

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THE following articles are reprinted from the *Classical Review* for February, June and October 1889, and March 1890. They are now corrected, and in some respects amplified. I may prefix a few words to explain the circumstances of their composition.

When in 1888 I was elected to a Craven Travelling Fellowship at Oxford, I proposed to my electors three lines of study, to be followed abroad; a collation of MSS. of the *fliad*, a collection of materials bearing upon palaeography generally, and, in cases where it seemed useful, cataloguing of manuscripts. During the two years of my tenure, which were spent almost entirely in Italy, I found abundance of material to come under the last head; but, being tied by my other occupations, I had not the time to attain the completeness and exhaustiveness that are implied in a full Catalogue; I found myself therefore compelled to content myself with rather rough lists of anything that seemed to me of literary or technical interest. I hoped that though imperfect they might be found of service to persons who would be able to use the material. And in this expectation I have not been mistaken, and must here thank the kindly critics who have at different times given me private encouragement. I must also profess my acknowledgement to the well-known and exemplary 'Inventaires sommaires' of the libraries of Switzerland, Belgium, Holland, and the 'Notes on the MSS. of the British Museum' of M. Henri Omont, which

first suggested to me this department of enquiry, and to which these lists hold the place of rough memoranda to a finished book.

Since the last of these articles was written, I have continued to travel in Italy, and have had occasion to visit a good many libraries which do not possess printed catalogues. Of these, while I had not the leisure to make detailed lists, it may be as well to give some particulars here.

At Brescia the Biblioteca Queriniana is now open from 9 to 3, and it has a MS. catalogue in which the MSS. are arranged alphabetically without distinction of subject. There are the following Greek titles : Apollonius Rhodius, nonnulla de eo (F.V. 6), Areopagita, Dionysius (A. IV. 3), Aristotle Rhet. al. (A. VI. 3), Evangelia (A. IV. 10, D. II. 14, A. IV. 12, A. VI. 26), Gregor. Naz. (D. II. 13), Himerius, (B. VII. 7), C. Lascaris, de nom. et verb. (B. VII. 15), Lycophron (A. VI. 33), Sophocles (B. VI. 24). I inspected the Lycophron and the Sophocles, and both are of saec. xv. From the fact that there is at the end of the catalogue a list of the earlier MSS. under centuries, and that none of the Greek MSS. appear in it, I conjecture that the other books also will be of about the same age. MS. A. VII. 7 contains 'Tibullus, Poemata ext. cum Propertius.' I did not see it.

The Biblioteca Civica at *Ferrara*, in the University, has a small collection of Greek MSS. The catalogue is for all the MSS., and alphabetical. I excerpted the following titles, but there may be more : Aeschylus, Aristophanes (3), Aristoteles, Biblia, Emanuel Cretensis, Evangelia, Hymni Graeci, Joannes Chrysostomus, Lexicon, Maximus, Pindarus, Psalterium, Ptolemaeus, Vitae Sanctorum. Owing to the extreme cold (December 10, 1889), and the deficient service of the library, I did not examine more than the following MSS. : 253 N.B. 2, Aristophanis Plut. Nub. chart. s. xv.—xvi., miscellaneous notes at the end.

At Messina in Sicily the University possesses a collection of 175 Greek MSS. from the suppressed Basilian convent of S. Salvadore, the buildings of which are passed on the road to the Faro. A full and accurate catalogue has been prepared of them by the late Father Matranga, who died unfortunately before he had finished the task of deciphering the palimpsests that underlie several of the MSS. His catalogue remains in slips in the library, but the librarian assured me that it would be published by the Italian Government, an intention that it is to be hoped will be carried out: for the row of dated MSS., and the local character of many of them, make this collection of importance for the palaeographer. Accounts of it are given by Diehl, Mélanges d'Arch. et d'Hist. de l'École franç. de Rome, 1888, ff. 309 sq., 'Notice sur deux manuscrits à miniatures de la Bibliothèque de l'Université de Messina,' and Rühl,

Philologus 1889, 'Bemerkungen über Bibliotheken in Sicilien.' I visited the library in the hope that, as the scribes were mainly Basilian monks, there might be some specimens of the tachygraphy that was familiar to their order to be gathered. In this I was to a great extent disappointed. In the notices mentioned above, the three classical treasures of the collection are given—a fine 10th century Galen (no. 84), an equally fine x.-xith cent. Hermogenes (no. 118) and another copy of Hermogenes (no. 119) of s. xii.-xiii. The number of dated MSS. is very remarkable: *e.g.* A.D. 961, 963, 1017, 1061, 1064, 1105, 1107, 1116, 1117, 1127, 1132, 1148, 1153, 1281, 1308.

At the Biblioteca Comunale I was informed that there was nothing of Greek. In the Museum there is a Greek MS. of the New Testament kept in a glass case;

it is apparently of about the xiiith century, but I did not think it worth while to inspect it more closely. Both at Palermo and at Messina I must look back with pleasure to the kindness and alacrity with which the librarians displayed their respective treasures. I had no time to stay at *Catania*, where one knows from Blume there is a library; and I have no information as to the fate of the collection which according to Angelo Rocca (*Bibl. Apost. Vat.* etc. Rome 1591, appendix p. 383 sq. 'de bibliothecis quae nunc exstant') 'reperitur in Abbatia sancti Placidi ex congregatione Cassinensi sancti Benedicti, in duas partes divisa, in Graecos scilicet codices et Latinos.' The convent of S. Placido is about 10 miles south of Messina.¹

The Biblioteca Comunale at *Poppi*, in the Casentino, contains no Greek MSS., but a large collection of early printed books, and some Latin MSS. These have come partly from the neighbouring convent at Camaldoli, partly from the family Rilli-Orsini. The same may be said of the Public Library at *San Gimignano* near Siena; there are Latin MSS. (one of Persius, s. xv. :) and printed books, but no Greek MSS.

At Viterbo, as is well known, the Chapter Library consists of the donation of Latino Latini, who was secretary to Rodolfo Pio, Cardinal of Carpi, who left him the collection of books and MSS. that he had in part received from his uncle Alberto Pio. On enquiry at Viterbo I was assured by one of the Canons that there were no MSS. whatever, except the correspondence of Latini, which was printed in 1667; but I do not rely too entirely on this statement.

The Municipal Library at *Perugia* has on two following occasions baffled me; this year, (April, 1890) the MSS.

were being moved into larger apartments, and while in 'trasbordo' were inaccessible. The catalogue (MS.) gave promise of several copies of the classics, and it is to be hoped that another attempt will be rewarded.

There are other towns in Italy, principally in the Emilia and the Veneto, but also in the South, where there are known to be libraries that contain some, if not many, Greek manuscripts. These I hope will be looked through by myself or another traveller. The probability of any great literary gain is not large; for wherever there is a good copy of a classic in a small collection, it happens that a philological wanderer has long ago passed by and noted it. But the history of Renaissance collections and the list of scribes and dated MSS. may always look for addition. The most important library in Italy without a printed catalogue is the Ambrosiana, and though when one is at Milan the kindness of Sac. Antonio Ceriani does away with the need of one, it may be hoped for the convenience of scholars afar off that the Government will be able to afford the cost of printing. The same is the case with the large additions that have been made to the Marciana and the Laurenziana since the catalogues of Zanetti and Bandini. At Florence the MSS. catalogues of del Furia are being revised; but the same thing needs doing even more at Venice, and the corrected catalogues should be published in a convenient form. The Riccardiana also, at Florence, would be the better for a handy modern classified catalogue; for Lami's catalogue, while excellent, is of all the MSS. alphabetically; and the 'Inventario' (Inventario e Stima della Libreria Riccardi. Manoscritti e Edizioni del Secolo XV. In Firenze 1810) compiled from it is shockingly inaccurate. Any one with leisure in Rome would do a service by making (with permission) what it is the fashion to call a 'hand-list' of the Greek MSS. in the Barberini and Chigi

libraries; but, as they are open only one day a week, it is a task likely to take more time than I myself can hope to afford. It would be a convenience also to know clearly what Greek there is at Monte Cassino.

It may be of use to any one not practically acquainted with Italian libraries if, without pretending to exhaustiveness, I subjoin a list of catalogues and books bearing on the subject, by way of supplement to the excellent list given in Gardthausen, *Griechische Palaeographie* p. 433, 4.

Beside Angelo Rocca (1591), Montfaucon's Diarium Italicum (1698) and Blume's Iter Italicum (1824), I may mention three notebooks of D'Orville's in his collection at the Bodleian, numbered x. 2, 4, 30, 31 and 32, two of which contain memoranda of his journeys, names of inns, persons to be called upon, and the other lists of MSS. in various Italian libraries : Martin Gerbert, Iter Alemannicum, accedit Italicum et Gallicum Typis San Blasianis 1765; the Italian journey took place in 1761 and 1762, and is in many respects valuable; for instance, Gerbert was in Rome shortly after the death of Passionei, and while his legacy of books was being arranged at the Angelica. A rare and useful modern Italian publication is that entitled 'Statistica del Regno d'Italia. Biblioteche. Firenze 1865.' It gives an alphabetical list of provinical libraries, with short descriptions. Moreover, in most libraries one may see upon asking a sort of 'Rapporto' or return made by the authorities to the Government about the year 1872: these small pamphlets often contain useful information. A most meritorious publication has been undertaken by Prof. Giuseppe Mazzatinti, an 'Inventario' of all the lesser Italian libraries (Torino 1887): it has hitherto reached its second fascicolo,¹ and includes Imola, Camerino, Empoli, Capua, Aquila, Rieti, Terni, Narni, Senigaglia, Crescentino, Sessa Aurunca,

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Asti, Reggio (Cal.), Alba, Piazza Armerina, Casale, Siracusa, Cuneo, Macerata. In none of these places are there Greek MSS.

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NOTES

UPON

GREEK MANUSCRIPTS

IN

ITALIAN LIBRARIES.

MODENA.

In the spring of the year 1888 I visited Modena for the purpose of collating two MSS. of the Homeric Hymns which were known to exist there; and the interest of the collection generally induced me to inspect the other Greek MSS. preserved in the Regia Biblioteca Estense. To these two tasks I was able to give from February 27 to March 10: and while I plead the exigencies of time in excuse for the deficiencies of this catalogue, I am the more bound to acknowledge the courtesy of Signor Luigi Rossi, librarian of the Estense (since promoted to the Biblioteca Palatina at Parma), and his most obliging assistant, to whose kindness I owe the bare possibility of covering so large a collection in so short a time. The history of the Estense collection yet remains to be written : for whoever should attempt it a first requisite would be the examination of the extensive series of Latin and Mediaeval MSS.-a task which lay outside my sphere; the main outlines, on the other hand, are well known. A convenient and continuous account is contained in a publication issued by the authorities of the library in 1873, entitled Cenni storici della

Biblioteca Estense in Modena: con appendice di documenti. Modena. Tipogr. Capelli, 1873. The basis of this is a history of the library written by Antonio Lombardi (librarian from 1814-47) and preserved in manuscript. It adds however nothing of moment to what was already to be found in Tiraboschi (e.g. Storia della Lett. Ital. ed. 1823, V. 167, 8, VII. 36-48, 216-18). It appears probable that a collection of books existed at the court of the Marchesi d'Este at Ferrara as early as the twelfth century; the first mentions of Greek manuscripts occur in two documents adduced on p. vi. n. of Cenni Storici: one, a catalogue of 1436, gives two Greek MSS., the other of 1467 gives four. But in the province of Greek the collection will have been scanty till the time of the Duke Alfonso II. whose reign began in 1559. Letters of the years 1560 and 1561, from the ambassador at Venice, Girolamo Falletti, relative to the ordering and purchase of MSS. are given in Tiraboschi, Stor. d. Lett. It. ed. 1791, VII. p. 229, and it is easy to recognise in the numerous MSS. written in Venice about the year 1560, especially by Andreas Darmarius (see Index), some of the books thus ordered by Alfonso. In his reign also, it is natural to assume that the large portion of the library of Alberto Pio of Carpi came into the Estense, soon to migrate to within a few miles of its old resting-place. The transference of the court and library from Ferrara to Modena took place in 1598; and from that time no material additions in the way of Greek appear to have been made (a donation of 329 MSS. among which are some in Greek, in 1805, is mentioned on p. xxxiii.). After suffering many vicissitudes of situation within the ducal palace, the library was lately moved to a convenient set of rooms in the Albergo Arti, at the west end of the town. The MS. catalogue of Greek manuscripts now in use is based upon a fuller catalogue made by the Abbate Gabardi, vice-librarian from 1780 to 1790.

In Documento I. of *Cenni Storici*, under the head of 'Codici Greci,' is a useful but not exhaustive list of the more valuable Greek MSS. in the library. I have compared my notes carefully with this catalogue, but even after a second visit to Modena there remain a good many points of divergence; these I have been careful to note where they occur.

One of the most interesting portions of the collection is that which was, as I have already stated, once in the. possession of Alberto Pio, count of Carpi, and which itself was in great measure composed of the library of Giorgio Valla of Piacenza. For this celebrated person it may be sufficient to refer to the short account in Tiraboschi, Storia d. Lett. Ital. ed. 1823, p. 1564 sq., and for Pio to the Biblioteca Modenese IV. p. 156 sq.¹ The question of the way in which so large a part of Pio's library entered the Estense must be held to be still unsolved, in spite of the ingenious hypothesis of the author of Cenni Storici, p. xiv. note, that the MSS. were bought from the heirs of the Cardinal of Carpi, nephew of Alberto, by members of the Este family. Two MSS. now in the Estense can be identified as having formed part of his library, viz. the MS. of Epictetus, now numbered II. A. 10 (see Upton's Epict. London, 1741 praef., printed at length in Tiraboschi, Bibl. Mod. l.c.), seen in the year 1548, and the Clement III. D. 7, which Piero Vettori in the preface to the edition of 1550 says he used in constructing his text : it had been lent to Marcello Cervini by 'Rodulphus Pius antistes Carpensis—e bibliotheca quam a majoribus suis doctissimis viris ac maximis virtutibus insignibus accepit.'² It is to be hoped that documentary evidence still exists, and will be produced, of the entry of these and other books into the

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Estense. For those of the MSS. of Valla and Pio that found their way into other collections, there is a tolerably clear chain of evidence: cf. Ambrogio Morando praef. to *August. Stsuchii opera.* Venet. 1591, Card. Stefano Borgia, *Anecdot. Litter.* Romae, 1773, ap. Tiraboschi, *Bibl. Mod.* l.c. and Nolhac, *Fulvio Orsini*, p. 168, note.

The Estense as it stands contains 253 Greek manuscripts; I have here mentioned only such of them as appeared of interest, whether literary or palaeographical; two omissions however have been made of somewhat greater extent—the commentators on Aristotle (*paene innumeri* as Montfaucon found them, *Diar. Ital.* p. 33), which I was told at the time had been investigated by Professor Vitelli of Florence, and a number of sixteenth-century copies of minor medical works of Galen and Hippocrates. These and other codices will be included in the long-intended printed catalogue of the Biblioteca Estense, which all scholars must hope may soon be given to the world.¹

It is convenient to add here a note upon the library of Reggio in Emilia. It is well known that the celebrated library of the monastery of Santo Spirito has recently been incorporated with the Biblioteca Municipale. The authorities there allowed me to inspect the MS. catalogue of the S. Spirito library, although, as they informed me, the ecclesiastical books from it had by agreement been given to the Chapter Library in Reggio. The only titles however in the catalogue that had a Greek look were 'Tatianus contra Graecos, grece MS.' and 'Athenagoras in 4to MS.': these books were not to be found, but on looking at the catalogue of the Bibl. Estense, I soon identified them with MS. No. 247, once the property of Giovanni Francesco Pico della Mirandola. In the Biblioteca Municipale at Reggio are late MSS. of the following Latin authors-Ovid, Propertius, Terence and Probus.

17. (iii. A. 2) chart. $8\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in. ff. 70, 18 ll. to p., A.D. 1469, contains ARISTOPHANES' PLUTUS, begins at v. 218 (ff. 1–29*r*.); NUBES (30*r*.– 70*r*.), with glosses and a few marginal scholia.

Ff. 44-268 *Epistles* : well-formed minuscule, above the line, 32 ll. There are stichometric notes. Several ff. are supplied on paper.

197. (ii. G. 3) EUSTBATIUS, ASPASIUS, MICHAEL EPH., ANON. IN ARIST. ETHICA. Chart. xv.—xvi. 13×9 , ff. ? 600.

I conjecture that it is a statement inserted by way of receipt by an agent or representative of Pio's, in one or two of a series of books ordered of contemporary writers—in distinction to those he obtained from Valla's library; and that to $\tau \lambda \xi \xi \eta$ should be supplied $\beta_i \beta_i \lambda_i \alpha_i$. A date and place might be given by No. 207. To seek to identify these MSS, without further evidence would be rash, but it is a possible conjecture that they may be found among those that follow MS. 197 and 205, are of the size 13 \times 9, and contain for the most part Commentators on Aristotle.

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BOLOGNA.

For the Libraries at Bologna I may refer to the full account in Blume, Iter Italicum ii. pp. 145-163. Two recent publications Notizie Storiche sulla R. Biblioteca Universitaria di Bologna, 1872, signed 'Prof. Carlo Gemelli Vice Bibliotecario,' and Monografia sull' Archiginnasio di Bologna da Gius. Guidicini, 1870, do not add anything material to our knowledge. The University Library, as is well known, takes its origin from the donation in 1712 of Conte Luigi Ferdinando Marsigli, who died in 1730. See an account of his eventful life in Fantuzzi, Notizie degli Scrittori Bolognesi, Bologna 1786, vol. iv. p. 286-326. A catalogue of his collection while still in the owner's hands is given by Talman, Elenchus librorum orientalium manuscriptorum—a Domino Aloysio Ferdinando Marsigli—collectorum coemptorumque-Viennae Austriae anno MDCCII. 'Pars 1' in this book contains the Greek MSS., 18 in number, with one printed Greek book. The MSS, may all be identified among those now possessed by the University: to those that enter into my list I have affixed the number of Talman's catalogue. Additions to the Library must have been made at different periods, but mainly by the incorporation in 1867 of the books of the celebrated monastery of San Salvatore. Of this library, extolled by Rocca, Mabillon, Montfaucon, and many other travellers, a short account may be found in Tiraboschi Storia d. Lett. Ital. ed. 1791 vii. p. 240, and a fuller in Trombelli, Memoria Istoriche concernenti le Due Canoniche di S. Maria et di S. Salvatore insieme unite, Bologna 1752, pp. 99-105. In several of the MSS. catalogued below will be found references to Pellegrino Fabbri,¹ Prior of the Monastery and virtual founder of the Library.

There are now in use two MS. catalogues, one of the Greek MSS. of the original collection of Marsigli, entitled *Index Mezzofanti*, another, of the MSS. from S. Salvatore, for which there is a separate numeration. In the appendix to the first of the two works cited above, it is stated that the total number of Greek MSS. in the University is 72. This is slightly in excess of the number shown to me.²

The Biblioteca Municipale in the beautiful building called the Archiginnasio, once the seat of the University, contains a small collection of twenty-one Greek MSS., which by the courtesy of the librarian were freely given to me for inspection. About the history of this library I take the following facts from the governmental publication called 'Statistica del Regno d'Italia. Biblioteche. Firenze 1865' p. xxxiv. sq. It consists of the books of several religious bodies already united in the Library of S. Domenico (earlier details of this ap. Blume p. 153 sq.). In 1802 the library was declared Municipal, in 1811 there was added a legacy of books from Abate Antonio Magnani, which in 1817 were incorporated with the rest of the Magnani's name was to be found on most of Library. the MSS.

GENOA.

The only collection of Greek manuscripts in Genoa worthy of the name is that now possessed by the Missione urbana di San Carlo, Piazza S. Maria Angelorum. A catalogue of these MSS. with some history of the Library will be found in Banchero, Genova e le Due Riviere, Genova 1846, pp. 497-523; the portion of the book relating to libraries was contributed by Grassi. Banchero's book, though quoted by recent travellers to Genoa (e.g. Neigebaur, Serapeum, 1857, p. 138 sq.; Molard, Archives des Missions Scientifiques, 3º ser. v. p. 137 sq.), does not appear very widely known; only one date for instance of those in Grassi's catalogue appears in Gardthausen's list, and that from Stein's preface to Herodotus 1869 praef. p. vii. It may be useful therefore to give here some details of palaeographical interest, some already to be found in Grassi, while others are due to my own observation. The collection of thirty-nine Greek MSS. is what survives of a legacy of 300 MSS. given to the Ospedale degli Incurabili in 1528 by Filippo Saoli, Bishop of Brugnato, and bought in 1746 by the Missione Urbana. A life of Filippo Saoli (1491-1531) is given in Oldoinus' 'Athenaeum ligusticum,' Perusiae 1680, with copious references to earlier authorities.

BIBLIOTECA ANGELICA.

Of the Biblioteca Angelica, still attached to the church of S. Agostino in Rome, no printed Manuscript Catalogue exists, if we except a list of the classical MSS. excerpted from the Catalogue (MS.) actually in use by Parthey, Serapeum no. XXX. 1869. The present list is made on a different principle, and may I hope be of use to the authorities in the completion of the Printed Catalogue, a labour undertaken by Signor Enrico Narducci, the well-known librarian of the Alessandrina. The history of the Angelica is well known; how much the actual library owes to its founder, the celebrated Angelo Rocca, is not easy to determine; but from the very small space given to 'manuscripta' in the printed catalogue of 1608² it may be imagined that Rocca's donation consisted chiefly of printed books. The greater part of the Greek MSS. came from the collection of Cardinal Domenico Passionei (1682-1761), who for the last six years of his life was librarian of the Vatican. The

Facsimiles of several MSS. from the collection before it entered the Angelica are given by Montfaucon, *Pal. The classical MSS. in the Library appear to be all already known, but it is not without interest palaeographically. Two at least of the MSS. offer tachygraphic peculiarities, and one of them (21) is of the famous school of Grotta Some interesting private collections also are Ferrata. represented in the Passionei library; a considerable number of MSS. from the collection of George Count of Corinth² must have found their way into it, and some of these had already belonged to Marcus Mamounas the Cretan. Egidio Viterbense,³ the celebrated theologian and Cardinal, has contributed several books that were once in his possession. Many of Passionei's books came from the library of the monastery of S. Silvestro in Quirinali. Other points of bibliographical interest are collected in the I must regret that the earliest dated MS. of the index.

BIBLIOTECA CASANATENSE.

The library, formerly Dominican and attached to the church of S. Maria sopra Minerva, and that still bears the name of its principal benefactor, Cardinal Casanata (d. 1700), has, it is well known, a very large collection of printed books; manuscripts are neither so numerous nor so important. Some 53 Greek MSS. were shown me by the very obliging authorities of the Library; how many of them formed part of the donation of Cardinal Casanata it is hard to say, but his stamp does not appear very often, and only one of the MSS. to which a place has been given in the following list will be found to bear it. Important contributions, as the inscriptions on the several MSS. show, were made from the Holy Office (about 1745), and from the library belonging to the church of Gesù (about 1774); various other MSS. appear to have been bought in the course of the century. There is a full catalogue for MSS., with a separate section for Greek. The interest of the collection is mainly palaeographical.

IN ITALIAN LIBBARIES.

BIBLIOTECA CORSINI.

The Biblioteca Corsini, in the Palazzo of that name which now belongs to the Accademia de' Lincei, contains among its other treasures a small collection of Greek MSS. They are enumerated in a printed catalogue entitled 'Catalogus selectissimae bibliotecae Nicolai Rossi—Romae in typographio Paleariniano MDCCLXXXVI.' Of a few of them it seemed worth while to give a fuller description.

BOBGHESE.

By the kindness of the Prince Borghese I was allowed to inspect the Greek MSS. contained in the Library of his family. Sig. Passarini, the very obliging librarian, showed me six books, unfortunately none of any particular value, and all written in the sixteenth century. I give a description of them.

BIBLIOTECA VITTORIO EMANUELE.

The eighteen Greek manuscripts now possessed by the Biblioteca Vittorio Emanuele are unfortunately not of any great importance. Those that came from Muretus' library have been described by M. de Nolhac (*La Bibliothèque d'un Humaniste au xvi.*^e Siècle, Mél. d'Arch. et d'Hist. de l'École franç. de Rome, 1883). The Catalogue, though only in MS., is full and accurate, and I confine my notes therefore to a few points of interest. MS. 3 (membr. saec. xii.) from S. Pantaleone, bears the inscription Ex haered. Fran de Rubeis.

MS. 4 (chart. s. xvi. Scholia on Theocritus), also from S. Pantaleone, has on f. l $\dot{\epsilon}\mu o\hat{\upsilon}$ σεβαστιανοῦ δοκίου καὶ τῶν φιλων Nunc Jo. sidisi d. rossy.

MS. 5 (chart. s. xvi.) contains Aeschylus' Agamemnon, with scholia at the end.

MS. 8 (chart. s. xvi.) contains Iliad A, with prolegomena and scholia.

MS. 10 (chart. ff. 13, unbound) the testament of S. Ephraem Syrus: at end, εἰς τὴν παραμυθίαν πόλιν τῆς εὐροίας ἔγραψεν ὁ ῥοδινὸς Νεόφυτος ἐκ τινος βεμβράνης βίβλου αχμα (1641) μαίου ιε.

MS. 6. By far the most interesting MS. of the eighteen is that of the Scholia minora to the Iliad, from which Osann took his well-known 'Anecdotum Romanum.' I may add a few points to the description of this book :

Membr. 9×6 in., ff. 167, 33 ll., defective at beg. and end, one leaf of ecclesiastical matter prefixed. Hand a rather small upright carefully-written minuscule, below the line, the letters finely shaped, uncial forms rare; headings however, and sometimes entire arguments, are in I incline with Osann, against Dindorf (Schol. uncial. *Iliad.* vol. i. praef. p. xcii) and the author of the catalogue to ascribe it to the tenth century. The ruling of the page into two columns, and the arrangement of the words and glosses is on the same plan as that of the Bodleian Scholia minora to the Odyssey (Auct. V. 51, cf. Dindorf, Schol. Odyss. I. p. xvii). The MS. is in quaternions, the signatures to which have been cut away by the binder; a late hand has renumbered them, and at the same time reproduced the old system; e.g. $\zeta \tau o \hat{v} \dot{\alpha} - \varsigma$: $\kappa \tau o \hat{v} \pi \rho \dot{\omega} \tau o v$ αλφαβίτου-ι.1

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The remainder of this book contains notes taken down in Rome and elsewhere in the earlier half of the year 1889, during a journey in Italy under the Craven Trust. Their comparative scantiness may perhaps be excused by the circumstance that the writer had begun to devote his time to a definite philological object, which allowed him only occasionally to note down points of general interest. It has seemed worth while to print them, without waiting for a possible opportunity of completion, partly because so many Italian libraries have so little chance of possessing a printed catalogue that any information concerning them must for some time to come possess value, and also to spare future travellers the trouble of investigating out-of-the-way collections that have been more or less completely looked through by the writer.

The writer desires to take this occasion of expressing his obligations to the authorities of the Public Libraries of Pistoia, Lucca and Siena. It may be well also to say definitely, what few people now would be inclined to believe, that there are no Greek MSS. in the University Library at Pisa.

BIBLIOTECA VALLICELLIANA.

An account of the steps by which the library of S. Maria in Vallicella acquired its books may be read in Blume, iii. p. 161 sq. The Greek MSS., taken by themselves, do not afford much indication of ownership; occasional references occur to the Portuguese Achilles Statius, the so-called founder of the library, and to other XVIth century personages, such as Fulvio Orsini and Cardinal Sirleto. These I have gathered together, wherever they were met. The collection is not of very great importance, although the notes that I give here do not fairly represent it. I wish to reiterate this, lest any one should be deterred from examining the library by the thought that its contents had been exhausted. There is a full but somewhat inconvenient MS. catalogue of Greek MSS. Facsimiles of seven MSS. may be found in Blanchinus, *Evangelium Quadruplex*, Romae, 1748.

ABCHIVIO DI SAN PIETEO.

By the permission of the Chapter of S. Peter's, and with the kind assistance of Don Pietro Wenzel and Don Giovanni Silvestri I spent a morning among the MSS. that are preserved in the Chapter Library of S. Peter's. I subjoin notes of two manuscripts that I noticed more particularly.

2. A. 24. THEOCRITUS AND HESIOD, in the same hand as A 55; with the subscription Tépµa θεοκρίτου. The hand is plain and rather poor.

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
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
