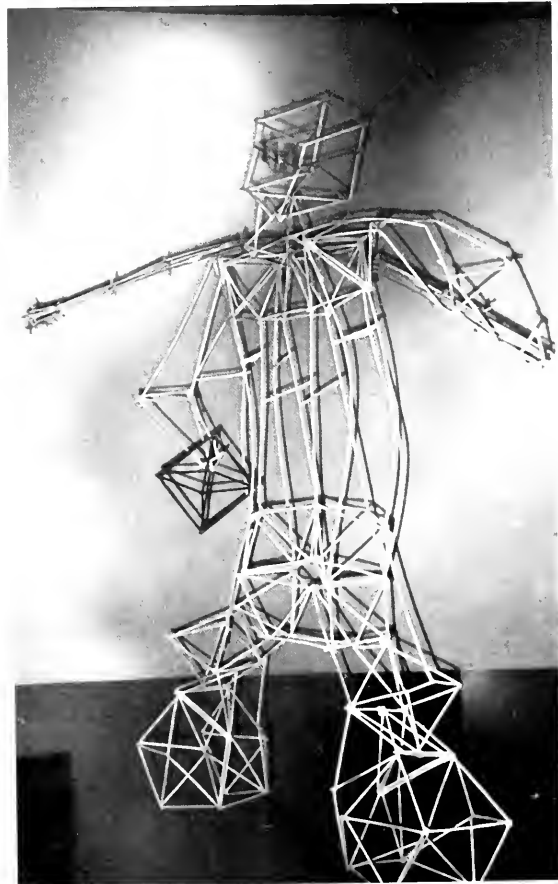

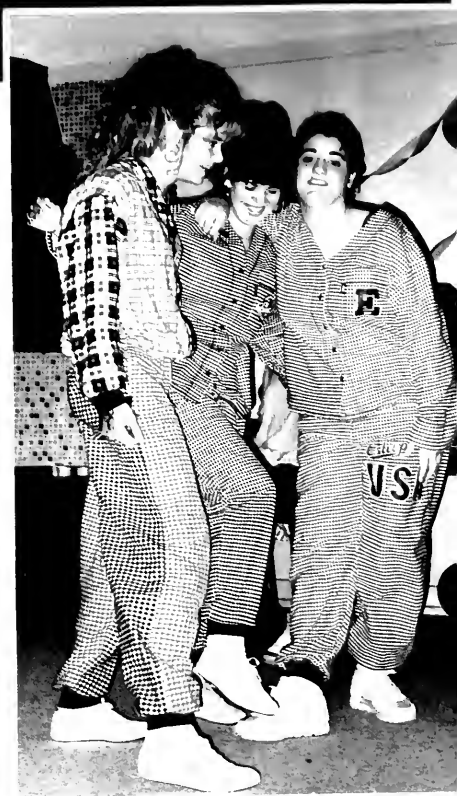

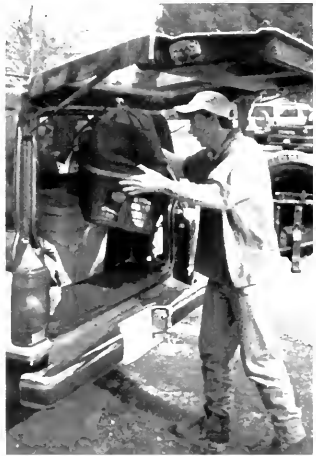

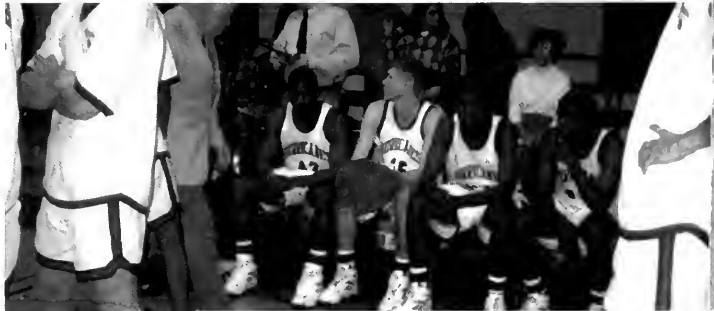

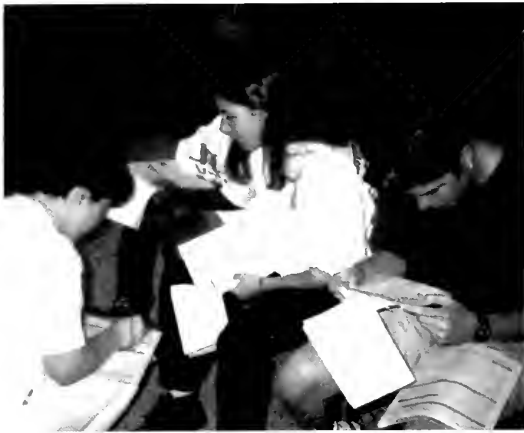

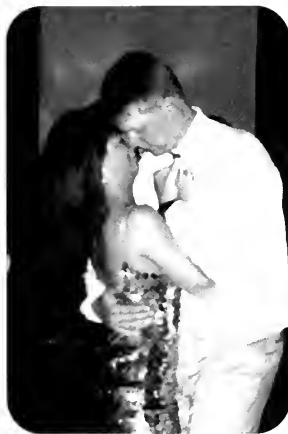


Visitation Day

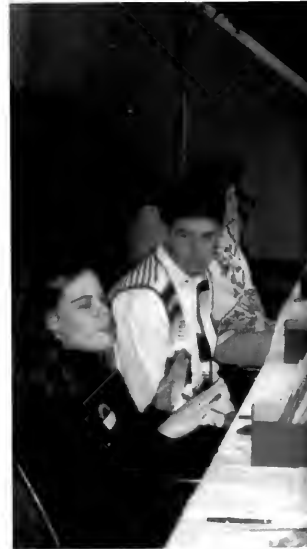

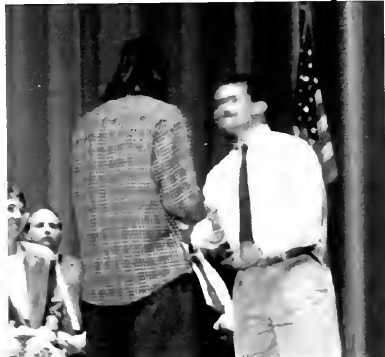

Christian Life Council

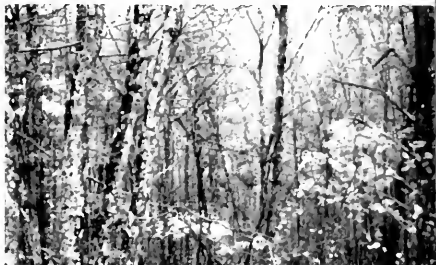

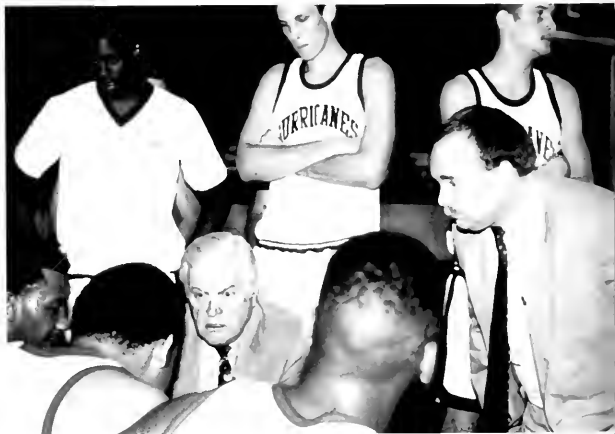
