Daily Proceedings

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The second session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Central Jurisdiction, convened in Mt. Pleasant Methodist Church, Winston-Salem, North Carolina, on Wednesday, October 23, 1941, at 9:00 a. m., Bishop Shaw presiding.

A brief devotional service was conducted by Bishop Shaw.

The motion of Rev. G. H. Caldwell prevailed that the organization of the Conference precede the welcome addresses.

J. E. Brower, the Secretary of the last Conference, was requested to call the Conference roll.

The Conference stood with bowed heads while Rev. W. T. Lomax led the Conference in prayer.

On motion of Rev. S. A. Peeler, J. E. Brower was elected Secretary with the privilege of nominating his assistant. He nominated Rev. T. H. Wootten, who was elected.

The Statistician, P. I. Wells, and the Treasurer, N. J. Pass, nominated their assistants who were elected. H. C. Gannaway, G. E. Hogue, and G. W. Patterson, to the Statistician, and L. A. Brown, J. W. Hall, and C. W. Perry, to the Treasurer.

On motion, Rev. G. H. Caldwell was elected reporter to local and church papers.

Motion carried that the bounds of the Conference include the Main Auditorium.

On motion, Rev. C. N. Williams was elected Postmaster.

The names of the charges by districts were called by the Secretary, and the Lay delegates present gave their names.

The Bishop requested the District Superintendents to hand the names of the Lay delegates to the Secretary.

Motion by Rev. R. C. Sharp prevailed that Thursday, eleven o'clock, be made order of the day for Roll Call and report of Cash and Vouchers for Bennett College.

The printed program for the Conference was adopted as the program of the Conference, with such adjustments as necessary to carry on the business of the Conference.

Motion by Rev. C. W. Perry prevailed that the Committee on World Service and Finance meet and recommend proration amount for each school, Bennett, Allen, and Gammon, for the ensuing year.

Welcome Service Continued: On behalf of Winston-Salem Teachers' College, by Dr. L. E. Boyd, representing Mr. G. L. Johnson. On behalf of Ministerial Alliance by Rev. Thomas Kilgore.

Response: Rev. W. M. Wells was requested by the Bishop to make the response in his stead. Rev. Mr. Wells accepted and made a thrilling response.

Holy Communion: Bishop Shaw requested the District Superintendents and the pastor of the entertaining church to assist him in the administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, which they did, using the revised order of worship. A thoughtful and searching communion meditation was given by Bishop Shaw on the question asked by the disciples, "Lord, is it I?" after which a very large number of communicants, both ministerial and lay, participated.

An offering of \$9.23 for emergency purposes was raised and given to the Treasurer.

The Communion closed with a brief song service.

The Mt. Pleasant Woman's Society of Christian Service presented to Bishop and Mrs. Shaw a lovely boquet of flowers. The Bishop responded with fitting words.

AFTERNOON SESSION—WEDNESDAY

Devotions were led by Rev. P. W. Jenkins.

Hymn No. 301 was sung.

Prayer was offered by Dr. H. L. Ashe, after which Rev. Jenkins delivered a very thoughtful message on "Re-digging the Wells of Our Fathers."

Dr. Roy Smith, Editor of the Christian Advocate, was presented and brought an urgent plea for the support of the Christian Advocate—Central Edition.

The name of Rev. W. T. Lomax was called, his character passed, and he presented his report as Superintendent of the Greensboro District.

The character of Rev. R. B. McRae was passed and he presented his report as Superintendent of the Laurinburg District.

The character of the Effective Elders and the Supply Pastors of the Greensboro and Laurinburg Districts were passed and they made their reports. Dr. A. R. Howard, representing the Board of Temperance, was presented.

Dr. J. T. Fletcher, representing the Board of Missions and Church Extension, was presented and brought encouraging remarks.

After the announcements, Dr. S. A. Peeler pronounced the benediction.

EVENING SESSION-WEDNESDAY

Devotions were led by Rev. M. S. Laughlin.

Hymn No. 164 was sung, after which Dr. A. R. Howard was presented and made a very touching and thought-provoking address.

Dr. E. A. Love was presented and gave a very informing address on "The New Church."

An offering of sixteen dollars was raised.

The name of Rev. H. L. Ashe was called, his character passed, and he presented his report as Superintendent of the Winston District.

Dr. David D. Jones, President of Bennett College, was presented and spoke.

The benediction was pronounced by Dr. A. E. Love.

THURSDAY MORNING, OCTOBER 23

Devotions were led by Rev. G. H. McMurray.

Bishop Shaw called the Conference to order.

The Journal of the previous day was read and approved.

Motion prevailed that a Committee on the Journal be appointed. Revs. G. H. Caldwell, C. W. Perry, and R. B. McRae were appointed by the Bishop.

Motion by J. E. Brower prevailed that the District Superintendents make individual reports at the Annual Conference and then prepare a composit report for publication in the Journal.

The name of Rev. G. M. Phelps was called, his character passed and he read his report as District Superintendent of the Western District.

Pastors from the Western and Winston Districts were called. their character passed, and they made their reports.

The Bishop followed with the complimentary statement: "That

after six years of listening to reports from various Conferences, I have never heard them so universally good."

Introductions: Dr. E. H. Blackard of High Point, N. C., Dr. D. E. Camak, and Rev. Mr. Wood. Doctors Blackard and Camak brought fraternal greetings from the Western North Carolina Conference, meeting in Centenary Church, this city.

Bishop Shaw made timely remarks and sent greetings to the Western North Carolina Conference and to Bishop Purcell.

Motion carried that Doctors R. N. Brooks and G. H. Caldwell convey fraternal messages to the Western North Carolina Conference.

The order of the day was called. The Bishop then presented President David D. Jones to make an appeal for the College.

The Conference roll was called by Districts for money collected since September 1st. An amount of \$419.00 was reported.

Introductions: Dr. C. K. Brown, Washington Conference; Rev. H. B. Barkley, A. M. E. Church, Winston; and Rev. G. J. Thomas, Congregational Church, Winston.

Dr. N. J. Crawley was presented and announced that he was presenting check from the Chartered Fund of \$75.00.

"Jesus, Keep Me Near the Cross" was sung.

Bishop Shaw presented Dr. A. R. Howard of South Carolina Conference, representing the Board of Temperance. Dr. Howard made a most forceful and persuasive address on "Temperance."

Bishop Shaw requested that an offering for the Board of Temperance be lifted. An amount of \$10.28 was given.

Rev. H. C. Gannaway led in singing "Until I Reach My Home."

Dr. J. W. Haywood, President of Morristown College, pronounced the benediction.

FRIDAY MORNING, OCTOBER 24

Devotions were conducted by Rev. J. W. Cameron.

Hymn No. 342 was sung, 23rd Psalm read, and a very fine comment made by Rev. Mr. Cameron.

Business Session: Question 2, "What rules have been adopted to govern the procedure of this Conference?" Rules of the General Conference.

Question 3, "Is the Annual Conference incorporated?" Yes.

Question 4, "What officers and persons holding money, funds, etc., are bonded, and in what amounts?" Dr. S. A. Peeler, \$1,000; Rev. N. J. Pass, \$5,000.

Question 24, "Who are transferred to other Annual Conferences?" None.

Question 28, "Who are admitted on trial? (a) In studies of first year?" None. (b) In studies of third year under the Seminary Rule?"

Question 29, "Who have been continued on trial? In studies of first year?" Samuel L. Townsend.

Question 30, "Who are discontinued?" S. P. Holland.

Question 31 (b), "Who are admitted into full membership?" (a) None. (b) "Elected and ordianed Deacons previously?" O. W. Burwick. Graduated from studies of the second year and advanced to studies of the third year.

Question 32, "What members are in studies of the third year? (a) Admitted into full membership this year?" O. W. Burwick. (b) "Admitted into full membership previously and continued in the studies of the third year?" J. J. Patterson, E. N. Mattison, Samuel B. McBrayer.

Question 34, "What members have completed the studies of the fourth year? (a) Elected and ordained Elders this year?" B. W. Stewart.

Question 36, "What others have been elected and ordained Elders? (a) As local Deacons?" Alexander L. Walker.

Question 38, "Are all members blameless in their life and official administration?" Yes.

Question 39, "Who are the Accepted Supply Pastors?" J. L. Alford, A. L. Barnes, B. B. Barnes, Lonnie Bailey, C. W. Belo, A. L. Brooks Glenn, Brown Beverly Campbell, E. G. Cook, W. C. Rev. C. W. Perry moved to rescind action of the Annual Conference in the case of Rev. Walter G. Hamilton. The motion carried unanimously. Question 27, "What ministers coming on credentials from other Evangelical Churches are received? (b) Into full membership on recognition of his orders?" Walter G. Hamilton.

Motion by Rev. R. W. Winchester carried that Rev. W. G. Hamilton be admitted into full membership on credentials.

Motion by Rev. C. W. Perry prevailed that a Conference Budgeting Committee be set up. The following men were appointed by the Bishop: The District Superintendents, W. C. Scarborough, R. W. Winchester, and S. T. Brooks.

Motion of R. W. Winchester prevailed that the errors made in the previous Journals be corrected, and the record read as follows:

- (1) S. P. Holland discontinued in 1941.
- (2) P. W. Jenkins as admitted into full membership in 1940correct.
- (3) G. H. McMurray as admitted into full membership in 1940 —correct.
- (4) Leander A. Brown as admitted into full membership in 1932.
- (5) Prance A. Taylor as admitted into full membership in 1932.
- (6) Herbert C. Gannaway as appointed, Brown Summit, full member, 1923. Admitted.
- (7) Aaron M. Robertson, located in 1918.
- (8) John W. Simpson admitted into full membership in the Conference in 1902.

Motion by J. E. Brower carried that a committee of three be appointed to correct the Chronological Roll of the Conference. R. W. Winchester, C. W. Perry, and J. E. Brower were appointed.

Question 22, "Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?" Motion of J. E. Brower unanimously prevailed that the next session of the Annual Conference, which is to be held by its own son, Bishop R. E. Jones on his fiftieth anniversary, be held in his home church, St. Matthews, Greensboro, N. C.

Bishop Shaw expressed his gratitude to the Conference for this unanimous vote and said that Bishop Jones has made a marvelous record and that we should see to it that this anniversary be celebrated in a big way so as to crown Bishop Jones with glory and honor and victory in his home Conference and church.

After a motion made by Rev. R. W. Winchester requesting the

presence of Bishop and Mrs. Shaw at the 1942 Conference, Bishop stated that he would be delighted to be present and that he would arrange so that he could be, without a vote.

Motion prevailed that a Special Program Committee be appointed for the 1942 Conference: The District Superintendents, R. N. Brooks, Conference Lay Leader, and J. E. Brower.

Motion by J. E. Brower prevailed that a Committee on Entertainment be set up for the Area Council which is to be held at Bennett College and that the name of President Jones be included. The District Superintendents, J. E. Brower, and Dr. R. N. Brooks were appointed.

Motion by J. E. Brower carried that the amount necessary for the Summer School for Undergraduate Ministers be apportioned to each of the Districts.

Rev. G. M. Phelps requested the privilege of the floor for Rev. N. J. Pass. It was granted, and Rev. Mr. Pass presented a check for \$50.00 to Bishop Shaw, as the Western District's pro rata share of the \$200.00 the N. C. Conference had been asked to raise for furnishings in the Bishop's residence.

Rev. G. H. Caldwell reported that the committee elected to convey greetings to the Western North Carolina Conference, meeting in Winston, went in total number, and that Dr. Brooks made a very appropriate address, which was enthusiastically accepted by the Conference, and that Bishop Purcell sent special greetings to Bishop Shaw and the Conference.

Motion by Rev. R. C. Sharp prevailed that we thank the committee for the report.

A check from the Publishing House was presented by Dr. R. N. Brooks in the amount of \$738.90.

Presentations: Drs. J. T. Fletcher, Guptill, and N. J. Crawley were presented, and Drs. Fletcher and Guptill spoke.

Rev. L. W. Hedrick, District Superintendent of the Bluefield District, East Tennessee Conference; Rev. L. L. White, Roanoke, Va.; Rev. E. S. Williams, Salem, Va.; Mr. Ambrose Williams. Salem, Va.; Elder E. J. Boyd, Misses Julia Titus, I. R. Jones, and Helen Andrews of Allen High School. Miss Titus brought greetings from Allen and asked for continued support.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON, OCTOBER 24

Devotions were conducted by Rev. H. C. Gannaway.

Question 42, "What ministerial members have died during the year?" Rev. E. I. S. Swann and Rev. Henry Jones.

Question 45, "Who are the retired ministers?" Revs. J. J. Blanton, G. W. Byers, S. B. Cornelius, J. R. McNair, Dorsey McRae, Marcus Munday, A. E. Robinson, R. J. Shipp, and B. F. Thomas.

The above-named were passed in character and continued in retired relation.

Motion prevailed that all moneys raised on Veteran's Day be turned over to the Treaşurer and the list be published by the Secretary.

Motion by Rev. W. E. Hairston carried that we set up a Committee on Town and Country Work.

Motion prevailed that the names of the Lay Delegates be published in the Journal.

Rev. H. L. Ashe moved that Lay members be elected at each fourth Quarterly Conference.

A substitute motion by Rev. G. M. Phelps was that they be elected each four years.

Vote on the substitute motion was lost. The original motion prevailed.

Motion by Rev. G. H. Caldwell prevailed that the District Superintendents give to the Secretary a complete list of the Lay members before the roll call each year at the beginning of the Conference.

Rev. N. J. Pass moved that Rev. R. W. Winchester share in the money raised for Secretary and Statistician to the amount of his expenses.

Dr. R. N. Brooks amended said motion, restricting the amount to \$5.00. The amendment was accepted and the motion prevailed.

The amount collected was \$47.75.

Motion by Rev. G. M. Phelps prevailed that Rev. G. H. Caldwell be elected Youth Councilor for the Conference.

SATURDAY MORNING

have a Conference Educational Rally on a convenient date for the Conference.

Rev. G. M. Phelps moved to lay the substitute motion on the table. The motion did not lie on the table.

The substitute motion prevailed.

J. E. Brower requested that the floor be granted Rev. W. S. McLeod. It was granted, and Rev. Mr. McLeod presented to Rev. W. T. Lomax, the retiring District Superintendent of the Greensboro District, a purse of \$35.00 on behalf of the ministers and laymen of the District.

Rev. Mr. Lomax responded with touching words, voicing his appreciation.

These officers have been selected by the Board, the name of which will be forwarded to the Board of Education.

BUDGET

We recommend that for the present year the sum of \$50.00 be placed in the Conference budget by the Committee on World Service and Finance to defray the expenses of the Conference Board of Education the year of 1941-1942.

In keeping with the request of the Executive Committee of the Methodist Conference on Christian Education the next meeting of which will be held in Nashville, Tenn., November 25-28, 1941, and in co-operation with other Conference Boards of Education in the church. We recommend that the sum of five dollars be sent by our Conference Treasurer to Secretary of Board of Education at Nashville, Tenn.

Rev. Mr. Phelps moved that the Conference confirm the election of Dr. G. H. Caldwell as Youth Councilor for the Conference. Motion prevailed.

Rev. Mr. Phelps also moved that Rev. Mr. Caldwell meet the District Young People's meetings in the spring and that his expenses be paid by these meetings. Motion prevailed.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, WINSTON DISTRICT

Mr. President and Brethren:

I am deeply grateful to God for health and courage to carry on in the face of anxieties and complications that have characterized the work of the year; and for the measure of success indicated, which is all too meager; and to the pastors and laymen of the District, who in varying degrees have made whatever success we have had possible. I humbly submit my report as Superintendent of the WinstonDistrict.

Another Conference year has become history; it has been a year that has made extraordinary demands upon the faith, courage and endurance of pastors and churches; but it has also been marked by rich fellowship, heroic service and worthy achievement. With but few exceptions the reports from the churches have been stimulating and encouraging and all signs indicate that the challenging task involved in the program of the United Church has been resolutely accepted and will be faithfully performed by our people in a spirit of renewed confidence and unfailing loyalty and devotion.

Death has invaded our ministerial ranks and claimed Brother Henry Jones, who for 14 years had served the Rural Hall and Pilot Mountain Charges successfully. Brother Jones was ill for two years. He battled the wasting disease with courage and fortitude. He kept in touch with churches, giving directions and inspiration which brought outstanding success. Through the services of his son, John Jones, Jr., a promising young preacher in the local ranks, as Supply Pastor, the charge is coming up with a 100% report.

During the year notable advances have been made. The churches throughout the District have had conversions and accessions.

The building and improvement program has gone forward in a very fine way. Nothing has been left undone for the glory of God and the advancement of His kingdom.

Our associations and contacts have been with some of the finest ministers and noblest laymen to be found anywhere, a group well organized and well trained for efficient Christian service. It is with joy that I commend them.⁶

If anything has been accomplished worthy of note during the years of my tenure on the District, the credit is due largely to the loyalty of my brother ministers and the flocks over which they have watched. I wish to thank them for the fine co-operation given, for every kindness shown, for every consideration given.

OUR MINISTRY: During the past few years we have been facing declining incomes in practically all of our churches. Naturally this situation, combined with the general disturbance of the period through which we have been passing, has intensified the unrest which we have learned to recognize as an accompaniment of growth and expansion in our re-organized and mighty church.

Some of our faithful pastors have grown restless as they have been compelled to face a loss of (so-called) grade, due to a radical reduction of salary. This can be readily understood and sympathized with. Deeply as we regret it, we are all aware of an inevitable rating somewhat on the basis of the salary received.

This restlessness gives rise to a desire to move in order to maintain one's so-called "grade"; but this is accompanied by serious complications. It has been difficult to make clear to our ministers and laymen alike that wherever there is

a reduction in support, someone, some preacher has to accept the reduction, unless there is a vacancy due to death, or retirement in a church of an equal, or higher grade. In fairness it may be said that this year, in particular, moving without sufficient cause is not in keeping with our efforts to economize.

WOMEN'S ORGANIZATIONS: The newly organized Woman's Society of Christian Service has kindled the imagination, aroused the interest, and challenged the faith of the womanhood of the church in a very remarkable way. It is no exaggeration to state that it has a revolutionary and re-vitalizing effect upon the women's activities in all of our churches. It is well organized on the Winston District and is carrying on a well-planned, intelligently directed program of inspiration and helpfulness with the result that a new spirit of consecration and service is possessing the hearts of our people, creating a larger interest in the world-wide mission of our church.

OUR YOUNG PEOPLE: Our young people's work has moved forward in direct proportion to the right type of leadership. It is our conviction that no finer group of young people ever challenged the church than the group with which we must reckon today. They are eager, alert, clear-eyed, responsive and purposeful. The Church School continues to be an exceedingly fertile field for the normal functioning of our educational, evangelistic and mission study programs. We note a growing problem in our city churches, especially, concerning the vacation season. We have urged our pastors to make a special study of methods by which the best interest of the Church School increases in popularity and usefulness. In several communities it is carried on as a co-operative endeavor in a very satisfactory way.

Bennett College for Women still stands as the powerhouse of our Conference. The Area, yes, the whole Central Jurisdiction, is feeling the utilizing influence generated and set in motion at the great institution. As a Conference we owe it a larger support. It should have it, it must have it.

There is no single agency in the Jurisdiction that is doing more to advance the great program of the church than the *Advocate*, *Central Edition*. Its brilliant Editor is giving editorials that are freighted with inspiration and information. The Conference could, and *should*, do a better job in increasing the subscription list. We are being urged to this end.

THE ECONOMIC SITUATION: It is our conviction that as Christians our aim and goal should be nothing less than a Christian Social Order. Such an order of society would recognize the sacredness of human personality, embody the principle of co-operation and largely appeal to the motive of service. It is obvious that our present social order is far from being Christian. In its dealing with the economically weak and oppressed it exhibits little regard for the sacredness of personality.

It is not, in our opinion, our task to map out economic programs, formulate legislation, or champion any given party; but we cannot as a church, or as individuals, content ourselves with mere generalizations. We must set forth those principals of justice and good will which we hold to be the will of God. As followers of Jesus Christ and servants of men we cannot be indifferent to those affairs of industry and state which so vitally effect human welfare. As preachers of the Gospel we must make plain what the Gospel means in all its applications. We must set up the goals of social welfare toward which we must strive, and we should judge all institutions and parties and measures by the way in which they minister to those needs. And there are some situations that are plainly evil, some procedures so clearly indicated that the church must stand for definite action or convict itself of sinful indifference and betrayal. We believe that religion should be concerned with all of life and that the rule of righteousness and love should extend to all the affairs of men.

As I hasten on to the conclusion of this report, let me remind this Conference of a fact well known to us all, viz: That the Christian Church makes its contribution to the advancing civilization of mankind not by might of numbers, nor by the power of money, but by theQUALITY OF ITS SPIRIT. During the past few years mankind has been subjected to a series of stresses and strains, appalling in their variety and intensity. A world war has increased national and racial hatreds, and unbalanced economic and social life, bred disillusionment and revolution. Fear and hate have spread through the human race with the virulence of a pestilence. If ever the world needed the FAITH, the HOPE, the CHARITY for which Christianity stands, it needs them today. Courage must go hand in hand with serenity; unselfishness with the appreciation of our fellowmen. The material success of individuals and nations must give place for the spiritual progress of the race.

In all human experience there is no instrument equal to this unparallelled task but the Christian Church. As we consider the important problems before us in all their various aspects, we should not forget that in the final analysis our task is neither to SAVE AN INSTITUTION NOR PROMOTE A DENOMINA-TION, but to DEVELOP WITHIN OURSELVES and within our fellowship, a consciousness of God's loving presence and eternal purpose. We should bear constantly in mind that as a Minority Group in a World Church we have a spiritual contribution to make for Christ's sake and for ourselves. WE are "on the spot." Unless each of us can grow day by day in devotion to our Lord and Saviour and in humble, fearless obedience to the will of God, our life and work as members of a great church will have been in vain. No matter how great, or how little our place in life may be, its real significance and ultimate value is directly dependent upon the spirit in which we live. We are a relatively small, but none the less significant, part of a great church which, without us, cannot be perfect. As such, each of us has a solemn responsibility to live his life with such adoring devotion to God, such unselfish fellowship with our brother and such daily growth in the spirit of Jesus Christ as belong of right to those who love and serve Him.

We are being TRIED AS IF BY FIRE. We are being PUT TO THE TEST. WE ARE "ON THE SPOT." Let us KEEP UP OUR MORALE.

The churches that are fighting the good fight and staying at their major tasks through these years of testing are to be the strong churches of what, please God, we believe to be a better tomorrow.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, GREENSBORO DISTRICT

Bishop Shaw, Fellow District Superintendents, Pastors, Lay Leaders, Representatives of the W. S. C. S., Youth Fellowship, Visitors and Friends All, Greeting:

I am happy to be permitted to make my second annual report in our new Methodism, and our sixth and final report as Superintendent of the Greensboro District.

Six years ago I was appointed to this responsible task by the late Bishop Brown in my home church, St. Matthews, Greensboro.

I accepted my task graciously, and with a keen sense of the many weighty duties to be performed. How well I may have succeeded, or how utterly I may have failed, may be learned from the records of our Minutes.

Four of our present pastors started with me in my beginning and have stood by us right through, doing a fine job of it. They are Brothers J. W. Hall, R. J. Shipp, J. W. Shuford, and J. W. Simpson.

TEMPORAL IMPROVEMENTS: Some new buildings have been erected and much improvement and beautifying churches, parsonages, and grounds have been done. I mention only the major projects. A brick veneered church has been built at Guilford without any help from our Board of Church Extension. The debt was cleared this year. Dr. Peeler has been the pastor for two years. A splendid church has been purchased at Townsville and paid for in full. Brother Shipp is pastor. Our church at Oxford has been renovated inside and out, and is now very beautiful. Brother Hall has been pastor for fifteen years, and the folk are begging for his return.

A new, modern heating plant has been installed in St. John Church, Leaksville, and the parsonage put in A-1 condition with hot and cold water. Under the leadership of Brother Stewart, who has served three years, his people want him returned.

Our church and parsonage at Raleigh have both been renewed, inside and out. Modern lav accommodation in church and parsonage, with other improvements. Brother McLeod has served here well for five years.

The Northwest Greensboro Charge probably takes first place in some respects. Under the leadership of Brother Simpson, a new church has been built at Mt. Carmel, roof and framework completed, storm-sheeted, and basement completed for services; seven thousand bricks on ground for the finish. The parsonage has been completed and the grounds beautified with many roses and other flowers.

The church at Mt. Tabor has been remodeled, painted inside and out, and new pews placed and all paid for. Warren Street Church has installed lavs, and also done much other needed improving. Brother Frazier has served Basses and Browning Chapels for two years, during this time new pews have been bought and paid for at Basses, and much repair work done at Brownings. Both of the churches are practically new brick veneered buildings.

Much has been done in many other charges which I shall not mention in particular.

St. Matthews was struck by a tornado five years ago last April and between five and ten thousand dollars' damage was done. Repairs have been made and the debt has been reduced to less than \$600.00. Brother Brower is pastor.

High Street, under the leadership of Brother Wells, and the three churches on the Brown Summit Charge have both made considerable improvements. Brother Hairston is pastor at Brown Summit. I regret that the Southeast Greensboro Charge has been abandoned. There are four churches on this charge, all of which are rapidly decaying. It seems to me that the Conference Trustees should take them over and dispose of them in whatever way would be the most beneficial to the Conference.

FINANCE: The financial condition of the District is fair. Our total report this year will show some increase over the previous years.

The District is greatly in need of a financial system that will take care of its ministerial support in a more business-like way, whether it be large or small. We are hopeful that through the activities of our Lay leadership this will soon be worked out.

(CHRISTIAN) EDUCATION: In these days of wretched, reckless restlessness, education will play an important part.

Christian education, the one and only panacea for this world's afflictions, should be our watchword. It will help hasten the coming of a universal brotherhood and the reign of the King of Peace. Therefore, I have urged the wholehearted support of our Church Schools and colleges: particularly Morristown College, Allen School, and our beloved Bennett College, which is the watchtower of our District and lighthouse of our Conference.

Our Church Schools have been stimulated, and the membership increased.

EVANGELISM: Living as we are today under the shadow of the deathdealing destruction of the seventh and last Angel of Death, whose veil of wrath is being poured out in the water, on the earth, and in the air, according to John's record in Revelations 16:16, 17, 18. It is time to use every possible means to save the world from being blown out.

There is an unprecedented need for world evangelization. I have, therefore, endeavored to help create an atmosphere pregnant with love which will reach and help save men and women in every race, group, caste and class of human society. Working with both pastors and people, we have encouraged both mass and individual methods in this most important work.

I think we have been able to strengthen the faith of Christians, reclaim many backsliders, and lead some sinners to accept saving faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

NEW HORIZONS: We are happy to bequeath to our successor in office all that we may hold of value to the future advancement of the District. And in passing it over we wish to remind you that the fields are write unto harvest. Our new Methodism demands the courage of a Joshua, the wisdom of a Solomon, the meekness of a Moses, and the faith and perseverance of an Abraham. May you be endowed with all of these graces; and, in the words of the poet, remember that:

> New occasions teach new duties, Time makes ancient good uncouth, We must upward, still onward, If we keep abreast with truth.

We need to establish missions and build churches in the following cities: Burlington, Durham, and Danville, Va., and several smaller towns and communities.

GRATITUDE: To the pastors, members, constituents, and friends all: Please accept thanks with the deepest expressions of my soul's gratitude for your fine fellowship and loyal support you have given us in our District program. We have endeavored to serve every charge, small or large, in an unselfish way. May the Father of love and mercy still pour his blessings upon you all.

FINALLY: And now to you, Bishop Shaw, I say thanks a million for your fatherly advice' and helpful co-operation. God bless you! Live forever!

I shall receive my appointment from your hands with pleasure. And I promise you that wherever my lot is cast, I shall let the Master have his way with my life, and I shall endeavor to serve all the people intrusted to my care faithfully. I am yours in Christ's name.

Last year in almost every church group, some reference was made to the New Church. Publishers were writing us concerning it, and warning us of plans soon to follow which would guide us in this new adventure.

This year hardly a week has passed but what in our mail some information has come, suggesting to us how to carry on. We hasten to confess to you without this information we could have done but very little. All praise to the *Methodist Layman*, the World Outlook, the Methodist Woman, Tidings, and the Christian Advocate, Central Edition. Any one trying to carry on without these is like trying to farm without sufficient tools.

We are indebted to Dr. Brooks for the campaign he has led in our Conference this year in securing subscribers to the *Christian Advocate*, in many instances it has surpassed that of any other year. When his idea of a *Christian Advocate* in the hands of every officer has been realized, we will soon have an informed leadership in every community.

After the reading of the appointments last year, there at the seat of the Conference, the pastors and lay members of the Western District were called together, and given plans to cover the first month, for we believe to do a year's work we must begin with the year.

We have not tried this year to work the total program, for we confess to you until now we have not fully understood it. But we have gone forth working as we understood, with the assurance as one proceeds the way opens up.

Our District and group meetings this year have not been taken up with great speech making, but with the interchanging of ideas relative to our church program as we have been able to grasp them.

The launching out on this new undertaking has brought large crowds of interested local church workers to our District meetings; results from such meetings will be evidenced in our reports to this Annual Conference.

Bishop Shaw, we were disappointed in your not being able to visit us this year. We had looked forward to your coming with great delight, the year has passed but we are still looking for you and Mrs. Shaw to honor us with your presence.

The Western District wishes to acknowledge here its indebtedness to those of

our leaders who found it possible to visit us, each of whom greatly helped us in their respective fields.

In this brief report I only have time to mention a few of those interests which have ever been before us. World conditions largely made possible by an atmosphere filled with the spirit of war, carries with it its usual evangelistic appeal. We trust that our work in the field of evangelism is far better than it seems. We are no less concerned than we have ever been but we face a compulsory change in our methods which we are a bit slow to grasp. That it is a process of education we most surely understand. With this before us we go forth slowly but surely, knowing that education without evangelism is not effective and evangelism without education is not permanent. Bennett College, which is becoming more and more one of the chief concerns in sur church program, has and will receive unstinted support until every possible resource shall be brought to its support.

Allen Home School, which must be given more than promises if it is to continue its service to a much neglected section. The Woman's Society of Christian Service in many respects is surpassing the other organizations of our church, but with the leadership and helps we are receiving through our Church Press, we look forward toward a greater day which must surely come to our organizations in general, and especially to the Lay Activities and Youth Work.

While we have gained along all lines over last year, the desired goal has not been reached. Therefore, after our assignments for another year we shall go forth to our respective fields with the adventurous spirit of our fathers following your leadership, following the Glory Way.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, LAURINBURG DISTRICT

Bishop Shaw, Brethren and Sistern of the

North Carolina Conference, and Friends:

Through the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ and the goodness of our Heavenly Father I am permitted to make this, my second report of the work of the Laurinburg District. I come to this hour with two emotions surging through my soul. One of joy and one of regret. We rejoice when we think that in our struggle through the year to carry on against the evil forces of life we have had victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. When we think of the opportunities that have been ours we have many regrets that we haven't done more for His cause.

The Laurinburg District is situated in the fertile section of the southeastern part of the state where farming is carried on extensively and thus, in many respects, becomes the most beautiful section of the state and the pride of the North Carolina Conference. As one travels the Laurinburg District and beholds its beauty, he is made to exclaim as did one of the Bishops of our church as he beheld the beautiful landscapes, "How much they miss who have not eyes to see. O God, if heaven outside so beautiful can be, give us the spirit's eyes to see inside with thee." I have traveled twenty-six thousand miles this year to carry on the work assigned to my care. I have no regrets for I feel that the results justify the travel.

In these days of war and confusion the faith and courage of our people are severly tested, and the church and ministry are scrutinized with respect to their ability to serve efficiently. If we could tear the muck-rake from our hands and

bring our eyes to focus with our soul's demands, we would not strain and struggle as we do, but from the hills, along the valleys and in the silence of the stars. God's voice would speak to us and we would hear and be at peace.

I am justly proud of the men with whom I have been called to labor this year, and with whom I gladly share whatever success has come to the District.

At the very outset we tender thanks to Almighty God that death has not entered our ranks this year. The personnel of the District has remained intact marked by the usual incidental ills and aliments that flesh is heir to. In the early part of the Conference year, Rev. W. M. Wells, our pastor at Laurinburg, was ill for several weeks and at times was not able to fill his pulpit, but due to wise planning and the aid of a loyal membership, the work was carried on and the cause has not suffered because of his illness.

DISTRICT MEETING: All of our District meetings were largely attended and splendid results were had. Our group meeting, in the early part of the year, met at Hamlet where we laid plans for our year's work. Our Young People's meeting met in Lumberton in June where we had a group of the finest young people anywhere to study the church. Our District Conference met at Beauty Spot in July and our after-Easter check meeting was in Hamlet in April. All of these meetings had a great part to play in the success of our work this year. Every phase of our church work has been emphasized this year and the same will be noted in the reports of the pastors.

The *Christian Advocate*, *Central Jurisdiction*, has been well taken care of this year on the District and I feel that the reports of the pastors will set a record for the Laurinburg District. Several of the charges have doubled themselves and some tripled.

Our pride for Bennett College has heightened, our love deepened, and our interest increased. We have a substantial increase in our giving for Bennett this year and yet it is not what it should be. We are greatly handicapped by the Food Rally which came at an inopportune time and spoiled the good that we might have done for the college.

We have given special attention to the work among the Young People of the District and no meeting is planned more carefully than our Young People's Institute. I have urged upon those who have to do with Young People's Work that while an academic study of national and international problems is needed, this study is in no sense a substitute for personal religious experience. Mark Twain once said: "There will never be an honest horse race until there is an honest human race." If we can lead our young people to a personal acceptance of christ, we will have made the largest possible contribution to a better social order. If we do not accomplish this, all else will not avail. When the heart is right, we have gone a long way towards righting human wrongs.

One of the amazing items of practical Christian service is the work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service. The women of the District are carrying on in a very fine way, and their influence is felt in their local church and thruoghout the District, and Conference.

A critic of the church has charged many laymen with being afflicted with a disease named Spectatorites. While such may apply to some, it is by no means attributed to the splendid company of men and women on the Laurinburg District. The work of the Board of Lay Activities of the District is being felt throughout the District and is being carried on in a very fine way under the very efficient leadership of Professors S. T. Brooks, J. F. McRae, and Mr.

William Thompson. They have plans on foot to reach each charge and help put into effect the plan of the church.

We come now to the most important and at the same time the most difficult part of the report of a Superintendent. That is: to tell the story of the achievements of the churches. In reality, this cannot be done. The actual work is with our Lord and only in eternity will it be disclosed.

The reports should show that there is an increase in membership of more than two hundred. Some of the churches have had, with our revival meeting this year, an increase of more than fifty members and the report of the pastors will tell the story of the success.

The material condition of the churches is good and in some of them it is far behind what it should be, taking into consideration the ability of the people to do.

None of our churches on the District have mortgages on them and none of them are heavily indebted.

The Philadelphia Church, near Hamlet, that was destroyed by windstorm more than a year ago, has been erected again by the aid from the Board of Home Missions of a gift of \$400.00 and the services of Dr. H. W. Bartley, and it is one of the most beautiful churches on the District.

In almost every charge there has been a raise in pastor's salary for the ensuing year, thereby showing the appreciation the people have for their pastor and his leadership.

While we cannot mention every charge one by one and tell of the great work that has been done by pastor and people, I feel that I would be false to my trust if I didn't mention the very fine work of two charges on the District, because of the interest we all have in them.

Many years ago the Methodist Church, bf some means, was silenced in Fayetteville, N. C., with the statement from some other branch of Methodism that it would never come back again. About a dozen or more years ago a handful of Methodist, who had moved into Fayetteville, began a Methodist Church that struggled a long time and they succeeded in building a cement block church there and, at the last Annual Conference, that church that has been a Mission church since its beginning, was put on its own resources and Rev. J. J. Patterson was assigned there. They have this year doubled all of their giving for the General Church and have given the pastor more than two hundred dollars over the assessment for this year and have raised the salary to \$1,200.00 for the coming year and thus Methodism has come back to Fayetteville to stay.

Rev. Beverly Brown, who was assigned to Goldsboro at the last Annual Conference, hastened to his work and got hold of the situation and began organizing the work and this has been one of the most fruitful years that Goldsboro has experienced in many years. The church has taken on new life and he has increased the membership by thirty-three members, and everything else in proportion. In June he was joined in the work by Mrs. Brown and they are still on their honeymoon and she has been quite an asset to the work. These two churches are handicapped for the lack of a parsonage.

Methodism has no more important work anywhere than the work in Charlotte. We must plan a program of expansion to take care of the large group of our people who are coming into the city and making their way into some other church. With a population of more than 100,000 we have the small number of 300 members in Charlotte. We have promise of help from other strong Methodist churches there when we are ready to take it up. EVANGELISM: The day of revival is over and evangelism has taken its place. If we are not evangelists we are not any thing. We have commercialized and now we must evangelize. We have come a little nearer that this year on the Laurinburg District and there has been a steady growth in all of our churches and they have added to the church those who are being saved. The field never was whiter than now and he that reapeth still receiveth wages. Whenever our programs have yielded to prayer and whenever and wherever we have re-discovered that the moral life is impossible to any man, and that we must have the miracle of the new birth before we can have life and growth, here one sees signs of real awakening. Heart hunger is everywhere revealing itself. Upon the mountain the feet of the messengers of good tidings are still beautiful.

We record here our appreciation for the Area Council and the joy that comes to us from being situated so as to have this very fine contact. We are grateful for the privilege to serve under the kind and brotherly leadership of Bishop Shaw. He makes one believe in his ability to do, and sends him forth determined to carry on against the odds.

The Laurinburg District is blessed to have two of the retired ministers of the Conference living in its bound: Rev. Marcus Mundy and Rev. J. R. McNair. These fathers in the ministry, as they rest in the shade of the evening, still bring sunshine and help to the ministers and are regular in attendance at services. I have specially urged the necessity of raising the entire amount for the Retired Fund. Many of our noble and faithful brothers reaching the age of retirement, are not able to claim the release from labor which is their right, and also open the door of opportunity for younger men seeking a place in the ministry, because of inadequate provision. The Conference must, in the near future, address itself to this task of providing more thoroughly for the retired brethren.

Permit me to say in closing, Bishop: While it is not possible to record all the activities in the churches-the devotion, the labors, the anxieties, the sacrifices -the spirit manifested is sufficient answer to those who say the church is a decadent institution. It is worth while to say especially at such a time as this, when churches are not as full as they once were, and there is the appearance of failure, what a real member of the church is in no doubt about: That the church cannot fail. If only among those reasons it is a divine society. It was not begun on earth but in heaven. And it came down from heaven. It does not matter if one destroy all the copies of a snapshot that have been printed, so long as the negative is in safe hands. This thought gives to God's followers peace as they watch so many lovely earthly dreams being shattered. Evil can only tear up the photograp;h God holds the negative. And when evil has done its worst, men will begin again to translate into terms of human fellowship and action the dream which dwells immortal and secure forever in the heart of God. The church's witness has ever been most powerful when she herself has been persecuted and despised. The highest peak of the church's power were not those days when she was miled upon by the world and had the support of princes and potentates. The church was never so powerful as when, keeping sincerely her true purpose before her, she was in ill-order, when her members were few, and when it was costly, and even physically dangerous to belong to her.

Thanking God that we were counted worthy to work for Him we choose no task but wait your assignment for another year.
