BERG, NORTH CAROLINA, OCTOBER 5-8, 1900.

FIRST DAY

The Atlantic Mission Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened for its fourth session at Marshallberg, N. C., October 5th, at 10 a. m., Bishop Cyrus D. Foss, D. D., presiding.

The Bishop announced the hymn commencing "Oh for a thousand tongues to sing," after the singing of which he read the 100th Psalm, and the 2nd Chapter of Paul's second letter to Timothy, and led the Conference in prayer.

Bishop Foss then administered the sacrament of the Lord's supper, assisted by Dr. W. Q. A. Graham.

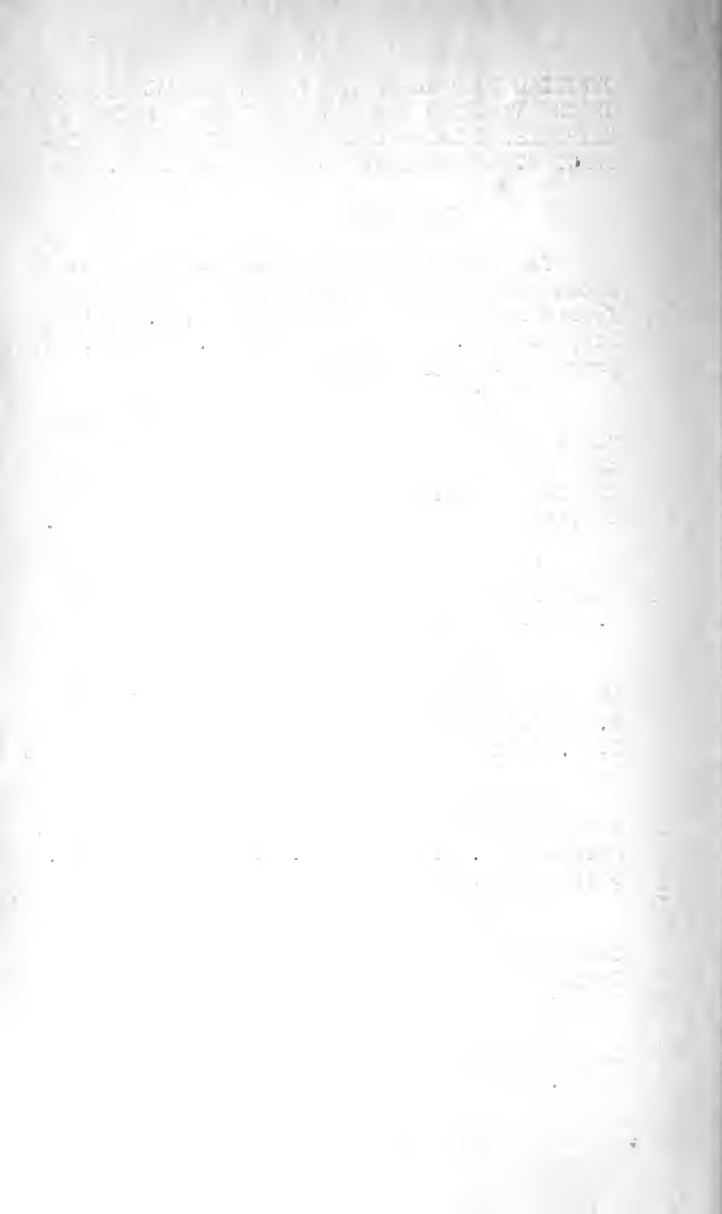

On motion of W. Q. A. Graham, C. M. Levister was elected Secretary, and T. S. Davis as his assistant.

On motion of C. M. Levister, Leolan Jackson was elected Statistical Secretary, and W. H. Luther as his assistant.

On motion of J. F. Usrey, W. S. Fitch



was elected Conference Treasurer, and J. B. Bridgers as his assistant.

Letters of regret were read from Rev. J. F. Dodd, D. D., Assistant Recording Secretary of the Missionary Society, and from U. S. Crowder.

The Conference then joined in prayer for Brother Crowder, led by Superintendent Graham.

The Secretary was instructed to make suitable reply to these letters.

On motion of J. F. Usrey, the Superintendent was instructed to make proper division of the various benevolences among the different charges of the Conference.

On motion of Dr. Graham, the accounts of the Book Concerns were placed in the hands of U. S. White for attention.

On motion, W. H. Luther was requested to represent "Gospel in All Lands."

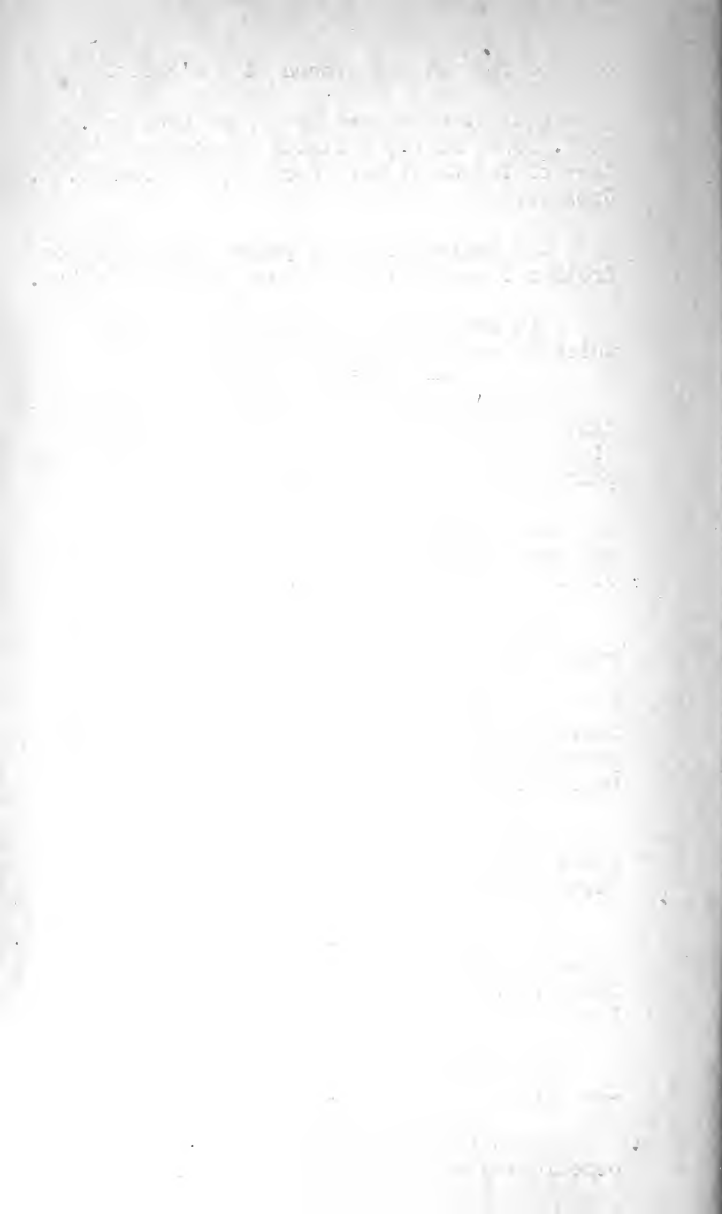
On motion of Superintendent Graham, the Secretary and the Superintendent were instructed to send suitable greetings to the Blue Ridge Conference, now in session.

Question 13, "Was the Character of each Preacher Examined?" was passed, and he made report of the work for the past year.

On motion of C. M. Levister, the hours of meeting and adjournment were fixed at 9:30 a. m. and 12 noon; the first half hour for devotional services.

The Bishop appointed J. F. Usrey to lead the devotional service.

On motion the Conference adjourned. The benediction was pronounced by W. S. Fitch.



Afternoon Session.

The Conference met in statistical session at 4 p. m. W. S. Fitch presiding, by appointment of the Bishop.

The devotional services were conducted by J. M. Smith.

On motion of C. F. Hunter, W. H. Luther was relieved from the duties of Assistant Statistical Secretary, and U. S. White was elected in his stead.

The charges were called in alphabetical order. Statistical reports were handed to the Statistical Secretary and the monies collected for the various benevolences to the Conference Treasurer.

The preachers paid to the Relief Fund the sum of one dollar each, in accordance with the resolution of last Conference.

On motion the Conference adjourned. The benediction was pronounced by J. B. Bridgers.

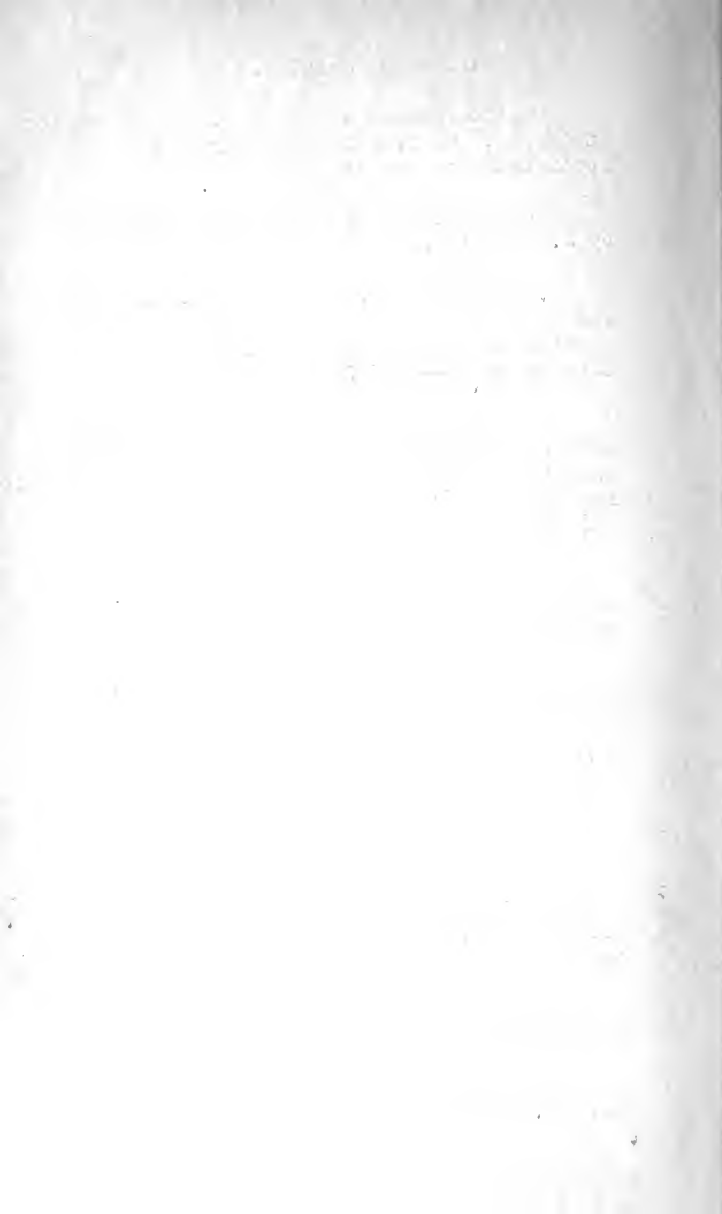
SECOND DAY

Saturday, October 6, 1900.

The Conference met at 9:30 a. m., and after devotional exercises, was called to order by Bishop Foss.

The journal of yesterday morning was read and approved.

Question 13 was resumed.

W. S. Fitch was called, his character passed, and he made report of his work.

The characters of J. T. Hardesty and J. A. Sisk, both of whom were absent, were passed, and on motion of the Superintendent in each case, these brethren were granted supernumerary relations.

The character of U. S. Crowder was passed, and he being absent, the Superintendent made report of his work.

At this time all the charges were called and pastors made report of their work.

Question 10 was taken up, "What Members have completed the Conference Course of Study."

The characters of T. S. Davis and J. F. Usrey were passed, the chairman of the Examining Committee made report as to the examination, and on motion, in each case, they were elected to Elders orders.

Question 9 was taken up, "What Members are in Studies of the Fourth Year?"

The character of C. M. Levister was passed and after report as to examination, on motion of Dr. Graham, he was advanced to the studies of the fourth year.

Question 5 was called, "Who have been Continued on Trial?"

The character of J. M. Smith was passed, and on motion he was continued in the studies of the first year.

W. H. Luther and M. L. Chappell were called, their characters passed, and on motion

in each case, after report by the Examining Committee, they were advanced to the studies of second year.

C. F. Hunter and H. H. Lowrey were called their characters passed, and, on motion of W. Q. A. Graham in each case, they were continued in the studies of the second year.

Question 7 was taken up, "Who have been Admitted into Full Connection?"

J. B. Bridgers was called forward. The Bishop addressed the candidate concerning the office and work of the ministry, and asked the Disciplinary questions, to which satisfactory replies were given. The chairman of the Examining Committee made report as to his examination; the Superintendent made proper representation, and the Secretary reported the filing of required answers to questions concerning debt and tobacco.

On motion of the Superintendent, J. B. Bridgers was admitted, he having previously been ordained deacon.

Question 8 was taken up., "What Members are in Studies of the Third Year?"

Leolan Jackson was called, his character passed, and on motion he was continued in the studies of the third year.

U. S. White was called, his character passed, and on motion, he was continued in the studies of the third year.

Question 30 was taken up, "Where shall the next Conference be held?"

Leolan Jackson presented an invitation from Parmele, N. C., and on his motion, it

was ordered that the next Conference be held at that place.

On motion, it was ordered that when Conference adjourns it be to meet at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

Conference adjourned. The doxology was sung, and the benediction was pronounced by the Bishop.

The Conference met at 3 p. m., Bishop Foss presiding.

On motion of C. M. Levister, the resolution passed at last session relative to the equalization of expenses, was defined to mean only the actual transportation expenses to and from Conference, and that it would apply to Probationers as well as full members.

The Examining Committee made report, the required answers to questions concerning debt and tobacco were filed, and on motion of Dr. Graham in each case, they were received on trial.

Article 1. This society shall be known as the "Evangelization Union of the Atlantic Mission Conference."

Article 2. Its object shall be to afford financial aid to needy churches; to organize new church enterprise; and conduct religious work among the religiously destitute within the bounds of the Atlantic Mission Conference.

Art. 3. The officers of the society shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and a Board of Control, which shall be composed of the officers and three additional members of the Methodist Episcopal Church either ministers or laymen; said officers to be elected annually by the Atlantic Mission Conference.

Art. 4. The President, Secretary and Treasurer shall report annually to the Conference at its regular sessions, the state of the mission needs, the work done through its agency, the financial condition of the Society and its needs.

Art. 5. The Board of Control may support either in whole or in part, one or more preachers or workers in any such destitute section as it may select, or it may employ, for such time as may be practicable, an Evangelist, to co-operate with the pastors upon their invitation, but shall in no case involve the Conference in debt.

Art. 6. Preachers or workers employed by the Society must be either members of the Conference, regularly appointed by the Bishop, or supplies appointed by the Superintendent or Presiding Elder.

Art. 7. The Board of Control may hold semi-annual meetings, if in its judgment required, and may arrange for the expenses of

Art. 9. This constitution shall be subject to alteration or change only by the Atlantic Mission Conference at a regular session.
