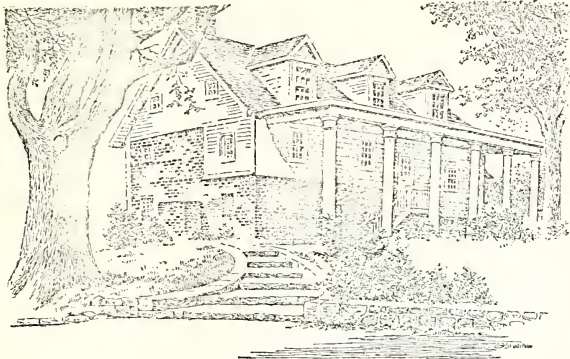

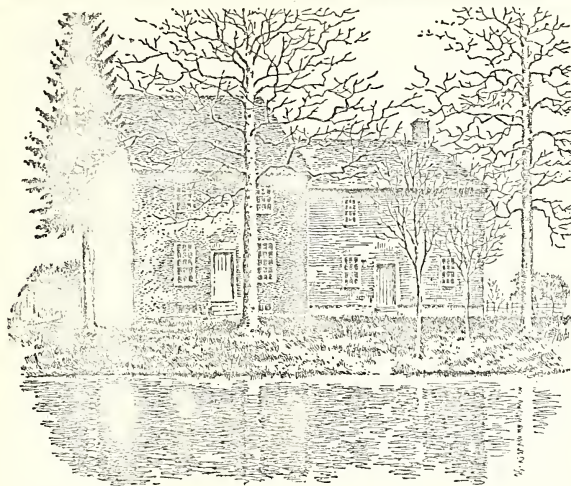

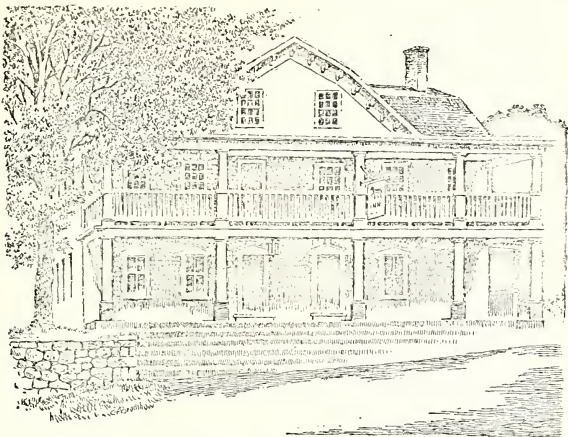

Mend 'Em." However, it is said that some of the early inhabitants came from Mendham (now Mendum) Massachusetts. "The Black Horse" has been operated as a tavern ever since the post road was built. It was in the vicinity of Mendham, in January 1781, that the mutiny of the Pennsylvania Line occurred.

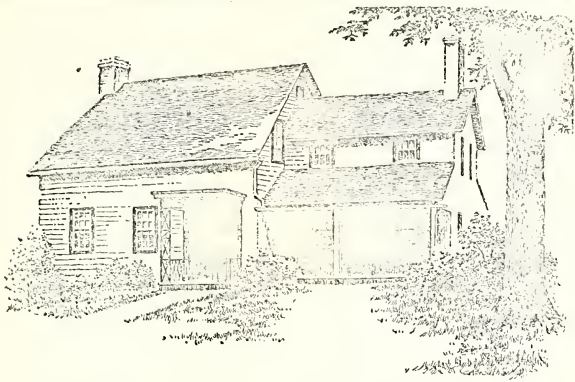

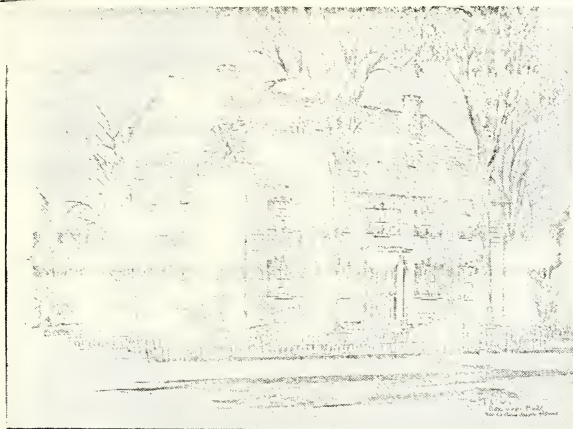

The well under the canopy shown in front of the inn was dug when the first building was started in 1697. 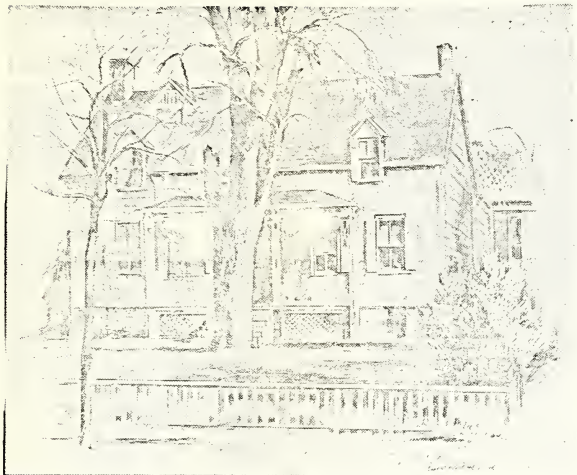

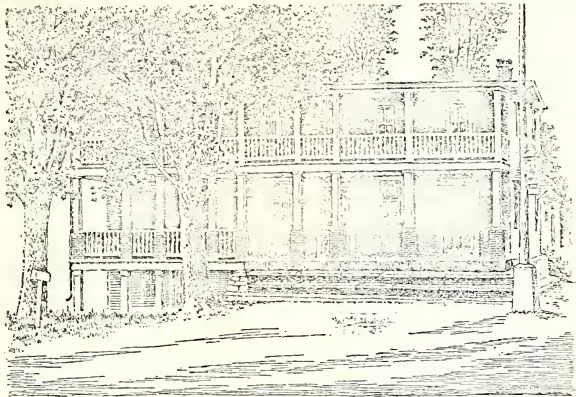

Grover Cleveland Home, Caldwell

Grover Cleveland's birthplace on the north side of Bloomfield Avenue, in the Borough of Caldwell, is controlled by a commission known as the Grover Cleveland Birthplace Association, a corporate body created by a special act of the New Jersey Legislature in 1933. Its 20 trustees are appointed by the Governor and serve without compensation. The house, in which the twenty-second President of the United States was born, is open daily to the public from 9 A.M. to 5 P.M. during the week, and from

1 to 5 P.M. on Sundays. In the house are a number of articles connected with Cleveland's life including his cradle and a number of his letters. The house was built in the year 1832 and at the time of Cleveland's birth, in 1837, was occupied by his father, the Rev. Richard Cleveland, the minister of the Presbyterian Church in Caldwell. It remained the parsonage of the church until March 18, 1913, when it was purchased by the Grover Cleveland Birthplace Memorial Association.

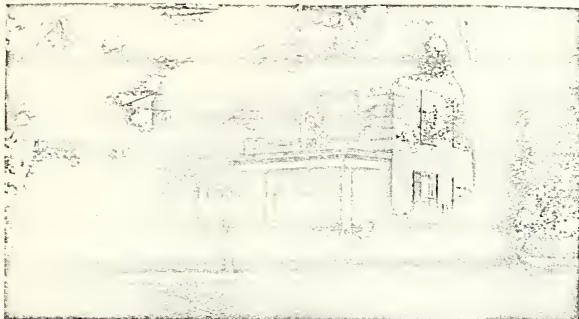

—were unaware that the Colonists had decided to engage them in battle as they rested in the William Covenhoven house, just outside of Freehold, the night of June 27, 1778. Enroute from Philadelphia to safety in New York, the British burned and pillaged property of the Colonists, but spared the Covenhoven house, as Mrs. Covenhoven gave them freedom of the place and allowed them use of her silver, which, incidentally, they carried away when they left. After the Battle of Monmouth, June 28, a hot Sunday, the British stole away in

the night and one of their reasons for not burning this mansion was the desire to keep their departure secret.

The main part of this farmhouse, now occupied by W. Rhea Moreau, was built by the Covenhoven family about 1775. When the east wing was built, nobody knows, but it was much earlier, when farmhouses were occupied only in summer. The farmers lived in the village during the winter, because of danger from Indians.

This famous house contains a mural over the living room fire-

place, believed painted by a British officer and left unfinished because of the Battle of Monmouth. The mural is of a naval engagement, between a British ship and one of Dutch or French ownership, and is done only in three colors. Two ships are finished, but three others are not. Tradition says the mural was started a few days before the battle, possibly by an advance guard.

This interesting old structure is a part of the Passaic County park system and can be reached by turning off U. S.

Route 202 at Mountain View. The stone mansion was built in 1740 by Colonel Dey, who served as Commander of the Bergen County regiment of the New Jersey militia in the Revolutionary War. He also represented Bergen County in the Legislature several terms between 1761 and 1783. Preakness at that time was a part of Bergen County.

The Hermitage at Hohokus

Among the places of historic interest in Bergen County, one of the most outstanding is the old mansion at Hohokus, considered by many architects to be one of the finest examples of English Gothic architecture in the country. Before the middle of the 18th century, the Hermitage was occupied by Captain Philip De Visne, who in 1740 married Anne Stillwell Bartow, mother of Theodosia Bartow, who in 1763 married Colonel Frovost. He was killed in the West Indies in 1777 and in 1782 Mrs. Frovost married Aaron Burr in

the Hermitage. General George Washington and his staff spent a number of days at the old mansion after the Battle of Monmouth in 1778 and Alexander Hamilton and General Lafayette were friends of the De Visnes and often visited them. Mrs. Benedict Arnold also stopped one night with them on her way from West Point to Philadelphia, after her husband's treason. The Hermitage was bought by Dr. Elijah Rosengerantz in 1804 and is still owned and occupied by his family.
