

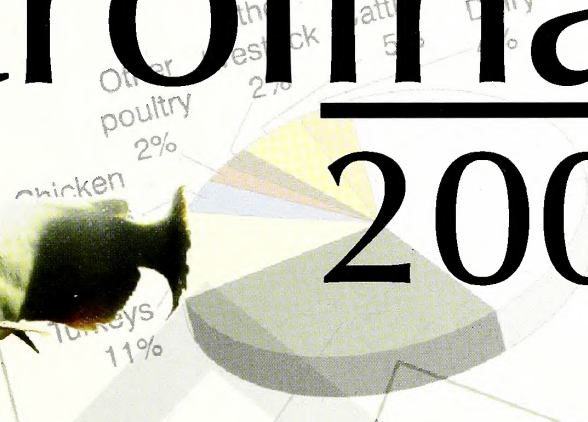

James A. Graham became Commissioner of Agriculture in 1964 and has successfully guided North Carolina's number one industry for over 36 years. He will be leaving office in January 2001 as the most experienced Commissioner in the nation, victorious in nine elections and successfully leading North Carolina's agriculture industry into the 21st century. Commissioner Graham's leadership and vision for North Carolina agriculture has kept this state's farmers at the forefront of today's agricultural revolution.

During his inaugural year, cash receipts from agriculture were \$1.2 billion with tobacco accounting for nearly half of the farm income. North Carolina was a crop-oriented state with more than 70 percent of farm income related to crop production. Broilers represented the largest livestock commodity, accounting for just over 8 percent of total cash receipts. But as policies changed and technologies developed, Graham recognized the need to diversify North Carolina agriculture and to become less dependent on one crop in order to remain a dominant force in the agricultural sector.

The latest statistics show agricultural cash receipts growing six fold during Commissioner Graham's tenure, exceeding \$8 billion in 1997 and totaling \$6.7 billion in 1999, a year when low prices and hurricanes significantly reduced profits for farmers. This growth can be attributed to many of the programs implemented by the Department.

Today the state's number one commodity is broilers followed by hogs representing 19.8 percent and 18.5 percent, respectively, of total cash receipts. Tobacco remains strong, but has been overtaken as the number one crop by the thriving and expanding greenhouse and nursery industry. North Carolina leads the nation in turkey, sweetpotato and tobacco production. The state ranks second in hog production, cucumbers for pickles, trout sold and Christmas tree sales. North Carolina farmers also have the fifth highest net farm income in the nation. These successes are not coincidental, but reflect Commissioner Graham's years of work to strengthen North Carolina agriculture.

One of the greatest success stories was the eradication of the boll weevil in North Carolina. In 1978, growers were limited to harvesting only 42,000 acres of cotton because of boll weevil infestations. To enable North Carolina farmers to grow more cotton, the boll weevil had to be eliminated. In 1987, the state was declared boll weevil free, and by 2000 farmers increased their plantings to 940,000 acres. The eradication of the boll weevil also reduced pesticide applications, improving cotton profitability and minimizing risk to the environment.

Commissioner Graham has remained committed to promoting a safe food supply. Numerous examples illustrate how animal health was improved through coordinated efforts between North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (NCDA&CS) and the livestock industry.

In 1971, North Carolina was declared free of Bovine Brucellosis, breathing new life into the beef cattle and dairy industries. The hog cholera program was declared a complete success in 1974, ridding North Carolina of this disease and proving a model for other states to follow. After several years working with the

hog industry and state veterinarians, North Carolina was declared free of pseudorabies in 1999, opening new markets for live hog sales.

Commissioner Graham's successes were not just limited to improving agricultural production, but also included promoting and protecting the state's food supply. He made meat, poultry and seafood inspection one of the major objectives of the Department. He supported the complete modernization of one of the nation's leading soil testing and animal waste analysis labs that provided economic benefits to producers and environmental benefits to consumers. Farmers utilize the results of these tests as a guide to apply fertilizer and to nearly eliminate farm runoff into our streams and rivers. Seven animal disease diagnostic laboratories were also built across the state to serve every animal owner in North Carolina.

Five major farmers' markets, located in Asheville, Greensboro, Charlotte, Raleigh and Lumberton, were opened to provide small farmers a local market for their fruits and vegetables. International markets have been developed for many North Carolina products making our state a leading exporter of agricultural commodities. Graham supported the development of Carolina Ports, a program to expand international markets. The "Goodness Grows in North Carolina" program, which promotes North Carolina products nationally and abroad, was initiated under his leadership.

The NCDA&CS has expanded its range of services under Graham's direction, moving from strictly an agriculture agency to a more broad

based Department that offers numerous consumer services. Among those is a system to inspect and calibrate the 8,600 gas pumps in the state each year to ensure consumers are receiving a uniform product. A system is also in place to check every commercial scale in the state that weighs any product bought from a producer or sold to a consumer. Price scanners are also verified by the Department to help ensure price consistency from shelf to checkout.

Graham has overseen the development of the Department's pesticide application program that issues licenses to qualified applicators and checks sample locations to verify pesticides are applied according to environmental laws of the state. Under his leadership, the Department has also developed a procedure for testing all types of seed for germination and implemented a program to sample and test fertilizer to guarantee the proper analysis is being sold to consumers.

Despite his numerous achievements and hundreds of awards, Commissioner Graham remains dedicated to serving the needs of farmers and others in the agribusiness sector, as well as consumers.

Jim Graham has provided visionary leadership throughout the past 36 years, making the NCDA&CS one of the most respected agriculture departments in the country. Diversification efforts and Graham's ongoing commitment to ag research has made North Carolina's farmers well-positioned for the next century.

The man affectionately known as "The Sodfather" has always been proud to promote and defend North Carolina's number one industry, agriculture — and he has always been quick to tell anyone, I love my job!

He will be missed, but not forgotten.

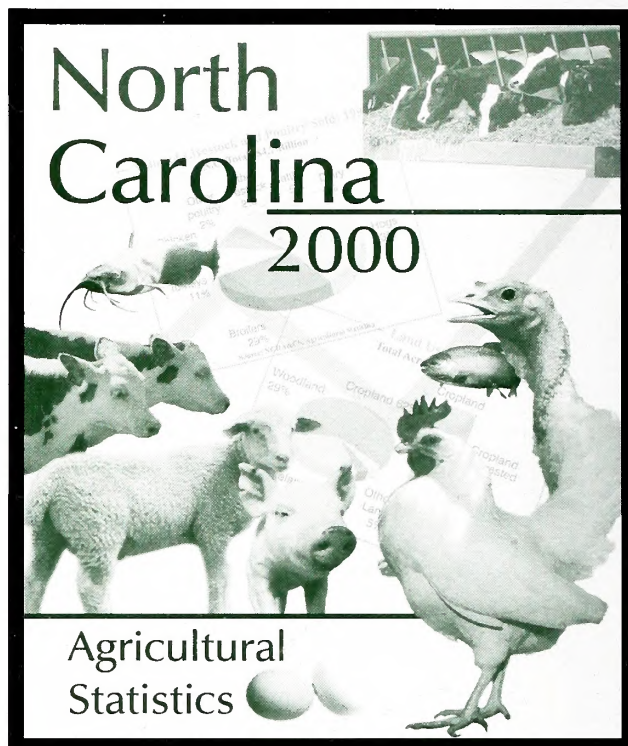
About the Cover

North Carolina's livestock and poultry industries have dominated the North Carolina agriculture scene since the mid 80's. In 1999, cash receipts from livestock, dairy and poultry totaled \$3.9 billion and represented 57.6 percent of the states agricultural income. Nationally, North Carolina ranks 7th in livestock, dairy and poultry production and accounts for \$354 million in exports.

Broilers and hogs have been the two key commodities that have led the way in livestock and poultry production. Broilers have become North Carolina's number one commodity, with 675 million birds sold in 1999. Steady growth over the last 50 years have allowed broiler cash receipts to increase nearly 70 fold to total \$1.43 billion this year. Contract farming transformed the hog industry in the 90's with modernized production practices catapulting North Carolina to second in national rankings. Marketings have more than tripled from 1991 to 1999 with cash receipts totaling \$1.16 billion this past year, even with low pork prices.

North Carolina leads the nation in turkey production with 46.5 million birds raised in 1999. Turkey production rose dramatically in the 80's, peaked in 1992, and still remains a viable industry today. Many people are surprised to learn that North Carolina is second in the nation in trout sales. Regionalized in the western part of the state, trout production has become an important piece of our aquaculture industry. Catfish farming continues to prosper, producing 2.5 million pounds in 1999, ranking 7th in national production.

The cattle industry has remained fairly stable during the past decade with an average inventory of one million head and annual marketings around 450,000 head. The dairy industry in North Carolina has been steadily declining in number of farms and number of



milk cows as environmental regulations have made it difficult for small operations to make a profit. North Carolina ranks 31st in the nation for beef and milk production. Egg production is a \$231 million industry in North Carolina and ranks 10th in the nation.

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Statistical Reports Program

NORTH CAROLINA AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS brings together the current and historic statistics concerning agriculture in the State. Where possible, information most often requested by farmers, the general public, and workers in government agencies are included.

Reporting of crop and livestock statistics is a service rendered to farmers and others in the State by the National Agricultural Statistics Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

The collection and dissemination of agricultural statistics had its start in 1863. This is one of the oldest activities of the United States Department of Agriculture. It was recognized that there were many advantages of a joint relationship between the State and Federal Governments in the development of agricultural statistics. Thus, in 1919 the N.C. Department of

Agriculture entered into a cooperative agreement with the U.S. Department of Agriculture to provide detailed agricultural statistics. The agreement resulted in the creation of the Agricultural Statistics Division of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

The North Carolina Agricultural Statistics Division publishes official statistics on crops, livestock, prices, and various other agricultural items. The most important reports and the approximate dates of release are shown in the table below. The reports marked with an (*) are issued separately. All others are included in the semi-monthly release entitled "Farm Report". The reports are free for respondents providing information used to compile the reports. 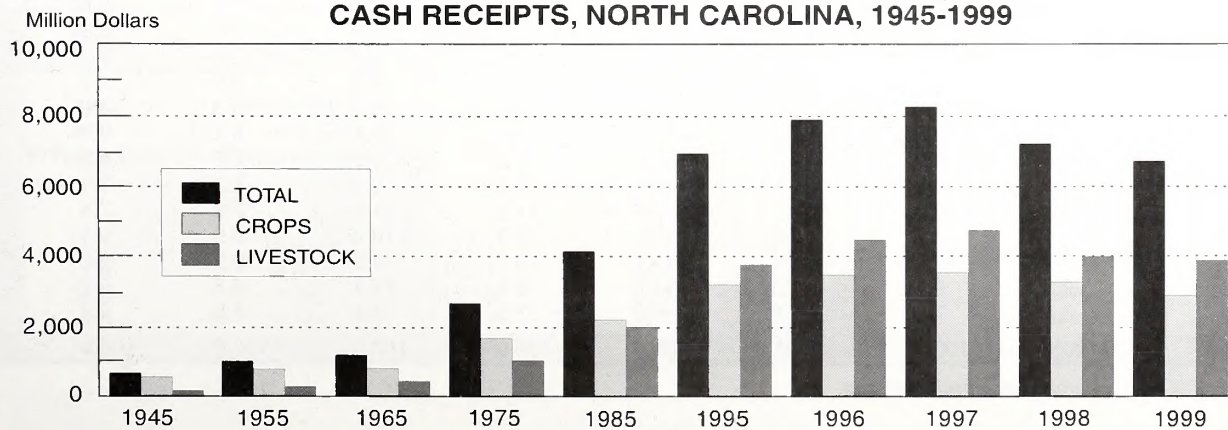

North Carolina 1999 Annual Weather and Climate Summary

The new year began with mild weather throughout North Carolina. January was relatively dry until the last week when much needed rainfall was accompanied by warm temperatures for much of the State. Soil moisture was not a concern even though 1998 finished very dry with most of the reporting stations several inches below normal. February was also mild and heading into March, farmers took advantage of the weather to get their cabbage and Irish potatoes in the ground early. March proved to be a wet month with most of the State reporting weekly rainfall. However, there were enough breaks in the weather for farmers to stay well ahead of normal for cabbage and spring potato planting. By the end of March, small grain conditions were improving along with pastureland.

April started out dry allowing farmers to concentrate on field preparation. Cooler weather during the middle of the month was accompanied by heavy rainfall and isolated severe weather. April ended with much needed rainfall as corn plantings were 75% complete, flue-cured tobacco over 50% planted, and cotton planting just underway. Field activities at the beginning of May were limited due to precipitation. The latter part of May turned dry with only scattered rainfall. At month's end many locations, especially in the Piedmont, had experienced an extremely dry May with record low precipitation in some areas. This caused soil moisture levels to dip and discouraged farmers who were postponing plantings until rain was forecast. Entering June, corn planting and tobacco setting were nearly complete while cotton and peanuts plantings were over 90% finished. Soybeans and sweetpotatoes plantings were a little behind schedule having just really geared up. The first half of June was hot and extremely dry. Crop conditions were slipping along with Statewide soil moisture levels. Finally, the last half of June brought significant rainfall and mild temperatures. The crops responded to the timely rainfall as corn, cotton and tobacco were in critical stages of development.

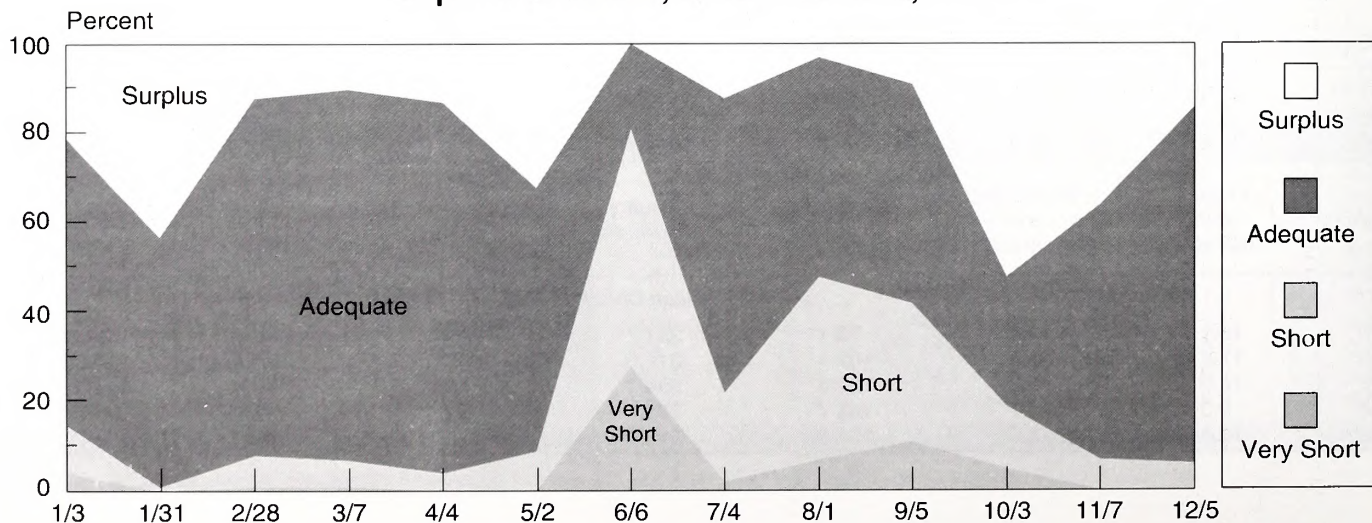
Hot weather returned in July with temperatures topping out in the 100's in some areas. The middle of the month provided some relief with cooler temperatures and widespread rainfall. Extreme heat and arid conditions returned in August. By the middle of August, soil moisture was short to very short as the harvest season was under-

way. A mid-month cool front collided with the dominant high pressure and spawned some severe weather, but welcome precipitation resulted for a majority of the Piedmont and Coastal Plain regions. Fields soaked up the moisture and quickly dried, allowing farmers to continue tobacco harvesting and begin picking corn. By the beginning of September, tobacco harvest was over half done, corn harvest was over a quarter complete, cotton bolls were nearly all set and starting to open, and soybean pods were over three-quarters set. All the crop progress stages were at or near their respective five-year averages. Drought conditions were still a concern with almost every weather station reporting significantly below normal rainfall levels.

The concern about dry weather for the eastern part of the State gave way to extreme flooding in September. The combined effects of three tropical storms (Dennis, Irene and Floyd) was easily the top story of 1999. The incredible amounts of rainfall, over 25 inches in some areas, caused massive flooding, crop destruction, and structure and equipment damage to the entire coastal region. Close to a billion dollars in damage to the agriculture sector alone was estimated from this tropical season. The wet weather continued into October as over 50% of the State was reporting surplus soil moisture. The excessive moisture put most crops behind schedule for harvest. By the end of a fairly typical October, tobacco harvest was finished, corn harvest was 90% complete, sweetpotatoes were 70% harvested, peanuts were 50% threshed, and cotton and soybean picking had really just begun. Ironically, with all the rainfall experienced in September and October, the Mountain region was still suffering from drought-like conditions.

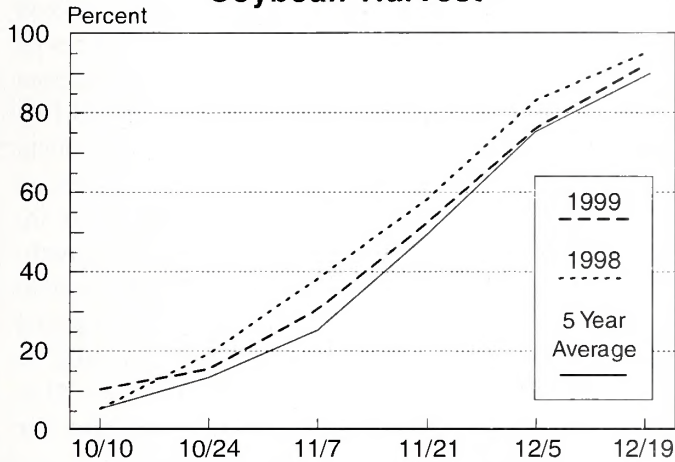
November was unseasonably warm with widespread rainfall the first and last parts of the month. Farmers took advantage of the periods of warm, dry weather to complete all harvest activities except cotton, soybean and limited peanut acres left to be threshed. Over 70% of the small grains were planted by the end of the month, and just over half the wheat was emerged. By the middle of December the harvest season was almost complete, and nearly all the small grains were planted. The year ended with mostly mild weather and limited precipitation as over 95% of the wheat was emerged and only limited soybean acreage remained unharvested.

Topsoil Moisture, North Carolina, 1999

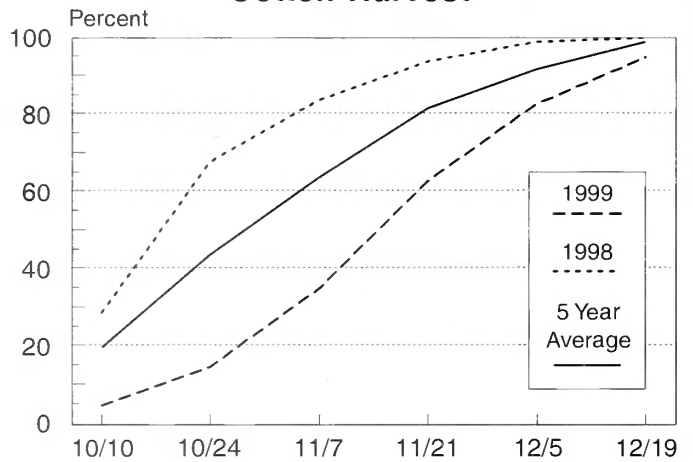


HARVEST PROGRESS, NORTH CAROLINA

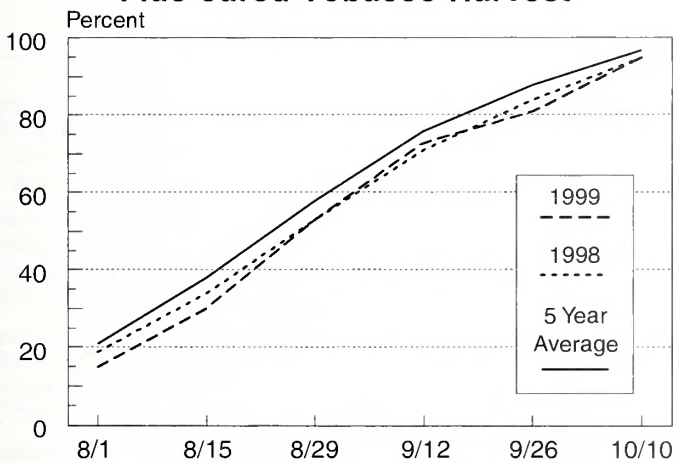
Soybean Harvest



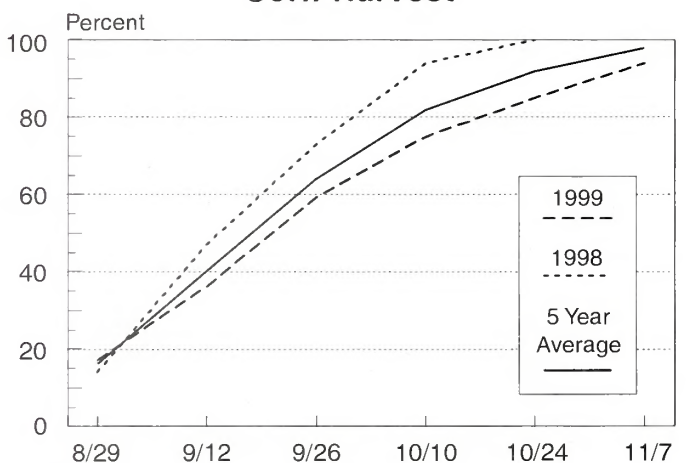
Cotton Harvest

Total Fertilizer Tonnage Down

The total amount of fertilizer, including lime and land plaster, shipped in North Carolina fell 7% from last year to 2.71 million tons. Lime tonnage in 1999 decreased 9% from 1,052,695 to 958,951 tons. Land plaster shipments, at 122,204 tons, decreased 20% from last year. This is the second year of the new fertilizer law which no longer requires companies to report by grade and county. Fertilizer is broken down into the following categories: Dry Materials, Mixed Materials, Other Dry Materials, Bagged Products, Fluid Materials, Mixed Fluid Materials, and Other Fluid Materials. Dry and Fluid Materials include any substance containing either nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, or any other recognized plant food element or compound which is used primarily for

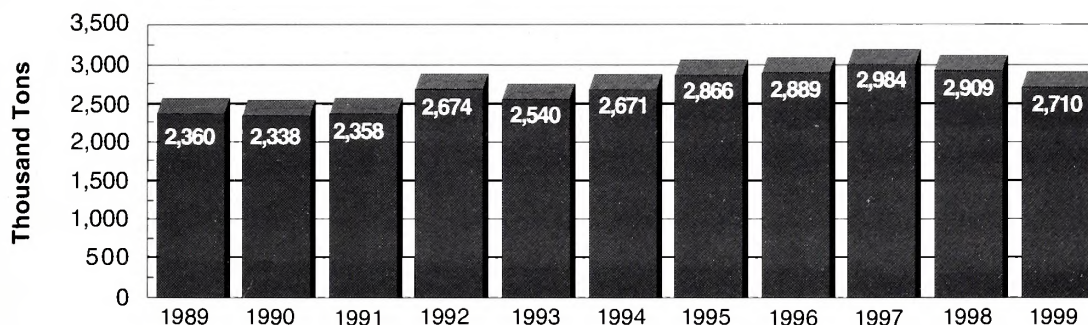
its plant food content or for compounding mixed fertilizers. Not included in this definition are all types of unmanipulated animal and vegetable manures and mulches for which no plant food content is claimed. Mixed Dry Materials and Mixed Fluid Materials include products resulting from the combination, mixture, or simultaneous application of two or more fertilizer materials for use in, or claimed to have value in promoting plant growth. Other Dry Materials and Other Fluid Materials include micronutrient supplements and organic materials. Bagged Products include any fertilizer product that is sold in package form. Total Dry Materials accounted for 41% of the total fertilizer. Bagged Products accounted for 24% and total Fluid Materials accounted for 35%.

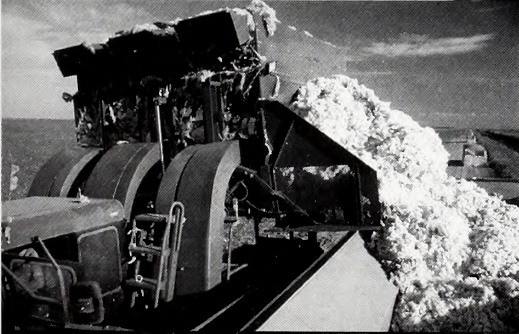
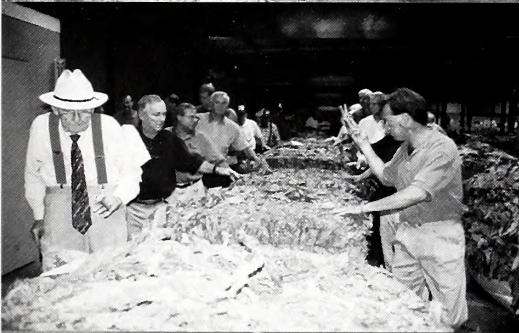

1999 North Carolina Crops Summary

Flue-cured Tobacco Production Down

For the second year in a row, North Carolina **flue-cured tobacco** growers had to contend with quota cuts and erratic, damaging weather patterns. Early in the season flue-cured growers experienced drought-like conditions until several hurricanes came well ashore in September and October. Border Belt tobacco was largely unaffected by the adverse hurricane conditions, but was affected by dry conditions. Eastern Belt harvest was partially complete when excessive moisture and high winds caused large field losses. Power outages also caused tobacco to rot in curing barns. The Old Belt received much needed moisture from the hurricanes that resulted in improved yields.

The overall yield for N.C. flue-cured tobacco was 2,183 pounds per acre. This was 39 pounds below 1998 and 111 pounds less than the 1997 yield. Growers harvested 200,000 acres, 43,000 less than 1998. Production, at 436.5 million pounds, was down 19% from a year ago. The value of the flue-cured crop totaled \$764 million, down 20% from 1998.

Burley tobacco producers harvested 7,800 acres in 1999, a 4% decrease from 1998. Yield for burley tobacco, at 1,600 pounds, was up 150 pounds from 1998 despite a third straight year of dry weather. Production, at 12.5 million pounds, represents an increase of 6% from 1998. Value of the crop, at \$23.8 million, compared to \$22.3 million last year.

Hurricanes Slam Cotton Crop

Damage sustained from the hurricane season reduced **cotton** yield and increased the number of abandoned acres. The State's cotton crop totaled 816,000 bales in 1999, down 20% from 1998. Area harvested totaled 825,000 acres, 17% above last year. Yield per acre averaged 475 pounds, 224 pounds less than the previous year's average and the lowest since 1983. The value of the crop was \$180 million, a disappointing 44% below 1998. The average price was 45.9 cents per pound, nearly 20 cents below 1998. **Cottonseed** production totaled 278,000 tons in 1999, 21% below the previous year. Value of cottonseed production was \$27 million, and the price averaged \$96.00 per ton.

Soybean Production Drops

The 1999 hurricane season took a toll on North Carolina's **soybean** crop. Yield averaged 23 bushels per acre, 4 bushels per acre less than a year ago. Production totaled 29.9 million bushels, down over 8 million bushels from the 1998 crop. Harvested area, at 1.3 million acres, was 115,000 acres below last year because of flooding associated with the hurricanes. The value of production was estimated at \$139 million, 28% less than 1998. Average price, at \$4.65 per bushel, was 38 cents below 1998 and the lowest price since 1972.

Sweetpotato Crop Down

North Carolina **sweetpotato** production in 1999 totaled 377 million pounds, down 31% from 1998. Hurricane damage reduced yields and increased the number of abandoned acres. Average yield per acre was estimated at 13,000 pounds, down 4,000 pounds from the record yield set a year ago. The sweetpotato crop was valued at \$45.2 million, down 24% from 1998. The average price, at 12 cents per pound, was 1 cent above the previous year. Harvested area, at 29,000 acres, was down 3,000 from a year earlier.

Potato Crop Value Up

The production of **Irish potatoes** in North Carolina decreased 1% in 1999 to 341 million pounds. Average yield, at 19,500 pounds per acre, was up 1,100 pounds from 1998. Harvested acres were down 1,100 to 17,500. Value of production totaled \$21.2 million, and the average price was 6.2 cents per pound.

Smallest Corn Crop Since 1954

The production of **corn** for grain in 1999 totaled 51.2 million bushels, down 5% from last year and the lowest production since 1954. The decrease in production is attributed to the continuing trend away from corn because of low prices. Tar Heel farmers harvested 640,000 acres with an average yield of 80 bushels per acre. This compares with 770,000 acres harvested in 1998 when yields averaged a mere 70 bushels per acre. The value of the crop totaled just over \$115 million, down 8% from 1998 and the lowest since 1971. The average price, at \$2.25 per bushel, was down 8 cents from 1998, and the lowest since 1987.

Peanut Yield Down Sharply

North Carolina **peanut** production was reduced by floods and excessive moisture conditions. Overall, fields closer to the coast that drained well experienced fewer losses than did the less permeable fields further inland. Yield, at 2,410 pounds per acre, was 780 pounds less than the final 1998 yield. Growers harvested 124,000 acres in 1999, down fractionally from 1998. This resulted in total production of 298.8 million pounds, 25% below 1998. The marketing year average price for 1999 was 27.6 cents per pound.

Wheat Yield and Production Up

Although North Carolina's 1999 harvested **wheat** acreage decreased 15% from 1998 to 580,000, yield increased to 49 bushels per acre, 8 bushels above 1998. Production, at 28.4 million bushels, was 2% above a year ago. However, wheat only brought \$2.20 per bushel, 35 cents below last year. This resulted in the value of the crop decreasing to \$62.5 million, 12% below last year.

Vegetable Production Mixed

North Carolina production of **processed cucumbers** totaled 78,000 tons, 1% less than 1998 and was valued at \$20.6 million. **Fresh market cucumber** production totaled 64.1 million pounds, down 15% from a year earlier. Value of production totaled \$7.1 million. **Tomato** growers produced 71.3 million pounds of tomatoes, 16% more than 1998. The value of the crop is estimated at \$20.7 million. **Bell pepper** production is estimated at 71.3 million pounds, 56% above 1998, with a crop value of \$14.6 million. **Strawberry** farmers produced 17.6 million pounds of strawberries in 1999, down 12% from the previous year. The value of the crop is estimated at \$14.1 million. All **cabbage** production totaled 129 million pounds, 13% less than 1998. The value of the crop is placed at \$11.0 million. **Snap beans** harvested are estimated at 31.3 million pounds, up 8% from last year. The value of production was \$8.8 million. **Sweet corn** production totaled 56.0 million pounds and is valued at \$7.9 million. Producers harvested 129 million pounds of **watermelons**, a 10% decrease from a year ago. The value of the crop was \$6.7 million.

Fruit Value Up

North Carolina total **apple** production for 1999, at 190 million pounds, increased 3% from 1998. Utilized production increased 26% from 1998 to 170 million pounds. The value of production was \$25.7 million, 72% above 1998.

The 1999 North Carolina **blueberry** utilized production, at 13 million pounds, was down 8% from 1998. Yield per harvested acre averaged 4,060 pounds compared to 4,730 pounds last year. The average price for all sales was \$1.03 per pound, with the value of production totaling \$13.4 million.

North Carolina **peach** production in 1999 totaled 28.0 million pounds compared to 25.0 million last year. The crop is valued at \$10.8 million, up 14% a year ago. Average price received was 39 cents per pound.

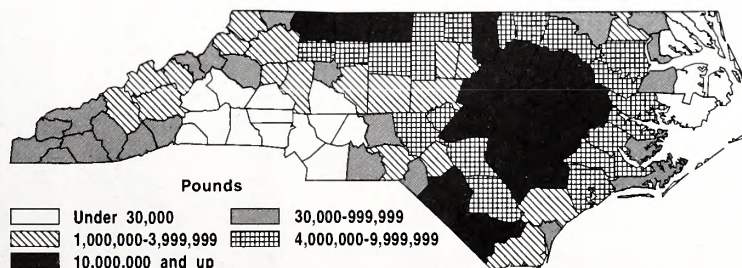

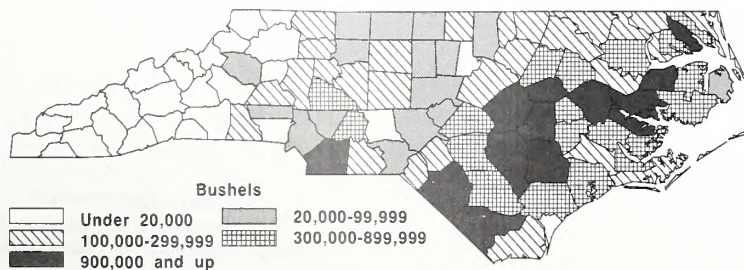

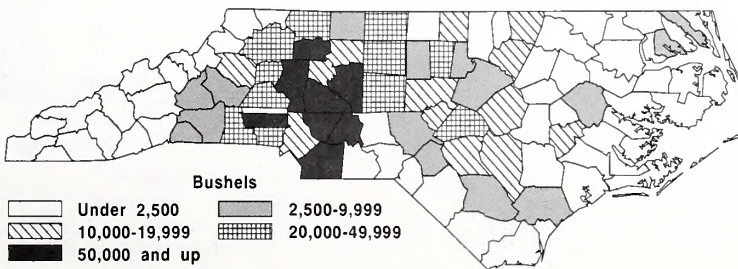

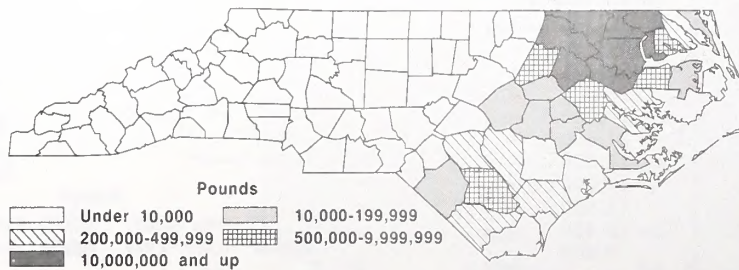

Selected Floriculture Value Up, Intentions Higher

The total wholesale value of all floriculture crops for North Carolina producers with \$10,000 or more in sales is estimated at \$132.7 million for 1999. A total of 368 growers reported 17.6 million square feet of covered area and 436 acres of outdoor production. Only growers with sales of \$100,000 or more were surveyed for selected floriculture crops. The wholesale value of the selected floriculture crops surveyed totaled \$121.1 million in 1999, up 12% from 1998. Quantity sold in 2000 is expected to increase substantially. The text and table below are based upon 124 growers with \$100,000 or more in sales.

Bedding/Garden Plants accounted for \$77.7 million of the overall sales, up 14% from 1998. Flats of bedding plants totaled \$24.5 million, virtually unchanged from 1998. Potted bedding plant sales increased 24% in 1999, totaling \$38.7 million. Total quantity sold in 2000 is expected to increase 22%.

Potted Flowering Plants accounted for \$34.1 million of the total wholesale value, up 13% from 1998. Poinsettias led this category with \$14.5 million generated from 4.5 million pots of all sizes. Potted chrysanthemums were down 8% in 1999 with an equivalent wholesale value of \$4.4 million from

1.5 million pots. Cyclamens, Easter lilies, and Kalanchoes generated \$3.5 million in sales, while the remaining \$11.7 million came from all other flowering plants. Total quantity of potted flowering plants sold in 2000 is expected to increase 7%.

Foliage Hanging Baskets and Potted Foliage had an equivalent wholesale value of \$7.2 million, down 7% from the previous year. The value of foliage hanging baskets increased 10% to \$5.7 million. The net value of sales for potted foliage was \$1.5 million, down 42% from last year's sales of \$2.6 million. The quantity of foliage hanging baskets and potted foliage plants will be down in 2000.

Cut Flower sales, at \$2.04 million, increased 1% from 1998 sales of \$2.02 million.

The wholesale value of 1999 floriculture crops in the **United States** was up 4% from the revised 1998 valuation. The total value of all crops at wholesale for all growers with \$10,000 or more in sales is estimated at \$4.09 billion for 1999, compared with \$3.95 billion for 1998. Growers with sales exceeding \$100,000 for the year accounted for 92% of the total, at \$3.77 billion.

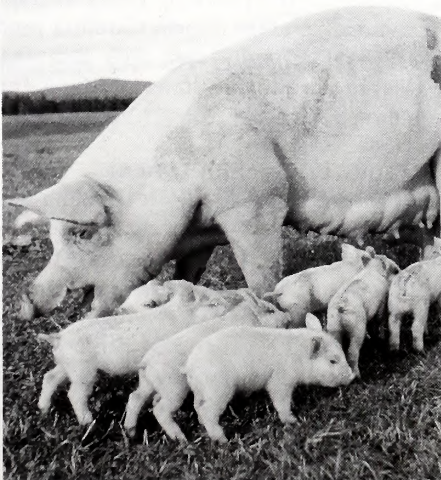

1999 North Carolina Livestock Summary

Cash Receipts Down

Cash receipts from all livestock, dairy, and poultry products decreased to \$3.9 billion in 1999, down 3% from 1998. Hogs took another big hit in 1999, dropping 12% from 1998 to \$1.16 billion. Eggs dropped \$1.4 million to \$231 million. Catfish and trout sales decreased 1% to \$8.4 million. On the brighter side, cattle were up 25% to \$193 million. Turkeys and broilers each increased 1%, with broilers totaling \$1.4 billion and turkeys bringing in \$475 million. Receipts from milk were up slightly to \$208 million. Honey sales were up 3% and totaled \$671,000.

Broilers are the number one commodity in the state with 21.4% of total sales, followed by hogs at 17.4%.

Broiler Income Record High

Broiler income for the state continued to rise in 1999 and totaled \$1.4 billion, up 1% from last year's record. Production increased 8% to 3.9 billion pounds, but price declined to 37.0 cents per pound in 1999, down 6% from last year. North Carolina ranks fourth in the nation in broiler production with a total of 675 million birds, up 3% from 1998.

Hog Cash Receipts Drop

Cash receipts from the marketing of North Carolina hogs and pigs dropped 12% to \$1.16 billion in 1999 primarily as a result of a \$3.70 per 100 pounds decline in the price received by producers. This huge decline dropped hogs to the number two commodity in the state behind broilers. The number of hog marketings for the year increased 1% from 1998 to 17.8 million head. However, much of the increase was in early weaned pigs shipped out of state. This resulted in pork production declining 2% from last year, totaling 3.7 billion pounds.

Inventory of hogs and pigs on December 1, 1999 totaled 9.5 million head, down 2% from 1998. The inventory was down 8% from the all time high inventory of 10.3 million head on September 1, 1998. A crop of 18.8 million pigs was produced in the state during the year, another record high, slightly above the 18.7 million produced in 1998. The average liter size increased slightly in 1999 to 8.88 pigs. The value of home consumption was down 16% to \$1.6 million. About two-thirds of the states hogs and pigs are under contract compared to about one fourth for the nation. Under contract means owned by large operators, but raised by contractees.

Turkey Numbers Decline

North Carolina retained the number one ranking in turkey production in 1999 despite dropping to 1.1 billion pounds produced, down 11% from the previous year. The number of turkeys raised totaled 46.5 million in 1999, down 7% from last year. Turkey price per pound increased 5 cents to 42 cents allowing cash receipts to increase to \$475 million, 1% above 1998.

Egg Receipts Down

The value of egg production in North Carolina decreased 1% in 1999 to \$231 million. Price per dozen, including hatching eggs, increased 2% from the previous year to \$1.07. The number of eggs produced increased 1% to 2.6 billion. The state ranks ninth nationally in the value of egg production.

Milk Receipts Higher

During 1999, cash receipts from marketing of milk and cream produced in North Carolina rose slightly from 1998 to \$208 million. The increase was made possible by a 3% increase in the price received, averaging \$17.40 per 100 pounds.

Output per cow declined slightly to 16,658 pounds in 1999 along with a 3% decline in milk cow numbers, averaging 73,000 head, reduced milk production by 3% in 1999 to 1.22 billion pounds.

Trout Sales Up

North Carolina's commercial trout growers sold a total of 4.5 million pounds of trout (foodsize, stockers, and fingerlings) during the 12 month period of September 1, 1998 and ending August 31, 1999. Trout sales were valued at \$6.4 million, up 1% from the previous year. The state ranks second in the nation in trout sales.

Foodsize value of sales increased 8% to \$6.0 million and averaged \$1.32 per pound, same as the previous year. Sales to processors accounted for 49% of foodsize sales with 43% going to restaurants and retail outlets, and another 8% going directly to consumers. Trout losses totaled 280,000 pounds for the year with 49% lost to drought, 19% to disease, 13% to predators, and the balance to chemicals, floods, and theft.

Cattle and Calf Marketings Increase

Cattle and calf marketings increased 16% to 245,000 head and 215,000 respectively in 1999. Calf births totaled 450,000 head, unchanged from the previous year. Inventory of cattle and calves in North Carolina as of January 1, 2000, at 980,000 head, was up 2% from the previous year.

Cash receipts from cattle and calves totaled \$193 million, up 25% from 1998. Increased marketing and higher prices accounted for the increase in cash receipts. Cattle and calf prices per 100 pounds were \$51.10 and \$78.50 respectively. The value of home consumption increased 10% in 1999 to \$8.4 million.

Catfish Sales Down

The 44 commercial catfish growers in North Carolina had sales of \$2.1 million in 1999, down 5% from the \$2.2 million the previous year. The water surface area used for the 1999 catfish production totaled 1,200 acres, up 30 acres from the previous year. Ninety six percent of foodsize catfish sales went to processors with the remainder going to restaurants and other outlets. The average price received for foodsize catfish in North Carolina was 74 cents per pound, down 2 cents from the previous year's average, and 1 cent above the national average. North Carolina producers received slightly more per pound for their fish than the producers in the leading producing states of Mississippi and Alabama, and equaling Arkansas.

Honey Production Down

Commercial honey producers in North Carolina with five or more colonies produced 414,000 pounds of honey in 1999, down 12% from a year ago. The estimated 9,000 colonies increased nearly 13% from 1998. Yield per colony averaged 46 pounds, down 13 pounds from 1998. Average price for the 1999 crop, at \$1.62 per pound, was up 24 cents from a year earlier. The value of commercial honey production totaled \$671,000, up 3% from 1998.

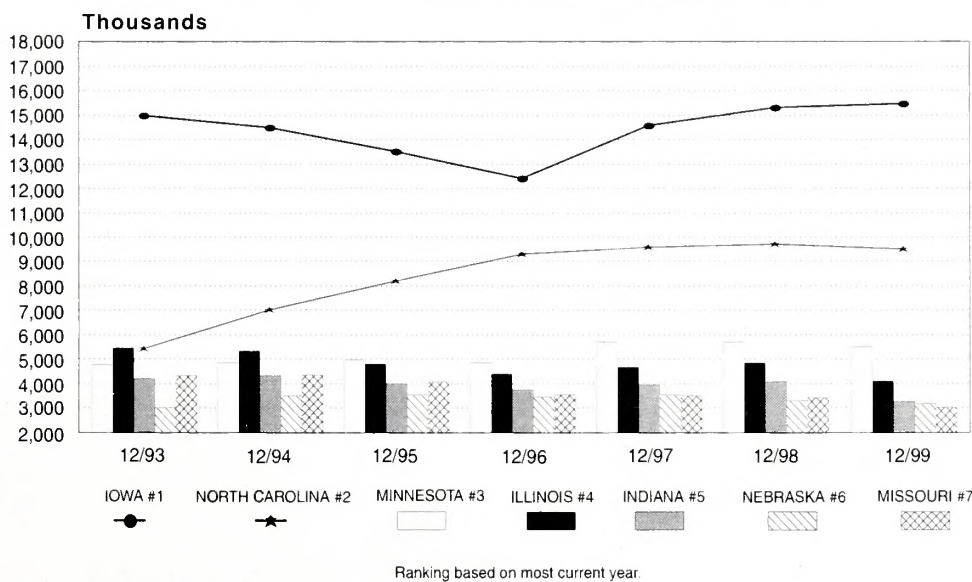

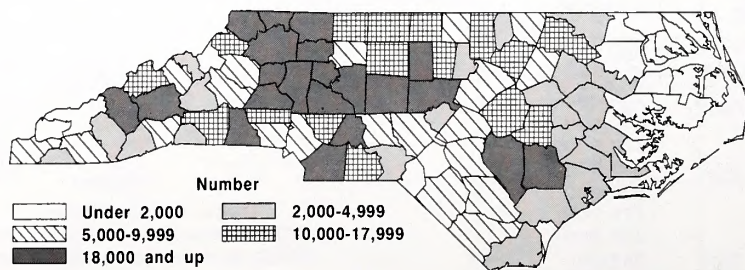

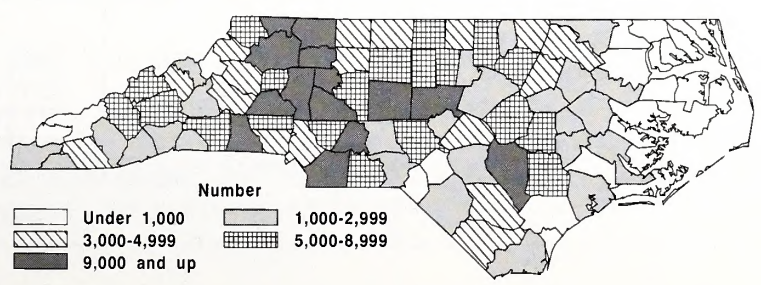

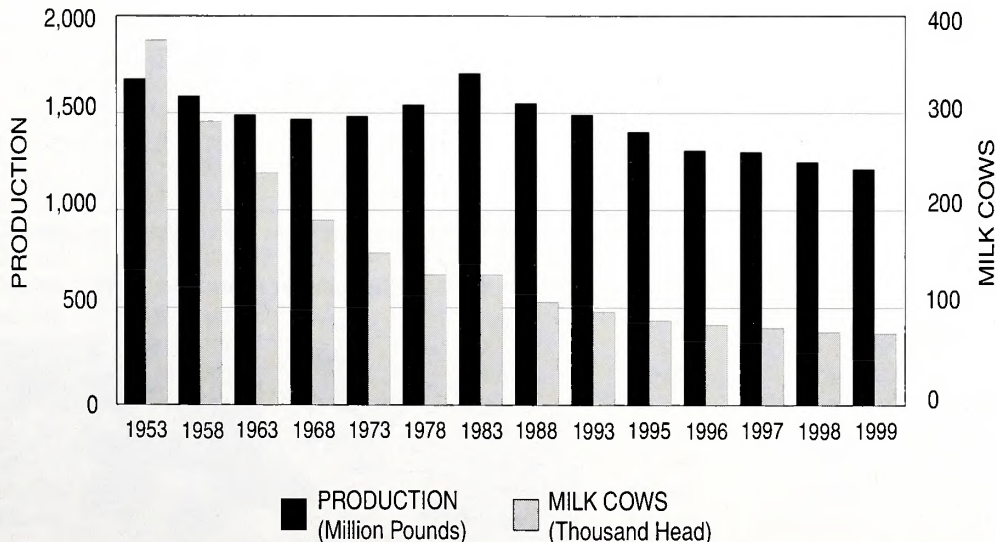

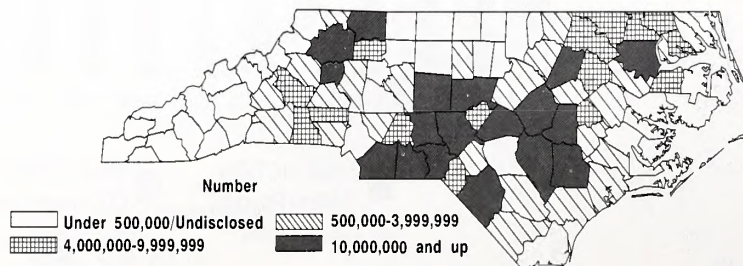

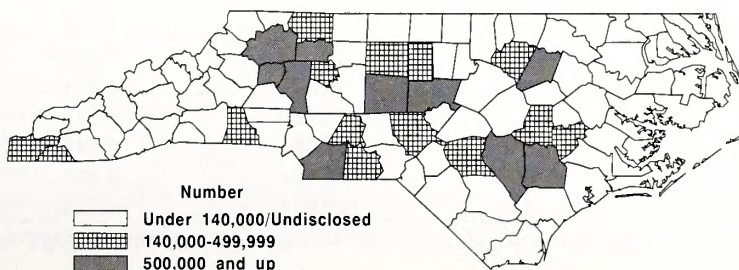

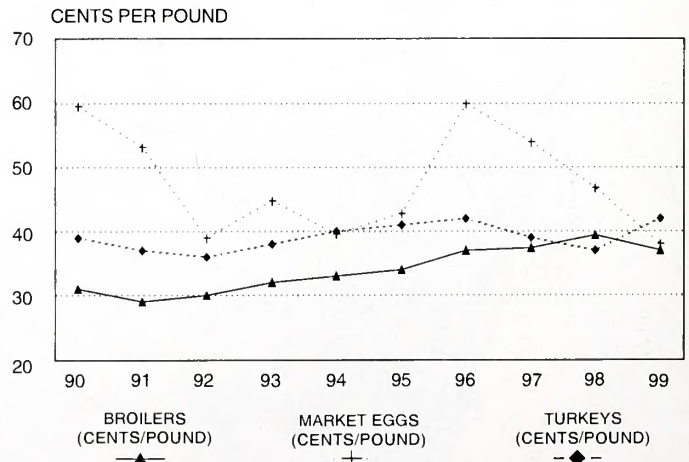

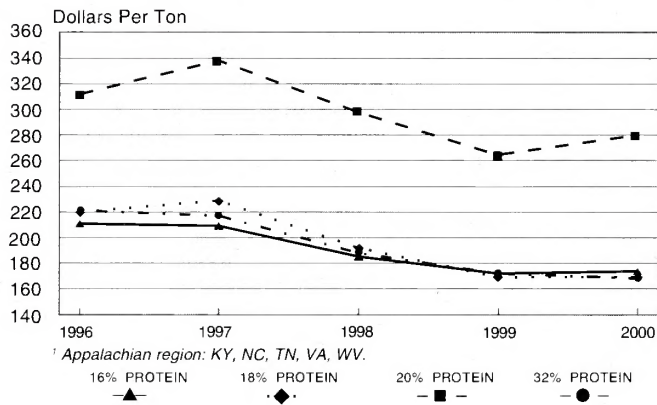

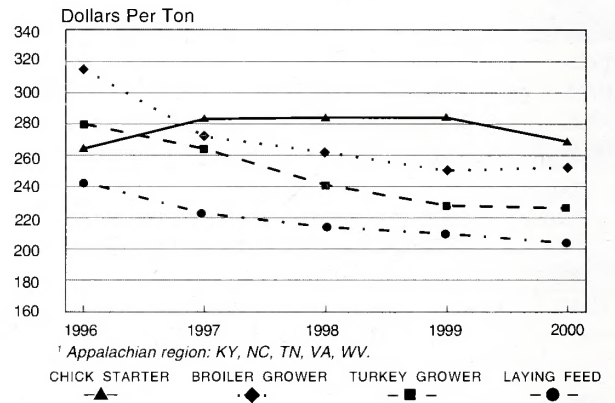
APPALACHIAN REGION ¹ Average Prices Paid, April, 1996-2000
