The 1984-85 Nocatula staff is proud to dedicate this yearbook, as a welcome into office, to President James Cheek and his family.

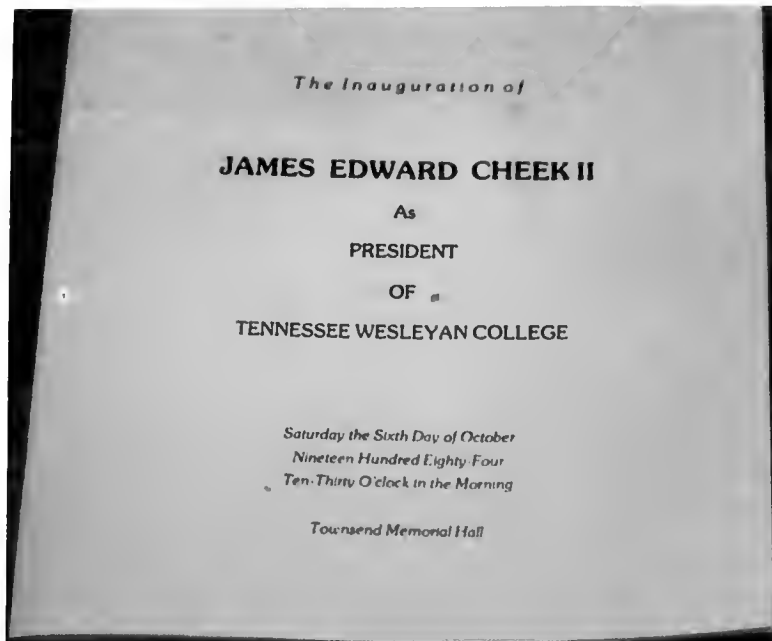


James E. Cheek II, Sixteenth President of Tennessee Wesleyan College, succeeds George E. Naff, Jr., who retired from the position on June 30th, 1984, after serving for 9 years. Dr. Cheek had been serving as Vice-President for Institutional Advancement at Tennessee Wesleyan College.

A native of Rossville, Georgia, he took his B.A. in English while an undergraduate at Emory and Henry College. He taught English at Brentsville District High School in Nokesville, Va., between 1962-65. President Cheek joined the faculty of Hiwassee College in 1965, where he spent eleven years as English instructor and coach. During his tenure, he was selected three times as Teacher of the Year by the student body.

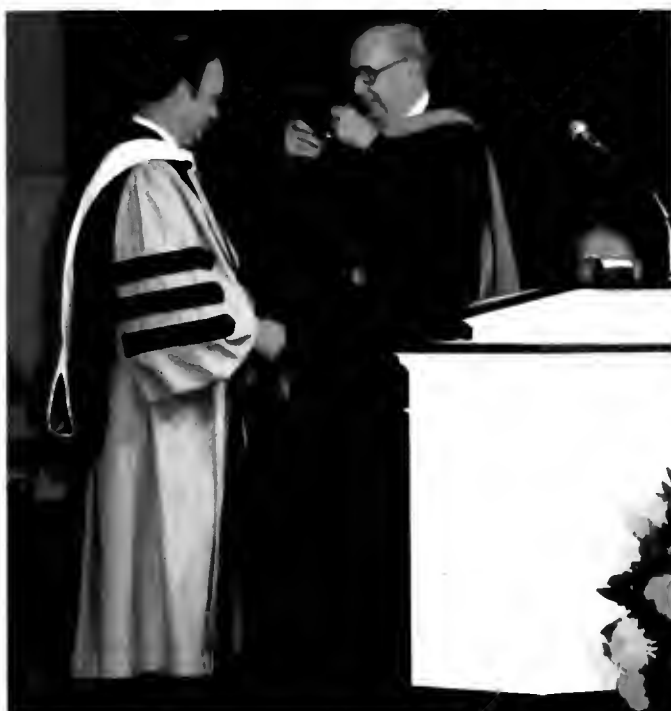
Dr. Cheek took his Master of Arts in Teaching in English from the University of Chattanooga in 1967. He has completed his work for the Ph.D. in English at Florida State University and has done further graduate study at the University of Virginia, East Tennessee State University and The University of Tennessee at Knoxville. He is a graduate of the College Management Program of Carnegie-Mellon University. In 1983, he received the honorary Doctor of Letters degree from Lincoln Memorial University. After joining the faculty of Tennessee Wesleyan College in 1976 as associate professor of English and a Chairman of the Department, Dr. Cheek has served in various capacities including assistant to the President, Dean of Student Services, Director of Admissions, Director of Development, and Vice-President for Institutional Advancement.

James E. Cheek II is married to the former Rosemary Dickson of Chattanooga. Mrs. Cheek is a graduate of East Tennessee State University and is active in community and church affairs. Dr. and Mrs. Cheek have 4 children, James E. III (Trippe), Caroline, John Christopher, (Chris) and Rachel Dickson.

A vital part of Tennessee Wesleyan College, the building known as Old College stands as a reminder of the past and present. This three story brick building was built by the Order of Odd Fellows who obtained a charter from the State of Tennessee on January 2, 1854. This was to be eventually bought by the Methodist Episcopal Church South on October 22, 1857, and then became known as Old College. At this time Old College came under the control of the Holston Conference. In 1858 Old College opens as the Athens Female College with seventy students. The college has always been used as an educational facility with the exception of the year 1862 when it was used as a hospital during the Civil War. After the Civil War, there was a dispute over the building and in a 1870 Supreme Court decision the building was returned to the Methodist Episcopal Church South. It was later called East Tennessee Wesleyan College and now is the focal point of the campus. Presently the McMinn County Living Heritage Museum is located in the Old College building. The museum was placed on the National Historical Register in 1983. Extensive renovation has taken place on Old College and nine rooms comprise the museum with each room sponsored by a family or company. The museum houses articles from McMinn, Meigs, and Monroe counties that date from 1820 to 1940. Tennessee Wesleyan College carries on the tradition set by Old College today.

Tennessee Wesleyan's underclassmen constitute three-fourth's of the student body. Our underclassmen are found in action as cheerleaders, athletes, and members of various organizations. As our Freshmen are getting used to being away from home, and the hustle of college life, our Sophomores are struggling to finish the year. The Juniors are faithfully looking forward to that wonderful next year. They are still enjoying this year as they find time for fun between studies. While the Senior class seems most important right now, it is these underclassmen that will be the leaders of tomorrow.

The Fisher Hall of Science was dedicated by J. W. Fisher of Newport, Tennessee, who was an active Trustee of Tennessee Wesleyan College. Mr. Fisher donated \$250,000 for the construction of the building which is complete with laboratories, lecture rooms, conference rooms, and offices. Fisher Hall is dedicated to the memory of three generations of Fishers: Robert M. Fisher, Richard J. Fisher, Sr. and Richard J. Fisher, Jr.

Fisher Hall is usually thought of as the science building since most of the building is used for Biology, Physics, and Chemistry classes. The laboratories are well-supplied with standard materials and valuable equipment.

Fisher Hall currently has classrooms and offices for the departments of Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Speech and Theater, and Computer Science. The building also has a darkroom for the Communications Department and is used to store a variety of recreation equipment.

The faculty and staff at Tennessee Wesleyan College have one goal — to aid in the education of the students. Some of these members have been at T.W.C. for a number of years, while others are relatively new; however they work together to form a learning environment for the students. The most prominent attribute of our faculty and staff is their immediate friendship and eagerness to help. Each of them follow the student from his or her first day at T.W.C. thru graduation day and all of them are always there to give support and an extra push toward that long lived goal!

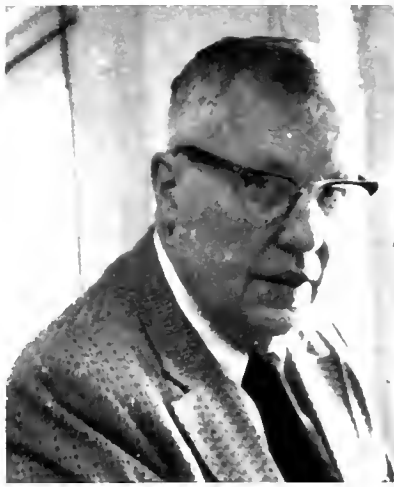

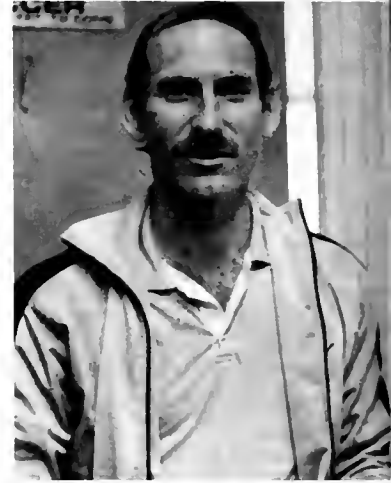

Townsend Memorial Hall was built in 1924. In 1951 the building was rededicated to the memory of the late Colonel W. B. Townsend, who was a generous benefactor of Tennessee Wesleyan College.

Townsend Memorial Hall is sometimes referred to as the Administrative Building, for it houses the President's Office, the Academic Dean's office, the Admissions offices, and the Business office. There is also a board room used for meetings.

An auditorium seating over nine hundred people is also located in Townsend. The Math Department has its offices upstairs above the auditorium. Next to these offices is a teachers' lounge.

There used to be a gymnasium in the basement of Townsend that seated over five hundred people. Tennessee Wesleyan's basketball games were played here before the new gymnasium was built.

This year at Wesleyan, there were a wide variety of special events. Among the special events covered, Homecoming ranked as a favorite. All-Sing followed with performances by Sigma Kappa, Alpha XI, and the Kids of Wesleyan. Dracula, the Fall production, was a chilling experience. Then the Winter drama productions of the Lifeguard and the Swimmer were splash hits. Lit Fest ends our special events section with super performances by many of the English classes. But don't worry, more special events will be featured later in the book.

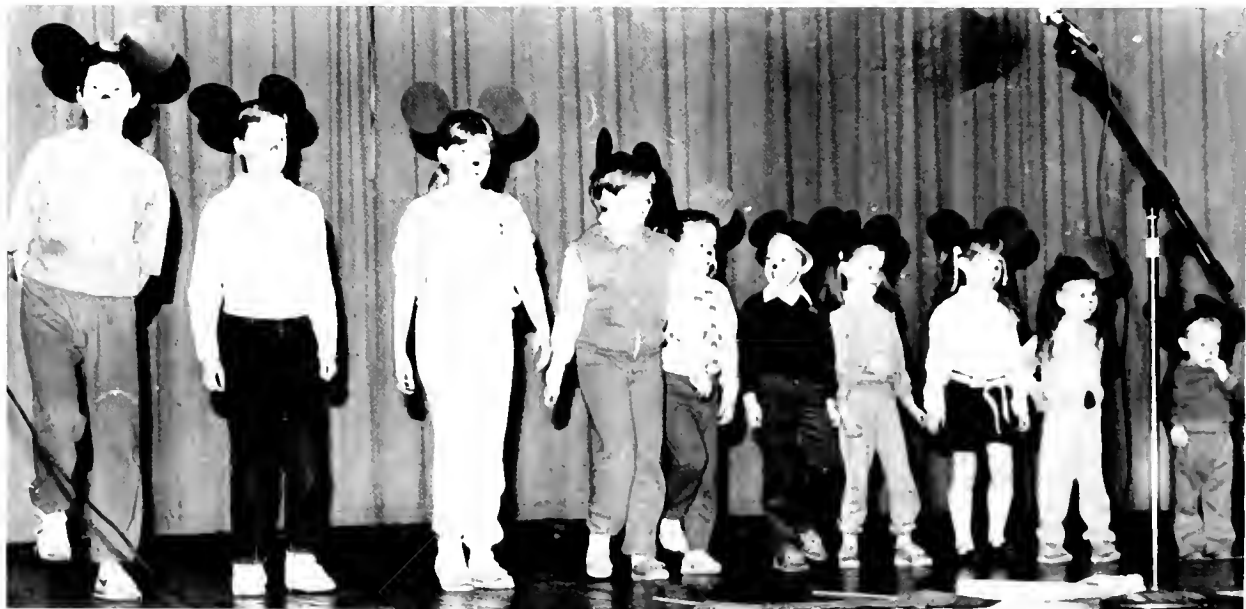

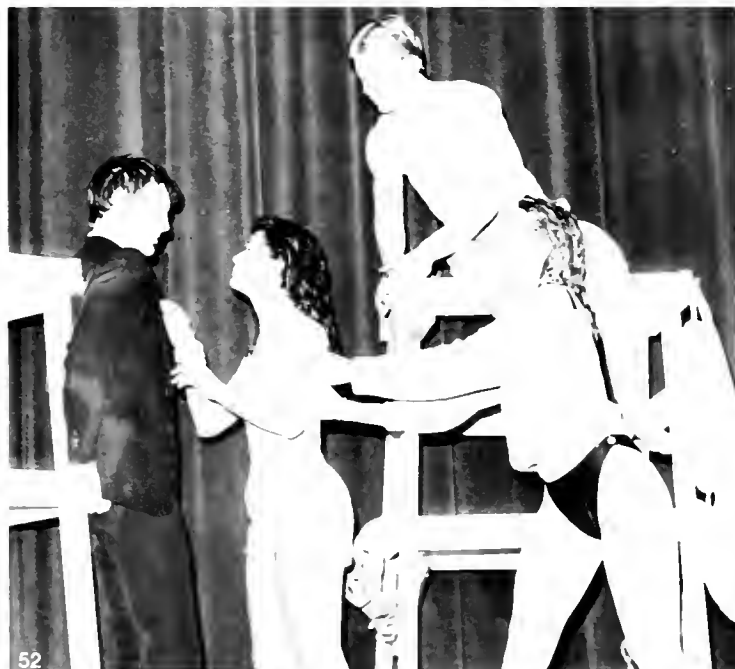

The assignment of Dean Wright to raise funds for the construction of a science building resulted in the construction of Banfield Hall, known today as Durham Hall, this building was to be three stories high, excluding the basement. It originally provided accommodations for the Science Department, which was referred to as the J. W. Fisher Laboratories. Two literary halls and the Fisher Library were also located in this building.

Dean Wright had interested William Banfield of Beaver, Pennsylvania in contributing \$16,400 to cover the cost of construction. Mr. Banfield's generosity was directed toward the construction of a memorial for his son, C. H. Banfield. Banfield Hall was opened October 7, 1902 and was formally dedicated May 19, 1903.

In 1937, Mr. Durham donated \$100,000 to Tennessee Wesleyan College for repairs and remodeling of the building. It was at this time that the name Banfield Hall was changed to Durham Hall.

Durham Hall provides classrooms and offices for the departments of Business Management, History, English, Math, and Psychology. The building also has a small library, known as the Bishop-Cooke Library, in its top floor.

Tennessee Wesleyan College participates in four intercollegiate sports and also has a very active intramural soccer program. Just as soccer is coming to a close, men's and women's basketball is starting. The spring is filled with the baseball season and the women's tennis team. The intramural program consists of basketball, volleyball and football. T.W.C. also has a cheerleading squad and a mascot. Tryouts for cheerleading are held in the spring. All sports at T.W.C. are open to anyone and various scholarships are available.

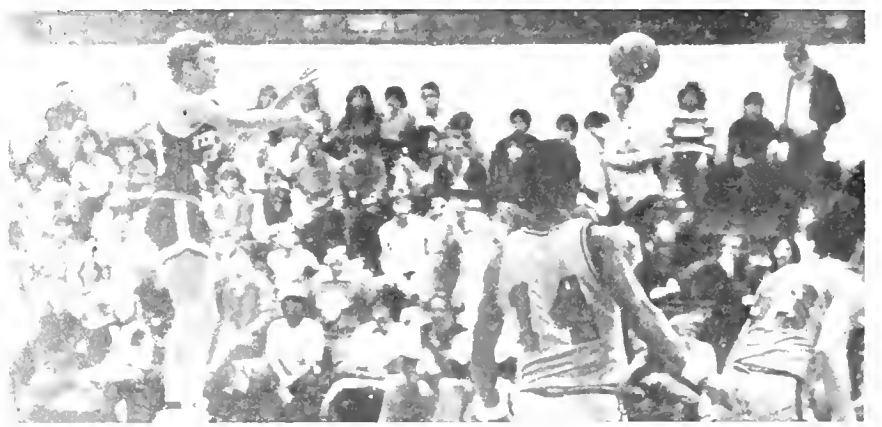

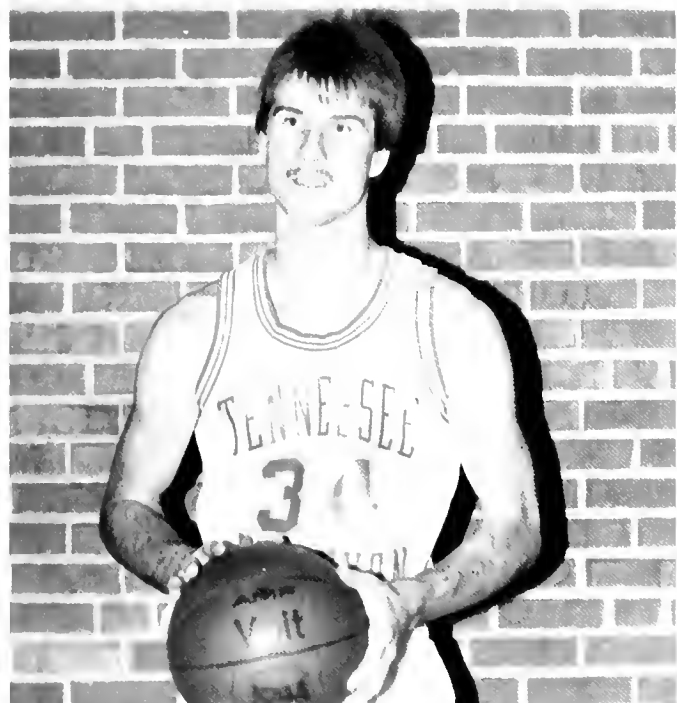

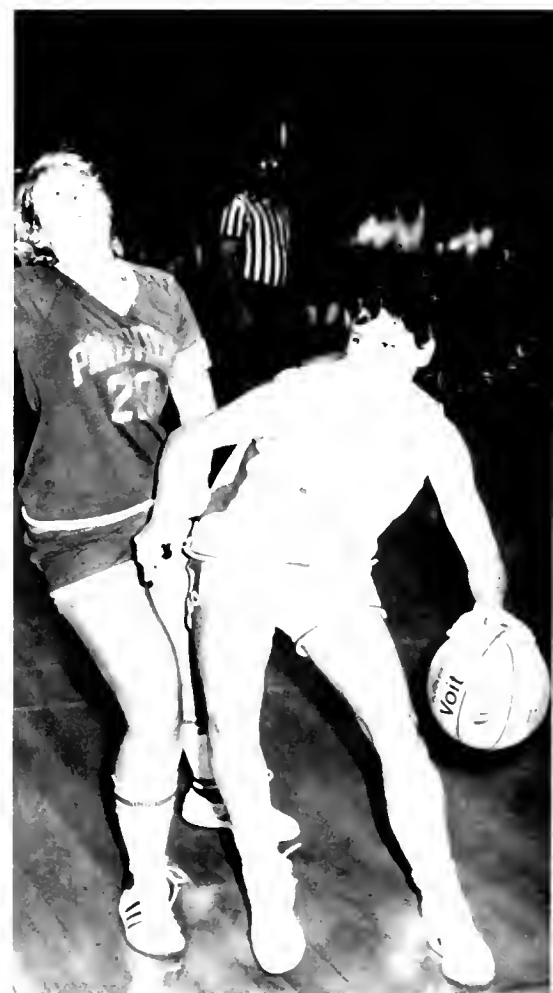

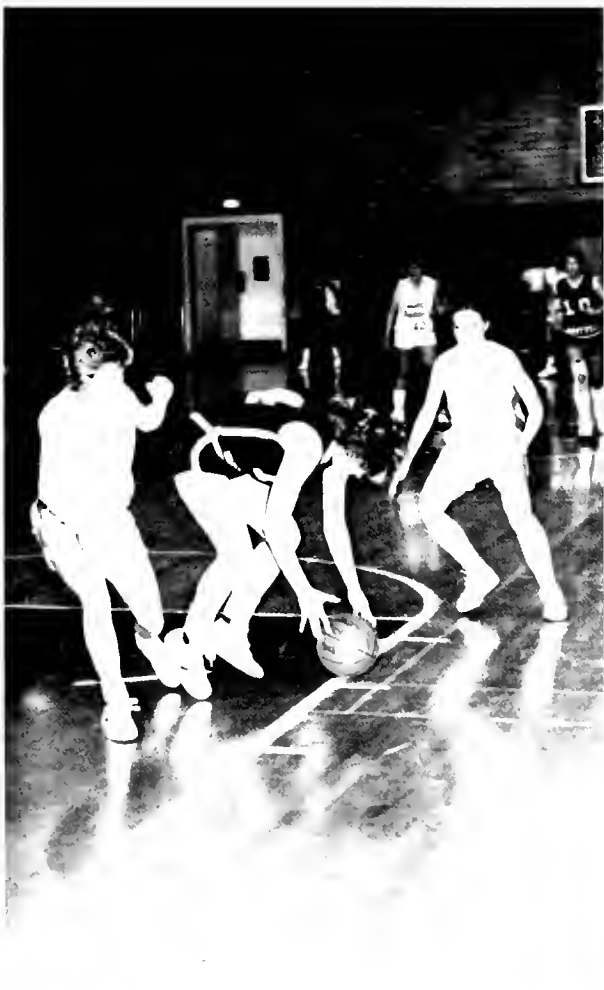

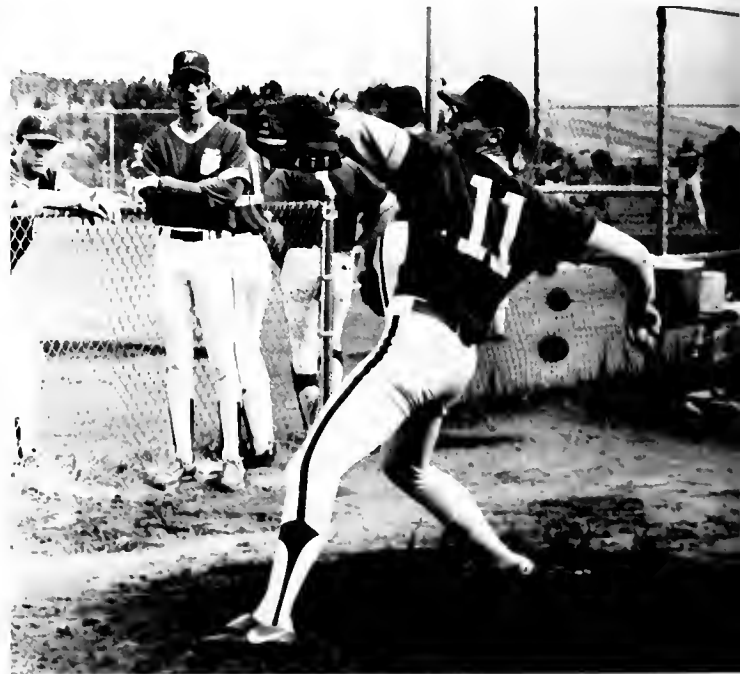

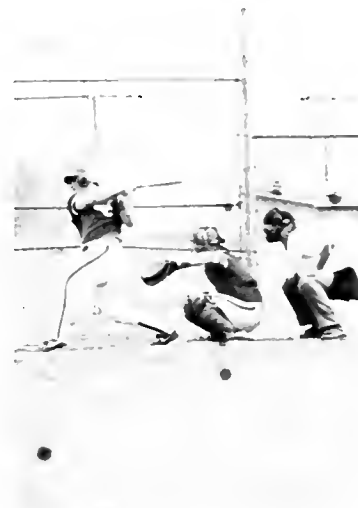

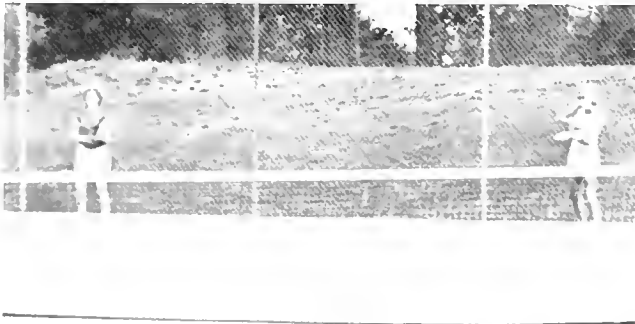
FRESHMEN AND THE "SINGLE" SOPHOMORE TENNIS SPOTLIGHT

Doubles matches turned out to be the most exciting games to watch. To play doubles the girls must work well together and display good communication skills.

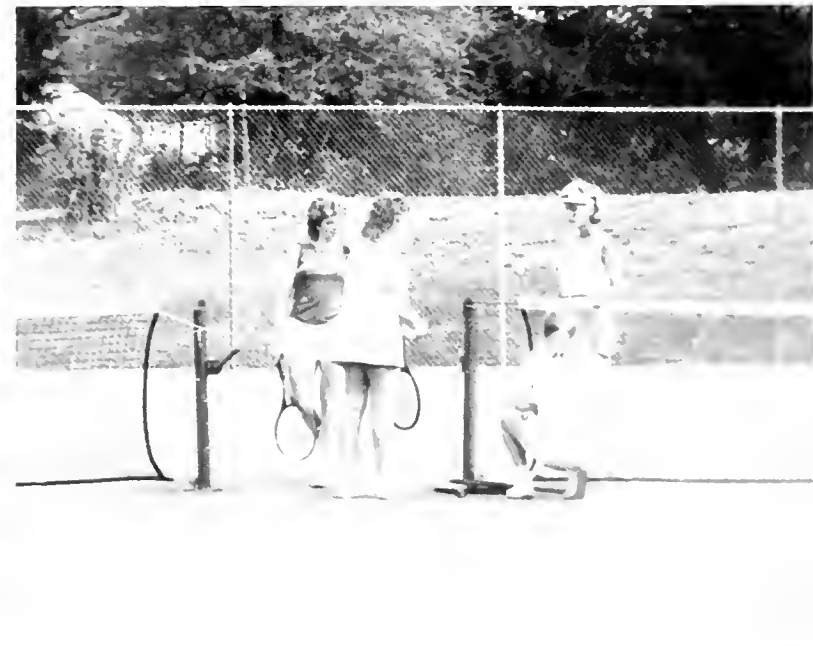
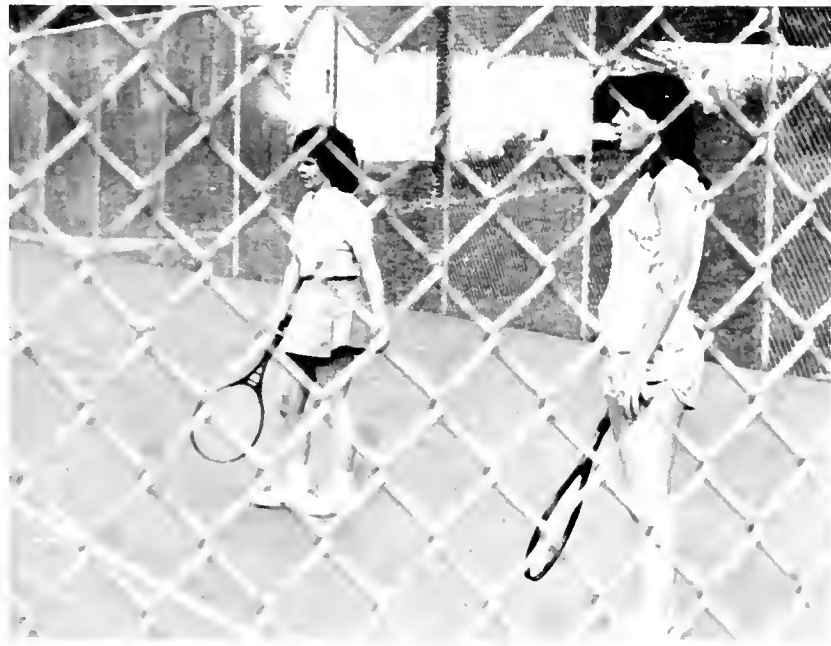
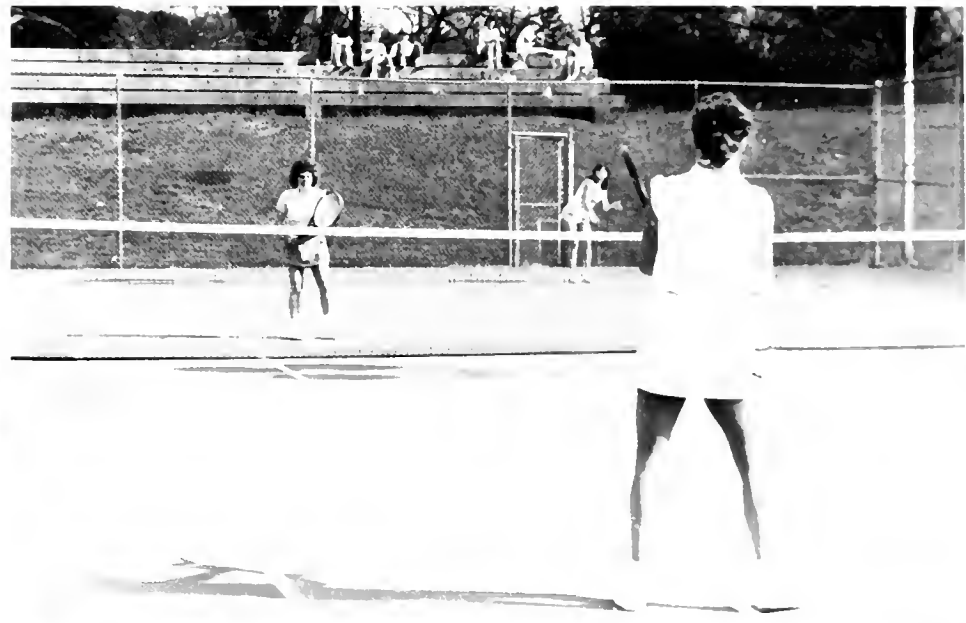
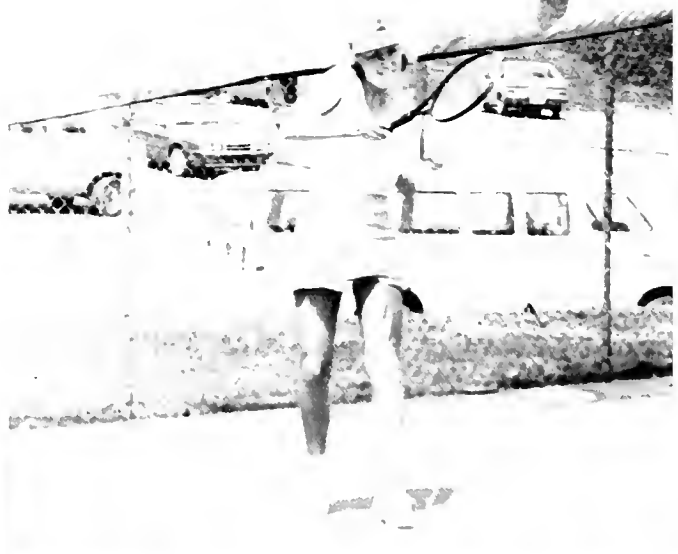

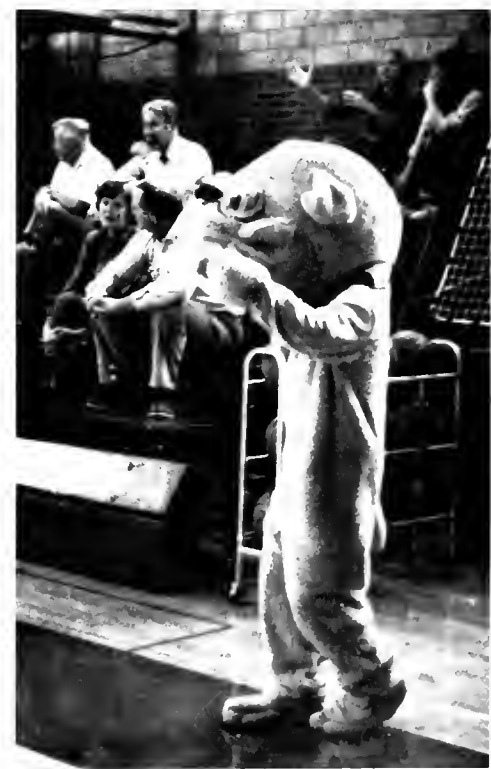

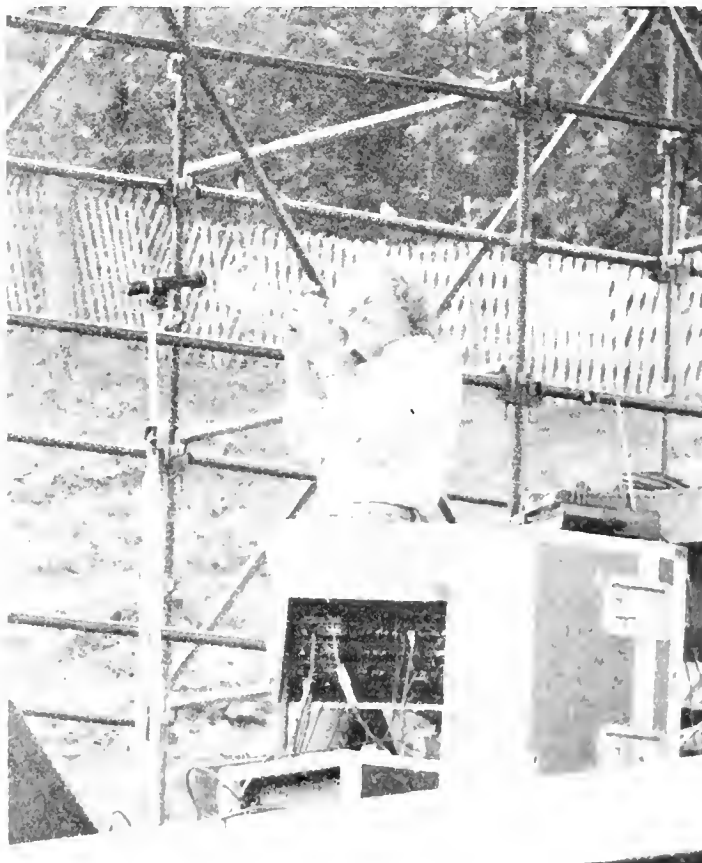
Religious Life "Invades" Six Flags

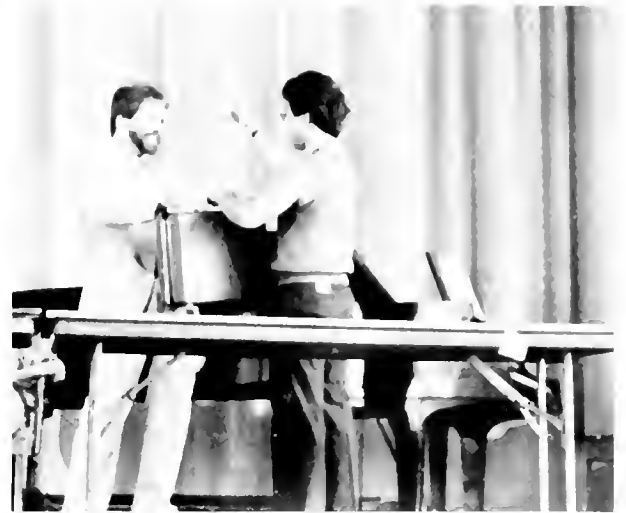

The Merner-Pfeiffer Library has been in existence on the campus of Tennessee Wesleyan College since November 5, 1941. A couple from New York City, Mr. and Mrs. Pfeiffer, donated the funds necessary for the library's construction. The Pfeiffers were very generous and the results of their contributions can still be seen today in the Robb Gymnasium, Sarah Merner Lawrence Hall and of course the library.

When the Library was first constructed, only the top floor was used for the library. Classrooms and an art gallery were downstairs while the Chaplain occupied the current reserves office. In 1965 the entire building was finally devoted to the library.

Originally the library was built to contain 20,000 volumes but it currently holds 69,000 volumes. The library consists of 1500 news books per year, audio-visual materials, a children's selection and a young adult collection. The library subscribes to 300 magazines each year.

The Merner-Pfeiffer Library is very unique because it serves people from the area such as town borrowers and students. Students from the UTC, UT and Cleveland State campuses as well as others come to this library.

Most of the collection of books came from a man named Bishop Cooke who left his entire collection of books to the library upon his death. This brought about the Methodist Historical Collection. It is frequently used for writing the Methodist Church History and the Genealogy of the Methodist used by some Methodist preachers.

Mrs. Harms is the Head Librarian at the Merner-Pfeiffer Library and she has been with the library for 21 years. The other longest member of the library staff is Mrs. Schutlz who has been with T.W.C. for 18 years.

The tower of the library holds the old bell which dates from December 1872. It was used as a signal for classes to begin and end.

The long awaited time had come for our Senior class. Baccalaureate ceremonies were held previous to Graduation. They took place in Trinity United Methodist Church with Bishop Eusler as the speaker. Parents, guests and members of the senior's college family were present. Graduation day was one of excitement and anticipation — it had finally arrived. There were various celebrations given in the honor of Wesleyan's seniors that included a picnic given by the Alumni Association and a reception given by President and Mrs. Cheek. Saddened by having to leave friends behind, the Seniors looked back at fond memories of their alma mater — Tennessee Wesleyan College.

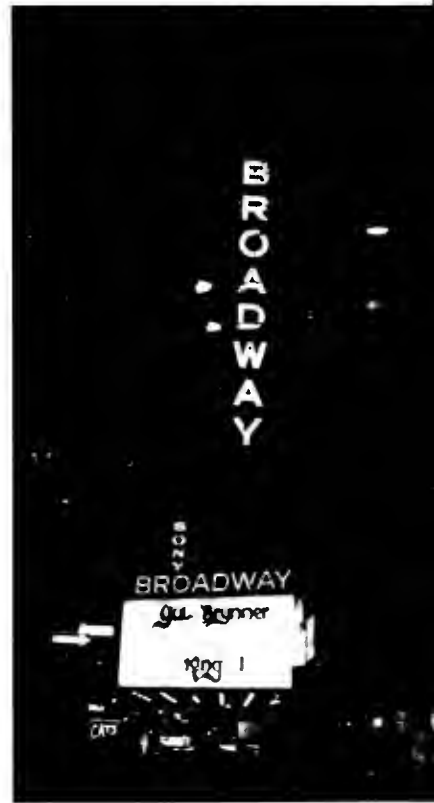
