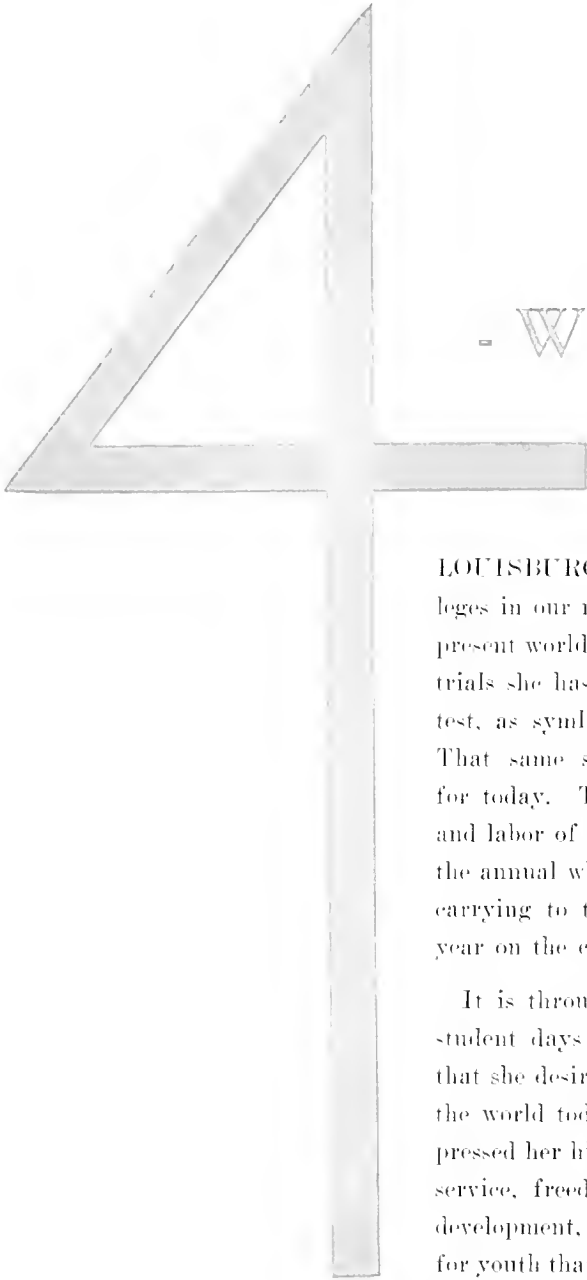

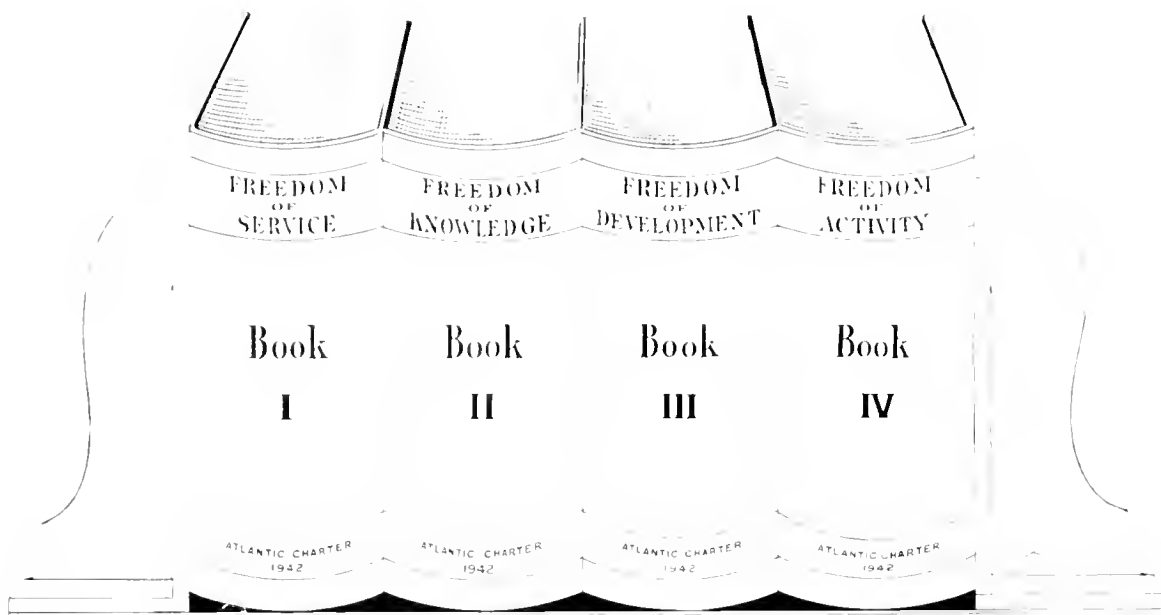




- W O R D

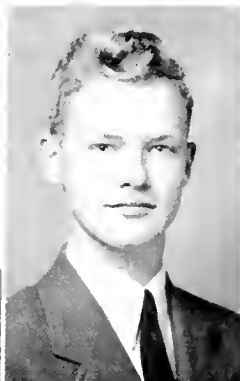
COLUMNS

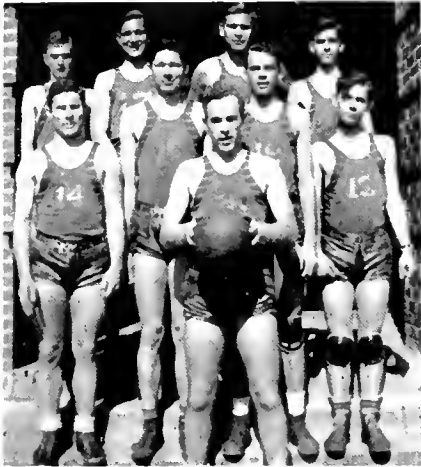
