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
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Parish Church of Upton Pyne, the Tower of which was built by Sir Herbert de Pyne about 1270.

JAMES PYNE (PINE) OF HEMPSTEAD, LONG ISLAND, AND SOME OF HIS DESCENDANTS.

James Pyne who settled in Hempstead during the first half of the seventeenth century appears to have been the first of the name to make a permanent home in this country, though one Thomas Pyne was admitted a reeman of the Colony of Massachusetts Bay as early as 1635, and "Thomas Pines" fought in

the French and Indian Wars.

The name of James Pyne, or "Pine" as it was afterwards spelled, is found in the Town Records of Stamford, Connecticut, which was settled in the summer of 1641, by a "companie of Wethersfield (Mass.) men," under a grant from the New Haven Colony. He does not seem to have been of this "companie" but to have followed them very soon, as he received an allotment from the town of the usual house lot and wood lot, Dec. 7, 1641. When he came to Massachusetts Bay, or by what vessel is not known, nor is anything known definitely as to his ancestry, but there has long been a tradition among his descendants that he came from Devonshire, which, according to Sir William Pole, who wrote in 1590, had been "the long contynewed Dwellinge of the Family of Pyne." It seems very probable that he was the James Pyne, son of William and Mary Pyne, who was baptized in Woodbury, near Exeter, Devonshire, England, on June 4, 1608, and who married Edith Williams in St. Mary Magdalen, Taunton, an adjoining town in Somersetshire, in Sept., 1630.* This James Pyne continued to live in Woodbury until 1640, when his mother Mary died, appointing him as her executor. His father had died in 1636, leaving considerable property, consisting mostly of horses, cattle and sheep, from which it is to be inferred that he was a yeoman. After

1640 the name disappears from the town records of Woodbury almost simultaneously with its appearance at Stamford, Connecticut. The titles in the books mentioned in the will of James Pyne of Hempstead, show that his religious sympathies were with the Puritans and suggest a reason for his coming to America. His probable age tends to prove the identity, for on his death in 1686, he left several grandchildren, and his oldest son was a man of mature years, so that he might very well have been 78 years of age, which would have been the age of James Pyne of Wood-

bury in that year.

Savage mentions a James Pyne who was in Hartford in 1647, and refers to Trumbull's Colonial Records, from which it appears that at a General Court held in Hartford, May 24, 1647 (vol. i, pp. 150, 158), "James Pyne" was declared to have "forfeited his recognizance for non-appearance," and again on Oct. 29, 1647, "James Pyne (was) bound in a recognizance in £20, provided Pyne keepe good behaviour until the Court in May at Fayerfield and appear there." No record of the court held in May has been preserved, so the cause of Pyne's offending is not disclosed. During the time that he remained in Stamford, James Pyne seems to have taken no part in its affairs, which were in a rather disturbed condition, on account of the dissatisfaction of the townsmen with the limited franchise which they enjoyed under the New Haven Colony.* The Stamford men complained that the New Haven men made laws and laid the rates, and that they had no votes, no liberties and no justice, and, apparently in the hope of securing greater liberty, a number of families determined to remove to Long Island and to place themselves under the Dutch Government. In 1643, a few individuals from Hemel Hempstead, near London, had commenced a settlement on Long Island, and named it Hempstead, and thither in 1644, after buying a tract of land from the Indians, the Rev. Richard Denton, the minister of Stamford, and several others betook themselves. A charter for the Town was on Nov. 16, 1644, secured from the Governor and Council of New Netherlands, giving the settlers considerable municipal powers and the "right to exercise the reformed religion which they profess."

The name of James Pyne (or Pine) does not appear in the first allotment of town lands, but his non-appearance at Hartford in 1647, upon his recognizance above mentioned, can very probably be explained by the fact that being unwilling to "keep good behaviour" by paying the taxes and conforming to the church discipline of the New Haven Colony, he had followed his townsmen to Long Island. It is certain that he moved there before 1656, for on July 4, of that year, he joined with other inhabitants of Hempstead in a letter to Governor Stuyvesant, claiming that if they were compelled to pay tithes, the Government should reimburse them for injuries received from the Indians. this it must be inferred that he was a land owner at the time this letter was written, and in the following year, as the Town Records show, he received an allotment of thirty-one acres of meadow land. From this time his name appears frequently as owning land, and in a list of freeholders and the number of acres owned by each in 1685, contained in the Town Records, James Pyne is put down as owning 500 acres, that being the largest amount belonging to any individual. In 1664, "James Pine, an inhabitant of Hempstead was made a freeman of Connecticut," which indicates that he still owned land in Stamford and tends to identify him with the early settlers of that town.*

In 1674, the Rev. Richard Denton having in the meantime returned to England, James Pine and others united in petitioning Governor Andros (as the father of the Commonwealth) "to instal such authority among them as may be a means under God for upholding and maintaining the ministry and worship of God among them, that his honor may be promoted and his sabbaths observed for the good of themselves and their posterity." Previously to this, in 1671, the Town had at a public meeting contracted with Richard Charlton "to keep a Schoole and to instruct ye Children & Youth there to write and read," and also built a Presbyterian meeting house, and passed an ordinance compelling attendance at its services under severe penalties for non-attendance. Presumably, the application to Governor Andros for a minister was successful, for in 1682 James Pine and three of his sons are included in a list of subscribers to the minister's salary. The ordinance just cited would seem to indicate that the founders of Hempstead had carried with them the rigid Puritanism of Massachusetts Bay and New Haven, but an evidence of somewhat greater liberality may perhaps be found in the fact that as early as 1668, they permitted a horse-race "not so much for ye divertisement of ye youth alone but for ye encouragement of ye breed of horses.'

On April 17, 1685, Governor Dongan granted a new Charter to the Town, and James Pine is named as one of the patentees. In the following year he died leaving a will, which is on record, as one of the earliest wills in Queen's County.†

The will indicates that he was a man of considerable education and reading, as it mentions the books which he leaves to his children, rather an unusual legacy in those days, and they include "Mr. Hooker's Works," probably referring to the Laws of Ecclesiastical Polity (London, 1662); Peter Heilin's Cosmography (Oxford, 1622); the works of Dr. William Sclater, a prominent theologian of the seventeenth century, the Ecclesiastical History in English, and The Marrow of the Oracles of God, by Nicholas Bifield (London, 1660).

The will also distributes a large amount of land among the testator's children, and considerable personal property, quaintly suggestive of the peculiar value then attached to the "longest gun or fowling piece," the "middle gun and the greatest iron pot;" the "middle best iron pot and the biggest bell metal skillet," set forth in detail, which is almost equivalent to an inventory of household effects. As he does not mention his wife, it must be assumed that she died before him, but he refers to the following children, viz.:—his eldest son John, and James, Nathaniel, Jonathan, Samuel; also two younger sons, William and Benjamin; also his daughters, Lea, Agnes, Sarah and Susan; his grand-daughter Mary, the daughter of his son John, and his "cosen, John Smith."

From the frequent occurrence of the family name in the records of Hempstead and its vicinity, it is evident that descendants of the original settler continued to live there for more than a century and a half after his death, but his descendants are now widely scattered. It is probable that a very large proportion of those now in this country bearing the name of Pine, owe their origin to James Pine of Hempstead, and through him trace their ancestry to the Pynes of Devonshire, though the Devonshire family is represented in this country through several other lines.

The destruction of church records, especially those of Westchester County, during the Revolution, has rendered it impossible to connect the various branches of the family with any degree of completeness, but some facts as to the earlier descendants of James Pine may be stated with certainty.

John, the eldest son of James, in 1672, received a grant from the town of a "home lott by his father's . . . and privileg to keep half a dozen cattell in summer," and in 1686 he was authorized to set up a grist mill. In 1700 he served as Lieutenant in a company of infantry raised by Governor Bellemont, and in 1703 he was chosen one of the first church wardens, representing the Parish of Oyster Bay and Hempstead, subsequently incorporated as St. George's Church, Hempstead.* He died in the same year leaving considerable real estate, which he divided between his sons Daniel and John. His widow, Abigail, and his daughter Mary also survived him.† Daniel married Sarah Carle and proved himself a good citizen by serving as a Commissioner of Highways, and as a vestryman of St. George's, of which the Rev. Samuel Seabury was rector. He is described in Jones' History of New York in the Revolutionary War (vol. ii, p. 39), as "a worthy loyal subject who during his life opposed the Rebellion in all its stages." He died during the war, leaving his farm to two of his nephews living at Fishkill, beyond the British lines, in consequence of which the estate was seized by the British and given to refugees.

John married Grace Carman and in 1758 sold his grist-mill (long known as "Persell's Mill") to Herman (or Hendrick) Onderdonk, and moved with his family to Fishkill on the Hudson, where they were among the first settlers, and where the Rev. Mr Seabury had but a short time previously established Trinity Church. He evidently continued his occupation for by his will, proved Nov. 27, 1781, he devised his grist-mill to his sons Silvanus and Philip. To his oldest son, Joshua, he left his farm at Cow Neck (now Sands Point), Long Island, and to his daughter Abigail, wife of Nathan Bailey, personal property, including a silver tankard and teaspoons.*

Joshua married Sarah de Milt of New York City, Jan. 26, 1751, and lived in Hempstead until shortly before the outbreak of the Revolution, when he removed to what is now the Bronx and engaged successfully in the flour business. But on the beginning of hostilities, he and his family were driven from their home by the British, and he removed to Fishkill, after having been imprisoned for several months. During the war he owned a sloop by means of which he conveyed supplies to the American Army. His son John served as a Captain of Westchester County Guides in the American Army with honor and courage (Bolton's Histary of Westchester County, vol. i, p. 25). In 1785, Joshua Pine joined several other families in settling the town of Walton on the Delaware River in Delaware County, where he was a leading citizen and held various offices.† He died in 1802, leaving three sons, Peter, Joshua and Daniel, and two daughters, Sarah and Rachel. Of these, Joshua married Margaret Remsen, became Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, and represented the county in the Assembly in 1807. He is described as a man of more than ordinary integrity and business ability. Silvanus, the son of John of Fishkill, married Judith —, and carried on his father's business as a miller until 1799, when he died, leaving Martha, Abigail, Thomas, Elizabeth and Nancy. Philip married Phebe Howard of Dutchess County, Oct. 15, 1765. He was a Trustee of Trinity Church, Fishkill, and was enrolled in the Second Regiment of Dutchess County Militia in the Revolution. About 1790 he removed to Tompkins, Delaware County, where he died in 1818, leaving two sons, Daniel and Peter. The last named was a member of the Assembly in 1820, 1824 and 1831, and a Presidential Elector in 1828. He also left four daughters, Sarah Underwood, Betsy Butler, Martha Brown and Phebe Youmans.

James, the second son of the settler, was also a considerable land owner, and his name appears frequently in the town records.

He was one of the building committee of St. George's Church in 1734-35, and joined in a petition for the incorporation of the church.* He seems to have left no children.

Jonathan was one of the colony from Long Island which in 1690, settled in eastern New Jersey. He held local offices and seems to have left a number of descendants, as many of the name appear in subsequent New Jersey records.†

Samuel married Rachel Ellison and is mentioned as a land owner in 1685 in Thompson's *History of Long Island*, vol. ii, p. 17, and in the *Gencalogy of the Willis Family* he is stated to have died leaving no children (B. & G. Record, vi, 103).

William married and had a son James, who married Ann Bedell in St. George's Church on Nov. 23, 1753. Their children were Richard, William, David and Elias. William also left three daughters, Mary and Elizabeth, who married Joseph Hall, Jr., and his brother, and Sarah, who married Joshua Smith,‡

The descendants of Nathaniel and Benjamin have not been traced, but one of them appears to have had a son James who married Mary Brush of Huntington§ on March 24, 1735; and had a son James and two daughters, Mary and Esther. This James appears to have been the one who moved to New Rochelle in 1746 and purchased 156½ acres of land on the Sheldrake River. He was in 1762, one of the petitioners for a charter for the French Church, and subsequently was named as one of the incorporators of Trinity Church.** He died about 1783, leaving a will by which he devised his lands and mill at New Rochelle to his grandson James. He also left bequests to his son Samuel, living in King Street, Fairfield, to his daughters Elizabeth Willis and Mary Bonnet; to Phoebe and Hannah, daughters of his son John of Eastchester, and to Elizabeth and Mary, daughters of his son Micah, and to James, the son of James, of Rye. The last named died about 1757, leaving James, John, Benjamin and Smith. His wife was Phoebe Willis, a sister of Richard Willis.

Many others of the name are mentioned in the records of Queens, Westchester, Dutchess, Greene and Ulster Counties, who are evidently descendants of James Pine of Hempstead, and as to whose connection there can be no doubt, though it cannot always be traced. Three brothers who are to be included among these descendants, James, Samuel and William Pine, settled in

Kingston, Poughkeepsie and Beekman, respectively. James Pine was born in 1768, and married (1) Margaret, daughter of Major Henry Schenck and Hannah Brett of Fishkill, and had children, William, Catherine, Robert Brett, Edward and Harriet, all of whom were baptized in Fishkill, as shown by the church records; and Maria and Margaret, who were baptized in Kingston, as shown by like records. On the death of his first wife he married (about 1811) Olive Walker, born Nov. 26, 1789; died 1876; by whom he had four children, George Washington, Laura, James He died April 29, 1822. Samuel Pine who and Ann Eliza. settled in Poughkeepsie, was born in 1775, and married Susan Storms. He died in 1842, leaving two sons, Perlee and Henry. The latter married his cousin Harriet, the daughter of James The third brother William appears to Pine, last mentioned. have served as a Captain in Col. Field's Dutchess County Regiment, in the Revolution, and to have died about 1823.*

Besides those mentioned, several of the name served in the army during the Revolution. James and Benjamin Pine were captains, and William Pine a sergeant in the Hempstead Company of Queens County Militia, of which David and Richard Pine were also members. (N. Y. Documentary History, iv, 137). John Pine was enrolled in the Second Regiment of Westchester County, and Samuel Pine in the Third Regiment of the same county. Another John Pine was enrolled in the Fifth Dutchess County Regiment, and Philip and Robert Pine were enrolled in the Second Regiment of same county. (N. Y. in the Revolution, and New York Archives, N. Y. Revolutionary Rolls, i, 147).

Another and apparently different family of the same name lived at Pine's Ferry, Westchester County, during the Revolution. Stephen Pine was a loyalist, and it was at the bridge across the Croton River, which succeeded the ferry, and which was known as "Pine's Bridge," that André parted from his guide, Smith, on his way to New York shortly before his capture. The estate of Stephen Pine was forfeited and in 1783, he went to New Brunswick, and settled near the River St. John, where he died in 1786, leaving three sons, Henry, Alpheus and Stephen.

Another Pine of Tory tendencies was Samuel of Massachusetts, who is described as "one of the eighteen country gentlemen who were driven from their habitations to Boston, and an addresser of General Gage on his departure in 1775."

The foregoing notes, however fragmentary, will at least preserve the name of one of the early settlers of Long Island, and render considerable material which has not heretofore been printed, accessible to some future descendant who may have the benefit of records as yet undiscovered and the disposition to pursue the writer's investigations.

EARLY RECORDS OF SALEM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, N. Y.

Through the courtesy of Miss Harriet M. Williams of Salem, Washington County, N. Y., the Record is enabled to publish the following original lists of the very earliest settlers of that town. The fac-simile of the subscription list for building the first church* in that region is dated 1769, and is probably the earliest original document pertaining to the settlement of the town in existence. The assessment roll, dated 1794, containing the names of every holder of real or personal property in the town is valuable genealogically, as many of these people emigrated direct from the old country. The originals are in possession of Miss Williams, having been recently discovered among the papers of her great-grandfather, Gen. John Williams, and were generously loaned for publication in this magazine.

James Turner, Hamilton McCollister and Joshua Conkey were the first settlers of Salem. They came from Pelham, Mass., about 1764, but not until 1765-7 was there any considerable settlement of the town; so that the 1769 list was made up of those who had but recently arrived.

The assessment roll, dated twenty-five years later, containing the names of about 350 taxpayers, indicates rapid settlement of the town simultaneously by two colonies: one from New England and the other from the North of Ireland.

The records are rendered more valuable from the fact that these early settlers, while possessing marked intelligence and culture, were very careless about preserving vital statistics. No records of births, baptisms, marriages or deaths were kept by the churches; at least the writer has been unable to discover any such records covering the first hundred years of the churches' existence there.

THACHER-THATCHER GENEALOGY.

By John R. Totten,

85. ELISHA⁵ THACHER (Deacon Josiah, Hon. Col. John, Antony, Rev. Peter¹), born at Yarmouth, Mass., —, 1698, see age at death and date of death; he resided at Yarmouth, and Barnstable, Mass., died at Barnstable, December 6th, 1774, "in the 76th year of his age," and was buried in Goodspeed's Hill West Burying Ground, Barnstable, gravestone; he was a yoeman, carpenter and boat builder; held office of hogreeve in 1765. He married at Barnstable, Mass. (presumably); date of marriage —, to Phebe Lothrop, born —, 1701; baptized Barnstable, Mass., July 20, 1701; died March 12th, 1785, at Barnstable, and was buried there in Goodspeed's Hill West Burying Ground; gravestone. She was a daughter of Capt. John Lothrop, and his second wife, Hannah (——) Fuller (wid. of Dr. John Fuller), whom he married December 9th, 1698, of Barnstable.

Children: 9 (Thacher), 5 sons and 4 daughters.

- +255 i. Desire, born April 15th, 1722; died —; married Capt. William Taylor.
 - ii. Anthony, 1st,6 born May 6th (16th or 17th), 1724; died August 29th, 1742, aged 18 yrs., 3 mos., 12 days, at Barnstable, and was buried there in Goodspeed's Hill, East Burying Ground, where a gravestone marks his resting-place thus inscribed: "Here lyes ye body of Anthony Thacher, son of Mr. Elisha Thacher and Mrs. Phebe Thacher, who died August 29th, 1742, aged 18 yrs., 3 mos. and 12 da." He was not married. According to his gravestone, he was born May 17th, 1724.
 - iii. Phebe,6 born March 7th (10th or 14th), 1726-7; d. September 24th, 1742, aged 15 yrs. 6 mos., 14 days, at Barnstable, and was buried there in Goodspeed's Hill, East Burying Ground, where a gravestone marks her resting-place, thus inscribed: "Here lyes ye body of Phebe Thacher, daughter of Mr. Elisha Thacher and Mrs. Phebe Thacher, who died September 24th, 1742, aged 15 yrs., 6 mos. and 14 da." She was not married. According to her gravestone, she was born March 10th, 1727.

- +258 iv. John, born September 1st, 1730; died —, before June 11th, 1770, it is thought, as his father's will made on that day makes no mention of him or of any wife or children belonging to him.
- +259 v. Mary, born March 7, 1731-2; died —; married Ebenezer Gorham.
- +260 vi. Elisha,6 born May 8th, 1734; died January 14th, 1795; married, first, Abigail Webb; married, second, Mary Given (or Grove).
- +261 vii. Lucretia, 6 born April 20th, 1737; died ——; married Joseph Davis.
 - viii. Samuel Sturgis, born November 4th (or 10th), 1741; died February 14th, 1742; aged 3 mos., 4 days, at Barnstable, and buried there in Goodspeed's Hill, East Burying Ground, where a stone marks his grave, thus inscribed: "Here lyes ye body of Samuel Sturgis Thacher, son of Mr. Elisha and Mrs. Phebe Thacher who died February 14th, 1741 (42), aged 3 mos. and 4 days." According to his gravestone, he was born November 10th, 1741.
- +263 ix. Anthony, 2nd,6 born June 28th, 1744; died January 18th, 1806; married Elizabeth Taylor.

In Goodspeed's Hill, West Burying Ground, Barnstable, lie buried the remains of Elisha⁵ Thacher and his wife Phebe; stones mark their graves, thus inscribed: "In memory of Mr. Elisha Thacher who died December 6th, 1774, in the 76th year of his age."

"In memory of Phebe, widow of Mr. Elisha Thacher; she died

March 12th, 1785, in ye 84th year of her age."

The will of Elisha⁵ Thacher, dated June 11th, 1770, proved January 20th, 1775, describes him as a yoeman, and mentions his son Anthony who receives carpenter and boat building tools; children Elisha, Desire Taylor, Lucretia Davis, and wife Phebe. He had a shop and his homestead lot is defined. Inventory presented by Elisha⁶ and Anthony⁶ Thacher, December 9th, 1776, and another paper relating to the estate was presented by Anthony⁶ Thacher,

July 4th, 1785.

Captain John Lothrop (father-in-law of Elisha⁵ Thacher) was born in Barnstable, February 9th, 1644; he married, first, at Plymouth, Mass., January 3rd, 1671-2, to Mary — (probably daughter of James and Mary (Tilson) Cobb, of Scituate); she was born in Scituate, December 3rd, 1653. His name in the marriage record is given as Laythrope and she is called Mary Colsgain. He married, a second time, December 9th, 1695, Hannah (——) Fuller, widow of Dr. John Fuller. John Lothrop died September 18th (or 27th), 1727, at 11 o'clock A. M., and he is recorded as having been 85 years old in the Barnstable Church Records. On Mr. Otis' authority, we know that he was a man of note among the seafaring

men of the coast in those early times, sailing as Captain in command of his own vessel.

In the New Haven, Conn. records is found this evidence of

his occupation:

"These certify I received on board ye Swan, John Lothrop, master, 8 bbls. pork, 48 bushels wheat of Samuel Hemmingway of New Haven, for use of Captain Elisha Hutchinson of Boston, and doe promise to deliver ye same on paying freight 8sh per barrel and 6^d per bushel.

"April 1st, 1691. (sgd) Jo. Lothrop."

John Lothrop's will (Book iv., p. 407, Barnstable Probate Records) is dated March 9th, 1726-7, and was proved February 9th, 1727-8. It names as legatees his wife Hannah, his son John's son Joseph, the children of his daughter, Mary Howland, and those of his daughter, Elizabeth Lewis, and his sons Barnabas and Benjamin. His son Barnabas and his wife Hannah, executors.

Hannah Lothrop's (widow of John) will bears date October 7th, 1738 (Book v., p. 362) and was proved October 19th, 1738; she mentions as legatees son Benjamin, the heirs of John Fuller, deceased, grandson John Lothrop, daughter Reliance Prince, daughter Bashua Webb and daughter Phebe Thacher. Executor, son-in-

law Elisha Thacher.

Hannah (widow of John) Lothrop was the second wife of Dr. John Fuller (son of Matthew Fuller), and had by him Bethia, born December —, 1687; John, born October —, 1689; and Reliance, born September 8th, 1691. These names make the names in the will understandable.

86. Captain Josian⁵ Thacher (Deacon Josiah, Hon. Col. John, Antony, Rev. Peter¹), born Yarmouth, Mass., July 7th, 1701; he resided at Yarmouth, Mass., and Norwalk, Conn.; he was a Sea Captain engaged in the coast trade, and a man of affairs in Norwalk; he died at Norwalk, Conn., August 22nd, 1780, "Tuesday at 8 hours and 44 minutes in the morning." He was buried, presumably, at East Norwalk, Conn., between the graves of his two wives; no stone marks his grave, but the space left between his wives' graves suggests his interment there. He married, first, at Norwalk, Conn. (according to Selleck's Norwalk), on February 17th, 1724, to Ann Burne (Burr, Bun or Bunce; probably Burr, according to Allen's Thacher Genealogy, p. 42). She was born at —-March 25th, 1609, and died at Norwalk, Conn., February 25th, 1733-4, "between 9 and 10 at night, aged 34," and was buried

in East Norwalk Cemetery, where a stone marks her restingplace. Her place of residence before marriage and her parentage is unknown. Capt. Josiah⁵ Thacher was married a second time, at Boston, Mass., by Rev. Sam'l Checkley, of the New South Church, on August 7th (or September 15th), 1735, to Mary (Greenleaf) Blinn (daughter of Rev. Daniel Greenleaf of Yarmouth and Boston, Mass., by his wife Elizabeth (Gooking) Greenleaf; and widow of James Blinn, whom she married March 16th, 1725). She was born at Cambridge, Mass., August 29th (or September 25th), 1706, and died at Norwalk, Conn., April 2nd (or 6th), 1744, and was buried at Norwalk, Conn., in East Norwalk Cemetery where a stone marks her grave.

Children by first marriage: 4 (Thacher), I son and 3 daughters, all born at Norwalk, Conn.

- +269 vi. Daniel,6 born June 29th. 1739, Friday; died November 17th, 1776; married Mary Street.
- +270 vii. John,6 born July 25th, 1742; died January 16th, 1805; married, first, Ann Perry; married, second, Mehitable (Uffoot) Thompson.

Captain Josiah⁵ Thacher was a mariner in the coasting trade between Boston and Cape Cod and along Long Island Sound. He lived in Yarmouth, Mass., until about 1725 when he acquired land in Norwalk, Conn., from Alexander Ressiquie. The deed of this transfer of land is to be found in Norwalk Land Records, Vol. V., folio 285; it is dated December 22nd, 1725, but is recorded of date December 31st, 1724; and in said deed Josiah Thacher is described as being of "Yarmouth in Barnstable County in Province of Massachusetts Bay in New England." By this deed he acquired a house lot of three acres. The place of the first marriage of Josiah⁵ Thacher is not a matter of record, but Selleck, in his History of Norwalk, states that it took place in Norwalk, Conn. The maiden surname of his first wife is variously stated by different authorities as being Burne, Burr, Bun, or Bunce. His family Bible and Freeman's Cape Cod, however, specifically state that her maiden surname was Burne, and I have therefore so recorded it. Where his first wife lived at the time of her marriage or where she was born or who were her parents is not a matter of record. In the East Norwalk Cemetery there is a gravestone to her memory thus inscribed:—"Here lyes buried the body of Mrs. Ann Thacher, wife to Mr. Josiah Thacher, aged 34 years and 11 months. Died February ye 25th, 1733-4" (hence she was born March 25th, 1698-99). Alongside of this grave, with a space between sufficient for another grave, is the grave of Josiah⁵ Thacher's second wife, which grave is marked by a stone thus inscribed:—"In memory of Mrs. Mary Thacher, wife of Capt. Josiah Thacher, who departed this life April 6th, A. D. 1774, in her 68th year.

Who follow here ye paths of truth Shall bloom in everlasting youth, Clad with new glories they shall shine In charms immortal and divine."

Mary (Greenleaf) Blinn, second wife of Josiah⁵ Thacher, was the widow of James Blinn, to whom she was married March 16th. 1725. This James Blinn was probably the son of Mr. Blinn and Margaret Dennis, who were baptized at Milton, Mass., by Rev. Peter⁴ Thacher (Rev. Thomas³), July 20th, 1701; where this James Blinn lived and died is undetermined. It is stated by some authorities that Mary Greenleaf had 10 children by Mr. Blinn, which statement seems incredible, as she married him March 16th, 1725, and married Josiah⁵ Thacher on August 7th (or Sept. 15th), 1735, which would render it necessary for her to have had 10 children in a little over 10 years. Josiah⁵ Thacher had 10 children,—4 by his first wife and 6 by his second, and I think the authority above referred to confused the 10 children of Josiah⁵ Thacher by his first and second wives, with 10 children supposed to have been born to Mary Greenleaf by her first husband, James Blinn. Wm. F. Boardman, in the Ancestry of Jane Maria Greenleaf, states that

Mary Greenleaf had 16 children; which would mean that she had 10 by James Blinn and 6 by Josiah⁵ Thacher. I am inclined to doubt the existence of these 10 Blinn children, as I have never seen any record of their births or deaths. The place of burial of Josiah⁵ Thacher is not positively known; but in the East Norwalk Cemetery between the graves of his first and second wives there is a vacant place where it is presumed he lies buried. No record

of his burial exists.

Captain Josiah⁵ Thacher died intestate. On September 17th, 1780, the bond of Josiah Thacher, Jr. (the eldest son of the deceased), as administrator of the estate of his father was accepted. In 1782 Josiah Thacher and Eliphalet Lockwood were allowed to sell land on the account of the estate of the late Captain Josiahs Thacher. May 6th, 1782, the inventory of Josiah Thacher was filed. This inventory takes up 11 pages of the Fairfield County Records. On November 3rd, 1783, another sale of land on account of the estate was ordered. November 13th, 1783, the accounts of Josiah⁶ Thacher as administrator were allowed. January 16th, 1786, the distribution of the estate was ordered. August 6th, 1790 distribution of said estate was finally allowed and ordered. In the probate records of Fairfield, Conn., Vol. 1795-1818, p. 678, we find the following record of final distribution:

"We the subscribers being by the Honorable Court of Probate for the District of Fairfield appointed to make distribution of the Estate of Josiah Thacher, late of Norwalk, deceased, distributed

Peter1), born at Yarmouth, Mass., February 19th, 1695-6; died at Barnstable, Mass., July 11th (or 19th), 1769, aged 73; married, first, at ----, March 16th, 1715-6, to Captain Isaac Freeman, who resided at Yarmouth, Mass., and removed thence to Fairfield, Conn.; he died at Fairfield, Conn., May 21st, 1732, in 46th year, and was buried there; gravestone. He was a son of Lieut. Edward Freeman (born June ---, 1657; died December 10th, 1717), by his second wife, Sarah Mayo (daughter of Samuel Mayo). Edward Freeman lived at Eastham, Mass. Captain Isaac Freeman, eldest son of Lieutenant Edmund Freeman of Eastham, removed to Fairfield, Conn., after his marriage, and died there before 1736 (he died actually May 21st, 1732), as appears by the terms of his mother's will. His widow returned to Yarmouth, Mass., and married a second time to Captain Job Gorham of Barnstable, Mass., as his second wife. Mrs. Sarah Freeman, widow of Lieut. Edmund Freeman, died in 1746, and in her will left legacies "to the four sons of my son Isaac, deceased," two of these sons chose on September 24th, 1746, their brother Isaac of Boston as their guardian. Their mother, who had married Job Gorham and again became a widow, died at Barnstable, July 19th (or 11th), 1769, aged 73. She was born February 19th, 1695-6. Mrs. Abigail Freeman, widow of David Freeman, administered on her estate August 8th, 1769. She, Bethia Gorham, had by her second marriage only one child, a daughter Sarah, baptized August 13th, 1736, and who probably died young. Bethia⁵ Sturgis

was a very attractive young lady possessing both personal and mental charins; her hand was sought by two gentlemen of great respectability, Freeman and Gorham. Both urged their suit earnestly. She had so warm a regard for both of them that in the unsophisticated tenderness of her heart she forbore giving preference to either of them, and left it to the two suitors to decide between themselves. No bloodshed occurred, but Freeman was declared the victor and was rewarded by the hand of the fair Bethia. When she became a widow, she returned to the scene of her youthful conquest and became the second wife of Captain Job Gorham (her first husband's rival), who had in the meantime, on December 4th, 1719, married Desire Dimmock (daughter of Thomas), who had born to him five (5) children, and who died January 28th, 1732-3.

The will of Capt. Job Gorham of Barnstable, Mass., gentleman, is dated September 12th, 1753, and was proved November 2nd, 1762. In it he names his wife Bethia Gorham and daughters Temperance Fuller and Desire Gorham, to whom he gives legacies. All the remainder of his estate he gives to his son Thomas, whom he appoints his executor. Capt. Job Gorham inherited the dwelling house built by his grandfather (Capt. John Gorham) in Barnstable and the lands in its immediate vicinity; and the same was held by his descendants as late as 1888. In 1745 he took down the old mansion and built the one which was standing in 1888 on the same spot. Part of the material of the old house was used in the construction of the new one. Captain Job Gorham's children by his first wife,, Desire Dimmock, were as follows:

Peter1), born Yarmouth, Mass., September 2nd. 1701; died at Yarmouth, January 10th, 1721-2, "in her 22nd year," at the birth of her first child; she was buried in Yarmouth in old Cemetery, gravestone; she married at Yarmouth, Mass., February 18th, 1719-20, to Timothy Hallett as his first wife. He was born at Yarmouth, Mass., ---, about 1694, according to his gravestone; he resided at Yarmouth, Mass., in the house owned and occupied by Mr. Eldridge Lovell in 1888; he was a farmer and a very respectable man, and died at Yarmouth, July 7th, 1760, "in his 66th year," and was buried there in old Cemetery, gravestone. He was a son of Jonathan Hallett (born November 20th, 1647; died January 12th, 1716-17, aged 69; married January 30th, 1683-4) and his wife, Abigail (Dexter) Hallett, daughter of Ensign Thomas Dexter, of Sandwich, Mass. And in Goodspeed's Hill (West) Burying-ground, we find a stone there inscribed:—

"In Memory of Deacon Gershom Davis; he died April 20th,

Note the difference in the dates of his death as given by Freeman's Cape Cod, p. 325, and Otis' Barnstable Families, May 6th, 1790, and his gravestone, which gives it April 29th, 1790.

He resided at Weymouth and Boston, Mass., Halifax, N. S., and Braintree, Mass.; he died at Germantown, near Braintree, Mass., at the home of his daughter, Abigail Greenleaf, May 30th, 1757, aged 63, and was buried at Weymouth, Mass., in Old Cemetery (North). He was a minister of the Gospel, in the shipping trade, a student of law, Harvard College, 1717. He married at Boston, Mass. (by the Rev. Peter⁵ Thacher of Boston), April 21st, 1721, to Eunice Treat, born at Eastham, Mass., September 27th, 1704; died at Boston, Mass., October 17th, 1747, aged 42, and was presumably buried at Weymouth, Mass. She was a daughter of Rev. Samuel Treat and his second wife, Abigail (Willard) Estabrook (widow of Benjamin Estabrook and daughter of Rev. Samuel Willard of Old South Church, Boston), of Eastham, Mass.

Hon. Robert Treat⁶ Paine taught school for a year. He then made three voyages to North Carolina, acting as master. He subsequently sailed to Fayal and to Cadiz and to Greenland on whaling voyages as master of his ship. In 1755 he read law in Lancaster with Judge Willard, a relative, and preached at the same time in Shirley, Mass. He was chaplain of Col. Willard's Regiment, which was sent to Crown Point and was in Camp on Lake George for three months. In 1757 he was admitted to the bar and removed to Taunton, Mass., in 1761. He was Rep. to G. C. from Taunton, 1733-4, Deputy to 1st Congress in 1775; attended

Ist provincial congress at Cambridge, Mass., and in May attended the Congress at Philadelphia, Pa. July 4th, 1776, he signed the Declaration of Independence. He was a Member of Congress in 1777-8, but did not attend. In 1781 he removed to Boston and settled there on the corner of Milk and Federal Streets in former residence of Governor Shirley. He was Attorney-General in 1777-1790. In 1790 he was made Judge of the Superior Court and resigned in 1804. A fac-simile of his signature may be seen, p. 244 of the Treat Family Genealogy.

v. Eunice,⁶ born May 11th, 1733; died February 2nd, 1803; at Boston, (probably); she was buried from her brother's home in Boston. Not married.

Rev. Thomas Paine at an early age was placed under Rev. Jonathan Russell of Barnstable for preparation for Harvard College. In 1713 he entered Harvard, and while there pursued the study of mathematics and astronomy far beyond the ordinary course of these studies there at that time. His great interest in these studies led him in 1718 and 1719 to publish almanacs in his own name. To the study of Latin, Greek, Hebrew and French he gave great attention, and graduated at Harvard in 1717. Having shown an early predilection for the ministry, in August, 1717, he began the study of theology under Rev. Theophilus Barnard of Andover, Mass.; and upon completion of his studies he accepted a call and was ordained minister at Weymouth, Mass., on August 19th, 1719; he remained there until 1730, when ill health compelled him to ask for his dismission. He then went to Boston to reside and soon became engaged in commercial pursuits. He carried on a trade with the Southern Colonies, West Indies, and the new port of Halifax, N. S., and with England and other foreign ports, and soon acquired considerable wealth. He was also engaged in the manufacture of cannon and the casting of shot; he had foundries in Abington and Bridgewater. In the summer of 1749, his business affairs became involved in consequence of the capture of some of his vessels, and on account of the depreciated value of the existing currency, and general business conditions; and his property was swept away. His health gave way, and he made a voyage to the West Indies; and on his return made Halifax his place of residence. There he turned his attention to the study of law with the intention of practising. His health becoming greatly impaired, he was compelled to abandon his studies and he returned to Braintree, Mass., to a village nearby called Germantown, where his daughter Abigail Greenleaf lived; and at her home passed to his rest and was buried at Weymouth, Mass. He was undoubtedly a man of great talents, learning and piety. AUTHORITIES.

Nathaniel Freeman, first husband of Mary⁵ Paine, died before the birth of his last child, Nathaniel Freeman. His will mentions his wife Mary, who was Executrix, and will was admitted to administration May 22nd, 1728, "the said widow and her father, James Paine of Barnstable, being granted letters of administration." Edmund Hawes, second husband of Mary⁵ Paine, was ruined financially by the depreciation of Continental paper currency. In January, 1777, the paper currency then in circulation was at 5 per cent. discount, in July it was at 25 per cent. discount, and before the end of the year three dollars in paper would not command one dollar in silver. The depreciation was so rapid that finally a paper dollar was only worth two or three cents. Edmund Hawes had sold his home to a Mr. Doane (the property since known as the Dr. Savage estate) and had been paid therefor in Continental paper currency, which almost immediately thereafter became worthless. Mr. Hawes, being thus reduced to poverty, went into the woods and hung himself. It is a singular fact that his only son also committed suicide.

In the settlement of John Kean's estate, which took place in 1801, see Plymouth, Mass., Probate Records, Book No. 37, pp. 106-8, "Division of Heirs of John Kean," the balance of estate is divided into shares and one share is allotted to heirs of Rebecca Smith, deceased.

Note:—In preparing the records of John Tilley and his wife —— (——) was regarded as good authority and hence my acceptance of her statement. Since the compilation of this portion of these records Mr. George Ernest Bowman has conclusively proven that the John Tilley who married Bridget Van der Velde in Leyden, Feb. 13, 1615, was not John Tilley the 16th signer of the Compact. (See *Mayflower Descendant*, vol. x, pp. 65-6-7.) I have therefore corrected my article on the authority of Mr. Bowman, whose article, at the time (April, 1911) of going to press, had not been brought to my notice. As Miss Haxtun's authority for stating that the baptismal name of John Tilley's wife was Elizabeth is not given in her work, and as I find no further authority for such statement, I have corrected my article so that both the baptismal name and the maiden surname of John Tilley's wife remain unstated.

Residuary legatee, the said Joseph Moore. Executors, my son in law Richard Read, my brother in law Richard Taylor of St. Martin's in the Fields, co. Middlesex, cordwainer, and Anthony Bayles of Rotherhithe, barber. Witnesses: Thomas Coattam, John Kidder, Not. Pub. Proved 6 Nov., 1723, by Anthony Bayles, power being reserved to the other executors.

Will of Joseph Torkington of Virginia in parts beyond the seas, planter, dated 28 January, 1652-3. I, William Littell of Chelmsford in the county of Essex carpenter, being aged, do make and ordain this my last will and testament. I give to my son John 5s. The copyhold estate which was my late wife's. I give to my grandson William Littell, now living in Georgia in America, the like sum of five shillings, to be paid to him when demanded. I devise my freehold messuage in the hamlet of Moulsham, in the parish of Chelmsford, now in the occupation of Edward Moody, to my son in law James Hawkes, the same being mortgaged to him. To my daughter Mary, wife of the said James Hawkes, my freehold messuage and farm lying in St. Giles in Colchester and East Donyland, now in the occupation of John Esty; also my messuage wherein I lately lived, lying in Moulsham. To my granddaughters Martha, Love and Elizabeth Pavett, daughters of John and Love Pavett, £10 apiece at 21. Elizabeth Tedder of Springfield,

widow of Henry Tedder deceased, £10. The rest to my daughter Mary Hawkes, whom Executrix. Dated 8 August, 1752. Witnesses: Tho: Lawrence, Thos: Bones, William Smart. Proved 20 Oct., 1757, by Mary Hawkes, widow, relict of deceased (sic), sole Executrix.

The last day of June, 1646, I RICHARD WILLIAMSON, Cittizen and Merchantaylor of London, being sickly and weake in body . . . give and bequeath vnto my brother Roger Williamson residinge in Virginia the summe of twenty shillings, and doe forgive vnto him all the money which he owes me. Item I give and bequeath vnto all the children of my said brother living at the time of my decease five poundes equally amongst them, to be paid vnto their father for their vse within two years after my decease. To my cousin Thomas Williamson £3, and to my cousin Alice Williamson his sister other £3. To my cousin Anne Nightingale, to whom I have given a porcon in marriage, 5s. Cozen Sarah Williamson £20 at one and twentie or marriage, or, if she die before said time, then to the children of my brother Roger Williamson equally. The lease of my nowe dwelling house, and all the rest of my goods, I give vnto my wife Mary, whom I appoint my Executrix. Witnesses: Edward Boldston, William Tuder, Ralph Dawson, Chr: Flavell, scr. Proved 5 Dec., 1646, by the Executrix.

19 Nov., 1651, commission to Martha Osboston, sister to Mary Williamson, whilst she lived relict and executrix of said deceased, to administer goods left unadministered by said Mary, during the minority of Sarah Williamson, brother's child to the said testator deceased, and legatee named in the will. (P. C. C. Twisse, 189.)

February the Six and Twentyth, 1672-3, ELIZABETH FOSTER, widdow, late wife of Henry Foster in Virginia, late deceased, did make her last will, that is to say, shee did nominate and appoint her mother Elizabeth Higginson, widow, late wife of Humfrey Higginson, to be her only Executrix, and did give and bequeath vnto her all her whole estate. Witnesses: Thomas Hasellwood, Mary Higginson, John Betts. Proved 14 March, 1673-4, by the executrix. (P. C. Bunce, 35.)

Humphrey Higginson, aged 28, sailed August, 1635, in the ship George for Virginia. Member of the Council, 1642-1655, and Colonel of militia. He lived in 1655 at Harop (now Williamsburg), returned to England and lived at Ratcliff, died March, 1665-66 (his will in Waters' Gleanings).* He had a brother Christopher who lived in Virginia. A letter from Virginia, of Richard Kempe, dated 24 April, 1640, describes him as a "kinsman of the Bishop of Ely" (Wrenn). They were probably brothers of Captain Robert Higginson.† (W. G. Stannard.)

I, WILTSHIRE REEVE the elder, of Hubbard's Hall in the parish of Harlow, co. Essex, gent., being indisposed in my health, doe

I give unto my son Wiltshire Reeve £100; unto John Reeve my second son and heirs my messuages, being nine in number, situate in Harlow, at his age of 21 years; to Joan my wife my farm called Hills and certain lands late in the tenure of Robert Nightingale, lying in Epping, during the term of her natural life, with remainder unto Francis Reeve my third son and his heirs; to Judith Reeve my eldest daughter £300 at 21 or marriage; to Anne Reeve my second daughter £300 at 21 or marriage; to Jane Reeve my youngest daughter and her heirs my two messuages in Shoo Lane in Foster Street in Harlow, late in the occupation of John Edden and Henry Colling; to my said daughter Jane £200 at 21 or marriage; to my sisters Letitia Wickstead and Anne Spademan each a ring of 20s. value; also I doe give and devise all my plantations, lands, tenements, etc. at or neer James River or elsewhere in Virginia in the parts beyond the seas, unto my sister Susan, now Susan Mareen, now or late residing in Virginia, and to her heirs for ever. I make Joan my wife guardian of my sons and daughters and their estates during their minority. Residue to my wife, whom Executrix. I do confirm a certain Indenture bearing date 27 Aug., last past, made between me the said Wiltshire Reeve and Joan my wife of the one part, and Richard Day and John Smith of the other part, whereby I and my said wife have made some provision for our said children. Mention of an obligation bearing date 21 Sept., 1704, in which I stand bound unto Thomas Spademan of London, apothecary, and Anne his wife, my sister, conditioned for the payment of £20 yearly unto them. Dated 13 Sept., 1707. Witnesses: John Taylor, Samuel Harrison, Ri: Harrison. Proved 1 Dec., 1707, by the Executrix. (Arch: Middlesex, Essex and Herts, Sanney, 267.)

Will of William Wall of Standon, co. Hertford. I give and bequeath unto my brother John Wall of the parish of Goshen in Chester County and Province of Pensilvania in America the sum of thirty pounds, and if he should happen to be dead before me then I will and order the same to be paid to his children. I give to my nephew Richard Wall £20 over and above the £20 I gave

him in my lifetime, or, if he die before me, to his children; to John Barler who married Anne, daughter of my brother Thomas Wall, \mathcal{L}_{20} , or if they be dead before me, then to their children; to my kinsman Richard Deane \mathcal{L}_{20} , or to his children; to my kinsman Richard Holford £10, or to his children; to my nephew Thomas Wall £10, or to his children; to Henry Madder £5, or to his daughter Elizabeth; to my sister Elizabeth Wall, widow of my brother Walter Wall, £5; to Edmond Rowley who married my niece Sarah Wall, £10; to Catherine Begford, daughter of my niece Mary, wife of John Hollis, £5; to John, son of said John and Mary Hollis, \pounds_5 ; to my sister in law Mary, widow of Thomas Wall, \pounds_5 , or to the children of her daughter Anne, wife of John Barler; to Joseph Sollam who married Elizabeth my sister in law, £5; to the poor of Tixall, co Stafford, 20s.; to my nephew William Wall and heirs all my free and copyhold lands at Latchford in Standon, co. Herts; to Catherine Dale of Standon one guinea; to Edward Moore of Standon, gardiner, 20s.; to the poor of Standon 40s.; to Joseph Mitchell of Standon 20s.; to Edward Odell of Puckridge, carpenter, 20s.; to my nephew William Wall and John Bridges of Standon, my friend, £180-2 in trust for the payment of the foregoing legacies. I order my body to be buried in the upper part of the South Isle of Standon Church, near to the body of Hannah Edwards, deceased. All my wearing apparel I give to my three nephews Richard Wall, Thomas Wall and William Wall. Executors: my nephew William Wall and my friend John Bridges. Dated 13 Sept., 1754. Witnesses: John Goodwin the elder, John Goodwin the younger, Henry Roberts. Proved 2 Oct., 1754, by the Executors.

"I do ordain & make William Hayward my son my sole Executor, but if it be apparently proved that he be dead & have no issue then my will is that the remainder of my goods and chattles shalbe (sold) by my supervisor whom I put in trust to be put into the hands of the Churchwardens & overseers for the poor of the town of Belton to be paid unto them by my supervisor within one whole year next after it be aparently proved that my son William be dead without issue." I ordain and make Edward Watson my supervisor. Witnesses: Wm. Pope, Joseph Falk. 13 February, 1638-9, administration of the goods of the said William Hayward deceased, with this will annexed (William Hayward the executor being in parts beyond the seas), was granted Edward Watson, supervisor under the said will, until such time as the said William Hayward should (Ipswich Wills: Register 1638–40: fol. 78.)

13 February, 1638-9, administration of the goods of William Hayward of Belton, deceased, granted to Edward Watson, super-

visor under the will of said deceased, for so long as William Hayward, the executor under said will, remains in part beyond the seas. (Ipswich Act Book, 1638-9, fol. 46.)

Will of Humfrey Ley in Partibus Transmarinus. My Deare Harte & Loving Sister my unfeined love remembered vnto thee with my love vnto my Aunt & Sister Mary and her children trusting in God that these few lines will find you all in good health as J am att present (Thanks be to God for it) Loueing sister these few lines are to certify you of my now being in the Downes & had our Merchant beene aboard wee had set saile presently the winde being now faire for us J did xpect yor answere of a letter that J sent you that J might have disposed of my selfe to you in that which J gaue you a hinte of in my laste & in whose hand it is But your not writing did cause mee to stop my hand of not writing. my hand of not writing. DESCENDANTS OF EDWARD TRE(A)DWELL THROUGH HIS SON JOHN.

Deed, dated 20th of August, 1747, from John Reynolds of Dutchess county, New York, yeoman, quit-claiming to Col. Willit and Samuel' Tredwell grantor's rights unto lands taken in Mr. Adolph Phillips' upper patent in Dutchess county. Deed from Phebe Tredwell, widow of John's Tredwell, dated the 12th of April, 1748, and the bond executed in consideration thereof, already mentioned under John's Tredwell (page 313, July, 1911,

Samuel Tredwell was one of the executors named in the last will of Samuel Hitt of Harrison's Purchase, dated the 17th of

August, 1742, and probated the 22nd of November, 1742.*
"Being sick," Samuel Tredwell made his will bearing date the 4th of January, 1747, which was probated in Westchester county the 11th of April, 1748, and recorded in Liber 16 of Wills, page 242, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York, where the original is still on file.

In this will are mentioned testator's wife, Margaret, to whom was given the use of all his real estate in Rye until their son Samuel became of age, then the use of one-third thereof, and, upon her death, the property to go to Samuel; his three daughters, each under eighteen and unmarried, namely, Gloriana (eldest), Margaret (second), and Mary (youngest), to whom were given the proceeds of the sale of the two pieces of land his uncle Col. John's Tredwell left him. The will further mentions the continuance of testator's indisposition at the time of said uncle's death and names testator's wife, brother Benjamin Tredwell, and brother-in-law, John Thomas, as the executors.

One of the papers in the possession of the late Mrs. Joseph Augustus Treadwell, was the inventory of "the Goods and . of Samuel Tredwell Esq Late of the Town of Rye," dated the 19th of April, 1748, and made by Jeremiah Fowler and Joseph Isinghartt, who appraised the personal estate left by Samuel Tredwell at £714-58.-2d. Among other things it mentions his Bible, books, many horses and cattle, farming implements, and six slaves.

In Liber E, page 276, of the Hempstead town records, is a copy of a deed dated the 27th of April, 1748, from John Thomas and Margaret Tredwell, widow, both of Rye, executors of the last will of Samuel' Tredwell, conveying to Thomas' Tredwell of Hempstead, gentleman, 45 acres of upland and meadow on the east side of Hicks' Neck, on the south side of Hempstead; also 20 acres of upland and meadow on the same neck. Benjamin Tredwell was one of the subscribing witnesses.*

Samuel' Tredwell's widow married Judge David Jones. his will dated the 28th of November, 1755 (?1765), William Willett, Jr., of Rye, mentions her as sister Margaret, wife of David Jones, Esq.†

This has prompted the claim that the maiden name of Margaret (Tredwell) Jones was Willett. But, in this will, the testator also mentions Gloriana, the wife of Edward Stevenson, as his sister, and John Thomas as his brother. Edward Stevenson is known to have married Gloriana Thomas. The explanation is, Col. William Willett, the father of William Willett, Jr., married Margaret, the widow of the Rev. John Thomas and the mother of the said Margaret Jones and Gloriana Stevenson.

His wife Margaret is mentioned in Judge David Jones' will dated the 26th of July, 1768, and also in the codicil thereto, both of which were probated the 27th of October, 1775, and recorded in Liber 30 of Wills, page 31, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York.§

Margaret (Tredwell) Jones left a last will dated at Harrison, the 20th of January, 1789, which was probated the 21st of March, 1789, and recorded in Liber A of Wills, page 113, in the office of

the Surrogate of the county of Westchester, New York. mentions her son, Samuel Tredwell; her daughter-in-law, Dorothy Tredwell; her grandson, John Augustus Tredwell; her three daughters, Gloriana Pell, Margaret Ogden and Mary Stevenson; her grandchildren, Nancy Stevenson, Alexander Stevenson and Samuel Stevenson; and her son-in-law, Benjamin Stevenson. The executors named were her daughter Margaret and her son Samuel, besides two others. In September, 1794, Isaac Sniffen of Mamaroneck, Westchester county, seems to have been the only acting executor.*

TREDWELL CHILDREN:

The order of the daughters is obtained from Samuel Tredwell's will, the place for the son being uncertain.

10. Thomas Star' Tredwell (Thomas, John, Edward), born after 1703, living 19th October, 1769, died before 5th July, 1772; married before October, 1738, Elizabeth Lyon, born Greenwich, Connecticut, 12th January, 1717/8,‡ living 5th July, 1772,† daughter of John and Hannah (widow of Joseph Banks) Lyont of Greenwich, Conn., and Rye, (Byram Neck), New York. Residence, town of Rye (part now town of Harrison), as late as October, 1759, soon after which, Burling Slip, City of New York. It is not known where either Thomas Star' Tredwell or his wife is buried.

He was an overseer of highways in the town of Rye (Harrison) for the years 1744\square and 1757; vestryman of Christ's Church, Rye, New York, 1752. On the public records he is described as "gentleman."

Thomas Star' Tredwell witnessed the deed from Jonathan Whitehead and wife, Sarah, of Hempstead, New York, to Joseph

Kissam of same place, dated the 11th of March, 1727.**

By deed dated the 7th of March, 1737, Timothy' Tredwell of Suffolk county, New York, yeoman, conveyed to Thomas Star' Tredwell of Rye all his interest in the lands in Harrison conveyed to him by his brother John' Tredwell, Benjamin Tredwell aeting as one of the witnesses. † The latter conveyance has been described under John' Tredwell (p. 420, Oct., 1911, Record.)

Thomas Star' Tredwell was one of the witnesses to the will of Thomas Weden of Rye, dated the 11th of March, 1745, and

probated the 15th of May, 1746.*

The will of John Lyon of Rye, dated the 14th of July, 1749, and probated the 16th of August, 1749, mentions his daughter Elizabeth, wife of Thomas Star' Tredwell, and names her an executrix.

On the 15th of June, 1751, Thomas Star' Tredwell had the following ear mark entered on the Rye town book, "a Step on the foreside of the near Ear and a Slipe on the underside of the

off ear."‡

He was also one of the witnesses to the will of Isaac Burdsell of Rye, dated the 13th of August, 1757, and probated the 2nd of

April, 1761.§

By deed dated the 4th of October, 1759, Thomas Star' Tredwell of Rye, his wife Elizabeth joining, conveyed to Thomas Vail the farm of 320 acres whereon he was then living in Harrison, bounded by land of Isaac Birdsell and the highway leading through Purchase, and by land of John Cromwell and John Clap, and the northwest corner being on the west side of the cove of Rye Pond, the highway running through the middle to White Plains.

An advertisement dated the 17th of September, 1766, in the Supplement to the New York Gazette or Weekly Post Boy for said month shows that Thomas Star' Tredwell was then either living or doing business on Burling Slip, City of New York. And in the New York Journal or General Advertiser for the 19th of October, 1769, is an advertisement of raccoon skins for sale by Thomas Tredwell on Burling Slip, New York, and by Matthias

Halsted in Elizabeth Town.**

of same city; and John Mecom of Brunswick, N. J., the surety. Benjamin Halsted was employed by gold and silversmiths in New York City, Sept., 1766, he formed a partnership with Matthias Halsted to carry on the same business in Elizabeth Town, N. J., where Benjamin was then living, the place of business being nearly opposite Joseph Jelf's.

11. Charity' Tredwell (Thomas, John, Edward), died probably before 20th December, 1744 (date of mother's will); married Benjamin Smith of Hempstead, New York, died between 19th March, 1766 (date of his will), and 17th May, 1768 (date of probate). He married, secondly, before 1750, Amy Spragg, living 19th March, Residence, Town of Hempstead, probably south side.

Benjamin Smith left a will dated the 19th of March, 1766, which was probated the 17th of May, 1768, and recorded in Liber 26 of Wills, page 303, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York.* In it is mentioned his wife Amy; his daughter Amy, wife of Amos Smith; his three sons, Benjamin, Samuel and John; the sons of his daughter, Phebe Tredwell, wife of Thomas Tredwell, namely, John and Benjamin Tredwell; the children John Jackson, Jr., had by his granddaughter, Charity; the children of his daughter, Mary Titus, deceased, namely, Austin, James and Phebe Titus; his daughter-in-law, Millicent Betts.

13. Timothy Tredwell (Thomas, John, Edward), born (1713?), died 6th November, 1749; married Huntington, New York, 15th December, 1738,‡ (license dated 14th Decembers), Mary Platt, died between 14th September, 1773 (date of a receipt to her), and 13th May, 1774 (date of probate of her will), daughter of Epenetus and Elizabeth (Smith) Platt of Huntington. It is uncertain where either Timothy Tredwell or his wife was buried, but, presumably, they were interred in the same plot on his homestead at Sunk Meadows, where his mother had been buried (see page 318, July, 1911, Record). Residence, town of Hempstead to about 1735, soon after which he moved to Sunk Meadows, Smithtown, Suffolk county, New York (see page 318, July, 1911, Record). Pelletreau says the home of this family was on Trcdwell's Neck, west of Sunk Meadows, Smithtown. By trade he was a carpenter; yeoman, 1737.

Timothy' Tredwell was a witness to the will of Jemima Denton of Hempstead, dated the 8th of June, 1734, and probated the 24th of July, 1734.¶

By deed dated the 7th of April, 1735, Abel Smith and wife conveyed to Timothy Tredwell of Hempstead, carpenter, 450 acres bordering on the Sound, being on Sunken Meadow Neck in Smithtown, Suffolk County, New York.** And, the next day, Abel Smith of Bergen township, Bergen county, New Jersey, conveyed to him 200 acres also on Sunken Meadow Neck.†

On the 10th of November, 1736, Timothy' Tredwell entered his ear mark on the Smithtown books as follows: "a latch on the fore side of the left ear and a slope on the under side of the right ear."[[

By his will, Epenetus Platt left £ 100 to his son-in-law, Timothy Tredwell, and one-third of his residuary estate to his daughter, Mary Tredwell. Timothy' Tredwell was one of the executors thereof.§§

Moses Vail of Huntington made his "friend," Timothy Tredwell, an executor of his will, dated the 24th of August, 1749, which was probated the 3rd of April, 1750. On the last mentioned date

there was also probated the will of Isaiah Rogers of Huntington. dated the 26th of August, 1749, in which Timothy' Tredwell was likewise named one of the executors.*

The Ulster county, New York, records contain a copy of a deed dated the 20th of October, 1749, from Uri Waygant and wife, Jean, to Timothy Tredwell of Smithtown, Long Island, conveying 1/3 part of a tract of land near "Blew Hills" in Ulster county and called "Tenston Medow," which had been granted to said Waygant's father, Capt. William Bond. This deed was recorded many years after its date at the request of Thomas' Tredwell,

Esquire.

Timothy' Tredwell "of Smithtown" left a will dated the 211d of June, 1747, which was probated the 28th of February, 1749/50, and recorded in Liber 17 of Wills, page 72, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York, where the original remains on file. Therein testator mentions his wife, to whom he left the use of his dwelling house and real estate in Smithtown for life, with remainder over to his "eldest son," Thomas, then not of age; also other children. His wife, brother Benjamin' Tredwell, and Zophar Platt were named the executors. The original letters testamentary are now in the possession of Mrs. Charles Hilton Brown of the City of New York.

About 1768, a controversy arose over the real property left by Timothy' Tredwell, and to settle this an action was commenced in the Supreme Court in New York City and, later, moved into the Court of Chancery. The details are set forth in the Records of Smithtown, Long Island, N. Y., by W. S. Pelletreau, at pages 375 to 388. Therein (p. 380) will be found a copy of an agreement dated the 11th of February, 1768, between Mary Tredwell, Philetus Smith and wife Phebe, and Hannah Tredwell, all

of Smithtown.

Mary Tredwell "of Smithtown . . . widow of Timothy Tredwell being infirm and weak," made her will dated the 29th of February, 1772, which was probated the 13th of May, 1774, and recorded in Liber 30 of Wills, page 245, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York, The original testament remains on file there. It mentions her son Thomas, to whom she devised the tract of land purchased of Floyd Smith; her daughter, Phebe Smith, to whom was devised testatrix's interest in lands in the Patent of Winnecomac and the right of lands and meadows on Sumpwam's Neck (Babylon) and on South Beach; and her son-in-law, Mr. Phenix. Thomas and her son-in-law, Philetus Smith, were named the executors. Mrs. Charles Hilton Brown has an ancient copy of the letters testamentary issued upon the probate of said Mary Tredwell's will, dated the 13th of May, 1774; the inventory of the

estate left by her; also a bond made by and receipts given to her, one of the latter being dated the 14th of September, 1773.

By deed dated the 25th of April, 1778, her said executors conveyed to Joseph Buffet the 330½ acres bought of Thomas Smith; also the land on Sunk Meadows bought of Jacobus Hubbs.*

On the second page is an inventory dated at Hempstead, 1st of October. 1750, "of the Goods and Chattles of mary Treadwell Daughter of John Treadwell Deceased of the Township of heampsted," consisting principally of bedding and clothing, also a silver tankard, six silver spoons, and a trunk, Following this is a receipt of the said articles "By the Hands of Benjamin Treadwell Esqr," "Being In full of all The Goods and Chattels Left at the house of the Said Benjamin Treadwell by Mary Treadwell Daughter of John Treadwell" bearing the same date and signed by George Manlove, following Treadwell," bearing the same date and signed by George Manlove, following which is a certificate signed by Joseph Kissam, John Touffey and Richard Smith, stating that they saw the said "Benjamin Treadwell deliver the said goods to George Manlove."

FIFTH GENERATION:

Thomas' Tredwell (John, Thomas, John, Edward), baptized Hempstead, New York, 7th June, 1739, died between first Tuesday in April, 1780 (chosen overseer of highways), and 25th July, 1781 (date of probate of his will); married, by license, Hempstead, 12th March, 1739, Phebe Smith,* his cousin, survived husband, probably the Phebe Tredwell mentioned in 1790 United States Census as living alone, daughter of Benjamin and Charity (Tredwell) Smith of Hempstead. Residence, Coe's Neck, southerly side of town of Hempstead, New York; in 1774, on the north side of highway leading from Daniel Pine's land to "house of the late Capt. Benjamin Smith."† The place of burial of Thomas' Tredwell and wife is unknown. Locally, he was chosen a fence viewer, 1747, 1748, 1750-1752; overseer of highways, 1753-1764, 1776, 1778-1780; on committee "to fence the Plains belonging to" Hempstead, 1757.

Thomas' Tredwell was probably the church warden and vestryman by that name of St. George's Church, Hempstead, 1750-1761. On the public records he is described as "yeoman,"

"gentleman," and "farmer."

He was appointed an executor of the will of Jonathan Balding of Hempstead, dated the 19th of November, 1757; likewise of the will of Lucas Coovert of Hempstead, dated the 10th of May,

In 1776, he was ordered to remove his cattle to a place in the

country out of reach of the British.

Thomas' Tredwell left a will dated the 28th of June, 1779, which was probated the 25th of July, 1781, and recorded in Liber 34 of Wills, page 253, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York, where the original document is still on file. It mentions testator's wife Phebe, to whom he bequeathed, among other things, his silver plate; his grandson John Tredwell, son of his son Benjamin, to whom was left, among other things, his silver tankard; his grandsons, Tredwell Jackson and Samuel Jackson; his granddaughter Charity Tredwell, daughter of his grandland and not all the control of the same plants. son John, and not 18 years of age; his son Benjamin Tredwell, who, with testator's brother-in-law, Benjamin Smith, and friend, Isaac Denton, all of Hempstead, was appointed an executor.

Samuel Tredwell (John, Thomas, John, Edward), baptized in Hempstead, New York, 7th June, 1739, died 20th December, 1803, aged 76 years and 9 months, buried in St. Paul's churchyard, south of the church, town of Eastchester, Westchester county, New York; married, by license, in Hempstead, 20th January, 1750/1, Hannah Sands of Hempstead,* born Cow Neck, present town of North Hempstead, New York, 18th December, 1731,† living 5th February, 1800 (date of husband's will), may be 1821, probably buried near or in same grave with husband, daughter of Edward Sands of Sands' Point, North Hempstead. Until, at least, March, 1749, Samuel' Tredwell resided in town of Hempstead, in 1748, the part called Cow Neck; before June, 1751, moved to northern part of town of Eastchester, dwelling on east side of White Plains road, near junction of road to New Rochelle. He was a carpenter, 1748-1749;‡ in Eastchester, an overseer of roads, 1756 and 1766;§ viewer of damages, 1757-1759, when also of fences; assessor, 1760 and 1765. On the county records he is described as "yeoman."

During the Revolution his dwelling became the headquarters of Lord Howe when the British army lay encamped in the vicinity. In 1836 the homestead was owned by Capt. Joseph Skinner who had married one of Samuel's Tredwell's granddaughters.

In 1790 the family of Samuel Tredwell consisted of 3 males over and 2 males under 16 years of age, 7 white females, and 1 free person.

His son John Tredwell, John Bennett of Scarsdale, and Jonathan Wood of Eastchester, were named the executors. Letters testamentary were issued to his said son John Tredwell on the 10th of March, 1804.

He resided at Manhasset, in the present town of North Hempstead, New York. He was a vestryman of St. George's Church, Hempstead, 1752-1754; justice of the peace under the crown; member of Assembly, 1764-1775; county treasurer, 1759-1782. On account of his loyalty during the Revolution, his home-

stead, consisting of 330 acres, was confiscated and sold at auction,

his widow bidding it in for £2,000 sterling. Both Daniel Kissam and his widow left a will. ment, dated the 17th of October, 1781, was probated the 28th (13th?) of September, 1782, and recorded in Liber 35 of Wills, page 109, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York. Her will was probated the 11th of October, 1813, and recorded in Liber C of Wills, page 292, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of Queens, New York.

was chosen an overseer of highways in Hempstead for years 1773 and 1774.

On the 8th of December, 1747, he entered the following earmark on the Hempstead records, "a Latch the fore Side of the off Eare."

His marriage bond was signed by Benjamin Tredwell of Queens county, farmer, and by Benjamin Kissam, Esq., and it recites that the license was obtained by John Tredwell of Queens county, farmer, and Peggy Cornell, of same place, spinster.

The father of Peggy (Cornell) Tredwell mentions her only by first name in his will dated the 24th of December, 1763, which was probated the 9th of April, 1764, and recorded in Liber 24 of Wills, page 376, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York. In her will dated the 15th of May, 1765, probated the 16th of May, 1769, and recorded in Liber 27 of Wills, page 46, in said Surrogate's office, Sarah Cornell of Hempstead speaks of her granddaughters, Phebe and Sarah Tredwell, the children of her daughter Peggy Tredwell.

John⁶ Tredwell left a will dated the 1st of December, 1779, which was probated the 4th of February, 1780, and recorded in Liber 34 of Wills, page 76, in said Surrogate's office. It mentions testator's wife Margaret, and his children named hereafter, the sons, Thomas and John, receiving the homestead farm on Great Neck. The executors designated were testator's brother Benjamin Tredwell, his brother-in-law William Thorne, and his wife.

The inscriptions on the head-stones marking the graves of John' Tredwell and wife are as follows:

"In | memory of | John Tredwell | who departed this life | Dec. 11th 1779 | Aged 47 years 4 m° & 8 Ds."

"In | memory of | Peggy | wife of John Tredwell | who departed this life | October 12th 1781 | Aged 45 years 4 mos & 6 Days."

This is another of the class histories, so interesting to friends and so valuable to biographers of the future. The plan of adding statistics concerning relatives of the class who have been Yale men lends genealogical interest to the work.

HISTORY OF THE NEW YORK SOCIETY LIBRARY, with an introductory chapter on libraries in Colonial New York, 1698-1776. Austin Baxter Keep, A. M. New York. The De Vinne Press. 1908. 8vo, cloth, pp. XVI-607. Price \$7.50.

An immense amount of historical and biographical research, is represented here, and the references in the foot-notes add most satisfactorily to its value. In addition, the work has been very fully illustrated with portraits, views, book-plates and facsimiles. It is of interest to know that Trinity Parish established the first library in New York, in 1698. The New York Society Library was founded in 1754, and its great services to the colonial town are ably set forth in this work.

Mr. Farman has made it easy for thousands of his kin to trace their ancestry to William Foreman who came to America in 1675 and settled near Annapolis, Maryland; in fact he has traced it for them, and the publisher has spared no pains or expense to produce a book worthy of the matter it contains. Type, presswork, paper and binding, all show the practiced hand of the master book-maker. The illustrations, 15 portraits, 2 ancient tombstones, and the family coat-of-arms, beautifully reproduced in colors, add artistic tone and historic interest, while a very complete index, the boon of all genealogical gleaners, completes this very unique and dignified volume of 232 pages.

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

EDWIN HENRY WEATHERBEE.

Edwin Henry Weatherbee, son of Henry Micajah and Mary Angell Weatherbee, was born at Chatham, Columbia Co., N. Y., Sept. 23rd, 1852. It was my privilege to bring him into this Society and he became a life member Jan. 6th, 1896; and in 1890 was elected to fill the vacancy in the Board of Trustees caused by the

death of Samuel Burhans, Jr.

He was prepared for college at the Amenia Seminary and Hopkins Grammar School at New Haven, Conn. He entered Yale University and was graduated in the Academical Department in 1875 with the degree of A. B. After teaching for two years as principal of the High School of his native city, he entered the School of Law in Columbia University, and was graduated in 1879 with the degree of LL.B. and was admitted to the New York bar. For three years he was associated in the office of the U. S. District Attorney for the Southern District of New York, under Hon. Stewart Lyndon Woodford, District Attorney, who had been Colonel and Brevet Brigadier General in the War for the Union, Lieutenant Governor of the State of New York, and since United States Minister Plenipotentiary to Spain.

On Nov. 15th, 1881 Mr. Weatherbee married Miss Amy Henrietta Constable, daughter of the late James M. Constable, of the firm of Arnold, Constable & Co., the great mercantile house founded by Aaron Arnold in 1816, who was the grandfather of his wife, and of which he became the head, and was sole manager at the time of his

death, having entered the firm in January, 1882.

John Wetherby came at the time of the Puritan emigration in 1630–32, during the conflict between Charles I and Parliament. He came from Norfolk, the Puritan section of England. There is a town named Wetherby in Yorkshire. The name is variously spelled, changes occur in the first vowel and the termination, but undoubtedly the family is one. John the emigrant ancestor, married early in 1672, Mary, daughter of John Howe, Jr., born Jan. 18th, 1654. John Howe, Senior, came from Warwickshire. Both families lived in Sudbury and Marlborough, Mass.

John and Mary Wetherby had three sons: Joseph, born Sept. 18th, 1672, who married Elizabeth, Feb. 9th, 1699; John, born March 26th, 1675; and Thomas, born Jan. 5th, 1678, married Hannah Woods, daughter of John and Lydia Woods, Feb. 20th, 1699. She was born in Marlborough in 1677, and died Jan. 23rd, 1713. Thomas and Hannah had: Thomas, born in 1705 and Silas in 1707. They removed to Grafton, and again to Shrewsbury, Mass.

John Woods was the eldest son of John Woods of Sudbury, who was the Sergeant of the garrison house in King Philip's War, and John Wetherby also volunteered at that time to defend the town. The time assigned me is inadequate to trace the line to the subject of our sketch, but enough has been said to show his earliest an-

cestors were patriotic Puritan men and women.

The father of Mr. Weatherbee was prominent in politics, and interested in early railroads. He was elected to office, and showed in his administration thereof the training he had received from his ancestors. He married Mary Angell, a descendant of Thomas Angell, born in England in 1618, who came to this country on the Lion in 1630 from London with Roger Williams. He was a minor. He moved to Salem, Mass. in 1631, and went with Williams to Providence, R. I. in 1636. His wife Alice died in 1693 and he the next year. They had two sons and four daughters: John² Angell, born 1646, died July 27th, 1720, married Jan. 7th, 1669, Ruth Field, daughter of John. She died 1727. He served in King Philip's War, they had four sons and two daughters. Daniel born May 2nd, 1680, married Hannah Winsor, she died June 16th, 1750. Ezekiel', born 1722, was a baptist minister at Smithfield, R. I. He married Ruth Sprague, and died Sept. 27th, 1782. She was born Dec. 6th, 1728, and died Dec. 22nd, 1816. Joshua⁵, the third son, born at Smithfield, March 29th, 1760, served as a soldier in the Revolution, though but fifteen when the war commenced. He married Mehitable Man-They removed in 1807 to Kinderhook, N. Y., and later to Chatham in the same County. He died Feb. 10th, 1838, and his wife Oct. 2nd, 1825. John⁶, the eldest child, born Aug. 20th, 1794, at Johnson, R. I., married Amy A., daughter of Joseph Harger. She died May 11th, 1874. They had three sons and Mary Augell who married Henry M. Weatherbee.

The Harger family lived at Stratford and Derby, Conn. The tradition states that they were Huguenots, and came from New Rochelle, N. Y., into that state. Jabez Harger, born in 1642, who married in 1662, Margaret, daughter of Henry Tomlinson, and died in 1678. They had Samuel, born Sept. 29th, 1663, Ebenezer, born Dec. 25th, 1674, Abraham, born April 1st, 1677, and Jabez, posthumous. This was the family of Joseph Harger, the greatgrandfather of Mr. Weatherbee. His great-grandmother Mehitable Manton, shown above, was the daughter of Daniel Manton and Patience Eddy. This family was of Providence, R. I., the earliest

being Edward who lived there until his death in 1682.

Daniel Manton was one of the organizers of a Troop of Horse, chartered by the Assembly of Rhode Island in 1775. It was called

the Captain Generals Cavaliers. They did duty about their home town Providence, and in May, 1783, the return of the officers was approved by the General Assembly as follows: Daniel Manton, captain; Caleb Harris, first lieutenant; Nicholas Eddy, second lieutenant; John King, Jr., cornet, and William Waterman, quartermaster. Mr. Weatherbee joined the Sons of the Revolution as a descendant of Captain Manton.

Mr. Weatherbee, as before stated, married Miss Amy Henrietta Constable, daughter of James M. Constable, a native of Storington, Surrey, England, and Henrietta, his wife, daughter of Aaron Arnold, who came from the Isle of Wight, England, where for generations his ancestors had lived on a property known as, Waytes Court, Broxton. This name Mr. Weatherbee gave to his place on the shore at Mamaroneck, N. Y., which was originally part of the De Lancey family's grant from Queen Anne of England.

Mr. Weatherbee found time amid his engrossing business and social engagements to travel, visiting all parts of the world and some places frequently. He has been a successful competitor at various horse shows, and has taken an interest in yachting, driving, riding and sports of various kinds, while his taste for literature and the arts was not neglected.

The end came unannounced and quietly, while in company of his wife and daughters at the performance of "La Boheme" at the Metropolitan Opera House. Just as the curtain rang down on the last act he slipped from his chair and became unconscious. In the box with them, Dr. Samuel Milbank, the fiancé of his daughter, was present and gave every attention. He was removed to his home and remained in a critical condition from that evening, (the 7th), until he died, Sunday, Feb. 11th, 1912, in the 61st year of his age.

His children: Henrietta Constable Weatherbee (Mrs. Caleb Potter Read), Hicks Arnold Weatherbee and Mary Angell Weatherbee, who is engaged to Dr. Samuel Milbank, were all with him at the end. The city home was at 240 Madison Avenue.

He was a member of the Chamber of Commerce, the Sons of the Revolution, the New York Genealogical and Biographical Society, New England Society, Metropolitan Museum of Art and American Museum of Natural History, and the following Clubs: Union League, Metropolitan, Yale, University, Reform, City, Ridiug and Driving, Michaux Bicycle, Knollwood, Jockey, New York Yacht, American Yacht, Larchmont Yacht, Westchester Horse Show Association, and a director of the Y. M. C. A.

Notwithstanding this, he seldom spent any time at any of these for he was not a clubman. He was essentially a home man, and was happiest there; and when he strolled over his estates, or drove up to his different places, or sailed in his launch upon the sound, he always wanted some of his dear ones with him in his usual trips at the week-ends, when at home; for every year he went abroad, though he had travelled extensively in many different countries, as well as having seen all parts of his own.

His love of family was not confined to his own domestic circle, for he was interested in the scenes and homes where his ancestors had lived; so much so that he had purchased many of these, on both sides, thus showing his fondness for them and their surroundings. These he not only restored, but enlarged and fitted up, adding artistic decorations, and beautifying with rare and costly woods and ornaments; sometimes supplementing the skill of his architects with his own contributions gathered in his travels; and in the house upon the Sound, he reproduced many of the old world features in a more beautiful and elaborate copy, which the old Hall on the Isle of Wight could not aspire to.

His was a sunny disposition, full of mirth and witticism, this playfulness was very noticeable even at the last meal with his family. His good taste and kindness held him in check, remembering:

"True wit is like a brilliant stone,
Dug from the Indian mine,
Which boasts two different powers in one,
To cut as well as shine.
Genius, like that, if polished right,
With the same gifts abounds,
Appears at once both keen and bright,
And sparkles while it wounds."

It is so easy for the wit to be led into the playful word that makes a wound, perhaps an enemy for life, like Poor Yorick, whose "wild way of talking cost him ten enemies for every joke." This man was far too tender for that.

I have spoken of the places bought by him, yet, in acquiring these he never disturbed the former owner or occupant, but drew them into a friendly employment, and on his visits talked with them of his plans and theirs, with all the friendliness of equals. Here was the explanation of the respect and love from all his subordinants, in business and other places. Arrogance and oppression were never in his treatment of any man. Augustine's rule applies to him: "Make companions of few, be intimate with one, deal gently with all, speak evil of none." His college room-mate seems to have been his close friend to the end.

He was passionately fond of nature, and Columbia County between the broad Hudson and the magnificent Berkshires was just the place for its full enjoyment; not merely this, but education, and as Milton says:

"In contemplation of created things, By steps we may ascend to God."

So of that other fondness which he had—music. Whoever knew any but a good man with these? Shakespeare truly says

"The man that hath no music in himself, Nor is not moved with concord of sweet sounds, Is fit for treasons,"—

and all the world is ready to admit the truth, and then rise to the higher note of Dr. George W. Bethune: "Music, celestial visitant! so familiarize us with thy high and saintly language in this lower

sphere, that we may be the better purified and prepared to join in the new song, in that clime, whence thou hast thy source."

Mr. Weatherbee was a member of the Church of the Incarnation, Madison Avenue and 35th Street. He was also a Vestryman of that church, and an intimate friend of its pastor, Rev. H. C. Robbins, its rector.

The business will be continued by the family, and Hicks Arnold Weatherbee, his only son, a graduate of Yale, of the class of 1908, will manage it for them. May the virtues of the father be so impressed that there may be no diminution of upright faithfulness in the business and of the family.

The funeral services were held at the Church of the Incarnation, Madison Avenue and 35th Street, and the large attendance testified to the estimation in which the deceased was held by a large circle of friends, representing every walk in life.

"FROME" VAN BUSKIRK. THE WANDERINGS OF A NEW YORK FAMILY.

Genealogy has its surprises and romances. The typical delver into vital records does not suggest much romance, it is true, in his round-shouldered search of maddening indices, but he often uncovers a story which traces a thread of romance through centuries. Imagine the pleasurable interest with which a man discovers that some New England ancestor was hanged as a witch at Salem. Among the surprises of genealogy may be mentioned the Scotch-Gaelic speaking negroes whom Kipling speaks of in his "Captains Courageous." And in Creole Louisiana the very names on the streets have a French and Spanish background which fades into romance. Back of all this is the sombre tinge of black blood, which often brings tragedy into genealogical research. Witness the young man of wealth and honored name who incautiously consulted the parish register only to find "F.M.C." (free man of color) against his maternal grandfather's name. He committed suicide and his beautiful sister became insane.

In a certain Massachusetts city a few years ago lived a man whose ancestry, while not at all famous, suggests several points of interest. He was commonly called "Frome" van Buskirk. A little inquiry into his Christian name would show that it was spelt "Vroom." In a land of Adamses, Lunts, Dows and Eatons, a land of as thorough Yankee connotation as can be found, lived the owner of this Dutch patronymic, which would have passed muster in Amsterdam itself.

But Vroom van Buskirk was not Dutch in appearance, manner or thought. He was as thorough a Yankee, to look at him, as any Adams or Eaton among them. In fact he had become a perfect part of his environment. As for van Buskirk's ancestry the reader has of course placed him as Dutch of the first water, Dutch as windmills, or cheese, or anything else which suggests the heroic land of dikes and canals. But if you asked the man himself what he was, he would have answered that he was a Nova Scotian. Yes, in the county histories of the Annapolis Valley will be found the genealogies of the Vrooms and the van Buskirks. There in a country wrested from the Indians by the French, and from the French by the English, within a short journey of Longfellow's Grand Pré these families have been Nova Scotian farmers for three or four generations. Here they were and are indistinguishable from the English families about them, yet retaining their Dutch Christian names, and preserving the What Englishman would pronounce Dutch pronunciation. Vroom as "Frome?"

The Vrooms and van Buskirks were British Tories who were brought to Nova Scotia from New Jersey and New York at the close of our Revolutionary War. Thus they figure not as listless subjects of whatever power they happen to be under, but as profound partizans. They were enthusiastically loyal to King George, so much so that they sacrificed their properties and their homes for his cause.

We can but wonder if these families accepted British domination as eagerly as they afterwards clung to it. What were their feelings when Col. Richard Nichols sailed up New York Bay with his "three hundred valiant red-coats"? Search of Diedrich Knickerbocker's famous history fails to identify them as welcoming the dreaded English ruffians, and it is more probable that they were among the sullen Dutch who gazed at the English troops from their garret windows, and resolved to get even with their conquerors by not inviting them to dinner.

We have now traced "Frome" van Buskirk's genealogy to its first American setting and there we will leave him. America has many similar stories of the vicissitudes and wanderings of family names, as interesting as those of Europe. The story of these Dutchmen had its parallel in some German stripling, straying in advance of the great Germanic invasion into Provincia Cisalpina, there to be plowboy, warrior, and then, with a Latinized name, master to the effeminate Roman noble whom he served. "Frome" van Buskirk, working at his trade in Yankee Land brings to our mind the Dutch settler of New Amsterdam, whose hate for his British conqueror changed into such loyalty that he endured exile for his king's sake. He was transported to far off Nova Scotia, only to return after a few generations to accept the ideas and principles of those colonists with whom he scorned to cast his lot in Revolutionary days. There as a plain Yankee, unmindful of his piquant ancestral history, he rounded out his life and was gathered to his fathers.

LIEUTENANT-COLONEL BENJAMIN HUNT, THE LOYALIST, HIS ANCESTRY AND DESCENDANTS.

Wyman's Hunt Genealogy is not only obscure in construction and unscientific in form generally, but abounds in errors, at least in connection with the family to which Col. Hunt belonged. The author professes to rely for the earlier section of his "New York Line" on the genealogical notes and other data in Bolton's History of Westchester County, no doubt a splendid work as far as it deals with ordinary matters of county history, but not so reliable in the pages of the appendix devoted to pedigrees. His errors have been pointed out to me by my esteemed correspondents George T. Fish, Esq., of Rochester, N. Y., and Benjamin W. Hunt, Esq., of Eatonton, Georgia, to whom with Doctor William L. Macy of King's Park Hospital, N. Y., I am much indebted for extracts from wills and other matter used in compiling the earlier part of this record. At the close of the revolutionary struggle Benjamin Hunt, after strenuous military service, came to Nova Scotia and settled at Upper Clements in the Township of Clements, in what is known as the Ryerson Settlement, about five miles from the town of Annapolis Royal, where he was until his death a prominent and influential citizen. In his deposition before the Commissioners appointed to take evidence on the claims of the Loyalists for compensation for their losses, sworn at Annapolis Royal, Oct. 16, 1786, and copied in vol. 18, pp. 147-165, of the evidence as transcribed for the New York Public Library, he gives three clues as to his origin and identity: 1st he was a native of Eastchester; 2nd he was a son of Moses Hunt; 3rd he had been firmly attached to the crown and government from the beginning of the troubles. This statement distinguishes him from the Benjamin Hunt who Wyman (pp. 169 and 170), jumping at the unreasonable conclusion that he was the same man, says "commanded a regiment called Jersey Blues" on Long Island and with fifteen men achieved the exploit of capturing thirty British troops by stratagem, citing Bolton, ii, p. 484. (Bolton's revised history, which I will hereafter cite, ii, p. 658), and "finally attached to the Loyalists he migrated to the Provinces." There were actually four Benjamin Hunts contemporary, the scenes of whose activities were not far apart in those days of fratricidal strife. ties were not far apart in those days of fratricidal strife. 1st my present subject; 2nd a son of a widow, Mercy Hunt, whose will proved July 5, 1762, mentions sons Jeremiah, Pexall and Benjamin; 3rd a son of Thomas Hunt of Eastchester, whose will was proved Nov. 6, 1770; and 4th Benjamin Hunt, Junior, eldest son of my subject.

Bolton says (ii, p. 738) that the family were supposed to have descended from a younger son of Thomas Hunt of Shrewsbury, Shropshire, England, Bailiff* of Shrewsbury in 1613, which would mean that Thomas the immigrant ancestor was such younger son, or a son of his, but when he says that Thomas Hunt was Sheriff of Shropshire and a Colonel in the Parliamentary army, he means another Thomas Hunt. The arms assigned to the family by Bolton are the same as given in Burke's General Armory to the Hunts of Longnor, Shropshire, the main features of which are common to a good many Hunt families: Per pale ar. and sa., a saltire counterchanged; crest: a lion's head erased per pale argent and sa. collared, gu. lined and ringed or. † The immigrant ancestor of this family, like the immigrant ancestor of the great Washington himself was a Royalist and a member of the Church of England, escaping from the rule of the victorious enemies of the Church and Crown, and his descendants for the most part continued attached to the Church of England for several generations, as Bolton's pages, where they are frequently mentioned as Church officials, sufficiently show. Some of them, however, of the early generations united with the Society of Friends.

1. Thomas' Hunt was of Stamford, Conn., in 1650 and 1653, probably of Rye, N. Y., in 1652, and removed to Westchester where he obtained, Dec. 4, 1667, from Governor Nichols a patent for the "Grove Farm" which was "ratified and confirmed" to him by Governor Dongan in 1686 (Bolton, ii, 268-9). He died 1694. His wife's name was Cecilia, but I cannot give

her maiden name. He had sons:

i. Thomas, b. before 1644; m. 1665, Elizabeth Jessup. I say before 1644 because he was old enough to sign an important public document as Thomas Hunt, Junior, in 1665 (Bolton, ii, 296). His eldest son Thomas, b. 1666; d. Oct. 25, 1739, ae. 73; m. Elisa-Thus the second Thomas was at beth Gardiner. first known as Thomas Hunt, Jr., and after his son Thomas' became of age, as Thomas Hunt, Sr., of (the town of) West Farms, while the first Thomas Hunt became Thomas Hunt, Sr., of the Grove Farm. When the first Thomas died his grandson Thomas had been of age and an active participant in the affairs of the community seven years, destined himself to become in time Thomas Hunt, Sr., and so these Thomas Hunts, Senior and Junior, are more or less confused by Bolton and Wyman. One thing is abundantly clear: they were all men of position, influence and usefulness. Bolton shows that the Hunt family came into possession of Hunt's Point at the extremity of Planting Neck in West Farms by

the marriage of Thomas Hunt to the daughter of Edward Jessup, and held it for nearly 160 years. This applies to the second Thomas Hunt. It will be seen that there is also a Hunt's Point in Nova Scotia.

ii. John, b. —; had son William bap, Oct. 7, 1680; was a Justice in 1702.

iii. Joseph, b. before 1652, had a son of age in 1696 (Bolton, ii, 311).

iv. Josiah.

I have followed the order in which they are named in the Indian deed of 1692 (Bolton, ii, 290), where they with others are described as Trustees of the Freehold and Commonalty of Westchester.

Josiah² Hunt (Thomas¹); Bolton says he married Bethiah Horguson, which is a mistake for Ferguson and applies not to this but to another Josiah. He m. (1) before June 28, 1671, Rebecca —; m. (2) before Aug. 16, 1688, Martha —; d. Dec., 1732. He was Alderman and Church Warden, 1701-2, and Justice and Church Warden, 1702-3. His father, Thomas Hunt, by his will (Bolton, ii, 269) shows that his eldest son was Josiah, devising to the latter the Grove Farm, but in the pedigree, p. 738, Bolton wrongly makes him an only son, and relegates the real Josiah to another generation, and gives the children a different order. I think it probable that Thomas named for his grandfather

would come next. I therefore put the order of his children, sons:

His father, the first Josiah, by his will dated March 30, 1729, proved Dec. 19, 1732, devised to him 40 acres of upland in the Long Reach, being the 11th lot bought of Richard Parton, also 10 acres on the Long Reach being the 9th lot bought of Dora Garretson and £75 privileges in said tract. He d. in May, 1764, and his will dated 1760, was probated May 21, 1764. His children (ten in all) in the order in which they were mentioned in his will were,

v. Vinnus, m. — Oakley. One of these Oakleys was vi. Phoebe, m. — Oakley. William, the other David. Lieutenant-Colonel Benjamin' Hunt (Moses. Josiah, Thomas'). He took under his father's will his father's house and fresh meadow "which land lyeth to the Mile Square road and Bronx River, and so far down the river as to where there is a great bend and a hollow in the bend, from thence East across to the fence that joins the road from White Plains to King's Bridge, and so up the river to the Mile Square road" (extracted for me from Pelletreau's, Early Westchester County, N. Y., Wills, pp. 51, 205-7). He declares in his petition for compensation as a Loyalist that he was ever uniformly attached to his Majesty's person and the British Government, and that he very early opposed the measures of the American Congress. Here I may note that ten members of the Hunt family of Westchester County, April 13, 1775, led by the eminent Loyalist Frederic Phillipse, signed a protest against sending delegates to the Congress at Philadelphia, among them our Benjamin Hunt, and later John Hunt, Esq., requested that his name be added (Bolton, ii, p. 557). He acted at different times as Lieut. Colonel of the Westchester militia during the war, and at different times had the command of them, and was frequently out with them on actual service. He acted as guide to the British army at the battle of White Plains, at the reduction of Fort Kniphausen, and on many other occasions; was taken prisoner and kept in close confinement for ten months and his property confiscated and sold. He says further that while the troops were in Boston he supplied them with provisions at great risk. In Oct., 1776, he joined the army under General Howe at Pell's Manor, and gives further details of his military career. Other witnesses deposed in corroboration. He estimated his losses at £1799 English money, and was awarded £1585. He was drowned while attempting to cross the Annapolis River between Granville and his home in Upper Clements in July, 1796. Tradition in the line of his son Joseph, who was born only four years before that event, says he was aged 60, but I think he must have been older. He died intestate. In the inventory of his estate we find one negro man named Jone, £20. He was evidently married three times, but I have been so far unable to find the names of his first two wives. Mr. Isaiah Wilson, the historian of Digby County, in which many of his descendants live has thought that the one who came with him to Nova Scotia was a Purdy or a Ryerson, more likely the latter, and that he and Francis Ryerson were brothersin-law may account for their settling side by side. I cannot find any record of her death, nor any gravestone in her memory. No one knows where she was buried. I have consulted three of her grandchildren, all of whom have forgotten her name. I have found only a faint tradition in one line that her given name was Mary Ann, and that the eldest daughter of her son Elijah was named for her. His son George also named a daughter Mary Ann. If the statement in Wyman that his first wife was of Long Island was furnished by William Hunt his grandson it is probably true of the latter's grandmother, the second wife. Here I may remark that the descendants of Colonel Hunt have been migratory and scattered, and have lost their family traditions to a degree most extraordinary. He m. (3) at Annapolis Royal, N. S., Feb. 24, 1791, Anna Stearns, probably a sister of Benjamin Stearns, a Loyalist, who died at Digby in April (buried 27th), 1790, and whose widow Bethiah (Purdy) m. (2), Nov. 1 1792, Col. Frederic Davoue, also a distinguished Westchester County Loyalist. She mentions in her will dated 1810, probated 1815, her mother Anna Stearns and son Joseph of whom presently her mother Anna Stearns and son Joseph of whom presently. From Angus M. Gidney, Esq., Member of the Legislative Assembly and now Collector of Customs at Digby, a gentleman who takes an intelligent interest in family history, I have acquired information which identifies the Benjamin Hunt and Elizabeth Gidney* whose license to marry issued Dec. 31, 1778, is given by Wyman, p. 170. He was the eldest son of Colonel Benjamin Hunt, and she a sister of Joseph Gidney, the Loyalist, and greatgreat-aunt of my informant whose father and uncles spoke of her as their "Aunt Betty Hunt." Mr. Gidney was present with his father and members of the Hunt family, including the late John Reid Hunt, Esq., all now dead, when the death of Doctor Joseph Hunt, son of Benjamin and Elizabeth, and the inheritance of his

property were discussed, and it was assumed as a well known fact that Benjamin was the only child of the Colonel by his first wife, thus confirming a conclusion I had reached that Benjamin, Junior, old enough to be married in Jan., 1779, was not likely to have been a child of the same mother as Elijah, born in 1784. The natural presumption is that Benjamin, Junior, was of age when he married, and if his father was only 60 in 1796, the average of the ages of the father and the son at their marriages was not more than 21 years. The records of Deeds for the County of Annapolis give a clue to the number of his children but not all their names as there was no deed of partition of his real estate. The law then gave the eldest son a double share, so that an estate was divided into as many shares as there were children plus one. We find his son Benjamin and wife Elizabeth, July 2, 1801, conveying to Francis Ryerson an undivided fifth and on Sept. 10, 1805, Elijah Hunt, then just come of age conveying to John Ryerson an "equal undivided tenth part," showing that there were nine children in all. George Hunt of Clements, Aug. 14, 1798, conveys to Moses Hunt "at present* of the same place, Cooper" an "individed share," and Nov. 20, 1800, Moses Hunt, "carpenter," and Hannah his wife convey to Francis Ryerson an undivided half part, showing that Moses must have bought three shares besides that of George, but I fail to find any other deeds. The account of the Nova Scotia family in Wyman, p. 169, bears internal evidence of having been furnished by William Hunt (eldest son of Elijah and a grandson of the Colonel), whose family record is at the top of the second column of that page, which with that of his father's family and his brother Benjamin's I accept substantially as he gave it to Mr. Wyman, as far as it goes, correcting it only where I know it to be wrong, but he does not give the names of all his uncles, nor any of his aunts. He gives the Colonel two daughters, but I think he had four, some of whom may have been married before their father came to Nova Scotia as we may perhaps safely infer from Wyman. Bolton in his chart pedigree of the Underhill family shows marriage of Lancaster Underhill, 1772, with Eudosia, b. Dec. 24, 1752, dau. of Benjamin Hunt, but I conclude she must have been daughter of one of the other Benjamins. I find on the records of St. Luke's Church, Annapolis, William Griffin m. Sarah Hunt who may have been a daughter of the Colonel. This was in Feb., 1791, the day not given, but apparently on the same day as the last marriage of the Colonel himself.

I therefore venture to construct an imperfect list of his

in 1801 (Records of Deeds Annapolis and Digby). Finally he lived in Brooklyn, N. Y., and died there; had one son Joseph Gidney Tarleton, bap. at Digby, Oct. 18, 1790, the parents having first received adult baptism on the same day. Joseph G. T. Hunt was a Physician, for a while practised in Bridgetown, N. S., and afterwards in New York, where he died unm. Benjamin, Jr., had also a dau. Caroline, who m. but died without issue.

By 2nd wife:

Mr. Wyman's informant was wrong in saying that his wife was a "native of England, inheriting English property;" she was a daughter of Abraham Spurr who came with his father Michael Spurr among the New England settlers of Annapolis County (see History of Annapolis, pp. 151 and 656). Her mother was Mary, dau. of Francis Le Quesne, or Le Cain, who m. Sept. 1, 1745, Alicia Maria, dau. of Thomas Hyde, who had been a "Master" in the Ordnance Department at Annapolis Royal, in which Le Cain, a native of Jersey was "Master Armourer." Mr. Hyde d. in England. The account was compiled for Mr. Wyman probably at the time that the excitement about the elusive and fabulous "Hyde fortune" was at its height among numberless supposed heirs in Nova Scotia and the United States. JOSEPH STEARNS' HUNT (Col. Benjamin, Moses, Josiah, 2 Thomas'), was b. 10. REVEREND ABRAHAM SPURR⁶ HUNT (Elijah, * Col. Benjamin, * Moses, * Josiah, * Thomas'), was b. April 7, 1814, and m. Catherine, dau. by his first wife May Cunningham, of Dr. Lewis Johnstone, who was a son of Capt. William Martin Johnstone, a distinguished Loyalist officer of Georgia, also an "M.D." and a son of Dr. Lewis Johnstone, a leading Councillor and Administrator of the Government of that Province (see "Some Recollections of a Georgia Royalist," by A. W. H. Eaton and the Calnek-Savary History of Annapolis, pp. 426 and 439, and the New York Gen. and Biog. Record for 1903, pp. 35 and 36). He was a graduate of Acadia College, Wolfville, N.S., a leading Baptist Divine of Nova Scotia, Pastor of churches at Dartmouth and Cornwallis and Superintendent of Education for the Province from 1868 till his death, Oct. 23, 1877. His children were as follows:

v. Ella Maude, b. Feb. 10, 1854; m. Aug. 11, 1884, Rev-Arthur Crawley Chute, D.D., a Baptist Divine and pastor of churches in Chicago and Halifax and Professor of Hebrew in Acadia College. For their

vi. Ralph Melburne, b. Aug. 11, 1858, graduated in Acadia College; a clergyman of the Baptist Church at St. Stephens, N. B., Jamaica Plain, Boston and Hamilton, Ont. He was much respected and beloved, and d. unm. in Oct., 1902, of typhoid fever while on a visit to Boston.

B., and 2 daughters, Elizabeth and Catherine, one of whom m. a Perkins of St. John.

13. WILLIAM LOVETT BENT HUNT (Joseph S., Col. Benjamin, Moses, Josiah, Thomas'), was b. June 23, 1833, and m. Nov. 1, 1867, Caroline Franklin, and lives at Acaciaville, Digby County.

A large number of the descendants of Col. Benjamin Hunt now live in the United States, and probably the majority of them in Massachusetts.

OTHER HUNTS IN THE MARITINE PROVINCES.

The roll of Loyalists mustered at Digby, May, 1784, (N.Y. Gen. and Biog. Record, vol. xxxiv, p. 122), contains Theodis (probably for Theodosius) Hunt, 1 man, 1 woman, and Frederic Hunt, 1 man, I woman and 4 children above 10 years old in family, and

Thomas Hunt, no family. Probably the Frederic and Theodis were the two sons of Nehemiah of East Chester mentioned in Wyman, p. 167, and Frederic again on p. 337. If so Frederic must have returned to the U.S. and settled in New Haven, Conn., after the rancour of the war had abated. But Wyman's list of his children conflicts a little with the muster roll. That of Annapolis Royal, June, 1784, gives us Benjamin Hunt I man, I woman, I child above 10 and I servant. I think this is Lieut. Benjamin, Jr., whose child by a clerical error in the copy recorded in the archives in Halifax is placed in the wrong column, for he could have had no child over ten at that date. The Colonel himself had charge of a "class" in making and enrolling the muster. Besides Cosby Hunt, Lientenant and Adjutant, mentioned by Sabine, Samuel Hunt and John Hunt were Loyalist grantees of St. John in 1783. I cannot account for John Hunt who d. at Marshalltown near Digby Jan. 12, 1846, ac. 86, and was therefore b. 1759 or 1760, but I think he was a nephew or first cousin of the Colonel. He m. apparently in middle age Tamar, daughter of Captain Frederic Williams, a prominent Loyalist from Westchester County, N. Y., whose wife was Eleanor Pell. He is said to have come to Digby from New Brunswick. He may have been the grantee of that name in St. John. To the Loyalist "protest" of Westchester County in 1775 no less than three John Hunts, besides John, Esq., signed their names, two of them Senior and Junior, and it was alleged by their opponents that two of them were under age. This John, then aged about 16, may have been one of these precocious ones; or he may have been of another family and State. There was a John Hunt, Lieutenant of the Loyalist "Guides and Pioneers," a corps attached to Colonel Beverly Robinson's Loyal Am. Regt. His wife d. July 4, 1853. They had children: 1. William J., b. 1810; d. Sept. 9, 1894; aged 84; 2. Ophelia, m. — Stevenson or Stephenson of N. Y., and had 2 sons John and George who lived in Bridgeport, Conn.; 3. Elizabeth, d. unm.*

William J. Hunt, son of John, in his early days a merchant and shipbuilder at Marshalltown, Digby, m. Anna Boyne of St. John, and had a large family scattered in Digby, St. John, Portland, Me., Boston, San José, San Francisco, Cal., Michigan and elsewhere. There is a tradition in both families of a distant relationship. The Hunts of Hunt's Point and other parts of Queen's Co., N. S., are according to More's History of that County, descendants of Samuel Hunt, one of the pre-loyalist settlers, probably from New England. A prominent Prince Edward Island family is from an Irish ancestor who settled there in the last century.

There is also a considerable family in Dartmouth, N. S., whose source I am unable to indicate. The ancestor may have come direct from England, or may have been of the Queen's County family.

DESCENDANTS OF EDWARD TRE(A)DWELL THROUGH HIS SON JOHN.

By William A. Robbins. Member of the New York Genealogical and Biographical Society and Long Island Historical Society.

19. Benjamin' Tredwell (Benjamin, Thomas, John, Edward'), born 11th May, 1735, baptized in Hempstead, New York, 10th August, 1735,* died in town of North Hempstead, New York, Saturday, 19th June, 1830, buried 21st June, in row D, (west of church), Christ's churchyard,† Manhasset, Long Island; married by Rev. Samuel Seabury in Hempstead, 7th December,‡ (bond dated 24th November,\$) 1762, to Elizabeth Seabury, born 14th October, 1743, baptized 16th October, 1743, died 7th April, 1818, buried ath April ** boside (north) bushend daughter of Pay buried 9th April,** beside (north) husband, daughter of Rev. Samuel and Elizabeth (Powell) Seabury of Hempstead. Benjamin' Tredwell resided on Great Neck in present town of North Hempstead up to 1764 and, probably, later; then, Westbury, part now East Williston. He was a physician and surgeon.

A power of attorney dated the 19th of November, 1756, from Benjamin⁶ Tredwell "of Great Neck . . . Surgeon" to his father recites, "Whereas I the said Benjamin Tredwell Junior am bound on a Privateering Voyage against the French on board the Ship called the Hercules, commanded by Cap' Sam'l Bayard in the Character of Surgeon . . . I Do Authorize and Impower the Said Benjamin Tredwell in my name and to my Use to Ask Demand Sue for Levy Recover and Receive of and from the Agent or Agents of the said Voyage and Every other person or persons whomsoever into whose hands the same Shall come and be, all and Singular the prize money that shall become Due to me in upon or by reason of the said Cruise or privateering Voyage."††

His marriage bond was signed by Benjamin Tredwell of Queens county, surgeon, and by Benjamin Kissam, Esq., of New York City, and recites that the license was obtained by said Benjamin Tredwell and Elizabeth Seabury of Queens county, spinster.

14th April, 1764, James Hicks and wife, Deborah, conveyed to "Benjamin Tredwell, Junor, of Mad Nans Neck . . . practi-

tioner of Physic" a farm of 513/4 acres and dwelling in the North Woods on road from Success to Cow Neck.*

27th May, 1766, Benjamin' Tredwell entered the following earmark on the Hempstead records, "a Crop of Each Ear & a slitt in Each Ear."

He was one of the signers from Queens county of the Declaration of loyalty to the King, dated the 21st of October, 1776.

Michael Rodgers of Hempstead designated Benjamin' Tredwell as one of the executors of his will dated the 5th of April, 1777. He was, likewise, named by Silas Carman of Oyster Bay, New York, in his will dated the 21st of May, 1783.8

On Saturday night, the 2nd of August, 1780, while returning with her son Adam from New York City in a chaise, Benjamin' Tredwell's wife was robbed of her horse and personal effects to the value of £30 by some rebels, according to the Rivington Gazette. Dr. Tredwell met with a similar experience at the hands of a party of British Dragoons. Jones' History of New York, volume I, page 114, has an account at length of this affair, in the course of which Dr. Tredwell is spoken of "as warm and steady a Loyalist as ever had an existence.'

In the Spring of 1781, Parmenas Jackson was cruelly murdered by three privates from Delancey's Brigade, and Drs. Tredwell and Searing were called in the case.**

Among the ancient family papers in the possession of Mr. Henry Hewlett Tredwell, is an unrecorded deed dated the 7th of May, 1784, from Stephen Titus and wife, Phebe, of Westbury, to Dr. Benjamin Tredwell.

In 1785, Benjamin' Tredwell and three others made a loan to Joshua Carman, Jr., secured by the latter's bond and mortgage upon real property in Beekman's Precinct, Dutchess county, N. Y.

According to the United States census for 1790, Dr. Tredwell's family, that year, comprised 2 males over 16 years of age; 3 males under 16 years; four females; and 13 slaves.

By a deed dated the 1st of May, 1792, Benjamin' Tredwell and wife, Elizabeth, conveyed to David Allen, for £3,000, the homestead farm of 160 acres whereon grantor's father died, reserving the "Burying ground Thereon . . . to be used as and for A Family Burying Ground" and "Road or highway leading from the Said Barn to the Said Landing place." | On the 11th of the same month, an agreement was entered into by the same parties

relative to the land thereby conveyed.* The title to the part reserved seems to be still in the descendants of Benjamin Tredwell.

His account-book, kept from 1776 to 1783, has been preserved among the family papers and is now owned by his great-grandson Mr. Henry Hewlett Tredwell. His case of surgeon's instruments has been deposited in a public museum.

Benjamin's Tredwell left a will dated the 21st of September, 1829, which was probated in Queens county, New York, the 30th of August, 1830, and recorded in Liber Gof Wills, page 29, in the office of the Surrogate of said county. In it are mentioned his son Benjamin, to whom he left all his real estate; his sons Adam, John, Seabury, George, and grandson Timothy Tredwell; children of his deceased son Samuel; children of his deceased daughter Elizabeth Kissam; his granddaughter Phebe Peggy Kissam, the representative of her deceased mother, Phebe Allen; his son-in-law, William Allen. Among the family papers have been preserved many of the receipts given by those receiving a share of his estate.

Following are the inscriptions on the headstones marking the graves of Benjamin' Tredwell and wife:

"In Memory of | Doct. Benjamin Tredwell | departed this Life | June 19, 1830 | aged 95 years | 1 month 8 days."

"In Memory | of | Elizabeth Tredwell | wife of Doct. Benjamin Tredwell | departed this life | April 7th, 1818 | in the 75th year of her age."

She was said to have been "a woman much beloved and remarkable for her hospitality."

The obituary notice of Benjamin's Tredwell in the Long Island Telegraph and General Advertiser, issue of the 24th of June, 1830, is, in part, as follows:†

"Such is said to have been the esteem and confidence of the community in this aged Physician, that to the last, he retained a large portion of the practice in the neighborhood where he resided."

Family tradition says that at the birth of each of his children Dr. Tredwell planted an evergreen tree in front of his house. A majority of these trees, now aged, are still standing. His old dwelling, greatly enlarged a few years ago, is now owned and occupied by his great-grandson, Henry Hewlett Tredwell. It is filled with many heirlooms, old furniture, books, papers and cabinets containing curios and mementos of former days gathered here and abroad, while the walls are covered with prizes won at early county fairs and elsewhere.

The descendants of Benjamin's and Elizabeth (Seabury) Tredwell are eligible to membership in the Society of Mayflower Descendants and also in the Huguenot Society.

April 1745, died 4th July, 1808, buried in old town cemetery, Hempstead, daughter of Benjamin and Susannah (Whitehcad) Hewlett.

Susannah (Hewlett) Tredwell was married, secondly, in Hempstead, by Rev. Thomas L. Moore, 14th May, 1787, to Daniel Stevenson of North Hempstead.

Samuel Tredwell resided at Success, town of North Hempstead. It is not known where he was buried. He was a farmer;

The marriage bond, signed by Samuel Tredwell of Queens county, farmer, and Samuel Kissam of same county, physician, recites that the license was obtained by said Samuel Tredwell and Susannah Hewlett of Queens county, spinster.

On Christmas day, 1766, Samuel⁶ Tredwell entered his earmark on the Hempstead town book as follows, "a slope the

fore side the near ear & a hole in same."

21st May, 1768, James Cornell and wife, Margaret, of Hempstead, conveyed to Samuel' Tredwell 140 acre farm and dwelling (particularly described) at Success, Dutch Church, lane, and burying ground excepted; also land adjoining the Great Pond used for a whitening yard, smoke-house, cider mill and mill house; also 6 acres at Hungry Harbor; and the patent right in Hempstead the said grantor purchased of James Smith, late of Dutchess county.‡

Samuel' Tredwell's Bible was, a few years ago, in the possession of his great-grandson, William Tredwell Van Nostrand. On one of the pages is written, "Samuel Tredwell his Book, given

him by his mother Sarah Tredwell."

Samuel' Tredwell left a will dated the 28th of August, 1781, which was probated the 20th of June, 1782, and recorded in Liber 35 of Wills, page 30, in the office of the Surrogate of the county of New York, where the original remains on file. His will, made while he was "sick and weak in body," mentions his son William, to whom was devised testator's real estate; his wife (name not given); his daughters Elizabeth and Susannah. His father-in-law Benjamin Hewlett, his brother Benjamin Tredwell, and his brother-in-law Uriah Platt were named the executors.

It was probably Samuel' Tredwell's widow who, in 1787, was

allowed £3 for taking care of an Indian woman.

According to the record of a satisfaction of a mortgage in the office of the clerk of the county of Queens, New York, the name of Susannah (Hewlett) Tredwell's second husband was spelled Stevenson, but, in Samuel Tredwell's Bible and on her gravestone, this name is spelled Stephenson. In 1897, the grave-

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stones in the cemetery where she was buried, were levelled and covered over, and the place was turned into a park. One of these stones was in memory of "Susannah Stephenson, wife of Daniel Stephenson, who died 4th July, 1808, aged 64 years and 5 months."* Her son Henry Tredwell Stevenson was baptized in North Hempstead, 20th of February, 1788.†

The Revolution compelled him to flee from Long Island to Goshen, Orange county, New York. On 8th of April, 1780, he petitioned for permission to return to Long Island, on the ground that his brother had lately died and his father was ill. Three

days later, Col. Isaac Nicoll and Henry Wisner wrote from Goshen to Gov. Clinton in behalf of the petition, Wisner stating that he was Tredwell's neighbor.* And on the 10th of the following November, Wisner wrote again, this time in behalf of Mrs. Tredwell going to New York City and thence to Long Island.

In 1783, George Carr mortgaged certain real property in Orange county, New York, to William' Tredwell "of Great Neck, Queens county, gentleman." The records in that county also show a mortgage from Stephen Gilbert to him; § and in 1788, as one of the executors of his father-in-law's will, his name again appears thereon as a mortgagee. This will is dated the 29th of November, 1783, and was probated in New York county on the 23rd of October, 1786.

On the records in the office of the Register of Deeds for the county of New York is a copy of a deed dated the 2nd of October, 1784, from John Leary to William Tredwell "of New York City, merchant," conveying a lot, 26 x 110 feet, on south side of Cortlandt street, in the West Ward of said city.** This lot William. Tredwell, in 1793, conveyed to George Gosman.

According to the United States census taken in 1790 (printed), the household of William' Tredwell comprised 2 males over 16 years of age; 1 male under 16 years; 3 white females; and 6 slaves.

Mrs. Alfred T. Slausson of Plainfield, N. J., now owns the William Tredwell Bible. It was printed in 1766, and in it are entered the dates of birth and death of himself, wife and children, as well as of the birth of his father and the latter's family.

Subsequently Samuel Tredwell married Dorothy Anderson "of Queens county, spinster" (marriage bondt dated 8th October, 1762, signed by Joseph Bull of New York City, shopkeeper, and James Breasted of same place, merchant, states that license was obtained by "Samuel Treddle of Westchester county, farmer"), living 22nd September, 1820. Samuel Tredwell resided in town of Rye (part now town of Harrisons), New York, the homestead, consisting of 200 acres, being on east side of road from Rye through Harrisons. He was a farmer; Captain of Troop, mentioned on the rolls, dated 21st February, 1776, as Captain from Harrisons' Purchase of a cavalry company in the 2nd regiment, Westchester county, Thomas Thomas, Colonel; yestryman of Christ's Church in Rye, 1770. On the public records he is styled "yeoman," "Esq.," "gentleman."

His commission as Captain of Troop of Horse in Westchester county, James Van Cortlandt, Colonel, dated the 15th of June, 1772, was (1890) among the family papers possessed by the widow of his great-grandson Joseph Augustus Tredwell. Other original

papers consisted principally of bonds and receipts.

In 1780, Samuel Tredwell let for one year two rooms and an upper chamber in his dwelling to Lewis Jacobs of Saw Pitts,

Harrisons' Township.

For some reason, Samuel' Tredwell became unable to pay his debts, so, on the 10th of February, 1787, he gave a bill of sale of his slaves and household chattels as security to a William Anderson, and on the 5th of November, 1788, his mother bound herself to give him £400. Soon afterwards he quitclaimed his interest in his 200 acre farm in Harrisons to Thomas Burling. above mentioned bill of sale was held by William Anderson at

the time of his death, and he bequeathed the same in his will (dated 26th January, 1796, codicil 20th November, 1801,) to Jonathan Anderson of Province of Nova Scotia, Jeremiah Anderson, and William Anderson, both of town of Harrisons, who assigned their rights therein to Dorothy Tredwell, widow of Samuel Tredwell.

In the office of the Register of Deeds for Westchester county, New York, are records of several mortgages from Samuel

Tredwell,* besides conveyances.

In the list of confiscated estates mentioned in the Supplement (page 258) to New York in the Revolution is the name of a Samuel Tredwell. This is probably Samuel Tredwell of Harrisons. The loss of his property might explain his financial troubles in late life.

The United States census for 1790 shows that his family then consisted of 5 males over 16 years of age; 1 white female; and 4

slaves.

In January, 1795, he brought suit in the New York Supreme Court against Benjamin Stevenson for trespass on the case.

His widow, Dorothy, conveyed to Jesse Park, Jr., ½ interest in certain islands nearly opposite Byram Point in Connecticut, by deed dated the 26th of July, and acknowledged the 22nd of September, 1820.‡

Thomas Tredwell (Timothy, Thomas, John, Edward), born Smithtown, Suffolk county, New York, 6th February, 1743, died at his homestead in Beekmantown, Clinton county, New York, 30th December, 1831, buried on his homestead; married (1) (?26th October, 1765), bond dated 23rd October, 1765,† Ann Hazard, born 14th February, 1743, died 5th January, 1798, buried near husband, daughter of Nathaniel and Elizabeth (Drummie)

Hazard of City of New York.

He married (2) in 1800, Mary (Conklin) Hedges, widow of Dr. (?Jeremiah) Hedges of East Hampton, Suffolk county, New York, and sister of Judge Alfred Conklin's father. She died Clinton, Oneida county, New York, 31st October, 1838, aged 94 years, buried in cemetery on Hamilton College campus, Clinton. Gravestone. member New York Assembly, 1777-1783; Council of Safety, while New York State Constitution was being organized, 1777, being last surviving member thereof; member State Senate, 1786-1789, 1804-1807; delegate to State convention to ratify United States Constitution, voting against ratification; representative in Congress for Kings, Queens and Suffolk counties, 1791-1795; delegate from Clinton and Essex counties to State Constitutional Convention, 1801; judge (first) of Court of Probate, 1778-1787, when made surrogate of Suffolk county, serving until 1791; surrogate of Clinton county, 1807-1831; also of Essex county, 1807.

The marriage bond was signed by Thomas Tredwell of Suffolk county, yeoman, and Joseph Hallett of City of New York, iron monger, and states that the marriage license was obtained by said Tredwell and Ann Hazard of City of New York, spinster.

According to the census of Suffolk county taken in 1776, the household of Thomas' Tredwell consisted of 1 male over 16 and under 50 years of age; 2 males under 16 years; 2 females over and 4 females under 16 years; 6 male and 6 female negroes.*

While living at Smithtown, his wife Ann was stricken with paralysis. Upon the occupation of Long Island by the British during the Revolution, Thomas Tredwell was obliged to abandon

his home there and seek safety in Connecticut.

His mansion at Beekmantown was only a few rods from the bay which it faced. In 1812, the English forces passed through his farm. After his decease, the homestead was sold to Abram Miller; and in 1870, or 1871, the dwelling was taken down and its timbers used in another building. Several of the inside panels were saved and upon them a coat-of-arms with the Treadwell name have been carved. No authentic record, however, has been found of any grant of a coat-of-arms to this family.

Some forty slaves accompanied the family to their new home in Clinton county. These subsequently were emancipated and colonized by Judge Tredwell on the high ground a few miles northwest called "Riehland," now known as "Dudy" or "Nigger

Hill."

12th July, 1788, letters of administration were issued in Ulster county. New York, to Thomas Tredwell on the estate of his brother-in-law, Samuel Hazard.

According to the United States census for 1790 (printed), Judge Tredwell's family consisted of 1 male over 16 and 1 under

16 years of age; 5 females; and 12 slaves.

He was very fond of horseback riding, even in late life. Once, when riding through woods, his left eye was pierced by a twig, which destroyed the sight thereof. An oil portrait of Judge Tredwell was, a few years ago, in the possession of his grand-daughter, Mrs. Anna Maria Redfield; and several letters from him and his daughters have been preserved and are now owned by Mrs. Charles Hilton Brown of the City of New York.

The Hempstead Inquirer for 2nd February, 1832, contains an obituary notice of "Hon. Thomas Tredwell," and quotes a long account of his life taken from the *Plattsburgh Republican*.

About 1/4 mile back from the lake and a few rods East of the state road, on the old homestead at Beekmantown, lies the small family burial ground containing five inscribed stones. grave of her former master was buried "Old Phillis."

The following are said to be the inscriptions on the headstones

marking the graves of Judge Tredwell and his first wife:

"Sacred to the memory of the Hon. Thomas Tredwell who

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departed this life Dec. 30, 1831, aged 87."
"Sacred to the memory of Mrs. Ann Tredwell, wife of Hon. Thomas Tredwell, who departed this life, Jan. 5, 1798, aged 56 years."

THACHER-THATCHER GENEALOGY.

By John R. Totten,

107. REV. ROLAND⁵ THACHER (Col. John, 4 Hon. Col. John, 3 Antony,2 Rev. Peter1), born at Barnstable, Mass., August 28th, 1710; died February 18th, 1775, at Wareham, Mass., "in his 64th year," and was buried there in Parker Mills Cemetery; gravestone. He was a minister of the Gospel and first pastor of the Church and Society at Wareham, Mass. He married, first, at Barnstable, Mass. (int. pub. there May 31st, 1740), on September 24th, 1740, according to Barnstable Records, Vol. III, p. 55 (on September 2nd, 1740, according to Otis' Barnstable Families, Vol. I, p. 246), to Abigail Crocker, born Barnstable, Mass., April 2nd, 1721; died at Wareham, Mass., October 31st, 1753, "in her 33rd year" and was buried there in Parker Mills Cemetery; gravestone. She was a daughter of Timothy Crocker, Esq. (born April 30th, 1680-1; died January 31st, 1737, aged 57; married October 27th, 1709, by Rev. Jonathan Russell), and Melatiah Crocker, his wife (daughter of his uncle, Josiah Crocker, hence she was his first cousin), who resided at Barnstable, Mass. Rev. Roland⁵ Thacher married a second time at Plympton, Mass., September 15th (or 16th), 1754 (int. pub. July 30th, 1754), to Mrs. Hannah (Swift) Fearing (widow of Israel Fearing of Wareham, Mass.). She was born at Sandwich, Mass., —, 1724-5 (see date of death and age at death); she died at Wareham, Mass, June 29th, 1774, "in her 50th year," and was buried there in Parker Mills Cemetery; gravestone. She was a daughter of Moses Swift (born —, 1699; died —; married December 24th, 1719), and Mary (Foster) Swift, who resided at Sandwich, Mass.

Rev. Roland⁵ Thacher was educated for the ministry and graduated at Harvard College in 1733. He was the first pastor of the Church and Society of Wareham, Mass., where he was ordained in 1740, and remained pastor there for thirty-four (34) years, dying greatly beloved and respected.

The following is an extract from an original letter written by Col. John⁴ Thacher in 1761 to his son, Rev. Roland⁵ Thacher, from which it seems clear that the latter's name was in reality Roland Cotton⁵ Thacher, viz:—

"My dear son Cotton:

Through much weakness of body, I write these few lines to you, which I would have you receive and improve as the last and dying words of your aged father. A few moments after you were born, I went into the room to see my new born babe with the mother, and after giving thanks for her deliverance, I asked her 'what we should do for a name.' 'Oh!' said she, 'I have a name ready, if you like it. Don't you know how often that good man, Mr. Cotton, comes in to see us? I want the child named after him.' To which I readily complied, and at the same time, I had sudden thoughts of giving you to God, as devoted to the work of the ministry.

Col. John⁴ Thacher, father of Rev. Roland⁵ Thacher, died in 1764, aged 90; hence he was 87 years old when he wrote the above letter. The original was in the hands of Mrs. Elizabeth Thacher (Benton) Bennett of Brooklyn, N. Y., who sent a copy of the same to Hon. Peter Thacher of Newton, Mass., from which copy the above extract was obtained.

From the Cemetery at Parker Mills Station, Wareham, Mass.,

we obtain the following graveyard inscriptions:

"Rev. Roland Thacher, Pastor of Church of Christ in Wareham, died February 18th, 1775, in his 64th year."

'Abigail, virtuous consort of Rev. Roland, died October 31st,

1753—33rd year."
"Hannah, virtuous consort of Rev. Roland, died June 29th, 1774—50th year."

- Elizabeth (Allen) Gorham (widow of Col. John⁵ Gorham) married, second, —, 1754, to Colonel John Stevens (as his second

wife; his first wife was Rachel Allen, whom he married in 1729), of Gloucester, Mass.; he was a merchant; he was born at Gloucester, ——, 1707; died April 13th, 1779, aged 72, at Gloucester, Mass.; he was a son of Samuel and Mary (Ellery) Stevens of Gloucester, Mass.

Col. John⁵ Gorham resided at Barnstable, Mass., until 1742. In 1743 he was granted 400 acres at Gorham, Maine, on condition that he should finish the saw-mill and grist-mill that he had begun there. He did not become a permanent resident of Gorham. In 1744 he was stationed in command of a body of provincial troops at Annapolis Royal, which place was threatened by the enemy; and he was sent by Governor Mascarene to Boston to raise troops for its defense. While in Boston he was induced by Governor Shirley to join the expedition there fitting out against Cape Bréton. Having raised a number of men for that expedition, he received the appointment of Lieutenant Colonel in his father's regiment of provincials, and was put in charge of the whale boats which were to land the troops. On the death of his father at Louisburg he was promoted by General Pepperell to be full Colonel. The following letter was written by him July 5th, 1751, from Halifax, N. S., to General Pepperell, viz:—"I was sent up to recruit from Annapolis Royal by Governor Mascarene, as that fort was then in great danger of falling into the hands of the enemy; and this expedition being then in embryo, I was importuned by Governor Shirley, and desired by your Honor and many more of the Council to raise a number of men and purchase whale boats and proceed on the expedition; as I did upon condition of my having the liberty of going home with your Honor's packet in my own sloop, once the English flag should be hoisted at Louisburg. But I was disappointed in this, and received no commission in his Royal Regiment. My father died and most of his Regiment at Louisburg. But I thank you for giving me the commission of Colonel in my father's regiment, and now I solicit a letter of recommendation abroad and assistance to carry through my memorial to the Legislature of Massachusetts."

Colonel Gorham returned to Annapolis Royal after the capture of Louisburg, and received from Governor Shirley the command of the New England troops sent to Minas with Colonel Noble, but he was not present in the engagement with the French at Grand Pré, where Noble, who was in command, was killed. He had afterwards command of a body of Rangers comprised principally of Indians raised in New England for service in Acadia. Colonel Gorham came from Annapolis with the Rangers to Chebucto in June, 1749, and was appointed to the Council of Governor Cornwallis and was present at the first meeting of July 14th, 1749. It is uncertain whether he held a seat in the Council at Annapolis, as there are no records of that Council to be found between 1745 and 1749, and but one entry in 1748, in which his name does not appear. Cornwallis however assigned him a place at the

Board above those gentlemen who came with him from England. He is called Captain in the last of Cornwallis' Council, which was probably his rank in the Regular (or Royal) Army, that of Colonel being only his Militia Rank. He was recommended to the consideration of the Government by General Pepperell for his services at Louisburg, and it is probable that the rank of Captain in the Royal troops was then conferred upon him. Colonel Gorham's name is among those of the Council at a meeting on July 11th, 1751. He must have died soon thereafter, for an inventory of his estate is in the Suffolk County Probate Records of Massachusetts dated May 7th, 1752. His widow afterwards married Col. John Stevens and moved to Gloucester, Mass. At the close of the French War, Col. John⁵ Gorham and wife visited Europe and were presented at the Court of St. James and had an audience with the King, an honor very marked in those days.

The following is the inscription on the grave of Elizabeth (Allen) Gorham-Stevens:—

"She supported through life the Christian Character, and moved in the various circles of domestic life with honor and dignity.

> The affectionate wife The tender mother The exemplary widow The pious friend."

Col. John⁵ Gorham died in London, England, of smallpox, while there prosecuting his claim for expenses in the Louisburg expedition; and he was probably buried there.

He married, a third

time, June 17th, 1783-4, at ——, to Hannah (Davis)) Davis (widow of Isaac Davis of Barnstable). She was born at Barnstable, May 31st, 1731, and died there at the home of Ebenezer Sturgis, October 3rd, 1810 (or 1812), aged 79 years, 3 months, and was buried in Goodspeed's Hill (West) Burying ground, gravestone. She was a daughter of James Davis (born July 30th, 1700; married January 4th, 1727-8), and Thankful (Hinckley) Davis (died August 20th, 1745, aged 38), of Barnstable, Mass.

The History of Gorham, Maine, says that Lydia⁶ (Gorham) Bacon died a widow, on April 4th, 1803; Freeman's Cape Cod says that Edward Bacon, her husband, died August 20th, 1811. These two statements are at variance. If she was a widow at time of her death she must, if Freeman is correct, have died subsequent to August 20th, 1811. I am inclined to think that she died

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in 1813 (not 1803). I give the statements as I have gathered them, but am not positive as to their correctness. Otis' Barnstable Families, Vol. I, p. 27, says that Hon. Edward Bacon married Patience Marston, September 7th, 1744. Freeman, Vol. I, p. 354, says that he married her September 2nd, 1740, which latter date, must be correct, as his son Edward (who married Lydia⁶

Thacher) was born October 19th, 1742.

v. Hon. William,6 born July 12th, 1743; died July 22nd, 1804, at Gorham, Maine; he resided after 1760 at Gorham, Maine, where he was Judge of Probate and Judge of Court of Common Pleas; he married, 1st, October 26th, 1769, at Scituate, Mass., to Temperance (Clap) White (widow of Joseph White, of Scituate, Mass., born -1745 (see age at death and date of death); died April 14th, 1788, aged 43, at Gorham, Maine. Dr. Jeremiah Barker was a son of Samuel and Patience4 (Howland) Barker of Scituate, Mass. (See Nos. 191, 414 and 634.)

Dr. Jeremiah Barker married, third, —, at —, to Eunice Riggs (daughter of Jeremiah Riggs) who died November 10th, 1799, aged 29; no children. of marriage of Dr. Jeremiah Barker of Falmouth, Maine, and Mary Williams is recorded at Gorham, Maine, July 2nd, 1802; but no record of the marriage is found. Dr. Jeremiah Barker married, a fourth or fifth time, at Gorham, Maine, March 17th, 1808, to Mrs. Temperance (Garrett) Gorham (widow of his brother-in-law William⁶ Gorham, No. 411; and sister of Dr. Barker's second wife, Susannah Garrett). She died ----,

1840, at Providence, R. I., at home of her step-daughter Abigail Gorham (Barker) Johnson. Children, none.

Dr. Jeremiah Barker was the son of Samuel Barker of Scituate, Mass., and his wife Patience⁵ Howland. Patience⁵ Howland was a daughter of Jabez⁴ and Patience (Stafford) Howland. Jabez4 Howland was a son of Bethia3 Thacher by her husband Jabez Howland; Bethia³ Thacher was a daughter of Antony² and Elizabeth (Jones) Thacher. Hence we see that both Dr. Barker and his first wife were both descendants of Antony² Thacher. Dr. Jeremiah Barker was educated by Rev. Mr. Cutler of the Congregational Church in Scituate, Mass., from whom he received a thorough education in the classics; he never entered college. He went to Cambridge, Mass., and studied medicine and surgery under Dr. Lincoln of that town, and served as a surgeon in the Revolutionary War. At close of that War he went to Barnstable where he practiced a while, and then removed to Gorham, Maine, under the influence of his brother-in-law, William Gorham, who had settled there. After a few years he removed to Falmouth (now Portland), Maine, where he resided until 1808, when, after his last marriage, he returned to Gorham, Maine, where he lived and died.

Col. David⁵ Gorham resided on the old homestead in Barnstable; his dwelling house was afterwards the home of Dr. John Davis and of his son Dr. Job C. Davis. He was with his brother Col. John⁵ Gorham at Cape Breton and at the taking of Louisburg

and had other military experience. During the Revolution some parties unjustly charged him with being a Tory, because he would not advocate the extreme measures of the younger men. He was for many years Registrar of Probate and kept the Records very carefully. He was in public life, active, energetic and capable,—but was never a popular man.

Ebenezer Sturgis and Ebenezer Bacon, Esq., took care of the property of Hannah (Davis) Gorham, widow of Col. David⁵ Gorham and provided for her support during the latter part of her life.

Mehitable Davis was born in Barnstable, August 10th, 1717, and died ——, 1804, aged 87.

Mehitable (Davis) Hersey married, second, October 21st, 1744, to John Russell (son of Dr. John Russell of Barnstable), by whom she had one son, John Russell, baptized September 4th, 1748. John Russell, Sr., died August 1st, 1748.

Dr. James Hersey settled as a physician in Barnstable and purchased a part of the Dimmock estate, which included the ancient stone house built by Elder Thomas Dimmock. A tradition existed that he lived in a house that stood east of stone house, but Amos Otis thought it more probable that he lived in the stone house which he owned and which at that time was in good repair. He did not receive a college education but was none the less a well educated man, and Dr. James Thacher, who studied medicine under him, speaks of him as a skilful physician who had acquired an extensive practice at that time in Barnstable County.

EARLY NEW YORK CHURCH RECORDS.

AN OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT.

By Walter Kenneth Griffin, of the Publication Committee.

In the January, 1912, number of the N. Y. Genealogical and Biographical Record appear notices of the addition by gift to the Library of the Society, of type-written copies of five Early New York Church Records—those of the Protestant Reformed Dutch Church of the "Boght," (1784–1896), now of Cohoes, Saratoga Co., N. Y.; of the 1st Methodist Church of White Plains, Westchester Co., N. Y.; of the baptismal entries, 444 in number, of the Dutch Church of New Utrecht, L. I., (1718-1741), transcribed from the original Dutch Script; of the Dutch Church of Oyster Bay, L. I., (1741-1834), and of the Dutch Church of Kakiat, Rockland Co., N. Y., (1774-1864), being a transcript of the 1st Church Book, together with the "private" marriage records of two of the earlier ministers, Rev. George Brinckerhoff, (1793-1808), until recently supposed lost, and of Rev. James Desmarest, (1809-1864), including the marriages celebrated by him at the Secession Church after he had left the old Kakiat Church.

It is not commonly known that Mr. Huntting, author of the History of the Little Nine Partners, has presented to the Society the original unique record of the Lutheran Church of Pine Plains, often called the Round Top Church,

Since these gifts, hereinafter in a later article to be more fully described, and as the result of the personal investigations, at his own expense, of Mr. Royden W. Vosburgh, a member, there have been loaned to the Society in the spirit of most courteous and intelligent co-operation on the part of the church authorities, and for the purpose of copying, the original records, never published and never copied, of the Protestant Reformed Dutch Church of Taghanick (West Copake), Livingston Manor, Columbia Co., N. Y., (1783-1864), and of St. Thomas Evangelical Lutheran Church of Churchtown (Claverack Township), Columbia

Co., N. Y., (1760-1905).

The last two records (not included in the records copies of which were collected by Mr. Burhans in the preparation of the Burhans' Genealogy), are invaluable, not only because of the fullness of their entries, but also because the consistorial and other minutes contain many items for the historian. early ignorant treatment of the insane, for example, is shown by the Churchtown entry of the death in 1840 of "Mrs. Patience Stickels, insane for 8 or 10 years. Burned to death in the night in the house in which she was chained. And the earlier animosity against all connected with Freemasonry cannot be better illustrated than by the minister's own note, that in 1796 there was at Churchtown no celebration of the Communion ("Abend-mahl"), "because the congregation had been lead into the error either that the minister was drunk, or that because of his connection with the Freemasons he was in league with the devil.

The Taghanick Record fills some 130 type-written pages in the copy, and includes some 2,500 baptismal entries, a few marriages and deaths, a full list of members, and consistorial minutes. The names, Dutch, German, Huguenot, French, English, Scotch, etc., supplement all records of Columbia Co., and fill

many hitherto impossible gaps.

The Churchtown Lutheran Record (1760-1905) is the more welcome because for unknown reasons few of the early Lutheran Churches have so far been included in public copies. It consists of 3 volumns. Vol. 2, (1802-1843), is an official copy of the original, with some omissions and some additions, requiring patient comparison with so much of the original as yet exists, all having been forwarded to the Society. Most of the original Marriage and Death Lists in the original Vol. 2 are mutilated or lost, and the copied Vol. 2 gives none of them. Careful work will probably supply these, at least in part. Vol. 3 contains an extensive Marriage Record, (1835-1905), and a Funeral List, (1835-1904),

which fortunately generally gives the ages at death. The earlier records are in German, the Taghanick records being up to about 1800 in Dutch. Personally I have been asked to supervise the transcription and translation. I hope the results will be trustworthy.

These gifts and loans illustrate the growing recognition that neither history nor genealogies can be made accurate except through public facilities in examination of the early Church Records. With the early settlers the Church was the social and community center. Round it revolved all the life then deemed worth record, and in the Church Records alone are to be found, especially in rural communities, the proofs of early settlement and organization, the names of early settlers, the trend of emigration, the growth of families, and their marriages and deaths. Such records are no longer private. They are the public history of the founders of our state and nation.

Natural local pride, and the recollection of such events as the Albany Capitol fire, oppose the concentration of original records in any central repository, equally inconvenient to all. The original records themselves, written frequently with watered or diluted ink, and sometimes on paper not fitted for the life everlasting, should not be submitted to casual, ignorantly careless, or alas, criminally envious examination. Eventually, all original records will doubtless be photo-lithographed and thus reproduced with more than Chinese fidelity. Meanwhile, and with what is at present believed to be a comprehensive understanding of the situation, the Society asks the aid of all its Members and Correspondents so that the fullest possible information may be obtained as to the existence and whereabouts of all early Church Records, also of all Marriage Records, often held by the descendants of early ministers—they being originally considered as the ministers' private property—or included in the Registers of local Justices of the Peace.

The Society will then communicate with the Church Authorities or other owners of the records, and these being willing, will accept the temporary custody of the originals, to be used for no other purpose than the prompt making of type-written duplicate copies, by expert transcribers, and carefully compared by competent scholars, and where necessary translated in addition to the reproduction of the original. Of these copies one will remain the property of the Church or other owner of the record, one will remain in the Society's library, and where other public spirited Societies may join and share the expense, the remaining copies, say two in all, will be deposited with them for public use, and for preservation forever.

This far reaching plan, begun with the Taghanick and Churchtown Records, has already resulted, through the able transcribing work of Miss M. Cohen, of the Society, in clear, accurate copies, on good enduring bond paper, in type-writing, and will undoubtedly finally result in a series of exact copies, carefully edited, and probably indexed, and after full opportunity of correction, editing, notes and references, will certainly aid publication, and so give to the public the accurate records of early times. Such a result invites to its culmination the co-operation and assistance of all the Churches, and of all students of the history, individual and public, of the beginning of our nation.

Many private copies exist, several original and supposedly long lost records are held as heirlooms in private hands, many Societies have originals in their custody, almost unknown except to the members. All who can help are invited to aid.

Minutes of the last Annual Meeting, January 13th, 1911, were read and

approved.

The Executive Committee announced the election of the following members: Bayard Hawthorne, 49 Wall St, City, Annual Member, proposed by Mrs. F. E. Youngs; Howland Haggerty Pell, 43 Exchange Place, City, Annual Member, proposed by Howland Pell. Also that the following resignations have been accepted with regret: Frederick Coykendall, George Washington Thomas and Mrs. W. B. Wood.

Since the December Meeting the following deaths have been recorded; Isaac John Greenwood, Life Member, died, Dec. 16th, 1911, in his 70th year: Byam Kerby Stevens, Life Member, died, Dec. 12th, 1911, in his 76th year: Mrs. Eugene Augustus Hoffman, Annual Member, died, Dec. 22nd 1911, and John De Witt Sterry transferred from Annual to Life Membership.

On motion the report was approved, received and placed on file.

The Annual Reports of the Officers and Committees being next in order the Secretary, Mr. Drowne, reported as follows: Our Membership now consists of 5 Honorary, 125 Life and 342 Annual Members, making a total of 472; in addition thereto there are 108 Corresponding Members.

Eight Regular Meetings have been held during the year at which interest-

ing historical papers were read, all of which have been well attended.

The more important transactions of the Board of Trustees were as follows: The starting of a Building Fund. The election to Honorary Membership of Hon. James Bryce, Minister from England to the United States, and Hon. Charles Francis Adams of Boston. Mr. Henry Pierson Gibson has been elected Librarian in place of Mr. George Austin Morrison, Jr., resigned.

The amendment of Article 23 of the By-Laws so that members may be en-

titled to vote at the Annual Meeting by proxy.

The Treasurer, Mr. Mott, presented his Annual Report, which showed the

Society free from debt, with a cash balance on hand of \$344.32.

The assets of the Society from various sources amounted to \$107,393.06, being a gain for 1911 of \$3,342.23. The investment account amounted to \$2,546.87 at market value.

Capt. Totten, Chairman of the Executive Committee, reported in detail as

to the present condition of the Society.

The total subscriptions to THE RECORD, our Quarterly publication, now

amount to 741, being a gain of 297 for the year.

The total cash receipts of the THE RECORD account from various sources for 1911, \$3,806.64; the total cost, \$2,827,72; leaving a cash profit for the year af \$978.92, to which should be added the value of the books donated for review.

Receipts from Society's special publications \$78.00; from Back Numbers of THE RECORD \$920.48; from Pedigree Charts \$172.68, and from Library Duplicates \$12.23.

The Revenue from Room Rents was \$1,383.75, and from Hall Rents \$708.00. The total gross receipts for 1911 amount to \$9,859.68, being a gain over 1910

of \$248.73.

THE RECORD this year is made up as follows:—Genealogical Material,

During the year 1911 the sum of \$1,500.00 has been subscribed and paid in

to the Building Fund.

Mr. Gibson, the Librarian, reported as follows:—Total accessions to the Library 1,532, representing an estimated value of \$1,836.81. The total number of visitors was 1,461. Total number of books in the Library 17,680. During the year a very large number of the manuscripts have been copied, shelf listing has also been begun, and is being carried to completion as rapidly as possible.

Messrs. Griffin, Cook and Vosburgh have been very active in securing manuscript material.

Appended to the report was a list of 34 manuscripts added during the

year.

The Necrologist, Capt. The Historian, Dr. William Austin Macy, Chairman of the Committee on Research, reported that numerous inquiries had been received, and answered and that wherever possible he had sought to stimulate the interest of the people in the work of the Society. That applicants for membership had been encouraged, as also the collection of data which had produced very encouraging results.

He furnished a list of valuable contributions received from Corresponding Members and stated that additional work in relation to Albany County was

forthcoming.

The report of the Nominating Committee was made by the Chairman, Prof. Giddings, presenting the names of the following candidates as Trustees for the Term 1912 to 1915:

This excellent work contains much valuable information regarding the Frost Family in England-a chapter on Old Matinecock, (now Oyster Bay), N. Y., 280 pages on William Frost of Oyster Bay, N. Y. and his descendants; 26 pages on the Frost Family of Stephentown, N. Y., descendants of Thomas Frost; 2 pages on the Frost Families of Long Island, descendants of Thomas Frost; some notes on Unconnected Frost Families, and notes on the following families, viz:-Horton, Feake-Feke, Hicks, Budd, Simpkins, Winthrop, L'Strang, Fones, Weeks-Wickes, Bowne, Haight, Hoyt, Haviland, Birdsall, Akin, Towner, Knapp, Underhill, Hyatt, Le Tellier, Northrop, Frost Family of New Haven and William Frost of Fairfield, Conn., and some 79 illustrations; and is most satisfactorily completed by an excellent index of 35 pages.

SOMERSET COUNTY HISTORICAL QUARTERLY. Editor A. Van Doren Honeyman. Published by the Society at Somerville, N. J., pp. 80.

Its field is the preservation of historical and genealogical data of a most interesting county in a historical sense, and this copy is a promise of valuable service along these lines. We wish to call the attention of all libraries and individuals interested in these matters, especially the Revolutionary history of New Jersey, to this magazine.

ROSTER OF SAINT ANDREW'S SOCIETY OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK WITH BIOGRAPHICAL DATA. Part 1, from its organization to the end of the American Revolution, 1756-1783. Compiled by William M. MacBean, Secretary of the Society. Small quarto, pp. 90, cloth. New York, 1911.

The biographical data of this book furnishes valuable material for students of the Colonial period in New York. A great many Scotch officers in the English Army became members of Saint Andrew's Society, and their stories are very interesting, leading us back to the mother country. Many famous Scotch families are represented in this roster, which will appeal to many readers and searchers outside of the Society.

THE NEW HAVEN COLONY HISTORICAL SOCIETY. Reports presented at the Annual Meeting, November 20th, 1911. 8vo, pamphlet, pp. 30. Published by the Society, New Haven.

These reports contain with the other usual details the interesting address of the President of the Society.

BULLETIN OF THE NEWPORT (R. I.), HISTORICAL SOCIETY. Pamphlet, 8vo, pp. 19.

This bulletin contains Part I of a paper on Newport County Lotteries by Mr. Hamilton B. Tompkins. Most people are astonished to find out how often lotteries were used by the New England fathers, in spite of contemporary protests of the wise. Newport, like many other places, raised money in this manner for fortifications, streets and public buildings.

BURNING OF HARVARD HALL, 1764; AND ITS CONSEQUENCES. Francis Apthorp Foster. Pamphlet, 8vo, pp. 43.

On January 24th, 1764, Harvard Hall, one of the few buildings of the young University, went up in flames at midnight after a session of the Great and General Court of Massachusetts. The State generously provided, at no small cost for another building and recompensed those who had lost property in the fire, including the college butler and several students.

The graphic quality of Mr. Foster's pamphlet is heightened in telling the

story by the chronological use of the original records. Thus, as in Carlyle's Life of Cromwell, told by his letters and speeches, we get an intimate view of times and customs which is by no means the least valuable side of this article.

The students who recollected their losses with such minute memory represent some of the oldest New England families. Among the most interesting of them was Nicholas Pike, afterwards the author of a notable Arithmetic, and an honored school teacher. Pike, Harvard 1766, had a third of a barrel of cider in his chambers in Harvard Hall, as did another student, for the destruction of which the State allowed and paid handsomely.

FORT LOUISBURG:—ITS TWO SIEGES AND SITE TODAY. Address before the Society of Colonial Wars in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. By Louis Barcroft Runk, Esq. Pamphlet, 8vo, pp. 34.

This address is an engaging sketch of the two successful sieges of Louisburg, in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia. The inimitable Parkman is Mr. Runk's historical authority, to whom he punctiliously acknowledges his debt.

The wonderful success of William Pepperrell and Peter Warren shows how much perseverance and audacity are followed by good luck in warfare. The victory was a joy and incentive to pride in all the Colonies, and as such appeals to their descendants today. The second capture of Louisburg reflects less glory on Provincial arms, but was a glorious victory and an important step. less glory on Provincial arms, but was a glorious victory and an important step in the progress of the lamented Wolfe, who lived and died in the love of honor and military glory.

Society of Mayflower Descendants in the State of Illinois. Publication No. 3, quarto, half morocco, illustrated, pp. 301. Chicago, Oliphant Printing Co., 1911.

This handsome volume has furnished a welcome task to the reviewer. Of prime importance to the Mayflower Descendants of Illinois, it will be of wider

interest to genealogical seekers after Mayflower descent.

The reader is impressed with the independent story which the many and wonderfully good illustrations tell. Views of hallowed Scrooby, Austerfield, Plymouth, Old and New, and Leyden are scattered with lavish hand through the book. We are reminded how much modern historical literature is enriched by good photographic illustrations. The older Mayflower and New Plymouth books told their noble story well, but their simple sketches conveyed no such

picture to the mind as the wonderfully fine and profuse illustrations of this book.

The old and ever new story of the inception of the Pilgrim Separatist movement in England, the removal to Holland and thence to America is sketched briefly and carefully. The historical matter which includes the story of the discovery of Governor Bradford's Manuscript makes the book a worthy addition to the literature on this subject. The binding is splendid and the paper and all appointments are first class. The reviewer turns with a sigh of regreet from this delightful book. of regret from this delightful book.

JAMES MOTT OF DUTCHESS CO., N. Y. AND HIS DESCENDANTS. By Edward Doubleday Harris. 8vo, cloth, pp. IV-58. Privately printed. Tobias A. Wright, New York, 1911.

The compiler of this one line of Mott Genealogy states in the preface that the records were made up from a large mass of genealogical material concerning the Motts of New York and New England, which he has been gathering for fifteen years with the intention of publishing a comprehensive history of the descendants of Adam Mott of Hempstead. Like all of Mr. Harris' work this little book of 62 pages shows the painstaking care and completeness of the trained genealogist, and it is hoped that the further results of his fifteen years' of research may soon find their way into print.

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

EDMUND ABDY HURRY, M. A., LL.B.

Mr. Hurry was born in New York City, Aug. 8, 1839, and

died at his home, 122 East 39th Street, April 8, 1912.

He graduated from Columbia College, New York, in 1860, and in 1862 from Columbia College Law School, receiving his degrees from this institution. In 1863 Mr. Hurry was appointed Secretary and aid to his uncle, Captain Homer C. Blake of the United States Navy, then commanding the U. S. S. Eutaw, and it was while in this service when in Pensacola harbor on the Eutaw that he bore dispatches to the Hartford, Admiral Farragut's flagship, at the time a council of war was being held on the latter vessel to determine the course to be pursued by the fleet in the proposed attack upon Mobile. After more than a year in this service he was obliged to retire in consequence of fever contracted in the Gulf of Mexico. Returning to New York he became active in professional and social affairs, and in 1868 married Emily Ashton Renwick, daughter of William Rhinelander Renwick, and great-granddaughter of William Renwick (the first of the family in America), and his wife Jane (Jaffrays) Renwick, who is said to have been the heroine of Burns' Blueeyed Lassie, and whose father was Rev. Andrew Jaffrays, D.D., of Lockmaben, Scotland.

While maintaining a residence in New York City, and a country place on Barclay Heights, Saugerties-on-the-Hudson, New York, he spent much time abroad, travelling in many countries. Though ever a patriotic and loyal American, he felt great pride in his distinguished English and Irish ancestry, and devoted much time compiling and publishing in 1900 an Addenda to the Memorials of the Family of Hurry, published in England in 1873, in which his Hurry ancestors are traced back to the sixteenth century. The American branch of the family descends from Samuel Hurry, third son of John Hurry of Liverpool, eldest son of John Hurry of Great Yarmouth, who was the third son of Thomas Hurry of the same place, the eldest son of

Thomas Hurry with whom the pedigree begins.

This Samuel Hurry, the grandfather of the subject of this sketch, was born at his father's residence in Liverpool, England, Nov. 24, 1778, and in 1795, when but seventeen years of age, came to America and settled in Philadelphia, Pa., where he married Eliza Ann, eldest daughter of William Whiteside. Their son Edmund (Cobb) Hurry, born at Philadelphia, Sept. 17, 1807, married April 25, 1838, Elizabeth Maria, second daughter of James Flanagan and Elizabeth Myers McKean, his wife, of New York. James Flanagan was the son of Christopher Flanagan of Dublin, Ireland, who left that city in 1786 and settled in New York and became one of the largest importers of books in the United States. He was also a public speaker of note.

The subject of this memorial was the eldest son of Edmund (Cobb) Hurry and Elizabeth Maria Hurry. Of the seven children of Edmund Abdy and his wife Emily Ashton Renwick Hurry: Edith Renwick is unmarried; Bessie Crosby died in infancy; Helen Schuyler married William V. Draper, and has one child, John Haggerty; Renwick Clifton married Lucy Washington Morss, and has three children, Renwick Washington, Lucy Rhinelander, and Emily Clarkson; Mary Crosby, married, 1st, Walton C. Peckham, and had one child, May Hurry; married 2d, James H. Colfelt; Emily Ashton married Louis G. Smith, and has one son, Crosby Tuttle; Rutgers Ives married Aline Virginia

Kent, no children.

Mr. Hurry joined the Society which publishes this magazine in 1873, and in date of membership was with one exception (the venerable Dr. Ellsworth Eliot) the oldest member. He early became active in the Society and at different periods filled the office of Secretary and Trustee, and served on many important committees. He had also been a vestryman of Trinity Episcopal Church at Saugerties, N. Y., a director of the United States Fire Insurance Company, Trustee of the New York Eastern Dispensary, Treasurer of the Babies' Hospital, New York, member of the St. Nicholas Society, St. George's Society, of New York, Metropolitan Museum of Art, American Geographical Society, Union League Club, University Club and other social organizations.

It was as a fellow member and worker in the New York Genealogical and Biographical Society that the writer came to know Mr. Hurry, as a gentleman of the old school, dignified but kind and genial, with a rare quality of making himself agreeable

to his associates and lovable to his friends.

THACHER-THATCHER GENEALOGY.

Joseph⁵ Gorham was a distinguished soldier; he was perhaps with his father at Louisburg in 1745; he was a Lieutenant of Rangers under Governor Cornwallis in 1749; and a Captain of Rangers under General Amherst in 1758-9. About this latter date he went to England to endeavor to have the Rangers put in the establishment of the Regular troops; and was the bearer of a letter from General Amherst to Governor Lawrence, dated April 30th, 1760, from which the following is an extract:-

"I send you this by Captain Gorham, who is lately returned from England, where he has been to endeavor to get rank and to get his company put in the establishment; concerning which Lord Barrington has desired my opinion which I have given him as far as relates to Captain Gorham personally, and I make no doubt but he will be promoted, as he is very deserving of it. I have as yet

suspended my judgment in regard to the establishment of his Company. His is certainly the best I have seen of the Rangers; but the best, according to me, is no extraordinary thing. However, if you think that the augmenting of that company, or the establishment of two, would be of any real service or advantage to the Province of Nova Scotia, I shall upon your answer recommend the affair to the Secretary of War."

The establishment of Gorham's Rangers as regular troops under Joseph Gorham as Major Commandant dates from September 25th, 1761. In 1763 his troops were disbanded; and on September of that year he again went to England, and was appointed a member of the Halifax Council, taking his seat on December 20th, 1766. In 1770 he became Lieutenant Governor of Placentia in Newfoundland. In May, 1772, he became a Lieutenant Colonel and in June of that year vacated his seat in the Halifax Council. In 1776 he was in command of Fort Cumberland. May 16, 1782, he became a Colonel; and on April 29th, 1790, he was appointed a Major General, dying soon after, probably.

Hon. George Thacher, in his MSS. Thacher Genealogy, gives the first two children of Joseph⁵ Gorham, viz:—Joseph⁶ and William,⁶ as one child named Joseph William⁶; but Amos Otis gives them as I have recorded them, the sons being grouped in sequence and the daughters likewise, with no dates of their respective births.

Ann Spry was a sister of William Spry, Judge of the English Court of Admiralty at Halifax, Nova Scotia. They both came to Nova Scotia with another sister, Emily, arriving at Halifax, September 25th, 1764.

Rev. Josiah⁵ Crocker was the friend of Whitfield and in some traits resembled him. At the early age of 15 he entered College and was ordained at the age of 23. He was of an ardent temperament; zealous and earnest, yet tender and persuasive in his manner. Like other zealous men, he was not always cautious in his expressions. He had many warm friends and some enemies. His call to Taunton was not unanimous, and there were always some who opposed him. He was dismissed from his charge December 1st, 1774, but continued to live in Taunton until his death. His earnest and persuasive manner drew together a large audience when it was known that he was to preach. His granddaughter Hannah M. Crocker was the author of the "Rights of Woman," published in 1818.

A memorial tablet has been erected to commemorate the location of the house of Rev. Josiah⁵ Crocker, 1742-1774, on the southeast corner of Mount Pleasant Cemetery, Taunton, Mass. He was the sixth minister of Taunton.

Hon. David Thacher was a Judge and Statesman. He inherited and lived in the house of his father in Yarmouth. He was a representative for 21 years and a senator several years in the General Court of Massachusetts, and was often there employed on committees where maturity of judgment and experience gained by careful attention to the interests of the commonwealth were particularly required. He was distinguished by talents of solid, judicious and useful character, rather than those of a brilliant and showy type. He held during the great part of his life various offices in his town and county. He was one of the committee of safety during the Revolutionary War; and for 15 years was one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas for Barnstable County. He was also a member of the conventions for forming and adopting the State and Federal Constitution. His gravestone is thus inscribed: "To the memory of the Hon. David Thacher, Esq., who having served his generation in many important public stations with honor and fidelity, died November 9th, 1801, aged seventy-two years. By a constant practice of social virtues, he rendered himself greatly beloved and respected in the various walks of domestic life. Reader, wouldst thou be honored in life and lamented in death, go and do likewise. Also erected to the memory of Mrs. Abigail Thacher, widow of the Hon. David Thacher, Esq., who died April 25th, 1803, aged seventy-six years. She was greatly esteemed as a Christian and a friend."

His tombstone inscription does not appear in Gravestone Records of Yarmouth, Mass., prepared by Thomas W. Thacher and Stanley W. Smith, and published in 1906 by the Mass. Society, M. F. D., and therefore I presume it was destroyed between the compilation of Alden's Epitaphs and the year 1906. He married, first, at Yarmouth, Mass., February 22nd, 1758-9, to Desire Crowell, born Yarmouth, May 30th, 1736; died at Yarmouth, February 27th, 1788, "in her 52nd year," and was buried there in old cemetery; gravestone. She was a daughter of Ebenezer Crowell and his wife Mary (Gorham) Crowell (born Yarmouth, August 20th, 1708, daughter of John and Ann (Brown) Gorham of Yarmouth) of Yarmouth, Mass. There is a remarkable coincidence existing between the records of Deacon Josiah⁵ Thacher and that of his uncle Deacon Josiah⁴ Thacher (No. 38). The latter was born April 26th, 1667, and died May 12th, 1701 (or 1702); the former was born February 2nd, 1732-3, and died January 19th, 1802; they were both deacons in the same church, and they both had for a wife a Mary Hedge. This coincidence has heretofore puzzled antiquarians and has caused a confusion of the two Josiahs.

Deacon⁵ Josiah Thacher was chosen as a deacon, May 18th, 1801. His tavern stood upon the site of the Congregational parsonage in Yarmouth. According to a paper written by his grand-son, Prentiss⁷ Thacher, he was married in 1758.

From Alden's Epitaphs we obtain the following inscription taken from the gravestone of Deacon Josiah⁵ Thacher, and those of his two (2) wives. The gravestone of Deacon Josiah⁵ Thacher has since the compilation of Alden's Epitaphs, been broken, and at last accounts (according to George Winslow Thacher of Yarmouthport, Mass.) was lying on the ground and likely at any time to disappear; and from the fact that the printed records of the Old Burying Ground at Yarmouth makes no mention of said stone, it would appear that it had now vanished.

"In memory of Deacon Josiah Thacher, who died January 19th, 1809, in his 60th year.'

> "Look down upon the sacred spot and see What death can do for you as well as me; Sweet bosom friend, your falling sand is nigh, Children, prepare, 'tis God that calls on high. Neighbors and friends alike must be the same, Prepare for death in time, for God doth reign."

The date 1809 was copied incorrectly by Alden or else it was recorded incorrectly on the gravestone, as he was born in 1732-3 and died in 1802, aged 69.

THE DOUGHTY FAMILY OF LONG ISLAND.

BY ETHAN ALLEN DOTY.

In offering this record of the descendants of Rev. Francis Doughty, the emigrant to Taunton, Mass., and Maspeth, Long Island, I am aware that it is by no means complete, but it furnishes a foundation and a frame work on which any one interested may build a more satisfactory record.

The items here given were collected while I was gathering material for "The Doty-Doten Family in America." Members of both the Doty and Doughty families frequently settled in the same town, and lived neighbors, though seldom intermarrying. This was notably the case on the north shore of Long Island, in Westchester Co., Dutchess Co. and Saratoga Co., in New York State, in New Jersey and in Maine. To keep my Doty records correct, I was obliged to take these of the Doughtys also.

There were other emigrants of Doughtys besides Rev. Fran-

cis Doughty.

James Doughty was a resident of Plymouth, Mass., and of Scituate, where he married in 1649 Lydia, daughter of Humphrey Turner. Also a Thomas Douty born 1620-5, was in Berwick, Maine, before 1660.

Both of the above families are represented by descendants in,

or emigrated from Maine.

Still another family largely represented in lower and Western New Jersey, claim descent from an Edward Doughty who came as a preceptor to the children of "Lady Moody" and marrying Millicent, perhaps the daughter of James and Rosana De Kraft, became the ancestor of a numerous family in New Jersey, Virginia and Ohio.

Of these I have but scattering records, but these are at the

service of any persons interested.

1. REV. Francis Doughty was the son of a Bristol, (England) Alderman. He had been Vicar of Sodbury, Gloucester, Eng. (See English Colonization of America, by Edward D. Neill, London, 1871.)

From Genealogical Gleanings in England, by Henry F. Waters. (Will) "Francis Doughtie of Hempsteed in the parish of Oldsbury and County and Diocese of Gloucester, gent., 16 May,

1634, proved 31 October, 1634.

To my son Francis my white horse or nag. To Spencer Achley, my daughter Frances' son, twenty shillings, to be paid by my executrix within six months next after my decease. To John Dauyes, the son of my daughter Margaret, ten shillings, to be paid in like manner. To the three children of my son Francis, that is to say, Mary, his daughter and Francis and Eliah, his sons, thirty shillings to be paid in like manner. The rest of my goods, moveable and unmoveable whatsoever, I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth (excepting what I have passed by my deed, bearing date 15th May 1634 made to certain uses to Humfrey Hooke, Alderman of the City of Bristol, Thomas Lloyd of the same, Adam Baynham of Yate gent. and William Maye of Cherefield gent. this excepted) and I make my daughter Elizabeth my whole and sole executrix etc."

One of the witnesses was Fr. Doughtie, minister.

Mr. Waters adds:

"The above will and the deed to Humphrey Hooke and others, to which it refers, gave rise to a great contention in New England, as appears from Lechford's Note Book, pp. 133-5, 137, 171-3 and 256 (I refer to the pages of the printed book) Elizabeth Doughtie, the daughter and sole executrix of the above testator, became the wife of William Cole in the parish of Chew Magna, in the County of Somerset, gentleman (as he calls himself in a bill of complaint to the Gov., Council and Assistants of the Jurisdiction of Massachusetts Bay) and brother of John Cole of Farrington, Somerset, Yeoman, who made a deposition about Hempsteed Farm in 1639. William and Elizabeth Cole were then in New England, as was also her brother Francis Doughty, who at that time called himself a planter of Dorchester in New England. He was called a clerk in the bill of complaint by William Cole and his wife, and seems to have been a minister at Taunton, Mass., and afterwards to have removed to Long Island."

About 1637 Rev. Francis Doughty, with others, purchased from the Plymouth Colony a tract of land at Taunton, Mass. He is reported to have come to Massachusetts 1639, and settled at Taunton, preaching there, but having some difficulties with the people he removed to Maspeth (now Newtown) on Long Island in New York State where we find him 1642. The Court Records and Acts of Legislature of Massachusetts Colony show that he had a lawsuit with his sister Elizabeth, wife of William Cole, extending through many years.

In Magazine of Amer. History, Jan., 1885, is an article on "Puritanism in New York" by Rev. Chas. A. Briggs, D.D., in which occurs "The Third Puritan minister (in State of N. Y.) was Francis Doughty. He had probably been Vicar of Sodbury, Gloucester, England. where he was silenced for Nonconformity. He emigrated to Taunton, Mass., 1637." (Then follows an account of his differences there with the Church leading to his expulsion with his wife and child. This is taken from Thomas Lechford, Plain Dealing. 1642, p. 40.) Doughty secured the conveyance of Mespat (near Newtown), L. I., with the view of establishing a Presbyterian colony there. The settlement was begun in 1642, but the Indian War broke up the colony in 1643, and the minister and flock went to Manhattan Island for shelter during the war. He became the first Puritan, and, indeed, Presbyterian minister in New York City. He ministered here from 1643 to 1648 and was supported by voluntary contributions from the Puritans and Dutch of the city. He also preached at Flushing for a while.

"Owing to the failure of the colony Govs. Kieft and Stuyvesant sought to recover the claime upon Mespat, but Doughty declined to restore it. He was at last glad to escape from the wrath of Stuyvesant and fled to Maryland, where he preached to the Puritans for many years."

An intelligent correspondent of the Brooklyn (New York) Daily Eagle, signing himself an "Old Brooklynite," in the issue

of June 7th, 1891, says:

"The first notice of Rev. Francis Doughty is found in the an-

nals of Taunton and reads as follows:

['Cohannet, alias Taunton, is in Plymouth patent. There is a church gathered there of late, and some ten or twenty of the church, the rest excluded. Master Hooke, pastor; Master Street, teacher. One Master Doughty (Rev. Francis) opposed the gathering of the church there, alleging that according to the covenant of Abraham all men's children that were of baptized parents, and so Abraham's children, ought to be baptized, and so spake in public, or to that effect, which led to a disturbance, and the ministers spake to the magistrate to order him out, the magistrate commanded the constable who dragged Master

Doughty out of the assembly.']

"But for this disagreeable incident the Doughty family probably would never have played their part in the history of Brooklyn. Much excitement followed the church wrangle, and it resulted in about one hundred families leaving the Cohannet colony and following the fortunes of Mr. Doughty. By this it was determined to leave the English colonies and apply to the Dutch for a grant of land upon which they could settle and enjoy that freedom of conscience which the straight laced Puritans demanded for themselves, but were unwilling to accord to anyone else. With his wife and children Doughty proceded to the Island of Aquetneck, the present site of the city of Newport, R. I., where his friends soon joined him. A regular association was organized and Mr. Doughty sent to New York to interview Governor Kieft. So successful was this visit that the Dutch authorities immediately granted Mr. Doughty a tract of land of 13,332 acres at Mespat, which embraced nearly the whole of Newtown, Maspeth and a part of Flushing. Here the Doughtyites settled in the year 1642, and from their efforts a successful colony was soon established. Indeed, its success was so great that it excited the jealousy of Kieft, as will presently be seen. The Doughty patent is recorded in the Secretary of State's office at Albany, book of patents, C. G., p. 49. It bears date March 28, 1642. Mr. Doughty seems to have been a chronic objector and a man of most decided opinions. Preaching to his flock weekly he took occasion to severely criticise certain acts of Governor Kieft's, and trouble was the result. The director and Council of the New Amsterdam colony in April, 1647, rescinded the Doughty patents, dividing the property among members of the association, leaving Mr. Doughty only his bouwery and the lands he had in possession. The Doughty bouwery occupied the land on the east of Flushing Bay, now known as Stevens' Point.

"To the decision of Kieft Mr. Doughty strongly objected, regarding it as not only unjust, but in direct violation of his patent, therefore he appealed from the sentence, which offended Kieft who had previously cut off the right of appeal to the courts of Holland, and, telling Doughty that his judgment was final and absolute, the despotic governor fined the defenseless clergyman \$10 and locked him up for twenty-four hours in the common jail. Discouraged at this, Mr. Doughty requested the director-general of New Netherland 'that as he had lived and done duty a long time without suitable support and as his land was now confiscated' he might be permitted to take ship for the West Indies or the Netherlands. The request was refused, as the director-general had no desire to have his acts laid before the diet. Later Mr. Doughty was minister at the Flushing church, where he preached a year for the sum of 600 guilders. He finally departed for the 'English Virginias' in 1648."

This is one side of the story—Doughty's side.

The colonial records show the Dutch view of the case to be different. Without going into this in detail, we will simply state that the Dutch claimed a debt of 1,100 florins from Mr. Doughty, which he refused to pay. It was out of this that the trouble arose. The last notice of this man is found in Dr. O'Callaghan's Colonial Documents where it reports a commissioner sent from New York to Maryland colony as saying that during a visit to Cecil, Lord Baltimore, he met Mr. Doughty at a dinner given by the Maryland governor and found him "looking much the same" as when he last saw him in New Amsterdam and very bitter against the Dutch. After the burning of Mespat village by the Indians in 1643, Mr. Doughty sought refuge in New Amsterdam with all his followers. Here they resided for several years, Mr. Doughty purchasing property just outside the fort. Within the fort he established an English church and preached regularly to his flock. Thus the Rev. Francis Doughty was the first preacher in the English language in New York city—"a fact we never saw commented on in any history of New York."

From the Calendar of N. Y. Hist. Mss. in the Secretary of State's Office at Albany, N. Y., Part I of Dutch Mss., we learn that 1642, March 28, a patent of 6666 (Dutch) acres of land at Maspeth was issued to Rev. Francis Doughty and his associates, page 49, vol. G. G.

1645. June 10, Rev. Francis Doughty sued Wm. Gerritson, an Englishman, for libel consisting of a defamatory song against plaintiff and his daughter. The defendant pleaded guilty and was sentenced. &c., page 224, vol. 4.

1646, March 22, Rev. Mr. Doughty appointed a referee.

1647, Feb. 7, Wm. and Richd. Smith vs. Rev. Francis Doughty. Defendant ordered to declare who are his partners. Vol. 4, page 283.

Soon after this probably, he removed to Maryland, where his brother-in-law, William Stone, was Governor. He married Bridget —— (?Stone). Children:

Since writing the above account of Rev. Francis Doughty, whose record was mainly obtained from official records in New York State and in England, I have received this further information through Mr. P. G. Burton of Washington, D. C., who for some time has been interested in the history of the Doughty family:

Quoting Mr. Burton's letter it is as follows:

"Rev. Francis Doughty went to Northampton County, Virginia, in 1655 (the year that his son-in-law, Adriaen Vanderdonck died) and became the Rector of an Episcopal church there. He was apparently well thought of, and one wealthy and influential woman (parishioner) directed in her will that he have charge of the rearing of her children.

Just what took Rev. Francis Doughty to Virginia I do not know, but I have a theory that the Rev. Samuel Disius, who was a minister in New Amsterdam, and who was sent on a special mission to Virginia in December, 1653, may have had something to do with the move.

It is known that Drisius, while in Virginia, preached in the church of which Doughty was later Rector. There is a reference to the choosing of Doughty in the Northampton County records, but I have not yet been able to get a copy of it.

In 1658 Doughty married Ann Eaton, a widow with some property, and shortly after moved into Rappahannock County, where in 1662 he bought 200 acres of land. (In 1692 Rappahannock County was divided into what are now Essex and Richmond Counties).

For several years Doughty was rector of two parishes, one on

each side of the Rappahannock River.

In the summer of 1668 he had a lengthy "argument" with two of his parishioners, both prominent in political and social circles.

He refused to allow them to "communicate in the blessed ordinance of the Lord's Supper" and they brought charges of nonconformity and scandalous living, the particular kind of scandal not being specified.

The matter was before Gov. Berkeley, and referred by him to the County Commissioners for trial. What decision, if any, was

reached, does not appear in any record that has survived.

In March, 1668-9, Doughty placed his farm in the hands of trustees for the benefit of his wife during her lifetime, and announced his intention of departing for "some other Countrey and Clymate that may prove more favorable to my aged, infirm and decayed body, than the said Countrey of Virginia wherein I now reside," his wife, however, being "unwilling to depart the said Countrey, she finding the same best agreeing with her health, besides her loathness and unwillingness to bidd farewell to her most deare and beloved children and to her beloved kindred and relacons, all or at least most of them, residing in the said Colony of Virginia, and the neighboring Province of Maryland."

On the same day, Rev. Francis Doughty deeded the reversion of this property to his son Enoch Doughty, who seems to have heretofore escaped the eye of the historian.

Enoch Doughty died in Virginia between 1675 and 1677 and willed his property to his children (not named) with instructions to his brother Francis, who was one of the executors, to sell all his property, because he wanted his children to move out of the country.

A memorandum attached to the will seems to show that in 1677 Francis Doughty, Jr., was in England, and among other things had some tobacco to sell for joint account of himself and his brother Enoch.

I have found a record of Enoch Doughty in Maryland as early as Sept., 1658. He had then a wife, Mary, and a daughter, Joy. Joy Doughty was living in 1668, but I have found no record of the names of the other children.

After the 18 of March, 1668-9, I find no record of Rev. Francis Doughty. Whether he went to Long Island and joined his son Elias, or went back to England, is yet to be learned.

Ann (Eaton) Doughty died in Maryland in the spring of 1683, and as there was quite a contest of her estate, we get a much better chance to know her family than usual.

Her will left all of her property to her grand-children by her first and second husbands, and no mention is made of any Doughty.

From the legal papers filed in connection with the suit referred to, and from other facts of record it would seem that her first husband was a brother of the wife of Gov. William Stone of Maryland.

It has been known for a long time that the will of Gov. Stone mentions "brother-in-law, Francis Doughty," and different writers have explained the connection in different ways.

It is often stated that the wife of Rev. Francis Doughty was Bridget Stone, usually with a question mark, as if the writer had grave doubts as to the accuracy of his statement.

Others have stated that Rev. Francis Doughty's sister married Gov. Stone."

It will be noted that in this statement Mr. Burton says that he has found a record in Maryland of Enoch Doughty as early as September, 1658, and that he then had a wife Mary and a daughter Joy. Now, as Francis Doughty left Long Island in 1648 and that there was no reference whatever to any son Enoch, it is difficult to explain how ten years later there could be a married son with children living in Maryland. It would seem as though there must be some other explanation of this, and this I leave for future investigation.

2. MARY DOUGHTY (daughter of Rev. Francis Doughty and Bridget, his wife). Married first at the Dutch Church in New York City, Oct. 22, 1645, Dr. Adrien Van Der Donck; he was known as the Younkers Van der Donck. They lived on the Hudson River, a few miles above New York City, at a place now

known as Yonkers, and which took its name from him. After his death she married Hugh O'Neale of Maryland, and removed there.

3. Francis Doughty (2d above) remained at Maspeth, or Newtown, where he married in 1660 the widow of Rev. John Moore, 1661, Feb. 18, he was ordered to deliver up the house of Rev. John Moore to the Schoolmaster Richard Mills. Child:

1661, March 9, Margariet, daughter of Franciscus Doten was baptized in the Dutch Church, New York City. And after this I find no further trace of this branch.

4. ELIAS DOUGHTY (son of Rev. Francis Doughty and Bridget, his wife), born in England about 1632; married in Flushing, Queens County, New York, about 1658-60, Sarah -

He first appears on record at Flushing in 1666. From the "Calendar of New York Historical Mss., Part 2, English," in Secretary of State's Office, Documentary History of New York, Volume 3, pages 91-99. 1673, July 28; Order issued to Lieutenant Willet and Cornet Doughty to send out scouts, and the next day, a letter from Captain Manning thanking Cornet Doughty for his activity. The same day a letter from Cornet Elias Doughty respecting his endeavors to raise men.

1676, October 4, Order of the Court of Assizes. Hempstead men to be told that whosoever act by way of combination will run themselves into a new pre-munire (sic) and that if Mr. Cornell, Doughty and others will not immediately settle on Long Island there are them that will.

1679, March 21; Elias Doughty of Flushing writes to Secretary Nicholls requesting a grant of Bomams Neck, near Cow Bay, Long Island, with bounds of said land. 1680, April 20, Town of Flushing, grants to Elias Doughty 200 acres of land. 1684, October 2, License to Thomas Willet, Elias Doughty, Thomas Hicks, Richard and John Cornwall to purchase of the Indian proprietors a tract of unoccupied land on east side of Cow Neck, Long Island.

1683, September 29; in the Flushing list of rates, Mr. Elyas Doughty, three males, thirty upland acres, twenty meadow acres, four oxen, 10 cows, eight two year olds, six one year olds, twenty swine, twenty sheep, 198 6d.

1684, November 11; Warrant appointing Elias Doughty and others a committee to audit accounts of Sheriffs of Long Island since 1674.

1685, October 20; Elias Doughty, Thomas Hicks and others commissioned as Justices of Peace of Queens County.

1688; Petition of Elias Doughty, Richard Cornell and Thomas Hicks for the immediate trial of William Jones of Madnan's Neck, Queen's County.

From Documentary History of the State of New York, volume 1, page 661: "An exact list of all ye inhabitants names within ye towne of fflushing and p'cincts-of old and young, freemen and servants, white and black, etc. 1698, Justice Thomas

Hukes (Hicks) and Mrs. Mary his wife; sons Isaac, Benjamin, Charles, William, Stephen, Charet, daughter Mary, nine persons besides six servants.

Sarah Doughty, sons Benjamin, William, Sarah, four besides

servants.

Francis Doughty and Mary his wife, sons Elias, Palmer, Francis, Obadiah, Sarah, Charety, Mary, eight besides servants.

Elias Doughty and Elizabeth his wife, children Elias, Eliza-

beth, Thomas, five besides servants.
Charles Doughty and Elizabeth his wife, children, John, Charles, Sarah, Elizabeth, six besides servants.

Five hundred and thirty (530) inhabitants altogether."
In the records of Twentieth Street, New York City, Friends Meeting, it appears, Sarah Doughty, of Flushing, an Antient widow, died 1726.

In records at Hemstead occur the names of Elias and wife

Sarah Doughty, 1668-1675.

It appears from above that Elias Doughty and Sarah his wife lived at Flushing and that he was a prominent, prosperous and highly respected resident; that he possessed considerable property there and in that vicinity. He probably died about 1690. She died 1726. She and her children were members of the Friends Meeting.

While there is no record of births of the children they were

Cornwall's." He removed to Flushing, where he lived till 1713, when he removed with his family to Burlington County, New Jersey, in which vicinity he subsequently lived.

A deed of Daniel Whitehead is recorded at Jamaica, New York, dated April 28, 1699, wherein he gives a farm to his son-inlaw Jacob Doughty and his daughter, Amy, wife of said Jacob. The farm was in town of Hempstead and probably was the farm on Cow Neck.

1716. Jacob Doughty was member of Assembly for Burlington Co., New Jersey.

By deeds on record at Flemington, New Jersey, it appears

that Jacob Doughty of Bethlehem, Hunterden County, New Jersey, conveyed March 20, 1733, to Samuel Large, Samuel Wilson, John Stevenson, Edward Rockhill, and Joseph King, for the nominal sum of forty shillings a part of the land he bought 1729 (which was bounded by land in possession of Daniel Doughty), and which they conveyed the next day to the Monthly Meeting of Quakers at Crosswicke, Burlington County, New Jersey.

Jacob Doughty's will is on record at Trenton, New Jersey, signed July 2, 1737, and proven at Burlington, New Jersey, August 12, of the same year. In it, Jacob Doughty of Bethlehem, Hunterden County, New Jersey, devises his estate to his wife Amy, giving legacies to his son Daniel and his daughter Deborah.

The will of Mrs. Amy Doughty, late of Bethlehem, Hunterden County, widow, is on record in Philadelphia, Pa. It is dated 7th day of 2nd month, called April, 1742, and proved on the 2 of August, of same year. In it she gives legacies to her children and grandchildren.

The following list of their children is furnished by Mr. Barclay White of Mount Holly, New Jersey, who is a lineal descendant of Jacob Doughty and who certifies that it is a correct copy of the record in the family bible of Daniel Doughty which is now in his possessian.

The dates being given in "olde style" allowance must be made as follows: The year began the 25th March, which is called the first month, April the second month, and so on to the twelfth month, February. Eleven days should be added to correspond exactly with our modern dates, but for the purpose of this record this change is not made. Old stile:

EARLY NEW YORK CHURCH RECORDS.

By Royden W. Vosburgh, of the Publication Committee.

Since the announcement made in the April issue of the RECORD, satisfactory progress has been made in the work of securing and transcribing early church records in Columbia County. A delay in completing the translation and comparison of the Taghkanick (now West Copake) church record was caused by the sudden death of Mr. Walter K. Griffin, on April 17th, to whom, by his energy and unfailing patience this Society is indebted for the revival of interest in collecting church records. The greater part of the Dutch in the Taghkanick record was translated by Mr. Griffln, and he had finished about one-third of the comparison and checking. I have completed this work and


have prepared the introduction, with notes of criticism. The editorial matter and translation of the Churchtown record, by the courtesy of the Holland Society of New York, was undertaken by Mr. L. P. de Boer, their Librarian.

Through the interest and assistance of the church authorities, and as the result of a trip through Columbia County in the early part of May, we have obtained for the Society for the purpose of copying and translating, the records of the Lutheran churches at Germantown and Manorton (Tar Bush). The record of the Lutheran Church at Gbent has been examined, and with the exception of the church at Ancram, I believe that this completes the early Lutheran records in Columbia County, but any additional information will be gratefully received. A copy of the record of the Hillsdale (Nobletown) Reformed Dutch Church, also known as the Krum Church, recently made by the Holland Society, may also be safely said to complete the work of copying, so far as it relates to the churches of the Reformed Dutch denomination in that county. While some of the records heretofore copied, from fifteen to twentyfive years ago, have been but partially and imperfectly made, it has been thought wise to leave Columbia County for the present, and to turn to other fields, where no copies have been made and where the originals are in danger of destruction.

Accordingly, I have made a preliminary investigation in the Mohawk valley, in the Counties of Montgomery, Fulton and Herkimer. The following towns were visited: Broadalbin, Mayfield, Johnstown, Fonda, Root, Minden, St. Johnsville, Little Falls, Manheim, Mohawk and Herkimer. About ten church records were examined. The field is a large one, and on account of the large territory covered, a thorough examination in any one locality was impossible. The object of the preliminary investigation was to get a general idea of the material at hand and to select a point for a more extended and thorough examination, to be commenced in the fall of this year. While a few of the earliest church records have already been copied, it is certain that many records exist, commencing shortly after the revolutionary period, that have never before been brought to light. The earliest uncopied record that came to my notice commences in 1763, and its immediate preservation is a matter of urgent necessity. With the limited means that this Society has at its disposal for this purpose, the work must of course be accomplished only very slowly. The starting point will be to some extent influenced by the degree of interest and co-operation manifested by the church authorities. It is hoped to copy all the records in a given locality before leaving it, but if this plan is not feasible the records already promised by the church authorities will be copied first. Reference is made to the Official Announcement in the April issue of the RECORD, and the church authorities are urged to avail themselves of this opportunity of preserving for all time the records of our fore-fathers.

I am indebted among others, to members of the Herkimer Historical Society, to County officials and to the local press for valuable assistance and hearty co-operation in my investigation. A more detailed description of the records secured will be given hereafter, and when the work of copying and translating is under way. Suffice it to say for the present, that the Society wishes it to be known that the Mohawk valley and the adjacent territory is its next field for investigation, and that it is hoped to continue the work there until the field is exhausted. The church authorities should remember that a copy and translation, such as the Society is prepared to give them, is one that

could not ordinarily be obtained without considerable expense.

In the Brinck-erhoff Genealogy, published by Richard Brinkerhoff in 1887, p. 76, it is stated that the wife of Joris was Annetie, dau. of Teunis Gysbert Bogaert, with the same date for her death. The children given are: Sarah, Susannah, Abraham, Teunis, Isaac, Aeltie. Joris, Neeltie, Hendrick, Antie. So far as I can see the known facts favor the latter statement, but perhaps this has all been worked out by some one, and if so I should be glad to be set right.

The carefully prepared index to individuals contains seven thousand seven hundred and thirty-nine names. The volume contains a short account of the occupation of the town by the Indians; Indian Legends, and a graphic account of the Battle of Strickland Plains at Cos Cob in 1644 between the Indians and the combined forces of the English and Dutch; descriptive accounts of the early settlers; early tax lists; alphabetical list of landowners prior to 1752; alphabetically arranged muster rolls of the officers and men who served in King George's War; French and Indian War; Revolutionary War; War of 1812; Mexican War; Civil War; and the Spanish-American War. Incidents of the early settlers, as also of the Revolutionary War, and as Greenwich was during that war debatable territory, there are narrated many stirring accounts of exciting escapes of the patriots from the tories and cowboys, who frequented the town. Tyron's raid and General Putnam's escapes are presented in a new light and some of the traditions relating thereto are very much shattered.

This work as a town history is representative in character and embodies within its limits all of the information so much desired by genealogical searchers. It is to be hoped that others contemplating the publication of town histories may use it as an example of painstaking and exhaustive work. All libraries should have it on their shelves.

INDEX OF THE GENEALOGICAL AND HISTORICAL QUERIES AND ANSWERS FROM THE NEW YORK MAIL AND EXPRESS, Vol. I. By Miss Mary E. Sinnott, 1816 South Rittenhouse Square, Philadelphia. Cloth, quarto, pp. 113. Privately printed 1911.

Most genealogical students either knew Mrs. Annie Arnoux Haxtun or had had communication with her through the department which she conducted until her death in the above mentioned newspaper. She pasted the clippings in three large scrapbooks and presented them to the Genealogical Society of Pennsylvania, in Philadelphia. Miss Sinnott has made a valuable addition to genealogical lore in making these extracts accessible to the public in this fashion. The index is printed as Mrs. Haxtun arranged it.

A CENTURY OF ACHIEVEMENT, THE HISTORY OF THE N. Y. BIBLE SOCIETY FOR ONE HUNDRED YEARS. By Rev. Dr. Arthur Lowndes, Vols. I and II, quarto, pp. 1112, covering the years 1898-1909 inclusive.

These volumes are pleasing accounts of the vicissitudes of the century's life of this well known and beneficient organization. Volume I is adorned with portraits of Bishop Hobart, Matthew Clarkson, elected a Manager of the Society in 1815, the Rev. Henry Hadley Norris of England and the Rev. Dr. Benjamin I. Haight, 2nd Vice-President. In Volume II are found portraits of Charles Henry Contoit, Rev. John McVickar, Thomas C. Butler, for many years treasurer and Agent of the Society, and James Pott, who succeeded to these offices. The work is well performed and is agreeable to the eye. A short but inclusive index closes the story.

THE LETTERS OF MOORE FURMAN, Deputy Quartermaster General of New Jersey in the Revolution. Compiled and edited with genealogical notes by the Historical Research Committee of the New Jersey Society of the Colonial Dames of America. Cloth, pp. 162, with Bibliography and Index. Edition limited to 350 copies. Published for the Society by Frederick H. Hitchcock, N. Y., 1912.

We agree with the Committee of Publication that these letters are worthy to be placed in enduring form. The work has been done, too, in a faultless manner, and the notes, which enrich the text, add very largely to the value of

the volume.

One of the original purchasers of Newtown, Long Island, where he came in 1656, was John Furman. His ancestors were of Stoke Nayland, Suffolk, England. Josias, his son, married Sarah Strickland and held some local offices in Newtown. Samuel, one of their sons, removed to Hopewell Township, New Jersey, and it was his son Jonathan who became the father of the writer of these letters, which begin in 1779. They treat the early years of the Republic in a vivid, personal way, and we can endorse this quotation from the foreword of the book: "They show how desperate the struggle was to finance the armies of the revolting Colonies; they show how conscientious the men were who assumed this task and what an important factor they were in the ultimate success of their cause." A few letters by other hands are added to lend further significance to the circumstances related in the letters themselves.

SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT, 1911, OF THE AMERICAN SCENIC AND HISTORIC PRESERVATION SOCIETY, to the Legislature of the State of New York. Printed by J. B Lyon Company, State Printers, Albany, N. Y.

This impressive volume is so compendius, so rich in interesting information on a multitude of subjects, and so valuable for reference that it confounds those short-sighted individuals whose province in life seems to be to inveigh against all organizations which do not just fit into their narrow idea of what is worth preservation. And withal the reading of the context is interesting in itself. The record of the work done alone justifies the existence of the Society. Not only does it include local information but objects having a world-wide import. The inclusion of biographies of noted Americans makes the work especially of value to genealogical and historical societies. The volume is embellished with unusually beautiful views, and taken all in all, every one concerned in its production is to be commended for the care and thoroughness displayed in its attractive pages. A voluminous index is fittingly added.

QUARTERMASTER GEORGE COLTON AND HIS DESCENDANTS, 1644-1911. Compiled by George Woolworth Colton. Printed for private circulation by John Milton Colton, Philadelphia, 1912. Octavo, cloth, ill., pp. 588.

The above is an admirable genealogy, modern and scientific in every respect. The ancestor was a public spirited and notable citizen of Longmeadow, Springfield, Massachusetts.

The Yale blue and the good Yale seal prepare the reviewer for the pleasant task of reading the life stories of the members of Yale, '70. The trail leads back to the wind-swept hill of Phillips Andover, where so many of the class prepared for Yale. The two pictures of each graduate, one taken in college, and the other late in life, show in turn the features of well-bred boys and mature gentlemen. These are good faces which we see in this book, pure, intellectual, virile, American. The gamut of human experience is found in these pages, tantalizing ill-health, early death, mediocrity and brilliant success. It is in some ways a sad task to read this volume, so many of the boys of '70 have gone before. Honor to the Class of '70 and to its alma mater.

The pictures of the homes of members of the Ruggles family range from "the stately homes of Merrie England," to splendid colonial mansions in Massachusetts, and include even residences of to-day of a very modern type.

THE AUTOBIOGRAPHY OF THOMAS COLLIER PLATT. Compiled and edited by Louis J. Lang. Octavo, cloth, ill., pp. 556.

The memory of Thomas Platt is still fresh in our minds as we read this autobiography. In his lifetime there were wide divergences in popular judg-

ment about him. One man would consider Mr. Platt as the last word in political trickery and vileness, while his neighbor would term him a statesman. Any criticism of Mr. Platt as self revealed in this book will encounter

the same difference of opinion.

At any rate a few salient facts occur to the reviewer. The book is not equal in construction to such autobiographies as those of Senator Hoar of Massachusetts, General Sherman or Grant. It is frankly a compilation. There is a great deal of material in it which throws a bright light on Senator Platt's life, but the material is thrown together too roughly for the finest results. Yet the prime object of the book is thoroughly accomplished. The life of the famous political leader is laid bare for the reader without hypocrisy or pretence. There is your Senator Platt mirrored to the life.

As to the value of that life we may say that it was sturdy, strong, able, adroit and successful. Had there been a little more of the moral and ethical element in it, it would have been great. It is certainly more true to-day than ever before that a man must be more than able and adroit to be long remembered with affection by the American people. We predict that the next generation will have to delve deeply into the libraries to find out who Thomas

Collier Platt was.

QUINDECENNIAL RECORD OF THE CLASS OF 1895, SHEFFIELD SCIENTIFIC SCHOOL OF YALE UNIVERSITY. Compiled by William Usher Parsons, Class Secretary. Yale University Press, 1912, octavo, cloth, ill., pp. 237.

In perusing this well-appointed book we realize the task imposed upon Class Secretaries of this day in getting out these Class Reports. Of the utmost interest to the members of the Class, they are not much less so to many outsiders. This Society welcomes into its library these condensed biographies of Sheft. '95.

WILLIAM WATTS SHERMAN.

BY CAPT. RICHARD HENRY GREENE.

William Watts Sherman was born at Albany, N. Y., Ang. 4, 1842; he was son of Watts Sherman, born Feb. 22, 1809, and died Feb. 20, 1865, in the Island of Madeira. Watts Sherman's first wife was Lois Sarah Turner, who died in Albany, Aug. 4, 1838, in her 21st year. His children were all of the second wife, Sarah Maria Gibson, whom he married Feb. 2, 1841 She was born Feb. 8, 1816, and died Mar. 10, 1878, the daughter of Henry Bicker Gibson (1783–1863) and Sarah Sherman, his wife, who was daughter of Watts Sherman and Olivia Gillson, born in Utica, N. Y., Sept. 15, 1796; married Dec. 9, 1812. He was born in Reading, Pa., April 13, 1783; his father removed to Saratoga, N. Y., and he to Utica, N. Y., in 1805.

The maternal ancestry is as follows: John Gibson (1757–1818) married Katherine Bicker; Henry Bicker, born 1722, married Sophia Heyer; Victor Bicker, Jr., born 1688, married Annatje Cregier; Victor Bicker, born 1652, married Claasje Blanck; Gerrit Bicker, born 1629, married Aaltje Lubbertse.

The paternal line descends from Philip Shearman, who came to Roxbury, Mass., in 1633, a single man, made freeman, 1634, married Sarah Odding. He was born in Dedham, Eng., it is said, Feb. 5, 1610. He was among the followers of Ann Hutchinson and was banished from the Colony, Oct. 2, 1637. The family emigrated to Rhode Island, bought land from the Indians at Aquetnet, and government was set up with Coddington for governor, and Shearman for secretary, this was at Portsmouth, R. I.

Soon after he left the Congregational Church and united with the Society of Friends. His son, Eber² Shearman, was born in Roxbury, 1634; he settled on the west side of Narragausett Bay at North Kingston. His wife's name was Mary; he died in 1706. His eldest son was also Eber³ Shearman, married Martha Remmington; they lived at North Kingston. Henry⁴ Shearman, his youngest child, was born Jan. 14, 1724, married Anna, daughter

of Dr. Charles Higginbotham in 1747; they resided in South Kingston. He changed the spelling of the name to Sherman, other members of the family did the same later. His son Nathaniel, born Aug. 15, 1748, m. Lucy, daughter of Rev. William Tisdale, a Baptist clergyman. They had two sons: Henry, married Sarah Mitchell of Hudson, N. Y., and Watts, born July 2, 1775, married Olivia Gillson, June 12, 1794. These brothers were each in the ancestry of William Watts Sherman, thus: Henry's youngest son was Watts (William Watts' father) and the brother Watts had an eldest child, Sarah Sherman, who married Henry B. Gibson, Dec. 9, 1812, and their second child Sarah Maria Gibson, married Watts Sherman, above. This man was teller of the Ontario County Bank, Canandaigua, N. Y., and later cashier of the Livingston County Bank, Genesee, N. Y. In 1833 he became cashier of the Herkimer County Bank at Little Falls, N. Y. In 1834 Erastus Corning was president of this bank and moved to Albany, N. Y., where Corning became president of the Albany City Bank and Sherman was made cashier. Mr. Sherman was a democrat and nominated for Alderman in 1845 and '46, but the whigs were successful in these elections.

In 1851 he came to New York and became a partner in the firm of Duncan, Sherman & Co., bankers. He lived at 5th avenue, corner 22d street until he died Feb. 20, 1865, while at the Island of Madeira, W. I. They were a generous couple, full of kindliness and charity, which the widow continued until her death, March 10, 1878.

William Watts Sherman, the eldest surviving son, married July 5, 1871, at Newport, R. I., to Annie Derby Rogers Wetmore, youngest child and only daughter of Wm. Shepard and Anstice (Rogers) Wetmore; she was born in London, Eng., and was a sister of Hon. George Peabody Wetmore. U. S. Senator from Rhode Island. This family was descended from Thomas¹ Whitmore, who came to New England in 1635, bringing his son John,² who was born in 1615; they lived in Middletown, Conn. Their son Israhiar,³ born March 8, 1656, married May 13, 1692, Rachel Stow. He was Deputy to the General Court and Magistrate. Seth,⁴ their son, was born Nov. 18, 1700, married (1) Margaret Gaylord; married (2) Hannah, daughter of Joseph Whitmore; married (3) Hannah, born Feb. 8, 1712, daughter of Timothy and

Esther Edwards; they were married June 15, 1745–6. Hannah was sister of President Jonathan Edwards. Seth, born Middletown, Conn., Sept. 10, 1769, married Nancy, daughter of Gen. Wm. Shepard Wetmore, Feb. 1, 1800. The parents of Wm. Shepard Wetmore, mentioned above, who was born in New York and died at Newport, R. I., June 1, 1859; she died in 1884.

William Watts Sherman married second in 1885, Sophia Augusta Brown, who was descended from Chad¹ Brown, one of the original proprietors of Rhode Island, and pastor of the First Baptist Church in 1642. His son John,² born 1630, married Mary, daughter of Rev. Obadiah Holmes, who died in 1706. James,³ born 1666, married Mary Harris. He died Oct. 28, 1732. James,⁴ born March 22, 1698, married Hope Power. He died April 27, 1739. Nicholas,⁵ born July 28, 1729, married Rhoda Jenckes. He died May 29, 1791. He was treasurer of the Newport Casino, member of the Reading Room, vice-president of the Redwood Library and the Historical Society, trustee of the Natural History Society, and one of the original members of the Park Commission of Newport.

Mr. Sherman died at his home in New York, Jan. 23, 1912. He was a man, prominent in New York City and equally so in Newport, where his kindly disposition and generous helpfulness made hosts of friends, who will miss him in the various association of his active life.

He was elected a member of the New York Genealogical and Biographical Society Feb. 10, 1893.

In the Brooklyn Eagle of June 7, 1891, an "Old Brooklynite" gives some interesting items:

"In the morning of Brooklyn's existence, when taxes were low, politicians were not, and population statistics represented by hundreds instead of hundreds of thousands, no street was better known than the now neglected byway behind the Eagle's back door. Time, the destroyer of all things, has reduced the prominence of Doughty Street, and from one of the thoroughfares of the village of Breucklyn it has become a byway of the great city of Brooklyn. But it has occurred to me that a retrospective glance at the ancient alley and the family for whom it was named would not be amiss; a forgotten family so far as the average newspaper interviewer of the oldest inhabitant is concerned, but a family whose name will endure forever in the annals of Brooklyn as one of the first, if not the very first of of English birth.

The Doughty family in America are all the descendants of one individual, the Rev. Francis Doughty, who emigrated from England and settled at Taunton, Mass., about the year 1633, which places him among the earliest of the Puritan fathers following in the footsteps of the Mayflower pioneers. The Brooklyn Doughty family are the descendants of Elias, the second son of the Rev. Francis Doughty. Their first appearance in this city is believed to have been about the year 1690; there is, however, no absolute proof in the possession of the writer that this date is correct, although it cannot be more than a decade or so out of the way.

Doughty street takes its name from Mr. Charles Doughty, for many years the most prominent attorney in the village of Brookyn, and a member of the Colonial Assembly as early as 1787. In fact we feel safe in asserting that Mr. Doughty was the first Brooklynite in the New York Assembly. We find mention of him in the journal of that body under the date of March 3, 1787, when a petition relative to the coinage of copper for the State was referred to Mr. Brooks, Mr. Duboys, Mr. Doughty, Mr. E. Clark and Mr. Taylor. Mr. Doughty's residence was located on the south corner of Doughty and Furman Streets, directly opposite the house of Gabriel Furman. It has long since disappeared and has been so completely forgotten that we never even see it mentioned in local annals. It is believed by the writer that Mr. Doughty was the owner of the street which bears his name.

The old Brooklyn records are full of the Doughtys, and yet, strangely enough, they are never mentioned in newspaper articles, although equally prominent in their day with the Bergens, Remsens, Boerums, Johnsons and Rapelyes. The reasons for this are easily explained. The Doughtys were never a popular family. Tall and stout, with red hair and large features, the men of this race have ever been noted for hard headed obstinacy, great self confidence, large intelligence and a disposition to express themselves freely at all times, in season and out. Another personal peculiarity of the family is in their walk. Doughtys never bend their knee, but always walk stiff legged, like a pacing horse. No criminal or betrayer of trusts, public or private, has ever been known to bear the name of Doughty, which, let it be understood, has no connection whatever with the English 'Doty' or the Irish 'Dougherty' or 'Doherty.' Doughty is spelled now so it has been spelled continuously since the days of Henry VIII. Of Charles Doughty, for whom the street was named, it is stated that he was about 85 when he died, previous to 1820, and that he used to often tell how, when a young man, he had been told by old people that they recollected when an Indian squaw waded from Governor's Island to Long Island with her papoose."

Graduated at Yale College and was principal attorney of Brooklyn for a time and for several years clerk of the Board of Trustees. Is said to have been largely instrumental in procuring the passage of the emancipation act by which Negro slavery was abolished in New York State. On the anniversary of Emancipation Day the colored people were accustomed to call at Mr. Doughty's house with chickens, turkeys, and other gifts to testify their respect. He is said to have drawn up the charter of the City of Brooklyn. Though the family had been Quakers he became convinced of the truth of the claims of Emanuel Swedenborg and braving public opinion he turned Swedenborgian. He was the subject of much opposition, losing friends and legal practice, but undaunted, he organized a society of Swedenborgians in New York City and became the Pastor, which position he held for thirty years. William⁵ Thacher was a deacon in the church; he was a carpenter and a ship-builder and a man of considerable genius in his line of work, introducing many improvements in the construction

of salt works and wind-mills. He was on the committee for drawing up the new State Constitution in 1776, he being then of Yarmouth. He lived in Yarmouth, at the foot of Church Street, until about a year after his son Laban⁶ Thacher removed to South Dartmouth. His son Laban bought him a farm in South Dartmouth and he removed thereto. Davis Thacher (his grandson) says that he was a house carpenter, and was chosen a deacon when he was 80 years old. Mrs. Sally (Hawes) Cobb, his grand-daughter, states that he was a deacon in 1819. Antony Thacher, his grandson, states that he built boats of a kind called "Moses" boats; and that afterwards he built small fishing and coasting vessels. He owned a sloop of 10 or 15 tons burden that plied between Yarmouth and Boston; and also sailed on a sloop of his own building to Labrador, but was probably not the master thereof. He built many wind-mills and also built the first light-house on the back of Cape Cod, it being constructed of wood. He is said to have built the wind-mill that formerly stood on the northeast corner of the Yarmouth Academy and which was subsequently on the hill east of the Congregational Meeting House. This wind-mill was moved to near the site of Charles Sears' house. He is said to have been the inventor of the improvements in salt work implements which were made use of by the Acme Salt Works. His ship yard was on Green Hill. Both Mrs. Sally Cobb and Warren Thacher (his grand-children) were in possession of miniature portraits of William⁵ Thacher, which were the only portraits of any of this line of Thacher's from the first to the fifth generation. Both William⁵ Thacher and his wife were dismissed from church in Yarmouth to that of Dartmouth in 1807.

Rev. Grindal Rawson succeeded Mr. Smith as pastor at Yarmouth; he was installed December 10th, 1755. He was descended from Edward Rawson, Secretary of the Colony of Massachusetts, and was the eldest son of Pelatiah Rawson of Milton, Mass. He graduated Harvard College 1741, and was installed as first pastor of Ware, Mass., May 9th, 1751, and was dismissed of his charge there June 19th, 1754; he took his dismission from Yarmouth Church in 1760, "in consequence"—as Mr. Alden said—"of general dissatisfaction between him and the people, being allowed by a council to ask for a dissolution of connexion." He is represented as having been a man of strong mind but very eccentric.

Bradford's regiment, enlistment 3 years; also list of men mustered by Joseph Otis, Muster Master for Barnstable Co., dated April 14th, 1777, Capt. James Davis' Co., Col. Gamaliel Bradford's regiment; mustered April 14, 1777; enlistment 3 years; reputed received State and Continental Bounties; also Sergeant 5th Co. Col. Bradford's Regt., Continental pay accounts for service from April 14, 1777, to December 31, 1779; also, Captain John Lamont's Co. Col. Bradford's (12th) Regt., return (year not given); mustered by County and Continental Muster Masters; joined May 1st, 1777; also Captain Haskell's Co., Col. Bradford's Regiment, Continental Army, pay accounts for service January 1st, 1780, to April 14, 1780 (see Obed Ilaebe); also Captain Micah Hamlen's Co., Lieut. Col. Hallet's Regt., entered service August 14th, 1780, 3 days preceding march; discharged October 31st, 1780; service 2 months, 21 days at Rhode Island; regiment detached from Militia to reinforce Continental Army for 3 months." This record is apparently that of the Ebenezer⁵ Thacher No. 158; and that it is so is rendered still more probable as a comparison of this record with that of Joseph⁵ Thacher (his brother, No. 160), it is seen that this Ebenezer Thatcher and Joseph⁵ Thacher both served in the same Company and Regiment (Lamont's Co. and Bradford's Regt.) and both were from Yarmouth. The subsequent career of Ebenezer⁵ Thacher I have been unable to trace; whether he married and left issue, or whether he died single, is unknown to me.

There were at this time in Bristol but two (2) Bethiah Howlands, viz.: Bethiah³ (Thacher) Howland (No. 36), widow of Jabez² Howland, son of John,¹ and the above Bethiah⁵ Howland (Jabez⁴ and Patience (Stafford) Howland). Bethiah³ (Thacher) Howland died at Bristol, R. I., December 19th, 1725, and it is barely possible that in her widowhood she may have contemplated a second marriage with Samuel Davis. If such was the case I have no knowledge of the fact. If this above record was the intention of marriage of Bethiah⁵ Howland (Jabez⁴) then it would seem that the marriage itself was never solemnized, as Samuel Davis died March 23rd, 1732, and in the meantime she, Bethiah⁵ Thacher, had on May 19th, 1725, married Nicholas Bragg. This Samuel Davis was as I make out the brother of Simeon Davis, her second husband, and was born June 30th, 1698, at Bristol.

I do not know who this Mercy Howland was unless she was the above Mercy⁵ Howland, or possibly Yetmercy (Shove) Howland, widow of Josiah⁴ Howland. If the record refers to the above Mercy⁵ Howland, then she married Joseph Tillinghast, Jr., August 6th, 1722, and on August 25th of same year her intention to marry Captain George Pearse was published and she married Captain Pearse on November 22nd of that same year, 1722. This is not impossible, but highly improbable, except as the result of some family tragedy or romance with which I am not familiar.

If, however, it refers to the possible marriage of the widow of Josiah⁴ Howland to Joseph Tillinghast, there is nothing in the record inconsistent with the record of Josiah⁴ Howland, as he died at Bristol, February 8th, 1717, and his widow may possibly have married a second time August 6th, 1722, to Joseph Tillinghast, Jr.; however, if she did so I am not positively so informed. I give the record of this marriage of Mercy Howland and Joseph Tillinghast and my analysis thereof for what it is worth, with no pretense of suggestion as to its value.

DESCENDANTS OF EDWARD TRE(A)DWELL THROUGH HIS SON JOHN.

John Tredwell (Benjamin, Benjamin, Thomas, John, Edward), born North Hempstead, New York, 5th April, 1775, baptized Hempstead, New York, 21st May, 1775, died, after a short illness, at No. 30 Front Street, Brooklyn, New York, Friday, 5th December, 1851, funeral services by Bishop Seabury (wife's cousin), at St. George's Church, Hempstead, buried St. George's churchyard, 10th December, 1851; married Maria Eliza(beth) Campbell, b. Long Island, died, after long illness Sunday, 7th December, 1851, aged 69 years, 1 month, and 19 days, buried at same time with husband, side by side, daughter of Colin and Abigail (Seabury) Campbell. Residence, New York City, 1798 (No. 42 Front Street); Flushing, Queens County, New York, 1814, where he lived until his mansion was destroyed by fire, November, 1842, when he moved to 30 Front Street, Brooklyn, New York. Merchant (china and glassware), Pearl Street, New York City; burnt out in the great fire of 1835. After this and because of failing health, he took his brother George in as partner. Famous in his day as "Uncle Johnny Tredwell, the horseman," sometimes called "Old Johnny." On his farm were raised some of the finest horses in this country and their descendants have been among the fastest in the world. His name appears frequently on the land records of Queens County. His wife was an able writer for the papers. He left a large estate; Kings county, New York, Wills, 13:207.

RAMSEY ANCESTRY OF ENSIGN WILLIAM RAMSEY,

Of the Revolution, who served from Franklin County, Pa., and his Sister, Jeannet Ramsey, who married Joseph Eaton, a Revolutionary Soldier in Franklin County, Pa.

INTRODUCTORY NOTE.—The purposes of this pamphlet are two-fold; primarily, to stimulate both interest and research in the Ramsey ancestry, and secondarily, to correct certain genealogical errors, as the writer firmly believes, which have been stated, re-stated and reiterated for several years.

COAT-OF-ARMS, CREST AND MOTTO.

RAMSEY—MARYLAND. Captain James Ramsey, Baltimore, 1735. (Descended from Sir James de Ramsey of Dalhousie, Scotland.)

Argent, an eagle displayed sable, beaked and membered gules.

CREST: A unicorn's head couped argent, armed or.

Мотто: Ora et Labora.

RAMSAY—VIRGINIA. William McCreery Ramsey, Esq., of Westover. Same arms as Captain James Ramsey of Dalhousie, Scotland.

From A Registry of American Families entitled to Coat Armor, by William Armstrong Crozier, F.R.S., published at the Taft and Belknap Galleries, 1904, 40th St., N. Y.

William and Mary College Quarterly, (Vol. 3, p. 168) contains very positive support of the foregoing, under the title "COAT OF

ARMS IN VIRGINIA:"

"The wax seal attached to the original will of Dr. George Ramsey, in Norfolk County Clerk's office: An eagle displayed, beaked and membered; CREST, a unicorn's head couped. These arms correspond to those in Burke of the Earl of Dalhousie and the Ramseys of Croughton House, Brackley, Southampton. Dr. Ramsey, in his will, dated June 22, 1756, devised his property to his wife Sarah, and to his sons, John and James Ramsey."

CUMBERLAND AND FRANKLIN COUNTIES, PA.

Cumberland County was organized about 1750 and Franklin County about 1784; Hamilton Township originally in Cumber-

land, then in Franklin County, was created about 1752.

The method of identifying genealogically, any one of a lineage is usually referable to land ownership and taxation returns, particularly in the State of Pennsylvania, and these should be viewed in the light of the fact that not always did the person live upon the land granted him or returned for taxation, and its location in one township and county in one year, may have been

relatively different as to township and county in another year, on account of the changes in township and county lines at different dates. This is a source of much confusion to one in a genealogical research.

Ensign William Ramsey.

His Revolutionary record appears in Pennsylvania Archives, Fifth Series, Volume VI, page 318, History of Franklin County, Pennsylvania, (1878-McCauley) pp. 87-96; also the publications Kittochtiny Historical Society, Volume 1908, page 264, and "U. S. Census of Pensioners for Revolutionary or Military Service 1841" page 169, in which he is named as a pensioner, age 84, and on June 1st, 1840, resided with "William Ramsey" in Morristown, Ohio.

His complete military record appears in the records of the Bureau of Pensions, Department of the Interior, Washington, D. C., which exhibits his application for pension under date of Jannary 29th, 1834, in which the applicant states that he was "Born January 1st, 1756, in Bucks County, Pa." This must convey evidence that he belonged to the Bucks County, Pa., Ramsey family; the same pension record shows his residence at the time of enlistment as having been Franklin County, Pa. The wife of Ensign William Ramsey was quite clearly Martha Allen, daughter of Josiah and Martha Allen of Franklin County, Pa., and is so asserted by his descendants without variation. The deed records in Franklin County show he was granted land in 1794, which he and his wife Martha conveyed in 1800, and which was located in Hamilton Township.

HIS SISTER, JEANNET RAMSEY.

Her husband, Joseph Eaton, likewise served in the Revolution, (Pennsylvania Archives, Second Series, Volume X, Pages 15 and 345; McCauley's History, Franklin County, Pa., (ante), and many other authorities,) and likewise received a pension therefor. The pension records show that he was born in 1756, and that his wife Jeannet was "59 years old in 1829," hence born in 1769-70.

That, Ensign William Ramsey and Jeannet Ramsey were brother and sister is, from family records, beyond dispute. It is very probably beyond question, also, that they had, at least, brothers, John, Thomas, and Benjamin, and a sister Margaret, who married a Henry, and that in all probability there was another brother Robert Ramsey. Benjamin is buried at Washington, Pa., and his monument recites that he was born in Cumberland, Pa., in 1755, which is undoubtedly erroneous.

March 3, 1789, Thomas, Benjamin, John and William Ramsey each received warrants for one hundred acres of land in Hamilton Township, Franklin County, Pa. Robert Ramsey was *earlier* a land owner there.

GENEALOGICAL ERRORS.

It was originally asserted that the parents of Ensign William Ramsey were William Ramsey and his wife Martha Allen,—clearly a confusion of generations.

This assertion was formerly repeated until it became an accepted fact, and really has little or no foundation. It is true that as early as 1751* a William Ramsey owned land in what is now Hamilton Township, Franklin County, Pa., and, also in Deed Records 1738-1744 there was a transfer of land "at Dobbins Spring" along the Conococheague Creek, three miles from Mercersburg, Pa., where one "Robert Ramsey" figures, and on the back of the record is the notation of "William Ramsey" as being the one who handed this deed of Robert Ramsey to the purchaser. The location of Dobbins Spring is eight miles southwest of the locality of the Hamilton Township Ramseys.

It has been asserted and alleged that William Ramsey died in 1782 leaving a will naming his wife Martha, and the children indicated above, but no such will is of record in any of the counties under consideration. A William Ramsey with a wife Martha did leave a will of record in York County showing he had lived in Hamilton Ban Township, then York, now Adams County, in 1777, in which he names only a son, Reynold Ramsey, and grandchildren.

BUCKS COUNTY FAMILY.

Davis' History, the Pennsylvania Archives and the Bucks

County Deed and Will Records are authority here. Further, a genealogical correspondent, who has

Further, a genealogical correspondent, who has compiled one of the Ramsey lineages, states that James Ramsey was born in Edinburg, Scotland, in 1692, settled in Bucks County in 1730; that he had a son James, born 1732, who died in York County, Pa., 1757, and he had in turn a son James and daughter Mary. This is the "President Harrison Lineage," published in 1893. (The Ancestry of Benjamin Harrison, etc., by Keith.)

There are practically no evidences against the origin of the Ramsey Family in Bucks County, or that it originated colonially in any other Pennsylvania County; hence, gathering together all of the proofs offered by the County Records and adjusting and harmonizing the various authorities as far as possible, it seems quite probable that the first Ramsey to emigrate to America, and who settled in Bucks County, was William Ramsey, and that the following is the correct lineage:

LINEAGE

Ramsey: Scotch-Irish ancestry.

An Eaton Family genealogist, writing of the ancestry of

Jeannet Ramsey Eaton (post), says:

"Descendant of William Ramsey, a friend of Robert Bruce by whose side he fought throughout the War of Independence, and was one of the nobles who subscribed the celebrated memorial to the Pope in 1320, vindicating the rights and liberties of their country. Like other of the great "Scottish families, the Ramseys settled in Scotland during the reign of David I."

An Alexander Ramsey, writing from his country home, "Dalhousie", near Elgin, Scotland in 1904, claimed that the name was

originally, "De Ramesey", and having a possible descent from the Egyptian Pharoahs, i. e., from Ra-me-sis, not necessarily a remote possibility. It at least accounts for the origin of the name.

Elgin is in Morayshire County and the first of the name to settle there was a Farrier from Forfarshire, which is clearly the ancestral seat. The head of the clan was the Earl of Dalhousie,

whose family name was Ramsey.

It is unquestionable that the first Ramsey who came to Scotland held property in Huntingdonshire, from which he took the name of De Ramesey. That property was part of the estate belonging to the Honour of Huntington, which was in possession of David, Earl of Huntingdon, afterward David First of Scotland. De Ramesey came to Scotland in the train of the Earl of Huntingdon, but retained his designation from his English estate.

By heritage and in temperament, the Ramseys were and are nobly proud and aristocratic, and never have yielded wholly to democratic influences, nevertheless, possessed in their personalities of splendid characteristics and religious preferments.

A descendent of the first John's Ramsey, son of William', copied the following from his tombstone in Montgomery County,

Pennsylvania:

"Ye who survey with attentive eye
This tomb where Ramsey's ashes lie
His worth through various life attend,
His virtues learn and mourn his end.
He's gone from all afflictions here
To reign in life eternal there."

Commencing soon after the year of 1700, there was a large Scotch-Irish emigration to Pennsylvania. Among them came William Ramsey with a large family to settle in Bucks County.

He was of the lineage of Sir James de Ramsey of Dalhousie, Scotland. As some of the Pennsylvania Ramseys possess traditions of Ireland locations, he may have likewise lived there.

The first records of any Ramseys in Bucks County are: Thomas Ramsey, who died intestate in 1714, and James Ramsey, who died intestate in 1720. The more prominent Ramseys of Bucks County was the elder William² Ramsey, son of the emigrant, William¹, who settled in Warwick Township before 1741; he served as a colonial soldier, 1747 and owned land there and in Warminster Township, and very probably was the William Ramsey who with his brother, Robert, owned land in Cumberland County, near Dobbin's Spring, 1738–1744. He m. (1) Jane or Jeannet Brady, daughter of Robert (?) Brady, and (2) Eleanor Fairies, widow of Samuel. He was born in 1698, died October 19th, 1787, age 89 years, leaving a will of record. Mrs. Jeanet Ramsey died February 16th, 1761, age 58 years. They had children; Robert', John', Jeannet', Jean', Hugh', William' and Patrick'. He had a sister Jane or Jeannet who married Robert Mearns who died in 1730, when she married Hugh Huston, and she died September 17th, 1781, age 82 years.

Of the first Bucks County emigrant, William Ramsey's family, then were the following:

i. William², b. 1698 d. 1787 (above).
ii. Robert, in Cumberland Valley, Antrim Tp., 1738-47.

iii. Alexander of Bucks County.

iv. James, b. 1692 or 1701, the ancestor of Major James Ramsey of Ligonier, Penn.

vi. John, of Montgomery County and who settled in Cumberland Valley.

vii. Thomas, b. about 1710, d. 1751, of Bucks County.

viii. And probably others.

Concurrent with the settlement in Warwick Township of the Elder William² Ramsey, was that of his brother, *Thomas*² Ramsey in Nockamixon about 1725 or 1730. He married Mary Darrah Johnston, daughter of another pioneer settler, James Johnston and wife, Mary, daughter of the Irish Colonist, Thomas Darrah, who settled first in Montgomery County and then removed to Bedminster Township in Bucks. Thomas2 Ramsey was an extensive landowner and participated actively in local civic affairs. He died intestate in 1751, his widow, Mary, admin-The orphan court records (1753) show the istering his estate. names of their children and years of birth. Mary Ramsey removed to Tinicum Township and died there 1795, leaving a will naming the same children. Issue:

- i. Captain Williams, b. Nov., 1732, d. after 1795, removed from Bucks and settled in Cumberland, afterwards Franklin County, Penn. In 1795 he was in North Carolina.
 - ii. David, b. Mar., 1735, and in 1795 he was in North Carolina.

iv. Thomas, b. February, 1742, and in 1795 he was in North Cumberland County, Pa.

2. CAPTAIN WILLIAM⁸ RAMSEY, (Thomas², William¹), was a colonial soldier, being a captain of the Fourth of the nine associated Companies of Bucks County, French and Indian War, 1755-1756, his brother-in-law, John Johnston, being a lieutenant of the same Company. He m. in Bucks County, Margaret, daughter of William Allen* of Bensalem Township. Soon after he re-moved to Cumberland County, Pennsylvania, settling first in Antrim Township and owning land in Rye Township, concurrent with his brother, Robert; and later in Hamilton Township, afterwards included in the present limits of Franklin County.

The records of the U.S. Pension Office show his son, Ensign William' Ramsey was born in Bucks County in 1756, while the

tombstone at the head of his son Benjamin's grave, states that the latter was born in Cumberland County in 1755 which may be erroneous in statement, (see statement, post), so the emigration westward was about that date, or Benjamin' was born on a visit to the prospective home place in Cumberland County before the actual location there.

Mr. Geo. O. Seilhammer, the aged historian and skilled genealogist of Franklin County, Pennsylvania, wrote several years ago, as follows:

"On Back Creek, above Brake's Mill, Hamilton Township were the plantations of William Ramsey, afterwards owned by his sons William, Thomas, Benjamin, John. This William Ramsey's descendents are to be found in Pittsburgh, in Washington Co., Pa., and in Harrison Co., Ohio. But strenuous efforts were required on their behalf to identify the old Ramsey homestead; and so far it has been found impossible to establish their exact relationship with the old Ramsey family of Bucks County, to which they undoubtedly belonged. William Ramsey, the eldest son of William Ramsey, the first settler, was an ensign in active services in the Revolution. He was a member of the Rocky Spring Presbyterian Church. * * * I believe that all the Ramsey families of Franklin County, of which there are three distinct branches, belong to the same stock."

When his mother, Mary Ramsey, died in Tinicum Township, Bucks County in 1795, leaving a will, she named this son, William', as being in North Carolina, and as he disappears from the Cumberland and Franklin County records before that date, his wife had probably died and he had gone to live with his brother, David's, in North Carolina. The record clinching the relationship is that of a deed in Cumberland County (Vol. 1, p. 367) reciting:

Deed to William Ramsey from Mary Ramsey, widow, of Nockamixon Township, Bucks County, for land in Rye Township, Cumberland County, 211 acres, "in consideration of the natural love and affection she bears to said William Ramsey", dated October 4, 1790.

WILLIAM4 RAMSEY and wife, had issue.

John Ramsey of Washington, Pa., wrote under date of Nov.

18th, 1907 (then quite old, and possibly now dead)-

"William Ramsey, the first ancestor of whom we have any knowledge, settled in Hamilton Tp., Franklin Co., Pa. He had four sons and two daughters: William, Thomas, Benjamin and John; Jane and Margaret.

William, the first son was born in 1756 and joined the Continental Army at the age of 16. In 1780, he married Martha Allan of Chester and in 1800 removed to Washington Co., Pa., settling on Pigeon Creek. In 1815, he removed to Morristown, Ohio, where he died aged 86.

Thomas Ramsey emigrated to Kentucky and we know noth-

ing further of him.

Benjamin Ramsey came to Washington Co., in 1804 and settled near Washington, where some of his descendents still reside.

John Ramsey came to Washington Co., about the same time

and located near Burgettstown.

Jane married a Mr. Joseph Eaton and Margaret a Mr. Henry. The William who lived and died in Franklin Co., left a goodly portion to each of his children.

The family was in religion, Scotch-Presbyterians." To the foregoing may be added the definite facts:

Ensign William' Ramsey was born January 1st, 1756 and died January 1st, 1841. He married August 26th, 1780, "his cousin," Martha Allen, born December 25th, 1760, died Septemder 28th, 1837, a daughter of Josiah and Martha Allen of Franklin County, Pennsylvania.

Benjamin' and John' Ramsey married twin sisters, Mary and Martha Shields, daughters of Matthew Shields of Franklin

County.

Thomas Ramsey, it has just been learned married Elizabeth Graham of Franklin County, Pennsylvania, and was located at

Lexington, Kentucky, in 1803.

Jeannet' Ramsey was born about 1769 and died in Guernsey County, Ohio. She married in 1780 Joseph Eaton of Hamilton Township, Franklin County, a Revolutionary Soldier, born March 18th, 1856, died December 15th, 1832, in Guernsey County, Ohio. He was a son of Joseph Eaton and Katherine McConnell, daughter of Robert McConnell, a Cumberland County pioneer, and a grandson of John Eaton and wife, Sarah Armstrong, daughter of the first Colonel Joseph Armstrong, the old Indian fighter.

To Mr. R. F. Ramsey of the Pittsburg Gage & Supply Company, Pittsburg, Pa., more than anyone else, is due the credit of continuous interest and research in developing the Ramsey

Ancestry.

Recent researches of his give the following as the children, with their marriages, of William³ Ramsey, and his wife, Margaret Allen, and are probably correct:

Certain court records at Doyleston, Pennsylvania, support the

The records of the Orphans' Court give the children, and their ages, of Thomas and Mary Ramsey, of Nockamixon Township.

One of the parties interested in the settlement of the Thomas Ramsey Estate was James Johnston, and the latter was presumably of the Wrightstown family, and probably the father of the James Johnston who died in 1762, naming John and William Ramsey as executors of his will.

It will be noted that Mary Ramsey's signature to a deed made by her in December, 1766, is as follows: Mary D. Ramsey. Likewise, in the similar signature to her will following:

"In the name of God Amen, I Mary Ramsey of Tinicum Township in the County of Bucks, and Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, being weak of body but of sound memory (blessed be God) Do this thirtieth day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety three make and publish this as my last Will and Testament, in manner following, hereby revoking all others heretofore made—That is to say, First I will that all my just & lawful debts & funeral expenses be paid as soon as convenient after my decease.

Secondly I will that my Real Estate and plantation situate in Tinicum Township in Bucks County Pennsylvania, shall be sold by my Executors after the expiration of one year after my decease and not before, and my Executors hereafter mentioned I do hereby authorize and impower to sell and convey the same to any person in as ample a manner as if I myself were living & the moneys arising from the sale of my said real and landed estate I give and bequeath among my five sons, namely William Ramsey and David Ramsey, living in North Carolina, Robert Ramsey living on my estate in Bucks County, Thomas Ramsey living in Northumberland County, in Pennsylvania aforesaid, and Samuel Ramsey living in Sussex County, State of New Jersey to be divided among them in the following manner viz:—

After all necessary expenses are paid my five sons before mentioned shall have the remainder of the money divided to them share and share alike excepting ten pounds shall be taken from William Ramsey's share afores'd and given to my grandson William Ramsey son of Robert Ramsey, and also ten pounds

taken from David Ramsey's share aforesaid and given to my grandson John Ramsey son of Robert Ramsey aforesaid, as to my personal estate I give and bequeath after my decease a feather bed with a diamond rug, with all its furniture unto Mary Ramsey my granddaughter & daughter of Thomas Ramsey afores'd. Also one feather bed and furniture I give unto my granddaughter Mary Ramsey daughter of Robert afores'd. And also I give my mahogany tea table to my son Robert during his life and after his decease to my grandson William, son of Robert aforesaid and also my desk I give to Jaine Ramsey daughter of my son Thomas Ramsey, also all my peuter.

I give & bequeath after my decease to Mary Ramsey daughter of Thomas Ramsey afores'd, and Mary Ramsey daughter of Robert Ramsey aforesaid to be divided between them share &

share alike.

Also all my wearing apparel I give and bequeath unto Mary Ramsey wife of my son Robert, and Ann Ramsey wife of my son Samuel afores'd. to be divided between them share and share alike, and the remainder of my personal property that I have not willed away I give unto my two sons Samuel Ramsey and Robert Ramsey afores'd, to be divided between them equally share and share alike, and I do constitute and appoint my sons Robert Ramsey and Samuel Ramsey aforesaid to be my executors to execute this my last Will and Testament. Witness my hand and seal dated the day and year above first written.'

As heretofore given, her husband was Joseph Eaton, a Revolutionary soldier.

The Eaton family was one of the early pioneer families of Pennsylvania, and the name appears quite frequently in the early county records.* Several of the name emigrated to America at an early date, one of whom settled in Connecticut, from whom the famous General William Eaton was descended; one of whom went to Maryland or Virginia, and one of whom settled in Pennsylvania. These were the progenitors of large and honorable

^{*} During the preparation of this manuscript, a History, Genealogical and Biographical, of the Eaton Families has appeared, compiled by Nellie Zada Rice Molyneux (Syracuse, New York), which gives the above Eaton ancestry correctly (pp. 607 et seq.), as being that of John Eatton (Eaton) who came from Radnorshire, Wales, to Pennepack, Philadelphia County, Pennsylvania, in 1683, with his wife, Joan. However, the compiler has confused two generations in that her No. 29-2 John Eaton, and No. 39-3 Joseph Eaton (page 627), were not brothers, but were father and son, the birth dates being wrong, and they were the ancestors of the Franklin County Eatons.

families. This sketch more particularly concerns the descendant, Joseph, who with his brother, James, served in the Revolutionary War. Joseph Eaton, himself, used the spelling "Eatton," which was probably historically incorrect, and which has never been adopted by his descendants. He was born in Franklin County, Pa., March 18th, 1756 and died in Guernsey county, Ohio, December 15th, 1832. The records of Franklin Co. show the ownership of land by Joseph, James and John Eaton, that they were hardy pioneers and industrious people, and honored members of the Old Rocky Spring Presbyterian Church. It was in the Revolutionary War, in behalf of the American Independence, that the three Eatons exhibited their most patriotic and heroic character.

Joseph Eaton, enlisted in 1775, for one year, under Captain James Chambers, in Colonel William Thompson's Battalion. In the Pennsylvania Archives, Volume 10, New Series, Volume 2, there is some history of this Battalion (to be found in Public or Historical Libraries) with letters from the officers, and Eatton's name is in Volume 10, pages 16 and 339. From which it appears that Captain Chambers' Company were riflemen raised in Cumberland, that part now Franklin county, Pa., in June, 1775, and went to the siege of Boston, arriving there July 7th. On the new organization of the army in January and February, 1776, the Battalion became the First Pennsylvania Regiment. He reenlisted in February, 1776, for three years in the same company, at first commanded by Captain James Grier, next by Captain Thomas Buchanan in the regiment of James Chambers, who had been promoted to Colonel.

Boston was evacuated by the British, March 17, 1776, and he must have been ordered to New York City, for he stated that he was in the battle of Long Island (August 27th, 1776 and New York City, evacuated September 15th, 1776), in the Battle of Brandywine, Delaware, (September 11, 1777), and Philadelphia occupied by the British, September 26th, 1777, and in the Battle of Germantown, Pa., (October 4th, 1777), at which time, he was one of the assaulting party that unsuccessfully attacked the stone "Chew House" in which the almost defeated enemy took refuge. He must have been, though he does not confirm it, in winter quarters in the historic camp at Valley Forge, Chester county, Pa., in 1777-8, from whence the army pursued the British on their march from Philadelphia across New Jersey, overtook them at Monmouth, June 28th, 1778 and Eaton was in that battle

on an excessive hot day.

About 1787 Joseph Eaton married Jeanet Ramsey, who was a daughter of William Ramsey and Margaret Allen. To this union there were born several children; among them, William and John, who emigrated and settled in Morristown, Ohio. Joseph settled at Mt. Vernon, Ohio. Catharine married a Sharon and moved to Schuyler county, Ill. Two of the children were twins, Benjamin and his sister Martha. Benjamin was born in Franklin county, May 2, 1791, and died March 17th, 1863. He married Mary Coony—Scott. They had several children, among whom, was Eliza Eaton, who married William Houston.

Benjamin's twin sister married Jas. Sharon about 1815. James was born in 1790, and was a son of William Sharon and Sarah Smiley. The Sharons were of Scotch-Irish descent, originally settling in Westmoreland county, Pa., and later moving to Jefferson county, Ohio. James Sharon had a brother William, who was the father of Senator William Sharon, of Nevada. James Sharon and Martha Eaton had four children, two sons and two daughters; (1) Joseph married Eliza Mayholm; (2) Smiley married Loretta Shotwell; (3) Sarah married Jonas Bernard; (4) Jane married James Gill Elrick.

James Gill Elrick was a son of Bernard Elrick and Serena Gill of Bedford county, Pa., and a grandson of George Elrick,

To him and his wife Jane were born four children (1) Helen Sharon Elrick, unmarried, and now living at Columbus, Ohio; (2) Clara Belle Elrick, unmarried and now living at Columbus, Ohio; (3) Anna Eaton Elrick, who married William Francis Janeway, now deceased, and is living at Columbus, Ohio, and (4) Mary Elizabeth Elrick, who married

John Mackall, and is living at Barnesville, Ohio.

William Francis Janeway and Anna Eaton Elrick had seven children: (1) Carrie Lucile, born at Zanesville, Ohio, August 3, 1874, married the writer, Orra Eugene Monnette, November 6, 1895, and now living at No. 3101 Wilshire Blv'd., Los Angeles, California; (2) Louella Sharon, born at Zanesville, Ohio, December 26th, 1875, died February 18th, 1876; (3) Edith Francis, born at Barnesville, Ohio, January 3, 1878, now living at Columbus, Ohio, unmarried; (4) Mary Viola, born Barnesville, Ohio, October 10th, 1881, married Alfred Cookman de Bruin, June 27th, 1905, and now living at Columbus, Ohio; (5) William Ralph, born Barnesville, Ohio, December 6th, 1884, unmarried and now living at Columbus, Ohio; (6) a child died in infancy; (7) George Harold, born Columbus, Ohio, December 5th, 1888, and living in Los Angeles, Cal.

In May, 1829, Joseph Eaton, residing at Morristown, Ohio, aged 73, and in October, 1832, he was living in Guernsey County, Ohio, aged 76 years, and badly afflicted with dropsy. In May, 1829, his wife, Jeanet, was living, aged 59 years. He died De-

cember 15th, 1832.

HINTS FOR THE SEARCHING OF RECORDS.

By Ethan Allen Doty.

Statistics for Genealogical studies are gathered from State, County and Town records, also from the records of churches, or ministers of churches, from old family bibles, and from the memories of old residents.

The State records of New York and New Jersey have many of the early marriage licenses, and the early grants of land, and these as well as all the Eastern states, have records of the soldiers of the Revolutionary War, and of the pensions granted them. The county records everywhere give the wills, deeds and mortgages. In Massachusetts and elsewhere, where its citizens have emigrated, the town records are very satisfactory, as they give births, marriages and deaths down to the close of the Revolution, and in some cases later. After this we are dependent on the family bible and the old residents.

The town histories of many of these old towns are very useful, especially where indexed as to names, and in very many cases the records of old towns have been indexed by some industrious collector, to the great delectation of the searcher.

It is desirable, and almost necessary, to study the history of the various localities, and follow the lines of emigration from the

early settlement.

The early settlers at Plymouth, Massachusetts, soon spread ont to the adjoining country, forming the towns of Plympton, Marshfield, Rochester and Wareham, and of Sandwich and Eastham on Cape Cod. Very soon the settlements continued to the coast of Maine, and further inland in Massachusetts and Connecticut. And while some pressed on to Sharon in Connecticut and to Hardwick in northern Massachusetts, and so gradually to the West, others as early as 1650 settled in Queens and Suffolk Counties on Long Island and as early as 1670 at Piscataway, near the present city of New Brunswick, in New Jersey.

As the town lines have been cut up, and new towns formed, it is essential to find which of the new divisions holds the original town records, and even this may change every few years. But I have always found Town Clerks very obliging, and I have received invaluable assistance from collectors of statistics, and

local historians in every part of our country.

In this vicinity we are largely interested in the records of Long Island, which was settled at its western end by the Dutch from Manhattan, and at the eastern end by the emigration from Massachusetts and Connecticut. The Dutch settled at Flatbush, Flatlands, New Utrecht, Gravesend and later at Bruckleyn as

they called it.

The old Dutch church at Flatbush has some old records, and the old Dutch families furnish some, but there are none of any consequence at Brooklyn, all the deeds being comparatively modern. The New York State records give about all we know of this region, and these are to be found at Albany, N. Y., and in the Register's Office in New York City. Indeed these latter are very interesting. The Dutch also setted at Maspeth and Newtown, but the population there consisted more of emigrants from New England who for various reasons sought residence in the Dutch territory. These spread out to Flushing, to Jamaica and Queens, meeting there the settlers of the Eastern end of Long Island. Records of these families are found at Jamaica in the county records, and in the various town records. The town records of Oyster Bay are with the Town Clerk at East Norwich, and cover all that region, including Cold Spring Harbor.

Records of Hempstead may be found at Hempstead and all of these are in fair condition. But the records of the Friend's Societies also give much valuable information. Some of these are with the Society at Flushing but the most have been deposited with the 20th Street Friend's Meeting in New York City, Manhattan Borough.

We should by no means overlook the valuable services of those who have so carefully gathered the records of towns and of families. The libraries of the New York Genealogical and Biographical Society, the Puplic Library, the New York Historical Society and the Long Island Historical Society are particularly rich in this literature, and a careful study of the volumes will

many times save a trip and hours of searching.

Families from Long Island emigrated again to Westchester, Dutchess, Columbia and Renssalaer Counties in New York State and to New Jersey. In Westchester County the records of St. Peter's Church and of the town of Westchester are valuable; in Dutchess County there are records at Poughkeepsie and several other points, and some excellent local histories. In the other counties it is more difficult. In New Jersey, the state records at Trenton and some valuable manuscript collections in the New Jersey Historical Society at Newark make a good foundation for search.

It requires a good deal of patience and hard work to follow up such information as may be collected in the ways mentioned above by personal interviews with aged members of the families, and old residents, but it is fully repaid by the results obtained.

One must recognize too, the difference in spelling of the name in the same family and in some cases between brothers. The English family of "Thornycraft" was represented in Suffolk County by an old farmer with two sons. At his death the farm was divided between them, one taking the name of Thorn and the other of Craft. Both families have flourished and have many modern representatives, who probably have no idea of their earlier ancestry. Similar cases are not infrequent, and only add to the zest of the enthusiastic Genealogist, when explained by the records.

The above gives information regarding this pamphlet, which the editor says is sent forth in the hope that it may prove an introduction to a history. There are ten full page half tone illustrations. The history covers twenty pages, of which nine pages give the descendants of Wm. Eagles Baird (1787-1879). It would be better if the New England Register arrangement should have been followed, since the absence of individual and generation numerals makes the matter obscure.

RODNEY'S DIARY AND OTHER DELAWARE RECORDS. C. H. B. Turner, Lewes, Del. Philadelphia, Allen, Lane & Scott. 1911. Octavo, pp. 148.

The preface shows the diary to be of the Hon. Daniel Rodney, the rest are bits scattered through N. Y., N. J., Pa., and Maryland archives, with a few wills from the Wills Books in Georgetown, Del., and marriages from the Deed Books of the same place. The diary begins March, 1813, and ends April 18, 1829, nearly covering the period of the Second War with England. Rodney was afterwards Judge of the Court of General Sessions of the Peace, Del. There are wills, Bible records, Pennsylvania and Maryland archives, Georgetown records, N. J. archives, and an index of twelve pages double colum. R. H. G.

Compiled and published by Emily C. Hawley, Brookfield, Conn., 1911. 8vo, cloth, pp. 359, ill. by 45 full page cuts. Fully indexed. Price \$10.00, postage 40 cents. Press of E. L. Hildreth & Co., Brattleboro, Vt.

Besides its genealogical value this work contains a wealth of historical matter connected with colonial days in New England and New York, It begins with a record of members of the early Scudamore family of England, including

the Coat-of-Arms and the English Manor House and grounds.

Thomas Skidmore or Scudamore, the pioneer, was a descendant of Sir Thomas Scudamore of Holme Lacy, Herefordshire, England. Born about 1600 he was married and living when thirty-five years of age at Westerly, County of Gloucester, England. In about 1635 he sailed with Gov. Winthrop and his company for the new world. The Massachusetts Bay Co., in 1630-1, having selected the site of Cambridge as a "convenient place to erect a towne," Skid-more took up his settlement there. He later removed to New London and afterwards to Fairfield, in Connecticut Colony. Soon he joined a party bound for Long Island and with them founded the Huntington of today. In this way he became connected with that island where the name has not only been prolific but of genuine advantage to the upbuilding of the locality. He had six children whose fortunes and those of their descendants it is the mission of this book to follow, and thoroughly it would seem has the appointed task been accomplished. Interspersed among the portraits are many really beautiful illustrations relating to places connected with the family story. The author is to be commended for praiseworthy zeal and intelligent use of her opportunity.

An index accompanies the text and a number of pages are added for the insertion of notes on individual families.

THE GRAVESTONE RECORDS OF SHAFTSBURY, BENNINGTON Co., VT. Copied and verified 1908–10 by Levi Henry Elwell, pamphlet, pp. 76. Printed at Amherst, Mass.

This work was decidedly worth while. Too many of the early tombstone records have been lost. One of the objects of this Society is the preservation of all such as remain. The Committee will gladly publish in this quarterly compilations of cemetery inscriptions. It is a pity that this pamphlet should be weighted down with such mongral spellings as, for instance, "bild" for "build" notist" for "noticed," "livd" for "lived," et id omne genus. There seems to be no excuse for it,

Perkins Families in the United States in 1790. Compiled by D. W. Perkins of Utica, N. Y., 1911. Price \$1.00.

A list of the persons bearing the name contained in the Census of 1790 and all the genealogical data appertaining to them. Of the 400,000 odd heads of families enumerated, 587 bore the name whose families consisted of 3327 individuals. In New York City there was no family and only eighteen in the whole State. In Boston there were to families while in the towns of Ipswich and Topsfield, where John Perkins and his three sons originally settled, there were 35 families. A brief account of this John is adjoined with facts tending to prove that he was a native of Hillmorton, Warwickshire, instead of Newent, Gloncestershire, England, together with a list of all town histories and authorities that mention the Perkins name among early settlers. Indexed with names of persons, places and items mentioned in the text.

CORNELIUS JANSEN CLOPPER AND HIS DESCENDANTS. Compiled by John R. Witcraft, Merchantville, N. J., 1912. Pamphlet, pp. 40. Price \$2.00. Edition limited to 100 copies.

This worthy was one of the early Dutch settlers, a veritable Knickerbocker, but without being aware of the fact. We doubt if he spelled his name Cornelius with a "u." A blacksmith by trade, he resided in 1664 on Maiden Lane near the Broad Way. His descendants have intermarried with the Van de Water, Grevenraet, Couvenhoven, Lefferts, Roosevelt, Ten Eyck and Schuyler families, among others; their connection with which has been genealogically shown on later pages. To this is added Clopper's will bearing date Sept. to, 1669. We welcome this account of one of the "Old New York Families."

HISTORY OF THE DESCENDANTS OF PETER SPICER, a Landholder in New London, Conn., as early as 1666, and Others of the Name, with Appendix containing short accounts of Allied Families. Compiled by Mrs. Susan Spicer Meech and Miss Susan Billings Meech, Groton, Conn. Octavo, cloth, pp. 610, ill. with 2 colored plates of Spicer Arms, 22 other cuts and a chart. Stanhope Press, F. H. Gilson Co., Boston, Mass. Edition limited to 250 copies, price \$7.00, postage 25 cents, with comprehensive index.

Besides the space given to the descendants of Peter Spicer who was of New London in 1666 some account of many of the name who came to America and of some who remained in England is given. The authors regret they are unable to ascertain where Peter came from but assert that there is a tradition that it was from Virgnia and he was of English parentage. The early land deeds, interesting biographical sketches, records of military service, etc., are included in the volume and the Allyn, Ames, Bill, Billings, Browne, Chapman, Geer, Fish, Latham, Lee, Meech, Newton, Park, Pride, Rose, Roffe, Stoddard, Swaddell, Thurber, Tyler, Williams and other early colonial families receive special notice. Early wills are printed in full.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF BISHOP JACOB MAST AND OTHER MAST PIONEERS, and a Completed Genealogical Family Register and those related by Inter-marriage with Biographies of their Descendants from the Earliest

Available Records to the Present Time: with Portraits and other illustrations. C. Z. Mast, Elverson, Penna. 8vo., cloth, pp. 822. Mennonite Publishing House Press, Scottdale, Pa. Price \$2.50. Indexed.

This book contains all that is known of the history of the Bishop who was born in Switzerland in 1738, landed at Philadelphia Nov. 3, 1750, and settled near the Blue Mountains in Berks Co., Pa. In 1760 his four sisters and younger brother John were attacked by Indians; thus they were forced to seek another asylum from persecution by settling in Conestoga Valley on a tract of land located one quarter mile from the present site of Elverson, Pa., where he reared a family of twelve children. John settled later in North Carolina and his descendants are spread widely in southern states. Both brothers were members of the Amish Mennonite Church which is closely allied to the main body of Mennonites in America. Jacob was elected to the Bishoprick in 1788, was well educated for the times and was a man of extensive influence. Nearly 2000 families claim him as an ancestor. Interesting sketches with pedigree are printed concerning the Zug or Zook, Kurtz, Hooley, Beiler, Stoltzfus, Johns, Miller, Gehman, Buch, Groff, Kintzer, Boyer, Greth, Kennel, Troyer, Yoder, Snyder, Wanner, Reeser families and others. A valuable and interesting compilation.

Descendants of Jacob Hochstetler, the Immigrant of 1736. By Rev. Harvey Hostetler, D.D., of Council Bluffs, lowa. Historical introduction by William F. Hochstetler. 8vo, full morocco, pp. 1191. Published by the Brethren Publishing House, Elgin, Ill., 1912, price, cloth, \$2.50; half morocco, \$3.00; full morocco, gilt top \$3.50. These prices exclude cost of transportation.

The general plan undertaken by the compiler is, starting with the head of each family, to follow it with the generation number and number of the family of the parents, present or last Post Office address, dates of birth and marriage, name of marriage partner and ancestors of that partner. Then is given the occupation of the family head and the religious preference. By this plan it is easy to ascertain the descent of any individual and the particulars about him. A method to be commended. The family descends from Jacob Hofstedler who reached Philadelphia Sept. 1, 1736, on a ship sailing from Rotterdam. He came from Switzerland but from what place is unknown. He settled in the township of Brecknock, Lancaster Co., where, being a farmer, he took up 200 acres of land. Here a short stay was made. Being a member of the Amish church he finally fixed his home at a settlement of that denomination on the Northkill, a rapidly flowing creek, in Bern Township, in the same County. The pioneer had three sons, John, Joseph and Christian, and a daughter Barbara. These and their descendants make up the larger part of this volume. In the history of the family which precedes the genealogy, we are granted, besides some account of the church, a vivid presentation of the danger of border settlements, the French and Indian War of 1754, the Massacre of 1757, the captivity of the family, and the final escape from the tribe. Truly a story well worth the reading. There is an appendix containing brief accounts of some related families and indices which are remarkably extensive. The book is really a reference work and as such will prove of valuable use to those of the name. It is well bound and printed in clear though small type.

THE PAYNES OF HAMILTON; a Genealogical and Biographical Record. By Augusta Francelia Payne White. Octavo, cloth, pp. 251. Illustrated. Tobias A. Wright, New York. 1912. Price \$7.50.

After a brief statement concerning families of the name in England and Normandy the compiler continues giving biographies of the ancestors of this family in the male line as far back as the immigration from England to Plymouth Colony. All the descendants of Elisha Payne, the founder of Hamilton, in the male and female line are given. There are also chapters giving information about the families of the wives of the ancestors of Elisha Payne in the male line. The compiler of this splendid work died before it was ready for the printer, but the important task of editing fell into such able hands that we recognize in this book a genealogical publication that is almost perfect

in its completeness, beautifully printed and substantially hound. The illustrations, especially the photogravure plates, are very fine and the entire book bears evidence of conscientious and intelligent labor throughout. There is a complete index of names.

THE EARLIEST CUYLERS IN HOLLAND AND AMERICA, and some of their Descendants: Researches establishing a line from Tydeman Cuylers of Hasselt, 1456. By Maud Churchill Nicoll. Large octavo, pp. viii+69. Illustrated. Tobias A. Wright, 1912. Price: Full morocco, \$10; cloth, \$5.00. Address A. J. Wohlhagen, 520 West 183rd Street, New York.

It is rare that a compiler has the patience, the ability and the means to trace a family back 500 years, establishing by undisputed documentry evidence complete records of the generations down to the present time.

The name of Cuyler is of great antiquity, dating authentically to 1387—an unusual thing in the history of Dutch surnames, and the Cout-of-Arms of the Cuylers is found as early as 1502 in use as an official seal. The unbroken records show that for 500 years the Cuylers have played an important part in every generation and a study of a genealogical chart giving the descendants of Hendrick Cuyler and his wife, Annetje Schepmoes, shows that there is scarcely a Dutch family of consequence in New York who are not related to them by cousanguinity or affinity. It was fortunate that the work of tracing and arranging these Cuyler records fell to so capable and indefatigable a genealogist as Mrs. De Lancey Nicoll. It is a splendid record, perfectly arranged and most beautiful printed and bound. The full morocco edition with colored Coatof-Arms, fine photogravure illustrations, and the text printed on Japan vellum, establishes a high-water mark in this branch of publication. The book contains a list of unplaced Cuylers, a partial list of works and sources consulted in its compilation, and a perfect name index.

ENOCH AND ELIZABETH MASON, THEIR ANCESTRY AND DESCENDANTS. Compiled by S. S. Mason, 1911. 8vo, cloth, ill., pp. 91. Press of J. H. Beardsley, Kingsley, Iowa. Cloth \$2.10 post paid; paper 60 cents.

This is a worthy contribution to the genealogy of the Mason Family. It is limited, of course, by its title. The descriptive matter and the portraits show the family to be of the old American stock, and the biographical references indicate how well the Masons have served the country and civilization.

THE ANCESTORS AND DESCENDANTS OF RULEF SCHENCK. A Genealogy of the Onondaga County, New York, Branch of the Schenck Family. By Benjamin Robinson Schenck, M. D., from Records and Notes compiled by Adrian Adelbert Schenck. 8vo, ill., pp. 160. Detroit, Mich., 1911.

This type of book is particularly desired by this Society. Its genealogical record of a New York family is valuable, and, incidentally, it casts light on the early history of Onondaga County. These personal reminiscences give local color to any book and are distinctly worth preserving.

BARNEY. BARNEY-HOSMER, 1634-1635. 8vo, cloth, profusely illustrated, pp. 133. Privately printed, 1912.

Nothing has been spared to make this book a delight to the reader. Type, illustrations and arrangement are clear and beautiful. The genealogy of the two families leads down to Mr. Everett Hosmer Barney whose portrait stands as frontispiece.

HAMPTON HISTORY. An Account of the Pennsylvania Hamptons in America in the Line of John Hampton, Jr., of Wrightstown. By John Hampton Doan, 1911. 8vo, cloth, pp. 199. Published by Dr. Solomon E. Hampton, Milton, Kentucky.

This is a thorough-going history of this branch of the Hampton Family, whose records are well worth printing. The biographical sketches show that the book was a labor of love. They will be very valuable to all the Hamptons, and the records will prove of value to all enquirers as to the line of descent.

Branch Family in Virginia. By James Branch Cabell. 8vo, cloth, ill. pp. 177. Whittet & Shepperson, Richmond, Va.

Branch of Abingdon. Being a Partial Account of the Ancestry of Christopher Branch of "Arrowhattocks" and "Kingsland" in Henrico County, and the Founder of the Branch Family in Virginia. By James Branch Cabell. 8vo, cloth, ill., pp. 126. Wm. Ellis Jones' Sons, Inc., Richmond, Va.

These two books are properly considered here as in series, giving an account of this family from several generations before the ancestor emigrated from England to this country. A vivid eye for matters of human interest enables the author to make the two volumes very entertaining. The subject has received literary treatment, and it is wonderful how this brightens up the pages of genealogy. Thus the details of a family fracas in colonial Virginia are given in the words of the old records, a most entertaining bit. A novelist might well study these books of Mr. Cabell for local color of early colonial life in Virginia. The reviewer owns himself very much entertained by this item and others, such as the shady suggestions of London life in the sixteenth century, into which "the unthrifty and disobedient son" Lionel Branch plunged.

The books are splendidly appointed. The type and paper are of the best, the illustrations of the finest and most beautiful.

An "unthrifty" ancestor and an unsuccessful lawsuit in England are responsible for the founding of the Branch Family in Virginia. Christopher Branch, the immigrant ancestor, sought the New World to rehabilitate the family fortunes, and found a fertile field for his evident strong character and ability. As landed proprietors in Virginia the Branches have produced many strong and able men, as is witnessed by their portraits and records. But these books show especially how entertaining genealogy may be made when treated by one who understands literary values.

SKETCHES OF THE FORNEY FAMILY BY H. O. F. For Private Circulation \$3 per copy, 8vo, cloth, ill., pp. 129. Harper and Brother Co., Phil., 1911.

The reviewer congratulates himself on having this book presented to him for perusal. Of all the national and religious migrations to America the so-called Pennsylvania-Dutch movement is one of the most interesting, and yet history and literature slight it the most. This book is not a catalogue of names, and in its biographical treatment, it shows more of the nature of this important racial body than many a United States history.

We are moved to note the contrast between the fertile farms of York and Lancaster Counties, Pennsylania, and the boulder-strewn patches of farm land which the Puritans had to till. The Forneys reached comparative financial ease, we imagine, long before the New England families of the same generation.

PARKER IN AMERICA, 1630-1910. What the Historians say of them; What a Large Number of them say of Themselves; Genealogical and Biographical; Interesting Historical Incidents. Compiled and edited by Augustus G. Parker, 878 Prospect Ave., Buffalo, N. Y., 8vo, leather, pp. 592. Illustrated with portrait of the Author. Price \$5. Niagara Frontier Publishing Co., Buffalo.

The task set for himself in the compilation of this voluminous book has been well performed by the author, and speaks well for his untiring efforts. The plan followed out so energetically has been the copying from local histories or other sources everything of interest relating to the name. Extracts from some 200 books have been brought together. Part II contains a large number of contributed sketches that, in the words of the preface, "unite the ancestry of yore with the progeny of today." If one may find any fault with the work it would be that the type is too small, and that an index is lacking.

Among many notable Parkers we can here call attention to but one, the Rev. Thomas Parker, the first religious leader and father in God of Newbury, Mass. in 1635. As one sails on the quiet River Parker today he can call to

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mind the cultivated gentleman, so strangely removed from the society of his Oxford and Newbury friends and peers in England, to lead the earnest and stubborn pioneers of Newbury in the knowledge of God and the Scriptures.

Beekman and Van Dyke Genealogy. Distinguished Families in America Descended from Wilhelmus Beekman and Jan Thomasse van Dyke. Compiled by William B. Aitken, A. M., Ph. D., printed by the Knickerbocker Press, New York and London, 1912. Cloth, 8vo, pp. viii+266, illustrated.

This volume will prove interesting and useful to the descendants of the above families and genealogists in general. It is written in a clear and concise manner and brings down the generations of minors to the date of publication and is completely indexed.

The illustrations consist of some fourteen full page reproductions of the ancient homesteads of the early settlers, including a map and numerous smaller illustrations of old time interest. The frontispiece gives the Beekman Coat-of-Arms in color. The title page border is composed of the Coats-of-Arms of the Allied Families in black and white. The preface gives a brief account of "other Beekmans" "who are not related as far as known to Wilhelmus Beekman."

The Beekmans are traced back to 1200 in Germany, and later in the Netherlands, in both countries they were large land owners, and were distinguished for their talents, and by titles and military honors conferred upon them for their courage and diplomatic abilities. They were men of letters, clergymen of the Protestant faith, and held many public offices of prominence in the old countries.

The Rev. Gerard Beekman, grandfather of Wilhelmus was a distinguished theologian, whose services in translating the Bible were rewarded by King James I, of England in granting him as a coat-of-arms, "A rivulet running between roses." "Crest is three feathers on a helmet of steel represented in profile." "The motto is: Mens conscia Recti."

The van Dyke Family. Jan Thomasse van Dyke who came to New Netherland in 1652, was the son of Thomas van Dyke. He came from Amsterdam in Holland in 1652, with his wife and seven children and brought his coat-of-arms with him. He was one of the founders of Utrecht in 1657, where he was granted a patent by the Governor and Council.

He was active in the affairs of the New Colony and received honors and appointments under its government and was a magistrate at the time of his death.

There were two other van Dykes who came from Holland to New Netherland,—Franz Classen van Dyke and Hendrick van Dyke in 1640. The volume deals with the descendants of Jan Thomasse van Dyke who were numerous and intermarried with many of the prominent old Dutch families and settled in New York, New Jersey and Long Island.

GENEALOGY OF THE CLOYD, BASYE AND TAPP FAMILIES IN AMERICA WITH BRIEF SKETCHES REFERRING TO THE FAMILIES OF INGELS, JONES, MARSHALL AND SMITH, by A. D. Cloyd, M. D. Octavo, cloth, pp. 298. Price \$2.50. Omaha, Nebraska, 1912.

Much intelligent labor has been expended on this very interesting and valuable book which contains some 4000 names of members of the above families. It begins with the first immigrant ancestor of each family to America, and contains a list of descendants, as far as known. By means of this book any member of either of these families can trace his or her ancestry to the original immigrant ancestor. As pecial feature of the book is an account of the services, rendered as soldiers in the Revolution or other American wars. It is profusely illustrated and the family groups, sometimes showing four generations, are particularly interesting. The book is well printed on good paper and substantially bound in cloth. The work ends with a Cloyd Family Chart and a very complete index of names.
