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



"Wedn, Nov. 30th (1808) Soon after my arrival (at Louisburg) I sent my name to Mr. M. Dickinson the principal of the Academy, who graduated at Yale one year before me. Dickinson soon came, took tea with me at Hills.' Spent 2 or 3 hours pleasantly; when we walked to his academy, a pleasant building on the hill about ½ m. from the Village of Louisburg."
