## Introduction

**T**WO groups of people who never crossed the Atlantic had a great deal to do with the foundation of New England. To them, very nearly as much as to the actual settlers, can be traced the success of the colony in its early years, and they gave it the characteristics which three centuries later are considered to be typical of the old New England families. There is scarcely a mention of them, as individuals or as a group, in the books that have been written about the movement in which they took so lively an interest. They made few records of what they did for the colonists; of those that survive, the present publication contains what is probably the clearest evidence of the importance of their activities.

Looking through the remnants of the correspondence that passed to and from Massachusetts Bay in the seventeenth century, it is possible to distinguish, dimly for the most part, the outline of those who made up these two groups. One consisted of London City men, merchants with widely extended interests and the controlling influence that put one king off his throne and seated three of his four successors. The other group was composed largely of their female relatives and connections, the dowagers of the Puritan families of the City and the Counties.

Much may be learned of the City men by consulting the ample records of the Liveried Companies whose history is that

of London. Of the women, the best known are those of John Winthrop's family, who appear in the letters made public by the late Robert Charles Winthrop. One other, who had much to do with the story of this volume, was the Lady Armine. She was Mary Talbot, grand-daughter of that Earl of Shrewsbury to whom Elizabeth entrusted the Queen of Scots, and wife of a close friend and Parliamentary colleague of John Hampden. Rich in her own right and as the widow of Thomas Holcroft, Esq., and childless, she lived close to the heart of the Puritan party until the death of Sir William Armyne in 1651. For the next twenty-five years she was the cherished acquaintance of everyone who was concerned with the promotion of good works. In this group there were many other women who differed little from those, often their collateral descendants, who contribute to the reputation of the Massachusetts Boston as the place where any enterprize for the benefit of others is surest of a profitable welcome. These well-to-do seventeenth century dames and the London men of affairs give to many of the otherwise prosaic entries in the old record books which are printed herewith, their human interest.

“The New England Company,” as it has been known for two hundred years to those concerned with its management, was organized in 1649. It is still carrying on the work for which it was established, with the funds contributed when it started, the oldest Protestant foreign missionary society. It was created by an Act of Parliament “for the promoting and propagating the Gospel of Jesus Christ in New England,” which provided that “there shall be a Corporation in England . . . by the name of the President and Society for propagation of the Gospel in New England.” Legal existence under this Act ceased when Charles II was proclaimed King on May 8, 1660. On February 7,

1662, a royal Charter was issued to the surviving members of the Society and others, providing that "there be, and forever hereafter shall be, within this our kingdom of England, a Society or Company for propagation of the Gospell in New England, and the parts adjacent, in America . . . by the name of the Company for Propagation of the Gospell in New England, and the parts adjacent, in America."

The confusion incident to these slightly varying names, which justify calling it the Corporation, Society, or Company, would not have been serious if other bodies created for similar purposes had not assumed scarcely distinguishable names. Forty years after the date of the royal charter, in 1701, the authorities of the Established Church organized "The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts," known familiarly as the "S. P. G." Eighty-six years later, a group of New Englanders who felt that something should be done to carry on the work which the original corporation ceased to support after it transferred its activities to the "parts adjacent," organized "The Society for Propagating the Gospel among the Indians, and others, in North America." In this Introduction, the Corporation is referred to as the Society of 1649-1660, and after 1662 as the Company. The reader will notice also that the Society had a President and the Company a Governor.

#### THE FORERUNNERS

The circumstances which led to the organization of the Corporation date from the earliest years of the settlement of Boston, and are largely concerned with the Rev. John Eliot, the Apostle to the Indians. Eliot was twenty-seven years old when he reached Boston on the full tide of the Great Immigration in 1631. During the eight years since taking his degree at Jesus

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College, Cambridge, where he had acquired a reputation for skill in the languages, he had been usher in the school of which Thomas Hooker was the head. Upon his arrival in Massachusetts, he was given the best place open to any young man in the colony, that of substitute for the Rev. John Wilson, the absent pastor of the Boston Congregation. The next year he became teacher of the church at Roxbury. Here, where the wilderness approached nearest to the metropolis, there was little to attract dwellers to the soil, so that the young minister had both opportunity and leisure to acquaint himself with the native inhabitants of the neighboring forests.

The souls of heathen peoples are mentioned frequently in the writings of those who organized the movement to settle Massachusetts, but their followers who crossed the Atlantic to make the settlement found so many other things to occupy both time and energy, and so few heathen in need of salvation, that the subject scarcely appears in the printed records of the first decade of Boston. There are bits of circumstantial evidence, however, which seem to imply that this factor among those which made the Great Immigration of 1630 possible, was not forgotten by some of the religiously minded friends of the colony who remained in England, and that these sent money to the New World to be used to promote the saving of souls.

A few pounds more or less made little difference to the Boston store-keepers of the decade which ended in 1642; during the ensuing ten years anything that represented real money aroused their interest. Throughout the earlier period there was a stream of new-comers to Massachusetts, bringing to the colony the best young blood of Puritan England. Most of these came with the expectation of making a home for themselves, and they brought whatever they possessed of worldly goods. Many were well-

to-do, having money chests filled with coined silver and abundant credit in London. This changed after what was to become the "Long Parliament" adopted its "Grand Remonstrance." No more young Englishmen left the island, and those of Massachusetts whose sense of duty was stronger than their domestic ties or who had not become securely domiciled in the colony — five of the nine members of the first class of Harvard graduates — went back to take their share in the Parliamentary struggles. The effect of this reversal of the current of travel upon the Boston merchants and upon their accounts with the correspondents through whom they bought supplies in London, threatened to be ruinous.

An effort was made to alleviate the impending financial crisis by sending a mission to England to see what could be done to get help for the colonists. The agents, according to Governor Winthrop, were "to congratulate the happy success there, and to satisfy our creditors of the true cause why we could not make so current payment now as in former years we had done, and to be ready to make use of any opportunity God should offer for the good of the country here, as also to give advice, as it should be required, for the settling the right form of church discipline there, but with this caution, that they should not seek supply of our wants in any dishonorable way, as by begging or the like, for we were resolved to wait upon the Lord in the use of all means which were lawful and honorable." It is not surprizing that "many others disliked it, supposing that it would be conceived we had sent them on begging." The results justified the suspicion, as well as the good judgment of those who proposed this method of meeting the emergency. One of the agents, William Hibbens, returned the next year, in 1642, with £500 invested in merchantable goods which yielded

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a profit of £80 additional for the benefit of the colony. Another £500 was donated by a prosperous and Godly haberdasher of Cheapside, being the amount "due to him from the Governor and Company of Plymouth."

The other two agents remained in England to carry on the mission. One was Hugh Peter, whose active temperament led him to a chaplaincy in the Parliamentary army. There his duties were so engrossing that the work which had brought him home received less and less attention, and that little of a sort which compelled his successor "to intreat the rest of the gentlemen not to trouble him any further in the business." His colleague was Thomas Welde, who devoted himself faithfully to his duties for a time, and then accepted a call to become the rector of the parish of St. Mary's, Gateshead, opposite Newcastle.

The results achieved by Welde are significant of what was going on under the seething surface of English life. These are summarized in two reports which he submitted as an answer to the persistent gossip that the money given for New England had never been accounted for. They prove both the generous response of the friends of the colony to its call for help, and the faithfulness of Welde in transmitting everything, and more, that came to his hands. One of his statements is dated April 10, 1647, and was auditted by a committee of the Massachusetts General Court on October 25, 1651. The other was given to those who were organizing the Corporation, perhaps at the time when he sent them the manuscript of his "Innocency Cleared," which contains an abstract of the figures, in a letter dated January 2, 1649/50.

Welde's defence is preserved in a volume containing a number of documents and letters that concern the first years of the

Corporation, when Edward Winslow was directing all its affairs, which are now among the Rawlinson Papers in the Bodleian Library at Oxford. It is printed in the *New England Historical and Genealogical Register* for January, 1882. The same issue contains, from another source, Welde's letter of September 25, 1643, in which he describes the method adopted by Providence to prevent his return to America. His financial statement is in the *Register* for April, 1885. The same statement, from the copy preserved among the Massachusetts archives, was communicated by Julius H. Tuttle to the *Transactions* of the Colonial Society of Massachusetts in December, 1911. Each version corrects apparent errors of the other copy, and introduces variations which leave the student in doubt about some points, the most important being the uncertainty whether one contribution of £2:10:00 came from John Emery or Avery.

Welde accounted to the Massachusetts authorities for more than £1625, as the total amount collected. In 1644 he sent to New England £339 which had been given "for the benefit of the Plantation in general, without reference to this or that use." The next year the churches of London took up a special collection of money with which to pay the cost of transporting poor children to Boston, to replace people who had left the colony. This yielded a total of either £832:09:05 or £874:09:02, but not enough to pay for the passage of all the children whose relatives were willing to assist them to make a fresh start in the world. Welde closes the account of this experiment with two entries which explain some of the later criticisms of his mission:

"Of the children some miscaried, others came ashore & runne away, many payd but halfe passage, some none, and the country at much charge for diet & curing divers of them who were lame & sick, at least lost this way. . . £200



“So it appeereth that the Country in Generall hath little benefitt by all these moneys, and lesse considering how great trouble the Court hath had about it.”

“A third sort of gifts were for pious uses in New England, viz. Some, for the advancement of Learning in the Colledge and Scools: some for the Godly-poore: and others towards the conversion of the Natives, etc.” These amounted to £355:05:00, besides various donations of woolen and linen cloth, clothes, shoes, etc. Most of the cloth was intended for the poor, and it seems to have been more than sufficient to supply the local demand, for when the college authorities were notified that Mr. Bridges had left them a bequest of £50 payable in woolen goods from his stock, they requested that these be disposed of in London on their account.

These remittances arrived in the Bay Colony most opportunely, and there can be no doubt that the proceeds were put to much needed uses in a time of great stringency. What the uses were, however, nobody in England knew at the time, and apparently no one since has found out satisfactorily. Those who had given the money, when they were asked to give more for the same objects, expressed a desire to be informed, adding that the reports which reached them were to the effect that those for whom they had intended the money, had seen very little of it. These rumors were so pointed that Welde “printed in one of the weekly *Occurrences* (which we knew would go through many hands) *That if any desired to be fully satisfied in our receipts and disbursements for the poor childrens transportation, they might please to repair to Mr. Pockes’ shop at the Plough in Walling-street London and peruse our account.*”

Welde was able to show that “We are so farre from gaining by ought we received for New England, that wee have dis-

bursed for pious uses more then we ever received in England upon that score to the value of £117:12:02." This amount, representing presumably their over-estimate of what they would collect, was eventually refunded to Welde and Peter. What Welde could not explain was what had been done with this money after it left his hands. Therefore those who were striving to reopen the well of charitable gifts appealed to the highest colonial authority, the Commissioners for the United Colonies of New England. In April, 1651, the Corporation wrote "Tis strange to see what and how many objections arise against the work, some from the ill management of former gifts bestowed on the country of New England of which no account hath been given to the donors and some personally reflecting upon Mr. Welde and Mr. Peter. . . . We could desire the Government of the Massachusetts or their special Commissioners would give us from thence a word or two, what account hath been given by Mr. Welde and what satisfaction their Court received by his account thither sent; and send it in such terms as we may publish it to the world if we see cause." The reply of the Commissioners, in their letter of the following September, was not made public until two hundred years later: "We are sorry that any objections or impediments should lie in your way, and would gladly answer and remove them but those ancient gifts and sums of money raised for New England were most (as we conceive) expended in foundation work not only before the colonies did combine but before two of them had any being; and though the gentlemen intrusted might in those times have given a satisfying answer to so just a demand, yet some of them being since dead and others removed, we fear it will be now difficult if not impossible."

The authorities of the Bay Colony got the money collected

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by their agents, but they could not get the agents themselves to return to the churches from which they had been borrowed for the public service. Welde promised to sail on one of the ships chartered to transport the poor children, but the departure was postponed until late in September, when "We dare not venture our owne & our wives healths & lives in a winter voyage." His uneasy conscience shows in a paragraph devoted to this subject in "Innocency Cleared:" "You know that neither you, nor wee are our own to dispose, but (as ourselves soe all our waies) are wholly in that hand that swayes the sceptre in heaven: Hence the Apostle sharply reproveth such as (even in lesser matters then these) were absolute, and peremptory in their resolutions, & did not refer all their goings and doings to his will, James 4. 13, 14, 15, therefore, that none might think we did equivocate, or had mentall reservations, when we so expressed ourselves, we do heir (each of us for him self) in ye fear & presence of God, deliberately affirm, that as we came from N. Engl. with a full purpose to return, so we firmly held that same resolution when we expressed for ye voyage; until providence appeared clearly to our consciences to stop us in our way, more then once or twice, in our full intentions and preparation for ye voyage, putting such cros barrs in our way that (indeed) we could not with good consciences break thorow them." The lines that are drawn across this paragraph in the manuscript may represent an early step toward the decision that the publication of Welde's defence would not contribute toward the purpose for which it was prepared.

THE ACT OF 1649

The men who were guiding the affairs of Massachusetts recognized the mandate of the higher power, and selected another

agent whom they could trust not to neglect their interests for the activities of an army chaplaincy or the attractions of a Durham rectory. Like the others, he never returned to New England, but the compulsion which sent him to an untimely death on the Caribbean was from the visible hand of the Lord Protector Oliver, after he had completed the mission which took him to London. He was Edward Winslow of Plymouth, than whom no one has ever represented England's overseas children with greater skill near the Court of St. James's. One proof of this is that, during the weeks of nervous tension following the execution of the King, Parliament enacted Winslow's "Act for the promoting and Propagating the Gospel of Jesus Christ in New England." The preamble reveals in part the intentions of those who secured its passage:

"Whereas the Commons of England assembled in Parliament have received certain intelligence, by the testimonial of divers faithful and godly Ministers, and others in New-England, that divers the Heathen Natives of that countrey, through the blessing of God upon the pious care and pains of some godly English of this Nation, who preach the Gospel to them in their own Indian Language, who not onely of Barbarous are become Civil, but many of them forsaking their accustomed Charms and Sorceries, and other Satanical Delusions, do now call upon the Name of the Lord, and give great testimony of the power of God drawing them from death and darkness, into the life and light of the glorious Gospel of Jesus Christ, which appeareth by their diligent attending on the Word so preached unto them, with tears lamenting their mis-spent lives, teaching their Children what they are instructed in themselves, being careful to place their said Children in godly English families, and to put them to English Schools, betaking themselves to one wife, putting away

the rest, and by their constant prayers to Almighty God morning and evening in their families, expressed (in all appearance) with much Devotion and Zeal of heart: All which considered, we cannot but in behalf of the Nation, represent, rejoyce and give glory to God, for the beginning of so glorious a propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ amongst those poor heathen, which cannot be prosecuted with that expedition and further success as is desired, unless fit instruments be encouraged & maintained to pursue it, universities, schools, and nurseries of literature setled for further instructing and civilizing them, Instruments and Materials fit for labor, and clothing, with other necessaries, as encouragements for the best deserving among them, be provided, and many other things necessary for so great a work; the furnishing of all which will be a burthen too heavy for the English there (who although willing, yet unable) having in a great measure exhausted their Estates in laying the Foundations of many hopeful Towns and Colonies in a desolate Wilderness; and therefore conceive ourselves of this Nation bound to be helpful in the promoting and advancing of a work so much tending to the honor of Almighty God."

It was therefore enacted, in language more familiar to readers of legislative procedure, that sixteen persons, who are named, were to be the first members of a self-perpetuating Corporation in England, with all the customary rights of a "Body Politique and Corporate," including the right to purchase or acquire "any Lands, Tenements or Hereditaments in England or Wales, not exceeding the yearly value of Two thousand pounds; and any goods and sums of money whatsoever, to the uses and purposes herein limited and expressed." The quorum was fixed at nine members for the election of officers and other matters of general concern, while the President or Treasurer and four others sufficed

for ordinary meetings or the decision in all emergent occasions.

The organization was completed by providing "That the Commissioners of the United Colonies of New England in New England for the time being, by themselves or such as they shall appoint, shall have hereby Power and Authority to receive and dispose of the moneys brought in and paid to the said Treasurer for the time being, or any other moneys, goods and commodities, acquired and delivered by the care of the said Corporation at any time; . . . which said Commissioners are hereby ordered and appointed to dispose of the said moneys in such manner as shall best and principally conduce to the preaching and propagating of the Gospel of Jesus Christ amongst the Natives; and also for maintaining of Schools and Nurseries of Learning, for the better education of the children of the Natives."

Having provided the administrative machinery, as well as an argument obviously designed to open the purses of all who were religiously minded, Parliament completed its work with a most important paragraph: "forasmuch as we cannot but be induced from the consideration of the premises, to recommend the furthering thereof to the charity of all such whose hearts God shall incline thereunto, by their Christian and Charitable contributions, to be as the Foundation of so pious and great an undertaking; Be it therefore, and it is hereby Enacted by the Parliament assembled, and by the authority thereof, That a general Collection be made for the purposes aforesaid, in and through all the Counties, Cities, Towns and Parishes of England and Wales: and for the more speedy and better effecting thereof, Be it Enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the several Ministers within the said several places, are hereby required to read this Act or a copy thereof, in the presence of their several Congregations, upon the next Lords day after the same shall be

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delivered unto them, and to exhort the people to a chearful and liberal contribution, and are to give their best assistance to so pious a work;

“And the Ministers and Church-Wardens, or Overseers of the poor of every such parish and place, together with such other well-affected persons as God shall stir up to be active in such an undertaking, and as shall be nominated and approved by the Minister for that purpose, are hereby authorized after the reading hereof, to go with all convenient speed from house to house, to every of the Inhabitants of the said Parishes and places respectively, and to take the subscription of every such person in a schedule to be presented by them for that purpose, and accordingly at the same time to collect and gather the same; a Duplicate whereof, as also the money so to be collected, shall be paid within ten days after the collection so made, into the hands of persons of quality resident in each county, specially deputed by said Corporation under their common Seal, to be Treasurers for the receiving of the same; and the names of such respective Treasurers shall be notified in writing to every place wheresoever such Collection is to be made.”

The Act was ordered to be printed, and appeared in the usual small folio, black-letter form, with title and pages numbered 407-412 of the Parliamentary enactments. It was also printed, probably more than once, for distribution by the Corporation, in large folio, pages 1-4. The imprint is at the end and is the same as that on the title page of the official publication: “London, Printed for Edward Husband, Printer to the Parliament of England, and are to be sold at his Shop in Fleetstreet, at the Sign of the Golden-Dragon, near (nere, in the Harvard and Bodleian copies of the Society’s edition) the Inner-Temple, 1649.” The Society added a paragraph above the imprint:



*The Corporation within mentioned, desire all men to take notice, That all such whom God shall stir up to contribute to help forward this great worke, may repaire to Coopers Hall in London, where the said Corporation sitt, and there if they please at any time may have the sight of their bookes, how the Moneys collected and received for the use above-said, are from time to time disposed and improved, according to the true intent and meaning of the said Act."*

The Corporation also provided the necessary books and blank schedules for the use of those who were expected to make the house-to-house canvas in every English parish.

## CORPORATION AND COMMISSIONERS

The Act created an organization admirably conceived to meet certain temporary conditions, and one which has adapted itself quite as successfully to others that it may be hoped are permanent. In order to counteract the objections raised to interfere with the hitherto unorganized desires of both the givers and the recipients of charitable benefactions, it provided a dual administration. At the receiving end was the Corporation, a legally responsible body of London merchants and men of affairs, prominent in City matters and trusted advisers of the Parliamentary leaders; meeting regularly to make sure that the money was coming to hand from those to whom they had delegated the collecting in the several counties of the Commonwealth, to decide how much should be spent each year on the missionary work, and to determine the investment of the balance so as to secure a continuing return for the future. The oversight of the spending was confided to the Commissioners of the United Colonies, who were from 1643 until 1684 the men in public life in whom their respective communities placed the

fullest confidence. The Corporation and Commissioners were men who each understood the other, appreciating their respective points of view and the difficulties with which each was confronted from time to time. Each had to remind the other of apparent short-comings, but nothing arose to interfere with the cordial co-operation and sympathy with which they administered their trust.

The Corporation and Commissioners maintained a regular correspondence to which reference is made in many of the entries in the record book. At a meeting, ordinarily in March or April and about the time of the spring voyages to Massachusetts Bay, the Corporation read and approved a letter stating the amount of the remittance to be made to carry on the year's work, together with suggestions, advice or warnings. This letter reached Boston in season to be discussed and answered at the meeting of the Commissioners held annually on the first Thursday in September at Plymouth, Hartford, New Haven or Boston, until 1664. Thereafter the Massachusetts officials attended to this business in the years between the triennial meetings of the Commissioners. The two letters were embodied in the report of the proceedings at the meeting, of which a copy was made for each of the four colonies. The original documents were nearly all lost in the fire that destroyed the Boston colony house in 1747, but two of the transcribed records have survived. That of Plymouth Colony was printed by Ebenezer Hazard in the second volume of his "Historical Collections consisting of State Papers and other authentic documents intended as materials for an history of the United States of America. Philadelphia, 1794," and again, in two quarto volumes with the sub-title: "Acts of the Commissioners of the United Colonies of New England," which supplement the "Records of the Colony

of New Plymouth, Edited by David Pulsifer. Boston, 1859." The Hartford copy contains the record of five meetings not in the Plymouth copy, and these are reprinted as an appendix to the Plymouth volumes from the third volume of "The Public Records of the Colony of Connecticut, Edited by J. Hammond Trumbull. Hartford, 1859." A few of the original letters from the Commissioners, with drafts of replies, are preserved among the papers of the Company. These were printed in 1896 in "Some Correspondence between the Governors and Treasurers of the New England Company in London and the Commissioners of the United Colonies in America."

The Corporation and Commissioners likewise provided a regular channel for communications between the givers of the money and the workers in the field for whom their benefactions were intended. Letters in the form of annual or occasional reports were transmitted from Eliot, the Mayhews of Marthas Vineyard and Major Daniel Gookin. The Corporation printed some of these for distribution to the friends of the work, in the later volumes of the series known as the "Eliot Indian Tracts." Seven of these were reprinted in volume four of the third series of the Massachusetts Historical Society *Collections*, Boston, 1834. Five were included in the series of "Sabin's Reprints" in 1865, and last one was privately printed at Boston in 1868.

Eliot also wrote directly to Treasurers Floyd and Ashurst and to Governor Boyle, frequently discussing the work with more personal details than in the reports designed for publication. A few of his letters remain in the archives of the Company, where they were found and "copied from the originals by John Waddington, pastor of the church formed by Henry Jacob in Southwark," into a volume which was given to the Massachusetts Historical Society in 1852. They were printed

from this copy in volume xvii of the Society's *Proceedings*, Boston, 1880. Treasurer Floyd's name appears here as "Hord," and it reappears as "Lloyd" when the same letter was again printed, with the others, in the volume of "Some Correspondence." Other letters from Eliot to the officers of the Company, from the collection of papers preserved at Oxford, were communicated to the *New England Historical and Genealogical Register* in 1882 by G. D. Scull. Eliot's first letter to Boyle is in the fifth volume, p. 548, of Boyle's Works, edited by Thomas Birch, London, 1744. Nine others, dated between 1670 and 1688, were printed in Appendix V, pp. 430-449, of Birch's *Life of Boyle*, London, "MDCDXLIV" (1744). From this they were reprinted in volume III of the first series of the *Collections* of the Massachusetts Historical Society, Boston, 1794.

#### JOHN ELIOT'S LETTERS

If Eliot had written no other letters, and if all the money that was given to save the souls of Indians had been paid to the Treasurer of the Corporation, those responsible for the good repute of the Society would have been spared much annoyance, and this volume would not have contained one of its more instructive episodes. That Eliot was a good letter writer is clear from the remains of his private correspondence with Thomas Thorowgood, Jonathan Hanmer, and Richard Baxter. The letter to Baxter, dated 6th of the 5th, 1663, with Baxter's reply written November 30, are in Matthew Sylvester's "*Reliquiæ Baxterianæ*. London, 1696," pp. 293-297. The originals of nine others, with the drafts of replies, are among Baxter's papers at Dr. Williams's library in London, and transcripts of them made for the late Frederick L. Gay are at the Massachusetts Historical Society. Four letters to Hanmer belonged to the late Theodore

N. Vail, who issued a volume containing facsimiles of them, with notes by Wilberforce Eames, in 1915. Three of these were printed, from copies made by Dr. Rendel Harris before the originals left England, in the *Bulletin* of the John Rylands Library, Manchester, for March, 1919. Thorowgood printed two of the letters he received from Eliot in his "Jews in America. London, 1660." A passage from one of Eliot's letters to Hugh Peter was printed in 1650, to utilize a blank page at the end of the tract "Of the Conversion of 5900 East Indians." There are references to others on later pages of the present volume, which show how skilfully the missionary used this means to produce a pressure upon the Corporation. The directness of his method is revealed by a passage in a letter to Baxter, where, after stating that one of his suggestions had been refused, he writes: "My request to yourself is, that you would please to stir up the honorable Corporation to it. Here is means sufficient, as I suppose."

The letters to Thorowgood and to Hanmer are the only ones now known of the large number Eliot must have written to those from whom he received gifts directly. The difficulties over these private donations began when Eliot, as soon as he learned that the collections had been authorized, took steps to secure what he regarded as his due share of the proceeds. In reply to his representations, the Commissioners wrote in September, 1651, "You are pleased to mention £20 per annum you have received for four years near past [this is the amount of the Lady Armine's annuity, given in 1644]; and of £10 from Mr. Andrews ordered for some years though you know not how many. We hear of some other gifts and particularly of an hundred pounds or more sent from Exeter or some of those Western parts, part for yourself and part for Mr. Mayhew and part for the Indians but in

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what proportion we understand not." The Commissioners, being responsible for the wise administration of a charity about which reports of extravagance as well as of inadequate returns were current, very properly felt that they could not increase the expenditure unless they were in possession of all the facts. Both the Corporation and Winslow had written the preceding April that "You would wonder to hear the several sorts of objections that are made against it by men that after all are ashamed to neglect it." Moreover, although the collection was hopefully begun and Winslow believed that it would rise to a considerable sum, very little had come into the treasury above what had been expended for printing and for the purchase of two private libraries which Eliot and Mayhew had requested as their most pressing immediate need.

The Commissioners, valuing their reputation for sound management as well as the good opinion of the members of the Corporation, declined to give Eliot more money unless he informed them concerning his outside income. They thought that they held the control, but Eliot knew better, and played a hand worth two of theirs. Until the originals come to light, the contents of the letters he wrote can only be guessed, but the guessing, both as to what the letters contained and what was said by the recipients, is made easy by a passage in the letter of February, 1653/4, from the Corporation to the Commissioners: "Give us leave to tell you there is such a material objection here started as we are ashamed of and know not how to answer, viz. the many complaints made by Mr. Eliot to sundry of his friends here that you allow him but £20 per annum which doth not bear his charges in so much as he runs in debt every year more and more and is disabled for giving his children that education he otherwise would. Now whether it be or no we know

not, but verily believe the work will suffer some thousands of pounds by it, for it flyeth like lightening and takes like tinder, men being extreme glad to meet with anything that may colour over their covetousness and dull their zeal in so good a work: Nay Mr. Peter who but 14 days before told Mr. Winslow in plain terms he heard the work was but a plain cheat and that there was no such thing as Gospel Conversion amongst the Indians presently after charged the same man upon a letter he received from Mr. Weld by information from Mr. Eliot that you the Commissioners for the United Colonies forbade the work in that you would not allow competent maintenance to Mr. Eliot and others that laboured therein; and however we have otherwise charitable thoughts of Mr. Peter, yet he hath been a very bad instrument all along towards this work."

In the same letter they reassure the Commissioners that "We are far from justifying Mr. Eliot in his turbulent and clamorous proceedings, but the best of God's servants have their failings, and as such we look upon him." They added, a year later, in a letter addressed to the Governor and General Court of Massachusetts, that he was not the only one who contributed to their troubles: "We have been exercised some years with a great deal of care and industry in the midst of many objections against the work of the Lord begun amongst you, and not the least arising and coming from New England itself through the malicious profane careless and envious tongues and pens of too many of those parts."

The Commissioners reported their efforts to settle the matter in the September letter of 1654: "We inquired of Mr. Eliot what sums were sent over yearly upon those more private accounts and how employed, what part to the Indians and what to himself and others who labor in the work. He acknowledged



some considerable sums of money came that way to his hands but was slow to give any account how much or how expended. Hereupon we did conceive that £20 per annum added to what he received by other means out of England and what he receiveth from the church of Rocksburrow which as we hear is not less than £60 per annum might sufficiently maintain his family and afford due education for his children without running himself into debt. We shall now allow him £40 per annum and if there be cause shall readily enlarge further and so to Mr. Mayhew. All we propound is that as our Masters acceptance is sufficient yea rich wages for any care or pains of ours in this work, so there may be some due proportion (as near as we can judge) betwixt the imployment and encouragement of other instruments through the blessing of him who is love itself and the God of Peace."

At the same meeting they wrote to Eliot: "You may remember some of us desired Information what sums of money you had yearly received out of England either from particular Benefactors or from private collections there made for propagation of the Gospel. . . . Some considerable sums you acknowledged to have yearly received, but chose rather to rest satisfied with a smaller allowance from us out of the Corporation stock than to give any account how much came to your hands or how expended and accordingly we conceived that £20 per annum from Mr. Rawson added to what you yearly receive from the Lady Arraminta and others out of England with the maintenance allowed you by the church at Rocksburrow might prove comfortable and satisfying for yourself and family as in other respects so for the due education of your children and thought you accepted it, though we then knew it must prove chargeable either to yourself or others in the low condition of New England to bring

up so many sons at learning in a collegiate way as you propounded. But by the last letter from the Corporation we are informed that you have made many complaints to sundry of your friends in England of the smallness of your allowance, that you run into debt and cannot educate your children as you would, and Mr. Peter from Mr. Weld by your information reports that the Commissioners by denying competent maintenance forbid the work, which seemeth strange when we can neither understand what you receive from others upon that account nor have you propounded to us any larger allowance; for ourselves we shall freely offer our accounts and the grounds of our proceedings to the consideration and examination of any that are Godly and judicious; but we fear that the work intended may suffer much by such reports and probably by some your own carriage herein may be thought not only irregular but turbulent and clamorous which crosseth that meekness of wisdom wherein we believe you desire to follow our Lord and Master."

The difficulty, so far as Eliot was concerned, may have come from the uncertainty of private benevolence. Gifts reached him in considerable amounts and were not accompanied by the bothersome obligations inevitably connected with allowances from an organization, but they could not be depended upon. Rev. Thomas Thorowgood, who nowhere reveals any trace of a sense of humor in his two treatises on the "Jews in America," drops a phrase which throws light upon Eliot's problem. Thorowgood had collected £40 from a number of noblemen, ladies, gentry and others of Norfolk, which Eliot gratefully acknowledged in a letter dated March 18, 1653. The second treatise on the "Jews in America," printed in 1660, is dedicated to those who had given this money. In the dedicatory epistle Thorowgood, mindful of the remarks that had been passing in

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Puritan circles regarding the New England mission funds, printed the receipt of the shipmaster by whom he transmitted the proceeds of his collection, as well as Eliot's letter. He adds the information that Eliot "did iterate a desire of returning thanks, 27 of 6th, 1654, and again 16 of 6th, 1655." The August letter of 1654 was written two days before one of similar import to the Rev. Jonathan Hanmer. The failure of these, and presumably other, letters to produce results helped to solve the problem of the Commissioners.

### THE RECORD BOOKS

Missionary problems were not the only ones that occupied the attention of the members of the Corporation at their meetings. Other matters of widely varying interest appear in the entries in its earliest account books, which are now in America. One is the Treasurer's Ledger, as made up for the annual examination from the daily cash entries in the Book of Receipts and the Book of Disbursements, for the years from 1650 to 1664. This is now preserved among the archives of the State of New Jersey at Trenton. It crossed the Atlantic before 1688, for in that year John Reading, who may have brought the volume from London, used the blank pages to record various Indentures relating to land in the County of Gloucester, in that state. The New England interest of the volume was recognized by the Rev. J. B. Thompson on February 20, 1890. He showed it to the Rev. Charles A. Briggs, who described it in *Scribner's Magazine* for March, 1898, under the title "The Romance of a Cash Book." Dr. Briggs, hoping that means might be arranged to secure its return to the Company in London, carefully concealed the whereabouts of the volume, although this had been stated two years earlier by Governor Ford, to whom Dr. Briggs had

communicated the discovery, in his preface to "Some Correspondence."

John Reading also possessed another book from Treasurer Ashurst's office, the Rent Book in which was kept the debit and credit account of each tenant prior to 1660. Unluckily for present interest, the treasurer's clerk put down the rent when it was due, and not when it was paid, so that the entries do not answer any of the questions that arise in connection with the difficulties that grew out of the failure of some tenants to pay, between the death of Oliver Cromwell and the restoration of Charles Stuart. A few marginal notes, "pd in pte," prove that the entry of the full amount on the date when due means nothing. As these marginal memoranda are not dated, they add nothing to what was already known from the record book. In New Jersey this Rent Book was used by Reading in 1701 for recording documents similar to those entered in the Ledger thirteen years earlier.

The Ledger and the official letters are the only record of the first six years of the Corporation. On January 19, 1655/6, the clerk, John Hooper, began to keep the minutes of each meeting, with a few exceptions, in the Record Book whose contents supply the main portion of the present publication. This book, with entries from 1656 to 1686, came into the possession of Henry Stevens, the London dealer in American books, about 1865. Failing to dispose of it by private treaty, he offered it in his "Bibliotheca Historica" sale at Boston on April 14, 1870. In the auction catalogue it is No. 1399, and is described in a long note which embodies several quotations that mention Marmaduke Johnson and the printing of the Indian Bible. These aroused curiosity to know what else the manuscript might contain. Those who tried to find it, however, after the sale, were unable to trace it

The buyer, to whom it had been knocked down at the moderate bid of \$265, took it from the sales-room, and the auctioneer's records gave no clue to his identity. Mr. Frederick L. Gay was particularly anxious to examine it and for many years directed a persistent search for the lost manuscript. He and the owner were on friendly terms, dining together frequently at the monthly meetings of the Club of Odd Volumes, of which the latter was the president from 1896 until shortly before his death in 1909, but the quest never chanced to lead to his shelves. His son, inheriting the father's tastes with his library, happened to show the manuscript in 1915 to one of those who had been actively co-operating in the hunt. The discovery was promptly reported to Mr. Gay, and the owner, Mr. James Melville Hunnewell, generously agreed to the proposal that it be printed by the Prince Society, of which both were members and Mr. Gay the President.

James Frothingham Hunnewell, the father, when he bought the manuscript in 1870, planned to print it. He was a member and the historian of "The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel among the Indians, and others, in North America," and may have been influenced by the hope expressed by Mr. Stevens in the sale catalogue that "Perhaps some other Corporation in New England will see enough in the volume to secure it, and give to the world, through the press, its contents in a neat volume, and so repay an instalment of the interest on the great debt of gratitude so long overdue to that brave Old Cromwellian Corporation." He made a preliminary transcript of a portion of the text, and had the Chiswick press set a trial page. Other interests intervened, as well as the difficulty of deciphering some of the pages, and the proposed printing was given up. The manuscript was put away, to remain hidden until chance brought it to the hands of the present editor.

Mr. Gay, at the suggestion of Mr. Worthington C. Ford, employed Mrs. Minnie V. Dickens of Washington, D. C., to transcribe the text. Mr. Gay's death, just as this preliminary work was completed, deprived the Society, and all who consult this publication, of the invaluable notes and editorial matter that he could have added from his intimate acquaintance with the period and the individuals that had to do with these records. Despite this loss, it was decided to proceed with the publication, and the writer agreed to see the volume through the press. The text was put in type and the proof carefully corrected by Miss Eleanor L. Waters of Salem, Mass.

The printed text does not attempt to reproduce the manuscript with precise literalness. Superior letters, the y sign for "the," abbreviations which are self-evident, and the obvious shortcuts of note taking, are printed in most cases as they are found in the original. The recognized script forms for per and pro, as well as other less familiar survivals from scribal times, are expanded, partly to save the cost of using special type forms but more because the use of the phonogram where there can be no uncertainty regarding the scribe's meaning, serves no useful purpose. The other extreme advocated by editors of a period now happily passing, which would print such a document as this in what the editor thinks would have been the form and spelling used by the writer of the original if he had overseen the printing, has been avoided even more carefully. The reason is the obvious one that the writer of this manuscript did not intend that it should be printed. He would certainly have objected to the perpetuation of his carelessnesses, even though some of these throw light upon what was going on at the time he was writing. The end sought in this publication is to provide a text whereby the reader who is not altogether unfamiliar with such documents

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can get without undue difficulty both the sense of what was written and also the significance that lies in the way it was written. The latter is ordinarily quite as important as the other, and a text ought to be so printed that the reader will be assisted to keep in mind the fact that he is dealing with a manuscript record and not something intended for publication.

The manuscript volume printed herewith contains the record of most of the meetings of the Corporation, as made by the clerk during the sittings, from January 19, 1655/6 to February 4, 1685/6. After the reorganization following the Restoration, these notes, as the clerk doubtless considered them, were copied at intervals into another volume, which became the formal record of the action of the Corporation. A considerable part of the interest of the original notes is found in the cancellations and interlineations which occur in many of the entries. These compensate for any lack of legal value by the revelation of the course of discussion and something of the arguments used to influence the decisions arrived at. In printing the text these have been indicated whenever they seemed to possess any significance. Insertions due to an obvious slip of the pen or to haste, except occasional instances when these in themselves seem to hint at what was taking place at the meeting, as well as illegible or minor erasures, are not noted.

At the Restoration there was an interval of several months during which the members could not be certain what was to be the fate of this Puritan missionary society. At this period the record book was not used, perhaps mislaid or put away where it could do no harm. The entries in it begin again after it was settled that the royal Charter would not alter the character of the organization. During the later part of this interval, from the first meeting under the Charter on March 27, 1662, until

that of October 22 following, the records were made in another book which has remained in the archives of the Company. The proceedings of these meetings are printed in their chronological place, from the Appendix to the "History of the New England Company" issued in 1871. Another hiatus, which has not been filled, covers the time of the Plague and Fire of 1666.

The date at which the record book begins marks the end of the period during which the organization of the Society was put into working order. That there was some change in the Corporation at about this time is shown by the Ledger. The accounts for the preceding years are each signed by Hutchinson, Speed and Clark. In September, 1656, the auditors are Young, Molins and Babington, and a different and larger committee performs this duty each ensuing year. The change doubtless signified nothing more than that the success of the undertaking was assured, and that the amount of the funds in the treasurer's hands became large enough to call for more careful accounting. The preceding five years had been a period of uncertainty and difficulties, which had sorely tried the patience and tested the devotion of both Corporation and Commissioners.

#### COLLECTIONS AND INVESTMENTS

The Commissioners learned officially of the successful launching of the Society at their meeting at Hartford in September, 1650. On the 5th of that month they wrote to acknowledge the Corporation's "great labor of love to raise and settle due means and encouragement that the Gospel of Peace may be further published to these miserable Indians." That "no time may be let slip but the means advanced for the work may be employed in it for the first and best advantage," they continue, "What



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money is already collected upon that account we cannot conjecture, but if yourself [the President] and those worthy gentlemen your assistants concur, we desire that one Hundred Pounds may be thence allowed and paid toward [Edward Winslow's] expense and encouragement." Of Eliot and Mayhew, "if you please for their encouragement and some necessary helps for the Indians to pay the assigns of Mr. Eliot the sum of One Hundred Pounds more we hope it will prove a real furtherance to the service." They conclude by suggesting that one thousand pounds additional be paid to Winslow and Herbert Pelham to be sent "hither in such commodities as may suit the end propounded." As a further precaution against negligence on their own part, an order was passed before the meeting adjourned that if word was received that more money had come in than already asked for, and that the Corporation expected advice as to what to do with it, the Governor and Commissioners for Massachusetts might write specifying what was desired.

The Corporation replied on the 17th of the following April that "We are glad to see your care in giving direction . . . however we are not in a capacity to send so much at present having newly begun the collection and very little moneys come in as yet. . . . We hope by the next ship we shall be able to send you some woollen shoes and stockings according to your direction or at least according to our abilitie for we find the proceeds of the collection goes slowly on both in City and country and that it will be long work." In the same letter they notified the Commissioners that the latter were not to have the spending of all the moneys that were contributed: "It shall be our greatest care and utmost endeavor to carry on the work with all convenient speed in all parts at once or as fast as we can, that so the Principal be not eat up as it comes but some

money be laid out to purchase a standing revenue." They also suggested that the Commissioners send an estimate of the cost of various undertakings that had been proposed as part of the work for the Indians, so that they might know "what the charge of all this will amount unto at first and what to maintain per annum from time to time that so we may here improve what the Lord shall send in, to the best advantage, that if money come in together, which we much fear, we may be enabled to purchase some lands to raise some yearly profits to carry on the same."

That the fear of the Corporation was justified is shown by an examination of the Treasurer's ledger. These accounts were drawn out and balanced on March 26, 1653, but as the entries of expenditures begin in August, 1650, and the income begins with folio 1 of the Book of Receipts, it is probable that the record is virtually complete, lacking only the entries from the first four folios of the Book of Disbursements. This confirms the statements in the letters to the Commissioners, that the money arrived slowly until the preliminary organization for directing the collections throughout the counties had been perfected, and that thereafter it came in substantial amounts, so that a more careful accounting became desirable.

The total receipts to March, 1653, amounted to £4582. Of this sum, the contributions from the Puritan army, occupying the first four leaves of the Book of Receipts, amounted to £511:03:07. The London parishes yielded £961:04:08½, while Somerset led the counties with £436. From individuals, who made their gifts directly to the Treasurer, £861:16:07 was received. During the ensuing twelve months the receipts from contributions were £7625:01:00; from personal gifts £317:02:06; and from rents, which had been only £22:15:00 previously,

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£196:15:08. After this the personal gifts cease almost entirely, the total under this heading for the rest of the decade being only £63. The general contributions fall off more gradually, to £415 in 1657, doubling to £1095 two years later, and dropping to £65 in 1660. The total contributions for these ten years were £15,367:01:04, and of personal gifts £1241:19:01. The rents meantime rose steadily to £800:19:11 in 1657, dropping to £272:16:09 in 1660, when tenants, like everyone else, waited to see what would happen to those who had prospered during the Puritan regime.

During this same decade, £4673:10:09 was expended for the benefit of the New Englanders; £11,957:15:04 was invested in landed property in England; and the charges for salaries and other sundries incidental to the business of the Corporation were £1468:03:02.

The first investment appears on the Treasurer's books under date of December 27, 1652, "By Fee Farm Rents bought of the State and paid for including Charges £320:19:05." A more important entry occurs two years later; "By the Manor of Ersewell & Chamberlynes Bought of Col: Thomas Bedingfield for wch paid £7000 . . . and paid in sundry charges about the perfecting of the purchase £108:09:10." This Suffolk estate occupied a good share of the attention of the members of the Corporation for the next two centuries. Colonel Bedingfield was one of those who had been loyal to the king, without becoming so deeply involved in Royalist affairs that they felt that it was wise to leave the country after the death of the Sovereign. The activities of the Committees on Sequestered Estates, however, caused a good deal of anxiety. Bedingfield was induced to accept the offer of the Corporation, which was £2000 less than his estimated value of the property, and went abroad to live on

the proceeds. The return of Charles found the Colonel again at Ersewell, urging the tenants, with some success, to give him the rent money they had ceased paying to the factor of the Corporation. As the Restoration cancelled all the acts of the Protectorate, he saw no reason why he, like his King, should not come into what he regarded as his own. He reckoned, however, without the inherent English conception of property rights, and without realizing that the second Charles was under vastly deeper obligations, present, past, and prospective, to the Citizens of London than he was to those who had attended him without being asked, during his exile.

#### THE RESTORATION CHARTER

A Royal charter was issued in due course, and without any serious delay, transforming the Society into a Company, but not otherwise breaking the continuity of the Corporation. The membership was enlarged from sixteen to forty-five, the new names including many prominent in the court circle, as well as some from the list submitted to Lord Chancellor Hyde by the Rev. Richard Baxter on November 1, 1660. The credit for securing the Charter has been given by later writers, relying upon Birch's biography, to the Hon. Robert Boyle. The contemporary evidence, however, suggests that Baxter's account of the negotiations, as printed by Matthew Sylvester in "*Reliquiæ Baxterianæ: or Mr. Richard Baxter: Narrative of the most Memorable Passages of his Life and Times.* London, 1669," page 290, is substantially correct:

"I shall next insert some account of the Business which I had so often with the Lord Chancellour at this time: . . . In the time of *Cromwell's* Government, *Mr. John Elliot*, with some Assistant in *New-England*, having learnt the Natives Language,

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and Converted many Souls among them . . . *Cromwell* caused a Collection to be made in *England* in every Parish; and People did contribute very largely: And with the Money (beside some left in stock) was bought 7 or 800 £. *per Annum* of Lands, and a Corporation chosen to dispose of the Rents for the furthering of the Works among the *Indians*. This Land was almost all bought for the worth of it of one Colonel *Beddingfield*, a Papist, an Officer in the King's Army: When the King came in, *Beddingfield* seizeth on the lands again; and keepeth them, and refuseth either to surrender them, or to repay the Money; because all that was done in *Cromwell's* time being now judged void, as being without Law, that Corporation was now null, and so could have no right to Money or Lands: And he pretended that he sold it under the worth, in expectation of the recovery of it, upon the King's return.

“The President of the Corporation was the Lord *Steele*, a Judge (a worthy Man): The Treasurer was Mr. *Henry Ashurst*, and the Members were such sober godly Men, as were best affected to *New-Englands* Work: Mr. *Ashurst* (being the most exemplary Person for eminent Sobriety, Self-denial, Piety, and Charity, that *London* could glory of, as far as publick Observation, and Fame, and his most intimate Friends Reports could testify) did make this (and all other Publick Good which he could do) his Business: He called the Old Corporation together, and desired me to meet them: where we all agreed, that such as had incurred the King's Displeasure, by being Members of any Courts of Justice, in *Cromwell's* days, should quietly recede, and we should try if we could get the Corporation restored, and the rest continued, and more fit Men added, that the Land might be recovered:

“And because of our other Business, I had ready access to

the Lord Chancellor, they desired me to solicit him about it: so Mr. *Ashurst* and I did follow the Business. The Lord Chancellor at the very first was ready to further us, approving of the Work, as that which could not be for any Faction, or Evil end, but honourable to the King and Land. And he told me, That *Beddingfield* could have no right to that which he had sold, and that the right was in the King, who would readily grant it to the good use intended: and that we should have his best assistance to recover it. And indeed I found him real to us in this Business from first to last: yet did *Beddingfield* by the friendship of the Attorney General, and some others, so delay the Business, as bringing it to a Suit in *Chancery*, he kept Mr. *Ashurst* in a Twelve-months trouble before he could recover the Land: but when it came to Judgment, the Lord Chancellor spake very much against him, and granted a Decree for the New Corporation.

“For I had procured of him before, the King’s Grant of a New Corporation; and Mr. *Ashurst* and my self had the naming of the Members: And we desired Mr. *Robert Boyle* (a worthy Person of Learning and a Publick Spirit, and Brother to the Earl of *Cork*) to be President (now called Governour) and I got Mr. *Ashurst* to be Treasurer again, and some of the old Members, and many other godly, able Citizens made up the rest: Only we left the Nomination of some Lords to his Majesty, as not presuming to nominate such, (And the Lord Chancellor, Lord Chamberlain, and six or seven more were added). But it was Mr. *Boyle* and Mr. *Ashurst*, with the Citizens, that did the Work: But especially the care and trouble of all was on Mr. *Ashurst*. And thus that Business was happily restored.

“§ 149. And as a fruit of this his Majesty’s Favour, Mr. *Elliot* sent the King, first the New Testament and then the whole

Bible, translated and printed in the *Indian's Language*: Such a Work and Fruit of a Plantation, as was never before presented to a King. And he sent word, that next he would print my *Call to the Unconverted*, and then *The Practice of Piety*: But Mr. Boyle sent him word it would be better taken here, if the *Practice of Piety* were printed before any thing of mine. At the present the Revenues of the Land goeth most to the maintaining of the Press."

The law officers and the courts, as Baxter relates, promptly decided that there were no flaws in the titles and nothing to prevent the Company from enjoying the properties acquired by the Society. Colonel Bedingfield, having apparently little else to lose, fought these decisions valiantly, but in the end he, and the tenants, had to acknowledge that the rents must go toward propagating the Gospel in New England. The Corporation administered the estates profitably, adding adjoining properties as opportunities arose. The original purchase consisted of the two manor houses and the water mill, and 2460 acres of arable land, not reckoning the 152 acres of meadow and pasture, 17 acres of carr ground, two free warrens of about 2000 acres and four fold courses with liberty of folding 2240 sheep. This was increased by purchases and allotments, which brought the whole estate to over 6665 acres. These were sold in 1869 for £120,000 to the Maharajah Duleep Singh, the ruler of the Punjab until the British occupation of his territories compelled the Maharajah to make his home in England.

The new Charter was dated February 7, 1661/2. It is considerably longer than the "pretended" Act of Parliament which it replaced, but it contains fewer passages of present interest. A lengthy portion of it suggests that the able lawyers who were retained to attend to this part of the business desired to give

good measure for their fees. The preamble, which states the Royal reasons for granting the charter, may have been written by some one who hoped that it would be read by the monarch, but otherwise there is nothing to compensate for the obvious appeal to a public which introduces the Act of 1649. The writer can scarcely have expected to mislead Charles into thinking what the document makes him say, that he made this grant because "those planters who first began this work and contributed largely thereunto, being of themselves unable to bear the whole charge thereof." The next sentence is equally suggestive of a hope that the King's mind, if he read the document, might wander from the subject in hand: "And whereas We (the King as grantor) are resolved not only to seek the outward welfare and prosperity of those colonies, by putting an industrious people into a way of trade and commerce, that they may be employed and improved for their own and the common benefit of these our Kingdoms; but more especially to endeavor the good and salvation of their immortal souls, and the publishing the most glorious Gospel of Christ amongst them.

Nowhere in the Charter is there a word in reference to the "late pretended Corporation." The only hint that everything was not of the future occurs in the closing sentence of the preamble; "And to the end that such our loving subjects as either have already been aiding herein, or as shall hereafter be willing to contribute hereunto, may not be discouraged in their intended charity for want of sufficient authority and patronage from us, faithfully to order and dispose all and every sum and sums of money, goods, chattels, lands, tenements, or hereditaments, that have been, or shall or may be given for the purposes aforesaid." That almost parenthetical "have been" had without much doubt been passed upon and declared sufficient under the



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circumstances, by the legal minds to which the Citizens of London who were interested in this document were accustomed to entrust their affairs. It was not, however, their only safeguard.

A petition "of divers for propagating the Gospel in America" had been referred by an order of the King in Council on November 14, 1660, to the Attorney General. He reported a draft "for renewing the Charter of the Corporation therein specified" on the following April 10. On this date the Council after "full debate thereof had" ordered that "Lord Viscount Valentia is to consider of and examine the list of names of the members whereof the said Corporation is to consist and . . . Mr. Attorney is . . . also to add thereunto a clause that all lands tenements and hereditaments heretofore given or bought to the use or uses in this Charter mentioned shall from henceforth be vested in the said Corporation and their successors with power to sue for and recover the same and any arrears thereof due." The reason why such a clause did not get into the Charter as granted is a matter for speculation. A copy of the Order in Council, preserved by the Company in its archives, shows that its solicitors may have been prepared to raise this question, if they did not actually do so, at the hearings of their suit against Colonel Bedingfield.

Four words were introduced into the Charter which had important permanent consequences. These provide that there shall be a Society or Company for propagation of the Gospell in New England, "and the parts adjacent." The probability is that both Court and City had an eye on the rich country lying westward of New England, which was to take its lasting name from the King's brother, the Duke of York. It was Dutch territory, and war with Holland was inevitable and imminent

in 1661. Those who had a hand in the wording of the Charter undoubtedly knew what they wanted England to get when the war came. Neither the Company nor the natives, however, benefitted greatly from the English occupation of the Hudson and the Mohawk valleys. The usefulness of this phrase came a hundred years later, when the legal advisers of the Corporation decided that Harvard College, which had become the principal beneficiary of its income, no longer had a right to English charity after the establishment of the Declaration of Independence. In 1786 the Company transferred its activities to the most adjacent parts, the province of New Brunswick, where the influx of families that could no longer reside comfortably in the revolted colonies, had produced a native problem not unlike that which existed in New England at the time the Society was organized. No one is likely to question the propriety of its further extension westward to British Columbia.

In 1920 the present clerk, C. Augustus Webb, Esq., writes that the Company's capital stands on its books as £149,198, yielding an average annual income of about £4500. The Charter Trust, amounting to the capital sum of £112,489, is made up of the sums received before the Restoration and of later additions donated from time to time. The Hon. Robert Boyle's Trust, which was received in 1695 as a perpetual rent charge of £90 per annum, now stands as a capital sum of £6972. The bequest of the Rev. Daniel Williams, who died January 26, 1716, leaving property subject to a life interest, was received in 1745, and now stands as £29,737.

Robert Boyle, son of the Earl of Cork and the principal patron of English scientific undertakings during the latter half of the seventeenth century, was by the Charter assigned named constituted and appointed "to be the first and present Governor

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. . . to hold and exercise the said office for so long time as he the said Robert Boyle shall well behave himself therein." This provision wrought a fundamental change in the conduct of the Company's business. During the Protectorate, the Treasurer had dominated its management, presiding at the meetings and administering its affairs. The President was an honorary and contributory official, to whom the papers which it was desired that he should sign were sent with messages of respectful compliment. After the Restoration, the Company passed into the Governor's control. Boyle attended the meetings with exemplary regularity whenever he was in the vicinity of London, and when he was indisposed at his sister's residence, the active members assembled there to transact the necessary business. The operations of the Company tended more and more to follow the lines of the Governor's personal interests. These interests reached into every aspect of scientific thought, giving Boyle an important place in the annals of British intellectual activities. The particular phase of his multifarious mind that led him to add the Company to his other engrossing occupations seems to have been a desire to see the Bible printed in an otherwise unknown language.

### ELIOT'S INDIAN BIBLE

The Corporation had decided to print the Indian Bible before Boyle became a member. The negotiations, which extended throughout the period of apparent political uncertainty, offer the clearest evidence that those who were managing the Society did not have serious doubts at any time regarding the continuity of its life. These Puritan merchants conformed respectfully to all the conventionalities of the Restoration, using the humblest phrases, but they acted with entire assurance. The

dates are significant. On May 7, 1659, the Corporation wrote to the Commissioners intimating its judgment that the New Testament be first printed; on the ensuing 25th instant, Richard resigned the Protectorate, a long foreseen event. On April 21, 1660, articles of agreement for three years were signed with the printer, who forthwith proceeded across the Atlantic to hasten the work; the Declaration of Breda was issued April 14, and on May 8 Charles II was proclaimed King. Five Books of the Old Testament had been finished by September, 1661; until the Charter was signed in the following February, Treasurer Ashurst wrote of "being no Corporation."

The discussion of the proposal to print the translation of the Bible extended throughout the first decade of the Society. John Eliot, with his reputation as a master of the ancient tongues, had evinced an interest in the language of his heathen neighbors soon after he was placed in a position where he was in familiar contact with them. He secured a native boy who understood English, and with this help acquired a sufficient proficiency to give him confidence both in preaching to the Indians and in putting his ideas into written form. He composed prayers for their use and provided his native assistants with short sermons to be delivered during his absence, as well as passages from the Scripture to be memorized. At an early period in his ministry to the Indians, he looked forward to the translating of the entire Bible for their use. As he wrote to Boyle somewhat later: "Until we have Bibles, we are not furnished to carry the Gospel unto them, for we have no means to carry religion thither, saving by the Scriptures." The members of the Corporation, "knowing that the foundation of true religion is from the Bible," considered the argument unanswerable, and urged the Commissioners to expedite the plans of Eliot when he sug-

gested that the newly organized Society should pay for printing books for the use of his converts.

The Commissioners wrote to Winslow in September, 1653, that "Mr. Eliot is preparing to print a Catechism in the Indian language which we shall further (as we may) by disbursing the charge of paper and printing out of the stock, but by some due allowance shall endeavor to encourage Thomas Stanton to assist in the work, who is the most able interpreter we have in the country for that language, that the work may be more perfectly carried on." Stanton's very considerable ability in understanding what the natives thought, as well as what they said, was not accompanied by an equal familiarity or sympathy with the thoughts and aspirations which John Eliot desired to convey to them. Even the Commissioners, to whom Stanton was invaluable as the irreplaceable intermediary in many delicate negotiations, found both the form and the substance of his language inconsistent with a proper regard for their own dignity, and felt compelled to remonstrate with him. As a collaborator in the intricate task of translating the Bible — or rather of expressing in a language hitherto unwritten what the words of the Bible meant to a seventeenth century Puritan divine — Thomas Stanton was obviously impossible. Eliot was unquestionably justified in declining to allow a person with Stanton's reputation and known character, to complicate his task. The physical labor of writing the version must have been sufficiently arduous, and there was a steady pressure from England urging Eliot to complete the work as soon as might be. That he would have welcomed proper cooperation in his exhausting undertaking, many years later, is shown by his generous acknowledgment of the revision of his work by John Cotton of Plymouth for the second edition of the Bible.

In September, 1654, the Commissioners wrote to Eliot; "We desired that Thomas Stanton's help might have been used in the Catechism printed and wish that no inconvenience be found through the want thereof, and shall now advise that before you proceed in translating the Scriptures or any part of them you improve the best help the country affords for the Indian language." Eliot's reply is not known, but its tenor may be guessed from the letter written to him at the next meeting of the Commissioners, a year later, in which they say that they "never forbade you to translate the Scriptures for preaching or for any other use either of your own or of your hearers but advised that what you meant to print or set forth upon the Corporation charge might be done with such consideration of the language and improvement of the best helps to be had therein that as much as may be the Indians of all parts of New England might share in the benefit, which we fear they cannot so well do by what you have already printed." Eliot had an opportunity to answer this in person at the meeting in September, 1657, according to his own account written four months later to Treasurer Ashurst: "I was there when [a petition from sundry of the Elders moving the Commissioners to further the printing of the Bible] came in. They moved this doubt whether the Translation I had made was generally understood? to which I answered, that to my knowledge it was understood as far as Connecticut: for there I did read some part of my Translation before many hundred English witnesses, and the Indians manifested that they did understand what I read, perfectly, in respect of the language. They further questioned whether I had expressed the Translation in true language? I answered that I feared after times will find many infirmities in it, all humane works are subject to infirmity, yet those pieces that were printed, viz. Genesis and

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Matthew, I had sent to such as I thought had best skill in the language, and intreated their animadversions, but I heard not of any faults they found.”

However hesitant his acquaintances may have been to suggest changes in his version, the repeated doubts expressed by the Commissioners and the questions raised by the Corporation show that Eliot's confidence was not shared by all of his contemporaries. The clearest evidence regarding the value of his work is in a letter rescued from oblivion by Samuel Sewall fifty years later, when the Corporation in London were asked by some one now unknown, to put the Eliot Bible to press for a third edition. The matter was referred to the successors of the Commissioners, who advised against such an undertaking. One of them, Cotton Mather, the biographer of Eliot, as his colleagues were unwilling to declare themselves on the question, wrote: “their Indian tongue is a very penurious one (though the words are long enough!) and the great things of our Holy Religion brought unto them in it, unavoidably arrive in terms that are scarcely more intelligible to them than if they were entirely English. . . . And a discreet person that we lately employed in a visitation of the Indian villages, inserts this as one article of his report, about this particular matter; ‘There are many words of Mr. Eliot's forming which they never understood. This they say is a grief to them. Such a knowledge in their Bibles as our English ordinarily have in ours, they seldom any of them have; and there seems to be as much difficulty to bring them unto a competent knowledge of the Scriptures, as it would be to get a sensible acquaintance with the English tongue.’ This opinion has been confirmed by the linguistic researches of later years. The language that John Eliot constructed and used during fifty years of devoted

labor, has no value for students of the American aborigines. His compositions in it are "a tragic monument of missionary zeal and of the pre-scientific study of the Indian tongue."

The men who first questioned whether Eliot's version of the Bible could be understood by those for whom it was intended, made the printing of it inevitable. The real difficulty, as is usually the case in similar controversies, was in the conflicting temperaments of the two parties to the discussion. Eliot, as on other occasions, brought the requisite pressure to bear upon the Commissioners, and he was left free to go on with the toil of his writing table, with an increased stipendium. In three years the completed text was ready for the press. In May, 1659, the Corporation wrote intimating "not only as our own but as the judgment of others," from whom something more than advice was presumably expected, that the New Testament be first printed. It soon became evident that nothing less than the complete Scripture would satisfy the expectations of those who had been following the progress of the work, and in September, 1660, the Commissioners wrote: "We shall attend your advice for the impression of the whole Bible, without which we should have rested in our former determination that the copy might have been fully perused and perfected by the most skilfullest helps in the country."

Meanwhile the Corporation was taking effective measures to expedite the publication which, as they wrote a little later, they counted as "that which we judge might be of public repute unto the work." That they had an eye on more substantial things than reputation is suggested by the observation in the letter of April 28, 1660, that "a happy progress made by the return of the next ships may much further contribution with relation to it." They had taken steps to make such progress possible



by concluding arrangements, a week prior to the date of that letter, with a competent London printer, Marmaduke Johnson, who signed articles of agreement to go to Cambridge in Massachusetts and work there for three years.

The Corporation was enabled to secure the services of a much more skilful craftsman than might otherwise have been possible, apparently because his disreputable wife refused to let go her hold upon him. Johnson seems to have been a man with respectable connections, and to have been honestly anxious to free himself from the entanglements resulting no doubt from youthful indiscretions. Unluckily, however naturally, he said nothing about his personal reasons for leaving London, when he reached New England. The story of course got about just as soon as he manifested a desire to connect himself with the established printer of the colony, by marrying the latter's daughter. The father objected to this trifling with his good name, and had Johnson haled before the court, which ordered him to return forthwith to his lawful spouse. The righteous indignation of the Cambridge authorities cooled quickly, however, and the sentence was suspended, as soon as it was suggested that this action would be likely to annoy the members of the Corporation. About this time the man who had taken Johnson's place in London got rid of both their troubles by putting the woman on board a ship which sailed before she came to discover where she was. She died on the voyage, so that the ship-master lost the passage money he expected to secure by selling her in the West Indies. Johnson married suitably somewhat later, and became a respected citizen of Cambridge.

When Johnson reached New England in the summer of 1660, the local printer, Samuel Green, had made a substantial beginning with the Gospels. He finished one sheet, containing the first

eight pages of Matthew, in time to send it to London by a vessel sailing in the autumn or early winter of 1659. In acknowledging this the ensuing April, the Corporation suggested that the number printed be increased from a thousand to fifteen hundred. It is not clear that this suggestion was complied with. In 1664, in reply to repeated requests for the information, the Commissioners reported that the number of copies of the Bible printed was "upward of a thousand." It is known that some copies of the New Testament were bound separately, presumably as soon as finished, and it may be that there were five hundred of these, to make the number asked for by the Corporation. If so, it would seem probable that five hundred additional copies must have been printed of the sheets finished by Green before the arrival of the letter dated in London April 28. These sheets would have had to be set in type a second time and could hardly avoid being typographically distinguishable from the others, double in number, of the first impression.

The sheets of the Gospel of John begin a new set of signature marks, with Aa, Luke ending with L4. This presumably marks the place where Johnson began. It also shows that Green had probably made a beginning on Luke, but not necessarily that he had finished it. The New Testament was completed before the September meeting of the Commissioners in 1661.

The Old Testament had been started, and the five Books of Moses finished, by September, 1661. Two years later, on September 18, 1663, the Commissioners were able to report that the whole Bible was done. On the ensuing April 21, the President of the Corporation, the Hon. Robert Boyle, wrote to Eliot "I waited this day upon the King with your translation of the Bible." Copies reached London between January 14 and February 26, the date of the meeting at which twenty were

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ordered to be bound. One of the first of these to be finished was undoubtedly that in which was inscribed the name of the *Lady Armine* on March 24, 1664, described in the Catalogue of the Library of E. D. Church and now belonging to Mr. Henry E. Huntington.

The Eliot Indian Bible is a solid quarto of the period, consisting of 600 printed leaves. The volume is described with minute detail, including the text of pertinent documents and passages from the correspondence relating to it, and an account of each copy located, by Wilberforce Eames in J. C. Pilling's "Bibliography of the Algonquian Indian Language," published by the United States Bureau of Ethnology, Washington, D. C., 1890. Except for the record of the few copies that have come to light since that date, there is nothing of importance to add to Mr. Eames's statements, although these records of the action taken by the Corporation complete some of the details in the story of this extraordinary undertaking.

### THE CORPORATION AND THE FUNDS

The Bible was completed by the reorganized Company. The Charter of 1662 had transferred the controlling influence on its affairs from the Treasurer to the Governor, from the mercantile to the intellectual interest. This was accompanied by a corresponding spiritual loss. The dominating impression left upon a reader of the letters that passed between Corporation and Commissioners during the Society's first decade is one of high integrity and serious consideration of the obligations assumed by those who had undertaken this trust. There is repeated evidence of careful attention to the proper use of the income in accordance with a strict regard for the purposes for which the money had been contributed. Those responsible for

the management of this business seemed constantly alert to protect its good name and conscious of the responsibilities imposed by their reputation as men of character and of high commercial standing.

This is not so evident after the Restoration. There was no falling off in the carefulness or the integrity of the London merchants, as these records abundantly prove. The Commissioners continued to oversee the expenditures and to complain of wastefulness as faithfully as before. There is even more of Scriptural language on both sides, but the quantity does not add any feeling of probity or of sincerity. It is obvious in a score of passages that in London and in New England there was a realization that the responsibility had passed to other hands. These others, on both sides of the ocean, were less interested in their financial than in their intellectual, or academic and literary, reputation.

The Puritan Corporation had not escaped criticism, particularly in the early months while the general contribution was being collected. In April, 1651, they wrote "Tis strange to see what and how many objections arise against the work, some from the ill management of former gifts bestowed on the country of New England . . . some upon ourselves the Corporation as if we had so much per pound of what is collected or might feast ourselves liberally therewith, whereas through mercy we never yet eat or drank of the fruit or charge of it; and neither have had or expect a penny or penny worth for all the pains we shall take." Made up as it was, the Corporation could hardly avoid having dealings with its own members. This was especially true during the first years when its remittances were made in the form of commodities either for sale on the Boston market or for direct distribution to the missionaries and the native

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converts or prospects. Among the members who attended the meetings regularly were merchants who dealt in these articles and who were engaged in the business of shipping goods to New England. Supplies were naturally secured from and sent forward by these members. A careful reading of the accounts does not reveal anything that justifies the slightest suspicion that advantage was taken of these opportunities by the Londoners. The amounts and the distribution of the payments suggest only the normal handling of commercial matters by men who were not afraid to do business with their associates when this was to the benefit of all concerned.

A single phrase in the records, at the time when the funds were transferred to a new treasurer, is the only entry that raises a question whether those who were active in the management of the Society may have secured an incidental profit out of it. This is in the vote that the executors of the late treasurer were not to be held responsible for nearly a thousand pounds "now remaining in several members hands." This may mean that some of his colleagues shared with the Treasurer the temporary use of the large balance ordinarily carried by the Society, for the safe keeping of which a strong iron box was provided with three different keys. There are other explanations which are equally likely, at a time when London was getting ready for the return to Royal government. There is nothing elsewhere to justify any suspicion of what is regarded in later codes of official morality as improper. If the active members of the Corporation had been in the habit of using their opportunities for their personal enrichment, this could hardly have failed to reach the ears of Hugh Peter, who could not have kept the gossip to himself. The Commissioners in New England would also have heard of it, and they were on more than one occasion called to

account by the Corporation because of apparent laxness in handling the funds transmitted to them. This would not have been done quite so straitforwardly by men whose own doings might have been subjected to a retaliatory challenge.

There are many reasons why the Commissioners never showed as painstaking faithfulness to the interests of the Society as did the Corporation. They came together only once a year, and the money was spent chiefly in the Bay Colony, of which the other three were openly jealous. Their Commissioners were constantly on the watch to prevent Massachusetts from getting any more than could be helped of the advantages which inevitably went with its larger population and greater wealth. In practice, nearly all the business was transacted by the officials of the Bay, and its Secretary, Edward Rawson, was the clerk or factor of the Society in America.

The obvious advantages of having some of the Society's funds invested near the seat of its operations early led the Corporation to consider the possibility of entrusting a portion of its capital to the Commissioners. The latter urged that this be done, and were willing to undertake the added responsibility. They could not, however, give the constant personal supervision which was exercised so loyally in London, and in consequence their management of the funds sent to them did not encourage the sending of larger amounts. More than once the Corporation observed that the Commissioners did not get as large a return for the money remitted to them as was currently obtained by the members who were engaged in the New England trade. There were questions also concerning the security of the balances in Boston, which were let out at interest until needed for the work. In 1653 the goods sent over to be turned into money were disposed of advantageously to customers who were

trusted to pay when the money should be required for salaries and other expenses. When that time came the debts could not be collected. To the Commissioners this seemed a simple and adequate explanation of their inability to let Eliot have the money he had expected. He, and the merchants to whom he was indebted, were not inconvenienced, because he promptly drew a bill of exchange for the amount he needed, on the Treasurer in London. The Corporation, as was anticipated, ordered that the bill be paid when it was presented, but at the same time pointed out to the Commissioners that bad debts were undesirable not only because they upset calculations but even more because they confirmed the low reputation of the New Englanders which had already been such a handicap to the Society.

The attempt to increase the amount available for the Indian work by shipping merchantable goods instead of sending funds through the channels of commercial credit, which already existed in an embryonic stage, was a source of repeated friction and annoyance. The missionaries, Eliot and Mayhew, naturally desired to improve their own allowances by getting the advantage of whatever profit there was to be made. They could see no reason why they should not receive the articles which they would otherwise have had to buy, at the cost price to the Corporation in London, without paying the profit and expenses of transportation charged by the Boston store-keepers. The Corporation, under the pressure of Eliot's letters, suggested that it would make less trouble in England if this were done. The Commissioners demurred, influenced no doubt by the difficulties which such a practice would be certain to create for the local merchants in a small community. Eliot also complained that the quality of the goods sent from London was not what he

wanted for his own use. When in 1654 he questioned the amount debited his account for two hats he had selected, the Commissioners authorized Secretary Rawson to charge off the amount in dispute, as "we would not for two or three shillings give him any occasion to think or say we are less favorable to him." The necessity of keeping accounts accurately continued to rankle, and a year later the Commissioners, who were trying to arrange Eliot's salary, wrote him; "how you could mistake our meaning concerning your allowance is yet to us unknown. . . . We still conceive that there was some small difference betwixt Mr. Rawson's account and yours in the tools you received but we put little weight there and marvel how you should think our meaning should be shoes and stockings."

The strained relations between Eliot and the Commissioners also led to the proposal that it would simplify matters if the payments to the missionaries were made by bills of exchange drawn directly by them on the Society's Treasurer. This did not commend itself to the Commissioners, who foresaw the trouble that was certain to ensue in case the bills were sold, by persons unaccustomed to business conditions, to those who were ready to offer the highest rate for the exchange, but who might not be as ready to turn over the proceeds after they received the money, a danger apparently likely to occur in the then state of commercial relations. These various discussions led the Corporation in 1656 to decline to agree to the proposal that a larger balance be kept in New England, to guard against the danger of interruption of communication through the increasing activity of the enemies of the Protectorate. Three years later this decision was reconsidered, but the falling off in gifts and the disinclination of tenants to pay rents left the treasury without surplus funds.



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Changing conditions in England as well as in the Company, and the difficulty of making a satisfactory purchase of landed property after the London Fire, led the Corporation in 1669 to send a fund to Boston for investment. This was a gift of £360 secured by Governor Boyle from a worthy French gentleman and lawyer whose name was pronounced Mowsche or Mouches or Moutche — the spelling Montrye which occurs in the printed copy of the draft of Boyle's letter of instructions being probably an indication that the Governor wrote rather hastily, and badly. This amount was transferred to the Commissioners, yielding at 25% advance £450 in New England money. Boyle wrote that this money "we would have put out at interest and the interest being £36 each year paid to some Godly able man for preaching to the Indians. . . . This is our present thoughts for the dispose of this money but possibly may alter and therefore desire you will advise us what annuity this will purchase for ten years (losing the principal) to be paid in money and what to be paid in country pay, and which may be best for the carrying on the work designed, also we would know what yearly rent it will purchase of an inheritance being desirous of its greatest improvement and kept intire as this good man's gift." Two years later the Corporation reminded the Commissioners that they desired "A note or account yearly by itself how the proceeds of the £360 given by that worthy French Gent: Mr. Mouches shall be yearly bestowed." The Commissioners reported in their letter of September, 1672; "Concerning Mr. Mouch his gift, we expect it will be returned into our hands this next autumn; and considering the trouble we find to get in the rent, and difficulty to secure the principal, we fear we shall not be able to make so good improvement thereof as formerly, but shall not be wanting to do the best we can therein." The

best they had been able to do with the money before this was a return of £31:10:00 New England money, annual interest.

The outlook for sound investments in England did not improve, and in 1674 the Corporation again threw the responsibility upon their colleagues in Boston. In 1679 Governor Boyle added £300 to the £2000 already sent over "to be put forth upon Improvement." In 1681 £560:10:00 was added, "it being this Company's endeavor that there may be such a stock in New England as that the improvement thereof may carry on the work if a supply should fail from hence." At the same time they notified the Commissioners, perhaps incautiously, that if the latter were obliged to use more money than had been remitted for current purposes, they might have liberty to take what was necessary out of the improvement of the stock. The result was inevitable.

The Bibles printed fifteen years before had disappeared during the confusion of King Philip's War, and Eliot urgently besought the Corporation to permit him to print a new edition. In August, 1679, they granted £250 for the cost of printing the New Testament and the Reading Psalms, at the same time voting to lay out £100 for 500 English Bibles. They also sent Eliot a special gift of £30, of which Boyle gave one-third, in order that he might establish relations with a remote tribe which he was assured could understand his translation. He acknowledged these contributions on November 4, 1680, writing to Boyle: "I do religiously keep [the £30] to be improved to the same end, to which your honor gave it, of which service I am still in hope, having more intelligence, that there is such a people. But by the immaturity of some occurrences and the intentions of the ship's speedy sailing, I cannot give your honor any further diversion at this time."

With the money in sight, and receiving no reply to his requests for authority to begin printing the Old Testament, Eliot put the work in hand on his own responsibility. A private gift which reached him opportunely supplied the funds with which to meet the outlay immediately necessary, and he added to this something from his own salary. His courage had its reward, as he wrote to the Governor on November 27, 1683; "Although my hasty venturing to begin the impression of the Old Testament before I had your honor's *fiat* may have moved (as some intimate) some disgust, yet I see that your love, bounty and charity, doth still breathe out encouragement unto the work, by supplies of £460 unto the work, for which I do return my humble thankfulness to your honour, and take boldness to intreat favour for two requests.

"First, I pray, that you would please to accept an apology for my haste. I am deep in years, and sundry say, if I do not procure it printed while I live, it is not within the prospect of human reason, whether ever, or when, or how, it may be accomplished. It is Christ's work and for the good of souls, which is my charge to attend, and run adventures to accomplish, especially when divine providence brought into my hand some small encouragement to begin.

"My second humble request is, that you would please to draw a curtain of love over all my failures, because love will cover a multitude of transgressions. The work goeth on now, with more comfort, though we have had many impediments, partly by sickness of the workmen, for it is a very sickly and mortal time with us, as also the rigour of the winter doth now obstruct us."

The printing of 2000 copies of the second edition of the Bible was completed in the autumn of 1685. Those sent to

London contained a leaf dedicating the work to Governor Boyle and to the Corporation, which is dated October 23, 1685. They doubtless arrived soon after the last meeting recorded in the present volume.

The capital deposited in New England continued to be increased by the annual surplus, although the Corporation expressed its anxiety regarding the proper investment and security of the fund. In 1684 they wrote that "this Company is a little surprised that they find by the accompt of the stock by them at several times remitted to New England that the profit and improvement thereof is so small and that it is the desire of this Company that for the future in the yearly accompts of their stock to be sent from New England it may be particularly expressed in whose hands the several sums of money by this Company remitted and to be remitted and disposed of for and as stock shall from time to time be in and that for the satisfaction of some misinformed persons there may be as exact an accompt as can be taken and sent over to this Company in the next letters of the number of all the Indian converts." The printed records do not tell what happened to these investments. They seem to have disappeared by the time of the next glimpse at the Company's activities, twenty-five years later. The Corporation did not again try the experiment of laying down a large charitable foundation in Boston. If the original remittances, amounting to over £3000, had been so administered as to lead to further enlargement, it is probable that a considerable portion of the funds that now pertain to the New England Company in London would have passed into the custody of the Treasurer of Harvard College.

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## BIBLIOGRAPHY

This volume supplements five previous publications prepared for the purpose of informing the members of the New England Company concerning its history. Two of these were written by Major Daniel Gookin, one of the Company's instruments in America, in 1674 and 1677. The first of these was referred to a committee at the meeting of the Corporation on March 24, 1674/5, with instructions to prepare it for the press. If it had been printed, it would have been the last of the series of "Eliot Indian Tracts." The news of the outbreak of King Philip's war reached London before anything more was done, and the manuscript, so far as known, disappeared. Fortunately Gookin kept a copy, which remained in his family for at least half a century. In 1741 it was produced at the hearings of the Commission which determined the boundary between Massachusetts and Rhode Island, where it was cited by the Rev. Thomas Prince. When the Massachusetts Historical Society was founded, this manuscript became one of its original possessions, and it is printed in the first volume of the Society's *Collections*, issued in 1792, pages 141-229. The title reads:

Historical Collections of the Indians in New England. Of their several nations, numbers, customs, manners, religion and government, before the English planted there.

Also a true and faithful Account of the present state and condition of the Praying Indians (or those who have visibly received the gospel in New England) declaring the Number of that people, the situation and place of their Towns and Churches, and their manner of worshipping God, and divers other matters appertaining thereto.

Together with a brief Mention of the Instruments or Means, that God hath been pleased to use for their Civilizing and Conversion, briefly declaring the prudent and faithful endeavours of

The Right Honourable the Corporation at London, for promoting that affair.

Also suggesting some Expedients for their further Civilizing and propāgating the Christian faith among them.

By Daniel Gookin, Gentleman. One of the Magistrates of Massachusetts Colony in New England, who hath been for sundry years past, and is at present, betruſted and employed for the civil government and conduct of the Indians in Massachusetts Colony, by order of the General Court there.

Now first printed from the Original Manuscript. MDCCXCII.

Major Gookin supplemented this three years later with

An Historical Account of the doings and sufferings of The Christian Indians in New England, in the years 1675, 1676, 1677. Impartially drawn by one well acquainted with that affair, and presented unto the Right Honourable the Corporation residing in London, appointed by the King's Most Excellent Majesty for promoting the Gospel among the Indians in America.

The Epistle Dedicatory to Governor Boyle is dated December 18th, 1677. It was printed by the American Antiquarian Society in the second volume of its "Archaeologia Americana" or *Transactions*, Cambridge (Worcester, Massachusetts), 1836, pp. 423-534. An accompanying letter from Jared Sparks, dated Cambridge, Sept. 4th, 1835, explains that "Five years ago, I obtained the manuscript from the Rev. Mr. Campbell, of Pittsburg, who had recently brought it from England. It was put into his hands by a clergyman in that country. . . . Mr. Campbell told me that he had promised to return the original to its owner in England."

The other volumes were issued by the Company for its members, and are based upon the archives in the custody of its clerk. The first, dated two years after the sale of the Eriswell

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property had attracted attention to this foundation, contains xv & 353 pages, and is entitled:

History of the New England Company, from its incorporation, in the seventeenth century, to the present time including A Detailed Report of the Company's Proceedings for the Civilization and Conversion of Indians, Blacks, and Pagans in the Dominion of Canada, British Columbia, the West Indies, and S. Africa, during the two years 1869-1870. Completed and Printed for Circulation among the Members of the Company, by direction of the General Court, held 13th December, 1870. London: printed by Taylor and Co., Little Queen Street. 1871.

The volume is illustrated by a map and three plans of the Company's Canadian stations. The acquisition of the various properties is described in detail, with careful statements of current financial and missionary operations. The first appendix gives the text of the Order in Council for the Charter, April 10, 1661, and the minutes for the meetings in the year 1662, which are reprinted in this volume in their chronological place. Besides the meetings of 1662, it contains the record for 17 February, 1698, 11 June, 1700, and 22 February, 1720. These were the only early records, of earlier date than 1770, in the Company's possession, according to a letter from the clerk, Dr. W. M. Venning, printed on page 181, vol. VI, of the *Transactions* of the Colonial Society of Massachusetts for April, 1899.

Henry William Busk, Esq., who was elected a member of the Company on July 30, 1830, compiled a volume of 91 pages & Errata slip, entitled:

A Sketch of the Origin and the Recent History of the New England Company by the Senior Member of the Company. Printed by Spottiswoode & Co., New-Street Square, London. 1884.

This contains the text of the Charter of February 7, 1661-2, and a list of the Governors, Treasurers, and Members since 1662, compiled by Dr. Venning from the Minute Books and papers then in the possession of the Company.

Governor John W. Ford prepared a volume of xxxii & 127 pages entitled:

Some Correspondence between the Governors and Treasurers of the New England Company in London and the Commissioners of the United Colonies in America, the Missionaries of the Company and others Between the Years 1657 and 1712, to which are added the Journals of the Rev. Experience Mayhew in 1713 and 1714, Printed from the Originals in the possession of the New England Company by Spottiswoode & Co., London, 1806. Privately printed.

Some copies were issued for sale with the imprint on the title: "London, Elliot Stock, 62 Paternoster Row, E. C. 1897."

William Marshall Venning, D.C.L., M.A., and for many years clerk of the Company, read a brief paper on the "Origin of the New England Company London with an Account of its Labours on behalf of the North American Indians" at the meeting of the Royal Historical Society in June, 1884, which is printed in its *Transactions*, New Series, II; pp. 293-301.

G. D. Scull, of Oxford, who contributed the Bodleian documents to the *New-England Historical and Genealogical Register*, summarized what he knew of its history in the issue for April, 1882, where there is also a note by John Ward Dean, the Editor of the *Register*, giving the references to the correspondence between the Corporation and the Commissioners in the *Acts* of the latter, as printed in volumes IX and X of the Plymouth Colony Records, Boston, 1859.

Henry H. Edes prepared a concise note explaining the con-



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fusing names by which the Corporation is referred to, and giving the important facts of its history, for the *Transactions* of the Colonial Society of Massachusetts, VI; pp. 180-182.

Rev. Charles A. Briggs, D.D., whose article on "The Romance of a Cash-Book" in *Scribner's Magazine* for March, 1898 is mentioned on a previous page, gave an account of the Corporation in Appendix v, pages xxxvi-xxxix, to his "American Presbyterianism," New York, 1885.

Also the petitions of John Hooper and Anthony Trayford late Clerk and Messenger to the late reputed Corporation was ordered to be read and upon hearing and consideration thereof the Court made choice of and ordered that the said John

Memor.: the Salaries were respited till some other meeting.

Hooper should be registered as Clerk and Anthony Trayford Messenger to this Company.

The same day the Court ordered that new books should be provided for the use of the Corporation and at the beginning of one of them the Charter to be fairly entered and a Breviate of the Charter written out for the more expedient use of the Company upon all occasions at their meetings.

Also the same day It was ordered that the Seal of the late reputed Corporation for Propagating the Gospel in New England etc., be altered as soon as conveniently it may, and as much of the Title of the new Charter put into the Inscription thereof as it will admit of.

This day also it was ordered that the account of Mr. Henry Ashurst late Treasurer to the late reputed Corporation be audited and that Mr. Alderman Peake Mr. Thomas Foley and Mr. John Rolfe members of this Company be desired and are hereby authorized to audit the said Mr. Ashurst his account or any two of them.

Ordered also that the account from the Commissioners at New England be audited by Mr. Henry Ashurst and Erasmus Smith Esq. members of this Company who are also added to the three former auditors.

Also ordered that a particular of the names of the late Commissioners in New England be prepared and presented at the next Court.

Ordered this day also that Mr. Alderman Peake Mr. Richard Hutchinson Mr. Alderman Warner Mr. Henry Ashurst Mr. Joshua Woolnough and Mr. Thomas Bell members of this Company or any two of them, be and are by this Company desired to speak with Mr. Broadstreete and Mr. Norton and others lately come from New England and desire them to give their opinions

who are the fittest persons to be employed as Commissioners in New England for the managing of the work there and to make report thereof at the next Court.

This day also it was ordered that notice and warning be given of the Charter to all the tenants of the lands and tenements heretofore purchased limited or appointed for the uses therein mentioned and that they pay not any of the arrears of rents or profits of the lands by them holden nor any of the growing rents hereafter to grow due nor any other moneys remaining in their hands for the uses aforesaid to any person or persons whatsoever other than to the Treasurer or Treasurers appointed or to be appointed by the Governor and Company.

Also at this Court the Right Hon. the Earl of Anglesey a member of this Corporation made known that Mr. Secretary Morrice, having a hundred pounds left in his hands to dispose of to charitable uses was pleased to add fifty pounds more of his own thereunto and give it unto this Corporation for the uses specified in the Charter. At this Court (after the Orders of the last Court were read) Mr. Alderman Peake Thomas Foley Esq. and Mr. John Rolfe members of this Corporation according to the orders of the last Court of the 27th of March last Reported their auditing of Mr. Henry Ashurst his account late Treasurer to the late reputed Corporation whereupon it was ordered by this Court that the said account should be entered into a book and that the said Mr. Alderman Peake Thos. Ordered also at this Court that three or four more (besides the Lord Chancellor) of the Lords' names members of this Corporation be inserted in the letters to be written to the tenants of the said Corporation.

The Court after much conference with Mr. Norton and Mr. Broadstreete lately come from New England about the good work of propagating the Gospel amongst the heathen natives in New England etc. and in conclusion found it most expedient that for this year the said work should be carried on as formerly by such Commissioners as the several Colonies made choice of. Also this Court desired Mr. Henry Ashurst Treasurer to this Corporation to signify by letter to the Commissioners at New England for their encouragement in carrying on so good a work this new Corporation hath taken order for the payment of £800 which they wrote about whereof £500 is already paid and that the said Corporation would use all means possibly they could for the perfecting so good a work and to desire the said Commissioners that they would forward the said work with all care and diligence and with all prudence in respect of charge because at present the Corporation stock is very low and the greatest part of their revenue unrighteously withheld from them which will be very chargeable to regain. And also that this Corporation desires that the said Commissioners would call to their

assistance all such persons whether Ministers or others that may be useful unto them in their meetings and to send over unto this Corporation as near as they can estimate how much the remainder of the Bible that is yet to print will cost.

Likewise ordered by this Court that the letters of information and warning to Mr. John Cheston and Mr. James Parker at Eriswell in Suffolk tenants to this Corporation be carried by a messenger of their own from London which was committed to the care of Mr. Henry Ashurst Treasurer to this Corporation and Mr. John Rolfe a member of the same.
