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## NOTE TO THE REVISED EDITION OF 1889.

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I HAVE found *Gradatim* to be a most useful book to accompany and supplement the first year's work in Latin. The Latin is pure, simple, and idiomatic, easily understood by the young learners, interesting, and even amusing. If Cæsar must be read as the first classical author, this book may be very happily used for some weeks to smooth the way, by giving practice in translating easy Latin. The enormous sale of the book in England shows how helpful it has proved to teachers in Latin there. The work of revision has consisted mainly in rewriting the first twenty anecdotes,—in which the authors made the unhappy experiment of writing the Latin in English order,—marking the quantity of long vowels everywhere, and correcting the vocabulary, which was unusually rich in mistakes.

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THE above note shows at what point this second revision has been taken up. It was my purpose to do little

more than correct errors that had been overlooked in previous impressions, and make certain omissions; but prolonged examination suggested other changes, together with additions so various and important that it has seemed necessary to modify the title in order to distinguish this edition from the book in its earlier form.

Thirty-four anecdotes have been omitted. Some of these seemed rather pointless, others a little questionable in tone or taste.

By permission of the author of *Fabulae Faciles*, Mr. F. Ritchie, the Story of the Argonauts and the Story of Ulysses, amounting to nearly thirty pages, have been added.

Some important principles of grammar have been added, emphasized, or expanded.

Notes explaining such difficulties as it has been found embarrass and delay young pupils are given at the end of the reading lessons.

Finally, immediately following each anecdote, from two to ten of the words that occur in the text are set down, chosen out as likely to be the least familiar to the learner, and either defined by more familiar Latin words, or having references to places where they have occurred in preceding anecdotes. It is most important to encourage students in every way to form the habit, when they meet with what seems a new word, or a familiar word in a new sense, of trying to recall its previous occurrence, instead of turning at once to the vocabulary, or to a lexicon.

The need of putting some easy Latin into the hands of pupils very early in their study, to accompany and supplement the learning of forms and the elements of syntax, is now happily coming to be realized, and it is hoped that *The New Gradatim* will be found to supply exactly that want.

The Stories of the Argonauts and of Ulysses, abounding as they do in the words, idioms, and constructions of Cæsar's *Gallic War*, ought to make it easy for the pupil to pass from them to *The Gate to Cæsar*; but it will generally be better to interpose not a little easy and rapid reading for the sake of an enlarged vocabulary.

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## PRONUNCIATION.

Consonants generally have the same sounds as in English. But observe the following:—

<sup>2</sup> In *qu*, and also commonly in *gu* and *su* before a vowel, *u* is a semi-vowel or consonant, is pro-

nounced like *w*, and joined in utterance with the preceding letter.

<sup>3</sup> *I-consonant*, that is, before a vowel in the same syllable.

<sup>4</sup> Never like *z*.

<sup>5</sup> Never like *sh*.

## DECLENSION.

**4. Nouns** are the *Names* of Things.  
In English we say,—

The *wasp* killed the bee.

The *bee* killed the wasp.

In these sentences the words “wasp” and “bee” are unchanged; though in one the “wasp” *does* the action, and the “bee” *suffers* the action. In the other the opposite is true. The order only has been altered.

In Latin this difference is expressed, not by altering the order, but by changes in the form of the word called case-endings.

NOMINATIVE. **vespa, apis**, when the wasp or the bee *does* the action.

ACCUSATIVE. **vespam, apem**, when the wasp or the bee *suffers* the action.

**Vespa apem necāvit.** *The wasp killed the bee.*

**Vespam apis necāvit.** *The bee killed the wasp.*

Pronouns are the only words in English which have different forms for nominative and accusative.

Nom. I ; who.

Acc. me ; whom.

**5.** Besides the nominative and accusative, Latin has three other cases,

### Genitive, Dative, Ablative,

the meaning of which is expressed in English by prepositions, *of*, *to*, *by*, etc.

GENITIVE. **hastārum**, *of spears*.

DATIVE. **hastae**, *to a spear*.

ABLATIVE. **hastā**, *with a spear*.

**6.** There are thus in Latin five cases in the singular, each with its own ending, and the same number in the plural.

To give these changes in the form of a noun is called *declining* a noun.

There are also two other cases, the *vocative* and the *locative*. The *vocative* is used of the person addressed, but it has always the same form as the nominative, except in nouns in *-us* of the second declension. The *locative* is almost confined to names of towns, and expresses the idea of *at*, *in*, *on*.

### CONJUGATION.

**7. Verbs** express actions.

Actions are done by different persons : we express this difference in *English* by placing pronouns before the verb, sometimes (but not often) altering its form also.

*I love, you love, he (or she) loves.*

In *Latin* there is a special form for each person, both in the singular and the plural, therefore the pronoun need not be used.

**amō**, *I love*; **amās**, *you love*; **amat**, *he loves*.

All nouns are of the third person; if, therefore, a noun is used, the verb will be in the third person.

**avēs cantant**, *birds sing*.

**8.** Actions differ also in the time in which they are done; they may be *present*, *past*, or *future*. In English, to express this difference, we use other verbs, called *auxiliary* or helping verbs, though there is also a special form for *past* time.

PRESENT. *I love, am loving, or do love.*

PAST. *I was loving, used to love, did love, loved.*

FUTURE. *I shall love.*

In Latin there are special *tense-forms* to express these differences of time.

PRESENT. **amō**, *I love, am loving, or do love.*

PAST. **amābam**, *I was loving, used to love, did love, loved.*

FUTURE. **amābō**, *I shall love.*

To give these special tense-forms is called *conjugating* a verb.

In Latin the present is often used of a past act, as in English, for the sake of greater vividness. See examples in the first and second anecdotes.

**SUBJECT AND PREDICATE.**

**9.** Sentences are divided into *subject* and *predicate*.

The *subject* is the person or thing talked about.

The *predicate* is what is said about the subject.

The subject may be—

*Simple*: One noun.

*Birds sing.*

*Qualified*: Noun with words added to it to tell you something more about the subject.

*Small birds sing.*

*Composite*: Two or more nouns.

*Blackbirds and thrushes sing.*

The predicate may be—

One verb.

*Birds sing.*

Verb with qualifying word or words.

*Birds sing sweetly.*

Verb with governed word or words.

*Birds sing sweet songs.*

In Latin the subject and predicate may both be contained in a single word.

*cantāmus, we sing.*

**10.** Special attention must be paid in *Latin* to certain RULES, which are not so necessary in English.

RULE 1.—The verb must be of the same person and number as its nominative.

*corvī cantant, ravens croak.*

*corvī cantō* would mean, *ravens I croak*, which would be nonsense.

#### INTRANSITIVE VERBS.

**11.** When an action affects only the doer the verb is called *intransitive*, because its action does not pass across from the doer to anything else.

*maneō, I remain.*

## TRANSITIVE VERBS.

But when an action affects some person or thing besides the doer the verb is called *transitive*, because the action *passes across* from the doer to the other person or thing, and this latter is put into the accusative case.

**RULE 2.**—When used *transitively*, verbs govern the accusative case.

1. **periculum vidēbitis**, *you will see danger.*
2. **timēmus lupum**, *we fear the wolf.*
3. **amicōs advocationē**, *we call to friends.*
4. **intrō aquam**, *I enter the water.*

SUBJECT.	PREDICATE.
1. <b>puer</b>	<b>taurum vulnerābit</b> , <i>the boy will wound the bull.</i>
2. <b>taurus</b>	<b>vulnerat puerum</b> , <i>the bull wounds the boy.</i>
3. <b>magister</b>	<b>puellam docēbit</b> , <i>the master will teach the girl.</i>
4. <b>fossae</b>	<b>agrōs terminant</b> , <i>ditches bound the fields.</i>

**12.** Care must be taken not to confuse the accusative case with the dative. These are easily confused in English, since the preposition *to*, which is the sign of the *dative*, is frequently left out.

**RULE 3.**—The dative is the case of the recipient, or the person (or thing) who is interested in an action but does not actually suffer it.

I give sugar *to the wasp*.  
I give *the wasp* sugar.

What I give is *sugar*; the *wasp* receives it, and is interested in what I do.

### ADJECTIVES.

**13.** An **adjective** is a word added to a noun to distinguish it from others like it.

In English, adjectives have only one form.

In Latin, many adjectives have three terminations in each case, one for each of the three genders,—masculine, feminine, and neuter.

Possessive adjectives agree in Latin with the *thing possessed*, and are not affected as in English by the gender of the *possessor*.

**taurus vulnerāvit suam dominam,** *the bull wounded his mistress.*

**RULE 4.**—An adjective must be put in the same gender, number, and case as the noun with which it is used.

**saevus oculus**, *savage eye.*

**clāra aqua**, *clear water.*

**vir est bonus, the man is good.**

In English the gender of a word is always settled by the *meaning*, but in Latin there is more difficulty, for it is settled generally, not by the meaning, but by the *form* of a word.

*eye* is neuter in English.

**oculus** is masculine in Latin.

RULE 5.—A noun used to limit or define another, and not meaning the same person or thing, is put in the genitive.

## APPOSITION.

15. RULE 6.—When a descriptive noun is joined to another, meaning the same person or thing, it is called an **appositive**. An appositive agrees in case with the noun which it limits.

1. verberābō Cāium, malum puerum, *I shall beat Caius, a bad boy.*
2. membra Pompeī, servi Āfrī, sunt nigra, *the limbs of Pompey, the African slave, are black.*
3. Rōmāni oppidum Vēiōs oppūgnābunt, *the Romans will besiege the town Veii.*
4. dabimus argentum poētae, nostrō amicō, *we shall give silver to the poet, our friend.*

**16.** The ablative case generally qualifies a verb like an adverb, and answers the questions, how? why? when? where?

He slew him, *with a sword, from hatred, at night, in the street.*

OBS. 1.— The conjunction **-que**, *and*, cannot stand by itself, but is joined to the end of the word to which it belongs.

**puerī puellaeque. puerī et puellae**

OBS. 2.— Latin has no article; therefore in translating a noun think whether you ought to put in *a* or *the* before it or not.

OBS. 3.— The possessive pronouns *my, his, their*, etc., are often left out in Latin.

**servī vidēbant dominum, the slaves saw their master.**

### ORDER.

**17.** English, having so few case-endings, is tied down to a particular order of words.

The man swallowed the fish

*is different from*

The fish swallowed the man.

Latin has much more freedom.

homō dēvorāvit piscem,  
piscem homō dēvorāvit,  
piscem dēvorāvit homō,  
dēvorāvit piscem homō,

all mean, “The man swallowed the fish.”

While —

piscis dēvorāvit hominem,  
hominem piscis dēvorāvit, *etc.*,

all mean, “The fish swallowed the man.”

Thus the beginner must not be surprised to find —

- (1) The accusative before the verb ;
- (2) The nominative after the verb ;
- (3) The adjective after its noun.

**RULE 7.** — In making out the meaning, it is often best to take the words in the order in which they come ; but if this does not give the sense, look first for the verb ; it always points to, if it does not include, the nominative.

### ANECDOTES FOR TRANSLATION.

The figures under the Anecdotes refer to the Anecdotes by number and line. These references are designed to remind the learner of the previous occurrence of the same word, or of a word of the same family. If he has forgotten the meaning, he should look back, instead of referring again to the vocabulary. If the former meaning does not seem appropriate, the vocabulary should be consulted and the meanings in the two sentences be compared. It will be apparent that only a few of the words that are repeated have been selected for comparison.

Latin words are occasionally defined by other Latin words, supposed to be more familiar to the learner, mainly for the purpose of giving him increased readiness in reading and writing Latin, but the words defined and the definitions are no more exact synonyms than in similar cases in English.

The abbreviation *cf.* stands for *confer*, i.e., *compare*.

In Latin *interrogative words* are always used. The most common are —

*num*, expecting the answer *no*.

*nōnne*, expecting the answer *yes*

*-ne*, expecting the answer *yes or no*.

*-ne* is always joined to the first word in the sentence.

*will you give me or my brother an apple?*

**19.** Prepositions when used in Latin govern the accusative or ablative case.

The following govern the ablative case :

*ā, ab, absque, cōram, dē,*  
*palam, clam, cum, ex, and ē,*  
*sine, tenus, prō, and prae.*

Sometimes *in*, *sub*, *super*, *subter* govern the ablative.

All the other prepositions govern the accusative case.

*cum*, *with*, is joined to personal, reflexive, and relative pronouns.

*mē-cum*, *with me*, *vōbīs-cum*, *with you*, *quibus-cum*, *with whom*, etc.

**22.** (1) When two things are compared they are put into the same case and coupled by *quam*.

**amō tē magis quam eum,** *I love you more than him.*

(2) If the *first* is either in the nominative or accusative, the *second* may be put into the ablative, leaving out the *quam*.

**Iūlia sorōre pulchrior est,** *Julia is more beautiful than her sister.*

The comparative can often be translated by *too*, *rather*, *comparatively*, etc.

**tardius ambulāvit,** *he walked rather slowly.*

**longius ē nāvī errāvit,** *he wandered too far from the ship.*

### TIME.

**23.** (1) The time *during which* an action lasts is put into the accusative, sometimes with the preposition *per*.

**tōtam hiemem in urbe manēbat,** *he remained in the city during the whole of the winter.*

If the sentence is negative, the ablative is used.

**tōtā hieme lupum nōn vidi,** *I have not seen a wolf all the winter.*

(2) The time *when*, or *within which*, an action is done is put into the ablative without a preposition.

**mediā hieme ab urbe discēssit,** *he went away from the city in the middle of winter.*

Observe the phrases —

**multis post annīs,** *many years afterwards.*

**aliquot post mēnsēs,** *several months afterwards.*

**haud ita multō post,** *not long after.*

**ante annum,** *a year before.*

#### THE RELATIVE.

**24. (a)** The *Relative* is used to avoid repeating a word (called its antecedent) already used once.

*videō mūrum, quem Balbus aedificāvit, I see the wall, which Balbus built.*

If there were no relative, we should have to say,  
**videō mūrum et Balbus eum mūrum aedificāvit**, *I see the wall and Balbus built that wall.*

Thus it has also the force of a conjunction and serves to connect sentences.

**RULE 9.**—The *Relative* agrees with its antecedent in gender, number, and person.

1. **nōs, qui fortēs sumus, pūgnābimus**, *we, who are brave, will fight.*
2. **tū, quae parva es puella, nūtrīcem amās**, *you, who are a little girl, love the nurse.*

**RULE 10.**—The *Relative* is not necessarily in the same case as its antecedent, but in the case which its antecedent would be in if repeated.

1. **habēs asinum qui (asinus) est labōris patiēns**, *you have an ass which is patient of labor.*
2. **equus quem (equum) habēmus est celer**, *the horse which we have is fast.*
3. **virum cūius (virī) filius es amāmus**, *we love the man whose son you are.*
4. **hic est puer cui (puerō) pōma dēdimus**, *this is the boy to whom we gave the apples.*
5. **hasta quā (hastā) hostem occidistī erat ācris**, *the spear with which you killed the enemy was sharp.*

(b) A sentence containing a relative word is often called an adjectival clause, because it qualifies a substantive like an adjective.

**est mihi mēnsa quae est nigra**, *I have a black table.*

A relative clause may be omitted without altering the construction of any other word in the sentence.

(c) A relative word is often omitted in English but never in Latin.

**ubi est ea mēnsa quam herī vidi?** *where is the table I saw yesterday?*

(d) The relative always comes first in its own clause (except after prepositions), and generally next to the word it qualifies.

Relative words are—

qui, quālis, quantus,  
quō, quā, unde, ubi.

#### ACTIVE AND PASSIVE.

**25.** The Verb has two voices—

- (1) *Active*, when you do something;
- (2) *Passive*, when something is done to you.

In turning a sentence from an *active* into a *passive* form

accusative becomes nominative.  
nominative becomes ablative.

All other cases remain unchanged.

- I. { **ānsrēs Manlium ē somnō excitāvērunt**, *geese woke Manlius from sleep.*
- Manlius ē somnō ānsribus excitātus est**, *Manlius was wakened from sleep by geese.*

2. { puer necābit lupum, *the boy will kill a wolf.*  
     { lupus necābitur ā puerō, *a wolf will be killed by a boy.*
3. { cīvēs mīlitibus cībum dabant, *citizens will give soldiers food.*  
     { cībus mīlitibus ā cīvībus dabitur, *food will be given to soldiers by citizens.*
4. { Caesar cīvitātī ducentōs imperat obsidēs, *Cæsar makes a demand upon the state for two hundred hostages.*  
     { ducentī obsidēs cīvitātī imperantur ā Cæsare, *two hundred hostages are demanded of the state by Cæsar.*

(1) If the doer of the act is a *person*, the preposition **ā** or **ab** is used with the ablative. It is then called the *Ablative of the Agent*.

(2) Transitive verbs become intransitive in the passive.

faveō, noceō, serviō,  
invideō, nūbō, ignōscō,  
maledicō, indulgeō.

*magister, cui pārēmus, benignus est, the master whom we obey is kind.*

*parcit mihi, he spares me.*

These verbs are called “cui” verbs from the dative of the relative pronoun, with which they are sometimes used.

**RULE II.**—Many verbs compounded with *ad*, *ante*, *con*, *in*, *inter*, *ob*, *post*, *prae*, *prō*, *sub*, and *super*, take the dative.

### PLACE.

**28. (1)** *Place where* is expressed by the ablative with the preposition *in*.

*Exception.* Names of towns use an old case called the Locative.

The locative in the singular of declensions I. and II. is the same form as the genitive, elsewhere commonly the ablative.

These locatives are also found,

**domī**, *at home*,  
**rūrī**, *in the country*,  
**humī**, *on the ground*.

(2) *Place whither* is expressed by the accusative with *ad* or *in*.

*Exception.* Names of towns (also *domus* and *rūs*) omit the preposition.

“To,” when it means *towards*, is never the sign of the dative, but always of the accusative.

(3) *Place whence* is expressed by the ablative with *ab* or *ex*.

*Exception.* Names of towns (also *domus* and *rūs*) omit the preposition.

The name of a *small island* is treated as if it were a town.

1. **nāvēs Tarentī aedificātæ sunt**, *ships were built at Tarentum*.
2. **Periclēs Athēnīs habitābat**, *Pericles lived at Athens*.
3. **exercitus in Hispāniam missus est**, *an army was sent to Spain*.

## VERB.

**29.** Every Verb has two parts —

(1) *Finite*, limited by person.

**amō**, *I* love.

**amās**, *you* love.

**amat**, *he* loves.

(2) *Non-finite*, not limited by person.

**amāre**, *to* love.

The *Finite* part of the verb contains the indicative, subjunctive, and imperative moods.

The *Non-finite* part of the verb contains infinitives, gerunds, supines, and participles.

These are partly verb, partly substantive or adjective.

As Verb    (1) they govern cases.

              (2) they have tenses.

As Noun    (1) they follow the ordinary rules of number, gender, and case.  
or

Adjective    (2) they cannot form complete sentences.

## INFINITIVE.

**30.** The *Infinitive* is used —

(1) Like the nominative of an ordinary noun, as subject to a verb ; *e.g.* —

i. { **hōc pōmum est iūcundum**, *this apple is pleasant.*  
     { **edere est iūcundum**, *to eat is pleasant.*

2.  $\left\{ \begin{array}{l} \text{famēs nocet pueris, hunger is hurtful to boys.} \\ \text{nimium edere nocet pueris, to eat too much is hurtful} \\ \text{to boys.} \end{array} \right.$
3. *vidēre est crēdere, to see is to believe.*
4. *dare quam accipere melius est, to give is better than to receive.*
5. *Catō dicitur discessisse ex urbe, Cato is said to have gone from the city.*

(2) As accusative to such verbs as *possum*, *volō*, *audeō*, *soleō*, *cōnor*, *incipiō*, *statuō*, etc., which are not often found with the accusative of ordinary nouns.

1. *ex equīs pūgnāre solent, they are accustomed to fight on horseback.*
2. *potesne huīc persuādēre? are you able to persuade him?*

### SPACE.

**31.** In measuring *distance*, *height*, *breadth*, etc., the accusative is used.

1. *Britannia ā Galliā multa mīlia passuum abest, Britain is many miles distant from Gaul.*
2. *haec arbor est vīgintī duōs pedēs alta, this tree is twenty-two feet high.*

But when two things are compared, the *difference* between them is put into the ablative.

1. *multō plūrēs quam hostēs sumus, we are much more numerous than the enemy.*
2. *altus erat sex pedēs, pede altior quam soror, he was six feet high, a foot taller than his sister.*

### DOUBLE ACCUSATIVE.

**32.** Verbs which make sense with an accusative either of the *person* or of the *thing*, sometimes use both at once. This is called *Double Accusative*.

*tē philcsophiam docēbō, I will teach you philosophy.*

(1) With some verbs the accusative of the *thing* is generally expressed by the *present infinitive*.

*docēbō tē tacēre, I will teach you to be silent.*

*quis tē vetuit canere, who forbade your singing?*

*omnēs discēdere iussit, he ordered all to depart.*

*Cimbrōs prohibuērunt suōs finēs vāstāre, they kept the Cimbri from laying waste their territories.*

(2) If converted into the passive —

Accusative of *person* becomes nominative.

Accusative of *thing* remains.

**QUALITY.**

**33.** A *quality* is something peculiar in a man which distinguishes him from others.

**A man with a beard.**

In English *quality* is expressed —

By an *adjective*.

**A talented man.**

By the equivalent of the Latin *genitive*.

**A man of talents.**

By the equivalent of the Latin *ablative*.

**A man without talent.**

In Latin, if the genitive or ablative is used, an *epithet* must always be put in.

*vir ingeniōsus*, a talented man.

*vir summi ingeni*, a man of the highest talent.

*vir nūllō ingeniō*, a man without any talent.

*I have seen a robber* { *armed with a sword.*  
 { *who was armed.*

*The enemy,* { *conquered, sought for peace.*  
 { *when they had been conquered.*

4. **mīlitēs armīs impeditī fugere nōn potuērunt.**

*The soldiers,* { *hampered with their arms, could not flee.*  
 { *because they were hampered.*

5. **flūmen eōs trānsitūrōs equitēs oppressērunt.**

*The cavalry surprised them* { *about to cross the river.*  
 { *as they were on the point.*

*N.B.*—Remember that the past participle is passive, and do not translate it by *having*.

## PRICE AND VALUE.

**35.** *Fixed value* is expressed by the ablative; *unfixed value* is expressed by the genitive.

**36.** The relative is often used in Latin after a full stop. This does not make the sentence adjectival, but simply serves to connect it with what has gone before.

**RULE 12.**— After a full stop do not translate the relative by *who* or *which*, but by the demonstratives *he*, *this*, etc., with or without a conjunction.

### GERUNDS AND SUPINES.

**38.** *Gerunds and supines* are used to make up the cases of the verb-noun infinitive.

**amāre, loving; amandī, of loving; amandō, to or by loving.**

Thus the *gerunds* are used like the genitive, dative, and ablative, of ordinary nouns.

1. **amor bibendī, love of drinking.**
2. **pārendō artem rēgnandī discimus, by obeying we learn the art of ruling.**

**NOTE.** — Only intransitive verbs as a rule use gerunds, which are declined in case, but not in gender or number.

Transitive verbs use an adjectival form called the *gerundive*, which agrees with its noun in number, gender, and case.

1. **Belgae vixērunt piscibus edendīs, the Belgae supported life by eating fish.**
2. **profectus est cum duābus legiōnibus ad urbem expūgnam, he started with two legions to storm the city.**

The *supines* are two noun forms of declension IV.

- (1) Supine in *um*—an accusative of purpose after verbs of motion.

*vēnī tē vīsum*, *I have come to see you.*

- (2) Supine in *ū*—an ablative of respect used chiefly with adjectives.

## IMPERSONAL VERBS.

**39.** *Impersonal Verbs* are those which cannot have for their nominative a personal pronoun or a substantive.

They are of two kinds —

1. Those which always have a nominative, but it can only be
  - (1) a neuter pronoun ;
  - (2) an infinitive ;
  - (3) a clause.

These are *libet*, *licet*, *accidit*, *cōstat*, etc.

1. **oportet mē abire**, *I must go* (lit. *it behooves me to go*).
2. **sī illud nōn licet, certē hōc licēbit**, *if that is not lawful, at any rate this will be.*
  
2. Those which need have no nominative expressed.

*piget, pudet, poenitet, taedet, miseret.*

The passive of all intransitive verbs must be used *impersonally*.

1. **invidētur mihi**, *I am envied.*
  2. **pūgnātum est āriter ab utrīsque**, *(the battle) was fought sharply on both sides.*

## SUBJUNCTIVE MOOD.

**40.** The *Subjunctive Mood* is never used, like the *Indicative*, to describe a fact.

It expresses *desire*, *hope*, or *doubt*.

1. *bonī simus*, *let us be good*.
2. *sis fēlix*, *may you be fortunate*.
3. *quid faciam?* *what am I to do?*

The perfect subjunctive with *nē* is used, instead of the imperative, to express negative commands of the second person.

*nē hōc fēceris*, *do not do this*.

Observe that *nē*, used in commands, is placed first in its sentence; *-nē*, used in questions, is added to the first word. See § 18.

The subjunctive mood is used to express *purpose*, *consequence*, *condition*, etc.

It is translated by the English subjunctive when it expresses *purpose*, and sometimes when it expresses *condition*, but in other cases by the indicative.

1. **portās claudit, nē quis effugiat,** *he shuts the gates, that no one may escape.*
  2. **tanta erat caedēs, ut nēmō effugeret,** *so great was the slaughter, that no one escaped.*
  3. **sī illi effūgissent, ego custōdem necāvissem,** *if they had escaped, I should have killed the jailor.*
  4. **cum effūgissent, domum rediērunt,** *when they had escaped, they returned home.*

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### ACCUSATIVE AND INFINITIVE.

**41.** Study the following Latin sentences and the translation.

1. **Dicō tē scribere** *I say that you are writing* (*write or do write*).

2. **Putāmus tē scripsisse**, *we think that you wrote* (*or have written*).

**42.** In translating we introduce the word *that* after the leading verb, then we translate the accusative as if it were nominative, and the infinitive as if it were indicative.

**43.** This construction of the accusative and infinitive is regularly used after verbs of *saying*, *thinking*, *knowing*, and *perceiving*.

### INDIRECT QUESTIONS.

**44.** Study the following Latin sentences and the translation :

1. **Sciō quis sīs**, *I know who you are*;

2. **Sciēbam ubi essēmus**, *I knew where we were*.

**45.** Notice that the subjunctives **sis** and **essēmus** are translated by the indicative. The dependent clauses are called *indirect questions*, for they represent **quis es?** and **ubi erāmus?**

**46.** Indirect questions begin with an interrogative word and have the verb in the subjunctive.

#### CUM CAUSAL OR CONCESSIVE.

**47.** **Cum** sometimes means *as* or *since*; sometimes *though*. When it has either of these two meanings it is followed by the subjunctive.

1. **Cum amīci adsint, gaudēmus,** since our friends are present, we rejoice.

2. **Cum fortiter pūgnārent, tamen nōn vicērunt,** though they fought bravely, yet they did not conquer.

**48.** Observe that the subjunctive is translated as if it were indicative.

#### THE RELATIVE OF PURPOSE.

**49.** We may say in Latin :—

1. **Lēgātī missī sunt ut pācem peterent.**

2. **Lēgātī missī sunt qui pācem peterent.**

The translation is the same :—

*deputies were sent to sue for peace.*

**50.** The relative may be used to denote purpose, and, with the following subjunctive, may be translated by the infinitive.

## THE ARGONAUTS.

The celebrated voyage of the Argonauts was brought about as follows. Pelias had expelled his brother Aeson from his kingdom in Thessaly and had attempted to take the life of Jason, the son of Aeson. Jason, however, escaped and grew up to manhood in another country. At last he returned to Thessaly, and Pelias, fearing that he might attempt to recover the kingdom, sent him to fetch the Golden Fleece from Colchis, supposing this to be an impossible feat. Jason with a band of heroes started in the ship Argo (called after Argus, its builder), and after many adventures reached Colchis. Here Aeetes, king of Colchis, who was unwilling to give up the Fleece, set Jason to perform what seemed an impossible task, *viz.*, to plough a field with certain fire-breathing oxen and then to sow it with dragon's teeth. Medea, the daughter of the king, however, assisted Jason by her skill in magic, first to perform the task appointed, and then to procure the Fleece. Medea then fled with Jason, and, in order to delay the pursuit of her father, sacrificed her brother Absyrtus. After reaching Thessaly, Medea caused the death of Pelias, and was, with her husband, expelled from Thessaly. They removed to Corinth, and here Medea, becoming jealous of Glauce, daughter of Creon, caused her death by means of a poisoned robe. After this Medea was carried off in a chariot sent by the sun-god, and Jason was soon afterwards accidentally killed.

Ad multitūdinem hominum trānsportandam nāvis paulō erat lātior quam quibus in nostrō marī ūtī cōnsuēvimus et ad vim tempestātum preferendam tōta ē rōbore facta est.

### 118. The Anchor is Weighed.

Intereā is diēs appetēbat quem Iāsōn per nūntiōs ēdixerat et ex omnibus regiōnibus Graeciae multi, quōs aut reī novitās aut spēs glōriae movēbat, undique conve-

niēbant. Trādunt autem in hōc numerō fuisse Herculem, Orpheum, citharoedum praeclārissimum, Thēseum, Castōrem et multōs aliōs, quōrum nōmina nōtissima sunt. Ex hīs Iāsōn, quōs arbitrātus est ad omnia subeunda pericula parātissimōs esse, eōs ad numerum quīnquāgintā dēlēgit et sociōs sibi adiūnxit: tum paucōs diēs commorātus, ut ad omnēs cāsūs subsidia comparāret, nāvem dēdūxit et tempestātem ad nāvigandum idōneam nactus māgnō cum plausū omnium solvit.

Tum rupes utrimque discesserunt; antequam tamen rursus concurredent, Argonautae bene intellegentēs omnem spem salutis in celeritate positam esse summā vī remis contendērunt et nāvem incolumem perdūxerunt. Hoc factō, dis gratiās libenter egérunt, quorum auxiliō ē tantō periculō ērepti essent: bene enim sciēbant nōn sine auxiliō deorum rem ita fēliciter ēvēnissee.

Hōc cōgnitō Iāsōn cōnsilium quod dederat Mēdēa nōn omittendum esse putābat; saxum igitur ingēns, ita enim praecēperat Mēdēa, in mediōs virōs cōniēcit. Illī undique ad locum concurrērunt et cum quisque sibi id saxum, nēsciō cūr, habēre vellet, māgna contrōversia orta est. Mox strictīs gladiīs inter sē pūgnāre coepērunt et cum hōc modō plūrimi occisi essent, reliquī volnēribus cōfēcti ā Iāsone nūllō negōtiō interfēcti sunt.

Eō cum vēnisset, ad pedēs Iāsonis sē prōiēcit et multis cum lacrimīs obsecrāvit eum, nē in tantō discriminē

mulierem dēsereret, quae ei tantum p̄fuisset. Ille, quod memoriā tenēbat sē per ēius auxilium ē māgnō periculō ēvāsse, libenter eam excēpit et postquam causam veniendī audīvit, hortātus est nē patris īram timēret. Prōmisit autem sē quam p̄imum eam in nāve suā āvēctūrum.

At Mēdēa, quae, ut suprā dēmōnstrāvimus, medicīnae summam scientiam habuit, rāmum quem ex arbore proximā dēripuerat venēnō infēcit. Hōc factō ad locum appropinquāvit et dracōnem, qui faucibus apertis adventum exspectābat, venēnō spārsit: proinde, dum dracō somnō oppressus dormit, Iāsōn vellus aureum ex arbore dēripuit et cum Mēdēa quam celerrimē pedem rettulit.

Quō cum vēnissent, Iāsonī et Mēdēae advenientibus occurrērunt et vellus aureum lūminis ēius causam esse cōgnōvērunt. Omnī timōre sublātō, māgnō cum gaudiō ducem suum excēpērunt et dīs grātiās libenter rettulērunt quod rēs ita fēlīciter ēvēnisset.

Argonautae, qui bene sciēbant rem in discriminē esse, summīs vīribus rēmīs contendēbant: cum tamen nāvis quā vehēbantur ingenti esset māgnitūdine, nōn eādem celeritātē quā Colchī prōgredī poterant. Quae cum ita essent, minimum āfuit quīn ā Colchīs sequentibus caperentur neque enim longius intererat quam quō tēlum adicī posset. At Mēdēa, cum vīdisset quō in locō rēs essent, paene omnī spē dēpositā, infandum hōc cōnsilium cēpit.

### 132. A Fearful Expedient.

Erat in nāve Argonautārum filius quīdam rēgis Aeētae, nōmine Absyrtus, quem, ut suprā dēmōnstrāviūs, Mēdēa ex urbe fugiēns sēcum abdūxerat. Hunc puerum Mēdēa cōnstituit interficere eō cōnsiliō ut, membris ēius in mare cōnectīs, cursum Colchōrum impedīret: prō certō enim sciēbat Aeētem, cum membra fili vīdisset, nōn longius prōsecūtūrum esse: neque opīniō eam fefellit: omnia enim ita ēvēnērunt ut Mēdēa spērāverat. Aeētēs, ubi prīmum membra vīdit, ad ea colligenda nāvem statuī iussit: dum tamen ea geruntur, Argonautae nōn intermissō rēmigandī labōre, mox, quod necesse fuit, ē cōspectū hostium remōtī sunt neque prius fugere dēstīterunt quam ad flūmen Ēridanum pervēnērunt. At Aeētēs nihil sibi prōfutūrum esse arbitrātus, sī longius prōgressus esset, animō dēmissō domum revertit, ut fili corpus ad sepultūram daret.

### 133. The Bargain with Pelias.

Postquam Iāsōn quid fieri vellet ostendit, Peliās prīmum nihil respondit, sed diū in eādem tristitiā tacitus permānsit: tandem ita locūtus est. “Vidēs mē aetāte iam esse cōfectum neque dubium est quīn diēs suprēmus mihi adsit.

Liceat igitur mihi dum vivam hōc rēgnū obtinēre ; tum, postquam ego ē vitā discesserō, tū in meum locum veniēs." Hāc orātiōne adductus Iāsōn respondit sē id factūrum quod ille rogāisset.

### 134. Boiled Mutton.

His rēbus cōgnitīs, Mēdēa rem aegrē tulit et rēgnī cupiditatē adducta cōnstituit mortem rēgī per dolum īferre. Hōc cōnstitūtō, ad filiās rēgis vēnit atque ita locūta est. "Vidētis patrem vestrum aetāte iam esse cōfectum neque ad labōrem rēgnandī perferendum satis valēre. Voltisne eum rūrsus iuvenem fierī?" Tum filiae rēgis his auditīs ita respondērunt. "Num hōc fierī potest? Quis enim unquam ē sene iuvenis factus est?" At Mēdēa respondit, "Scītis mē medicīnae summam habēre scientiam. Nunc igitur vōbis dēmōnstrābō quōmodo haec rēs fierī possit." His rēbus gestis, Mēdēa spērābat sē cum coniuge suō rēgnūm acceptūram esse: at cīvēs, cum intellegerent quō modō Peliās periisset, tantum scelus aegrē tulērunt: itaque Iāsone et Mēdēa ē rēgnō expulsī, Acastum rēgem creāvērunt.

Vestem parāvit summā arte contextam et variis colōribus tinctam: hanc dīrō quōdam infēcit venēnō, cūius vīs tālis erat, ut, sī quis eam vestem induisset, corpus ēius quasi ignī ūrerētur. Hōc factō, vestem ad Glauce mīsit: illa autem nihil malī suspicāns dōnum libenter accēpit et vestem novam, mōre fēminārum, statim induit.

### 137. Flight of Medea and Death of Jason.

Hōc cōstitūtō, Sōlem ūrāvit ut in tantō periculō auxilium sibi praeberet. Sōl autem hīs precibus commōtus currum quendam misit, cuī draconēs alīs instrūctī iūnctī erant. Mēdēa non omittendam tantam occāsiōnem arbitrāta currum cōscendit itaque per āera vēcta in columnis ad urbem Athēnās pervēnit. Iāsōn autem post breve tempus mīrō modō occisus est. Ille enim, sīve cāsū sīve cōnsiliō deōrum, sub umbrā nāvis suae, quae in lītus subducta erat, oīlim dormiēbat. At nāvis, quae adhūc ērēcta steterat, in eam partem ubi Iāsōn iacēbat subitō dēlāpsa virum infēlicem oppressit.

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## ULYSSES.

Ulysses, a celebrated Greek hero, took a prominent part in the long siege of Troy. After the fall of the city, he set out with his followers on his homeward voyage to Ithaca, an island of which he was king; but, being driven out of his course by northerly winds, he was compelled to touch at the country of the Lotus Eaters, who are supposed to have lived on the north coast of Libya (Africa). Some of his comrades were so delighted with the lotus fruit that they wished to remain in the country, but Ulysses compelled them to embark again, and continued his voyage. He next came to the island of Sicily, and fell into the hands of the giant Polyphemus, one of the Cyclopes. After several of his comrades had been killed by the monster, Ulysses made his escape by stratagem, and next reached the country of the Winds. Here he received the help

of Æolus, king of the winds, and, having set sail again, arrived within sight of Ithaca ; but, owing to the folly of his companions, the winds became suddenly adverse, and they were again driven back. They then touched at an island occupied by Circe, a powerful enchantress, who exercised her charms on the companions of Ulysses, and turned them into swine. By the help of the god Mercury, Ulysses himself not only escaped this fate, but forced Circe to restore her victims to human shape. After staying a year with Circe, Ulysses again set out, and eventually reached his home.

Erat inter primōs Graecōrum Ulixēs quīdam, vir summae virtūtis āc prūdentiae, quem dicunt nōnnūllī dolum istum excōgitāsse, per quem Trōiam captam esse cōnstat. Hīc rēgnūm īnsulae Ithace obtinuerat et paulō antequam cum reliquīs Graecīs ad bellum profectus est puellam fōrmōsissimam nōmine Pēnelopēn in mātrimōnium dūxerat. Nunc igitur cum iam decem annōs quasi in exsiliō cōnsūmpsisset, māgnā cupidīne patriae et uxōris videndae ārdēbat.

## 139. The Lotus Eaters.

Postquam tamen pauca millia passuum ā litore Trōiae prōgressi sunt, tanta tempestās subitō coōrta est, ut nūlla nāvium cursum tenēre posset, sed aliae aliās in partēs dīsicerentur. Nāvis autem, quā ipse Ulixēs vehēbātur, vī tempestātis ad meridiem dēlāta, decimō diē ad litus Libyaē appulsa est. Ancoris iactis, Ulixēs cōnstituit nōnnūllōs ē sociis in terram expōnere, qui aquam ad nāvem referrent et quālis esset nātūra ēius regiōnis cōgnōscerent. Hī igitur ē nāvī ēgressi īperāta facere parābant. Dum tamen fontem quaerunt, quibusdam ex incolis obviam factī ab iis hospitiō acceptī sunt. Accidit autem ut vīctus eōrum hominum ē mīrō quōdam frūctū quem lōtum appellābant paene omnīnō cōstāret. Quem cum Graecī gustāssent, patriae et sociōrum statim oblīti sē cōfirmāvērunt semper in eā terrā mānsūrōs ut dulcī illō cibō in aeternum vescerentur.

omnibus qui in navi relictī sunt ad locum vēnit; et sociōs suōs frūstrā hortātus ut sponte suā redirent, manibus eōrum post terga vincitīs, invitōs ad nāvem reportāvit. Tum ancorīs sublātīs quam celerrimē ē portū solvit.

### 141. The One-Eyed Giant.

Paulum ā litorē prōgressī ad antrum ingēns pervēnērunt, quod habitāri sēnsērunt: ēius enim introitum arte et manibus mūnitum esse animadvertērunt. Mox, etsī intellegēbant sē nōn sine periculō id factūrōs, antrum intrāvērunt: quod cum fēcissent, māgnam cōpiam lactis invēnērunt in vāsis ingentibus conditam. Dum tamen mirantur quis eam sēdem incoleret, sonitum terriblem audīvērunt et oculis ad portam versīs mōnstrum horribile vidērunt, humānā quidem speciē et figurā, sed ingenti māgnitudine corporis. Cum autem animadvertisserint gigantem ūnum tantum oculum habēre in mediā fronte positum, intellēxērunt hunc esse ūnum ē Cyclōpībus, dē quibus fāmam iam accēperant.

Hōc factō, oculō omnia perlūstrābat et cum sēnsisset hominēs in interiōre parte antri cēlārī, māgnā vōce exclāmāvit. “Qui estis hominēs? Mercātōrēs an latrōnēs?” Tum Ulixēs respondit sē neque mercātōrēs esse neque praedandi causā vēnisse: sed ē Trōiā redeuntēs vī tempestātum ā rēctō cursū dēpulsōs esse: ḍrāvit etiam ut sibi sine iniūriā abīre licēret. Tum Polyphēmus quaesīvit ubi esset nāvis quā vēcti essent; Ulixēs autem, cum bene intellegereret sibi māximē praecavendum esse, respondit nāvem suam in rūpēs cōiectam et omnīnō perfrāctam esse. quidem hominibus āmovērī posset. Quae cum ita essent, Ulixēs hōc dēstitit conātū et ad sociōs rediit; qui, cum intellēxissent quō in locō rēs essent, nūllā spē salūtis oblātā, dē fōrtūnīs suīs dēspērāre coepērunt. Ille tamen, nē animōs dēmitterent, vehementer hortātus est: dēmōnstrāvit sē iam anteā ē multīs et māgnīs periculis ēvāsisse, neque dubium esse quin in tantō discrimine diī auxilium adlātūrī essent.

Reliquī omni spē salūtis dēpositā lāmentīs lacrimisque sē dēdidērunt: Ulixēs vērō qui, ut suprā dēmōnstrāvimus, vir māgni fuit cōsiliī, etsī bene intellegēbat rem in discrimine esse, nōndum omnīnō dēspērābat. Tandem postquam diū tōtō animō cogitāvit, hōc cēpit cōsiliū. Ē lignīs quae in antrō reposita sunt, pālum māgnum dēlēgit: hunc summā cum diligentiā praeacūtum fēcit; tum postquam sociīs quid fierī vellet ostendit, redditum Polyphēmī exspectābat.

Polyphēmus, qui nunquam anteā vīnum gustāverat, tōtam crātēram statim hausit ; quod cum fēcisset, tantam voluptātem percēpit ut iterum et tertium crātēram replēri iusserit. Tum cum quaesivisset quō nōmine Ulixēs appellārētur, ille respondit sē Nēminem appellārī : quod cum audīvisset, Polyphēmus ita locūtus est, “Hanc tibi grātiam prō tantō beneficiō referam ; tē ūltimum omnium dēvorābō.” Hīs dictīs, cibō vīnōque gravātus recubuit et post breve tempus somnō oppressus est. Tum Ulixēs sociīs convocātis, “Habēmus,” inquit, “quam petīimus facultātem : nē igitur tantam occāsiōnem reī bene gerendae omittāmus.”

Hāc ōratiōne habitā, postquam extrēmum pālum īgne calefēcit, oculum Polyphēmī dum dormit flagrante lignō trānsfōdit : quō factō, omnēs in dīversās spēluncae partēs sē abdidērunt. At ille subitō illō dolōre, quod necesse fuit, ē somnō excitātus, clāmōrem terribilem sustulit et dum per spēluncam errat, Ulixī manum inicere conābātur : cum tamen iam omnīnō caecus esset, nūllō modō hōc efficere potuit. Intereā reliqui Cyclōpēs clāmōre auditō undique ad spēluncam convēnērunt et ad introitum adstantēs, quid Polyphēmus ageret quaesivērunt, et quam ob causam tantum clāmōrem sustulisset. Ille respondit sē graviter volnerātum esse et māgnō dolōre adfici : cum tamen céterī quaesivissent quis eī vim intulisset, respondit ille Nēminem id fēcisse : quibus auditīs, ūnus ē Cyclōpibus, “At si nēmō,” inquit, “tē volnerāvit, haud dubium est quīn cōsiliō deōrum, quibus resistere nec possumus nec volumus, hōc suppliciō adficiāris.” Hīs dictīs abiērunt Cyclōpēs eum in īsāniām incīdisse arbitrāti.

## 147. Escape.

At Polyphēmus, ubi sociōs suōs abiisse sēnsit, furōre atque amentiā impulsus Ulixem iterum quaerere coepit: tandem cum portam invēnisset, saxum quō obstrūcta erat āmōvit, ut pecus ad agrōs exīret. Tum ipse in introitū sēdit et ut quaeque ovis ad locum vēnerat, tergum ēius manibus tractābat, nē virī inter ovēs exīre possent. Id accidit quod fore suspicātus erat. Polyphēmus enim, postquam manūs tergīs eārum imposuit, ovēs prae-terīre passus est. Ulixēs, ubi rem ita fēliciter ēvēnisse vīdit, omnēs suōs sociōs ex ḍordine eōdem modō ēmīsit; quō factō, ipse ūltimus ēvāsit.


