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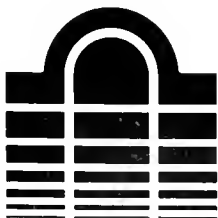

From President Welty:

Back in 1966, a *Pittsburgh Press* story pointed out that "The Top Cinderella story in American education this year is right here in the Pittsburgh district--the Indiana University of Pennsylvania--with every prospect of becoming one of the great educational institutions in America."

In the twenty-one years since that statement was made, IUP has made considerable progress. The enrollment has doubled, and the physical plant has grown to almost twice its 1966 size. But, more important, this university has become a highly respected comprehensive institution which includes a significant number of nationally prominent professionals

Official start finds The Capital Campaign halfway to goal

After months of planning and precampaign solicitation, Samuel Jack, Jr., general chairperson of The Capital Campaign, announced in late April that the fund drive "is right on schedule. We've raised slightly more than half our minimum goal of \$2.5 million."

The Capital Campaign is raising funds to underwrite four pressing needs of the university: expanded student scholarship programs, distinguished professorships in at least five disciplines, the renovation of Breezedale as an alumni and community conference center, and the enhancement of academic programs at the Punxsutawney and Kittanning campuses.

The Capital Campaign was officially kicked off on April 29 with a press conference and public announcement. Prior to the official start, a volunteer Campaign Leadership team was organized under Jack's chairmanship. The team includes eight solicitation divisions, which are listed at the end of this article.

First to be solicited were members of the Foundation for IUP board and the Council of Trustees. From this division was sought solid support for the drive before outside corporations and foundations were approached. With solicitation nearly complete among foundation board members and university trustees, over \$750,000 has been pledged, or over thirty percent of the goal. Additional giving from this group should bring the division's total to \$1 million. Actual solicitation of all divisions will be completed in the early fall.

"The solicitation that takes place during this drive is very people-intensive," said Anthony Lenzi '54, executive director of the Foundation for IUP. "We are not using any form of computerized mailings or paid solicitors to do our work. We are following the fund-raising maxim that 'People give to people.' The bulk of the solicitation will be on a one-to-one basis, and all of it will be done by volunteers. Our volunteers believe in IUP, and each is personally committed to the success of our drive."

"I believe that IUP is playing an essential role in the revitalization of our region," said campaign leader Jack.

"The majority of our students are first-generation college students. Over fifty-six percent of the student body falls into this category, an average that is above the national norm. With the traditional heavy industries disappearing from Western Pennsylvania, an IUP education is offering our citizens new opportunities in fields they never before considered. The Capital Campaign is an important part of the university's plan to keep abreast of the job and career needs of the region. We've done a first-class job in the past. The Capital Campaign will help us to do even better."

The Campaign Leadership team includes the following: Dr. John Welty, president, IUP; Edward Mackey, chairperson, Board and Trustees' Gifts Division; John Delaney, chairperson, Leadership Gifts Division; Robert Duggan and Mrs. Michael Toretti, co-chairpersons, Advance Gifts Division; Mrs. Samuel Light, chairperson, Punxsutawney Gifts Division; John McCue, chairperson, Kittanning Gifts Division; James Miller, chairperson, Major Gifts Division; Kenneth Garner '65, chairperson, Alumni Gifts Division; Dr. Richard Magee and Dr. Donald McPherson '69, co-chairpersons, University Gifts Division; and Joseph Kovalchick, member at large.



Annual funds have best year yet

Once again, the Alumni Phonathon set the stage for success in the university's annual fund campaigns. Each of the campaigns achieved increases in terms of both participation and dollars pledged.

The 1986 Alumni Phonathon, under the direction of the Office of Annual and Planned Giving, set a new record. More than nine thousand alumni pledged over \$236,000. This figure topped the previous high, set the year before, by more than \$36,000.

Rickey McCurry, associate director of the Office of Annual and Planned Giving and phonathon director, attributed the success of the phonathon to an "excellent group of student callers. We had some terrific kids calling alumni this year," he said. "They were determined to surpass last year's figures."

The Alumni Phonathon also witnessed the successful completion of the first alumni challenge grant. Michael Gendich '35 agreed to match dollar for dollar all first-time gifts of \$100 or more and previous gifts increased by \$100 or more up to \$10,000. According to McCurry, the challenge was met in the fourth week of the five-week phonathon.

The enthusiasm and momentum generated by the Alumni Phonathon carried over into the first-ever Parents Phonathon. For two consecutive weeks, student callers contacted the parents of currently enrolled students.

At the end of the two-week period, 3,136 parents had pledged over \$32,000. This effort saw nearly fifty percent of all the parents contacted responding in a positive manner. Robert Shoemaker '60 of Butler, Pennsylvania, served as chairperson of the Parents Phonathon.

Lyrrasis Members and Sloan Foundation

Under the leadership of Dr. Daniel DiCicco '54 and Dr. Melvin Woodard, the University Family Campaign posted record results. This campaign elicited a fifty-six percent increase in participation over the previous year (up from 199 to 311) and a sixty-four percent increase in total dollar amount (up from \$22,000 to \$36,000).

New to this year's University Family Campaign were the Dr. Willis E. Pratt Award and the President's Cup Award. These awards were instituted to encourage participation in the campaign.

The Pratt Award, presented to the area with the highest per capita amount raised, was given to the College of Fine Arts. The President's Cup Award, presented to the area with the highest percentage of participation, was given to the College of Natural Sciences and Mathematics.

Under the volunteer leadership of Dr. Stanley Lore, the Retired Faculty Campaign posted a 90-percent increase in participation and a 178-percent increase in dollars raised. This year's campaign brought in \$10,000 from seventy-six donors. Dr. Lore, who served as chairperson for both the 1985 and 1986 campaigns, will be succeeded by Dr. Robert Saylor.

Kathleen Lambert Mack '79, director of the Office of Annual and Planned Giving, summed up the success of the 1986 campaigns: "Our theme for 1986-87 was 'building on success.' Our goal was to make this theme a reality. We believe that success breeds success."

IUP ranks high in selective survey

IUP's average Scholastic Aptitude Test scores from the fall, 1986, freshman class ranked high among Western Pennsylvania colleges and universities, according to a survey done by the *Valley News Dispatch* in Tarentum.

The findings noted that most schools take other factors besides SAT scores into consideration when reviewing applications, such as class rank, grade

point average, high school profile, and recommendations from guidance counselors or teachers.

It should be noted that in order to insure accurate comparison between those schools that have branch campuses and/or special admissions programs and those schools that do not have such programs, admissions data reported is from main campus, regular admissions programs.

The following chart summarizes the survey. West Virginia University and Indiana University, Bloomington, were added to the chart by the Media Relations Office at IUP to add an out-of-state perspective.

Retired Faculty Spotlight: Dorothy Lucker

The Retired Faculty Spotlight is on **Dorothy Fowkes Lucker**. Dr. Lucker, Dorothy to her friends, was born in Boston. Her father was a chemical engineer for Texaco Oil for many years.

Dorothy received her bachelor's and doctor's degrees from the University of Texas. In between, she earned a master's degree at Columbia, attended the Breadloaf writers school, and spent a semester at Princeton.

Dorothy's teaching career began in a fourth-grade classroom in Houston. With college teaching her goal, she left after a year for New York and Columbia.

Dorothy's career in higher education took her to William and Mary, to West Virginia's Fairmont State College, and to Pennsylvania's East Stroudsburg. In 1956, Dorothy joined the faculty at Indiana, where she taught for twenty years until her retirement in 1956.

While at Indiana, Dorothy taught courses in modern European fiction, Romantic poetry and prose, creative writing, modern American literature, and Victorian literature, as well as basic English courses. Her students recognized in her an excellent lecturer who loved to teach and who loved the subject matter she taught. "She always came prepared" is a compliment frequently heard from those who remember her classroom style.

Devoted to teaching and to her students, Dorothy gave support and encouragement and sometimes financial help (always anonymously) to any serious student who sought her help. She also served in the University Senate, acted as faculty adviser to the staff of the *Oak*, and made valuable contributions to the work of many faculty committees.

Retirement for Dorothy has not meant inactivity. She has long enjoyed reading, hiking, and membership in several book discussion clubs. Her travels have taken her to Outer Mongolia, India, Afghanistan, Iceland, Russia, Yugoslavia, Egypt, Switzerland, China, and most of Europe.

A dedicated volunteer in such groups as the League of Women Voters and the Open Door (a local drug and alcohol prevention and treatment center), Dorothy was honored by the latter group when she was designated the first emeritus member of its board. She makes her home at 43 South 9th Street in Indiana.

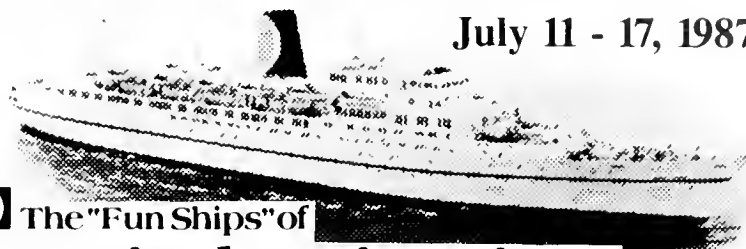
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Eight nominees seek three directors' positions

The Nominating Committee's regular members (Susan Snell Delaney '64, Richard Fiscus '78, Judith Moorhead '74M, Hester Munden '38, and Alice Poole Sheeder '43) and the alternate members (Richard Clawson '74, David Frick '57, Larry Judge '64, and Richard Smith '71) selected eight graduates as candidates for this election. Donald Ficco '61, 66M is coordinator of activities for Pennsylvania Electric Company's Speakers' Bureau and Customer Advisory Panels. The recipient of both bachelor's and master's degrees in English, Ficco taught secondary English, literature, and creative writing for twenty years in the Ferndale Area School District near Johnstown. Before joining Penelec, he was training director of the United States National Bank/U.S. Bancorp's human resources department. Ficco lives in the Johnstown area with his wife, the former Ruth Ann Minnick '63, an art teacher, and their three children, Mike, Matt, and Ann.



Catherine Dunlap Miller '73 is part-owner and operator of E. N. Dunlap, Inc., a Harrisburg-based business equipment sales and supply dealer. She was an English teacher for three years in the Central Dauphin School District before becoming involved in the business. Miller has done graduate

work at Shippensburg University and Pennsylvania State University and is a member of Phi Kappa Delta, an honor fraternity in education. In women's sports, when you say 'Pod,' you've said it all

Among the honors bestowed on Ruth Podbielski at her February retirement dinner was the IUP Certificate of Appreciation, presented by Pres. John Welty. Only the fifth such certificate given since the honor was initiated in 1982, it is intended to "express gratitude to an individual for supporting, assisting, or making a special contribution to the university."

In his remarks, Welty said, "From the time of your arrival on campus . . . your commitment to high standards of performance in both academics and athletics has been an inspiration to your colleagues and an incentive to your students."

Ruth Podbielski and IUP women's athletics have been synonymous for the past thirty-one years, ever since "Pod" joined the faculty. She formally retired from her position as associate director of athletics for women's programs on January 1.

In addition to the presentation of several personal gifts and testimonials at her retirement dinner, it was announced that a scholarship endowment in Podbielski's honor has

been initiated for women athletes with a beginning balance of some forty thousand dollars.

A search for a successor in the associate AD position is underway and is expected to be completed by early summer. Whoever is selected will have a very tough act to follow.

"To our knowledge, there's no one who has done more for women in sports anywhere than Ruth," said fellow Associate AD Herm Sledzik, who has worked closely with Podbielski. Sledzik was athletic director from the time women's sports were initiated at the varsity level in 1970 until 1982, when Frank Cignetti '60 succeeded him.

When Podbielski came to IUP in 1955, it was as an instructor of health and physical education, and she eventually became that department's assistant chairperson (1968-82). She obtained a master's degree from Pitt. After many years of patiently guiding women's sports through intramural and "play day" phases, she received the opportunity to develop a full-fledged varsity program that became

among the most respected anywhere, regardless of NCAA division.

In 1983, for example, the *Pittsburgh Press* published a survey of tri-state college and university women's sports programs that found IUP the leader in terms of number of sports sponsored, the emphasis it places on them, and the ambitions it has for their success.

The university's ten women's sports began with basketball, fencing, tennis, and volleyball. Field hockey was added later, followed by gymnastics, swimming, track and field, softball, and cross country, in that order. No sport has ever been dropped.

Since 1982-83, IUP has clearly designated two women's sports, basketball and gymnastics, along with men's basketball and football, as its "emphasis sports." This means scholarship money is devoted to these particular teams (and, on a more limited basis, to certain other of the ten women's varsity entrants).

The support of Cignetti over her final four-and-a-half years as women's AD meant a lot to Podbielski. "He wants the total program to be as good as it possibly can be," she said, emphasizing the word "total." "He allows you to work within your philosophy as long as it's good for the program."

Podbielski's philosophy is rooted in her high school days in Beaver Falls and her college days at Slippery Rock, from which she graduated in 1949, as well as in six years of teaching at Butler (Pa.) High School prior to coming to Indiana. It is a philosophy that is extremely people-oriented.

"I'm going to miss the daily contact that I had with the faculty, staff, and students," she said. "Those people made the job more exciting. There were always new faces and new challenges."

Football team's success sparks new honors

IUP football's 9-2 record and 1986 Pennsylvania Conference championship resulted in individual laurels for Coach Frank Cignetti '60 and several of his top players.

Besides being named PC Western Division Coach of the Year, Cignetti was honored as College Coach of the Year by the Pittsburgh Chapter of the National Italian-American Sports Hall of Fame. He was also invited to speak before the annual Kodak Coaches' Clinic.

At the Italian-American event, Cignetti shared the spotlight with nine first-ever inductees into the organization's Pittsburgh Hall of Fame. Of twelve panelists at the Kodak affair, he was the only one not associated with a Division I team.

Player recognitions included those received by senior offensive tackle Jim Angelo, whose hometown is Indiana and whose father is Dr. Joseph Angelo '56. The younger Angelo became a first-time All-American as named by both the Associated Press and Kodak/American College Football Coaches Association for their "college division" rosters.

Senior center Al Arrisher of Wexford/North Allegheny and junior outside linebacker Troy Jackson of Pittsburgh/Taylor Alderdice were given AP honorable mentions. Both Angelo and Arrisher were also picked for the ECAC team. Freshman fullback Paul Palamara was named PC West Rookie of the Year.



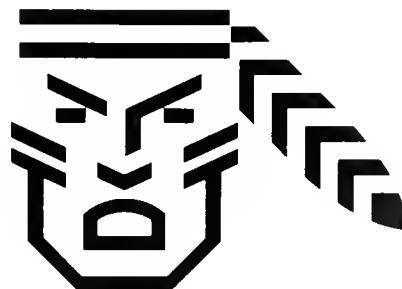

Eminent scholar and “crackerjack biologist”

ATHENS, Ohio - What's going on when the governor, the university president, the deans and chairmen and the press all turn out to welcome a 36-year-old biologist to the Ohio University faculty?

John J. Kopchick, Ohio's newest eminent scholar, seemed a bit bewildered by all the fuss.

Born in Punxsutawney, Pa., Kopchick remembers watching those poor blinking groundhogs wake up each spring to the sudden glare of publicity. Now he knows how they felt.

After being officially welcomed here yesterday by Gov. Richard F. Celeste and OU Pres. Charles Ping during a televised press conference, Kopchick said a few appreciative words and fled back to his laboratory.

According to the people who hired him, Kopchick is worth the fuss, not to mention his near-\$90,000 salary.

“John is just a crackerjack molecular biologist,” said Tom Wagner, head of OU's Edison Animal Biotechnology Center. “John was without doubt the outstanding animal biotechnologist in industry.

“He was the first person to introduce genes into chickens and birds just as we were the first to put them into mammals.”

Until last week, Kopchick was group research leader in the Animal Drug Discovery Department in the pharmaceutical firm of Merck and Co., Rahway, N.J.

His appointment yesterday ended a three-year search by OU for a distinguished biologist to work in animal genetic engineering as part of Ohio's \$61 million program to become more competitive in the research sciences.

At OU, Kopchick will work as a professor of zoology and biochemical sciences as well as head of the molecular biology department in the Edison center. His salary, as well as laboratory equipment and the costs of assistants, are covered by a \$1.2 million endowment fund from matching grants from the Ohio Board of Regents and OU alumni Milton and Lawrence Goll.

Genetic manipulation of commercially raised birds and livestock could offer consumers several major benefits, Kopchick said yesterday:

- For medical research, it allows the development of animal strains with diseases that mimic human illnesses. Science already is using rats and mice to find cures for diabetes and leukemia. “If one had an animal model for arthritis, for example, we could use that to attempt to cure the disease; to produce a drug, there must be an animal model.”

- For agriculture, it allows farmers and breeders to produce leaner, more disease-resistant animals for market without chemicals. “A typical broiler, for example, takes approximately seven weeks to raise from the time it hatches to the time it goes to market. If we could decrease that to six weeks, we'd save the broiler people a lot of money.”

- For drug manufacture, genetically altered livestock and birds may prove to be the most efficient producers of special peptides and proteins in the blood and milk which are necessary for vaccines and pharmaceuticals.

“The technology has advanced so rapidly,” Kopchick said. “Just in the last ten years, scientists have gone from talking about ways to sequence (determine the chemistry of) a gene to doing such sequencing in a few days.

“What was an abstract idea in 1976 was a reality in 1986.”

But it cannot easily be turned into a “Frankenstein” science, he said. This is because genetic engineering processes are too slow and the number of influencing genes too numerous to allow anything more than the manipulation of only a few targeting traits in any organism, he said.

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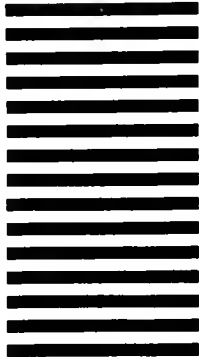
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
