall record and a 15-3 mark in the conference.

Senior forward Damien Jackson was named WVIAC player of the week, first team All-WVIAC, and first team Daktronics NCAA Division II All-East Region. Jackson finished the season ranked #7 in the conference and #47 in the nation in scoring, averaging 19.4 points per game and a total of 553 points for the year. He finishes his WVWC career with a total of 1,777 points, to place him 6th on the all-time scoring list. Fellow senior center Jomar

Thompkins, the other half of the Bobcats' one-two punch, garnered several honors as well. Thompkins was a 2-time WVIAC player of the week selection, named to the ALL-WVIAC first team and named to the second team of the Daktronics NCAA Division II All-East Region team. Thompkins finished ranking #2 in the conference and #4 in the nation in rebounding, #3 in the conference in field goal percentage, and #4 in blocked shots.

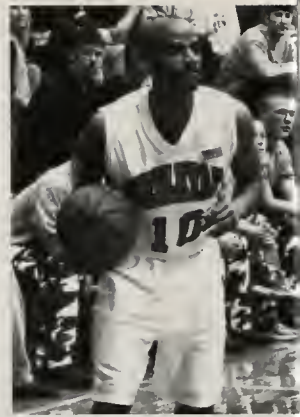
Thompkins finished his 2-year Wesleyan career with 809 points and 620 rebounds.

Although winless during their 4-game overseas schedule, those games were essential as the young Lady Bobcats prepared for another highly competitive season in the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WVIAC).

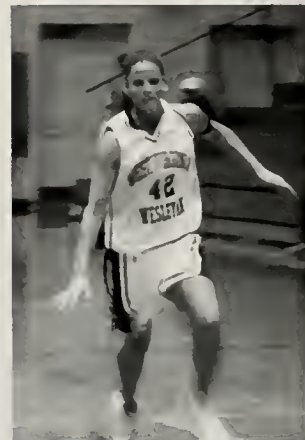
After starting the official 2001-2002 season on a 9-game losing streak, the Lady Bobcats came back from the Christmas break to win 10 of their next 11 contests. This rally started with a history-making 107-

101 victory over the Fairmont State College Lady Falcons on January 10, 2002. That game was tied at the end of regulation and lasted for 4 overtime periods, making it the second longest NCAA Division II women's game in history and the longest WVIAC contest ever. In all 4 overtime periods, Wesleyan scored 38 points while both teams combined for 70 points to break the previous NCAA Division II record. The Lady Bobcats' mid-season rally included a 9-game winning streak where the Lady Bobcats beat regionally ranked Wheeling

Jesuit and conference powerhouse University of Charleston. Wesleyan finished the regular season with a road win at Shepherd College to place 4th in the WVIAC power ratings.

Several individuals on the Lady Bobcat squad ended the season with conference honors. Sophomore guard Jessie Roeth garnered All-WVIAC 1st team honors. Roeth averaged 15.2 points per game and 7.4 rebounds, both team highs for Wesleyan. Senior point guard Andrea Gianni made All-WVIAC honorable mention with 7.8 ppg, 5.8 rpg and a team-leading 4.1

assists per game. Also, freshman center, Frances Carvajal was named to the All-Freshman team with 7.9 ppg and 5.6 rpg. The Lady Bobcats will lose seniors Kelly Howe and Sarah Meredith, both four-year contributors to the program.

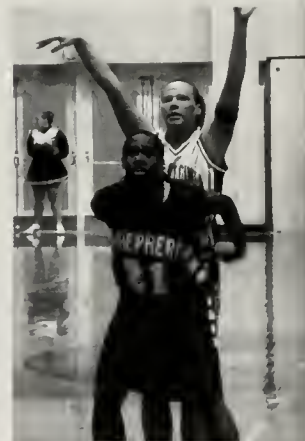

Tina Graf, women's team captain, commented, "We're a very talented, intelligent and diverse group and I was proud to be a part of this year's team."

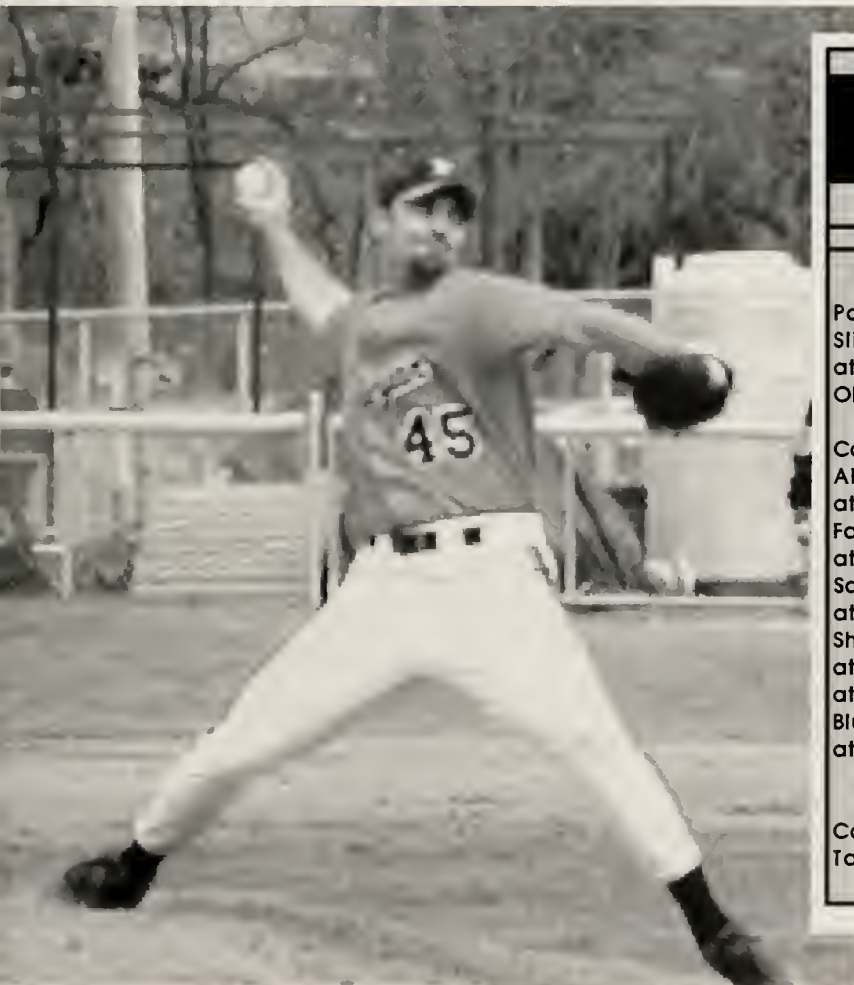

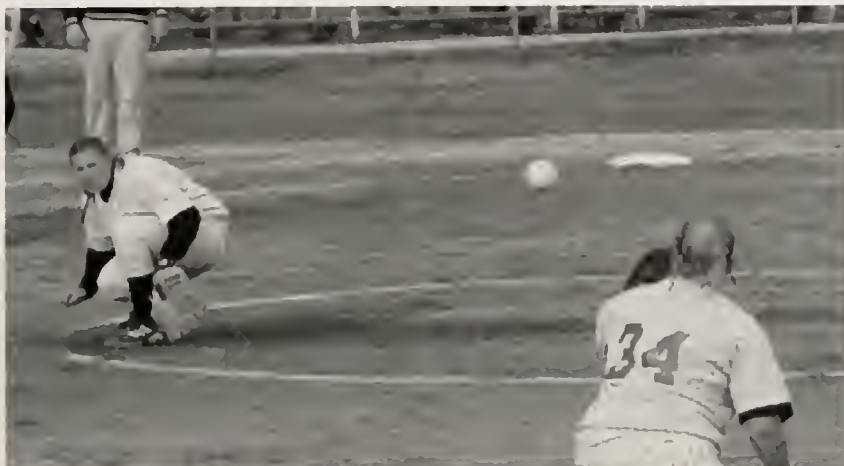

The team had a decent showing, but it really came alive at the next match. That one took place on February 23-24 and the Bobcats came in first place. 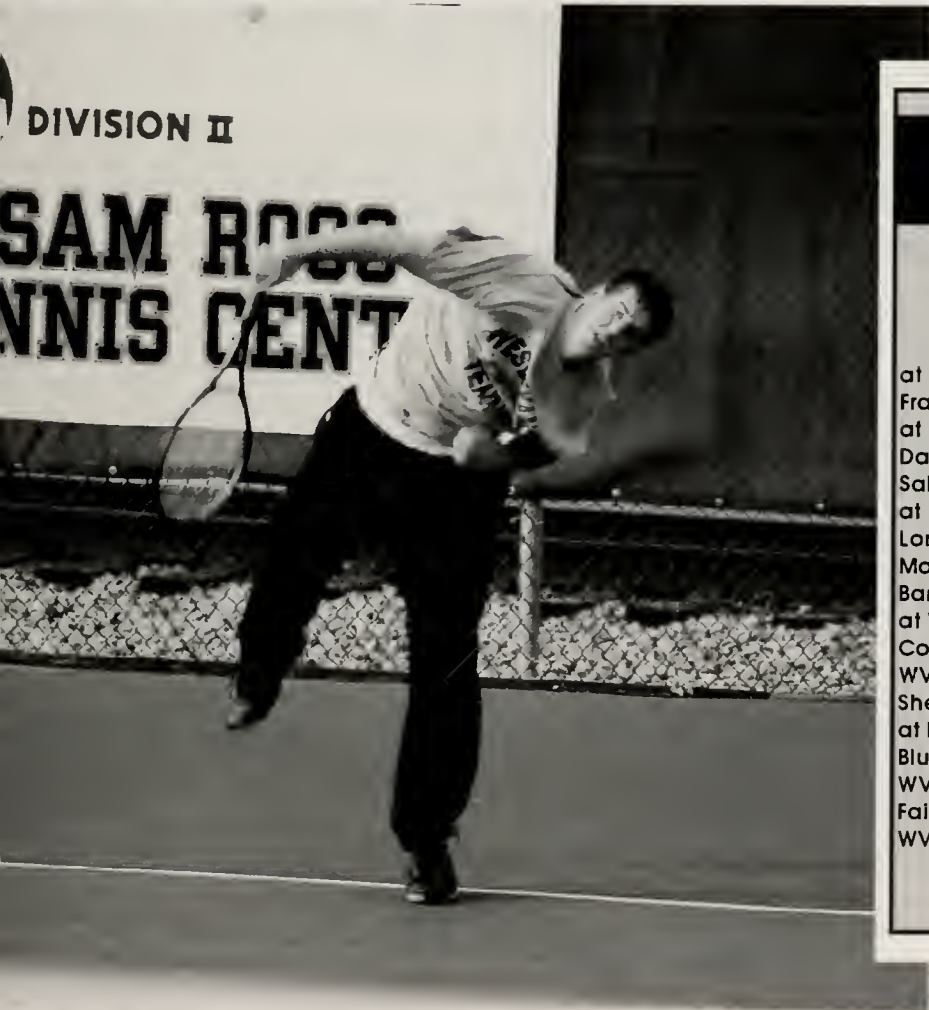

Athletic Training Program

In the fall 2001, Wesleyan's athletic training program entered its third year as a CAAHEP-accredited program. In keeping with the program's overall mission of providing the highest level of medical care for the over 300 athletes at Wesleyan while at the same time offering a rigorous undergraduate preparation for those students interested in pursuing careers in the field of sports medicine, the athletic training staff had yet another busy year. Once again with the help of Mike Kuba from the counseling center, along with featured speaker Dr. Al Kasprowicz, faculty athletic trainer Jeremy Sibold put together an excellent in-service program on eating disorders for the entire campus community.

In March 2002, eleven students were formally accepted into the athletic training major. Those students will begin their clinical experience in the fall of 2002. During the month of April, three senior athletic training majors, Alicia Stickel, Jason Gessel and Jesse Thomaselli, were selected to present their senior research papers at the WV State Athletic Trainers' Association annual meeting in Wheeling. Five junior athletic training students were selected for poster presentations. Four members of the 2001 athletic training class passed their certification exam on the first try.

Although the class of 2002 was among the smallest for the athletic training major, the accomplishments of this group are among the most notable in the eighteen-year history of the program.

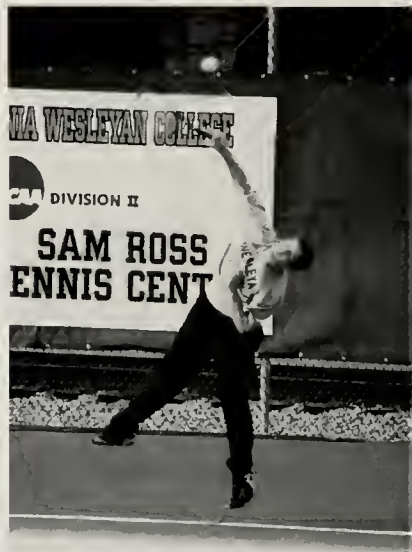
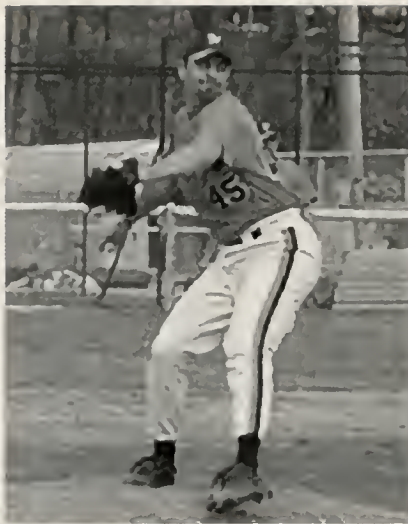
The spring season found the Bobcats at the North Carolina Wesleyan Don Scalf Invitational on February 18-20, 2002, where WVWC

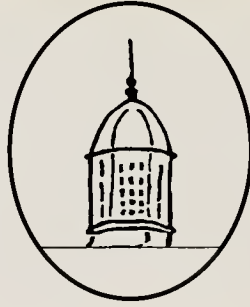

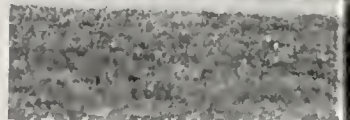
